





GAYS OFFICIALLY RECOGNIZED

HOUSTON — "It was the result of a lot of work and an open attitude in the Democratic Party leadership; it was an exciting moment for those of us there," were the first comments from a jubilant Lee Harrington concerning Democratic Party action at its February 1983 winter meeting in Washington, D.C. The action gave official status to a gay caucus, Harrington, local gay activist and immediate past president of the Houston Gay Political Caucus (GPC), explained to TWT NEWS. Harrington had lobbied for and witnessed the official sanctioning at the meeting.

While noting that 10% of Democratic National Committee (DNC) members must agree before a new caucus can be considered, Harrington stated, "After we had 20%, from 23 states, we stopped. I was particularly pleased that in numbers of signatures, my home state of Texas produced the second highest," he said. "California had one more, but their percentage of possible signatures was much lower.

"Al Calkin of Dallas and Scottie Scott of Austin really helped in Texas," he added.

We have cornered, at one time or another over the last two years, nearly every member of the DNC, from chairman Manatt on down," he summarized.

The tone was set when, in the DNC's keynote address, Senator Edward Kennedy declared, "We can not and we will not, in this country, allow discrimination because of a person's race or their religion or their age . . . or their sexual orientation."

"The benefits from official Party recognition are many," Harrington continued. "The prestige and political clout—everything from inclusion on hotel and convention center Democratic Party function lists, to committee positions—all that comes with it is important, but the more practical benefits are inclusion in and access to the entire Party communications network.

"The DNC office in Washington will perform almost as our GPC office, providing everything from limited secretarial service to direct mail service. The power structure of 374 DNC members and almost four thousand 1984 convention delegates will now get routine notice of our activities," he related.

"In essence, they will be hearing, officially and regularly, that we're here to stay, and now they'll even be paying for the postage to hear it," Harrington concluded.

AUSTIN BANS GAY DONORS

AUSTIN — Two private plasma centers in the Capitol City have joined several Houston and Dallas blood plasma centers in banning gay blood donors. The temporary ban has surfaced to guard against the spread of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS), which is believed to be transmitted through human blood.

After several cases of AIDS were reported among hemophiliacs who required regular blood transfusions, the National Hemophilia Foundation called for a ban on blood donations from gay men, who have been found highly susceptible to AIDS.

NEW PATIO BAR NOW OPEN WED., FRI., SAT. & SUN. TWT NEWS first learned of a temporary ban on gay blood donors in December 1982 when several Houston centers restricted gays from donating blood. The following month, several Dallas plasma centers followed suit.

The Austin Plasma Center at 2800 Guadalupe and the Austin Blood Components, 510 W. 29th, said they had been requested by the companies they sell plasma to, to enact new donor screening policies.

The Texas Regional Blood Center, 4300 North Lamar, said, however, they will "take a wait-and-see attitude until more medical research is completed on the connection between homosexuals director Janice Atkinson told the Austin American Statesman.

Austin's gay activist, Troy Stokes, said the new procedures won't guarantee that all gays won't be barred from selling their blood to the centers.

"I don't see what compels anyone to be truthful in those declarations," Stokes said. "From what I can see, the people who hang around 29th and Guadalupe are pretty desperate people."

"DON'T GET BLOOD ON MY AMBULANCE"

HOUSTON — The ending to this true story is unbelievable. It is one that Marvin "Chicken Ranch" Zindler of KTRK-TV in this city has already started to investigate, TWT NEWS has learned.

At about 1:00am Saturday, February 12, Daniel Cornelison, early 20s, of Southwest Houston, was leaving a Westheimer club. After walking north on Mason past Avondale to return to his parked car, he was rushed from behind by two hispanics while opening the car door. He was shoved into the car and stabbed in the calf of his left leg, severing a nerve.

His assailants then robbed him of a gold ring, gold chain, Seiko watch and \$25. Startled and trying to fight back, Cornelison was then stabbed above the forehead. His assailants then stabbed for his throat but missed, knocking out

a tooth and cutting his lip.

Screaming for help, Cornelison fell to the street as his attackers fled. Fortunately, an employee of Dirty Sally's found him after about five minutes, bandaged him and called for an ambulance

When ambulance R-60 arrived on the scene, and Cornelison was placed inside, one of the paramedics shouted, "You're getting blood all over our ambulance!"

The victim tried to explain that he couldn't help it, that he was bleeding from his head, mouth and leg. His plea went unanswered as he was removed from the ambulance.

Much to the shock of witnesses, the ambulance then drove off without Cornelison.

Zindler's initial investigation revealed that the ambulance driver had denied the charge, explaining that Cornelison was in such a state of shock that he was unmanageable. Cornelison, however, said he was "sticking to my story for Marvin."

Cornelison was last in Twelve Oaks Hospital in guarded condition awaiting plastic surgery, David Gary of TWT NEWS reported.

An open letter to the gay community on hepatitis B

Hepatitis B, a serious disease, may be sexually transmitted

Sexually transmitted diseases among the gay community are epidemic. Herpes has recently received a lot of attention; gonorrhea and syphilis are well known; but the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recently issued a major recommendation for the prevention of another sexually transmitted disease: Hepatitis B. In their Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, the CDC stated: "Susceptible homosexually active males should be vaccinated [against hepatitis B] regardless of their age or duration of their homosexual practices."

Gay men are at a high risk of contracting hepatitis B

In one study, from 51% to 76% of 3,816 gay men seen in five sexually transmitted disease clinics had evidence of past or present hepatitis B infection. Once infected, there's a 6% to 10% chance of becoming a carrier—capable of passing on the virus. The CDC estimated there are nearly 1 million carriers in the United States and that 100,000 of these carriers are gay men.

The hepatitis B virus can be passed on by contact with contaminated body fluids

such as saliva, urine, semen, and blood. The hepatitis B virus can be transmitted through tiny breaks in the skin or contact with mucous membranes. This can occur during intimate sexual contact and can lead to hepatitis B for the partner of an infected person. Although most patients recover and over half contracting hepatitis B do not get symptoms, there is no specific treatment and no known cure for hepatitis B infections.

Hepatitis B may lead to even more serious complications

For those who do get symptoms of hepatitis B, a mild

or severe "flu-like" sickness may continue for weeks or months. Ten percent of all infections become long lasting (chronic) with potential complications that are sometimes more serious than those of other sexually transmitted diseases. The serious complications include the chronic carrier state, chronic active hepatitis, chronic persistent hepatitis, cirrhosis, and even cancer of the liver. Every year almost 4,000 carriers die of cirrhosis. In addition, carriers have a risk 273 times greater than that of the general population of contracting a usually fatal form of liver cancer.

Now this serious sexually transmitted disease is usually preventable by vaccination with the new hepatitis B vaccine

After more than a decade of research and development, a new vaccine is available for prevention, not treatment, of hepatitis B. In clinical studies, the vaccine was highly effective in preventing hepatitis B infection and was generally well tolerated. No serious adverse reactions occurred in these studies.

The vaccination regimen consists of a series of three injections, the first two a month apart and the third, six months after the first. To be effective, the vaccine must be given before a person gets hepatitis B. The vaccine helps prevent the disease: It is not effective as a treatment. We suggest that you consult your doctor to determine if you should be vaccinated.

Why you should consult your doctor or clinic

The vaccine helps protect against infection caused by hepatitis B virus. This virus is an important cause of viral hepatitis, a disease mainly of the liver. Even mild forms of this disease may lead to serious complications and aftereffects, including liver cancer. There is no specific treatment for viral hepatitis. Vaccination is recommended for persons who have a

higher risk of becoming infected with hepatitis B virus because of frequent, close contact with infected people or exposure to body fluids from such people. It will not protect against hepatitis caused by viruses other than hepatitis B virus

No serious adverse reactions were reported in over 6,000 individuals receiving the vaccine in clinical trials. The most frequent reaction was soreness at the point of injection; less

common local reactions included redness, swelling, warmth, or formation of a hard, lumphike spot. The local effects were usually mild and lasted no more than 2 days after vaccination, Occasionally, low-grade fever (less than 101°F) occurred. When it did. it usually lasted no longer than 48 hours following vaccination. In rare cases, fever over 102 °F was reported.

More generalized complaints including malaise, fatigue, headache, nausea, dizziness, muscle pain, and joint pain were reported intrequently. Rash was reported rarely. As with any vaccine, broad use may reveal additional adverse reactions

Your doctor or clinic knows what special care must be taken when administering the vaccine and in determining who should receive the vaccine. The vaccine is not intended for persons who are allergic to any of its components.

It seems probable that there are already gays on the police force in Dallas, TWT NEWS has opined, since being told repeatedly that there are 25-30 gays on the Houston police force.

Have gays ever been hired by DPD? "There are 2,006 people in DPD (should be more) and it requires suspension of the laws of probability to imagine that not one is gay," Ivins detailed.

We know there are gays who are professional football players, Dallas Republicans, U.S. Marines, mothers, fathers, members of motorcycle gangs and leaders of the New Right, so who are we to assume that the DPD has somehow escaped statistical probability," Ivins deduced.

The last person DPD fired for being gay was a lieutenant a number of years ago. "I assume the reason they haven't booted anyone since," Ivins said, "is because the gay cops are (a) discreet and (b) good cops."

THRF TO FILE BRIEF FOR GSS

COLLEGE STATION — M. Robert Schwab, president of the Texas Human Rights Foundation (THRF) has informed TWT NEWS that the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans has given leave for THRF to file a friend of the court brief on behalf of Gay Student Services (GSS) of Texas A&M University, who are appealing an adverse finding by Federal District Court Judge Ross Sterling that their school was not required to extend campus recognition to GSS.

"This case is of critical importance," Schwab said, "in that denial of equal access to University facilities for gay students is unconscionable as measured by either legal or equitable standards. The issue has been widely ad-



dressed by other Circuit Courts of Appeal with generally favorable outcome. In light of Baker vs Wade, which found Penal Code Section 21.06 to be unconstitutional, I am optimistic about the ruling of the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals. I applaud the courage of the members of GSS in pursuing this matter and urge them to have the patience required to see the case to its conclusion," he continued.

"This marks the first time THRF has filed an amicus curiae brief in an action," Schwab noted. "Previously, THRF has underwritten legal fees or other costs incurred in a case. In the last year, a number of attorneys have become active in our foundation who are willing to donate their time for research and other legal activities," he explained, adding that it had allowed THRF "to significantly expand the scope of our activities."

"Special thanks to Houston attorney Tom Coleman, who prepared the amicus brief to be filed by THRF on behalf of GSS," Schwab concluded.

NEW DALLAS GAY PRIDE THEME

DALLAS - "Out of Obscurity . . . Into the Dream" is the official theme slogan of this year's Gay Pride Week (GPW) as selected at a February 10 meeting of the Dallas Gay Pride Association (DGPA). The phrase "Marching Defiantly" prefaced the original slogan, but was dropped from the theme last Sunday after further considerations. The original artwork accompanying the 1983 theme featured a closed fist holding a metallic Lambda emblem. That artwork was also changed and now features and open hand holding the Lambda emblem with a starburst, along with the original symbolic pink triangle:

The winning theme was submitted by Jad after having been inspired by the 21.06 decision, which freed 700,000 gay Texans. TWT NEWS learned.

GPW will begin on June 17 and conclude June 25—not Sunday as reported elsewhere, with the annual parade











My Brother Has AIDS

Dear TWT:

Recently, I was both shocked and distressed to learn that my brother joined the rapidly growing number of gay men (along with other diverse groups) being diagnosed as having AIDS. . .

After a nasty seven-week scuffle with infectious mononucleosis (including a relapse and 10-day hospital stay), "Jim" developed pneumoncystic pneumonia, one of the quickest killers of all the opportunistic infections. Jim was put back into the hospital for another seven days, after having been out for only five. Seeing that this was getting serious, I took two weeks off from work to take care of him in his home. . . .

Incidentally, blood tests showed that somewhere along the line, Jim had experienced a CMV (cytomeglavirus) infection. CMV is invariably found in conjunction with AIDS and Kaposi's Sarcoma.

My brother and I are both gay, and, of course, have heard of Kaposi's Sarcoma, AIDS and other "gay-related" diseases. ... But frankly, up until several weeks ago, it was all Greek to me. . . . Now, Jim and I feel that we have both taken crash courses in gay medicine.

We have both taken new looks at our lives. ... My life could be closely compared to that of a Jack Wrangler movie. . . . Jim, on the other hand, is the proverbial "goody-two-shoes." . . .

You'll meet very few people as healthconscious and active. Not only was Jim opposed to recreational drug use, he seldom drank, and up until six months ago, had been involved in a loverrelationship of several years. Their relationship was nearly completely monogamous (nobody's perfect). In addition. Jim had never contracted any kind of social disease that would have resulted in megadoses of antibiotics-a known link to AIDS.

Many of the factors commonly or directly associated with AIDS have never even been a part of Jim's life. So what went wrong?

Probably two very important things. Jim had two jobs for the past three years to save money to make a down payment on a house. A definite strain on the mental as well as physical aspects of anyone, no matter how healthy. (Also, his schedule most likely did not allow for decent eating habits-another "x".) . . .

The other factor, and apparently the major one, could have been the most easily avoided. Ample rest from the time Jim first contracted mononucleosis most certainly would have done away with any chance of a relapse-apparently, the straw that broke his immune system's back. This series of events, plus other factors we probably know nothing about, all add up to one thing: How do you spell serious illness? AIDS.

What I'm trying to do is make a point. Is "stereotypical" gay lifestyle a prime breeding ground for AIDS and resulting opportunistic infection? One of the best! But it's certainly not exclusive, as in my brother's case. . . .

I do realize that my brother has not been given a death sentence by any means-but he has been put on probation, so to speak. Even though he's gone back to work full-time, lymph node and upper respiratory infections plague him almost weekly. He has gained part of his weight back, and his attitude has never been anything but great (981/2 % of the time).

They say something good comes out of something bad. A very kind man already afflicted with Kaposi's Sarcoma has sort of taken my brother (and myself) under his wing. Even though he barely knew either of us, he found time during the day to check on Jim when I had to return to work. We are very lucky to have met him, and don't know what we would have done without his strength and caring, and we love him for it (you know who you are). What this man lacks in immunity is made up for in patience. Get well!!!

Austin Door Policy

Dear TWT:

This isn't an easy letter to write. After reading the letter "Austin Door Policy" January 14-20, 1983, I thought of the night of October 21, 1977.

I had been invited to a party at the Driskill Hotel's disco, the Cabaret. After visiting with two friends for a while, we went into the dance area and started dancing together (2 men and 1 woman). A very nasty scene ensued and we were bodily thrown out and the shouts of faggots still ring in my ears.

I filed a complaint with the city Human Relations Commission. My two friends would not bear witness to the incident because of where they worked. Gay Community Services attorney and five gay men and women went dancing there. Everyone was immediately thrown out and we proceeded with a lawsuit. Many months later we won that case on the grounds that the Driskill Hotel did not adhere to the provisions of our city's Public Accommodations Law. That law states: No person shall be denied access to an establishment that is a public accommodation (bar, hotel, dance hall, restaurant, etc.) on the grounds of race, religion, color, age, national origin, sexual preference or sex.

Punk, to me, means Dead Kennedys or the Ramones, which is hardly the same thing. . . .

For that matter, the Glenn Miller band is still playing forty years after 'ol Glenn kicked off—but is Glenn Miller the music of the 80s? I think not. . . .

A GROWING PART OF OUR COMMUNITY

BWMT stands for Black and White Men Together, and was begun in January 1980 in San Francisco by a group of men concerned about segregation in the gay community there. Their response was to form a support group for those wishing to ease divisions; and now, the international organization that has arisen since continues to develop with 26 chapters around the world. BWMT of Houston was organized in November 1980 with an initial following of 20 people. Currently, we have developed a subscribing membership of 75 and have over 130 people on our telephone contact lists.

Our purpose and goals are:

 To offer an opportunity for gay men of different races (not just black and white) to socialize together, to form friendships and provide support for ongoing relationships.

2) To provide a forum to express and explore our personal feelings, supporting each other in the sharing of these experiences, with the goal of learning positive lessons from them.



GOD'S Bilies

Power Politics and Religious Tyranny


God's Bullies, by Perry Deane Young; appendixes, index; Holt, Rinehart and Winston, 383 Madison Avenue, New York, New York 10017; hardcover, \$13.50.

No clearer analysis and exposition of the power campaigns of the Religious Right and the New Right (one and the same) has yet been written than this offering by Perry Deane Young, God's Bullies. He presents the efforts of liberal, conservative and religious leaders to effectively respond and staunch the flow of our liberties away from us. The best statements are accredited to Thomas Jefferson, whose speeches on the proper placement of religion in a democratic republic are recorded here for all to see, and cannot be denied.

Perhaps the newest feature in the literature against religious tyranny is Young's historical perspective of other attempts to keep separate religion and politics, dating back to the early 1800s. Another unique aspect Young supplies is his own small-town, Southern Baptist upbringing that enables him to recognize religio-political hypocrisy and duplicity in the most sincere-seeming demagogue. He sympathizes with the free-thinking Baptists whose ideologies center around love for others, but whose religion is associated with frenzied, strident attacks on all but the most narrow-minded.

Excerpts of this book have been published in *Christopher Street* magazine recently under the title, "Sleeping With the Moral Majority." A general state-



ment was included by Young, and his accounts concerning the homosexuality of Terry Dolan, chairman of the National Conservative Political Action Committee (NCPAC). He discusses this curious phenomena of Dolan, and others at the head of the New Right movement, extensively. Other chapters in the book focus on other individuals' specific roles played by those such as Anita Bryant, Jimmy Carter, Richard Viguerie (controlling an empire in direct-mail assaults on the nation's perceptions) and, of course, Jerry Falwell.

The title God's Bullies is so appropriate and descriptive of the way James Robison and others conduct their campaigns. This is especially true for Jerry Falwell's methods of harassing those who criticize him, those who catch him in a lie. The title is also appropriate for those who use force when they have no intelligent, rational argument to persuade others to accept their way of thought. The history of other religious leaders during the Civil War becomes very interesting when one discovers how instrumental preachers had been in sustaining and inciting conditions for battle in those times.

One other item Young records is one of the last notations in the diary of Abraham Lincoln's killer, John Wilkes Booth: "I can never repent it, though we

nate to kill. Our country owed all her troubles to him, and God simply made me the instrument of his punishment."

Young's writing is in clear and captivating prose. His tone is not vindictive, but aware of the traditions that began in this country, he forthrightly asserts anew what Falwell, et al., choose to ignore and cover up with their slander: anti-intellectualism, thought-control, racism, anti-Semitism, hatred and intolerance are all poisons that must be dispersed in the free-flowing marketplace of ideas, creative ideas that are the life-blood of the country.

Though many will say, "It seems so far away, these issues the book raises, how do they affect me?", the danger is ever-present, simply dormant. After one of Anita Bryant's tirades, attacks against gays increased 30% in the Dade County area, as mentioned in the last book reviewed here. Ignorant people with hate in them already, susceptible in their ignorance, fear and insanity, are whipped into action by these people. Knowledge is the key, the key to prevent further abuses and distortions people get away with every day; education is the flip-side of that key. This is Young's purpose and his success.

God's Bullies is invaluable in understanding its subject and charting our remedy for it.



QUEEN VERONIKA

Rainer Werner Fassbinder, until his death last year, was the third in the trio of New German Cinema directors completed by Wim Wenders and Werner Herzog. These artists, while admittedly different in approach, share a florid visual sense and a radical view of relationships and political ideologies. Fassbinder is probably the most radical of them all, especially in his belief in the oppressive nature of any relationship. Veronika Voss amply displays Fassbinder's preoccupation with fluid camerawork, American directors such as Douglas Sirk and Billy Wilder, and, of course, power relationships between people on the most intimate levels. It's beautifully photographed in black and white, with strong contrasts in lighting ("Light and shadow," says Voss, "are what films are all about"). Veronika

Voss is elegantly produced, nicely acted and certainly indebted to Hollywood and at least a dozen films, but what in the hell is it?

One of the difficulties I have with Fassbinder (I've seen, roughly, about half of his 38 movies) is an aesthetic "discomfort" at his continual use of unpleasant, hyperbolic imagery and thematic material in a pointedly self-conscious way. While in no way trying to denigrate Fassbinder's obvious talents (Ali, Fear Eats the Soul shows a great filmmaker at work), I must say that Veronika Voss tries so hard for "camp" that a viewer feels overwhelmed. The story concerns a German film star who has lost the adulation of a post-war public, turns to morphine pro-

vided by a vicious hospital owner, and eventually commits suicide. In this film, as in The Bitter Tears of Petra Von Kant, Fassbinder tries to make campiness hold some sort of truth. The inflated style of Veronika Voss (Rosel Zech), the actress-reminding a viewer of Crawford, Davis and Swanson all at once-contrasts with the bitter, confused emotional state of Veronika Voss, the person. Fassbinder wants to remind us that, as an actress, her emotions have been absolved as a way of behaving that seems "real" to an audience; however, Veronika Voss-the drug addict-can never be acknowledged.

The film, unfortunately, never allows us to get our aesthetic bearings, and so the theme-what little there is-disappears. Veronika Voss opens with a romantic rendezvous between Voss and a stranger, who board a tramcar to escape a shower. Yet we soon move to a mystery-melodrama, complete with vicious doctor, and finally to cynical realism. Along the way, Voss seduces the stranger in a house complete with all the trappings found in that museum Gloria Swanson inhabited in Sunset Boulevard. The similarities continue. Veronika Voss and Norma Desmond are both forgotten stars looking for a comeback role. Both are attracted to writers. Both watch their old pictures. (In Sunset Boulevard, Swanson as Norma Desmond views one of her silent films. Queen Christie, directed by Erich von Stroheim, who plays Desmond's

servant and one-time director/husband). Obviously, Fassbinder wants to make an allegory all tied together by Hollywood camp, i.e., emotions and mannerisms which, while hyperbolic, were taken as "truth." But a director, I think, must provide a basic framework to a film before (s)he posits any meaning or significance to it. Fassbinder moves in and out of so many styles (at one point, he duplicates Jayne Mansfield's milkbottle scene from *The Girl Can't Help It*) that he never gets down to making a picture. *Veronika Voss* is a pastiche that never really connects.

THE LORDS OF DISCIPLINE

In the previous months more intelligent, well made, and (most importantly) enjoyable films have been released than in any time in recent memory. If the trend continues throughout the rest of 1983, it could be an outstanding year for film. A recent release, Lords of Discipline, joins the ranks of good films by intelligently stating its message

without dramatic overkill.

The film is set in a South Carolina military academy during the early sixties. Will McClean (David Keith) returns to the academy for his senior year. He is asked by his mentor Cololnel "Bear" Berrineau to do a special favor. The academy recently accepted its first black student; the Colonel wants McClean to protect the student from un-

fair harassment. McClean finds this an odd request and is reluctant to fulfill it.

McClean does not want a black student enrolled in the academy and finds the notion of him protecting the student from the rest of the student body faintly suicidal. Initially he weakly enforces the Colonel's request but intensifies his efforts as the harassment increases in severity. With the help of his roommates he uncovers the existence of the "Ten," a vigilante group made of ten cadets who have empowered themselves to use any means available to preserve the honor and dignity of the academy.

Worse yet is the discovery that the Ten are connected with the administration of the academy. Finding hypocrisy in the administration that espouses honor and democracy, yet allows the Ten to operate, Will vows to bring those responsible to justice. The Ten likewise try to rid themselves of McClean and all those involved with him.

The film beautifully captures a slice of life with a military academy. Most particularly in the humorous exchanges between McClean and his roommates and the incidents of Hell night, where the upper classmen try to break the newly enrolled cadets. It is remarkable that the atmosphere of a

military academy in South Carolina was captured in this film when the bulk of it was shot in England. The film portrays the military with fairness. Set at the time of Vietnam, it makes little reference to the war and shows no antimilitaristic sentiment prevalent in most post-Vietnam films.

The film shows it is not the military institutions that are evil, but those individuals who abuse their positions. It's the film's understatement which makes the message stronger. My only regret was that the resolution was too understated; the plot near the end was weak and anticlimactic. This is a shame since most of the film builds itself up nicely to the tense confrontation between McClean and the Ten.

Some of the credit for the film's success must go to David Keith for his portrayal of Will McClean. The character of McClean is beautifully complex. Originally repelled by the idea of protecting a black student, he grows to realize that if the Ten can act unchecked, his four years at the academy are for naught. I will not be surprised if David Keith enjoys a successful movie career. Credit also goes to Robert Prosky as the Good ol' Boy Colonal "Bear" Berrineau and to G.D. Spradlin as the thoroughly despicable General Darrell.

A FREUDFUL EXPERIENCE

LOVESICK

If this film is for the "incurably romantic," as the ads stress, maybe I'm incurable. The question is whether that's good or bad. Perhaps I should let my analyst decide.

After bombing with Six Weeks. Dudley Moore has switched back to terrain more familiar to him-comedy. And, given the right material, Mr. Moore can certainly be a very funny man. Unfortunately, Lovesick only makes you chuckle on precious few occasions. This motion picture, written and directed by Marshall Brickman (Annie Hall, Sleeper, Manhattan), focuses on a few days in the busy life of a prominent New York psychiatrist, as played by Moore. Mr. Brickman, I assume, has a hatred for the analytical profession so deep-rooted that I would recommend he see a shrink about it. His lead character is an inept, daydreaming, mostly non-caring "doctor of the mind" who lets his patients talk or fantasize or merely rest on his stereotypical couch, and never fails to remind them-if need be in mid-sentence—when a 50-minute session is up. Among the decidedly wacky patients is a super-nerd who firmly believes that some vicious rays are being beamed from the World Trade Center in order to mess up his brain; there is also a frustrated housewife enduring a helplessly boring mid-life identity crisis; there is, of course, the gay guy, thrown in for laughs, who's tricking with a married policeman and later gets kinky with a Viet vet; there's another paying customer who doesn't say a word in a year of sessions and then gets cut short when he finally reports of one weird dream in which he was having intercourse with his mother while his father took pictures. If Moore fails to make sense out of all the tidbits and pieces his patients throw at him, he can always check with his imaginary sidekick. None other than Sir Alec Guiness was signed up to bring to life the ghost of none other than Sigmund Freud. Whenever Dr. Siggy shows up he tries to point Dr. Dudley in the right direction, especially after he is ready to commit the ultimate no-no for a psychoanalyst, namely falling for one of his patients. She is Elizabeth McGovern (remember the girl Tim Hutton had a crush on in Ordinary People?) who is on the verge of becoming a celebrated playwright for the NY stage, and equally on the verge of stealing her shrink's heart or sanity or both.




Dudley Moore (I) and Elizabeth McGovern share an indoor picnic in Marshall Brickman's Lovesick.

With a rather stale, uninspired performance, Mr. Moore doesn't help the unimaginative writing. Ms. McGovern lacks the magnetic attraction needed to make the dilemma which the doctor experiences possible as he finds himself bitten by the lovebug. Other minor parts include a brief appearance nicely played by Wallace Shawn (My Dinner with Andre); John Huston dares to show some enthusiasm as the elder, experienced therapist; while Alan King and Selma Diamond do not exactly spark what you would call memorable moments.

The movie's bottom line: Lovesick is cute—rarely; silly—mostly; sick—occasionally.

LOOKING AHEAD — Did you know that Superman has a cousin in Chicago? Of course you didn't, but wasn't it inevitable after the colossal box office of the first two Superman films? Supergirl, from Superman producer Alexander Salkind, begins production this spring in London, with director Jeannot Szwarc at the helm. His next film. Streamers, from David Rabe's play. should be out by August. Cast mostly with unknown New York stage actors. the film is set in an Army barracks during the Vietnam years. It's shooting in Dallas. After Streamers his next project is something called The Diviners, to star Treat Williams. After that, Altman plans to make a film version of a novel called Easter Egg Hunt, which is set at an English finishing school for young ladies during WWI. He hopes to star David Bowie and Geraldine Chaplin.

LIGHTING UP - I keep vowing not to go out on a limb with predictions, but here I go again. In my opinion, Ben Kingsley and David Keith are the two main actors to watch in 1983 (unless Richard Gere, Mel Gibson and Robert Redford are all cast in a porno movie together). Kingsley, who has already received several important awards and an Oscar nomination for his starring role in Gandhi, is also the star of a new film version of Harold Pinter's Betraval. a comedy-drama about a menage-atrois involving two close friends, played by Kingsley and Jeremy Irons (he was the male lead in French Lieutenant's Woman), and the wife of one of them. played by Patricia Hodge. ... David Keith has already appeared in several

films—Brubaker, Take This Job and Shove It, etc.—but his big break was getting the second male lead in the enormously popular An Officer and a Gentleman. Already we are about to see him in his first starring role in a new film called The Lords of Discipline. Set in 1964 at a strict military school in the South, this story of corruption and cruelty has parallels to Watergate and, by some accounts, is a real shocker.

DEJA VU — Speaking of An Officer and a Gentleman: Isn't it funny how that plot keeps coming back to haunt us? My favorite version was a recent and rather abominable (but fun!) made for TV movie called Dixie: Changing Habits, which starred the incredibly beautiful and talented Suzanne Pleshette as a glamorous whorehouse madam who gets busted and sent to a convent for rehabilitation. The convent is run by Cloris Leachman (in the Lou Gossett role), playing a "cute" tractordriving Mother Superior. I hope you saw it because it was a scream.

DOUBLE YOUR PLEASURE — I used to think that the quickest way to get to the top of the record charts was to remake a golden oldie. Look at the recording career of Linda Ronstadt; almost her entire chart life has been dependent on third-rate versions of other people's hits, and other stars have also taken that route many times. Now, however, it seems that the easiest, if not the quickest, route to the top

with them! Actually, it's nothing new: Remember Barbra Streisand and Neil Diamond, Barbra Streisand and Donna Summer, Barbra Streisand and Andy Gibb etc.? Anytime you pair a couple of superstars, you're going to have a hit record. Recently we've had Paul Mc-Cartney dueting with Stevie Wonder and Michael Jackson, with spectacular (commercially) results. Dueting also seems to be the answer for some less successful artists like Joe Cocker and Jennifer Warne, whose "Up Where We Belong" (from Officer and a Gentleman) went all the way to the top. The Billboard country charts are virtually choked with duets: T.G. Sheppard & Karen Brooks are at No. 1 with "Faking Love," and not far below that you can find duets by George Jones & Merle Haggard, Dolly Parton & Willie Nelson and Merle Haggard & Willie Nelson, among others. My favorite of all the duet successes involves the current No. 1 record on Billboard's "Hot 100" chart. "Baby Come To Me," by Patti Austin and James Ingram (who?) first appeared on the "Hot 100" last spring and dropped off after four weeks, only to reappear in October, when it began its steady 19-week climb to its current No. 1 position. Slow, but successful, Incidentally, since everyone considers me to be a cornucopia of trivia, I gotta tell you this: "Baby Come To Me" is the fourth No. 1 single to be produced by Quincy Jones. The others were the Michael Jackson hits "Don't Stop Till You Get Enough" and "Rock With You," and, uh, Lesley Gore's "It's My Party."

RESEARCH-OBSERVATION


Research shows that levels of Guilt Syndrome present in the human body vary not according to age or sex, but according to job class.
