GPC MEETS WITH HOUSTON MAYOR

HOUSTON — Wednesday afternoon, March 16, Larry Bagneris, Jr. and Marion Coleman, president and vice-president, respectively, of this city's Gay Political Caucus (GPC) met with Mayor Kathy Whitmire.

The meeting was not the first; nor will it be the last, as it is part of an ongoing dialogue between the gay community and elected officials at City Hall.

"During the meeting, we discussed the mayor's participation in this year's Gay Pride rally at the Summit, fair housing and other matters of equal rights," Bagneris told TWT NEWS. "The mayor, as usual, was very attentive and agreeable to the goals of the gay community."

Although there are some in the community who feel the mayor doesn't do enough for gays, Whitmire cited a recent poll which found that 40% of the city thought the mayor did too much for gays.

NEW ANTI-GAY BILL PROPOSED

AUSTIN - There's a new anti-gay bill trying to make it to the floor of this year's Texas Legislature, Bettie Naylor, gay lobbyist at the State Capitol has reported to TWT NEWS.

The bill is so ludicrous that it is not being taken seriously by those of wisdom. What makes the bill so outrageous is that it defines "sexual contact" between two people, regardless of sex, gay or straight, as the simple touching of one by another. If such touching is a first offense, it would be a misdemeanor. The second offense would be a felony.

The proposed legislation also attempts to define the difference between sexual intercourse and deviant sexual intercourse.

Simply stated, sexual intercourse would involve "the penetration of the female sex organ by the male sex organ." It would not be against the law.


Deviant sexual intercourse would, however, be against the law. In fact, it would be a felony. For sexual intercourse to be considered deviant, it would involve people of the same sex. involve "the penetration by one person of the genitals or the anus of another person with an object, except for medical purposes," or any penetration, oral or anal, on one person, whether oral/anal, oral/genital or anal/genital.

The legislation would make all homosexuals law breakers. It would also make heterosexuals law breakers if they involved themselves in any type of sexual gratification other than religiously accepted male penetration of the female.

The law is so ridiculous that it has little hope of reaching the floor for a vote, TWT NEWS has learned. The law is as ridiculous as the non-medical, homophobic Dallas Doctors Against AIDS.



In fact, one of its members, attorney Bill Blackburn, has been lobbying for the passage of the proposed legislation, which has been supported by State Representative Bill Ceverha and State Senator John Leedom of Dallas.

EX-GIRLFRIEND KILLS MONTROSE MAN

HOUSTON — Montrose guitarist and singer, Art Collett, 30, was fatally shot in the chest in the early morning hours of March 17 by an ex-girlfriend, Pam Willett, who used a .25-caliber automatic pistol.

Willett, 22, arrived at Collett's apartment with the gun after learning that Collett, the father of her child, was breaking off their relationship and going to move in with his friend Keoki Kona, a popular entertainer at The Hole.

After Willett killed Collett, she fled in his car to a friend's house, where she confessed the murder. Her friends called police; she was arrested and placed in Harris County Jail.

"It was the scorn of a rebuffed exgirlfriend," Kona told TWT NEWS. "When Art didn't come by The Hole after work at 2:00am to take me home, I became concerned. I called his apartment, but the phone was disconnected.

"It was not until later that same morning, around 6:00am, that I received a call from Art's wife, Becky, in Dallas, who told me Art was dead," Kona explained.

His wife, from whom he was separated, told Kona that she hoped to arrange a memorial service for his many Montrose friends.

Collett was employed by the Jewish Community Center as chief maintenance engineer. He was a well-liked patron of several Montrose clubs.

Collett's body was returned to the family home in Tampa, Florida for services on March 21.

DGA READIES FOR DALLAS ELECTION

DALLAS — On April 2, Dallas will elect a new mayor and ten city council members. "This may be the most important election gay people in this city have ever faced," president of DGA, Mike Stewart, told TWT NEWS.

"We have made substantial progress in dealing with city government and we know that progress is due to our political influence in local elections. The mayor, the chief of police and other police officials, the city manager, city council members, assistant city managers and department managers do not meet with us because it is 'right.' They meet with us and respond to our requests because of our political power, our votes," Stewart attested.

The Dallas Gay Political Caucus Steering Committee began planning for the municipal elections before the votes were counted in the November election. The DGA has made the election its primary focus.

"The outcome of the April 2 election will affect the daily lives of thousands of gay women and men in Dallas," Stewart said. "I don't want to see us lose any of our influence in local government, and I believe you share my concern." Stewart concluded.

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GAYS TO IGNORE KU KLUX KLAN

HOUSTON - On Saturday, April 2. the Ku Klux Klan has arranged a parade permit to march in downtown Houston. Because the Klan is financially strapped, city rules stipulate the Klan is not required to pay for their permit, TWT NEWS learned.

When the Klan held a march recently in Austin, TV cameras pictured the story of violence.

Leaders in Houston's gay community have chosen to suggest that the gay community "not honor the Klan with our presence." GPC, at its most recent meeting, reiterated its majority choice to ignore the Klan.

"We are going to ignore the Klan's bigotry, hatred and ignorance," GPC president, Larry Bagneris, told TWT NEWS, urging "stay away."

City Councilmember for Montrose, George Greanias, is in agreement. His aide, Kent Speer, informed TWT NEWS

that Greanias would issue a statement next week urging the gay community to abstain.

Ray Hill, host of Houston's Thursday night Wilde 'n' Stein radio program on KPFT-FM, told TWT NEWS he would most likely announce an alternative function for the day of the rally, such as a social event or picnic in Hermann Park.

TWT NEWS is of the further opinion that the Klan's march has been scheduled on the wrong day. It would be more approrpiate for the Klan to march on April 1, April Fools' Day.

LAMBDA FILES TO HELP GSS

COLLEGE STATION - Late last vear, TWT NEWS learned that the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund was planning to file an amicus (friend of the court) brief in the Gay Student Services vs Texas A&M University case, which is before the Fifth Circuit of the

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United States Court of Appeal in New Orleans. That brief has now been officially filed.

The case involves the rights of the gay student group at A&M to gain official recognition from the university. GSS is represented by a private attorney, with amicus briefs being submitted by Lambda and the Texas Human Rights Foundation (THRF). Lambda's brief was written by Steven Rosen. The brief argues that the denial of recognition violated the students' First Amendment rights of speech and association and their rights to equal protection of the laws under the Fourteenth Amendment.

Lambda executive director, Tim Sweeney, told TWT NEWS, "This case builds upon established precedent in numerous other gay student recognition cases, such as the previous Lambda case of Gay Student Organization of the University of New Hampshire vs Bonner in 1974. We will continue Lambda's involvement in gay student cases,


including our amicus work in the Georgetown University gay student recognition case."

BALLPARK ROBBER GETS 50 YEARS

HOUSTON — Anthony Ray Petitt, 25, was sentenced to 50 years in prison last Monday in District Judge Doug Shaver's court for the January 18 hold-up of the popular Ballpark Bookstore, 1830 W. Alabama.

He was charged with aggravated robbery and attempted capital murder, TWT NEWS learned, and pleaded guilty. The incident involved a 16-hour standoff with police and SWAT officers.

The holdup was surprisingly discovered by two vice officers who entered the store just after it had opened. When they discovered that they had just happened to have walked in on a robbery, they returned to their car, at which time Petitt fired his pistol at the officers at least seven times.

The Ballpark suffered extensive damage and had to be thoroughly remodeled.

ALAMO CITY SETS GAY PRIDE

SAN ANTONIO — Gay Pride Week in the Alamo City has been officially set for June 25 to July 2 "so as not to conflict with activities during the Houston and Dallas Gay Pride Week celebrations," TWT NEWS learned from Tony Tuckwiller.

The emphasis this year will be on the arts. There will be presentations of gay films, gay art exhibits and a concert by the newly-formed Mission City Chorale. "The Chorale is still looking for more singers, both men and women," Tuckwiller explained.

Gay Pride Week in San Antonio will

begin with the annual picnic and end with a 50-day countdown to Gay Fiesta '83.

200 YEARS PRISON; \$200,000 FINE

LITTLE ROCK — A psychiatrist in this city has been sentenced to 200 years in prison and fined \$200,000 for having sexually abused a 13-year-old boy. The jury found Dr. Robert M. Thompson, 48, guilty of "homosexual assault on the boy 20 times" beginning in February 1980, when the young lad was only 12 years old.

The story also involved incest as "carnal abuse" charges were still pending against the boy's father and four of his male friends. Deputy prosecutor Lloyd King had placed the boy in a foster home earlier this year.

The sentence, one of the longest ever handed down from the bench, was described by Thompson's attorney as "cruel and unusual punishment."

Probing AIDS

Dear TWT:

My congratulations and thanks for the publication of the article on AIDS in TWT, March 4, 1983. I commend you for the responsibility of your journalism—the article was timely and much-needed.

I am heartened by the clear manner in which options for behavior were set forth and the possible consequences of it discussed. It was a welcome change from the usual fare of glib dogmatic moralizing on the one hand, and constant rationalizations for self-destruction on the other. None of us, I suspect, are innocent of either charge. . . . I also think what they had to say rings very true.

As a social worker and priest, I am constantly encouraged by the knowledge that there is a dedicated group of concerned mental health professionals working for the betterment of the social and individual well-being of our community. My thanks to them for their article, and to TWT for its publication. Rev. Ted. Boya, Jr. Houston, Texas

Dear TWT:

... I was extremely impressed with the article entitled "AIDS: Making Choices."

... Anyone who ... took the time to read it and fully comprehend it should have had a lot to think about. The article was not only informative and down to earth, but it also served a purpose. Before this AIDS epidemic can take a full toll and diminish our population one by one, friend by friend, we need to be aware and concerned of the process this disease follows.

... [A]nyone still taking chances and not following preventive health measures is in a great deal of danger. The health psychologists who wrote the article mentioned that everyone should practice mental health and preventive medicine. The best cure is prevention.

... Getting to know your sexual partners is becoming an increasingly difficult task to do. ... How many times have we gone

out to the bars to cruise and end up going home alone? Maybe some of you never have, but I am not necessarily shy, I just find it difficult to make the first move. So often I would like to talk to someone, just to talk, but everyone always has one thing on their mind—sex. Why can't you be willing to talk to a stranger and just get to know the person? . . .

If gays feel the need to better society, what better way than to develop the gift of friendship? Someone out there, maybe the person you are looking past, needs attention. Preventive health should not only be practiced on one's self, but also on one's fellow human beings....

We all need to feel more, to care more, to show our feelings without hesitation or intimidation. It can be done, we just need to start. . . . [L]et your friends know; maybe they will see the good in you, and, together, you can accomplish twice as much good. Smile more and say hello to someone who seems to be lonely. If they take your good intentions the wrong way, let them know. YOU can and will make the difference. Don't give up. Help us be a lot better.

Look at your behavior, listen to yourself and others, and feel your experiences. Share what will benefit others, and care. Take care of your own self, but do not deny others the benefit of someone caring about them. No one has too many caring friends in their lives.

The choice is always yours, and the responsibility is always yours. . . . Be fair, don't spread such things [AIDS, herpes, VD, hepatitis, parasites] through our community. Take the proper amount of time to recover, and then, practice preventive physical and mental health. Don't subject your body to abuse. And don't subject my body to your ignorance. Dear TWT:

I recently saw an advertisement in TWT which read: "AIDS! Are You Next? Benefit." I think that ad is sick and typical

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of the "throwing-the-baby-out-with-the-bath-water" overreaction syndrome. I don't know what irritates me more now: a) listening to a religious fanatic condemn me to hell for an immoral lifestyle, or b) listening to an "AIDS authority" chastise me for an irresponsible lifestyle. They are both implying to me that the wages of gay sin is death and I say that's bullshit.

I don't think AIDS can be ignored and I know it's a deadly, devastating disease, but right now too many persons are going overboard, creating an atmosphere of fear and tension about a disease which they themselves really don't understand.

Monogamy is fine for many people. It has worked wonders for heterosexuals for centuries. But does it have to be rammed down all our throats? . . .

Much research points to stress as a cause of cancer. I can't help but feel that if you make a person feel guilty about having a good time, you're causing him grief and stress. Now, that's UNHEALTHY. Timothy M. Hall Houston, Texas

We need to sharpen up and stop all this hysteria and AIDS paranoia—all it does is contribute to the problem. It all boils down to prevention and preventive medicine, and when I say that, I mean vitamins.

I have been on vitamins for years and my immune system is strong. I know for a fact that two males were diagnosed with AIDS at a well known hospital in Houston. After two weeks of the treatment listed below, the men returned to the hospital and were told they were cured of AIDS.

The formula: No caffeine, no cigarettes, no drugs, a natural herbal mineral multivitamin, Thymus—125 mg., Immugen—liquid, Rentenzym A-plus, Propolis—liquid, and Vitamin C—500 mg. daily.

Let's get our immune system healthy now, instead of drugs and hospitals later. You can't die from vitamins.

Dear TWT:

I was very sorry to read of Larry's tragic loss of his twin brother Robert to AIDS [TWT COMMENT, Vol. 8, No. 51]. However, I did not understand Larry's admonition, "Tell your readers to be careful." How can one "be careful" of catching AIDS?

It is impossible to screen your dates for AIDS. They may not know that they themselves have been exposed to it, and

therefore be potential carriers. This assumes, of course, they are honest and would tell you. . . .

From his letter, and from personal experience, I have to conclude that Larry's warning to "be careful" is useless. Men will still date men and women will still date women, and you can't really know who your date was with before you.

Worrying about catching AIDS is as futile as trying to avoid it. My advice is not to let your life be ruled by worry or fear. Whatever you call the forces greater than you—god, karma, chance, fate—are the only powers you can appeal to in the case of AIDS.

The alternative is to abstain from intimacy, and in this frequently lonely and hostile city, who wants to do that? John M. Simpson Houston, Texas

Editor—The following letter, from Robert's lover, outlines the tragic circumstances surrounding the death of Larry, Robert's brother.

Dear TWT:

... Larry and I spent a few peaceful days at his parents ranch in South Texas recently. We both had a pretty difficult time adjusting ourselves to Robert's death. I thought that we were doing pretty well considering all things. I woke up one morning early . . . and saw that Larry's bed was empty. I did not give much thought to it at first. While fixing breakfast for Larry and myself, one of the ranch hands came into the kitchen and asked if either I or Larry had heard what he thought was a gunshot about 4:00am. I explained that I had heard nothing and that Larry must be out on the ranch somewhere. Then he told me that Larry's horse was missing.

I suppose at that very moment I knew what had happened. . . . [W]e found Larry; he looked so peaceful. The gun was still in his hand. He had shot himself in the chest. Larry was not a weak person; he did try, yet he simply could not accept Robert's death, nor could he really live without his "precious brother," as he always called Robert.

Larry's parents wanted an autopsy, which exposed the fact that he had AIDS, too, even though I am certain that he did not know it. We buried Larry next to Robert; everyone was weeping except me. I suppose I have turned to stone inside. I feel as if my very soul is dead.

So, it's over; these two beautiful guys

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are dead. Why? The only answer is

AIDS...
I can't really help their desolate parents, and they certainly don't need my personal grief added to their burden. On March 21, Robert and Larry would have been 26 years old. I am 31; even so, I don't doubt that I could pass for 60 years old now.

If someone out there will really listen to this terrible waste, then maybe we can all do something about AIDS. Larry did not live to see his letter in TWT, so I'll thank you for him. I'm certain that he would have appreciated your concern. Thank you, TWT, for caring.

First, I want to congratulate you on your consistent quality of reporting and news coverage of the important issues that concern our community, and of the

accuracy of those articles.

Secondly, I would like to note my disappointment with an alternate publication in our community [of Houston] for its lack of journalistic quality and its totally inaccurate reporting of the news that ultimately effects our community by having misinformed readers securely armed with misinformation and half truths.

To the point of my statement, let me refer to the February 25, 1983 issue of this newspaper, and its article on page 14 entitled, "The World Comes To A Special Montrose Weekend." This article concerns the post-Mardi Gras parties that were held in and around Houston.... The fourth paragraph starts out by stating that "The Houston Conference of (Motorcycle) Clubs sponsored their sixth annual 'Let Us Entertain you Weekend.'..." [I]n fact, it is the "Houston Conference of Clubs" (no motorcycle), it is their tenth annual "Let Us Entertain You Weekend," not their sixth....

The truly pathetic part of this situation is that this publication had its advertising director registered for the weekend activities and they still got it wrong.

Don't they realize the damage they can do to our community by its flagrant abuse of misinforming the public? This is just one incident, but how many others have there been that were never brought to our attention?

And as far as no damage done, what about the problems that have arisen from the ommissions . . . from this article? There have been many accusations and lost tempers between . . . businesses and HCC because they were omitted from that article. But this certain publication doesn't seem to care as long as they keep getting their advertising dollars from these same businesses.

What I would like to say to the community and businesses of our city is: Be aware! Things are not always as you read them. Quality is no more than what you settle for; don't settle for anything that insults your intelligence as an informed reader. "The squeaky wheel gets the oil." Let them know that you will not settle for second-rate news.

If you missed the article in question in their newspaper, you will find it reprinted verbatum in the first copy of their new magazine.

Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) and the ever-rising incidence and death rates associated with it will, whether we like it or not, bring about certain freedom-squelching changes in our lives. Little is known about what causes AIDS, let alone what might cure it.

Several people have already suggested that our espionage-loving government, or some group of religious fanatics, may have deliberately introduced ADIS into the gay community through some sort of biological warfare. This sounds outlandish, but consider: In a world where lunatics sneak poison into over-the-counter medicines, what suspicion of malevolence seems too wild to take seriously?

Meanwhile, AIDS, together with the opportunistic diseases (Kaposi's Sarcoma and Pneumocystis Carinii Pneumonia) that it invites into our bodies, is striking and killing gay men. The death toll rises each week; at this writing, more than 1000 cases of AIDS have been documented, and over forty percent of these have resulted in death. AIDS may be sexually transmitted, doctors think. And its incubation period can last as long as a year, which means incalculable numbers of gay men may be carrying and spreading AIDS right now. without showing any symptoms themselves.

What can we do? The prescription costs no money, but it's a bitter pill to have to swallow. I quote from the AIDS brochure available from the Oak Lawn Counseling Center: "Cut down the number of different men you have sex with. Particularly with the men who also have many different sexual partners." In other words, we can no longer safely indulge in cruising and promiscuity as freely as we might like. Our lives may literally depend on our cutting down.

Now, anyone who points this out runs the risk of being branded both a prudish moralist and a meddling busybody. I am neither. I am frustrated, chagrined, and downright furious about the restrictions that AIDS is imposing. And I wish there were an unpejorative term for promiscuity. Despite the much vaunted sexual revolution of the sixties. sex is still pretty much a dirty word in this country, and promiscuity is an even dirtier one. There lingers in American

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minds (especially heterosexual ones) the idea that if sex is attained too easily, too frequently, and with too many partners, then it is not just morally wrong but perverted and disgusting—and that unless one makes some investment much greater than buying an attractive man a scotch and soda, then sex is too easily attained. Supposedly we must suffer, or risk some large amount of time and emotional commitment, to earn the right to physical pleasure; free, easy sex is supposed to be degrading.

This idea is and ought to be bullshit. Sex with a stranger—even if with one of many strangers—need not be a worthless experience. Sex feels good, period. (Can you hear me out there, Reader's Digest, wherein a recent article expressed elation that herpes would soon end what the author saw as "mindless promiscuity" among straights?) Sometimes it feels much better than good; tricking with the right person can be energizing, liberating, horizon expanding—an emotionally supercharged event.

Doubtless we've all gone to bed with someone we've promptly forgotten. But there are others we not only haven't forgotten, but deliberately enjoy remembering. And such strangers don't always remain strangers; former tricks occasionally become lasting friends and potential lovers. In any event, it's damned good to wake up with a warm, attractive body in your arms.

But unless AIDS mysteriously and beatifically begins to wane as suddenly as it appeared and spread—a most unlikely event—we will eventually have to cut down our sexual contacts. At the very least, extremely casual sex, i.e., sex as a sport with virtually anybody and everybody, will undoubtedly decrease as the AIDS death toll mounts.

Undoubtedly, if people won't even give up smoking to save their lives, they're not about to give up sex. I write knowing that many gay men will disregard AIDS and continue to cruise for as much sex with as many partners as they can get. I can't blame them, especially

those without lovers. Hormones and erections are difficult to ignore. I don't know whether I'll be able to follow the advice of restraint myself. I can envision some Friday or Saturday night when none of my friends is available. I'll settle down with a book, as I used to do in my hometown, where plenty of gay men undoubtedly lived but kept the fact an urgent secret. Around 10:00pm I'll stop pretending I want to read Moby Dick, or whatever, on a weekend night and admit that I'm horny as hell. I may think about AIDS the whole time I'm showering and dressing-but I'll go out anyway.

Sadly, some of our friends may have to die AIDS-related deaths before we attempt to modify our lifestyles. This too will occur more and more often.

What next?

Some grisly, doomsday science-fictionesque scenarios are easy to imagine: a world so ridden with disease that physical love requires a real act of courage and self-sacrifice. More immediately and realistically, as AIDS spreads, we can expect to see the following:

A) Those gays with a passion for organization will mastermind a closed fuck-buddy circle of perhaps 4-10 members who agree to have sex only with each other, thereby hoping to keep AIDS contagions out. If the members like each others' bodies enough, such a circle might work, providing there's enough variety and mutual horniness within the group to keep anybody from cheating.

B) Heretofore open relationships between lovers will become closed to guard against AIDS. Boredom that seemed excruciating before may begin to seem tolerable; in fact, lovers may discover genuine reawakened interest in each other—once they have to.

C) The menage a trois will become more popular than ever. A couple may bring in a third partner to dispel boredom or three close friends may decide to sexually lock out the rest of the world, concentrating on each other.

D) Friends will become more valuable



than ever before, and friendship will evolve into love much more readily than it does now.

E) Romance will make a comeback. Gay men will see each other as potential lover material more eagerly. Dating will encroach more and more on tricking time.

F) The new readiness to couple and settle down may make us seem, to some, "straighter." Some activists are resisting the reality and seriousness of the AIDS threat and are indulging in polemics against it. They see our freeand-easy sexual lifestyle as a significant symbol of liberation; going to bed with vast numbers of partners is not just a lot of fun, but a political act as well. Giving up cruising and settling down to sex with at most a few partners would supposedly be equivalent to selling out to straights, accepting their confining, tiresome, snobbish notions of propriety and morality. We would, so the argument goes, be making ourselves "straighter." These politoos (see

The Advocate, issue number 361) rail against this possible, perhaps predictable, result.

I think they're worrying needlessly. Straight, like gay is, ultimately, only a label. Denying the reality of AIDS won't make it disappear, but adapting to it will keep more of us alive and healthy. Only living gavs can vote: corpses, however politically liberated, have a very limited voice in our government. Even the symbolic martyrdom value of a gorgeous body that died for sex with the masses would be negligible in our harsh, cruel political world. If our sexual set-ups do begin to resemble those of straights more, but we stay alive, healthy, and happy, where's the problem? It's the quality of our sexual situations, not the labels attached to them. that ought to count most.

Perhaps AIDS, through some utterly unexpected medical miracle, will soon disappear. And unless it does, big changes in the way we live and love are inevitable.

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
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

I went away to Stephen F. Austin State College at the age of nineteen, met a 27-year-old female, and for the next eight and a half years, I played homemaker, and graduated from college with honors. We went from a small two-bedroom trailer to a two-story house.

Over the years, I had realized and accepted, to a degree, that she occasionally slept with others. She was in a position of power and would use that

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

plus her good looks, charm, versatility. I had gone from a 19-year-old to a 27year-old, and I no longer could accept many aspects of our relationship.

I forgot to mention one major aspect. She was my direct supervisor for two years, and going into the second year, I met a person who had a compelling influence on my thoughts. We related well. Before there was ever any involvement, I knew it was time to leave many things behind that I disliked. Without my awareness, she (my superior) had been totally involved with someone for months. What happened was she couldn't deal with her behavior, and when I moved in with a "straight" teacher, she still continued to visit my classroom daily, often leaving in a loud, boisterous manner. In other words, all the teachers knew there was a problem.

Over the years, I had been allowed to go deer hunting, attend any convention. and make trips with her on school time. Suddenly, if I was absent, I had to produce a doctor's excuse. No one else in the entire school district was required to do so. I could give you numerous examples.

I was called in the by superintendent



of the school district; I was questioned by him on who I was sleeping with. I asked for a transfer out of the building and was told to "hang on," next year they'd move her.

The director of Special Education was behind her, seemingly due to the fact that he loaned her money to complete our house settlement. After all, she had worked hard for him over the years and, coincidentally, he resigned the same year all this happened.

I am still a taxpayer in the community, and have been for five years, and I really wonder when, after going to the superintendent, the school board, and to the district attorney, there would be any justice. I had lived with someone who had found ways to make money off the school distict by means which you would have trouble imagining. One example was writing grants for reports that were never, to this day, written. As it came to be in the Tyler Federal Court, Judge William M. Stegar's courtroom, a directive verdict was decided, and the jury was not allowed a decision on the case. The case has been appealed.

I suppose justice stops somewhere. It stops when a person sits on the witness stand and simply cannot remember. One example being the district attorney, who would remember he talked to me five or six times, but couldn't remember about what.

Another example was when the misappropriation of funds was mentioned, and invoice numbers provided. The judge told our attorney he was taking too much time. Every time the prosecutor's objections pertained to misappropriation of funds, the judge ruled in favor of the school district. Such was not the case, however, when the defense's objections dealt with the sexual matter.

Another example was when the superintendent testified that I called him, made an appointment, walked into his office and stated I was a lesbian. I think, regardless of the jurors' opinions on the subject, that most would have difficulty believing anyone would walk in and tell their superintendent that.



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
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


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Is The Homosexual My Neighbor?, by Letha Scanzoni and Virginia Ramey Mollenkott; 159 pp.; indexes; Harper & Row, Publishers, Inc., 10 East 53rd Street, New York, New York 10022; softcover, \$6.95.

One dimension of coming out that often causes the most pain in oneself and in one's family is the strong religious objections that exist to gay activity. Families that may otherwise transcend society's and their own personal anxiety and come to love and accept their relative, are forced to disown or even persecute them on religious grounds. Letha Scanzoni and Virginia Ramey Mollenkott have written Is The Homosexual My Neighbor? to inform devout Christians and to develop their capacity for Christian love and acceptance, apart form society-based tradi-

tion and ignorance.

Their familiarity with scripture, and their frequent use of it to answer many real emotional issues of growth and maturity as thinking Christians, make this a comprehensive explanation of homosexuality's legitimacy and acceptance by God. The scriptures themselves are subjected to analysis and accurate interpretation as they explain the corrupting influence of the many translations that obscure the actual intent and meaning of the original Greek text and word usage.

Other books have been written to meet the particular objections of other religions, e.g., Catholicism, Episcopalianism, Hebraism, and their traditions. The same references are made to the pertinent passages in the Bible, but each religion has its own traditions and church policies that must be answered in individual books. Scanzone and Mol-

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lenkott focus on Christian ethics and city for intolerance or support. Informathought derived from the New Testament scriptures.

Their most useful function is to clarify muddled and confused perceptions and thoughts religious persons have due to the emotionalism and ignorance promoted by those in the church, often the pastor and fanatical deacons. A section entitled "Why Christians Find This Topic So Difficult" is the crucial first step for anyone reading this book to open themselves up to enlightenment. Unfortunately, this section is several chapters into the book.

Their use of the parable of the good neighbor and the Good Samaritan gives the book its compassionate tone. Then, each of the condemning scriptures is discussed in light of that compassionate spirit which was shared and initiated by Christ. Their intimate knowledge of how translation of the original scripture reflected the prejudices of the times and the inadequacies of the lanquage and translators, combined with their passion, is the most effective argument toward a more accepting love by misguided Christians.

The role and participation of homosexuals and women in the higher offices of the church are examined. Stories of people's lives ruined or uplifted by the rejection or acceptance of gay people illustrate Christians' capation about advances in research concerning the positive mental and physical condition of gay people, the naturalness of homosexuality in humanity and the recognition of homophobia in many people aids Christians in their new awareness.

The authoresses include a survey of the attitudes of prominent church leaders and institutions, and the debate concerning gayness in the church. The last chapter is entitled "Proposing a Homosexual Christian Ethic," based on the new information derived from an accurate interpretation of the scriptures.

The text is thoroughly footnoted. referring to notes at the book's end. where one will also find a list for further reading, an index of names and subjects, and an index of scripture references. Reviews of the book on the back cover should lend this perspective a great deal of respectability and credibility to most Christians.

The conflicts engendered in this issue can be deeply personal and devastating, the resolution of which is absolutely vital to the emotional wellbeing of many gay men and women around the world. The message of Scanzoni and Mollenkott is clear, with great value and purpose, for all connected to the church and with religious sentiment.



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
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

Starstruck is billed as "a new wave musical comedy from Australia." I guess this is the best way to describe this lively little film from down-under. I can see this film becoming a midnight show staple like Rocky Horror Picture Show or Rock 'n' Roll High School, two films with which Starstruck has a lot in common.

Don't let me scare you off. There is not a dull moment in *Starstruck*. It is filled with talented young performers

whose collective energy leaps off the screen. Several production numbers had me on the edge of my seat (particularly one with several dozen muscleboys doing a water ballet a la Esther Williams movies).

Jo Kennedy (sort of a smaller, more feminine Lene Lovich) plays a teenage girl who works in her mother's pub in a less-than-fashionable hotel. She is a pop singer waiting for the "big break." Her 14-year-old step-brother, played marvelously by Ross O'Donovan, becomes a motivating force. Through sundry ups and downs, he maintains that dreams are attainable if you really want them enough.

I won't give away the ending, except that it does what every great musical should do—send you out of the theatre with a bouncy optimism.

Starstruck is filled with interesting characters and locations. Filmed in Sydney, Australia, director Gillian Armstrong uses a lot of local faces and

Robert De Niro stars at Rupert Pupkin

Robert De Niro and Martin Scorsese have always produced persuasive, feverish characters on the fringe of society. Travis Bickle in *Taxi Driver* and Jake La Motta in *Raging Bull* are vivid Jerry Langford (Jerry Lewis), in order to mount a *coup d'etat* and appear on his program. The film begins as a satire comparing the public and private lives of famous celebrities—but turns into something mean and ugly by the end,

creations in films which, respectively, subvert the traditional tenets of urban melodrama and biography to create revisionist portraits. In *The King of Comedy*, De Niro once again plays an outcast, named Rupert Pupkin, a would-be comic who kidnaps his talk-show idol,

much in the same manner as another "critical" appraisal of television, *Network*. While nowhere near as reactionary as that film, *The King of Comedy* is, unfortunately, rarely funny. Much of this has to do with Scorsese's temperament, which is, admittedly,

poorly suited for comedy in the first place. The "comic" scenes in Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore, for example, felt shrill and forced. Furthermore, Scorsese's extreme stylization of sets, photography and fantasy sequences in The King of Comedy, constantly remind us of the seriousness of his intentions.

Robert De Niro and Jerry Lewis are. however, very fine, although the ambitious nature of each character seems far more apparent than any talent (or lack of) as a comedian. De Niro is a sharp, impulsive actor; there's a distinct kind of tension in his body and style that works well in roles like the repressed cab driver, Travis Bickle, but work against him when he attempts to play an underdog, grinning as Langford and others humiliate him. De Niro's at his best when he creates a character whose tensions, superficially suppressed, are released in paroxysms. In The King of Comedy, a viewer feels neither sympathetic toward Rupert Pupkin nor repelled by him. He seems more the dunce than the poignant outsider.

MARRIAGE/MIRAGE

The action and story of *Betrayal*, written by Harold Pinter and based on his stage success, is simple, to the point, yet strange. The movie, directed by David Jones, deals with a *menage a trois* between two publishers named Jerry and Robert—friends since youth—and the latter's wife. The concept

certainly isn't new, but its realization is: Pinter starts his story at the destructive conclusion of the affair and moves back in time, ending with the first encounter between Jerry and Emma. As usual, Pinter uses many of the techniques he is noted for, on both screen and stage. We know exactly what is tak-


ing place, but never understand why it happens. The surface is crisp and clear, the dialogue polished, tightly constructed, full of pauses and tension. Everything else, however, is opaque: Emotions are rarely defined and articulated.

where it's all over right back to the point where the lover first declared his love for the lady. Of course, you only see selected scenes, so the movement backward is in selected importance of significant scenes." I would add that Betrayal seems one of the most eco-

Betrayal works, however, because Pinter has a dramatic clarity and organization that is beautifully conceived. As the author noted in an interview: "We see the story move from the point

nomical works of Pinter; we can almost see the bones, as it were, of the script. Both director and screenwriter are aided by a uniformly fine cast, especially Ben Kingsley, who worked on *Betrayal* and *Gandhi* almost simultaneously. *Betrayal* is certainly one of the most adult dissections of the destruction of friendships and important marital values, but it is not without faults, especially in character motivation.

In the early 1960s, Pinter wrote an original script for the film, *The Pumpkin Eater*, which starred Anne Bancroft and still seems to me an immensely honest, literate portrait of sexual conflicts in a marriage. In that film, Pinter tried to use conventional dramatic narrative methods and failed rather badly. There were, in other words, many instances where much of the action in the film had no apparent motivation. As I noted at the beginning of this review, *Betrayal* doesn't use conventional narrative

methods, but it does feel diluted in parts. I was moved by the film, yet I never fully recognized the characters. Consequently, the ending, which technically might have been called a climax, felt like an anti-climax: Characters and situations seemed to disappear. Admittedly, I don't think this flaw is serious enough to ruin the film, but it does

point to very obvious strengths and weaknesses in Pinter's work in general. His characters have emotional content, yet at times the feelings presented are unspecified and trivialized. Betrayal is an honest work, and sure of itself technically, but its coldness and ambiguity may leave some viewers uncomfortable.





ESPADRILLES IN THE PARK

Neil Simon films are similar to that famous junk food—Cracker Jacks: Not everyone wants it. Sometimes you get "something inside" that you enjoy, and for those who crave a sugar-free diet—they avoid the sucrose. In Max Dugan Returns, I found a Saturday night special which should be as popular as Goodbye Girl and Barefoot in the Park

(and yes, Mr. Movies enjoys a box of "C.J." when hips permit.)

This fancy fantasy has a generous helping of "Gosh, I wish that would happen to me" scenario, which is about a teacher's long forgotten father who decides to spend his slippery-hand fortune on his only known heirs in return for their affection in his dying days. As Moon Zappa would say: "I'm sure!" Ignore her. With all the eyebrow plucking drama of life, who doesn't need a laugh? Save your technical points for Film 101.

Both Marsha Mason (Nora McPhee) and Donald Sutherland (Brian Costello) keep up with the script and prevent their characters from going soft. Jason Robards (Max Dugan) has too much style and not enough rogue to play an ex-con on the run: It's like watching Olivier do Al Capone. Matthew Broderick (Michael McPhee) makes his film debut in a pair of boxer shorts, and his role does not get to be much more stimulating than that.

Free from those awful monologues about living and nauseous sentimental moments, Max Dugan Returns keeps the action and banter frothy till the end. Give it three stars.

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

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

SHOWBIZ MELANGE — The saga of Liz and Dick goes on and on, and we all just eat it up, don't we? When illness forced Elizabeth Taylor to miss performances during the 1980 Broadway revival of The Little Foxes, insurance payments amounting to \$300,000 were paid, and when Richard Burton had to back out of the revival of Camelot last year, a reported \$1,200,000 in insurance payments were paid. Now Taylor and Burton are coming to Broadway together in a revival of Noel Coward's Private Lives, a play about two ex-lovers who have new mates but are dving to get back together. (At one point the script calls for Liz to say: "I believe in being

kind to everyone and giving money to old beggar women and being as gay as possible.") According to Variety, Burton and the ex-Mrs. Burton are insured for \$3,250,000, an all-time record for the stage. The show opens May 8. . . . Remember Mickey Dolenz of the Monkees? He's been living in London for over five years, and during that time he has become a successful TV director and producer. Currently going by the name Michael Dolenz, he is adapting the Alan Parker film Bugsy Malone as a stage musical which he hopes to bring to Broadway after a London run. ... The next Blake Edwards film, The Man Who Loved Women, pairs Mrs. Edwards (Julie Andrews) with Burt Reynolds for the first time. . . . Fave Dunaway has a role in Supergirl, which goes before the cameras this spring.... Dan Aykroyd's latest film Doctor Detroit opens May 16. The supporting cast includes Howard Hessman and James Brown. . . . Matt Dillon, currently the "hottest" teenager in the movies, is the star of Francis Ford Coppola's new (and rather unheralded for a Coppola film) The Outsiders, based on S.E. Hinton's novel. Dillon has also starred in film versions of two other Hinton books-Tex







and Rumble Fish.... Are you ready for Dallas: The Movie? Yes, it's true, and we'll probably get it sometime next year.

SWINGER - Ever since the silent film Tarzan of the Apes, with Elmo Lincoln in the title role, opened in January of 1918, movie audiences have been continuously fascinated by Edgar Rice Burroughs' legendary loin-clothed jungle hero. To date, around 15 actors and non-actors have portrayed Tarzan, with some of the more notable specimens of male pulchritude being Buster Crabbe, Johnny Weissmuller, Lex Barker, Gordon Scott, Jock Mahoney, Mike Henry, and, on television, Ron Ely, who later turned up as host of a TV game show. Of course the most popular of all the screen Tarzans was Weissmuller, who appeared regularly in the role from 1932's Tarzan, the Ape Man to 1948's Tarzan and the Mermaids, and a particularly low point in Tarzan's screen history came in 1981 with John and Bo Derek's rotten (but commercial-

ly successful) remake of Tarzan, the Ape Man, which featured Miles O'Keefe in a bit role as Tarzan. Now, more than half a century after the first Tarzan film. we may be getting the most "authentic" version yet. Hugh Hudson, director of the Oscar-winning Chariots of Fire. is preparing Greystoke: The Legend of Tarzan, Lord of the Apes, an epic Warner Bros. film which, unlike previous versions, promises to remain faithful to Burroughs' original story. It's the story of an aristocrat who is raised by African apes, and who later returns to his home in Scotland to resume his position in Edwardian society. At one point the title character, portrayed by newcomer Christopher Lambert, says: "Half of me is the Earl of Greystoke, and half of me is wild." Sounds intriguing.

IN MEMORIAM — Arthur Godfrey, whose folksy, good-natured persona was the mainstay of such 1950s television programs as Arthur Godfrey's Talent Scouts (1948-1958), Arthur Godfrev and His Friends (1949-1959), and Arthur Godfrey and His Ukulele, (1950), died March 16 at the age of 79. Godfrey had been a top radio star in the late 1940s, and by the mid-50s his familiar TV image had become somewhat tarnished by a tendency to fire regular performers from his programs. The most dramatic of these incidents came in October 1953 when he fired singer Julius LaRosa on-the-air, during a segment of Arthur Godfrey and His Friends. 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
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nce upon a time, in the kingdom of

On the night of the royal function, everyone was in a festive mood. The music and the merriment had risen to a fever pitch. Everybody was there, including the poisoned subject.



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
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

To audition for the Montrose Singers, Mr. Albert has found that, rather than the uncomfortable ordeal of making an



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




