21.06 APPEAL SCHEDULE

HOUSTON — The schedule that applies to the State of Texas' appeal of Baker vs Wade, the landmark civil rights case decided last August, which found Penal Code Section 21.06, Texas' homosexual conduct statute, to be unconstitutional, has been released to TWT NEWS by M. Robert Schwab, president of the Texas Human Rights Foundation (THRF) and Jim Barber, attorney for the plaintiff, Don Baker.

This timetable runs from the date that the official court reporter files the transcript to the trial court proceeding. The brief of the State of Texas will be due forty days after filing of the transcript. Baker will have thirty days to respond to the brief filed by the State of Texas. The State will then have fourteen days in which to file a reply to the Baker brief.

After filing of all briefs and replies, the case will then be submitted to the Fifth Circuit for oral argument with that Court's concurrence. Although the entire Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals, which is composed of fourteen judges, may decide to hear the case, generally, oral argument is before a three-judge panel, Schwab explained, adding that such oral arguments are generally presented in New Orleans.

In its decision, the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals will either affirm the decision of the trial court, in part or in whole, reverse the finding of the trial court, in part or in whole, or remand the decision back to the trial court for further consideration. The next step will then be to attempt to invoke the jurisdiction of the next appellate level, the U.S. Supreme Court, by petition for certiorari.

"We are encouraged by the recent published statements by our new Attorney General, Jim Mattox, that he is examining the decision of his predecessor to file an appeal of Baker vs Wade," Schwab said. "We would hope that Mr. Mattox would determine that pursuing this appeal is not an efficient or proper use of State resources.

"However, should the State continue to litigate this matter, I am confident that the thoughtful and correct decision rendered by Judge Buchmeyer will be sustained. I am also certain that the gay community will continue its generous support of this action," he told TWT NEWS.

INTERDENOMINATIONAL MEETING IS A FIRST

DALLAS — The Gay Unitarians of Dallas will host the first meeting ever of all gay religious groups in the area. The event will be a potluck dinner on Thursday, February 13,beginning at 7:00pm at the First Unitarian Church, 4015 Normandy, in University Park.

"This will be the first time various religious organizations such as Affirmation, Dignity and Integrity have joined together to share common hopes and aspirations," Gay Unitarians' president, Mary Franklin, explained to TWT NEWS. All religious groups open to homosexuals have been invited "in an effort to create a sense of community among religious gays in Dallas."

The Gay Unitarians hope that the February gathering will offer increased chances for social contacts and networking within the larger gay community of Dallas. The First Unitarian Church provides an excellent site for the event since the denominaton has adopted a pro-gay resolution and since the Dallas church has been used before as a meeting place for gay groups.



MONTROSE CLINIC BLOOD DRIVE

HOUSTON — The Montrose Clinic Blood Fund Committee will conduct a blood drive at the clinic, 104 Westheimer, on Saturday, January 29 from 9:00am-12:00pm and 1:00pm-5:00pm. Credits for blood donated will be applied to the clinic's blood fund by the Blood Center of Houston.

"The bank of credits can be used by the community for those patients who cannot pay the cost of blood and do not have insurance," administrative director, Frank Berrier, told TWT NEWS. "Those persons who have this need and fit this situation are invited to contact the clinic's blood fund committee through its chairperson, Mr. Richard Adams, at (713) 528-5531," Berrier further explained.

ANNUAL AUSTIN WOMEN'S DANCE

AUSTIN — The annual Austin Lesbian/Gay Political Caucus (ALGPC) Valentine's Day Women's Dance has been set for Friday, February 11 at the church at 4700 Grover, from 9:00pm to 2:00am.

There will be a live disc jockey, but Fundraising Chair Melita Abrego is interested in also having a women's band play for part of the night, she explained to TWT NEWS.

Every year, ALGPC relies on volunteers for this event, which is traditionally one of the caucus's biggest fundraisers. This year is no different.

There will be one 2-hour shift, and several 1-hour shifts to be worked at the dance. Volunteers will get half-price admission and a free beer ticket. Anyone interested in this and anyone knowing a women's band that might be interested in playing should call Abrego at (512) 478-4256.

Fundraising through events like the Women's Dance is critical for ALGPC, especially now, when the caucus needs money for its political action efforts and its regular expenses.

The organization will be relying heavily on proceeds from the dance to help pay rent, telephone, printing, postage and other monthly costs. There are also some outstanding debts which need to be paid, TWT NEWS learned.

BAY AREA GAYS ANNIVERSARY

LEAGUE CITY, Texas — Texas Bay Area Gays (TBAG), the first Houston area suburban gay organization, will celebrate its fourth anniversary on Thursday, January 27 at 7:30pm. Since the first meeting in 1979, this organization has served as a social outlet and support group for gays in the Galveston Bay area. As a member of local, national and international organizations, TBAG has served the greater gay community as well.

TBAG conducts a business meeting on the first Thursday of each month at the Civic Center in this city and holds social meetings the other Thursdays of the month. "All persons are welcome to attend our anniversary celebration and other TBAG activities," TWT NEWS was told.

ANDROGYNY OF AMARILLO


AMARILLO — At last month's meeting of Androgyny, this city's newly-formed socio-political group, the newly elected officials were seated. Those seated were Robert Schroeder, director; Charles Payne, secretary-treasurer; and Kevin Locke, officer-at-large. Their terms are to run until November, 1983.

Four special interest groups were also approved and coordinators appointed, TWT NEWS learned. Travis Potter will head the new Committe on Political Involvement, Donnie Jordan will lead the new Amarillo Lambda Sports Association and Mark Dominiquez brings his publishing abilities to *Update Etc.*. A coordinator for the Amarillo Gay Pride Association was to be named at the January meeting.

Special interest groups were formed at the request of at least three An-

drogyny members. After the request was approved, the director appointed a coordinator, who was subject to approval. Although the special groups were to operate separately, most of their funding is to come from the umbrella organization, Androgyny.

DALLAS GAY PRIDE SWELLS

DALLAS — The Dallas Gay Pride Week Association (DGPWA) adopted its by-laws at last month's meeting, creating a year-round organization whose primary purpose will be to plan for Dallas' Gay Pride Week—June 18-June 26, 1983.

In accordance with the adopted bylaws, elections were held for DGPWA officers. Those elected were Jim O'Connor as president, Nanci Vinyard as vice president, Carlos Hernandez as treasurer and Joe Murray as recorder.

"The formalization of the Association will ensure that Dallas will have a yearly Gay Pride Week, culminating with a parade," TWT NEWS was assured.

HOUSTON GAY PRIDE LAUNCHED

HOUSTON — This city's organizational plans for Gay Pride Week (GPW) will be launched on Sunday, January 30. "It will mark our first meeting for 1983," Larry Bagneris, Jr. told TWT NEWS.

The meeting will be held at Kindred Spirits beginning at 2:30pm, at which time, nominations for this year's GPW officers will be accepted.

The month of February will be devoted to theme competition. In past years, the gay pride committee had approved such themes as "United We Stand," "Proud To Be" and "A Part Of, Not Apart From." The public will be invited to submit all themes for selection at the gay pride meeting to be held the first Sunday in March.

The last ten days of June, as always, will be the dates for Houston's GPW. As specified by GPW by-laws, the last Sunday in June will be the date for the annual parade. "Sunday, June 26, will

be this year's parade date," Bagneris noted.

ROBBERY ATTEMPT FOILED AT BOOKSTORE

HOUSTON - At 11:00am, Tuesday, January 18, the clerk at the Ballpark Bookstore, along with the store's security guard, was held at gunpoint and robbed after the clientele was cleared from the store. After taking the guard's gun, the bandit headed toward the door, where he was confronted by plainclothes police officers arriving to serve the clerk a warrant of arrest for selling obscene material. Upon seeing the gun, the police retreated from the store with the gunman following, shooting at them and their car. During the commotion, the guard escaped, leaving the clerk to be held hostage.

The clerk's captor shut him in a booth and then tried to escape out the back door, which was locked. At this time, the clerk ran out of the booth and then out the front door, where he was arrested under the existing warrant.

By this time, the HPD Swat team had arrived, barricading the four-block area surrounding the store. At press time, the police had spoken with the intruder, locating one of his friends in an effort to talk him out of the store, but the situation was at a standstill.

PLANS SET FOR FIESTA '83

SAN ANTONIO — Plans for Fiesta '83 in San Antonio are progressing, with reservations having already been made for a block of rooms at the Travelodge on the river. Several Dallas men who have made arrangements for the past five years gave several reasons to TWT NEWS for choosing the Travelodge as the primary hotel for April 22-24, the dates for Fiesta '83.

Fiesta '82 centered around the Crocket Hotel. The Crocket underwent extensive remodeling recently and has increased its rates to \$100 per night for a double. The Travelodge has offered

Our members are made up of both sexes and all sexualities. We are a NON-religious order and our only requirement for full voting membership is that you be at least of adult age.

Four years ago this January, the Austin Lesbian/Gay Political Caucus (ALGPC) formally became the organization structured to fight for civil rights for lesbians and gay men. We were a small group at first, with myself, Steve Thomas, Janna Zumbrum and others as charter members. Some of us had worked successfully in the past on local legislation to end discrimination based on sexual preference in areas such as employment and public accommodations. Most of the work done prior to the formation of the ALGPC was done as individuals working with city officials, and by Janna in her role as our advocate on the Human Relations Commission.

However, one of the major obstacles left to overcome was the passage of the Fair Housing Ordinance, to protect us in the area of buying and renting, a basic human need—housing. Nevertheless, we had an unfriendly city council which did not see the need for protection in housing on the basis of sexual

preference, and they were, at least, hostile to our attempts. We realized that we would have to organize and fight for our rights through the electoral arena as lesbians and gay men were doing in San Francisco, Houston, Dallas and countless other cities and towns nationwide. We formed the ALGPC and had our first caucus meeting in January of 1979.

Two years later, in the spring of 1981, with several electoral victories to our credit, we plunged into the city council races. We worked as we had never worked before, as a unified political force. We also worked in coalition with other community groups, and out of this, a slate was formed. We got ourselves a progressive city council which has been receptive to women's issues. blacks' issues, Hispanics' issues, labor's issues and human rights issues. We all worked hard, and we won big. Last year we had the election on the Fair Housing amendment. The strong coalition bonds we had been building over all this time really made the Citizens for a United Austin campaign one of the most successful ones this city





Early in the fall semester of 1982, the University of Texas' Gay Students' Association played with the idea of uniting all Texas gay and lesbian students' organizations under one umbrella organization. Jay Cherin, chairperson of GSA, contacted all other groups and asked them for their opinions on grouping together. Every organization Jay spoke with showed great enthusiasm and encouragement about getting together to talk further about how this could benefit their own group's interests. Since then, the Texas Coalition of Gay/Lesbian Students' Organizations has kept all eight students' organizations in close contact with each other. and they have planned many activities together.

So far, leaders from GSA, the Rice Gay/Lesbian Support Group and Texas A&M's Gay Student Services have met together, and the first conference of the organization as a whole will be held in Austin on February 5 and 6, 1983. Other organizations invited to this conference are Law Students for Human Rights (also at UT), the Gay/Lesbian Association of Denton, the Gay Academic Union of North Texas and the Gay

Atheist League of America-University of Texas at Austin chapter. At the conference, the first of its kind ever, the groups will discuss how they can work together in educating the community—gay and straight, academic and non-academic—about pertinent issues dealing with homosexuality. Additionally, the coalition will supply a social atmosphere where students, faculty and staff members can make many friend-ships with those from schools other than their own. Also at the conference, the groups will decide specifically what the coalition's purpose will be.

The first activity of the coalition will be a campout/retreat at Bastrop Park over the weekend of February 26 and 27. Any gay or lesbian student, faculty or staff member of any university in Texas is welcome to attend. At the retreat, in addition to enjoying the outdoors with friends, speakers will talk about gay culture and how it directly affects students. Following a report from the eight organizations' leaders, a dinner and dance will finish up the first night on the retreat. 



In Women in America, written in 1842, Mrs. A.J. Graves commented on the women who, "in their ambition to be considered ladies, use their fair hands only in playing with their ringlets. or touching the piano or guitar." In the same year, Mrs. Ellis, in The Women in England, complained that "the number of languid, listless, and inert young ladies who now recline upon our sofas, murmuring and repining at every claim upon their personal exertions, is to me a truly melancholy spectacle."

But where fashion and etiquette-"the barrier which society draws round itself, a shield against the intrusion of the impertinent, the improper, and the vulgar"-conspired to make women idle, idleness itself developed into a kind of disease that undermined both physical and nervous health; by no means did the ladies who lapsed into a picturesque decline do so merely for the sake of being interesting.

In 1828, James Fenimore Cooper said that "the genteel wife lived retired from the destroying taint of excessive intercourse in the world." And a dozen vears later, a London court stated that a husband was justified in helping to

exacerbate the situation of their poor wilting female creatures by enforcing cohabitation. This included the world of medicine-protecting women from gynecological examination in the name of modesty. A professor in Philadelphia was quoted in 1952 as stating the fact that he was proud that in America "Women prefer to suffer the extremity of danger and pain rather than waive those scruples of delicacy which prevent their maladies from being fully explored." Such attitudes not only prevented women from seeking medical help when it was needed, but it prevented doctors from doing their jobs right, and prevented women from learning anything about their own anatomy and physiology. For example, menstruation was rarely mentioned and was generally thought of as a disability.

So chivalry, gentility, delicacy and ignorance all combined to keep the middle-class woman to her home. Women seemed destined to remain in this role, had it not been for her spirit and her finally denying the "natural" superiority of men over women.

The 19th century placed women on the verge of independence-but this in-

dependence cannot be fully recognized even today, without economic self-sufficiency. The feminist revolution was resented by men and women alike, who out of habit and fear wanted to keep women in "their place." But, by 1979, all the jobs that Senator George H. Williams of Oregon had thought, in 1866, that women could never do—were being done by women. There were women soldiers and sailors, farmers and engineers, bankers and lawyers. There were women truck drivers and brain surgeons and jumbo jet pilots.

Today, after the damage attempted and done by women like Anita Bryant, women are still able to stand up and demand that they receive full recognition for their abilities, and to demand equal rights with men for equal responsibilities. Individual identity for all women is what is driving them on to higher and more responsible positions in all areas of business and government. Sexual identity, individual identity—women have lived through these crises, and to-

day more than ever womanhood is standing on the brink of changing the pattern of history to show that the female species has been treated like a second-class person long enough.

It is truly a remarkable time to be living and a great time to be a womanhelping to shape history. There will come a time when women of the future will look back on this period and be just as shocked and dismayed as we are today to think that a woman would be denied medical help for the sake of preserving her "modesty." In other words, a woman's life meant very little, but her role as man's mistress or wife had to be protected. We women have suffered through hundreds of years of needless torture, suffering, degradement, ridicule, insults and sexual abuse; we have come a long way. We have a long way to go. Self-liberation takes courage. Overcoming the remaining overtures of ignorance will take the combined efforts of all women who feel pride in their bodies, minds and hearts.

FARENTHOLD SPEAKS OUT ON ...

... HER POLITICAL BACKGROUND

"I come from Corpus Christi and spent my early adult years working in local political matters. I worked on the local level, never in an elected office. I was appointed a member of the city's Human Rights Commission. I was a legal aide and director of legal services for the poor for two years. I have a background in local affairs which extended over many years before I ran for the legislature.

"I would like to say that for women who chose to run for political office then, that was the typical way to go. We were so fearful that we were not qualified. In a sense, we were overqualified for the position we dared to run for,

compared to our male counterparts, and let me explain why.

"Traditionally, young men who were interested in politics had several routes to choose from. One of the routes was to run soon after you were out of law school, or even when you were in law school, for the legislature. That is the way the young male lawyer interested in politics went.

"I went to the legislature after 15 years of working in local affairs and political campaigns, always for other people though. From city council races to working for John Kennedy's race—I worked the whole spectrum, as it was always what I was interested in.

"I didn't look at the percentage of women in politics, and I am glad I did not or I would have been discouraged. So I ran and served two terms in the Texas legislature. During the second term, I was dubbed the den mother of the Dirty 30. We were a reform group. A little known fact that was ignored then was that we were in the vanguard of cutting the fat out of budgets. That was something we could scarcely get any attention from, but that was very much a part of us.

"We took the budget to task every term. We tried to cut the fat out of it, to no avail. It is possible to be conscientious about expenditures and still be progressive.

"I ran for governor in 1972. After getting as far as the runoff in the first primary, I defeated both the governor and lieutenant governor. Briscoe and I were in the runoff. He defeated me, although

I received 46% of the vote. I guess he outspent me ten to one."

... WOMEN AND POLITICS

"We have our first woman holding a statewide office in Texas since Ma Ferguson, which is wonderful. But if we take a view over the country as a whole, we see that the gender gap was really exploited by male candidates. I am still studying the returns, but feel that in the long run it did not really work for the benefit of women candidates.

"I can give two examples from information which I was told. Going into the last week of the general elections, Millicent Fenwick in her U.S. Senate race in New Jersey and Harriet Wood in her U.S. Senate race in Missouri, both had a wide gender gap spread and were

ahead on more women supporting them. That gap was closed by intensive television campaigning by both male candidates targeting women voters. This was told to me by political scientists in the east who have been studying this.

"It is not in any report yet, but certainly from the other side of the ledger there is—I believe, and I have got to hedge it with all kinds of reservations because we know how slowly these things move—an emerging women's constituency. It is going to be up to you, and many like you, to make it a reality. I do not think it is wishful thinking. You won't see any discussion of that in the 1974 film [Sissy Farenthold—A Texas Chronicle]. I believe that there was a gender gap in my 1972 and 1974 races.

"I will never forget the statement made at a press club interview of mine in Dallas in 1972, when a reporter stood up and said to me, 'What percentage of your votes do you think come from ignorant housewives?' Of course, I challenged his statement. Clements said something comparable, and he sure suffered for it when he said he could not find a qualified housewife to serve on the Public Utilities Commission.

"There is a developing network which is so interesting. The isolation I once felt is not there. When I served in the Texas House, I was the only woman. I used to tell them I was the most conspicuous minority of all, and they [fellow legislators] did not know what I was talking about."

... EDUCATION

"In 1976, I was appointed president of Wells College, which is a women's college in Western New York. It was established in 1868 by Henry Well, who was the man who started Wells Fargo and American Express. I was the first woman president, and was there for a year.

"I balanced the budget, brought new programs in, etc. My favorite program I brought in was the Public Leadership Education Network, which has now gone to eight women's colleges. We had programming urging women to get into politics. To my knowledge, it was the first time it was ever done in higher education in this country.

"Students are so important. I will say one thing about education today—it is awfully expensive—but it is a buyer's market because there are fewer and fewer students."

... FUTURE OF PRIVATE INSTITUTIONS

"With inflation and state-supported universities, it is an enormous problem. The '80s are going to be very difficult years because of the drop in collegeage students. So there will be many that will fall, but not all. We will probably come out of it with fewer private colleges.

"I remember reading a study from the University of Chicago that said many colleges would be closed because of energy costs, not from the lack of student enrollment. I think we will see colleges in different forms. There will be mergers and closings. We will see innovative scheduling. For example, Dartmouth requires everyone to take a year of summer school to utilize the campus year-round."

... EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT

"The ERA was an organizing tool. Never let anyone say it is gone. It is not going to go away. The way it will go may take ten years, but by then we will be so much a part of the political process that there will not be this kind of opposition. I always say you change the laws by changing the lawmakers. It will just take time.

"We went into it with a kind of euphoria, and the reason why we had such euphoria was because we do not know our own history. We all should read A Century of Struggle, which tells of the 100 years it took to get the 19th Amendment."

... NUCLEAR WEAPONRY

"Groups have become much more knowledgeable in lobbying. For example, two efforts have certainly demonstrated their effectiveness. First, the

nuclear freeze lost by only two votes in the House last summer, and secondly, the MX missile vote. I don't want to overstate those successes, but it sure is a beginning.

"So, my interests have moved from trying to bring reform in state government to problems on an international level. A couple of weeks ago, I had a chance to go to Comiso. It is a name that does not ring a bell in this country. It is where the U.S. asked NATO to deploy cruise missiles with a range of 1.500 miles.


"This brings on a whole new generation of weaponry with less opportunity for verification and so on. Here, it goes on with our scarcely knowing of it. One of the things that I would like to mention—and that we are oblivious of because we are the "power"—is the dislocation that something like the deployment of those missiles brings to a relatively poor community.

"It will bring all kinds of social dislocation to the area, to say nothing of the hazards. It is a poor place, and the best vineyards and farmland will be taken for the missiles."

... THE CIA

"I am terribly concerned about our intervention policies in Central America. That leads me right to what I think is the most insidious development—the use of covert action by the CIA. We did not know about these activities twenty years ago. They were known in just a few circles. It perverts our whole system and gives the President a free hand on making foreign policy, which distorts our whole system of government.

"I think one of the real problems with the control of the CIA, which is the palace guard of the President, is that there is no constituency—yet—to hold it accountable. I hope that will come. I think our 30 years experience with them shows it needs reform and not the blank check it is being given to meddle not only in foreign countries, but in this country."

FADVOCATE GUIDE GAY HEALIH

The Advocate Guide to Gay Health, by R.D. Fenwick; 236 pp.; bibliography, index; Alyson Publications, P.O. Box 2783, Dept. B-23, Boston, Massachusetts 02208; softcover, \$6.95.



If the title seems familiar to you, it should. The book came out originally in 1978. If you have read it, don't turn this version down. The Advocate Guide to Gay Health comes in a new, updated edition with more current information on AIDS (by Nathan Fain), STDs and new ways to help ourselves stay healthy through preventive medicine and holistic medicine. Fenwick prevents the book from simply being a dry bulletin of facts on gay diseases; his use of anecdotes about people who are doing something to maintain, or regain, their good health make for an enjoy-

able, more readable guide.

The author includes, as well, chapters about health problems in general, as they relate to the gay experience—the risk of certain forms of sex, sexual dysfunction, the use of alcohol and other drugs and perspectives on aging. Finding sources of health care is discussed, with listings of same; further reading material is listed; and a bibliography is provided, as well as an alphabetical breakdown of gay organizations by state and then city.

Fenwick uses a mellow, down-toearth tone in speaking to the reader, and the information is made even more palatable with his use of a question and answer format. This format simulates an informal dialogue with the reader and will enable everyone to go directly



to the area of information (s)he specifically wants to learn about.

Each topic is covered in sufficient depth (further reading may be desired), but Fenwick has chosen to be expansive and cover a wide range of related health problems, solutions and practices. Our degree of health touches every part of our lives, so it is natural for him to choose this course. He emphasizes much more the importance of how our mental attitude concerning our lives and self-image influences our susceptibility to disease. This is where holistic medicine begins to play a central role in our lives.

With these outbreaks of disease in the gay sub-groups, many persons succumb to a far worse problem of thinking "It seems to me that only gay people get these diseases, so that proves what society has told me—being gay is wrong—and I am being punished." As we learn more about the interaction between mind and body (holistic thinking), we learn that we have control over our attitudes, and thus a certain amount of control over, and responsibility for, our own health and sickness. As the old saying goes, "If you are part of the problem, then you are part of the solution."

With this in mind, the relationship between self-oppressive homophobia and our health becomes clear. When we rid our minds of negative attitudes that keep us on the "sick" list, we have a powerful new tool to fight disease and even prevent it. When we consciously incorporate the reality of the fact that other groups get these diseases as well, when we no longer let society's homophobia sabotage our strength and our relationships, there will be no need for fear, merely caution and awareness.

This is the guiding message that Fenwick gives us. He also states that with the intensive research going on in the area of Kaposi's Sarcoma, science may find the key that unlocks the solution to all cancer. Gays would be instrumental in that breakthrough. This holistic view of our health may be Fenwick's most valuable information in the book to aid the vitality of ourselves and of the gay movement in general.

Another pleasurable aspect of the book is his total integration of health information for both gay men and women. This is quite different from books in the past written by and for gay men, the author claiming ignorance and just leaving it up to women to write their own books. It is necessary and desirable for women to write their own books, but Fenwick has cared enough to combine the information into one.

The Advocate Guide to Gay Health is a valuable source book for our health—physical, mental and emotional—to live a happy, gay life.

THE SAD CAFE by George Klein

Come Back to the 5 and Dime Jimmy Dean, Jimmy Dean is a beautiful picture in every way, and has the unmistakable touch of Robert Altman, Produced by Mark Goodson Productions and Viacom for under \$1,000,000, it's a masterpiece of film style and technique. Has there ever been a director as diversified in approach as Robert Altman? In films like M*A*S*H. Nashville and McCabe and Mrs. Miller and parts of Brewster McCloud, Thieves Like Us and The Long Goodbye, he's looked critically at the American Dream in such vastly different ways that you're left breathless and wary at the same time. Can anyone really be this talented. some ask. (Studio heads phrase it differently: "Will his films keep making money?") In Come Back to the 5 and

Dime Jimmy Dean, Jimmy Dean, Altman shows us his talent, and then some. At first, the movie looks like a "confessional picture" with bits of The Last Picture Show and Durrenmatt's play, The Visit, thrown in for good measure. But unlike most confessional films (The Boys in the Band being the worst example), we're not forced to pity any character; the camera never dwells on a face, hoping to wrench the "Godlook-at-me-l'm-just-awful-please-pitymy-poor-soul-l-only-want-to-be-loved" feeling about some character from the audience. Altman's too good a filmmaker to do that to us; he never panders or overstates a theme or emotion. The picture is a triumph of civility.

Come Back to the 5 and Dime Jimmy Dean, Jimmy Dean doesn't follow

any organized pattern of narration, which may confuse some viewers. It deals with a group of women who meet on the twentieth anniversary of James Dean's death (the performers include Sandy Dennis, Cher, Karen Black and Sudie Bond). A viewer gets meaning and content from the rhythms established by speech, photography and editing; Altman is willing to let you work in this picture. He directed the stage production of the film (written by Ed Graczyk), yet it never has the feel of a staged play. You're overcome by images and emotions, and characters seem straining for room on the frame. (In an interview. Altman said he began thinking of the play in cinematic terms after it opened.) Come Back to the 5 and Dime Jimmy Dean, Jimmy Dean really is meant for the screen—a stage could never hold it (which may account for its failure there). In the picture, Altman succeeds in containing the uncontainable.

The real triumph of the film, though, is the ensemble acting. These women are sad, lonely, inspired, all too believable. Sandy Dennis gives her usual pouting, egregious performance, yet because of the calmness of the other actresses, her portrayal works. As Mona—a child living in a woman's body who thinks she's given birth to James Dean's son—there's a delicacy in her

movements and facile features that's genuinely moving. Karen Black as Joanne, a transsexual who comes back for a kind of revenge but earns a type of dignity, and Sudie Bond as Juanitaafraid of God yet toting her Bible like a gun-all shine in their roles. But it is Cher as Sissy who is especially impressive. Big-bosomed, lusty, she's genuinely appealing. Her life revolves around her breasts and scoring. Yet when she's confronted with the fact men pay attention to her cleavage "but not the person under it," the revelation is so moving because we feel a deep attachment to her. The understatement Cher brings to such a flashy part is beautifully effective.

This movie shows how a great director such as Robert Altman-working with ten times less money than usual for a feature film and with complete control over his product-can make a great and lovely piece of art. And it's more than poetic justice that the same studio heads who wrote off Altman a long time ago, rushed to get distribution rights for the film after they saw what they had passed up. (Altman refused.) Come Back to the 5 and Dime Jimmy Dean, Jimmy Dean triumphantly reminds us that talent and a love of the medium-not money and the media blitz-make a great picture. w

Ralph Waite (The Mississippi) and Vickie Lawrence (Mama's Place). . . . Sheree North, once a contender in the who-will-replace-Marilyn Monroe sweepstakes, is co-starring with John Heard in an upcoming ABC TV-movie called Leas. (Devoted TV viewers may remember Sheree in an unusual 1979 TV-movie titled Amateur Night at the Dixie Bar and Grill, which also featured Candy Clark, Dennis Quaid, Tanya Tucker. Henry Gibson, Jamie Farr and Louise

Latham. It hasn't been rerun in years. but when it does turn up again don't miss it. Many people believe it to be one of the best TV-movies ever made.) . . . Suzanne Pleshette and Joseph Bologna are starring in a TV-movie called One Cooks, the Other Doesn't, soon to begin production for CBS. . . . George C. Scott returns to TV in a movie called China Rose, for CBS. His co-star is Ali McGraw, whose TV debut is coming February 6 with ABC's Winds of War. ... Bob Denver, once Dobie Gillis' sidekick and later the goofy first mate on Gilligan's Island, returns in a TVmovie called Portrait of an Invisible Woman, an NBC project which may be turned into a series. . . . Albert Finney will be making his American television debut when he protrays the Pope in CBS's John Paul II. . . . Pat Boone and his wife Shirley will have a program on CBN-cable called Together-Shirley and Pat Boone. Rosemary Clooney is scheduled as a quest. GAY ARTS — Giant steps forward for Dallas. The premier season of *Gay Arts* is quite impressive. The productions begin with **Terry Hutchison**, January 27-30. Following Terry's appearance will be the all gay **West Street Repertory** from New York with plays called *A Perfect Relationship*, *My Blue Heaven* and *If This Isn't Love*. The month of May brings **Women In Concert** and **Men Together**.

Terry Hutchison is appearing at Gran' Crystal Palace. We spoke with Terry at his home in New York and found this information on him. Terry travels with a three-piece band. They perform some original music along with rhythm and blues and early Motown sounds. He has backed up people such as Quincey Jones. Marvin Gaye and Sharon McNight. The band he had while living in San Francisco was featured in the movie Word Is Out. Terry is currently performing at the Royal Roost in New York. I've heard good things of this man. Don't miss him when he comes to Dallas.

Houston Grand Opera presents Giuseppe Verdi's classic, Rigoletto, on January 25 and 28 at Jones Hall. The opera (performed in Italian) was composed in 1851 when Verdi was 37 years old. The play created a scandal in Paris because the "frivolous king" was supposed to be Francois of France. Police, fearful that a plot showing a monarch in a compromising situation might provoke demonstrations, forced Verdi to change the locale and the King of France to the Duke of Mantua.

The Houston Opera also opens with Gaetano Donizettis' Daughter of the Regiment on January 22, 26 and 27 (sung in English). The story tells of young Marie who had been brought up by a kindly French regiment after

having been abandoned as an infant. Guided by Sergeant Sulpice, she is a happy "daughter of the regiment" singing of her love of war and patriotism. She falls in love with Tonio, a young Tyrolean who has saved her from falling off a precipice. But as love stories go, Marie is in love with Tonio. Who gets the girl? You have to see the show.

She studied drama at the University of Texas and then moved to New York to persue her acting and music career. Amanda tells us she wrote "The Rose" two years before the movie was made. When she heard the movie needed a title song, a tape of her song was sent to the music producer of the movie, who sent it to the producers of the movie, who sent it back, rejected. It was sent to the producers again, who rejected it a second time. The music producer then sent the tape directly to Bette who obviously had more sense than the producers and accepted the song. We recently met with Patti LaBelle in her suite at Houston's Hyatt Regency. Patti was in town rehearsing for the production of Your Arms Too Short To Box With God. The show will be at Houston's Music Hall, February 1-6. The first act of Arms is Christ's life according to St. Matthew. Patti really gets to demonstrate her vocal skills in the second act, which is more or less a gospel revue.

Patti spoke candidly with us concerning her private and stage life. If there was any insincerity in this lady, I failed to detect it. When you work in this business, it's easy to catch.

Patti was dressed in black with red accents. Her nails were long and scarlet. Though she looks the part, one gets the feeling Patti doesn't realize the caliber of star she really is. I hope she never changes.

TWT — Patti, is this a dream of yours, to be in a Broadway show?

Patti — No, to be honest, I've done Broadway before with my band as a solo performance at the Wintergarden.

Why did you choose this production? I wasn't going to accept it in the beginning. I had already seen it done twice, once with Jennifer Holliday. I wanted to do a new play. After three months of the producer's calling and asking me to do it, I finally agreed, but only if they would rewrite the music for me and make it new. After the second rehearsal. I realized it was something very special. It's nice to be in a Broadway show also, because when you do legitimate theatre, people respect you more. I don't know why they think that now; I've always been a respectful person.

You've done television [a program called Working with James Taylor, Rita Moreno and Eileen Brennan], concerts and Broadway. Are you considering movies?

Yes, but I want to wait for the right one to come along. I wouldn't do a part just to say I've made a movie. That's demeaning and belittling, on my part. It has to be in good taste.

What type of movie would attract you?

I'd like to do a drama with no singing. A romantic drama would be nice. This is a part of me you haven't seen yet. I'd also like to do some comedy. I've only done comedy around the house; my husband thinks I'm funny.

You have three children. Would you tell us about them and what it's like to travel so much and be a mother also?

My youngest [9 years old] is named Zuri—it's Swahili and means "beautiful." I gave birth to him, but I have two adopted boys, Stanley and Don, who are brothers. They're 20 and 24. And I have a husband named Armstead. The only problem with the traveling is with the little one; he wonders why I have to do it all the time. But I explain to him, "See your cassette player? My traveling

helped you get that." He still doesn't let me off the hook, though. He still gives me a hard time when I must leave. I took him with me once, and he was so bored he wanted to go home. He knows it's not all glamour.

You started out in the '60s with Patti LaBelle and the Bluebelles. Has it been a hard road to reach this point in your career? Would you change anything?

It hasn't been that difficult. I wouldn't change anything. All the hardships and money loss and stealing that was done to me [by the music industry]. I would accept again. In order to respect what you have, you have to have earned it. I've had as many hard times as anybody could. I'm glad I didn't have it easy. There are so many little "punk" groups and overnight successes, people who haven't paid any dues. They get it and abuse it, they're rude, they're nasty. They don't know they've been blessed and they don't treat it right. I don't take anything for granted. One example of me learning the ropes is that I manage my own business now with my husband and attorney. Too many times, managers and booking agencies are rip-offs.

Are you bitter about the past?

Not anymore. I used to be so bitter that I couldn't do interviews because everything was so negative. But now, I realize that's just the way some people are. They rip-off for a living. But you can bet your ... breath, I know what to watch out for now.

What can we expect to see in Your Arms Too Short To Box With God?

People feel so much emotion. They leave crying and laughing and feeling lifted. It's an emotional experience, and it's not all rehearsed. After a certain point, some members of the cast and myself get carried away and slip into a concert.

Is it hard to adhere to a certain time limit on a song? You've been doing concerts so long.

That's one of the reasons I didn't want to do it in the beginning. I also didn't want to wear the same costumes every night, I didn't want to sing the same songs with the same amount of



minutes and seconds, nor did I want to do eight shows a week and two on Saturdays and Sundays. But after I did it, I found it wasn't that hard. I could have done it long ago. It's not that hard to think of others. You have to do a song for two minutes and 50 seconds because someone is waiting in the wings to come on. The songs that I really go off on are during the second half of the show. There's nobody waiting, except the stage manager, to break my face.

Has this taken time away from your other music?

No, because I've been doing rock and roll concerts in between. In April, I'll start back doing full-time concerts. Three weeks ago, I did a Duke Ellington special for television, and next week, I'm doing a Eubie Blake special. I've been doing a lot of different things while I'm doing the play.

The production is gospel. Were you raised in a gospel atmosphere?

I sang gospel in the choir of a Baptist church. I'm always singing gospel, even in my rock and roll. I don't sing about Jesus, but the feeling is the same. Some songs have "the spirit," you might say.

Have you had any formal stage training?

I've always done stage and theatre, so when I do a song like "You Are My Friend" or "Music Is My Life," I always act the songs out. "Over the Rainbow" is definitely drama. I'm a drama queen and don't even know it.

How many times have you played Houston?

I remember being at the Summit. I can't remember. Can you tell me where I've played?

I've seen you at the Music Hall and Texas Southern University.

I've played the Music Hall? See, it's terrible. I can't remember all these places. I don't get high, so that's not the reason.

I have some friends who danced with you on stage once. Of course, they were painted silver and had bugle-beads in their hair.

That had to have been for "Lady M."

["Lady Marmalade"]. I would pick the craziest looking people to dance with me during that song.

Why do you think "Lady Marmalade" made it so big when ...

. . . other songs should have made it. I know. I felt other songs we had done before that were platinum material. It's very hard with a black female group to cross over on the charts. When we did "Lady M." and it made it so big, I thought, "What's wrong here? Why didn't the others make it?" I think it's because people were shocked that ladies were singing about hookers. I didn't expect the song to make it that big. I sang the song because I liked it. I didn't see anything wrong with singing about a lady of the evening . . . not that I am one, or will ever be . . . knock on wood. I had a very good friend who was a hooker, and she was the nicest person I knew. She committed suicide. But she would do anything for you. I didn't care if she was a hooker or not. It's very prejudiced to say, "I like her because she's this, and I don't like her because she's this." I don't believe in prejudice or segregating anything. I'll be with a nun and a hooker at the same time and they'll both be my good friends. I saw no reason not to sing about a hooker. She has to make a living. I don't make a living that way, but that's what she chose. I felt that, "God, that's really horrible. The first song we sing about a hooker becomes a hit." All our other songs were about the system and how really messed up it is, and those songs were ignored. I guess they >



[recording industry] thought the song was sexual, so they made it a hit, It's really sad. But to me, "Lady M." is a social statement.

Your first hit with the Bluebelles was "I Sold My Heart To the Junkman."

And I had no idea what that song was about. I thought it was about the guy who picked up the trash. Then I found out later it was about drugs. That's really something. Our biggest hits were about junkies and hookers.

Now you get to sing songs like "You Are My Friend." That was a fairly big hit. Well, it is within my cult following.

It's one of my favorite songs.

What do you think attracted your gay



following? Was it your costumes?

No, we had a gay following when we were wearing dresses from Woolworth's. The Bluebelles had a very large gay following. Every place we played. we had the gays. I think the reason was that I've never been ashamed to sing or do anything I felt on stage. I never did anything vulgar, but I wasn't afraid to say something about you sitting in the front looking like you were fixing to throw-up. I lay on the floor and sing because I feel like it at the moment. Or crawling down the steps. Gay people knew by the emotion we let out that we weren't inhibited or intimidated to do or say what we felt. Maybe they saw a freedom in us they could relate to. I'm going against the social norm, and so are they. I'm not afraid to let an emotion take over. I might trip or fall, but I wouldn't be embarrassed.

I understand you like to gamble.

I do. I'll gamble with you today if you have some money. All you need is a dollar and we'll start. I go to Vegas and Atlantic City, and I gamble a lot. I love it. I used to make more money gambling than I did singing. I used to clean out Otis Redding and Sam Cooke. That was my income, because maybe we were making nine dollars a week. I'd make two or three hundred at gambling, because I was good.

I hear your hobby is cooking.

Yes, it is. Cooking and cleaning. When I travel, I bring my electric fryer and oven, buy my own groceries, and cook every day. It cools me out; it's cheap and I know I'm eating good food.

You won't have to clean here [a threeroom suite at the Hilton]. You probably have 15 maids.

I don't want them cleaning my pots. You never know how clean they are. I put my own Ivory Liquid in my own pots. After the show, sometimes, I invite the cast over, or they smell it in the hall, and know it's Patti's room.

Are you still close to Sarah Dash and Nona Hendryx [the other two members of LaBelle]?

Very close. I just recorded with Nona three weeks ago. I'm singing on her new album. I see them all the time. We're very close.

Do the three of you get together and talk about old times?

Yeah. We laugh about a lot of things. I have everything, all the shows on video. They're funny. You know, we had to have had a great sense of humor. Some of the stuff I used to come out in—I thought, "Girl, you were either on drugs or crazy." I wasn't on drugs, so you know what's left. But it was fun. We plan, in the future, to do an album and a tour. We'll use the old name, LaBelle. Just like old times.

Do you ever take a break?

Never. I don't like to relax, nor do I like to travel. I like to be home, but I don't like to be home too long. I don't like to fly, but I have to. I don't like sand, sun or the beach. This is really making a lot of sense, isn't it? I can't explain it. I like to cook. I'm basically a homebody. I don't do drugs or disco-misco. I like to drink wine or gin or beer. Maybe I'm missing something; I don't know.

How would you describe yourself? Emotional, caring, perfect, outrageous and sick. A fun sick. A positive sick. Are people ever afraid to talk to you?

Yes, and that's a shame. I'm just like everyone else. I mean, what's a "star"? It's "rats" spelled backwards. The people who act real grand are sick. That's the other side of sick. I can't take people who act untouchable and grand. I feel like taking up a whip and beating them

Maybe they're afraid you might be that way.

I would imagine, you being on the other end, being an interviewer—
"God," I bet you say, "what kind of fool am I going to meet today?" You have to; I would. I'd wonder, "What is this idiot like?" Some of them are real idiots. I know what you must go through.

After this interview, Patti pulled me aside and said, "I have to tell you about a group of my gay friends who were at a gospel concert I was giving. One of them kept screaming, 'Sing "Lady Marmalade." I thought, 'Now, girlfriend, here I am singing a gospel concert and you want to hear about a hooker.' I loved it, it sounds like something I would do. Hey, look at this neat ice bucket they have here. You think I could get out with it?"



An open letter to the gay community on hepatitis B

Hepatitis B, a serious disease, may be sexually transmitted

Sexually transmitted diseases among the gay community are epidemic. Herpes has recently received a lot of attention; gonorrhea and syphilis are well known; but the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recently issued a major recommendation for the prevention of another sexually transmitted disease: Hepatitis B. In their Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, the CDC stated: "Susceptible homosexually active males should be vaccinated [against hepatitis B] regardless of their age or duration of their homosexual practices."

Gay men are at a high risk of contracting hepatitis B

In one study, from 51% to 76% of 3,816 gay men seen in five sexually transmitted disease clinics had evidence of past or present hepatitis B infection. Once infected, there is a 6% to 10% chance of becoming a carrier—capable of passing on the virus. The CDC estimated there are nearly 1 million carriers in the United States and that 100,000 of these carriers are gay men.

The hepatitis B virus can be passed on by contact with contaminated body fluids

such as saliva, urine, semen, and blood. The hepatitis B virus can be transmitted through tiny breaks in the skin or contact with mucous membranes. This can occur during intimate sexual contact and can lead to hepatitis B for the partner of an infected person. Although most patients recover and over half contracting hepatitis B do not get symptoms, there is no specific treatment and no known cure for hepatitis B infections.

Hepatitis B may lead to even more serious complications

For those who do get symptoms of hepatitis B, a mild

or severe "flu-like" sickness may continue for weeks or months. Ten percent of all infections become long lasting (chronic) with potential complications that are sometimes more serious than those of other sexually transmitted diseases. The serious complications include the chronic carrier state, chronic active hepatitis, chronic persistent hepatitis, cirrhosis, and even cancer of the liver. Every year almost 4,000 carriers die of cirrhosis. In addition, carriers have a risk 273 times greater than that of the general population of contracting a usually fatal form of liver cancer.

Now this serious sexually transmitted disease is usually preventable by vaccination with the new hepatitis B vaccine

After more than a decade of research and development, a new vaccine is available for prevention, not treatment, of hepatitis B. In clinical studies, the vaccine was highly effective in preventing hepatitis B infection and was generally well tolerated. No serious adverse reactions occurred in these studies.

The vaccination regimen consists of a series of three injections, the first two a month apart and the third, six months after the first. To be effective, the vaccine must be given before a person gets hepatitis B. The vaccine helps prevent the disease: It is not effective as a treatment. We suggest that you consult your doctor to determine if you should be vaccinated.

Why you should consult your doctor or clinic The vaccine helps protect against infection caused by hepatitis B virus. This virus is an important cause of viral hepatitis, a disease mainly of the liver. Even mild forms of this disease may lead to serious complications and aftereffects, including liver cancer. There is no specific treatment for viral hepatitis.


Vaccination is recommended for persons who have a higher risk of becoming infected with hepatitis B virus because of frequent, close contact with infected people or exposure to body fluids from such people. It will not protect against hepatitis caused by viruses other than hepatitis B virus. No serious adverse reactions were reported in over 6.000

No serious adverse reactions were reported in over 6,000 individuals receiving the vaccine in clinical trials. The most frequent reaction was soreness at the point of injection; less

common local reactions included redness, swelling, warmth, or formation of a hard, lumplike spot. The local effects were usually mild and lasted no more than 2 days after vaccination. Occasionally, low-grade fever (less than 101 °F) occurred. When it did, it usually lasted no longer than 48 hours following vaccination. In rare cases, lever over 102 °F was reported.

More generalized complaints including malaise, fatigue, headache, nausea, dizziness, muscle pain, and joint pain were reported infrequently. Bash was reported rarely. As with any vaccine, broad use may reveal additional adverse reactions.

Your doctor or clinic knows what special care must be taken when administering the vaccine and in determining who should receive the vaccine. The vaccine is not intended for persons who are allergic to any of its components.
