**GAY STUDENTS
ORGANIZE**

AUSTIN — On February 5, here in the Capitol City, representatives from various gay student organizations met to discuss the formation of a coalition which would unify the efforts of campus organizations across the state of Texas.

Representatives from UT's Gay Student Association, A&M's Gay Student Services, the Gay/Lesbian Association of Denton, Austin Lambda, the Gay Atheist League of America—University of Texas chapter, the Gay Academic Union of North Texas, the Austin Lesbian/Gay Political Caucus and the Rice Gay/Lesbian Support Group met and made statements on how their individual groups could contribute or benefit from the proposed umbrella organization, and decided to name it the Texas Gay/Lesbian Students Organizations Coalition.

"It was also decided that each group would appoint, in a manner seen fit by their own group, one male and one female representative who would attend any meetings of the coalition," spokesperson Jay Cherin informed TWT NEWS.

That same evening, the Gay Students' Association held a reception to honor the new organization. Harry Wingfield, an Austin singer and songwriter of men's music, and Leo Lerma, an actor who is preparing a one-man

show on Tallulah Bankhead, entertained those in attendance with examples of their work.

The next day, the representatives reconvened for further discussion. Proposals were made to be included in the constitution, and future events each group was planning.

The next meeting, scheduled for April 9, is to be held in College Station, sponsored by Gay Student Services. If any organization is interested in involvement in the coalition, write Box 275, Texas Union, Austin 78712, or call Cherin at (512) 441-3678, TWT NEWS was told.

**DALLAS POLICE
WON'T HIRE GAYS**

DALLAS — When this city's citizens learned last week that the Houston Police Department would no longer discriminate against the hiring of homosexuals as police officers, they quickly responded. Gay citizens wondered why their progressive Police Department had not done as the infamous, hard-handed HPD had done.

Houston's non-discrimination policy was enacted recently in response to the favorable decision by the court to rescind Texas Penal Code Section 21.06. By that decision, gays were no longer lawbreakers.

Non-gay citizens in Dallas were angered and voiced their sentiments that DPD should hold the line and not hire gays.

The *Dallas Morning News* echoed this conservative viewpoint in a February 11 editorial, by exclaiming, "City officials should not change current policies of the Dallas Police Department that prohibit homosexuals from serving as officers on the force."

"Since taking office last year, Chief Prince has made positive strides to ease communication problems that

have existed between the police and the gay community," the commentary continued.

"Homosexual groups should continue to work with the chief to assure fair police treatment of gays rather than pressing him into a corner on the hiring issue," was its conclusion.

The Dallas Gay Alliance (DGA) was outraged over the editorial. President Mike Stewart called it "offensive, incorrect and counterproductive to effective communications between the city of Dallas and the gay community."

When mayoral candidate Starke Taylor lashed out on February 10, Stewart told TWT NEWS that his comments were "offensive not only to gay women and men, but to all minority citizens of Dallas.

"They are certainly contradictory to statements made by Mr. Taylor during a meeting I had with him recently," Stewart explained.

"Mr. Taylor had requested a meeting with representatives of DGA. I was confident that he would honestly and fairly consider the issues that affect the more than 100,000 gay citizens of Dallas.

"Apparently, Mr. Taylor has chosen to ignore the concerns of a major constituency in Dallas," he added. "That is truly unfortunate," Stewart noted in conclusion.

GSS OF A&M ACTIVATED

COLLEGE STATION — Gay Student Services (GSS) has informed TWT NEWS that Hart Prochazka was elected president of the organization at its January 26 election of officers. Eric Graham was elected as vice president.

In order to help GSS in its lawsuit against Texas A&M University for recognition as a legitimate student organization, a benefit is scheduled for next Friday, February 25 at Fantasy Disco on College Ave.

Also, at a recent press conference for GSS, Texas Human Rights Foundation president, M. Robert Schwab, en-

couraged the organization "to proceed with patience and perseverance in your court case."

In the future, there are plans for a speakers' seminar, a spring picnic and the formation of a Montrose Hometown Club for the former students in Houston, David Gary of TWT NEWS reported.

Interested parties should contact GSS. The next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, February 23 at the College Station Community Center.

DOUBLE HOMICIDE NEAR TOMBALL FARM

HOUSTON — In the early morning hours of Saturday, January 15, Lee Walton Leslie, 70, and Raymond L. Mitchell, 57, were stabbed to death in separate bedrooms by two assailants in Leslie's farm home about six miles north of Tomball in Montgomery County. The time of death appeared to be between 3:00 and 4:00am, after a neighbor reported hearing a loud conversation in the front yard of the home between 1:00 and 3:00am, David Fields of TWT NEWS learned.

The Montgomery County investigation noted the discovery of Leslie's automobile, found parked in the Montrose area on February 7. Investigating officers told TWT NEWS that since they believed the murderers returned to Houston, the investigation is now centered here.

Montgomery County Sheriff's Department officers, Det. Sgt. Charlie Burks and Det. Sgt. Jim Hall, met with Houston Human Rights League president, Ray Hill, and others, to discuss the case with TWT NEWS in an effort to ob-

An open letter to the gay community on hepatitis B

Hepatitis B, a serious disease, may be sexually transmitted

Sexually transmitted diseases among the gay community are epidemic. Herpes has recently received a lot of attention; gonorrhea and syphilis are well known; but the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recently issued a major recommendation for the prevention of another sexually transmitted disease: Hepatitis B. In their *Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report*, the CDC stated: "Susceptible homosexually active males should be vaccinated [against hepatitis B] regardless of their age or duration of their homosexual practices."

Gay men are at a high risk of contracting hepatitis B

In one study, from 51% to 76% of 3,816 gay men seen in five sexually transmitted disease clinics had evidence of past or present hepatitis B infection. Once infected, there's a 6% to 10% chance of becoming a carrier—capable of passing on the virus. The CDC estimated there are nearly 1 million carriers in the United States and that 100,000 of these carriers are gay men.

The hepatitis B virus can be passed on by contact with contaminated body fluids

such as saliva, urine, semen, and blood. The hepatitis B virus can be transmitted through tiny breaks in the skin or contact with mucous membranes. This can occur during intimate sexual contact and can lead to hepatitis B for the partner of an infected person. Although most patients recover and over half contracting hepatitis B do not get symptoms, there is no specific treatment and no known cure for hepatitis B infections.

Hepatitis B may lead to even more serious complications

For those who do get symptoms of hepatitis B, a mild

or severe "flu-like" sickness may continue for weeks or months. Ten percent of all infections become long lasting (chronic) with potential complications that are sometimes more serious than those of other sexually transmitted diseases. The serious complications include the chronic carrier state, chronic active hepatitis, chronic persistent hepatitis, cirrhosis, and even cancer of the liver. Every year almost 4,000 carriers die of cirrhosis. In addition, carriers have a risk 273 times greater than that of the general population of contracting a usually fatal form of liver cancer.

Now this serious sexually transmitted disease is usually preventable by vaccination with the new hepatitis B vaccine

After more than a decade of research and development, a new vaccine is available for prevention, *not treatment*, of hepatitis B. In clinical studies, the vaccine was highly effective in preventing hepatitis B infection and was generally well tolerated. No serious adverse reactions occurred in these studies.

The vaccination regimen consists of a series of three injections, the first two a month apart and the third, six months after the first. To be effective, the vaccine must be given before a person gets hepatitis B. The vaccine helps prevent the disease. It is *not effective as a treatment*. We suggest that you consult your doctor to determine if you should be vaccinated.

Why you should consult your doctor or clinic

The vaccine helps protect against infection caused by hepatitis B virus. This virus is an important cause of viral hepatitis, a disease mainly of the liver. Even mild forms of this disease may lead to serious complications and aftereffects, including liver cancer. There is no specific treatment for viral hepatitis.

Vaccination is recommended for persons who have a higher risk of becoming infected with hepatitis B virus because of frequent, close contact with infected people or exposure to body fluids from such people. It will not protect against hepatitis caused by viruses other than hepatitis B virus.

No serious adverse reactions were reported in over 6,000 individuals receiving the vaccine in clinical trials. The most frequent reaction was soreness at the point of injection; less

common local reactions included redness, swelling, warmth, or formation of a hard, lumplike spot. The local effects were usually mild and lasted no more than 2 days after vaccination. Occasionally, low-grade fever (less than 101 °F) occurred. When it did, it usually lasted no longer than 48 hours following vaccination. In rare cases, fever over 102 °F was reported.

More generalized complaints including malaise, fatigue, headache, nausea, dizziness, muscle pain, and joint pain were reported infrequently. Rash was reported rarely. As with any vaccine, broad use may reveal additional adverse reactions.

Your doctor or clinic knows what special care must be taken when administering the vaccine and in determining who should receive the vaccine. The vaccine is not intended for persons who are allergic to any of its components.

tain whatever information the community might have concerning the incident. "This is one of those cases where information is going to be the key thing," Burks asserted.

"It is not . . . just a typical [killing]. I don't think it was a spur of the moment-type situation," Hall told TWT NEWS. "[The killers' attitude was] 'let's wait till we get to the country . . . and then kill them.'"

The bodies were found by Leslie's nephew late Saturday afternoon. Nothing had been stolen from the home, situated near a lake. Ironically, Mitchell had come to see Leslie from New Orleans on January 8 to receive consolation from him concerning the violent murder of a mutual friend, who had also been in the Merchant Marines. The friend had been murdered during or after sex with the murderer(s). It is believed Mitchell and Leslie were killed in the same manner.

Mitchell often frequented several Montrose clubs and restaurants. It is supposed that before Leslie and Mitchell left for Tomball Friday night, they stopped to eat or to get gasoline. Leslie's car, a red 4-door '78 Pontiac, license RJV-992, was apparently used to return the murderers to Houston.

"AIDS Update 1983" will take place next Tuesday evening, February 22 at the Sheraton Houston Hotel, 777 Polk St., Kaposi's Sarcoma Committee's Craig Rowland informed TWT NEWS. Dr. Peter W.A. ORAL ARGUMENTS IN NATURALIZATION SET

HOUSTON — TWT NEWS has learned that the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals has scheduled oral arguments for the week of March 21 on the appeal of Richard Longstaff from a federal district decision denying his petition for naturalization. This will be the second time that the Court has heard the case.

Longstaff, owner of the Union Jack clothing stores in Houston and Dallas, applied for naturalization in 1975. In 1977, an Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) Examiner recommended that Longstaff's petition be denied due

to his homosexuality. That recommendation was subsequently reversed. In March 1979, Longstaff's petition was denied by Judge Estes. The Court record was unclear as to the exact reason for the denial. In December 1980, the Fifth Circuit Court remanded the case back to the trial court to determine if Longstaff had violated the Texas Homosexual Conduct Statute (Penal Code Section 21.06), and if he had violated that statute, whether this could serve as a bar to Longstaff proving he was of a good moral character, which is a requirement for naturalization.

Judge Estes again heard the case in early 1982. He found that Longstaff had violated 21.06 and that such violation was a bar to his proving that he was of good moral character. In addition, the trial court judge determined that Longstaff had entered the country illegally in that he had failed to indicate on the visa application, submitted in 1965, that he suffered from "psychopathic personality," to wit: that he was gay.

Despite what you might have read elsewhere about changes in immigration law and policy, a person seeking to enter the U.S.—other than on a short-term visa—is still asked whether that person "suffers from sexual deviancy."

Should anyone respond yes, the visa is denied. Should one respond no, the person then has entered the U.S. illegally. Schwab clarified the dilemma.

"I have never been arrested or convicted of a crime," Longstaff said. "My application for citizenship had been denied solely for the reason that I am a gay person. I am outraged, not so much personally as for the slur that casts on all gay people."

M. Robert Schwab, president of the Texas Human Rights Foundation (THRF), which has sponsored this challenge, explained to TWT NEWS, "Judge Estes' decision is clearly erroneous. In an almost identical fact situation, the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals decided in *In Re Nemitiz*, that it was unconstitutional to deny a person naturalization solely on the basis of the fact of being gay.

HOMOSEXUALITY

Social, Psychological, and Biological Issues

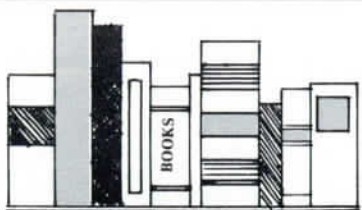
Homosexuality: Social, Psychological, and Biological Issues, edited by William Paul, James D. Weinrich, John C. Gonsiorek, Mary E. Hotvedt; references, indexes; SAGE Publications, Inc., 275 South Beverly Drive, Beverly Hills, California 90212; hardcover, \$29.95.

Various studies of homosexual psychology have been reviewed in this space, as well as studies discussing social issues of homosexuality; but *Homosexuality: Social, Psychological, and Biological Issues* takes a multi-disciplinary approach to the topic with an emphasis on homosexuality as a social issue first, then as a psychological and biological issue. Psychologists, psychoanalysts and psychiatrists are subtly and unconsciously prejudiced by popular misinformation and tend to fill

fill their own preconceived prophecies in the course of their research or practice.

This book is the published report of the Task Force on Sexual Orientation to the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues (SPSSI), a division of the American Psychological Association. The scope of the essays inside is staggering and will serve well the many people involved in the debate and resolution of this social issue. From the personal level to the political, from the social level to the institutional, legislators, doctors, lawyers, political leaders of the majority (as well as the minority), and everyone at the points of conflict between society's oppression and an individual's capacity to love, would benefit from the new perspectives contained within.

This comprehensive statement covers analyses of the hidden irrational beliefs and myths that support the accusations, the religious right's rhetoric and Administration policies that oppress and cloud the open debate vital to the health of the homosexual minority. The propaganda war that has escalated against gays and non-gays alike who advocate openness and enlightenment is examined, its parts and strategies charted, to aid in the clear, rational discussion of these various aspects of freedom to associate, to speak, to love whom one wants.

"Understanding homosexuals as *people* is a key to reducing stigma against them [gays]... This increase in visibility [over the last ten years] appears to have had a positive effect, both on the arguments expressed in public and on people's gut-level feelings," writes William Paul, which bolsters the feeling that coming out is the best way to combat the propaganda efforts of the majority.

The book is divided into six sections: Introduction; Mental Health; Biology; Life Adaptations; Social and Cultural Issues; and Conclusions. The essays are written for the lay person but deals with issues each profession confronts every day. Spurious psychological and biological theories and treatments are disproven. The methods and assump-

tions (culturally based) behind them are exposed, leaving us with the conclusion that many mental health institutions and administrators are co-opted by the majority rule to oppress and sustain conditions for homosexuals that prove the majority's theories.

One contributing writer, Eli Coleman, supplies us with a developmental model of the coming-out process to facilitate the transition to a healthier, freer life. Lesbian issues, independence, motherhood, relationships are all given full discussion in the Life Adaptations section, edited by Mary Hotvedt. In the Biological section, alongside a discussion of a genetic basis of homosexuality is a primer on genetics to enable the reader to supplement his/her understanding of the material.

Though there may be a small amount of repetition in stating the myths of homosexuality, they are looked at, evaluated and disproved from different perspectives. The book may serve better as a reference work in debate or communication on social issues, but for a current understanding of the anti-gay forces rallying against freedom of thought, for an awareness of their tactics and strengths (propaganda and ignorance), this collection of essays is vital to the success of the gay movement.

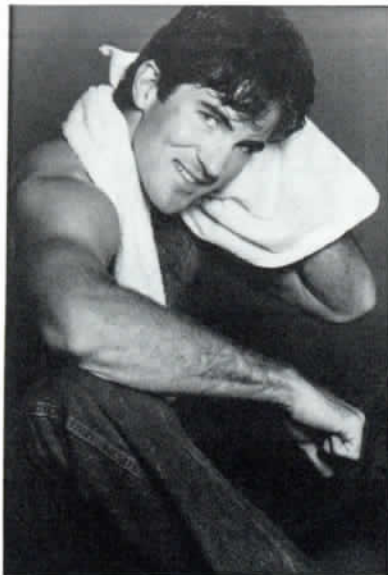

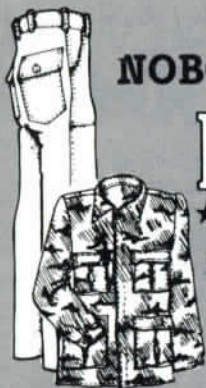

Frances, a film by Graeme Clifford starring Jessica Lange, aims for gritty

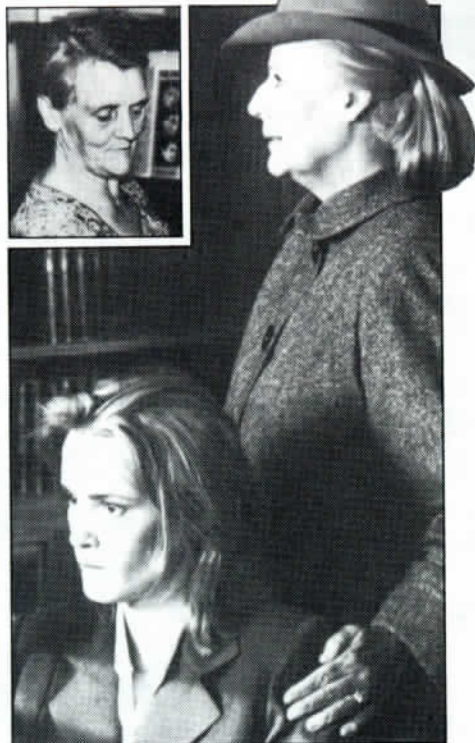
realism in its story about Frances Farmer, an iconoclastic actress of the 1930s who was in and out of jails and mental institutions for a large part of her life. The film packs a tremendous wallop, yet rarely gives a viewer room to breathe. The cinematography by Laszlo Kovacs heats everything up in vivid, ecstatic colors; it's all about as subtle as a hammer on glass, and you come out of the theater feeling not only exhausted, but also black and blue. The director obviously was moved by the Frances Farmer story—she eventually had an unsolicited lobotomy

which left her "cured" of violent "tendencies" and a calm vegetable—and wanted an audience to share his shock and disbelief at her forced incarcerations. Yet Clifford's desire for an emphatic response causes disunity between subject and narrative. He presents "enough" about Frances Farmer so that we can identify with her, although we're constantly filling in the blanks that Clifford leaves. The overall film, however, is a *total* blank. *Frances* is, ultimately, a gossipy, old-fashioned film. I felt a little angry that the movie—which points an accusatory finger at the shameless exploitation of Frances Farmer—is itself guilty of exploitation in the worst possible way.

Frances Farmer's life still remains enigmatic. Her "autobiography" is an unreliable document, crudely ghost-written by a friend, Jean Radcliffe (who dedicated the book to herself). *Will There Really Be A Tomorrow?* is a book full of inaccuracies, falsifications and outright lies as well as an almost pathological fear of lesbianism. It's a true pot-boiler. These errors are highlighted in the biography, *Shadowland*. The author gives details about Farmer's

feuds with studio heads, associates, hospital owners and parents, and explains the outcome of her lobotomy (long suppressed) by a noted surgeon who maintained it was "necessary" and useful, even though it was performed without her consent. The film seems to borrow heavily, at least in tone, from the autobiography. We see Farmer's mother, well-played by Kim Stanley in a thankless role, as a dominating monster, a one-sided portrait which is expanded in *Shadowland*.

The real accomplishment in *Frances* comes from Jessica Lange. She's in top form. Handsome, erotically-charged, full of bravura, Lange keeps our interest. We want to learn more about her character each time she appears. *Frances* isn't an awful movie, but it is a false one. Clifford tries for realism and freshness and the "truth," yet falls back on handy clichés. It's a gossip columnist's version of a film. **W**

CHINESE RIDDLE

Chan is Missing is a refreshingly simple film. Or is it? This charming black-and-white film was made in San Francisco with an all Chinese-American cast for less than \$20,000. Director Wayne Wang uses an uncluttered "cinema verite" approach to tell the story of two Chinese-American cab drivers who are looking for a missing business partner and \$4,000 they entrusted to him. The more clues the two men unearth, the more puzzling the mystery becomes.

Chan is Missing is a film reduced to the basic elements. Images are as important as dialogue. The acting is very natural, creating a documentary effect. The camera is hand-held and the film is grainy; but the questions raised are serious and profound, although the tone of the film is definitely light-hearted. *Chan is Missing* is a film of contradictions, an illustration of the Chinese philosophy of Yin and Yang.

The plot revolves around two likeable characters, Steve and Jo. Both men destroy the stereotypes of Chinese-Americans that Hollywood has used since the first silent movie flickered in barnyard theaters. Remember Charlie Chan?

Jo is a middle-aged immigrant from

Taiwan who has established himself successfully in American culture, yet he still retains many of the qualities of his native culture. He finds himself having to consciously "think Chinese" to solve a peculiarly Chinese mystery. Steve is a young man born and raised in Chinatown of immigrant parents. He is just another American city kid, a cross between Richard Pryor and Charlie Chan's Number One Son.

As Steve and Jo try to find Chan, they discover that the facts don't always lead to the truth. Jo realizes what his American-born partner does not: The unseen tells us as much as what is seen.

Director Wang uses this theme of contradiction—of something being the opposite of what it seems—to create a delightful comedy that shows a part of America that has seldom, if ever, been portrayed before.

Chan is Missing is filled with one great moment followed by another. There is the cook at the Golden Dragon Restaurant who chainsmokes, wears a t-shirt that says "Samurai Night Fever" and sings "Fry Me To the Moon" (sic). But some of the most moving images come from the director randomly filming Chinatown and its myriad peoples and cultures.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Who outcons whom, and who is the greatest con-artist of them all? Those were the questions raised by *The Sting*, the ingeniously entertaining original made in 1973. Why people decided to wait ten years before they came up with part two beats me, and it makes me wonder if we'll soon encounter other delayed sequels of one-time smashes, for instance *The Graduate II*, *Another Network* or *Two Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest*. *The Sting II*, of course, has nothing whatsoever to do with its popular predecessor; all the honorable moviemakers had in mind was to cash in on its name recognition.

This time, Jackie Gleason and Mac Davis are playing the leads, as if to eliminate off hand any possible connection reminiscent of the marvelous team of Newman and Redford. The son of Sting plays in New York of 1940 and centers around the schemes and scams of some mediocre and some big-time underworld figures. One of the good crooks is Jackie Gleason, who sends a cable to his friend, Mac Davis, inviting him to stop by at his new "big house with a yard" in Florida, which turns out to be the local slammer. From there, they start plotting new semi-

intelligent and not-so-terribly-funny ways to generate cash. The nasty mobsters are led by Karl "Don't Leave Home Without It" Malden and Oliver Reed. Teri Garr looks good in blonde and manages to beat Mr. Davis with his pickpocketing routines more than once. None of the roles offer major challenges to any of the players. Mr. Gleason—surprise, surprise—is not quite as overbearing as usual; and Mr. Davis doesn't seem sure which category he would like to fit into, whether underworld underdog, slapstick sidekick or romantic hero.

The movie's culminating sequence is a boxing match which prompts all the thugs to engage in high-stakes gambling. Mr. Davis, as one of the fighters, displays a rather unorthodox style in the ring; Sly Stallone should take notes in case he runs out of new throws and punches to be choreographed for *Rocky IV* or *V*. The music by Lalo Schifrin is a second-rate imitation of the classic ragtime tunes by Scott Joplin. If I were a gambler like all the folks in this film, I would consider it a super-safe bet to assume that the twists and turns of *The Sting II* are not tricky or inventive enough to keep this con affair afloat. **w**

TWT GOES TO A FILM FESTIVAL AND MEETS MAMIE VAN DOREN

Several TWT staffers, including Blase DiStefano, Weldon Grahame and myself, attended various functions and festivities held during the recent week-end-long Texas Film Society Achievement Awards and Movie/Video Expo where, on the final night of the festival, the newly created "Yellow Rose" awards were presented to actresses **Joan Bennett**, **Luise Rainer**, and **Ruby Keeler**, actor **Paul Henried** (who was looking rather fit considering all those cigarettes he had to light for **Bette Davis**), and director **Mervyn LeRoy**.

At the awards dinner, Blase DiStefano sat with, among others, former *Starsky and Hutch* star **David Soul** and his wife **Patty**. Soul, currently starring in a TV series adaptation of *Casablanca*, was in town to present the "Yellow Rose" to **Paul Henried**, star of the original 1942 film classic on which the new series is based. Although Soul was busily preparing for his speech, he was able to take time out to hear

I had a chance to say hello to **Kathryn Grayson** and former *Gilligan's Islander* **Natalie Schafer** (she played the scatter-brained Mrs. Howell), but the highlight of the weekend for me was meeting **Mamie Van Doren**. I found her to be witty, down-to-Earth and apparently as interested in browsing through the movie memorabilia as some of us gushing fans.

(How about if I segue from those remarks into a **SHOWBIZ** mini-biography of Van Doren who, incidentally, looks terrific these days.)

She broke into "B" films in the early fifties, and by the end of the decade she was a prime contender in the Anything-**Marilyn Monroe**-Can-Do—*I-Can-Do-Better* sweepstakes, which provided her with such competition as **Jayne Mansfield**, **Barbara Nichols**, **Diana Dors** (Britain's Marilyn), **Anita Ekberg**, and **Sheree North**, among others. Mamie probably came in second to Mansfield, but, in my uncalled-for opinion, Mamie had a far more interesting screen presence (and it also didn't hurt that she was one of the most beautiful

of all the Hollywood blondes). She made one "A" film, 1958's *Teacher's Pet*, which starred **Clark Gable** and **Doris Day**, but she was a lot more fun in the steamy Bs, which were her forte.

When was the last time you saw:

High School Confidential (1958)—in which Mamie, wearing a skin-tight bathrobe, tempts **Russ Tamblyn** with an apple.

Girls Town (1959)—in which Mamie is thrown into reform school and makes friends with some nuns.

Sex Kittens Go to College (1960)—in which Mamie, playing a stripper, is inadvertently made head of a college science department. (**Tuesday Weld** was also on campus, along with **Mijanou Bardot**, a sister of you-know-who).

The Private Lives of Adam and Eve (1960)—in which Mamie gets on a bus and dreams about Genesis. (It must have been a nightmare—**Martin Milner** played Adam and **Mickey Rooney** played the Devil). Again, **Tuesday Weld** was somehow involved.

Mamie never got nominated for an Oscar (Weldon Grahame refers to this oversight as "a Hollywood travesty"), but she proved particularly adept at grabbing headlines. In 1963 she made the papers when she offered to strip-tease in order to raise funds for the GOP. While she continued working in low-budget films such as *Three Nuts in Search of a Bolt* (1964) and *The Navy vs. the Night Monsters* (1966), she was also involved in well-publicized romances with such athletes as **Jack Dempsey**, **Bo Belinsky**, and **Tony Conigliaro**. Later, she even dated **Henry Kissinger**.

In recent years she has worked on the stage and, finally leaving the limelight, she became involved in selling antiques. However, she may be on the verge of a comeback of sorts. She has an idea for a book about Vietnam, tentatively titled *Remember Me From Crying Tree*, and has been talking with publishers about it.

Mamie Van Doren was once involved in a business which used women for their physical attributes and for little

else. I, for one, hope she has success with her book, but since she is still gorgeous at age 50, I'd like to see her back on the screen. Attention script-writers: let's find Mamie a vehicle which calls for blonde hair, shapely figure, and intelligence.

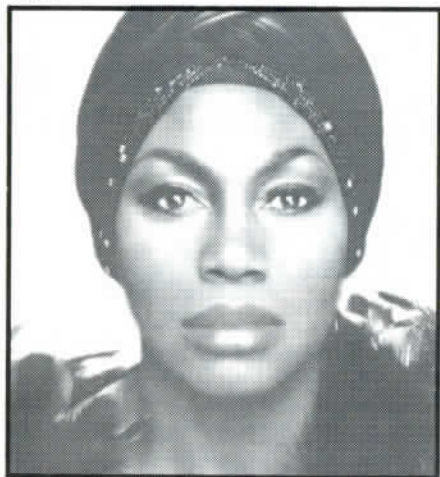

Oh, by the way, Mr. Simpson's birthday was this past week: **HAPPY BIRTHDAY, JOHN.**

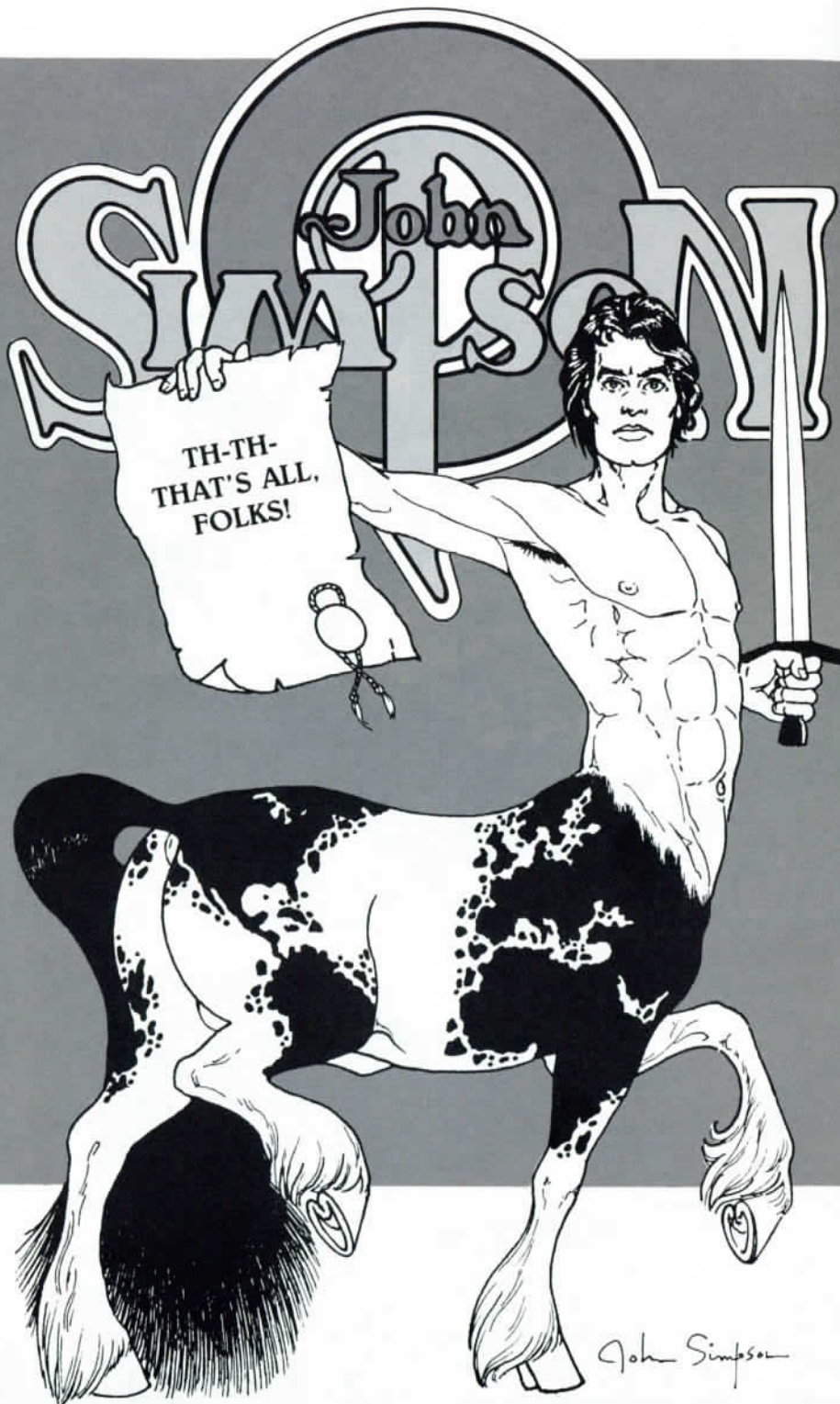
