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
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
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

ALGPC BENEFIT AT THE RITZ

AUSTIN — On March 22, the Austin Lesbian/Gay Political Caucus (ALGPC) hosted a fundraising entertainment extravaganza at the Ritz Theatre, to raise campaign funds for Austin's endorsed city council candidates Larry Deuser, Roger Duncan, Sally Shipman, Leda Roselle, John Trevino and Charles Urdy, Places 1-6 respectively.

Singer Boyd Vance (who later brought down the house with "Yo Feets Too Big") opened the evening, accompanied by Giovanni Voltaggio, followed by songstress Nancy Scott, a skit by "Word of Mouth," and excerpts from "God Bless You, Dahlings!" by Leo Lerma

Mayor pro tem and Place 5 candidate John Trevino then took the stage and spoke on the fair housing election. He said that not only politicians, but the majority of the people of Austin put themselves on the line for us! "Our city leads the way in Texas, showing that we can all live together in harmony," he added.

More entertainment followed with powerful vocals by Deborah Dew, with Ed Greer, and writer/actress Kathy Kendall doing two characters from her onewoman show "Characters!"

Larry Deuser discussed the issues of the campaign and said that absenteeism would play a major role in the election due to its falling on Easter weekend. "I urge anyone who will not be in town to vote absentee," he told Scott Taylor of TWT NEWS.

ANOTHER LAME SEX BILL

AUSTIN — Another of those lame and ludicrous bills, written in a frenzy, regarding sex, has been introduced into the Texas Legislature this session. State Senator Hector Uribe, of Brownsville, has introduced Senate Bill 258, which would give the law the authority to arrest any person known to be infected with a venereal disease or "reasonably suspected" thereof.

A person could be arrested by a peace officer and be immediately transported to the nearest VD clinic for examination and treatment. "There is much potential for law abuse in this bill." TWT NEWS was told.

As columnist Doug Harland of San Antonio put it, "Suppose you've been falsely named as a sexual partner of someone with VD. You've explained to the public health officials who contacted you that an error has been made, and, as a matter of principle, you have politely informed them you will neither go to the clinic for an examination nor authorize your physician to provide them with test results.

"... There's nothing funny about the penalty, though. If you fail to obey the health department's order to be examined, you have committed a crime punishable by a jail term up to 180 days and/or a fine up to \$1,000."

Like a similarly frenzied bill on "touching sex," this bill too will most likely get shot down unless the irrational have their way on Capitol Hill in Austin.

AUSTIN MAYOR NO ENDORSEMENTS

AUSTIN — TWT NEWS has learned of a clarification in this city's mayoral race. As reported earlier this month, the Austin Lesbian/Gay Political Caucus (ALGPC) decided to make no endorsements in the election to be held April 2.

The decision was whether to endorse Ron Mullen or Lowell Lebermann. "The membership voted almost unanimously for a motion to make no endorsement for mayor, since neither candidate was deemed worthy of the financial and volunteer support of ALGPC," member Rod Florence explained.

Mary Summerall, ALGPC publicity chair, further clarified the matter by telling TWT NEWS, "The vote in the caucus about the mayoral race was between endorsing Ron Mullen or making no endorsement at all.

"At the general membership meeting, at which endorsements were considered, the majority of caucus members in attendance voted to make no endorsement," Summerall added. "The remaining votes were cast in favor of endorsing Ron Mullen."

Contrary to earlier reports, the vote was not "too close to call" between Mullen and Lebermann.

Although ALGPC did not endorse in the mayoral race, TWT NEWS had learned that several gay bar owners were backing Lebermann. Meanwhile, Mullen was actively seeking the gay vote.

CITY COUNCIL AUSTIN GAY VOTE

AUSTIN — Although there is no official endorsement for mayor in this Saturday's city election, ALGPC has informed TWT NEWS of six city council endorsements.

Place 1 — Larry Deuser, Place 2 — Roger Duncan, Place 3 — Sally Shipman, Place 4 — Leda Roselle, Place 5 — John Trevino, and Place 6 — Charles Urdy.

Although Mark Spaeth did not receive the ALGPC endorsement for

Place 4, he is actively seeking the gay capitol city bloc vote stating that he "is sensitive to all the interests of the community."

CITY COUNCIL DALLAS GAY VOTE

DALLAS — There are eight candidates endorsed by DGPC for the ten city council races up for vote in this Saturday's city election.

For the two at-large seats, DGPC endorsed Dr. Marvin Robinson for District 9 and Annette Strauss for District 10.

In single seat districts, DGPC informed TWT NEWS of the following endorsements for city council.

District 1 — Helen Giddings and James Hart are co-endorsed, District 2 — incumbent Ricardo Medrano, District 5 — Craig Holcomb with Tex Aymond as a runoff choice, District 6 — Elise Faye Heggins, and District 8 — incumbent Fred Blair.

DGPC made no endorsements in Districts 3, 4, and 7.

DALLAS MAYOR NO ENDORSEMENTS

DALLAS — This city's Gay Political Caucus has opted to make no endorsement in the mayoral race for the upcoming April 2 city election.

TWT NEWS learned that, although Wes Wise and A. Strake Taylor both returned their DGPC screening questionnaires, their answers were not worthy of an endorsement.

Neither Wise nor Taylor appeared at the meeting, nor sent a campaign spokesperson or representative to talk with DGPC members.

It was noted that both candidates had made unfavorable remarks about the hiring of gays for city jobs, such as police and fire department positions.

Taylor was quoted in the Dallas Times Herald as saying, "As mayor, I would push the chief of police as hard as I could . . . to see that gays are not hired by the police department."

Wise, somewhat softer on the issue, was quoted, "I don't think there's any

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public official who can deny that the gay community is a potent factor in political campaigns. On the other hand, the gay endorsement may rouse the ire of voters who are offended by politicians who appeal to homosexuals."

Thus, of the two leading contenders in the mayoral race, one is on record for denying employment on sexual preference, while the other is on record as hedging the issue.

To have endorsed one of the other weaker running mayoral candidates would have diluted DGPC's endorsement clout.

"It's too bad we don't have a clear cut favorite candidate for the mayoral race here in Dallas," TWT NEWS was told.

SAN ANTONIO'S GAY BLOC VOTE

SAN ANTONIO — Clark Niblock, treasurer of the newly-formed Alamo Human Rights Committee (AHRC) has informed TWT NEWS of this city's first endorsements based on candidates' response to questioning and screening prior to the city election this Saturday, April 2.

AHRC has announced endorsement results in both the city council and mayoral races.

Mayor-no endorsement.

City Council, District 1—Maria Berriozabal is endorsed by AHRC.

City Council, District 2—no endorsement.

City Council, District 3—no official endorsement; however, Helen Dutmar "is acceptable to AHRC."

City Council, District 4—no endorsement.

City Council, District 5—no official endorsement; however, Bernardo Eureste and Joe Paez "are both acceptable to AHRC."

City Council, District 6—no official endorsement; however, Pablo Escamilla "is acceptable to AHRC."

City Council, District 7—no official endorsement; however, Frank Sepeda "is acceptable to AHRC."

City Council, District 8—no endorsement.

City Council, District 9—no endorsement. "Van Henry Archer is unacceptable to AHRC." (Archer is on record for recommending that all homosexuals who are arrested should be locked in cages while in jail.)

City Council, District 10—no endorsement.

San Antonio's gay community is urged to vote the AHRC gay endorsement slate in this Saturday's city election, as Alamo City registered voters launch this city's first gay bloc vote.

ASSAULTERS GET FIVE YEARS

HOUSTON — Last December, Melvin Roy Wells, 25, was sexually assaulted in City Jail by two men. Consequently, Wells sued the city and its police department, saying, "negligence allowed the attack," and that his "screams for help went unanswered by the jailers."


Last week, the case went to court. District Judge Carroll Weaver sentenced the assaulters to five years in prison after they pleaded guilty to being responsible for the December 27 offense.

Convicted of aggravated sex abuse were Leo Pharms, 20, and Kenneth Washington, 18. TWT NEWS learned that the pair beat and sodomized their new cellmate.

Washington was in jail at the time of the assault on another assault charge. Pharms was in jail on a public intoxication charge.

VIDEO OF GREAT DEBATE

The Great Debate concerned that age-old question of homosexuality and the Bible. Dr. Ralph Blair, founder of Evangelicals Concerned, a gay religious support group based in New York, debated with Evangelist Dan Billingsly of the Denton University Church of Christ.

The attendance, as TWT NEWS reported earlier this month, may well have been the largest at an informational discussion on homosexuality in North Texas.

STRIKING DOWN HOUSE BILL 2138

AUSTIN — House Bill 2138, authored by Republican state representative Bill Ceverha of Richardson "has not yet been referred to committee," Pat Cramer, co-chair of Lesbian Gay Rights Advocates, has informed TWT NEWS.

Although many people find the bill ridiculous, and most likely it is, "we are still going to have to worry about it," Cramer explained. "It could come up for a vote!"

As reported last week by TWT NEWS, the bill seeks to define deviate sexual intercourse, sexual contact, and homosexual conduct. Cramer also seeks to add these new definitions to penal code 21.06 which is under appeal. The new sections would include "offering, agreeing, or soliciting," such as asking to hold your hand or asking for a kiss.

As frenzied as the bill is, it could get past committee and reach the floor for a vote. Ceverha has been sending out letters to new freshman representatives seeking their co-sponsorship, TWT NEWS has learned from our gay lobby in Austin.

To help stop this bill before it has a chance to be voted on, TWT NEWS urges all concerned citizens to write their state representative. "You don't have to identify yourself as being gay," lobbiest Bettie Naylor outlined to TWT NEWS.

When you write to Austin, mention that you don't agree with Ceverha's bill, that you think it might be unconstitutional, and that you believe it smacks at human rights.

TURTLE CREEK CHORALE SEARCH

DALLAS — The Turtle Creek Chorale (TCC) is beginning a search for its Musical Director and Conductor, currently held by Richard Fleming. "His full-time position requires more and more of his time and energy, but he will continue through this season, ending in July," the Search Committee explained to TWT NEWS.

The TCC Musical Director and Conductor is a paid position. The qualified candidate should have a full-time job or source of income. The applicant also should have strong choral conducting experience and diverse conducting skills to be able to lead the award-winning 80-voices in classical works to pop selections.

Resumes, including salary requirements, should be submitted to the TCC Search Committee, P.O. Box 190806, Dallas, Texas 75219.

CAMPAIGN FUND SEEKS DIRECTOR

WASHINGTON, DC — The Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF) has informed Larry Bagneris, Jr., president of Houston's Gay Political Caucus, that the national political action committee of HRCF is seeking an executive director. The director's office would be based in the nation's capitol.

The responsibilities of the position include major day-to-day management and fundraising operations. Good organizing and management skills plus a background in fundraising are required.

A salary of up to \$30,000 plus benefits was outlined. TWT NEWS was advised that applicants should send their resume by no later than May 1 to the Search Committee, HRCF, Box 1396, Washington, DC 20013.



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
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

That is the way of politics if you are a member of a minority.

To those who do not agree with certain endorsements: Your chance to make comments and express opinions and vote for or against candidates ended when the Candidates' Night of the GPC came to a close. Every member of the GPC, and that is every member of the DGA, had the opportunity to speak and to vote for or against an endorsement. Now the endorsements have been made in Dallas and no gay person should vote otherwise. If you vote against the slate sheet, you vote straight, you vote for oppression. Our strength shows in the cold, hard vote tallies election night. A number in the column of the candidates' other than our endorsees, however well meant those votes, shows up as opposition to gay rights ...

Gay rights come from gay power.
Perhaps some day we will be able to identify our economic power and use it to secure our rights. For now, however, gay power comes from gay bloc voting. We have no other alternative.


"So?" Marge asked. "Don't they have a key?"

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

The Gay of Cooking, by the Kitchen Fairy; 187 pp.; index; Fairy Publications, P.O. Box 450, Laguna Beach, California 92652; softbound, loose-leaf, \$12.45.

With this weighty little tome, the Kitchen Fairy instructs and entertains us on the art and joy of cooking gay. He adds a whole other dimension to cooking with the foreplay...uh...word-play he uses when describing how to make some real food, such as "Whipping, beating, creaming, kneading, rising, pinching, skinning, boning, hardening, softening, rubbing, etc." His puns can be downright pornographic as he renames certain dishes concocted for this book. Fortunately, the "straight talk" translation is included.

There are several ways to savor the pleasures of the verbal, and herbal,

delicacies within. One could read the cookbook through once completely, deriving all the humor available. Or, one could choose to try one recipe at a time, and be entertained over a longer period. But I will say, once you begin reading, just like in the potato chip commercial, you may not be able to read just one. The Kitchen Fairy is simply tres gay and outrageous.

Each section representing one of the various food groups also has their own gay title and what he comes with—I mean, comes up with—is enough to make you laugh hard enough to forget about eating... well, almost. As you might guess, the novelty of the format may have worn off after about the hundredth page, but the good Kitchen Fairy knows this and does not repeat himself or maintain his constant pun-running (as in the beginning).

The index is at the back of the book (as it should be), with the "straight" translations of all the dishes described. Recipes for various cocktails are here also. Appetizers, dips and other delicacies for brunches can be whipped up with his suggestions.

You may be surprised at the variety of foods, the words he uses to describe them and the creativity he has in thinking them up (the names, of course!) He advocates fresh foods, and has recipes with inexpensive meats like ground round as well as the more expensive, such as veal scallops. He supplies preparation time as well as cooking time for each recipe, the ingredients (I hope!), and simple instructions on preparation and a serving suggestion.

This is the real answer to the book Real Men Don't Eat Quiche. The tone the Kitchen Fairy uses with the reader is like a conversation between two close "queens" and indulges in the flaming faggot argot shamefully (that's not escargot, now). What may appeal to the reader the most is his ability to parody and imitate a certain stereotype with relish (or your favorite condiment).

But don't be mistaken: These recipes are not just a vehicle for a lot of jokes and puns; for every bit of humor you may find, he uses it often as sugar on top of excellent advice and tips.

I can't resist. Here are a few of the section titles—on meats: "Put your money where your meat is!"; on seafood: "Sailors are the fruits of the sea!"; on vegetables: "Fruits should eat their vegetables!"; and on salads: "There's always time to toss off a quick one!" His ingenuity in making new names out of old is just as astonishing as his jokes, such as "Asspairagrasp salad" for asparagus salad. Cooking will never be the same after this.

The Gay of Cooking is comprehensive in scope. There are individual sections of recipes on various meats, poultry and seafood, on hors d'oeuvres, and desserts. The recipes range from the "quick-and-easy" to the more elaborate dishes. Everyone could take advantage of his recipes here, even those who say they can't cook.

For those who wish to expand their gay consciousness to the realm of food to truly become a gay-identified person, remember, you are what you eat, so, to be gay you must eat gay. This book is your best guide to this goal. (And for any of you out there who have any doubts about my last paragraph . . . APRIL FOOL!!)

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
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

Tough Enough is deja vu from "a" to "z." It is what one might call an ultralight, non-demanding "feel-good" flick. The crowd at the preview performance I attended was exuberant and possibly into S & M, for they obviously tried hard to clap their hands sore.

Dennis Quaid, in the lead role, is terribly handsome as an idealistic country & western singer/songwriter who, to haul in some bread, enters the Toughman boxing contest in Fort Worth. This fast-loot competition for bloody amateurs attracts the kind of roughnecks and mean oddballs that would perfectly fit the bill of any ordinary semi-rigged wrestling event. After what I saw in the three Rockys, Raging Bull, The Champ, and recently,

the disappointing Sting II, I must admit that fight coordinator Jimmy Nickerson has come up with some different stunts in the ring that range from wildly amusing and original to grotesque. Too bad that in this type of movie, from the instant that the first jab lands on target, you know who will go all the way. Quaid, nicknamed the "Country & Western Warrior," eventually introduces his evil final opponent, the ugly and fat "Albanian Aggressor" to the cold, hard canvas. The action moves on to Detroit for the super tournament with a \$100,000 pot. In between, you have some routine reservations against this violent means of making money, which are voiced mainly by Quaid's wife (played plain-Janely and teary-eyed by newcomer Carlene Watkins). Nothing in

the story itself is new or out of the ordinary; no shame is felt in mocking Rocky with a non-satirical jogging sequence with a sightseer's background of Motown (promotional fee paid by the city of Detroit, I'm sure). At least they spare us the raw-egg gulping routine

The next showdown occurs when the "C&W Warrior" encounters Gay Bob (Eli Cummins), who represents the not-so-butch hair dressers of San Francisco. The preview spectators proved their redneckish tendencies by rooting in this fight shamelessly for the irresistibly gorgeous straight man. But surprisingly, Gay Bob's wrist is strong enough to support a smacking fist that floors the "Warrior." The jurors can only come up with a split decision, and Quaid moves on to face other increas-

ingly rude and nasty adversaries.

Houstonian Dennis Quaid (Breaking Away and the soon-to-be-released 3-D spectacle Jaws III) is a likeable and talented young actor who wrote some of the movie's so-so scores and performs them with hard-to-resist boyish charm. The late Warren Oates (The Wild Bunch, Badlands, The Border), in one of his final appearances, adds some spice to an only somewhat intricate role-that of Neese, the controversial fight promoter. It feels good to see a black actor as the unselfish coach of the stubborn WASP gladiator. Stan Shaw gets all the mileage out of this not-at-all deeply defined part.

All in all, Richard O. Fleisher's film is quite enjoyable, yet equally forget-table. If all you want is having a good time killing time, this one's for you.

snorted, and did everything short of grabbing Mr. Movies' box of popcorn to throw at the screen.


Clue 6: Some people left the theater during a man-made intermission.



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

CHUCK NORIS

WORLD CHAMPION MARTIAL ARTS EXPERT AND ACTOR

Chuck Norris has starred in a number of martial arts movies including A Force of One, Good Guys Wear Black, Silent Rage, An Eye for An Eye, Breaker, Breaker, and The Octogon, which grossed over \$200 million worldwide. He retired as professional World Champion in Karate, a title he won in 1968 and held, undefeated, until 1974. He is a black belt in Tand Soo Do and Tae Kwan Do (both Korean fighting styles) and reigned as Black Belt Magazine's "Fighter of the Year".

TWT's Entertainment Editor, Rob Clark, along with Features Editor Blase DiStefano met with Mr. Norris in his hotel suite to discuss his new movie Lone Wolf McQuade, in which he co-stars with David Carradine of Kung-Fu fame. The following are excerpts of our conversation with Chuck Norris regarding his new film which was filmed in El Paso. Texas.



HIS STYLE — People compare the types of characters I play to John Wayne and Clint Eastwood which I find very flattering. The difference, however, is that I use my hands as a weapon instead of a gun. Luckily, I have an audience who will come to see my movie because it's an action movie and not just a martial arts film.

DAVID CARRADINE — At first we didn't know if we could get David because he's used to playing a good guy. In this movie he's the antagonist. He did agree to do the movie as long as the script did not call for me to kill him in the end. I wouldn't have done it anyway.

VIOLENCE — I'm actually very antiviolent. There's a difference between violence and action. You don't have to resort to blood and gore to make a movie exciting. NO STUNTMEN — David and I both did our own stunts in the movie. The only problem was that David is good at learning how to do the martial techniques, but he didn't know how to control those techniques. I never allow any hits in the face because if you bust a lip or something, it holds up production. In one scene, David was supposed to give me a kick in the side, but we



couldn't get it right. It took twelve takes to finally get it, and that's really hard on your body. But, we did it. We had to teach David to fake the hits more because he was really hurting us. When you see the movie, notice one scene where David knocks down the girl playing my daughter. Well, that's not fake. But, he didn't mean to do it.

HOW HE GOT STARTED - I was the World Champion in Karate from 1968 to 1974, and I wanted to continue in the martial arts, but I had to find a way to put it to use. I did that movie with Bruce Lee called Return of the Dragon and that sparked my interest. Steve McQueen was a student of mine so I talked to him about acting. I started acting school, thought of a story and found a writer. The problem was finding a producer for my first film, Good Guys Wear Black. They kept saying, "Chuck, you're an athlete, not an actor." The way I finally found a producer was by selling them on the idea that since I had retired and there were four million people in the karate field who were familiar with my name, they would see me perform again but this time on the screen. The first movie was hard to get distributed but, after that, the rest fell into

HIS PAST — I was a very insecure, non-athletic person, you could imagine. I grew up in Oklahoma on welfare for ten years with no father. Now I'm a world champion and an actor. I still can't believe it, but I always told my students where I came from so that they could realize they could make it also. You must have a positive attitude. You must have a goal and a determination to reach that goal.

DEALING WITH CHALLENGERS — I've never been in a street fight or barroom brawl or any of that. If I know some guy has a chip on his shoulder and wants me to try and knock it off, I simply talk to him and find out why he has this bad attitude. It has never once failed; they always became my friend. You'll find that true in most things in life. It all depends on your positive attitude.



Originally, Margie Adam intended to be a "behind the scenes person." She thought her life's destiny was to be a songwriter, not a performer. Her life was significantly changed in 1973, when she performed for the first time at a women's music festival in California organized by Kate Millet, Her intent in performing was to interest fellow artists in her work.

Much to her surprise, the audience overwhelmingly responded positively to her performance. One thing led to another, and she became Margie Adam, singer/pianist/songwriter -PERFORMER.

In response to demand from a faithful following, she teamed up with Barbara Price to form Pleiades Records. Her first album, Margie Adam, Songwriter, was a collection of her favorite songs which represented a cross section of her abilities.

Following the popular acceptance of her first album, she produced a second album entitled Naked Keys, a collection of eleven evocative piano pieces.

Adam recorded Naked Keys in order to establish herself as an instrumentalist in addition to being a singer. Her most demanding album and third release, We Shall Go Forth, was recorded live in San Francisco in 1982, during a series of concerts produced by Barbara Price and Women In Production.

This album was recorded in response to the Equal Rights Amendment. Its release was scheduled the first day after the deadline for ratification of the E.R.A. It was a direct response to those who claimed the women's and social movement had ceased to exist.

She presently has plans for a fourth album, Here's A Lovesong, an album of "unmittigated mush." Release of the album is tentatively scheduled for Fall,

The daughter of a songwriting newspaper publisher and a classical planist and organist, Adam was raised to appreciate music. She began playing the piano when she was five and started arranging and composing during her teenage years. By her senior year in high school, she had written numerous instrumentals and a full concerto.

Uncomfortable with the idea of being an act which would be repeated over and over, Adam decided to be herself on stage and speak from her heart. In return for risking herself, a unique, wonderful, vibrant communication exists between the audience and Adam.

"In a concert situation, with a microphone and sound system filling the room with my music and all those lights on me, I had a tremendous amount of power. At some point early on, I chose to take responsibility for that reality-to create an environment where power was more equally distributed between the audience and me. I wanted people to know that I was a fellow traveler with them, a woman in process, and that it was very important for me to connect with them in the short time we had together," said Adam.

LENA HORNE:

The Lady and Her Music

Charley Barnet offered Lena Horne her first big break in 1940 when he hired her to sing with the "swing" bands of that era. She became a frequent target of insults from whites who weren't quite ready for integration. She was eventually discovered by an MGM agent who promptly signed her to a long-term contract. Her only starring roles were in all-black movies, such as Stormy Weather and Cabin in the Sky. Fighting society's prejudice of the time, Ms. Horne fought her way to the top as a world-renowned musical entertainer.

We recently spoke with Ms. Horne in the press room at Houston's Jones Hall where she is currently performing her multi-award winning musical, Lena Horne: The Lady and Her Music. The eternally beautiful lady graciously agreed to a lifteen-minute interview, after which she immediately resumed rehearsal for the evening's performance of her show.

TWT — Ms. Horne, how does it feel being a living legend?

Lena — Oh, please! I haven't been able to answer that question yet. I think what you really mean is survival. I've been around quite a while. It feels good to have lived this long. [Ms. Horne is 65 years of age.]

Do you find women intimidated by your lasting beauty?

I think women shouldn't be that insecure. I always wanted to have a better figure, and to sing like Aretha Franklin. I had none of those things and I made it, so I think it's silly for women to want to be like me. People ask if I use Oil of Olay or something. I use Vaseline myself.

How do you make it through your two-hour show?

I'm at ease there on stage. It's before and after that gets to me. I feel most comfortable with the audience. Usually Saturday nights are the most difficult for me because the men have been watching the games all afternoon and they would rather see 42nd Street but they come anyway with the attitude of, "All right, let's see what she can do. Come on and entertain me, I'm tired." That means I have to do 90% of the work and they do ten. Really. Other nights, it's 50/50. It's a state of mind really. I draw my energy from my audience.


Do you accept the fact that you paved the way for other black performers?

There was Bessie Smith and other black female singers, so I'm a "Johnnycome-lately." Really.

Have you had any other film offers since The Wiz?

Oh, I've had lots of offers to be people's mothers and grandmothers. I wouldn't mind playing Billy Dee Williams' mother. He's almost as pretty as my son was. I'm not that anxious. I've been reading some, but it's mostly monkey-see-monkey-do stuff.

twelve years ago after the tragedies that struck you? [Ms. Horne lost her son, father, and husband within a 13-month period.]

I have no idea. It must be the way everybody else does. They were three people I respected and loved a lot, but the Man upstairs takes care of all that. You know, you grieve but you put it to use. It's a positive thing sometimes. I learned from them all, they talked to me a lot. I wasn't left like the woman who wants to leave her husband because he abuses her, but she doesn't know where to go. They taught me to work and survive.

Have you gotten your driver's license yet?

No. I don't know how to drive. I really should get one. Sometimes when I go to cash a check they ask for my license, so I have to do without the money.

What are some of your other interests besides theatre?

Worrying. Worrying about my grandchildren, worrying about my daughter. I love to worry.

Do you admire any particular entertainers?

I love anything Lionel Ritchie does. I like Michael Jackson. I think he's going to be a bigger, bigger star than he is now. I'm not crazy about Guy Lombardo.

Why did you make an appearance on Sanford and Son a while back?

Redd [Foxx] has been a friend of mine before he became famous to the world. I was just happy to be working with an old friend.

You've always been very vocal concerning civil rights. Would you comment?

I had a very militant grandmother who always taught me I was just as good as everybody else. Remember, when I first started performing, we [blacks] couldn't even swim in the same swimming pool as everybody else. I used to insist on contractual assurances that blacks be admitted to my performances.

How did you get into show business?

I didn't know how to do anything else. When I was 16, my mother became very ill and someone had to work. I was hired at that time because I was young and cute. I sang in the chorus at a place called the Cotton Club in Harlem. My mother always wanted to be an actress. I never did, but I got into it and here I am.

If you had to do over again, would you change anything?

I wouldn't change so much; I'd want society to be different. Some white, as well as black, leaders made mistakes along the way. It's all very romantic, what I'd like to see. I'd like to see all people being decent to each other, but that's only something you read about in books obviously.

What do you consider your proudest achievement?

Meeting Mrs. Roosevelt. Do you know who she was? Knowing her meant a great deal to me. And I received an honorary degree from Harvard University. I didn't go to college, but they took me in anyway.

Did you develop any relationships with people from MGM while you were there?

I knew Lana Turner and became good friends with Ava Gardner. I knew to say "hello" to Judy Garland. I developed a close relationship with Vincent Minnelli, Liza's father, who directed Cabin in the Sky. In those days there was a caste system in Hollywood. You only associated with the people who made as much money as you did. I was pretty low on the totem-pole.

What are some of your popular recordings that you enjoy?

I hate my recordings! I do like the "The Lady and Her Music" album. It won a Grammy.

Do you have any advice for a young person starting out in show business today?

I had problems when I started out, but they were different than those they must face today. I would tell them to respect other people, respect drugs, respect their teachers and respect show business.

SHOUBIZ by Jack Varsi

BABY, BABY-During the past quarter of a century probably no record company has produced a body of work as vital and lasting as that of Motown. Originally established in Detroit by Berry Gordy, Motown was by the mid-60s the most consistent producer of hit singles in the world, with constant chart assaults by the likes of Diana Ross and the Supremes, Smokey Robinson and the Miracles, the Four Tops, the Temptations, Marvin Gaye, Martha Reeves and the Vandellas, the Marvelettes, Stevie Wonder, and numerous others. Motown left Detroit over a decade ago, and many of the original stars have long since departed. but the company has continued to exert a major musical influence with the mature Stevie Wonder, and with artists such as the Commodores, Rick James, High Energy, DeBarge, Syreeta. and the solo Lionel Ritchie. Recently, in an unprecedented event, many of

these past and present performers were gathered at the Pasadena Civic Auditorium for a colossal concert celebrating Motown's 25th anniversary, and, lucky for us, the event was taped by NBC-TV for broadcast sometime in May. Among the highlights: a "battle of

the bands" between the Four Tops and the Temptations, a Linda Ronstadt/ Smokey Robinson duet (they both have had hits with Robinson's "Ooo Baby, Baby" and "The Tracks of My Tears"). and film clips from the 1960s. Other quests, such as Dick Clark, Richard Pryor, Billy Dee Williams, Adam Ant. and T.G. Sheppard, also appear in the show, which will probably be made available later on records and videocassette, and all proceeds will be given to the National Association for Sickle Cell Disease. 






A scene from Taking Tiger Mountain

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

"Not exactly," he hedged.


"What do you mean, not exactly? Answer me, dammit!"

"Calm down," said Dr. Manlove. "You won't be a vegetable. Let's just say . . . vou'll be a fruit."


