

SIXTH TEXAN DIES OF AIDS

HOUSTON — Donald E. Smith, 28, became the sixth victim in the Texas gay community to die of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) on December 17, 1982. He had been admitted to Memorial Hospital in this city a month earlier on November 15.

Burial was in Baltimore, Maryland on December 22. Friends were encouraged to participate in two memorial services to be held this Sunday, January 9. One service was scheduled for 11:00am at St. Anne's Catholic Church. Mass was to feature the choir with whom he sang tenor.

A second memorial service was to be held later the same day at 3:00pm at the Metropolitan Community Church of the Resurrection (MCCR) at 1919 Decatur, David T. McLaren informed TWT NEWS. Anyone wishing to participate should contact (713) 939-1112.

Smith was active in MSA bowling, being a member of the Briar Patch team. Because of his high-pitched cheer, he was known to many as "Mr. Wonderful." He also starred in a production of Pajama Game at the Jewish Community Center.

Smith was employed by Bechtel Petroleum since May 1981 as traffic administrator. However, his termination resulted from his poor health and attendance record relating to his AIDS condition.

"Donald wanted to do everything he could to help educate, prevent others from suffering, and convince others of the seriousness of the possible consequences of their lifestyle," said McLaren.

"Persons wishing to help Donald's dream come true have been asked to contribute to the Kaposi's Sarcoma Committee," McLaren explained. Donations may be sent to P.O. Box 1155, 3317 Montrose Blvd., Houston, Texas 77006. "Please specify that you are contributing for Donald E. Smith," TWT NEWS was reminded.

Smith's death from AIDS followed closely the sudden death of another Houstonian, Jim Jones, who succumbed on December 4 from bilateral pneumonia.


TWT NEWS learned from Dr. Swinney of the Baylor College of Medicine that Jones's eyes were donated to the college as a result of a recent article in TWT NEWS. The eyes were subsequently transplanted, one to an 18-year-old woman and one to a 19-year-old man who were victims of an automobile accident on December 26.

Of the six fatal AIDS cases in the Texas gay community, half have been caused by Kaposi's Sarcoma, two from pneumonia and one from hepatitis.

AIDS CAUSES BLOOD DONOR RESTRICTION

HOUSTON — In the past, healthy gay males had been able to donate blood on a weekly basis at the Alpha Therapeutic Corporation, 1520 Capitol in this city. For their efforts, they received \$40.

That has now been stopped, at least temporarily, because of the recent AIDS epidemic that is sweeping into Texas. "On December 20, 1982, a temporary restriction was placed on all male homosexuals, residents of Haiti and in-



travenous drug abusers," Joel Miller, assistant director of Alpha Therapeutic, informed TWT NEWS. "The purpose is to screen out those groups who have a higher incidence of AIDS," Miller explained. "We want to continue to insure safe products for public consumption," he cautioned.

Because three infants have died of AIDS as a result of blood transfusions, donors are being screened more carefully. The Center for Disease Control (CDC) in Atlanta reported one infant death resulted from blood transfused from a man who later died of AIDS.

"Several hemophiliacs have also come down with AIDS," Miller told TWT NEWS.

Donors who have had hepatitis may still be eligible for plasma donation. All plasma from Alpha is tested for hepatitis in Memphis, TWT NEWS learned.

CONGRESS DESIGNATES \$2 MILLION FOR AIDS

WASHINGTON, DC - The Gay Rights National Lobby's (GRNL) effort to increase funding for research on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) met with success during last month's lame duck session of Congress. Congress passed a Continuing Resolution funding the government for the rest of the fiscal year, which runs through September 30, 1983. In the resolution, \$2 million was appropriated for AIDS research to be conducted by the Center for Disease Control (CDC). In fiscal year 1982, only \$500,000 for AIDS research was provided. The funds for AIDS respresents a significant victory, since there were only two other new health related programs funded during the 97th Congress.

The CDC funds will be used to expand monitoring activities in an attempt to learn more about AIDS. The disease has been identified in nearly 800 cases nationwide, resulting in almost 300 deaths with two new cases reported each day. Medical researchers still know little about the cause, mode of transmission, treatment or cure for

AIDS. It is known, however, that the syndrome causes a profound suppression of a critical party of the body's immune system.

Commenting on GRNL's success, Steve Endean, executive director of GRNL, pointed to the extensive use of the field network in securing support from key members of Congress.

While this initial victory is an important step forward in gaining Congressional support for AIDS research, the effort to obtain more funds for vital research must continue. "Our goal is to turn the ever increasing concern of the gay community about AIDS into effective political action," Endean explained to TWT NEWS.



NEW MCCG FOR GALVESTON

GALVESTON — The Metropolitan Community Church of Galveston (MCCG) has purchased its own building, located at 1824 Broadway in the famed East Side Historical District. The 2200 sq.ft. building, initially constructed as a residence in the early '20s, offers ample space for worship facilities, offices, conference center and various social activities.



"Our acquisition of this building is evidence of our church's deep commitment to Galveston's gay community," Rev. Howard Wells, pastor, told TWT NEWS. "It is our intention to utilize the facility as a community center for the island's gay men and women. In 1983, we hope to house a gay Alcoholics Anonymous group, legal and medical referral service, counseling programs and an arts and crafts center, in addition to a full range of religious activities and Christian education programs."

The dedication service for the building will be held this Sunday, January 9, which will coincide with the third anniversary of the church's founding. Worship services have temporarily been held at St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church.

INTEGRITY ELECTION NEXT TUESDAY

HOUSTON — The annual election of officers for Integrity/Houston has been called for next Tuesday's January 11 meeting. The executive committee, sitting as a nominating committee, has nominated itself for re-election. Additional nominees will be solicited from the floor at the meeting.

The nominees are: Earl Gregory, convenor; Bob Harrison, vice convenor; Gary Schumacher, secretary; and Hal Harter, treasurer. Following the election, the elected officers will lead a discussion on the topic, "Directions for Integrity."

"We have filed a non-profit corporate charter with the Secretary of State, and should have the charter back in time for the January 25 meeting," said Gregory. "If it is in, there are a number of things that we must do to our by-laws, and we will discuss these changes and improvements at that meeting."

TWT NEWS has also learned that the Rev. Fr. W. Norman Pittenger, STD, Senior Fellow, King's College, Cambridge, will return to Houston on April 11 for a major address to the gay community, and a meeting with Integrity on April 12.

PHILPOT DIES ON CHRISTMAS

DALLAS — Joe Philpot, longtime owner of the popular Sundance Kids club in this city, died on Christmas night at Parkland Hospital after an extended illness.

Non-specific cerebral degradation was listed as the cause of death, TWT NEWS learned from physicians. Philpot had earlier been hospitalized for amebiasis. Although treatment was somewhat successful, Philpot never regained his full health in the ensuing year.

Burial was held on December 27 at his hometown of Greenville, Texas. The Philpot family had requested that any donations be made to the AIDS Program, Oak Lawn Counseling Center, 3409 Oak Lawn, Suite 202, Dallas, Texas 75219.

The request was in keeping with Philpot's continued work with local charities. During the past decade, as club owner of Sundance Kids, Philpot had been known for his community work in raising money for charities such as Visually Impaired Children of Dallas, the Thelma Boston Home, March on Washington, Texas Human Rights Foundation, Dallas Alliance for Individual Rights, and the Oak Lawn Counseling Center.



GAY ATHEISTS PICKET SWAGGART

HOUSTON — This Saturday, January 8, the local chapter of the Gay Atheists of America will sponsor a protest in front of the downtown Houston Coliseum where the Rev. Jimmy Swaggart, noted for his anti-gay railings, is scheduled to hold a three-day crusade.

Interested persons are encouraged to participate in the protest which will focus on the homophobia of the TV evangelist's messages. If you are interested in participating, please call Don Sanders at (713) 522-7531. "You must have your signs ready and approved by this Saturday at 6:30pm, and meet at 812 Harold St. for instructions and briefing," Sanders explained to TWT NEWS.

REHEARING ON DALLAS ARCADE

DALLAS — On October 20 of last year, the Court of Criminal Appeals ruled that a fully-enclosed movie arcade booth, with the door closed and locked, was "a public place," and consequently, any sexual activity occurring inside constituted public lewdness, a Class "A" misdemeanor. Potential punishment, under Texas law, is one year in iail and a \$2,000 fine.

The October decision was the outcome of a long trial involving Ronald Gene Cammack and Dallas Police Officer R.L. Newell. Newell had entered an arcade booth at Red Letter News, 10851 Harry Hines in Dallas. Cammack later entered the same booth and locked the door, allegedly touching the officer's genitals "with intent to arouse and gratify" his own sexual desire.

Cammack's attorney, Clyde F. DeWitt III, has now rightly reasoned to pursue a rehearing motion in light of last August's ruling by Judge Jerry Buchmeyer of Dallas in the 21.06 trial.

Because Judge Buchmeyer had ruled that sexual activity in private was within the law, DeWitt has concluded that his client did not break the law, since a locked movie arcade booth is private not "a public place."

DeWitt maintains that the right to privacy is at issue. DeWitt concludes that if a locked arcade booth is a public place, then so is a locked hotel room.

A hotel room, with the door locked and bolted, is "a public place," and accordingly, any of us who have engaged in sexual intercourse or any other sexual contact in a locked hotel room, has violated the statute in question, the attorney has opined.

"Obviously, this was not the legislative intent" of our law makers in Austin when statute 21.07 was carved out and passed. "The general right of privacy is rapidly expanding as can be observed by a review of cornerstone cases," DeWitt explained.

Taking the case in question to its loudest volume, DeWitt recalled the trial testimony which recorded that, "On January 5, 1978, Robert Newell, a Dallas city police officer, working undercover on a temporary assignment, went to the Red Letter News Number Two. After entering the common area of the store, he went into several of the booths in the movie section.

"He eventually entered booth six and deposited a quarter, leaving the door ajar about three inches. Appellant (Commack) then entered the completely enclosed booth, 28 inches by 42 inches, and closed the door. Newell related that the appellant 'groped my groin,' made sexual contact and placed his hands on Newell's genitals there in the booth. Newell suggested that they go to his van parked outside. The appellant was thereafter arrested," the testimony continued.

Because at the time of sexual contact, the booth door was closed to public view and the door was locked, the logical conclusion of the court should be that "public access to the booth had been eliminated," stated DeWitt.

When public access to a booth has been eliminated, a booth becomes "a private place," should be the reversed decision of the court.

THE RIGHT TO RESTROOM PRIVACY

DALLAS — When two men were arrested in the restroom at a Sears store, they were not convicted. When two men were arrested in the restroom at Reverchon Park, they were convicted, TWT NEWS recalled.

Why such a difference in judgment on two seemingly similar cases of homosexual activity?

The answer lies within the domain of one's right to privacy. The key to the court's answer hinged on whether a restroom stall had a door or didn't have a door.

In the Sears case, the men's restroom had commode stalls with doors which locked from the inside. "A person inside such a stall with the door locked could be said to have some reasonable expectation of privacy," ruled the court in Brown vs State.

In the Reverchon Park case, the men's restroom had commode stalls with "no doors and were visible to all in the general restroom area. In such a design, there is no reasonable expectation of privacy from viewers," ruled the court in Bryant vs State.

Hence, the expectation of privacy was not reasonable in the case where no doors were provided for the stalls. For this reason, the courts reversed the conviction involving the Sears store and affirmed the case involving the park.

In both cases, police officers observed, from concealed positions above the men's restroom in Sears Department Store and in Reverchon Park, two separate acts of oral sodomy committed. One was ruled to have occurred in a public place because there were no restroom doors. The other was ruled to have occurred in a private place because locking doors existed.

As a result, for the past decade, an increasing number of restrooms have removed the doors of their stalls. Consequently, for the past decade, restroom encounters where there are no locked doors have not been protected by the right to privacy.






AIDS Epidemic

Dear TWT:

Twr's continuing coverage of the AIDS epidemic is greatly appreciated and needed. This disease syndrome is becoming increasingly complicated and frightening as it spreads into various segments of the population of this and other countries. Although it appears to be true that gay men were the first to be affected by this medical problem almost two years ago, it now affects others such as hemophiliacs, heterosexuals, Haitians, women and even newborns whose mothers were intravenous drug abusers during pregnancy.

In a recent issue of TWT (Vol. 8, No. 40), a news story entitled "Miami Reports Six New Cases of AIDS" refers to the "gay cancer." There are a few important reasons why it is important that all media refrain from using this phrase. Last August at the Dallas Gay Leadership Conference, representatives from across the country voted to use the AIDS acronym rather than "gay cancer," one reason being that "gay cancer" is inaccurate since the problem now affects so many others than gay men.

Perhaps more important is that this term lends itself to negative implications on both a personal level and in terms of public awareness. Some of the "straight" media, anti-gay organizations and even the gay media have used this term (the latter perhaps inadvertently) in a way that misrepresents the medical problem and sensationalizes it in such a way that many readers assume that gay men have caused this problem.

Also, some gay people, victims of AIDS and others who are not, internalize this psychologically. They believe we have caused this epidemic and feel guilt and shame because of it. Many are quite

justifiably shaken by this epidemic. Others who are still in the awkward and uncomfortable stage of not being adjusted to their homosexuality are often ripe as targets of the misconception that gays have caused this deadly cancer and related diseases.

For these people the term "gay cancer"

In truth, it may very well turn out that the one positive side of the fact that it is mostly gay men who are currently affected is that we could be the means to the discovery of the solution(s) to this medical puzzle.

It is commonly known among medical professionals that the key to this solution is very likely to unlock other mysteries about cancer itself, making this a medical breakthrough of Nobel Prize winning stature, perhaps the most, and definitely one of the most important developments in

Thus, those concerned about the AIDS problem can rest assured that there is much motivation, whether it stems from a humanitarian focus or otherwise, to invest tremendous concentrated professional effort on research into this new clinical entity which is not the "gay cancer." On Bars in Lubbock

Dear TWT: I would like to take this opportunity to

comment on a very disgusting incident that I experienced at the Papillon Club in Lubbock. . . . On Saturday, November 27 at 1:30am or so, the dj (Kerri) called last call: a few minutes later Kerri got on again and scolded us by saying, "Give up your drinks now or you won't get any after hours"-you see, we are supposed to be ecstatic when they bless us with after hours. A few minutes later, I noticed Kerri picking up glasses. . . . There was a guy and a girl dancing right behind us who apparently were still drinking. Kerri apparently attempted to confiscate the guy's drink, and the guy gave some resistance, because before long they were in a heated argument. Soon after that, security came up and Kerri shouted to get that guy out of the bar. Up to this point, Kerri had every right to do what he did, but at this point it was up to security to get this guy out of the bar. By now, several of the bar's employees were at the scene, and the guy who was causing the trouble was trying to apologize to Kerri. I saw the guy put his hands on Kerri's shoulders-if he was not apologizing, I know at least he was not being violent. I turned away from the scene for a minute, and the next thing I knew they were fighting. . . . What was happening was all the employees (at least three of them) were holding the guy, while Kerri was taking some very hard and fast punches at the guy's facewhile security watched. Maybe Kerri feels he had good enough reason to beat on the guy-the guy seemed to be drunk, he probably wouldn't surrender his drink, and maybe he insulted poor Kerri. But I was appalled to see the way Kerri was allowed to beat on a guy while his fellow employees held him down. To add insult to injury. Kerri went to his booth, turned

off the music in the middle of a song, and although the incident was nobody else's business, he announced over the intercom that he would not tolerate assholes in that bar. I don't see how he can tolerate himself, if that is the case!

I have been in bars in Austin, San Antonio, Corpus, Waco and Dallas, and I have seen troublemakers roughed up and thrown out-but never anything like that. And believe me, that's not the only time I've seen Papillon employees gang up on a customer. I'm just so very sorry that gay people in Lubbock have no choice but to subject themselves to that bar-Papillon does not deserve the business of gay people. I have met some very nice people since I was transferred to Lubbock eight months ago, but having to give that bar my business, when my lover and I want to go out dancing, makes being gay in Lubbock a real drag. Name withheld by request Lubbock, Texas

Response from Papillon:

There are a lot of problems involved in providing after hours service in Lubbock, Texas. We have experienced many difficulties in the past and have come to realize that we absolutely must have all drinks out of the club no later than 1:55am, if we are to keep open. As we always clearly explain, we must strictly enforce this rule in order to provide after hours service to our customers.

In reference to the incident described above, it was a personal disagreement between Kerri and one of the patrons. The writer is mistaken in his assertion that other club employees were involved. If there is ever any problem in the club, it is a problem for the management to judge and decide upon, not for someone who "turned away from the scene for a minute."

And for the writer's information only: don't feel sorry for gay people in Lubbock. They have chosen Papillon as one of the four gay bars currently in Lubbock. As you should know after living here for eight months, there are three other bars in Lubbock where you can go. I sincerely hope that you will try all the bars, so that going out in Lubbock will no longer be "a real drag" for you. After all, we agree with you on one point—we do not deserve your business. "Hi, honey," you say and your lips close softly over mine. "How are you?" I respond with a smile and I touch





Hurry back, SUNDAY! ***





Alienation, by Ian Everton; 209 pp.; Gay Men's Press, P.O. Box 247, London N15 6RW, England; softcover, \$7.50.

Well, Alienation, the new novel by lan Everton, certainly lives up to its title. Published in England this past September, this story about the experiences of two gay men in the United Kingdom is chock full of questions, ambivalencies and estrangement. In fact, one of the two lovers, Jon Hanna, is found to be an amnesiac by Peter when he picks him up on the "motorway." Jon is totally cut off from his past by forces beyond his control (forces we learn about

later), reinforcing the theme of alienation.

Since lan is a Briton, his terminology and references allude to places and things in England, pleasant diversions from the narrative in which they lay. "Motorway" is only one of many of the differences between the language of their culture and ours. They are refreshing changes in the content of the book that may be its most entertaining feature, unfortunately.

The tale is low on action, low on dialogue, and high on the internal ruminations of its characters. They draw back from the events and people surrounding them, as per Everton's wishes, and engage themselves in self-doubt, ques-

tioning and philosophical discourse from a critical stance—on the whole they are quite humorless in their thoughts and actions. The appeal this book may have for others eludes me. Doubtless, there are many books, novels among them, that can successfully convey a character's philosophical stance, relate him/her to the surrounding events and persons, explore ideas and provide either suspense, excitement, catharsis or humor.

Instead of revealing the characters through their interactions with others, Everton chooses to enter their thoughts directly and reporting them to the reader. This constant switching of the focus of the reader's attention is often distracting, slowing down the pace of the story considerably. The reader has to "work" harder to understand the character in reference to the rest of the novel when the character has a bout of musing on his/her life.

Now, the theme of alienation has a long and respected history. One of the foremost works of fiction, *The Outsider* by Colin Wilson, elaborates on this theme in modern times. The appeal of *Alienation* may be an evocation of its relationship to the alienation many gays feel from society at large, intensified by the cruel separation from loved ones because of intolerance, ignorance, and a refusal to correct that ignorance. Ever-


ton's book does succeed in exploring this theme of alienation within an encounter/social group that the characters participate in as well.


(You may be relieved to know that Everton does not use the word "alienation" more than five or six times throughout the book—if you think I have used it too much here.)

The reader is introduced to several characters, but most of them are "on stage" for a small period of time. Peter and Jon, and their interactions with the people in the social group, make up the bulk of the novel. Everton shifts from one character's thoughts to another's with little or no warning to the reader. When one reads this, pay attention to these shifts or it may become confusing. Each character is developed to the degree of importance to the plot or the main characters.

Little space is given to physical descriptions of the people here, or the surrounding city and neighborhood in which they live and work. We learn only what is necessary for the characters to interact.

The theme of alienation in the gay world has not been dramatized before in a novel such as this, so the contribution should be appreciated on that basis. Books that answer some of the questions this book begins to ask would be appreciated more.

Honkeytonk Man

Like Father, Like Son

Clint Eastwood's *Honkeytonk Man* is a likeable picture, never pushy, never overstated. As a director, Eastwood believes in interfering as little as possible with his actors and the action on the screen. Consequently, his films have a

freshness about them, and rarely posture to the audience. I'm in no way saying Eastwood is a great director worthy of high praise, but some of his films display an honesty that puts more famous (and long-winded) directors to

shame. Honkeytonk Man deals with the relationship of a man and a boy, each on the verge of self-revelation, of understanding their behavior and reactions to other people and each other. Kyle Eastwood is very fine as the boy; his face seems fresh and alive when he's in front of the camera, and there's a naturalness about his movements that is ingratiating, Likewise, Clint Eastwood (his real-life father) shows us that he too knows how to relax before a camera. and even if he still can only drawl his lines, at least he lets his body have some life and action. Clancy Carlile's screenplay, based on his novel, isn't all that bad on inspection; Carlile's not the greatest on exposition-on telling us how his characters get into situations -but he does provide ample explanation concerning reactions to situations. Honkeytonk Man is gentle and honest, a film interested in its performers as well as its audience.




Clint Eastwood as Red Stovall performs with blues singer Linda Hopkins in a scene from Honkeytonk Man.

GHOST OF A CHANCE

Kiss Me Goodbye

Kiss Me Goodbye, directed by Robert Mulligan, is a tiny, tiny bit of fluff about a woman whose husband-dead for some time-comes back to haunt her after she decides to remarry. The film aims for high comedy in the manner, say, of Noel Coward-particularly his Blithe Spirit—and may remind some of the 1930's production, Topper, which starred Cary Grant, Sally Field, James Caan and Jeff Bridges are all gifted performers and work nicely together, but the film feels tame. I smiled every now and then, but hardly ever laughed. Robert Mulligan—best known for To Kill A Mockingbird-knows very little about timing, and so the principles flounder around on the screen, looking for their cues. Moreover, Kiss Me Goodbye moves between high comedy and farce, never really following the dictums of either. The appeal of high comedy is intellectual, and we react to it because of perception and insight, rather than any emotional involvement. Farce is the comedy of physical action and situation, generally giving us a visceral reaction. Kiss Me Goodbye doesn't have the character development, the interest in diction or the plot devices needed for high comedy, and it rarely allows characters and their environment to collide -so necessary for farce. There's comic potential, surely, in the premise, but screenwriter Charlie Peters falls on cliches, rehashing the worst of Noel Coward. Kiss Me Goodbye is a slow. safe, family film. In other words, it's dull-strenuously so, at times. It's the perfect Reaganomics picture displaying a romantic longing for a past (in this case, the old days of movie-making) that never really existed. w



TEXAS by Rob Clark

The Alley Theatre of Houston begins the year with the Southwest premiere of two new works by American contemporary authors. *Nuts*, a compelling courtroom drama by Tom Tapor, will begin a month-long run on the Alley's Large Stage with a champagne opening on Thursday, January 13 at 8:00pm. Dick Goldberg's ferocious story of a family in conflict, *Family Business*, will have its champagne opening the following Friday, January 14 at 8:00pm on the Arena Stage.

The title of *Nuts* refers to the purported mental state of its heroine, Claudia Faith Draper, played by **Robin Moseley**. Raised in upper-middle class surroundings, she has turned to prostitution for financial support following her divorce. Now she stands accused

of killing one of her clients. Her friends and relatives unite in their efforts to protect Ms. Draper (against her wishes) by having her declared insane.

In Family Business, Isaiah Stein. played by Timothy Arrington, is the overruling father in the all-male Stein household. The brothers are sharply contrasting figures who must comprise their differences when Isaiah's last testament proves just a bit eccentric. Phil is a psychiatrist with a huge home and enormous debt; Bobby takes over the family toy business and proves as unyielding as his father; Norman is guilt-ridden over the death of their mother and assumes her place as family nursemaid; while the youngest son, Jerry, is spoiled, manipulative and gay. David is Jerry's lover.

John Steinbeck's haunting portrayal of two migrant farm workers, Of Mice and Men, plays January 14-February 12 at the Chocolate Bayou Theatre Co. in Houston. Steinbeck, who won the Nobel Prize for literature, wrote the play as an adaptation from his novel of the same name.

PHYLLIS DILLER

Most people are quite surprised when they discover Phyllis Diller is a concert pianist, owning seven pianos, a harpsichord and a celeste. After having already researched her background, it wasn't that surprising to find Phyllis Diller to be a very charming and gracious lady off-stage. We caught Ms. Diller's act recently at Granny's Dinner Playhouse in Dallas.

Phyllis Diller a concert pianist? Yes, this mad performer, with her ridiculous hair, bizarre dresses and crazy hats, who puffs on a foot-long cigarette holder, shrieking insults at a fictitious husband named Fang, cackling insanely at her own quips . . . is an intelligent musician and sensitive lady.

Phyllis Diller is not only a splendid harpsichordist, she's a lovely and welldressed woman of good breeding. Far from despising men, she adores them.

Phyllis, like so many mature women in our time, has kicked the old habit of actresses concealing their real age. She will be 66 on July 17 and is proud that she has five children and three grand-children.

This is such a different lady than the one on-stage who shrieks of her hus-

band Fang, "I told Fang there was a leak in the gas pipe. He put a pan under it." "Fang never worked a day in his life. Once somebody asked me whether he moonlights. Hell," I said, "he doesn't even daylight" (she punctuates her tirade against Fang with wild guffaws of laughter). "He got so drunk at this party we were at. He staggered over to me and asked, 'Do lemons fly?' I said, 'No, why?' He said, 'Well I just squeezed their canary in my drink.'" Ah-ha-ha-ha-ha-ha-

Her invented mother-in-law receives even worse treatment, "You want to know why they wouldn't let her on Noah's ark? They couldn't find another animal that looked like her.... She's so old her social security number is two.... That fat old bat, I'd love to slit her girdle and watch her spread to death.



"My sister is such a slut. She bought a mink coat on a Lay-A-Day plan."

"My cooking is terrible. Once I cooked something so disgusting ... the cat covered it."

"My mother-inlaw hates dogs. Her legs look like fire hydrants."



"I once tried wearing a Playtex Living Bra. It died of starvation."

"My mother-inlaw is known as Tilla the Ton. How can I describe her? Jello with a belt."

"The last time I asked Fang to eat out, we ate in the garage."

When she was a kid, her mother used to dress her alike. [It's like this through her entire show. She barely stops to breathe.] Her dress size is Junior Missle." Ah-ha-ha-ha-ha. "You ought to hear her sing. She hit high-C and spayed the cat."

And finally, she attacks herself. "Most women go to a beauty salon to get a hair-do. I get a hair-don't. . . . I don't have hair, I have nerve endings. . . . I got a phone call from this peeping Tom and he pleaded with me to pull down my window shades."

Phyllis Driver Diller, born in Lima, Ohio, was expected to marry young and be a dedicated wife and mother. She met her future husband in Bluffton, Ohio, and married young. The Dillers settled in a San Francisco lower-middle class suburb. When several of her husband's business ventures failed, she started working on a small San Leandro. California weekly paper. She wrote

society gossip and sold advertising. Then she went to a local radio station as a reporter and an advertising and promotion writer. Her husband was the first to recognize her talent as a performer. In 1955, at age 38, she ventured out in public as a paid performer at San Francisco's Purple Onion, Booked for two weeks, she remained for 89. She went on to play intimate supper clubs and chic spots all over the land. She has moved on to posh hotels and the highsalaried Las Vegas rooms, television appearances too numerous to name, 12 movies, and she has authored three books. Two are Phyllis Diller's Housekeeping Hints and Phyllis Diller's Marriage Manual. Her books will not help you keep house or a husband. All they will keep you in is stitches.

The price for success was paid with her marriages. The first went with her initial success. Phyllis then met and married Warde Donovan, a struggling



singer. The marriage began faltering when Warde became her manager. He began booking himself as her opening act. The reviews were basically: Phyllis is great, Warde is the pits. The pressure drove Phyllis to a nervous breakdown and her second divorce.

When asked if she would remarry, or if she had a current flame, she replied. "I may get married again. On the other hand, I adore the romantic whirl of an affair. I mean, of course, if neither party is married. I'm in love at this moment, but I won't tell you his name. I met him at a party this past September and we've been inseparable since then. I am going to start taking time off to enjoy my personal life more. I want to enjoy my home and grandchildren. I'll probably work six months in a year instead of 25 months. It's very hard to be an entertainer and maintain any sort of relationship."

Does it bother Phyllis that some people can't separate the real her from the stage persona?

"It does in a way. I love clothes, I love elegance, and I take thought when I'm dressing up for a party. I never go out looking like a frump. I'm not a loud harridan who is married to a blithering idiot. I made the character Fang up once at the Purple Onion Cafe in San Francisco. It was a one-line joke I adlibbed. It got such a tremendous laugh that I put in more Fang jokes. My God, who could like that repulsive broad I play? It's awful that some people think I'm a loud bitch with ugly hair. Please tell them it's a wig. On the other hand, maybe I should be flattered that my act is so good they think it expresses me."

Although an ardent feminist, Phyllis purposely avoids political stances. "You must be very careful in the entertainment industry not to offend those who may not agree with your particular views. If I'm labeled Republican or Democratic, I'm only keeping half of my audience. Something I will say though, this year we've all got to pull together to get this country out of whatever the hell it's in."





An open letter to the gay community on hepatitis B

Hepatitis B, a serious disease, may be sexually transmitted

Sexually transmitted diseases among the gay community are epidemic. Herpes has recently received a lot of attention; gonorrhea and syphilis are well known; but the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recently issued a major recommendation for the prevention of another sexually transmitted disease: Hepatitis B. In their Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, the CDC stated: "Susceptible homosexually active males should be vaccinated [against hepatitis B] regardless of their age or duration of their homosexual practices."

Gay men are at a high risk of contracting hepatitis B

In one study, from 51% to 76% of 3,816 gay men seen in five sexually transmitted disease clinics had evidence of past or present hepatitis B infection. Once infected, there's a 6% to 10% chance of becoming a carrier—capable of passing on the virus. The CDC estimated there are nearly 1 million carriers in the United States and that 100,000 of these carriers are gay men.

The hepatitis B virus can be passed on by contact with contaminated body fluids

such as saliva, urine, semen, and blood. The hepatitis B virus can be transmitted through tiny breaks in the skin or contact with mucous membranes. This can occur during intimate sexual contact and can lead to hepatitis B for the partner of an infected person. Although most patients recover and over half contracting hepatitis B do not get symptoms, there is no specific treatment and no known cure for hepatitis B infections.

Hepatitis B may lead to even more serious complications

For those who do get symptoms of hepatitis B, a mild

or severe "flu-like" sickness may continue for weeks or months. Ten percent of all infections become long lasting (chronic) with potential complications that are sometimes more serious than those of other sexually transmitted diseases. The serious complications include the chronic carrier state, chronic active hepatitis, chronic persistent hepatitis, cirrhosis, and even cancer of the liver. Every year almost 4,000 carriers die of cirrhosis. In addition, carriers have a risk 273 times greater than that of the general population of contracting a usually fatal form of liver cancer.

Now this serious sexually transmitted disease is usually preventable by vaccination with the new hepatitis B vaccine

After more than a decade of research and development, a new vaccine is available for prevention, not treatment, of hepatitis B. In clinical studies, the vaccine was highly effective in preventing hepatitis B infection and was generally well tolerated. No serious adverse reactions occurred in these studies.

The vaccination regimen consists of a series of three injections, the first two a month apart and the third, six months after the first. To be effective, the vaccine must be given before a person gets hepatitis B. The vaccine helps prevent the disease: It is not effective as a treatment. We suggest that you consult your doctor to determine if you should be vaccinated.

Why you should consult your doctor or clinic

The vaccine helps protect against intection caused by hepatitis B virus. This virus is an important cause of viral hepatitis, a disease mainly of the liver. Even mild forms of this disease may lead to serious complications and aftereffects, including liver cancer. There is no specific treatment for viral hepatitis.

Vaccination is recommended for persons who have a higher risk of becoming infected with hepatitis B virus because of frequent. close contact with infected people or exposure to body fluids from such people. It will not protect against hepatitis caused by viruses other than hepatitis B virus

No serious adverse reactions were reported in over 6.000 individuals receiving the vaccine in clinical trials. The most frequent reaction was soreness at the point of injection, less

common local reactions included redness, swelling, warmth, or formation of a hard, lumplike spot. The local effects were usually mild and lasted no more than 2 days after vaccination. Occasionally, low-grade fever (less than 101 °F) occurred. When it did. It usually lasted no longer than 48 hours following vaccination. In rare cases, fever over 102 °F was reported.

More generalized complaints including malaise, fatigue, headache, nausea, dizziness, muscle pain, and joint pain were reported infrequently. Rash was reported rarely. As with any vaccine, broad use may reveal additional adverse reactions.

Your doctor or clinic knows what special care must be taken when administering the vaccine and in determining who should receive the vaccine. The vaccine is not intended for persons who are alleroic to any of its components.
