DGA TO ERECT GAY BILLBOARDS

DALLAS — The Communications Department of the Dallas Gay Alliance (DGA) has informed TWT NEWS plans to lease billboards in the city which will carry the message, "The Dallas Gay Community—Working Toward A Better Understanding." The billboards were designed by Phil Gerber and incorporate a large pink triangle as well as lettering that is large enough to be seen at a distance. Initially, the DGA is planning to lease one billboard for a year and then add others based on availability of funds.

The budget for the project is to be in excess of \$4,000. The board of directors of DGA has determined that this project should generate its own revenue and not draw on general funds of DGA. For that reason, an appeal was being made directly to the community. Members of the Communications Department told TWT NEWS they would be in front of local bars soliciting small contributions from patrons, in hope that most people will choose to contribute a dollar or two, Bill Nelson of DGA said. "In that way, literally thousands of gay people will be involved in erecting the billboards," he emphasized

The project has been listed as a vital part of a three-pronged outreach program. The Communications Department determined that it must reach members of DGA, other members of the local gay and non-gay community.

If funds become available, additional DGA-sponsored billboards will pop up around Dallas. But "the first billboard is the most important," according to exchair of the Communications Department and newly-elected board member, Michael Burnet, "for city leaders must be reminded that we exist in Dallas.

"Our goal is to have the billboard across from the Convention Center and City Hall remain in place through the Republican National Convention in the summer of 1984," Burnet told *Dialog*.

ELECTION TIME FOR HOUSTON GPC

HOUSTON — It's that time of year again when the largest gay community in Texas cranks up for its annual election of officers of the Houston Gay Political Caucus (GPC). But so far, it's been rather tame.

Although several aspirants have been rumored to be ready to place their names in nomination, to date, only one had stepped forward.

As of January 5, only one seat was being contested. All other candidates were running unopposed, TWT NEWS observed. Of course, that could change, as further nominations were scheduled to be accepted next Wednesday night, January 19, and again on the night of the election, February 2.

Nominations for officers included incumbent Larry Bagneris, Jr., president, unopposed; incumbent Terry Harris, vice president, unopposed; incumbent Tony Vega, secretary, unopposed; and for treasurer, no nomination to date.

Board nominations included: Seat One—incumbent Bill Etheridge vs Scott Miller; Seat Three—incumbent Ray Hill, unopposed; and Seat Four—incumbent Gary Grant.

"If you intend to vote in the February 2, 1983 election, it would have been necessary for you to have been a paid member of GPC thirty days prior to the election," as stated in GPC by-laws.



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DALLAS DOCTOR SPEAKS ON AIDS

DALLAS — Dr. Kevin Murphy, of Parkland Hospital, was the guest speaker last Sunday night for a special program on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) and hepatitis B. The forum was sponsored by Gay Unitarians of Dallas (GUD) at their church in University Park.

Dr. Murphy spoke of the increased number of homosexuals who have been attacked by the two diseases and the need for all citizens to be aware of the symptoms.

Dr. Murphy is the director of the Sexually Transmitted Disease Training Program for the University of Texas Health Science Center in Dallas. "I wanted this to be a no-holds-barred situation so everyone could get answers for the tough questions facing the gay community." Murphy had stated to Dialog.

To date, six gay males in Texas have died of AIDS. However, also to date, no gay residents of Dallas/Ft. Worth have fallen victim to the disease.

DALLAS AIDS FORUM TUESDAY

DALLAS — The Oak Lawn Counseling Center (OLCC) is to sponsor its second AIDS Information Forum as a part of the AIDS Action Project. The AIDS forum is designed to educate the community about AIDS, which can lead to Kaposi's Sarcoma and other often fatal infections.

The forum is scheduled for next Tuesday, January 18 at 7:30pm at the Unitarian Church, 4015 Normandy at Preston. "There are a growing number of AIDS cases being reported in Dallas. For your own protection and that of your friends, please make every effort to attend," it was stated to TWT NEWS.

Those scheduled as presenters of the forum are Dr. James Wheeler and Howie Daire, TWT NEWS learned from Daire, who is the director of OLCC. A 24-hour AIDS information line has been established—(214) 528-2181.

CITIZENS ON PATROL WORKING

DALLAS — Citizens on Patrol (COP) is helping making Oak Lawn a safer place in which to live. Working in cooperation with the understaffed Dallas Police Department, COP has been viable in several recent incidents of violence.

On Friday, January 7, COP successfully caught three men as they were robbing two local citizens at gunpoint. The incident, TWT NEWS learned, occurred in a parking lot at Cedar Springs and Throckmorton, the gay crossroads.

COP, an effort of Village Security, was formed last year after increasing numbers of victims in Oak Lawn reported being victimized by robbery and assault. After repeated requests for extra patrols of Dallas police fell on deaf ears, local citizens formed their own coalition for protection named COP.


BUSINESS GUILD ELECTS DIRECTORS


HOUSTON — The Greater Montrose Business Guild (GMBG) has announced the results of their election of the board of directors January 4.

The GMBG meets the first Tuesday of every month at Liberty Bank in the new Community Services Room, which is located on the Westheimer Road side of the building.

The purpose of the GMBG is threefold: to promote and advance Montrose as a strong, viable and economically stable community; to function as a Chamber of Commerce, providing a communications network of contacts for mutual support and an interchange network for information among the members; and to support the goals and objectives of the National Association





of Business Councils and to be the NABC's affiliate in Houston.

Membership is open to all Montrose area businesses. Interested parties are invited to attend the next meeting. scheduled for Tuesday, February 1.

MCCD JOINS NORTH TEXAS FOOD BANK

DALLAS - The Metropolitan Community Church of Dallas (MCCD) has been authorized by the North Texas Food Bank to obtain food to distribute to the needy who come to the church.

MCCD has been distributing food from the Deacon's Closet for some time. "The new move allows us to add a great deal of food to the closet for distribution," Rev. Don Eastman told TWT NEWS. "This adds enormously to the benevolence ministry of the church."

To date, MCCD has had to purchase almost 800 pounds of food at 10¢ per pound. About two-thirds of that has already been given to needy families.

The Food Bank is a non-profit organization which is sponsored by private donations. The 10¢ per pound, which MCCD contributes, is not required by the Food bank, but assists them in maintaining their distribution center.

Donations to the Food Bank come from all major grocery stores and food manufacturers in the area. One item that is not readily available through the bank is canned meats. It would help round out the Deacon's Closet if church members would bring canned meat and main course items.

NEW STATEWIDE GAY STUDENT GROUP

AUSTIN - For sometime the various gay student organizations of various colleges and universities in Texas have been game-planning the formation of a statewide umbrella group. The new statewide group will be known as the Texas Coalition of Gay and Lesbian Students.

TWT NEWS has now learned from Tom Bassett in Austin that the first official function of the still-forming group has been planned. Austin's Gay Students' Association is organizing a spring trip to Florida's EPCOT Center and Disney World.

"We are making reservations for the week of March 13, since six major universities-SMU, SWTSW, Texas Tech. Texas A&M, U of H and UT-share the same week for spring break," Bassett explained.

The cost is to be \$130 and will cover six days and five nights at Orlando's Sheraton Twin Towers (quad occupancy) and full admission to EPCOT and Disney World.

"We are making arrangements to fly to Florida and we will offer transportation in rented passenger vans. This trip is open to all students and their invited quests." he told TWT NEWS. To ensure hotel reservations, a deposit of \$75 is required before January 27. Simply call Bassett in Austin at (512) 471-1381 for transportation costs, reservations and further information.

INCREASING PUBLIC LEWDNESS ARRESTS

HOUSTON - Lately, many homosexuals who have been arrested for sexual activity in public places such as parks, bookstores and restrooms, have been shocked to learn that the recent judgment on Penal Code Section 21.06 (Texas' homosexual conduct code) had not alleviated the seriousness of their arrest. It appears that more and more people are being charged with Section 21.07 (public lewdness), observed Houston attorney, M. Robert Schwab.

"To the extent that people in the past were charged with 21.06 for sexual activity that was arguably in public, these people are now likely to be charged with public lewdness, which is a far more serious crime," Schwab explained. "Caution is essential.

"I have counseled with a number of people who have been arrested in the past for sexual activity in a bookstore or public bathroom. To give an example, one man had five prior arrests in

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
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Memorial Park. Each of the prior arrests had been disposed of by his paying a \$50 fine.

"His most recent arrest, however, resulted in a public indecency charge [21.07] and the very real possibility of a jail sentence," Scwab continued.

"I want to caution the gay community as to the impact of the Baker vs Wade [21.06] decision," stated Schwab. "When 21.06 was declared unconstitutional, sexual acts between consenting adults in private were legalized. However, the ruling did not legalize any sexual activity in public. The ruling also did not affect laws against prostitution or sex acts between adults and minors."

Schwab, who is president of the Texas Human Rights Foundation (THRF), which sponsored the successful challenge to 21.06, outlined to TWT NEWS the impact of that decision.

Penal Code Section 21.06 criminalized private non-commercial sexual acts between consenting adults of the same sex. On August 18, 1982 in Dallas, Federal District Court Judge Jerry Buchmeyer held that Section 21.06 was unconstitutional in that it violated the constitutionally implied right to privacy. Further, Judge Buchmeyer found that in order to criminalize the sexuality of a vast number of its citizens, the state was required to show a compelling reason, which it failed to do, in justifying enactment.

Section 21.06 was a class C misdemeanor. The maximum punishment was a \$200 fine. From time to time, persons arrested for having sex in public were charged with Section 21.06 rather than Section 21.07 (public lewdness) for activity which was in a public bathroom or bookstore.

"The precise definition of public and private places has undergone continual judicial interpretation and modification," Schwab observed. The impact to the person arrested was that while 21.06 was a class C misdemeanor, 21.07 was a class A misdemeanor and punishable by a maximum fine of \$2,000 and a prison sentence of up to a year in jail.



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


Dear TWT:


AIDS in Dallas


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
Two months have passed since I met Sandy, my first lover. Sandy was a complete surprise to me in that as quickly as she had entered my life, she was gone.

The first time we met, neither one of us made a lasting impression on the other. We first met at a mutual friend's dinner party. A few weeks later, I bumped into her at a local bar. I asked her to dance (which is something I usually do not do), and as we danced, I realized I was attracted to her. We exchanged telephone numbers and began to go

places together as friends.

I have been out for almost three years and have dated several women but have never felt so close to someone in such a short length of time. I found myself experiencing a new level of emotion while the defensive walls which took so many years to be invisibly erected dissipated quite quickly.

This frightened me and I began to ask myself many questions which had no real answers. In talking with Sandy, I discovered that she had a lover (her first woman lover) who lived out of



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town. The two were having serious problems and were on the brink of breaking up.

It had always been a policy of mine not to get involved with someone who was involved with another, as it usually leads to many people being hurt. Knowing this, I told myself that we would simply be friends. However, that was not to be.

In one spontaneous moment, both of our defensive walls were smashed. I was visiting with Sandy one day at my apartment, and we were sitting on the couch conversing when be both simultaneously looked into each other's eves. It was as if it was a scene from a movie. As our eyes met, our bodies drew near and our lips met.

As we kissed and subsequently made love, I knew that I was falling in love. I remember saying to myself, "God, me falling in love-the perpetual

single woman?"

Up until Sandy, I had accepted the fact that I was the type who was selective in what I wanted out of a relationship. In being a selective minority (I define this as someone not willing to compromise her/his own personal code: for when you do this, it only creates unspoken hostility), I had been forced to question myself as a person.

Needless to say, it took quite some time in thought and reassurance from a few close friends that I was indeed a normal person. It seemed to me that almost everyone I knew was involved with someone. I did not realize that many of those people were dating to escape loneliness.

I fell head over heels in love with Sandy, while she found herself in the position of loving two women at the same time. As the tension grew for Sandy, she decided to ease off of both relationships with regards to level of intensity. She told her lover about me, and then the fireworks came. Her lover told her to choose between us.

Sandy told her lover that she did not want to choose. Sandy was at a point in her life where she needed to be free to date-not just me or her lover but anyone whom she wanted to. I understood this as it was how I felt. I loved Sandy, but I was not ready to settle down. However, her lover was.

This went on for almost four weeks. The tension level was always high except for infrequent moments. We grew closer together and began to share ourselves with one another. It was absolutely wonderful, as the only time we ever disagreed was on what movie to

As life would have it, the inevitable came-Sandy and her ex got back together and decided to move in together. I discovered this on Christmas Day. I can recall saying something like "bah humbug and happy new year" to myself. The only thing I could say to her when she told me was, "I certainly hope you know what you are doing and be careful."

Realistically, I suppose I knew all along that they would get back together. Inside, I had almost fooled myself into believing it would be different for us.

The point to me telling you my story is not to make anyone feel sorry for me but rather to share an experience. One might easily say something like, "See what happens when you become a third party involvement." There is indeed some justification to that, and in the future, I will be more adamant about it. But I also learned something very important about myself.

For many years, I essentially shortchanged myself. I was quite comfortable in not being involved, as there is security in doing so. Additionally, as stated previously, I learned that I was indeed capable of having a relationship that was not based primarily on sex.

Although our relationship lasted only two months, in many ways the time seems longer with regard to what I have learned. I respect Sandy for her openness and honesty. If we had met at different points in our lives, I believe the end result would have been different. But the time is now and it did not. Instead we parted as friends, two months older, two months wiser. w

Texas' Sissy Farenthold



A special screening of Sissy Farenthold—A Texas Chronicle, a film documenting her early career and her campaign for the governorship of Texas in 1974, will be shown Monday, January 17, to benefit the Women's Lobby Alliance. It will begin at 7:00pm and will be held at First Unitarian Church, 5210 Fannin, Houston. Farenthold and Janice Blue, filmmaker, will speak after the screening. Admission is \$5 at the door. Twt's Susan Collins talked to Ms. Farenthold at her home in Houston and inspired the following article.

Sissy Farenthold served in the Texas Legislature from 1968-73 representing the Corpus Christi area; ran for the Texas governorship in 1972 and 1974; placed second in total votes for nomination for the Democrat's vice presidential nominee in 1972; was the first chair for the National Women's Political Caucus; served as the first woman president of the women's educational institution. Wells College, and is currently practicing law in Houston.

While serving in the State Legislature. Farenthold became known as the den mother of the Dirty 30, a group of state representatives who worked to expose the Sharpstown Scandal which involved bank fraud and ultimately led to financial reforms in the state of Texas.

Although she lost to Dolph Briscoe in the 1972 race, she won an impressive 46% of the vote without the benefit of a large financial backing. While her opponents were traveling around the state in jets, she could be found on a bus or train. Her campaign was indeed true grass roots support.

According to Farenthold, there have been numerous changes in the political system since the film was made. She said, "We now have a process where an image is created and where polls and PAC's (Political Action Committees) are priority matters. The film exemplifies a less sophisticated time. Additionally, it costs more to run for office today. For example, Briscoe spent roughly \$4 million in his campaign while Clements spent \$7 million. It is priced almost out of the ballpark."

Her advice to women entering politics: "Tenacity-never give up." Farenthold sees women becoming more organized and informed and that networking is one of the biggest assets women have. "There is more acceptance of women candidates today. It even has a kind of respectability now with the socalled gender gap.

"I do feel that in some areas in my campaigns it did indeed exist, but it was not considered a research topic because, frankly, women have been trivialized." she says.

Citing the recent MX missile decision and the fact that a nuclear freeze lost by only two votes in the House, she says that groups are becoming more effective and knowledgeable and can influence the government.

Farenthold advocates reform of the CIA, which she feels has been given a blank check to do as they please. She states that its thirty-year record reflects the need for accountability.


Although not presently an officeholder, she calls herself a politician without a portfolio. "Public issues still remain my primary concern. I have moved from being state issue-oriented to what I think is the most pressing issue of our day, and all other dwarf in its midst, and that is the control of nuclear weapons. The thought of it is so horrendous that we almost look on conventional weapons as benign, but they are not."



Lesbian Studies, by Margaret Cruikshank; 286 pp.; appendix, bibliography, index, notes; The Feminist Press, Box 334, Old Westbury, New York, New York 11568; softcover, \$7.95.



The title of the book is, of course, Lesbian Studies-lesbianism in out and out of the closet in universities and schools around the country. But this book also goes further to discuss the effects of "silence" and "oppression" on communication, and the learning and teaching process, personally and in the classrooms.

The tone of the essays here is very personal and with open rage at the

forces mentioned above. "To suffer an injustice without protest is, in my opinion, far more destructive in its consequences than the original injustice itself, since the self-betraval silence involves eventually rots away the inner person. To betray oneself in this way for a job is certainly not a price worth paying. Yet it is a price asked constantly of lesbians and gays in our society, and having had to pay it, to any degree, makes me angrier than I can say." -Dykes in Academe (II), Paula Bennet.

Lesbian Studies is a wide-ranging anthology not only in the sharing of the many differing lesbian realities, but also in its many sources of information to access concerning women's, feminist



and lesbian studies. The thrust of the book concerns lesbians speaking out about teaching, researching and learning in the academic world of the universities in which they work.

What strikes me most is the expansive inclusion of all lesbian/feminist women in these studies—lesbians of color, those who are poor, Jewish lesbians (the similarity of the Jewish experience to the lesbian and gay experience). There does not seem to be that same wide-ranging outreach to all the various gay male experiences that exist in the mainstream gay liberation movement of today.

Margaret Cruikshank is the editor of The Lesbian Path and selects this group of essays to reflect the dilemmas of educating in a hostile environment and to provide a sourcebook of information to recover and share the large body of lesbian history that has been surpressed.

For many feminists, it was a surprise and a shock to discover such a ground swell of interest and concern about the power inequalities between men and women in respect to lesbianism. Heterosexism, specifically, was and is practiced by many feminists and those involved in women's studies. These essays document the struggle lesbians have had and still do have to make a place for their voice to be heard.

Several of the articles are short, personal statements. They vary widely, from topics such as "Who hid lesbian history?" to "Lesbians in sports." The topics include not only personal/political feelings, but how lesbians in universities develop, modify and teach specific courses such as lesbians in literature, lesbian writers, and Third World lesbian literature.

As per any reputable reference work, Lesbian Studies is fully indexed, with appendices and a bibliography. Each essay has general notes and is footnoted as well. The essays are divided into three sections: 1) Personal/Political Experiences; 2) In the Classroom; and 3) New Research/New Perspectives. The text is remarkably free of "liberation jargon" and still gets its message across clearly. The writers here speak out with much energy.

The bibliography is not just research studies—novels (fiction and non-fiction), science fiction and letters and magazines are referenced also. As I said earlier, this is a sourcebook to pursue information for personal growth or political dissemination (at times one and the same). The essays are never boring or dry; they carry much human feeling, frustration, anger, warmth, joy and pride. This is an excellent work to facilitate the exchange and communication of ideas and personal realities.



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

FIRE ON THE WATER

The Ku Klux Klan rallies near a Texas shrimp fishing town on Galveston Bay

Fire on the Water is a sensitive look at the uneasy relationship of Vietnamese immigrants with native Texas shrimp fishermen. The film was shot entirely in Texas a little over a year ago. Producer/director Robert Hillmann was in Houston last week to promote the documentary which has played at the River Oaks Theatre and will be broadcast in Houston on Channel 8, Friday, January 21 at 9:00pm.

Most impressive about Fire on the Water is Hillmann's honest effort to explore all sides of a story objectively. He gives no answers. He looks at the problem with a well-trained and sympathetic

He accomplishes this by examining the lives of three men: Jim Craig, a transplanted Yankee who leases a fishvard and buys from the Vietnamese: James Stanfield, "Titan" of the local Ku Klux Klan and a self-described "radical racist Christian"; and Hung Nguyen, the eldest son of a struggling Vietnamese family.

Through the lives of these men, Hillmann draws a portrait of the tensions that run deep within the community, Interestingly, all of the sides concerned feel the same way. The problem stems not from race, but from economics. The simple fact is that the Texas shrimp industry is in its death throes. The waters have been overfished. Thus, no one js making money, Vietnamese or Texan.

The Vietnamese have a dream of a different life in the country. They discover that everyone feels that there is not enough to go around, a fact hard to argue after viewing the paltry catches of a day's work.

The movie is beautifully filmed. Hillmann contrasts images within the two cultural settings to make some profound observations about the similarities in people so outwardly different.

Jim Craig, the big-hearted Yankee, comes off as the hero in the film. When he loses his business and his house, in essence ruined, we feel his anguish almost as intensely as he does.

All said, Fire on the Water is one of the best documentaries in years, and you don't have to be involved in the issue to enjoy it. Director Hillmann asks questions a lot larger.

TWT talked to Robert Hillmann about the film and his impressions of Texas.

TWT - Welcome to Houston, Did you live here while you were making the movie?

Hillmann - I started out living in Houston and commuting down, but that didn't work out. I couldn't establish any credibility, and I didn't enjoy the ride, so I moved [to the Kemah area].

What are you doing these days, other than promoting the film?


I start shooting a film called The New South in February, but I am developing a few features.

I'm curious, what happened to Jim Craig?

We had Fire on the Water playing at the Castro Theatre in San Francisco. and Jim Craig came into town. We flew him into San Francisco. He just couldn't believe it. He has been so down and out, everything . . . he's lost everything. He's lost his business, he's lost his retail fish market, he's lost his house ... just everything falling apart. We thought it would be a real good shot in the arm to have him come out and see himself, because he had never seen the film. He arrived ... eyes wide ... the Castro section of San Francisco really is a scene for somebody who's lived in small towns most of his life. Well, he just couldn't believe the goings on. He gets to the movie house, and there he is, forty feet high on the screen. At the end of it, people just stood up and gave him such a round of applause, he was really touched, really moved. I hope he has gotten his old confidence back, because he's obviously a strong, survivor type of individual.

Have you had any response from any of the people in the movie other than Jim Craig?

As far as I know, nobody has seen it, because it hasn't shown in Texas until now. . . . I think it will be exciting for some, frenetic for others, perhaps; but hopefully revealing in the best sense, education for everyone involved in it.



You can learn something about yourself seeing yourself forty feet high. I wouldn't have made this film if I didn't think there was something to be learned about what is going on in the American Republic. But I have no idea how warm or hostile people will be. . . . I guess I would be much more uncomfortable if I knew they were going to be burning crosses in front of the theater.

You obviously convinced the Klan of your interest in objectivity for them to let you bring a camera to a rally.

I wasn't interested in saying they were dangerous. I wasn't interested in making fun of them. I was interested in showing that there are elements in each of these characters, including the Klansman, that are in each of us. If you come away from the film on the side of the Vietnamese or Americans, if you walk away polarized, then I failed. If people just had that sense of what's going on in each of these characters. what's going on in each of us, then I've gotten somewhere. w

COMING UP — With *Tootsie* packing theaters solid all across the country and *Frances* nearing national release, it looks as though **Jessica Lange** could be the femme star to watch in the '80s. And wasn't it only a few years ago, 1976 to be exact, that critics and viewers were knocking her because of her role in the last remake of *King Kong?* I, for one, thought the shape of Jessica's mouth was probably the best thing that

that disaster had to offer (Weldon Grahame made me say that), and I've been pulling for her ever since. After some of the big monkey's stigma had


faded, she was able to earn a substantial amount of respect by appearing in Bob Fosse's All That Jazz (she was a luminous apparition), and in the remake of The Postman Always Rings Twice. Postman didn't impress enough people to make it a hit, but Lange's performance had enough impact to make people forget that she was once King Kong's leading lady. Tootsie is Dustin Hoffman's film, but Frances, successful or not, will have all eyes on Jessica Lange. Film biographies usually amount to a tours de force for gifted performers. and Frances, the story of Frances Farmer, has all the elements required for a real wallow-i.e., alcoholism, radical politics, insanity, lobotomy, shock therapy, and a bitchy mother played by that actress of actresses, Kim Stanley. In addition to Lange and Stanley, the cast includes Sam Shepard, the 1979 Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright (for Buried Child) who previously acted in the films Days of Heaven and Resurrection. Some people will be interested to know that Frances marks the directorial debut of Graeme Clifford who, in addition to editing Don't Look Now. The Man Who Fell to Earth, Images and The Long Goodbye, also edited the film and music for The Rocky Horror Picture Show.

POTPOURRI - For several years there has been talk of a sequel to the 1956 film Giant with, possibly, Elizabeth Taylor and Rock Hudson being reunited in their original roles, and there has also been speculation as to who might appear in the role originally played by the late James Dean. It doesn't seem very likely that this "idea" will ever materialize, but it's still an interesting rumor, especially in light of the fact that the 1956 film has recently been reissued for theatrical presentation. During Christmas, the George Stevens oldie did rather well at San Francisco's Castro Theater, and a New York run is coming up.... Richard Benjamin, whose recent directorial debut with My Favorite Year was a success, will soon begin filming his next, Racing With the Moon, described as a 1940s romance. . . . Teri Garr, currently of *Tootsie*, will soon begin *Mr. Mom.*... And I'm sure you're looking forward to *Sahara*, the next **Brooke Shields** film, which might be described as "blue lagoon in a desert."

SIGNS OF THE TIMES - Try these on for size. In 1982 not one solo female artist entered the top five of Billboard's album chart. For solo females this represents the worst year since 1970 when no solo female acts entered the top ten. Of course, as part of groups, females did rather well in 1982, considering the success of the Go-Go's, Joan Jett & the Blackhearts, Human League and Fleetwood Mac. And Olivia Neutron-Bomb did fairly well with Physical. . . . In other news: George Harrison's "comeback" album, Gone Troppo, peaked at 108 on the Billboard chart. ... "Calling out around the world, are you ready for a brand new beat?"

IN MEMORIAM - During the final weeks of 1982, several significant talents passed from us, and have, until now, been ignored by this column. Better late than never. David Blue, singer, songwriter and sometime actor, died December 2 at age 41. He released numerous albums in the '70s and participated in Bob Dylan's "Rolling Thunder Review." . . . Dwight MacDonald, journalist, author and critic, died December 19 at age 76. He was probably best known as Esquire's film critic, but he was a political critic as well; among his books was The Memoirs of a Revolutionist: Essays in Political Criticism. . . . Arthur Rubinstein, classical pianist (with few rivals) died December 20 at age 95. His keyboard genius contributed to such flms as Song of Love (1947), in which he "ghosted" for Paul Henreid (who portraved Robert Schumann), and Of Men and Music (1950), in which he appeared as himself.... Jack Webb, best known as the creator and star of Dragnet, died December 23 at age 62. He began Dragnet as a radio program in 1949, switched it to television in 1952, and made a feature film of it in 1954. The original TV series ended in 1959, but was revived for a few years in the late '60s. w

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

An open letter to the gay community on hepatitis B

Hepatitis B, a serious disease, may be sexually transmitted

Sexually transmitted diseases among the gay community are epidemic. Herpes has recently received a lot of attention; gonorrhea and syphilis are well known; but the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recently issued a major recommendation for the prevention of another sexually transmitted disease: Hepatitis B. In their Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, the CDC stated: "Susceptible homosexually active males should be vaccinated [against hepatitis B] regardless of their age or duration of their homosexual practices."

Gay men are at a high risk of contracting hepatitis B

In one study, from 51% to 76% of 3,816 gay men seen in five sexually transmitted disease clinics had evidence of past or present hepatitis B infection. Once infected, there's a 6% to 10% chance of becoming a carrier—capable of passing on the virus. The CDC estimated there are nearly 1 million carriers in the United States and that 100,000 of these carriers are gay men.

The hepatitis B virus can be passed on by contact with contaminated body fluids

such as saliva, urine, semen, and blood. The hepatitis B virus can be transmitted through tiny breaks in the skin or contact with mucous membranes. This can occur during intimate sexual contact and can lead to hepatitis B for the partner of an infected person. Although most patients recover and over half contracting hepatitis B do not get symptoms, there is no specific treatment and no known cure for hepatitis B infections.

Hepatitis B may lead to even more serious complications

For those who do get symptoms of hepatitis B, a mild

or severe "flu-like" sickness may continue for weeks or months. Ten percent of all infections become long lasting (chronic) with potential complications that are sometimes more serious than those of other sexually transmitted diseases. The serious complications include the chronic carrier state, chronic active hepatitis, chronic persistent hepatitis, chronis, and even cancer of the liver. Every year almost 4.000 carriers die of cirrhosis. In addition, carriers have a risk 273 times greater than that of the general population of contracting a usually fatal form of liver cancer.

Now this serious sexually transmitted disease is usually preventable by vaccination with the new hepatitis B vaccine

After more than a decade of research and development, a new vaccine is available for prevention. not treatment, of hepatitis B. In clinical studies. the vaccine was highly effective in preventing hepatitis B infection and was generally well tolerated. No serious adverse reactions occurred in these studies.

The vaccination regimen consists of a series of three injections, the first two a month apart and the third, six months after the first To be effective, the vaccine must be given before a person gets hepatitis B. The vaccine helps prevent the disease: It is not effective as a treatment. We suggest that you consult your doctor to determine if you should be vaccinated.

Why you should consult your doctor or clinic

The vaccine helps protect against infection caused by hepatitis 8 virus. This virus is an important cause of viral hepatitis, a disease mainly of the liver. Even mild forms of this disease may lead to serious complications and aftereffects, including liver cancer. There is no specific treatment for viral hepatitis.

Vaccination is recommended for persons who have a higher risk of becoming infected with hepathis B virus because of frequent, close contact with infected people or exposure to body fluids from such people. It will not protect against hepathits caused by viruses other than hepathits. B virus

No serious adverse reactions were reported in over 6.000 individuals receiving the vaccine in clinical trials. The most frequent reaction was soreness at the point of injection, less

common local reactions included redness, swelling, warmth, or formation of a hard, lumplike spot. The local effects were usually mild and lasted no more than 2 days after vaccination. Occasionally, low-grade fever (less than 101 °F) occurred. When it did. It usually lasted no longer than 48 hours following vaccination. In rare cases, fever over 102 °F was reported.

More generalized complaints including malaise, fatigue, headache, nausea, dizziness, muscle pain, and joint pain were reported infrequently. Rash was reported rarely. As with any vaccine, broad use may reveal additional adverse reactions.

Your doctor or clinic knows what special care must be taken when administering the vaccine and in determining who should receive the vaccine. The vaccine is not intended for persons who are allergic to any of its components.
