BAGNERIS REMAINS AS GPC PREZ

HOUSTON — Larry Bagneris, Jr. has won a second term as president of Houston's Gay Political Caucus (GPC). This was not a surprise to **TWT NEWS**. In fact, the lackluster February 2 vote was unanimous by acclamation. Although there had been controversial speculation surrounding a last-minute nomination, there was none. Bagneris ran unopposed.

For vice-president, the race was more spirited. Four had tossed their hats into the ring, but by the time of the vote, there were only two candidates left on the ticket.

Incumbent Terry Harris chose not to run for a third term, and threw his support behind Marion Coleman, owner of Kindred Spirits. In a surprise move, Greg Russell, leader of the Ad Hoc committee, also withdrew his name. Russell, calling for "the need for change," gave his support to UT Law School graduate, Mike Lattimore.

Yet Coleman won handily, clearly 2-1. Coleman—123 votes; Lattimore—53 votes. Coleman became the first wom-



an to hold the GPC vice-presidential post. She is also the first Republican to hold that office. "GPC is capable of more progress," she exclaimed. "I believe in GPC!"

In the race for secretary, the incumbent, Tony Vega, gleaned 105 votes to win another term over Jerry Mays, who garnered only 71 votes.

For treasurer, Lattimore withdrew his name, leaving only one candidate, Norman Guttman, to run unopposed. His victory was also by acclamation.

For board position one, Scott Miller withdrew to throw his support behind Dale Beverly, whose 118 votes beat the incumbent, Bill Etheridge. Beverly spoke of his "desire to appeal laws that have crushed gays."

Ray Hill, one of the founders of GPC, won board position two. It was Hill's third time to be elected to the board. Hill beat Paul Corollo, 118-61.

A gay parent, Gary Grant, sought re-election to board position four and won

125 votes to 53 over Joe Thornton. Grant cited his continued experience with voter registration.

Linda Jones, chair of elections, was voted by her peers to chair the 12-person board of directors, **TWT NEWS** was informed.

HOUSTON POLICE CAN HIRE GAYS

HOUSTON — This city's police department has ruled that homosexuals could become members of HPD. Mayor Whitmire had urged Police Chief Lee Brown to make the change since the decision on Penal Code Section 21.06 (homosexual conduct). That decision was made by Judge Jerry Buchmeyer last August.

Heretofore, HPD had maintained that gays could not be police officers since homosexual activity was against the law. That stumbling block was removed with Buchmeyer's decision. It was only a matter of time before HPD would be required to change its screening and questionnaire procedures.

The change that was made to HPD's application reduces the number of questions about sexuality to one—as to whether an applicant has ever engaged in any illegal sexual activity that might make one susceptible to blackmail or prove an embarrassment to HPD.

Although it is a loaded question, it is still a step in the right direction toward non-discrimination.

When KPRC-TV, Channel 2, asked GPC president Larry Bagneris, Jr. about this change, he responded that he had known that it was coming for about three weeks and was pleased that "the police department, which is charged by state law to uphold the law, had at last decided to abide by the law." He also noted that he did not foresee any great surge of gays applying for police employment. "We already have quite a few gay police officers in HPD," Bagneris told **TWT NEWS**.

Past GPC president, Lee Harrington, agreed, maintaining that there are 40-

45 gay police officers now on the force. "This change cleans up the application to make it fair and equitable to all who want to apply to become a police officer," Harrington said.

Reaction from the Houston Police Officer's Association (HPOA) was, as expected, not favorable. Having gays on the police force would create "chaos, controversy and conflict," HPOA vice president, Mike Wood, articulated.

FORT WORTH'S TCGA ELECTION

FORT WORTH — Greg Wooten has been elected as the new president of the Tarrant County Gay Alliance (TCGA) at a special election held February 1 at the Center for the Community. The election was called to replace those officers who had resigned and moved away, Jerry Cassidy of **TWT NEWS** explained.

Others elected were Frank Cordy as vice president and Frank Roper, formerly a board member, as the new treasurer. Lester Van Huff will continue to serve out his unexpired term as secretary.

Sharon Huber and Mike Martin were elected to the board of directors. Sandra Kolansar will continue to serve her unexpired term. Two alternates to the board, Billie Moon and David Blasic, were appointed and accepted.

All officers will serve until June, when the regular election is scheduled.

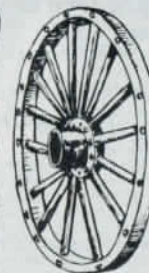

An open letter to the gay community on hepatitis B

Hepatitis B, a serious disease, may be sexually transmitted

Sexually transmitted diseases among the gay community are epidemic. Herpes has recently received a lot of attention; gonorrhea and syphilis are well known; but the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recently issued a major recommendation for the prevention of another sexually transmitted disease: Hepatitis B. In their *Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report*, the CDC stated: "Susceptible homosexually active males should be vaccinated [against hepatitis B] regardless of their age or duration of their homosexual practices."

Gay men are at a high risk of contracting hepatitis B

In one study, from 51% to 76% of 3,816 gay men seen in five sexually transmitted disease clinics had evidence of past or present hepatitis B infection. Once infected, there's a 6% to 10% chance of becoming a carrier—capable of passing on the virus. The CDC estimated there are nearly 1 million carriers in the United States and that 100,000 of these carriers are gay men.

The hepatitis B virus can be passed on by contact with contaminated body fluids

such as saliva, urine, semen, and blood. The hepatitis B virus can be transmitted through tiny breaks in the skin or contact with mucous membranes. This can occur during intimate sexual contact and can lead to hepatitis B for the partner of an infected person. Although most patients recover and over half contracting hepatitis B do not get symptoms, there is no specific treatment and no known cure for hepatitis B infections.

Hepatitis B may lead to even more serious complications

For those who do get symptoms of hepatitis B, a mild

or severe "flu-like" sickness may continue for weeks or months. Ten percent of all infections become long lasting (chronic) with potential complications that are sometimes more serious than those of other sexually transmitted diseases. The serious complications include the chronic carrier state, chronic active hepatitis, chronic persistent hepatitis, cirrhosis, and even cancer of the liver. Every year almost 4,000 carriers die of cirrhosis. In addition, carriers have a risk 273 times greater than that of the general population of contracting a usually fatal form of liver cancer.

Now this serious sexually transmitted disease is usually preventable by vaccination with the new hepatitis B vaccine

After more than a decade of research and development, a new vaccine is available for prevention, not treatment, of hepatitis B. In clinical studies, the vaccine was highly effective in preventing hepatitis B infection and was generally well tolerated. No serious adverse reactions occurred in these studies.

The vaccination regimen consists of a series of three injections, the first two a month apart and the third, six months after the first. To be effective, the vaccine must be given before a person gets hepatitis B. The vaccine helps prevent the disease: It is *not effective as a treatment*. We suggest that you consult your doctor to determine if you should be vaccinated.

Why you should consult your doctor or clinic

The vaccine helps protect against infection caused by hepatitis B virus. This virus is an important cause of viral hepatitis, a disease mainly of the liver. Even mild forms of this disease may lead to serious complications and aftereffects, including liver cancer. There is no specific treatment for viral hepatitis.

Vaccination is recommended for persons who have a higher risk of becoming infected with hepatitis B virus because of frequent, close contact with infected people or exposure to body fluids from such people. It will not protect against hepatitis caused by viruses other than hepatitis B virus.

No serious adverse reactions were reported in over 6,000 individuals receiving the vaccine in clinical trials. The most frequent reaction was soreness at the point of injection; less

common local reactions included redness, swelling, warmth, or formation of a hard, lumplike spot. The local effects were usually mild and lasted no more than 2 days after vaccination. Occasionally, low-grade fever (less than 101°F) occurred. When it did, it usually lasted no longer than 48 hours following vaccination. In rare cases, fever over 102°F was reported.

More generalized complaints including malaise, fatigue, headache, nausea, dizziness, muscle pain, and joint pain were reported infrequently. Rash was reported rarely. As with any vaccine, broad use may reveal additional adverse reactions.

Your doctor or clinic knows what special care must be taken when administering the vaccine and in determining who should receive the vaccine. The vaccine is not intended for persons who are allergic to any of its components.

treating sexually transmitted diseases," the clinic director, Frank Berrier, explained to TWT NEWS.

An initial staff of women has been developed for the program, but an urgent need still exists for volunteers, especially physicians and nurses. Those interested in volunteering should contact Berrier by writing the clinic at 104 Westheimer or calling (713) 528-5531.

Although the Women's Emphasis Program will be primarily staffed by and for women, men will continue to be treated on Sundays.

CONFERENCE ON GAYS AT A&M

COLLEGE STATION — At a February 2 press conference at Texas A&M University, Gay Student Services (GSS) sent the message to the university and the federal courts that they "will not quit." After six years in federal courts, GSS is still fighting for recognition from Texas A&M, David Gary of TWT NEWS reported.

GSS spokesperson Jo Foy and Texas Human Rights Foundation (THRF) president M. Robert Schwab addressed media reporters from around Central Texas as part of the conference.

After the press conference, Schwab addressed Alternative, a gay service organization for the community. His briefing was laced with cautions for patience. Citing constitutional violation and blatant discrimination, he urged that the groups continue their fight. THRF is underwriting many costs in the case.

Also discussed at the conference were possibilities of a second gay group seeking university recognition. The thought of a gay political group was discussed using the same constitution as the Young Republicans, a reactionary student group, only omitting the name Young Republicans and using a new name. Other types of groups were discussed. The matter, however, was tabled pending more research, TWT NEWS observed.

SPA STABBING RULED SUICIDE

HOUSTON — TWT NEWS has learned that the January 30 death at the Midtowne Spa has been ruled a suicide. Homicide Detective Scott Dobyanski concluded, after thorough investigation and an autopsy, that Andrew E. Hamilton, 29, stabbed himself in the left chest.

There were several "hesitation" marks—shallow knife punctures—on Hamilton's chest, indicating that he had made several false attempts in stabbing himself before self-inflicting a fatal thrust.

TWT NEWS further learned that Hamilton had written a suicide note last spring, but had failed to go through with the act.

Hamilton had been found in his rented room at the bathhouse. No robbery or forced entry had initially left investigators with no motive other than probable suicide.

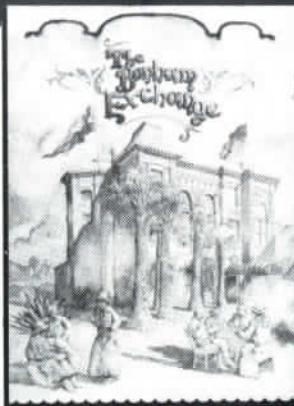

Police/Guns/Ticket

Dear TWT:

I am writing this letter to inform others in the community of a situation that occurred . . . to myself. My motive is to prevent any needless trouble from our own Houston police department.

I was stopped by the Houston police department for making an illegal turn. I was out partying with friends, having a good time, and just forgot about the sign. I know that I made an illegal turn, I realized what I had done in the middle of the turn. I don't mind being ticketed for the offense. What made me very irate was the handling of the situation by our Houston police officers.

I pulled over to the curb and stepped slowly from my car to give the officers my driver's license. I got out of my car for two reasons: 1)my window was broken and wouldn't roll down; 2)every time I have been stopped by an officer the first thing they ask me to do is get out of my car.

Immediately, both officers drew their guns and aimed them at me. This was followed by the officers yelling obscenities at me and telling me "I should blow your head off for getting out of your car like that." I tried to apologize and explain my actions to the officers and was abruptly told to shut up or I would be shot. While the officer was issuing me a traffic ticket, the other officer held a flashlight and a gun pointed at my passenger. We were literally being held at gun point while I was being issued a traffic ticket. My passenger was going to light a cigarette and was told not to move his hands from his lap or he would be shot. The main thing that bothered me at that point, was that both officers were very nervous and I could actually see their hands shaking with their guns pointed at us. . . .

The next morning, I called all of the people that I could think of that might help me to get some action on this matter. My friend, Larry Bagneris (GPC President) is very political, so I called him. He referred me to (Police Chief) Lee Brown's secretary, Dora Tenorio. Larry told me that she might be able to give me some advice on what

course of action to take. Ms. Tenorio informed me that I should file a report through police internal affairs. I asked her if citizens were ever harassed upon filing these reports. She replied that it has been known to happen and that she couldn't promise me that it wouldn't happen to me. I guess that this is the reason most citizens don't file reports in situations like this one. I called another political activist, Ray Hill, and he was very helpful. He said that if I type the incident up and turn it over to him, that he would handle it from there since he is now working on a presentation for the city council dealing with police matters. My friend Jerry Vann referred me to (councilman) George Greanias' office and (aide) Kent Speer. Kent told me to go public and present myself to the mayor and the council to inquire their interpretation of proper procedure for a motorist to follow while being ticketed. Now the big question arises to myself, how public with this matter do I really want to go? Is it worth my time and possible police harassment?

My last call went to the police internal affairs department. I asked them the proper procedure to follow while being

ticketed. They said that I was not wrong to get out of my car and that my actions must have been very suspicious for the officers to draw their weapons, because that is not a common practice. I was further informed that it would be my word against that of the officers'. If they were found to be in error, they would be verbally reprimanded.


The reality of the situation is that I could have been shot over a lousy traffic ticket. I would just like to make all of you aware of the fact that there might be a few rookies and irresponsible police officers who wouldn't hesitate to shoot you for any reason, believe me. If you are ever stopped by the police, for any reason, use extreme caution. Don't get out of your car until asked to do so or make any sudden movement. As shaky as these officers were, any of us could be just another statistic for them and they wouldn't lose any sleep over it. I hope that it doesn't take another martyr for us all to realize the danger that exists in our own back yard. I am only conveying my own personal experience.

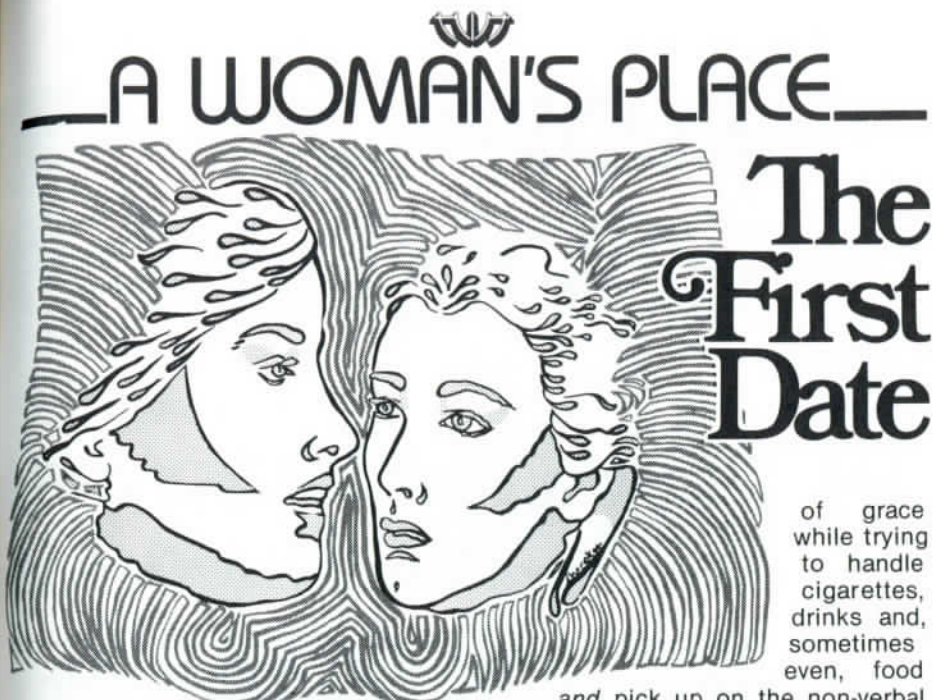

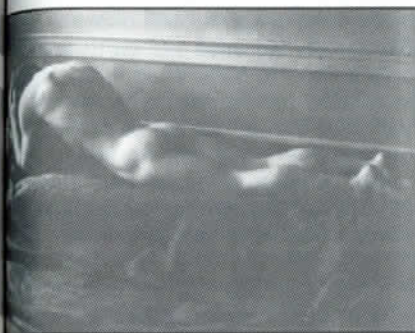

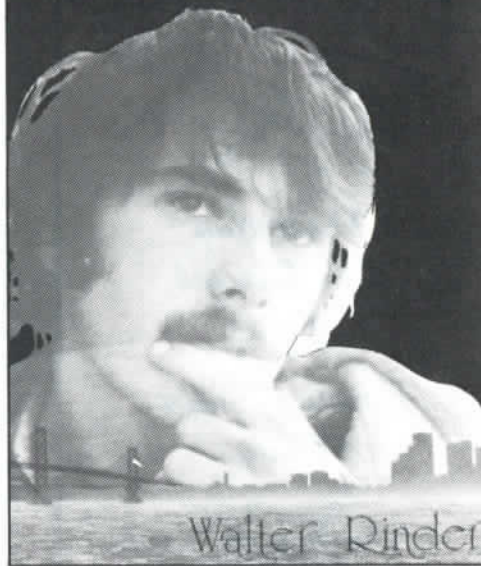

Where Will I Be
Tomorrow?



Where Will I Be Tomorrow?, by Walter Rinder; 141 pp.; Celestial Arts, 231 Adrian Road, Millbrae, California 94030; softcover, \$5.95.

Valentine's Day is usually not the day to give presents to those you love, besides of course the card, box of chocolates or roses. But for those who want to give something more substantial, something more love-enriching, consider the book *Where Will I Be Tomorrow?* by Walter Rinder.

Contained within are short essays of various lengths as well as prose poetry concerning our freedom to love, sometimes curtailed by ourselves, sometimes by society. Rinder writes of the struggle to love, to reach higher in our

awareness of beauty and love in the things, events and people around us. He writes of his own struggle to love, to raise that awareness in those he meets.

Like most visionaries, Rinder is able to conceive a world of freedom and beauty in love, inherent in natural and common things, yet far beyond the awareness of most. His words speak of confidence in his freedom to love, his determination to explore, communicate and share the love he finds there. He records his emotional struggle to conquer his own and others' barriers to the expression and sharing of love.

The prose poetry is simple yet evocative in sparking to life the reader's own feelings and capacity to love. He often speaks of this confrontation with others when he expresses his feelings

of love in terms of a war as he fights to help others release the potential for them to love. He relates to us specific events in his life where he tried this with people he cared about. Sometimes he wins, other times he loses and is mortally, emotionally hurt.

Walter Rinder is a photographer as well, and his art accompanies the verbal pictures he paints. Many are of male nudes and other scenes, and all relate to the individual story, and perhaps attempt to document the sensual side of love of which he also writes. The pictures are abundant and in harmony with his messages. A few pictures of himself are included.

His writing dynamically portrays new levels of awareness in metaphors full of impact and graphic expression. "... the earthquake of awareness upset his complacency." He uses the earth and its possessions to form images in our minds related to the naturalness and purity of love. Indeed, he writes of love, not love between men and women only, but the phenomenon of love that erupts between any two human beings who care, accept and have faith in each other.


His most touching moment may be when he states: "I have dedicated my life to awakening other people to loving each other, to care and to feel and propagate this emotion as a way of

life." And though his statements may be meant to instruct, often he simply asks questions of us to help us find the path to our own answers in the struggle to love and be loved. For we must learn to love in our own way, this is the freedom he speaks of and advocates for all.

Rinder has the ability to express the beauty and reality of love as a dynamic process, part of everyday living and existing. He reveals love in its various forms, making us more sensitive to it.

Though Rinder may have a philosophy of love, it is not formalized and crystallized into a thing of cold dogma. His love is described as alive, warm, evolving, constantly finding new lives to enrich.

Valentine's Day should be more than red cards, red roses and presents. It is an opportunity for us to be reminded of our need to give and receive love in the fullest, most complete way possible. Rinder has charted a course to this destination by his example.

One of his essays is entitled "The Courage to Love." This may be his most important message. He clearly describes the society that suppresses love, that often fights love between people. And we must have this courage to love because it is the supreme, most life-fulfilling energy and strength we have.

THE DARK SIDE OF GAY

Without a doubt, *Without A Trace* could have easily made a wonderfully in-depth TV movie, one of those deals the networks like to offer because they are reasonably risqué, yet overall parental-guidance clean. During the first half of *Trace*, I was so fooled by its tube-type flavor that I kept anticipating some strategically placed commercials. But something strange happened around mid-point. *Trace* went beyond TV standards and extended to screen size dimensions.

This is the terror tale of a little boy, aged six, who vanishes one day on his way to school. The movie's title adequately describes the kind of dilemma the cops and the boy's mother are facing. They have no leads and no sane explanations as to how an alert youngster with a healthy amount of suspicions

toward strangers could have disappeared from the streets of Brooklyn in broad daylight. What is utterly amazing is the fact that the Big Apple's police come out in full force only hours after the child is reported missing. Also, the video and print media are all over Susan, the desperate-yet-determined mother. But all the attention fades fast. Al Menetti, however, the cop in charge of the case, has a boy the same age at home. This fact does not allow him to consider this a routine investigation, even after his precinct sets other priorities. Judd Hirsch plays the detective low-key and comes across as the typical trustworthy fellow from next door and not as the stereotyped tough big city cop. Come to think of it, Mr. Hirsch, with his refreshingly average appearance, will have a hard time ever trying to escape his regular-kinda-guy image. Kate Nelligan, who was excellent in *Eye of the Needle*, is equally stunning as the mother who refuses to give up hope, even after all indications confirm

her worst fears. Ms. Nelligan, who looks a little like a young Barbara Stanwyck, successfully walks a very thin line of being adamantly strong willed and noticeably vulnerable at the same time. The viewer feels for her and admires her never-give-up attitude in which she reaches for any potential last straw, be it in the form of a psychic or a crank caller; and New York is full of those. The supporting cast, which portray less-defined characters, includes Stockard Channing as Susan's good-neighborly friend, David Dukes as her ex-husband and—it felt great to see him again—my old flame from afar, Keith McDermott, whom I had this tremendous crush on seven years ago, as he played the boy in *Equus* opposite Richard Burton on the Broadway stage.

Before I point out why *Trace* grabbed my undivided interest only half-way through the picture, let me explain: Whenever there is a newspaper article about a missing child, there is this not

altogether rational fear in the back of my gay mind that some sicko out there is trying to damage "our" reputation. Any such sex crimes, which usually get banner treatment in the press as a homosexual crime, I feel, offset a dozen positive articles covering this country's gay culture. Logically, child molestation is seen as a prime motive behind the kid's disappearance in *Trace*. It is stressed, however, that the vast majority of such acts are done by straights. I don't want to give away the plot development, but let it be said that the looming gay connection in this case is handled in a rather fair and objective manner.

Without A Trace has quite a few holes in its script, but Stanley Jaffe, who produced *Kramer vs Kramer* and *Taps*, premieres as a director with a passionate no-nonsense effort that'll grow on you as you watch. **W**

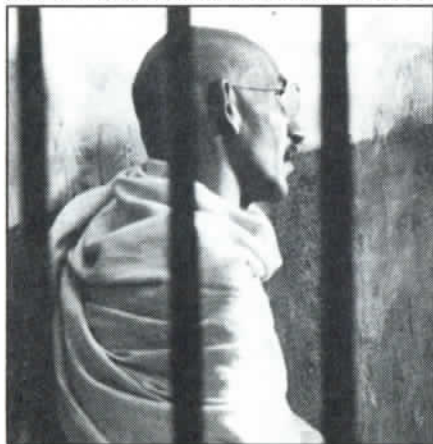

MOVIEOLA — I guess by now everyone has heard that *E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial* has surpassed *Star Wars* as the all time box office champ. *E.T.* is far from a bad movie, but frankly I don't understand why so many people are so passionate for it. Both the National Board of Review and the New York Film Critics organizations have named *Gandhi* as "Best Picture," **Ben Kingsley** (for *Gandhi*) as "Best Actor" and **Meryl Streep** (for *Sophie's Choice*) as "Best Actress." . . . Director **Milos Forman** (*One*

Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest) is currently preparing a film adaptation of the Broadway success, *Amadeus*. . . . Don't you just love "women's prison" films?

The definitive one has to be 1950's *Caged*, which starred **Eleanor Parker** (and in a supporting role, **Ellen "Grandma Walton" Corby**). Be on the lookout for a new one called *The Concrete Jungle*. Are you ready for the stars? They are **Jill St. John**, **Nita Talbot** and **Barbara Luna**. (You may remember Barbara as the child actress who sang "Dites-Moi" on the Broadway cast album of *South Pacific*.) . . . The film adaptation of **Kurt Vonnegut's** science fiction novel, *Slapstick*, starring **Jerry Lewis**(!!!), has opened "impressively" in West Germany, according to a recent article in *Variety*. This could be Lewis's year, with *Slapstick*, and his upcoming appearance in **Martin Scorsese's** *The King of Comedy*, and the rumors of a reunion with **Dean Martin**. Co-starring with Lewis in *Slapstick* are **Madeline Kahn** and the late **Marty Feldman**. . . . **Christopher Atkins** is currently working on a film called *Heaven*, in which he plays a male stripper. Directed by **John Avildsen** and scripted by **Joan Tewkesbury** (*Nashville*), the film co-stars **Lesley Ann Warren**, **Roz Kelly** and **Carrie Snodgrass**.

IN MEMORIAM — Obviously, the big Showbiz shock of the week was the untimely death of **Karen Carpenter**. She died from a heart attack on the morning of February 4 at age 32. (That should give pause to some of us in our mid-30s who are accustomed to doing all sorts of bizarre and unnatural things to our frail bodies.) Like other artists who specialized in "soft-rock," the **Carpenters** had their share of detractors: They were criticized for blandness and predictability, but they also allegedly sold some 60 million albums during their decade as chart contenders. If I remember correctly, their first big hit was a cover of the **Beatles'** "Ticket to Ride" in late 1969, and their follow-up single, **Burt Bacharach** and **Hal David's** "Close to You," was an even bigger smash and made them superstars worldwide. (If you are one of those who believe "Close to You" to be the definitive Muzak tune, I suggest you search out **Dusty Springfield's** rather bluesy rendition which appeared on her 1967 *Look of Love* album.) Other hit singles by Karen and her brother **Richard Carpenter** were "We've Only Just Begun," "For All We Know," "Rainy Days and Mondays," and their salute to golden oldies, "Yesterday Once More." That's really not a bad selection, but leave it to me to inform you of the esoteric and obscure—for my money the Carpenters' best single by far was "Calling Occupants of Interplanetary Crafts," which came out around 1978. This absolutely weird record was both an attempt to cash in on the science fiction craze and change the Carpenters' style—and it was a huge bomb!!! (I don't know a soul who remembers it.) . . . The death of a superstar should not be allowed to eclipse some other recent Showbiz deaths. **Gale Page**, a blonde actress who appeared in numerous Warner

Bros. films of the late 30s and early 40s, died January 8 at age 72. Among her films were four appearances with the three Lane sisters (**Priscilla**, **Lola** and **Rosemary**) in *Four Daughters* (1938), *Daughters Courageous* (1939), *Four Wives* (1939) and *Four Mothers* (1941). . . . **John McHugh**, a film and stage actor, died January 13 at age 69. As a child actor known as "Jack" McHugh, he performed in numerous silent and early sound films, including 17 "Our Gang" shorts; he also appeared for awhile in his own "Jack McHugh" series. By the mid-30s he had worked in nearly 300 films; later he worked mostly on the stage. . . . Character actor **Shepperd Strudwick** died January 15 at age 75. In addition to many stage appearances, he appeared in such films as *Congo Maisie* (1940), *All the Kings Men* (1949) and *A Place in the Sun* (1951), and such TV soaps as *As the World Turns* and *Another World*. . . . **Don Costa**, the prominent musician/arranger/conductor, often associated with **Frank Sinatra**, died January 19 at age 57. Aside from his long series of collaborations with Sinatra (their 3-record set *Trilogy* won much acclaim and six Grammy nominations in 1980), he allegedly discovered **Trini Lopez** and was responsible for 17 consecutive hits by **Paul Anka**.

ERRATA DEPT. — Just gotta include this! Did you happen to read the February 5 *Houston Chronicle* news story about **Karen Carpenter's** death? At the end of the article was a list of several other rock 'n' roll performers who have died over the past 25 or so years, and (get this) the list included "Florence Henderson of the Supremes." What I want to know is this: Who was babysitting with all of those *Brady Bunch* brats while Flo was out singing "baby, baby" with Diana and Mary?

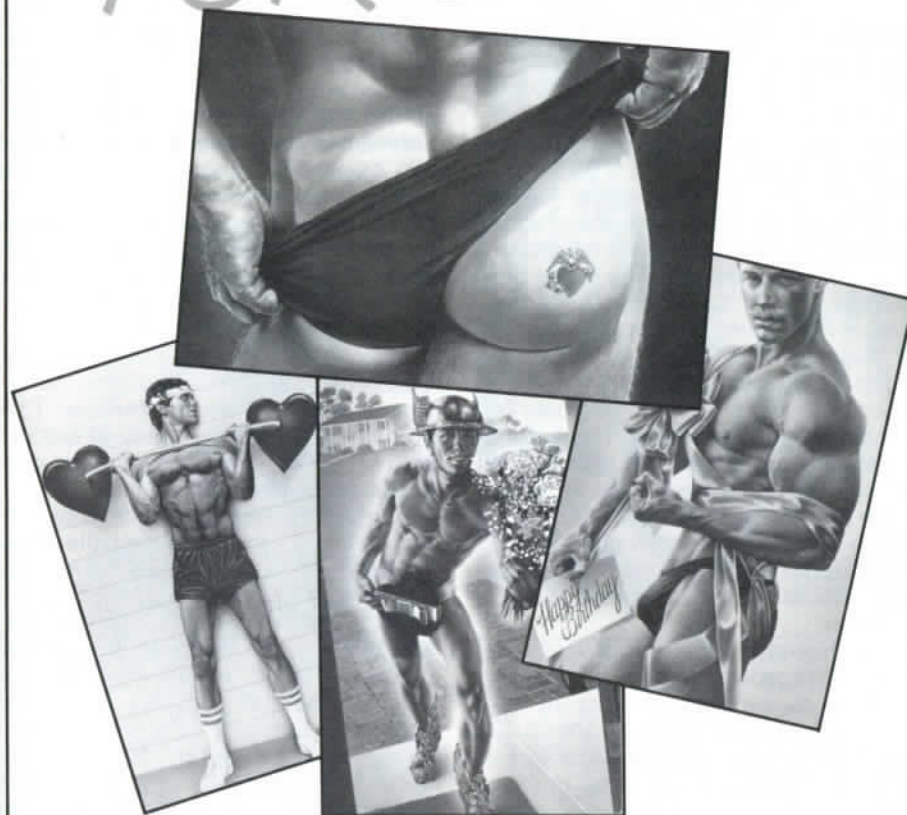

Singer/songwriter Gayle Marie, with an appeal to both lesbians and gay men, will be appearing at Kindred Spirits Sunday, February 13 and Valentine's Day, Monday, February 14.

"I am not out to move mountains, but I want to shake a few trees," said Gayle Marie, singer/songwriter, who is receiving nationwide attention for her unique, personal style which runs the gamut from jazz to pop music.

"My music is number one with me now. I am not a political activist singer. I really respect those like Holly Near whose music reflects what they are doing politically. I do care about issues that affect people. In fact, many of the concerts we do which are not held in clubs are benefits for health collectives, battered women's shelters, etc. My approach is more subtle. As people get to know me, they understand where I stand on issues without me having to say so," said Marie.

"I know it is a slow, slow rise but I want to pursue it. It's a crazy business but great," said the Ohio native. Marie utilizes careful planning and inner determination to plot her career. She is realistic but places stiff demands upon herself.

Valentine's Day, February 14, is the scheduled release date for her first album, *Nightrainbow*, which was produced on her own label, Gaylo Music. Marie selected jazz pianist Mary Watkins to produce her album.

"Mary had co-produced several albums I admired and was one of the first people I saw perform in the California Bay Area. When I saw her perform with Holly Near and heard her piano playing, I thought it was incredible. As a keyboard player, she had a feeling for what I wanted on the album."

Up until five years ago, Marie had a



successful career as a music teacher. One event changed all that for her and enabled her to make a major decision which affected her life tremendously.

"The thing that spurred me to decide dropping teaching and pursue singing as a career and to take my chances singing full-time was seeing my first women's music concert. I saw Holly Near and enjoyed hearing her experiences and seeing how bold and adventurous she was," said Marie.

Explaining her personal background, she said, "I was into music from an early age, especially from eighth grade on. I played piano for the boys church choir, appeared in high school musicals and received a vocal scholarship to Kent State University. At Kent, studying vocals, I received some opera background. Afterwards, I had a career teaching music for awhile."

How many people get to participate in a million selling record while still in high school? Well, Marie did when she played organ on the hit song by the Outsiders entitled, "Time Won't Let Me," with Capitol Records.

"I was the only girl in the band, and they would not let me perform live with them as I was the only girl. . . . It was a great opportunity for me to record for Capitol Records and get the taste of the

studio in my blood. I never did get over it and wanted to get back into the studio the minute I got out of it."

Commenting on *Nightrainbow*, she said, "It took me too many years to get back into the studio, and now I want to stay. I love recording and want to do more." Two years ago, she arranged, wrote and recorded a 45-single called "Stormy Nights," which received notable attention.

Through perseverance, Marie raised the needed funds to produce *Nightrainbow*, which will be distributed nationwide by Galaxia Women Enterprises. "Doing an independent album means you have to work twice as hard, and it means being exceptionally prepared as you cannot waste time in the studio, as time is money. For example, a new artist might receive \$100,000 to do an album for a major recording studio, while albums like mine have budgets of \$15,000-20,000," Marie said.

Continuing, she added, "By doing an independent album, you get to watch the album develop through all the processes. You get to supervise what photograph to use on the cover, what to print on the inside of the jacket, etc. I am very pleased with how the album turned out. It was what we wanted it to be."

Although her album may be found in the women's music section at record stores, Marie is quick to note that her album has universal appeal. "I think it is an album for everyone. It is a good pop record that gay men and women will like."


Marie is familiar with Houston, having played at Baja's, Club L'Amour with Gwen Avery, and most recently in concert with Lyra and Jan Martinelli at Fitzgerald's last March 16.

Her opinion of the upcoming Women's Music Festival at Kindred Spirits: "I'm excited about it and glad they are having it for a whole day. It shall be an interesting array of music from people of different backgrounds. I hope a lot of people come for the event. I think it is a great idea. Also, I think Kindred Spirits is a classy women's bar. I think



it is one thing Houston has in its favor, as most cities don't have something that nice. San Francisco is just coming around to having places like Spirits."

When asked if her album had any particular message, or if it reflected any personal philosophy, she replied, "On my album, there is a song, 'Need To Be.' It means to strive to be the best person you can be and at the same time, keeping your sense of humor. You should always keep your sense of humor and try not to let the world get you down, as it is a great place to be."

What does the future hold for Marie? She plans to continue touring to build up a following, improve her songwriting and singing, and eventually make a second album. With Marie's talent and determination, it is likely trees will be shook and even a few mountains moved.

The Origin of St. Valentine's Day

the Emperor to the Prefect of Rome, who on finding all his promises to make him renounce his faith ineffectual, commanded him to be beaten with clubs, and afterwards to be beheaded, which was done on the 14th of February about the year 270. It is obvious that there is nothing in the description to explain why he comes to be associated with our present-day celebration of the day of his death. In connection with his name, romantic love is purely accidental.

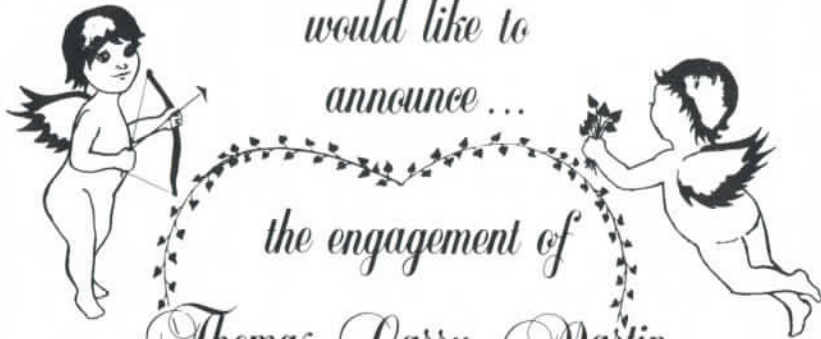

Tale of a Tub: "Left us example to do deed of charity. To feed the hungry, clothe the naked, visit the weak and sick, to entertain the poor, and give the dead a Christian funeral. These were the works of piety he did practise, and bade us imitate; not look for lovers; or handsome images to please our senses."

To look further to try to figure out how St. Valentine's Day got started, we must look to the Rome of thousands of years ago, when they celebrated a day called Lupercalia. This means "feast of Lupercus," and the Romans believed that a god named Lupercus helped protect them from wolves. Wolves were always a great danger to Rome, so Lupercus was an important god to them.

Each year, in the middle of February, the Romans had great feasts to honor their god and gave thanks to him for protecting them. At these feasts, the young men drew names of girls out of a bowl to become their partners; often they became sweethearts, too. The Romans celebrated this feast for hundreds of years, until the Christian religion came to Rome. Then, when the Romans no longer believed in such gods as Lupercus, they still recalled it as a happy time and wanted to keep it as a celebration. So they kept their holiday in the middle of February and, for some unknown reason, except for the fact St. Valentine was beheaded on February 14, they began to honor him on this day.

As time went by, this celebration spread to France and England, with feasts and dancing and games being played, and a young man still chose his partner by drawing a girl's name out of a bowl. This tradition remained the same.


In England, people believed that birds chose their mates on February 14, and so people started to look on this day as a good day for choosing their sweethearts, and when a man chose his lover on St. Valentine's Day, he called her his Valentine. On this day, also, sweethearts and lovers sent letters to

one another and they called these letters valentines, too. Then, as time went on, they began to draw little pictures on their letters, and then someone got the idea to add lace or flowers or birds, just to make the letter more beautiful.

When the English came to America, they simply brought St. Valentine's Day with them, as it was one of their favorite holidays.

In the years since then, valentines are no longer given just to one's sweethearts, but to all people we like. In fact, the simple letters that once were sent are now replaced by fancy cards of every description. Now on St. Valentine's Day, candy or flowers are given to one's sweetheart, lover or friend, to let that person know (s)he is special to the giver.

So, although St. Valentine himself had really nothing to do with this day of celebration, except having the distinction of giving up his life on this date, I think it is fitting that he at least be remembered for what he really stood for. The fact that his name is associated with this date and is now celebrated, should give us the desire to know something about him. In his way, he believed in love—the real meaning of love in giving to others and helping others in times of need. I wonder how he would feel today to see how Valentine's Day is actually remembered, using his name to celebrate with parties, games and gifts. I think, perhaps, he would be pleased to see that love is remembered, in his name, even for the one day called St. Valentine's Day. But, I think we need to also associate this day with his death and remember why he was executed.

Pope Julius I is said to have built a church near Ponte Mole to the memory of St. Valentine, and the greatest part of his relics are now in the Church of St. Praxedes. So, to St. Valentine, I say, we will celebrate February 14 with hearts and flowers, and perhaps strive during the rest of the year to emulate your example of true charity for others, as you practiced yourself, and for which you died.
