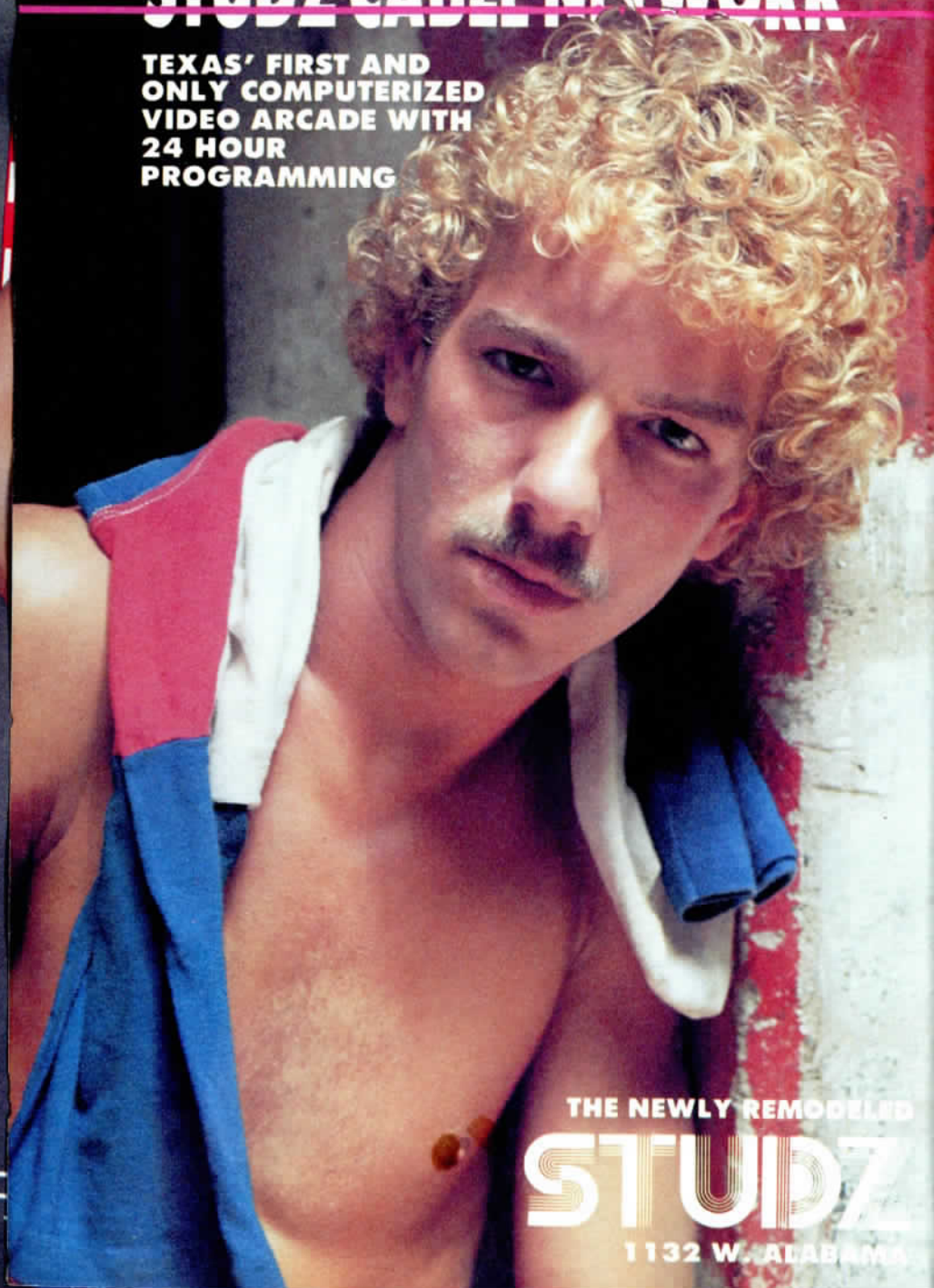
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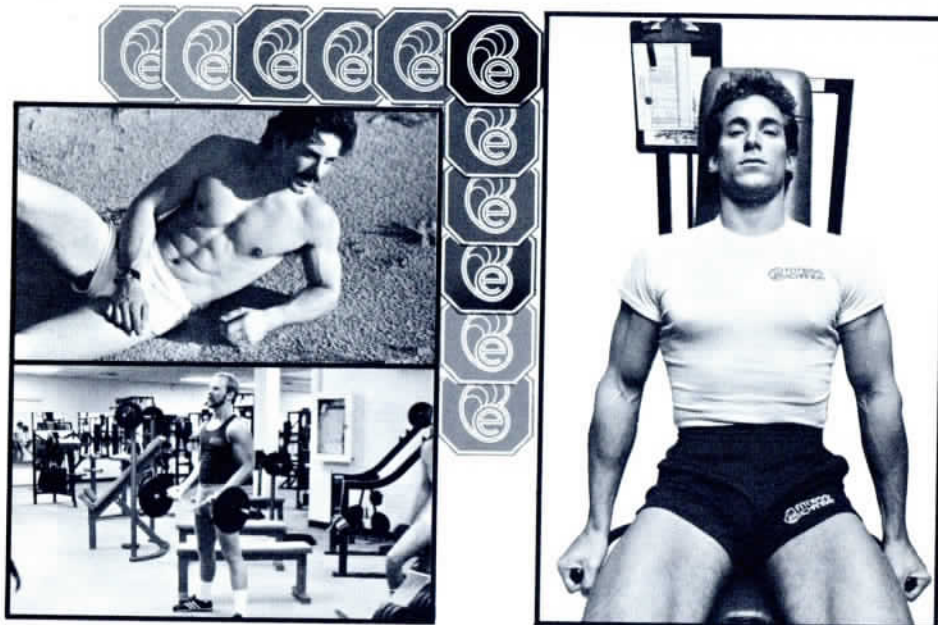
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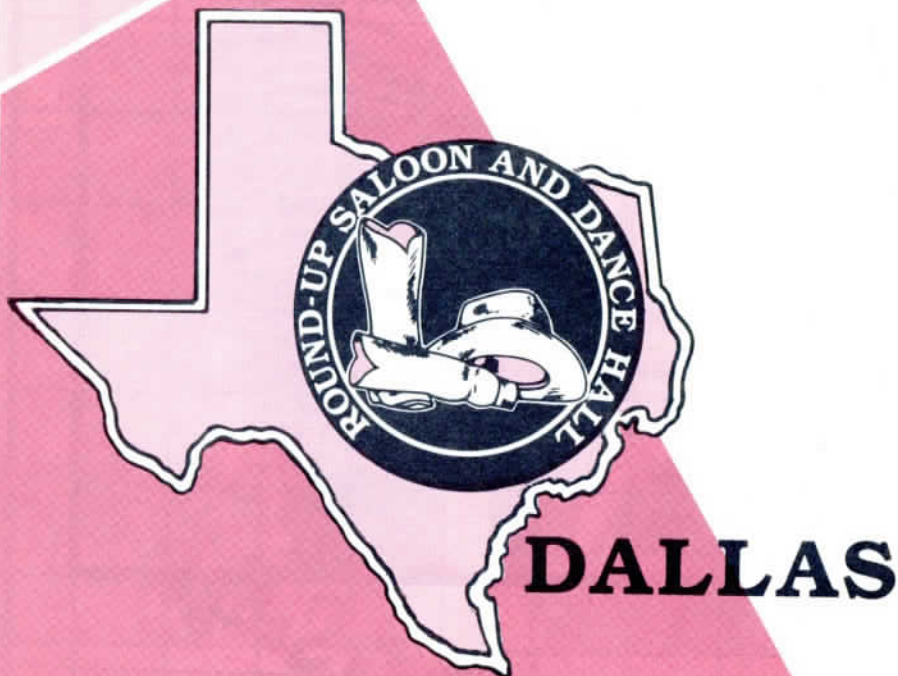

CANDLELIGHT VIGIL FOR AIDS

HOUSTON — Several hundred people carrying candles gathered at the Reflection Pool in front of this city's downtown City Hall last Monday, May 2, in an impressive vigil to memorialize recent AIDS victims and to urge government funding for research for the disease.

City Controller Lance Lalor announced from the steps of City Hall that he had allocated additional money for local needs, which had been included in the city's new budget. Mayor Kathy Whitmire's proclamation announcing "AIDS Awareness Week" was also presented.

The Houston vigil correlated with similar ceremonies in New York City and San Francisco, where mayors Edward Koch and Dianne Feinstein made identical proclamations.

Appearing as an honored speaker at the Houston sharing was Nathan Smith, president of the National Hemophilia Foundation, one of over 20 cosponsors of the ceremony. The Candlelight Vigil in Houston was coordinated by Citizens for Human Equality (CHE) and the Montrose Counseling Center.

On the night of the vigil, the public was also asked to call President Reagan at the White House and urge

the release of additional monies for AIDS research. TWT NEWS learned that the switchboard at the White House was flooded with pleas from concerned citizens. To date, the government's allotment for AIDS research had been less than money allotted for the building of one MX missile.

SAN ANTONIO'S FIRST REPORTED AIDS CASE

SAN ANTONIO — Danny Costilla has become this city's first reported resident AIDS victim, having been diagnosed with Kaposi's Sarcoma. Doctors also believe it is the first case of KS in the Alamo City.

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Costilla's family has appealed to the gay community for financial assistance for their son's medical bills, Jim Hamilton of TWT NEWS reported. The SAFE Committee of SAGA announced they would spearhead a city-wide benefit effort.

Costilla, in his mid-20s, is under the care of Dr. Gus Sicard and is responding favorably to treatment at Baptist Hospital.

AUSTIN'S EARLY AIDS ACTION

AUSTIN — Although the AIDS epidemic has not affected the Capitol City as it has Houston and Dallas, this city's awareness has prompted early positive action to be taken.

Representatives of Austin gay organizations recently met with the City Health Department in order to respond to the potential threat AIDS raises within the community. Health Department employees Sarah Lasater, and Drs. Phil Zbylot and Todd Bagwell composed the text for a Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD) pamphlet aimed at gay men which included a section on AIDS.

Representatives from the Gay Students Association (GSA), Metropolitan Community Church of Austin, Dignity, Gay Nurses Alliance, American Gay Atheists and the Austin Lesbian/Gay Political Caucus (ALGPC) were asked to give suggestions as to the tone of the pamphlet. The pamphlet is presently available from the Health Department and at selected organizations and businesses, ALGPC told TWT NEWS.

In addition, a forum sponsored by GSA and the University of Texas' Physical and Health Education Department, with the assistance of the Health Department, was presented on Thursday, April 28 at Belmont Hall. A panel composed of various medical authorities examined what is known about AIDS and provided an opportunity for questions.

The ALGPC also has laid plans for a Blood Drive on May 22 from 3:30pm to

6:00pm at the Congregational Church on 23rd Street.

Austin citizens concerned about their health as it pertains to AIDS or any sexually transmitted diseases should contact the city's STD Clinic at 15 Waller St. or phone them at (512) 480-8555, ext. 241 for an appointment or ext. 243 for information.

HPD CHIEF BROWN BIG FIRST YEAR

HOUSTON — It's been a big first year for Houston Police Chief Lee Brown, GPC was told at an April 20 meeting. The guest speaker was George Greanias, District C, of Houston's city council. Greanias spoke of Brown's four big accomplishments for gays, which Brown has attained in his first year as Houston's police chief.

"In the first place, Brown has gotten rid of all those questions about sexuality on the HPD polygraph," Greanias stated.

"Secondly, he has established a Lesbian/Gay Task Force, as he did in Atlanta. And, he meets regularly with your [gay] task force.

"Thirdly, Brown has increased the educational aspects in police cadet training. The curriculum, coordinated by non-gay John Mathews, now includes a four-hour course entitled 'Coping With Cultural Stress,' which pertains to improving a patrolman's attitude when dealing with gays," Greanias outlined.

"There is also a large section dealing with gays in the 'Cultural Awareness' curriculum. All of these things were not possible prior to Brown," he explained.

Brown's fourth major accomplishment for all minorities, including the gay community, was his order to police officers "not to arrest citizens on Class C misdemeanors. It was these small infractions which had left the door open for policemen to harass gays."

"You're going to see more substantial changes at HPD," Greanias con-



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tinued, adding, "We are fortunate to have Brown as our police chief."

Greanias concluded by saying, "I have always been proud of my support by the gay community and by GPC. Without your votes, I would not have won that close race. It's a warmth and emotion I shall always feel for you."

Larry Bagneris, president of GPC, pronounced, "We are fortunate to have a man like George Greanias as our Montrose City Councilman."

LESBIAN MOTHERS GROUP FORMING

HOUSTON — Because lesbian mothers have a unique position and unique problems in our society, a new support group, Choices for Lesbian Mothers, is now forming at the grass roots level.

A calendar of free and low-cost forms of entertainment and activities are to be created, along with solutions to baby-sitting problems, providing children with a peer group, and solving the problems of being raised by a gay parent.

Custody, coming out to your children and how to handle dating and lovers will be some of the specific topics to be discussed in future rap sessions.

TWT NEWS was informed that the first meeting of Lesbian Mothers will be held, appropriately, on the eve of Mother's Day, this Saturday, May 7 at 6:30pm, 210 Fairview, Apt. 1. Interested persons should contact (713) 529-4975 and are asked to bring a friend.

GAY CONFERENCE ON DALLAS CABLE TV

DALLAS — Beginning this Sunday, May 8, a program dealing with last year's National Gay Leadership Conference, held in this city, will be aired on Warner-Amex Cable TV, Channel 9, on the service known as *Video Crossroads*.

Utilizing speakers and workshops from the conference, the program will explore the gay rights movement from its inception through the present and

AUSTIN WINNERS: MULLEN & SPAETH

AUSTIN — In this city's April 30 runoff election, Ron Mullen was elected mayor and Mark Spaeth was elected to City Council, Place 4. Voter turnout was heavy in conservative areas and light in liberal boxes, TWT NEWS learned. Mullen ran well in the north and south districts; Lowell Lebermann ran strongest in the east and west ends with the central core divided.

In the mayoral race, Lebermann conceded to Mullen at 10:30pm. Final vote totals gave Mullen 33,697 (52.6%) and Lebermann 30,338 (47.4%).

ALGPC leadership said, "We are pleased with Mullen's victory," citing his recent support of a benefit package for domestic partners of gay employees, ALGPC political action chair, Gary Fitzsimmons, explained.

ALGPC also noted that Mullen was instrumental in keeping the anti-gay Citizens for Decency from launching a second initiative on last year's fair housing issue, which would have targeted the sexual preference clauses.

In Mullen's acceptance speech, he talked of "pulling this city together," adding, "I believe this is a victory for all of Austin, regardless of socio-economic backgrounds."

In the City Council runoff, Spaeth trailed most of the night until pulling ahead at the end, Scott Taylor of TWT NEWS reported. Spaeth's slim margin of victory was 32,295 votes (50.6%) com-

pared to George Humphrey's 31,519 (49.4%).

Although ALGPC had endorsed Humphrey, many gay businesses were in Spaeth's camp. "Nevertheless, we are anxious to work with Spaeth," Fitzsimmons commented.

Thus, ALGPC is happy that Mullen won and many gay businesses are happy that Spaeth was victorious. Regardless, everyone is happy that Austin gays have never been better represented on City Council. With friends like Roger Duncan, Sally Shipman, John Trevino, Charles Urdey and Mark Spaeth on Council, gay rights should fare well during the coming two-year terms of office.

WRITE OR CALL ON SODOMY BILL

AUSTIN — A special report published last week by TWT on House Bill 2138 (HB-2138)—Texas' proposed new sodomy bill—has outraged the gay community of Texas. And that outrage must not die.

"You need to express your concern that this anti-gay bill be defeated by writing or calling your local congressman in the Texas State Legislature," TWT NEWS was urged by gay lobbyist Bette Naylor in Austin.

In order to strengthen our support and not allow this bill to get to the House floor for a vote—where gay rights would be doomed—it is imperative that you contact one of the nine members on the House Committee on Criminal Jurisprudence.

WHAT IS CEVERHA REALLY LIKE?

RICHARDSON, Texas — What is Representative Bill Ceverha, a Republican from this city, really like? The answer to that question is not as easy as the question, TWT NEWS notes.

On the surface, one would think that the man who introduced Texas' proposed new sodomy bill, HB-2138, would be conservative and church-minded. Yet the record shows, by contrast, that he would like to legalize Sunday shopping by removing the "blue laws" from the books. This is the third session that Rep. Ceverha has championed an attempt to repeal the old religious law.

It would appear to an observer that Ceverha is on both ends of the mythical morality spectrum. Yet he maintains he is being consistent as a Christian, citing his strong belief in separation of church and state.

"I don't hate homosexuals," he told United Press International. "As a Christian, the most difficult task you have is to truly follow the creed of the New Testament, to love your enemy."

"You can't legislate the holy day," he said. "A person can't keep a holy day just because the state says it is."

"Homosexuality," he said, "is a different matter. Fundamentally, it's a moral issue, not right or wrong, but what's good for society."

Ceverha, a commercial real estate broker, moved to Dallas in 1962. His well-to-do district is a conservative slice of North Dallas County.

Gay Billboards

Dear TWT:

You've heard it before—the Dallas Gay Alliance billboards will be on the street for all of Dallas to see. But what actually happened? The billboards never appeared.

As most of you have probably heard, Foster and Kleiser, the billboard company, mailed us a letter on the day the billboards were scheduled to be posted saying that they could not accept "controversial issues." Representatives of the Alliance pointed out to them that "working towards a better understanding," the message of the billboards, could hardly be considered a controversial issue. After further discussion . . . the company informed us that they would be delighted to post our message.

So one billboard was erected at the corner of Oak Lawn and Rawlins, and the other location, across from City Hall, on Cadiz St., is to appear in a month or two.

In the meantime, the Communications Dept. of the Alliance has undertaken yet another project of a similar nature. During June, the side of at least 35 Dallas Transit buses will carry the message of the billboard all over the city. The money left over from the billboard project will be used to print the boards for the buses and the space will be rented from funds gathered in the Adopt-a-bus program.

Dear TWT:

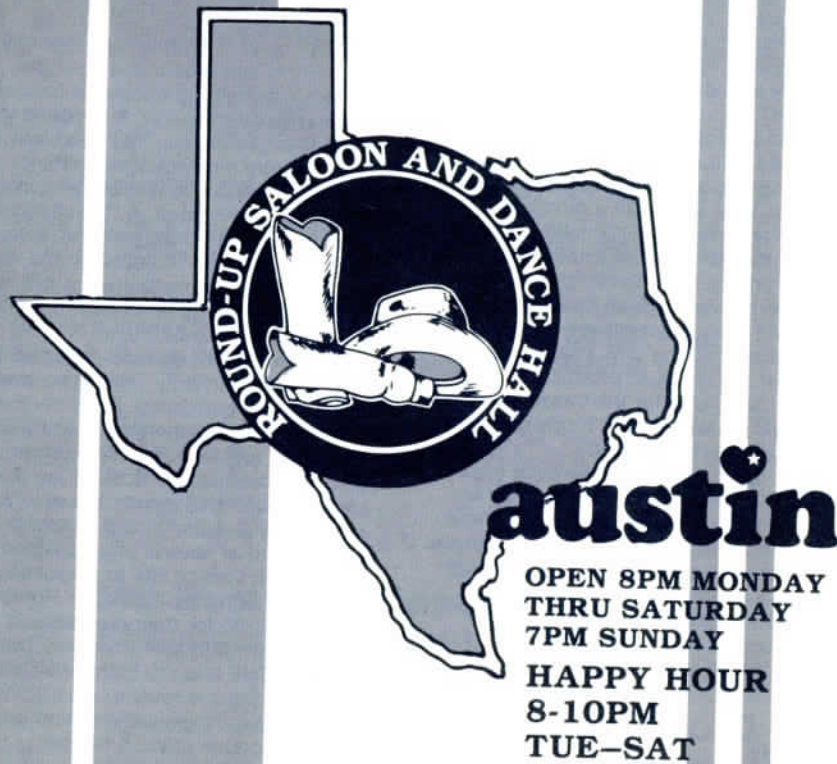

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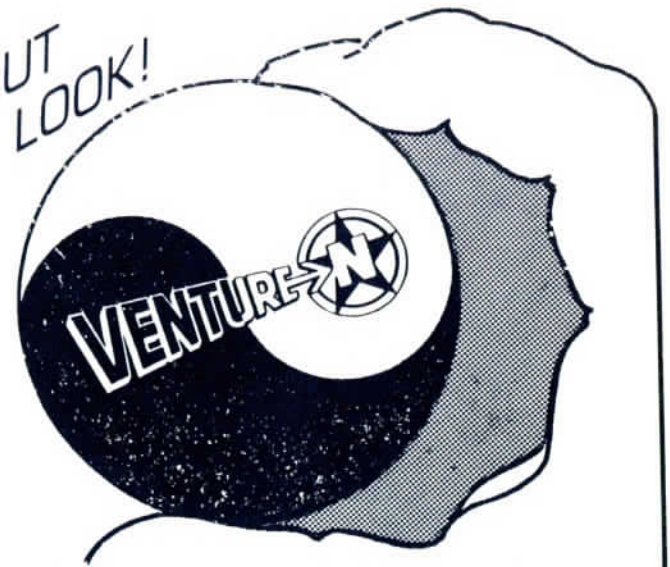

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TRANSFORMER

Transformer, by M.A. Foster, 255 pp.; science fiction; DAW Books Inc., Donald A. Wollheim, Publisher, 1633 Broadway, New York, New York 10019; paperback, \$2.50.

A little more than a year ago, the book, *The Morphodite*, by M.A. Foster, was reviewed here. Just recently, he has provided us with a sequel to it, called *Transformer*. They share what may be called a social science fiction genre, dealing with social manipulation and control at a very profound level. But to understand *Transformer*, one must remember back to the first novel. The Morphodite was first thought to have been taken out of Lisagnor on the plan-

et Oerlikon, and then changed bio-chemically, first into a "tabula rasa" (blank mind) and then trained in all forms of defense and offense, and imprinted with the matrix of society (socially, politically and psychologically).

In effect, a trained and skilled assassin, but with the further ability to generate spontaneous and conscious conversion into another person, each time becoming the opposite sex as well. Total identity conversion would ensure no possibility of capture. The Morphodite (named for Morpheus and hermaprodite) begins *Transformer* as Phaedrus, who has settled in an inlet village with a foodgatherer named Meliosme. His attempts to disengage from the web and destiny of his past fail and he



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is found by those who feel he will uncover his previous and primary identity and seek out those who swept it to oblivion.


His greatest ability, integral to his being, is related to the matrix instilled in him. He has the ability to perceive and calculate where the balance points are for the foundation of the society; he is a self-directed catalyst for chaos and new order. He threatens whole societies. His creators made him as an ultimate weapon for their use, dominated by their will. They created more than they thought and he turns on them for killing Meliosme, one whom he loved.

Two characters from off-world (Heliarcos), from the society who created the Morphodite in the laboratory planet that is Oerlikon, are sent to destroy Phaedrus. They initially fail, and force him into an identity conversion, to Nazarine Florissante Alea, a female. She is the main character for this book as she uses her skills and profound integration with society's fiber.

Foster has written a tight, non-technical, fast-paced second to *The Morphodite* in his new book *Transformer*. His sequel reveals the larger purposes and origins of the Morphodite as an agent for social assassination who becomes more than the sum of his parts and knowledge, and who transcends his "programming" to become an indi-

vidual consciousness. Foster's premises on which the story is based are as intriguing as the characters and events. The suspense of the hunt by the two off-worlders for the creature is credible. The only problem one may have is the number of coincidences that are used to maintain and continue the story.

The beginning of the sequel is given over to a reprise and summary of the last book and its events. Fortunately, one does not have to read *The Morphodite* to enjoy this book. As in *The Morphodite*, each chapter of the book is preceded by a quote of philosophy or observation which is as entertaining and thought-provoking as the subject of the book. There are no gay themes in either of them. But the character is comfortable with the role reversals, and is free to remember previous personalities.

Science fiction has been the domain of male chauvinists who splattered pretty girls with big boobs on the covers of books and magazines. That has changed in the last few years, much for the better. Now we can have books such as *Chrome*, and others, with explicitly gay themes. Many successful authors, such as Ursula K. LeGuin and Samuel Delany, have led the way to change the genre in a more realistic and positive way. *Transformer* is another example of this new enlightenment. 

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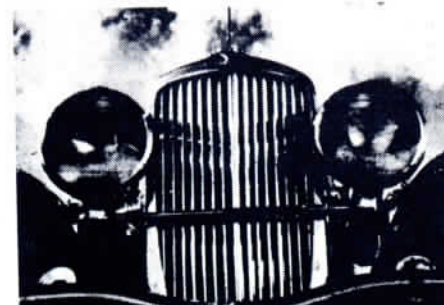

THE VAMPIRE BITES BACK

"Forever and ever," promises Mr. Bowie to Ms. Deneuve. And so does she, again and again. They exchange this vow during steamy shower scenes or after tender moments of tongue-in-flesh. This is how *The Hunger*'s very fashionable "Mr. and Mrs. Dracula" spend much of their time, unless they are on the lookout for vitamins and all the other good stuff they thrive on. Their sources of supply, you guessed it, are other trendy individuals from whom they, rather selfishly, suck out the red fluid that keeps them going.

Catherine Deneuve and David Bowie cruise the punk scene in Tony Scott's *The Hunger*.



This appears to be an outright addictive habit for our gourmet heroes who, I'm sure, in blind taste tests would prefer their precious liquid diet 100:1 over any other earthly fare. That's no wonder, because the lady vampire (Catherine Deneuve) has discovered that being a passionate bloodsucker is the key to eternal life. For all we know, she's been around for centuries. Her hubby (David Bowie) isn't quite as fortunate. All of a sudden, he engages in a supersonic aging process until he comes close to literally rotting away before your very own, wide-open eyes. As a matter of fact, Mr. Bowie, who mimes one of his traditional outlandish parts, is seen displaying his customary features for the first 15 minutes only. After that, it's Graveyard City, as far as he is concerned. In other words, he experiences on himself, in a period of minutes, what happened to the picture of Dorian Gray. Once he reaches what appears to be age 150, the missus stuffs him into a coffin in the attic where several of the lady's exes are stored in similarly attractive boxes to continue their unattractive decaying process—because simply die, they can't.

The horrific spectacle reaches a new dimension when Ms. Deneuve recruits another lovely lady as her new partner in eternal life and bed. (Oh yes, Anita, vampires do recruit to replenish their race.) Susan Sarandon is a research scientist on aging and a formidable match for the curiously enticing Ms. Deneuve. When they French-kiss, segments of the audience reacted with the same kind of oohs and ohs and nervous giggles that accompanied Christopher Reeve kissing Michael Caine in *Death Trap* and Peter Finch lining up lips with Murray Head in *Sunday Bloody Sunday*. The lovemaking scenes are aesthetically beautiful, enhanced by lots of artsy photography. The camera sometimes plays discreet peeping tom through thin window curtains which move before its lens as a veil of mystery.

What director Tony Scott cannot be accused of at all is producing your ordinary vampire adventure. *The Hunger* is shrouded with mystery and mystique; it is a story told from a different (camera) angle; a story by Whitley Strieber who wrote the thrilling *Wolfen* and never allows you to guess what will happen next; a story with a number of weird confusing stages. All in all, *The Hunger* offers a generous dose of style and class in combination with innovative, wonderfully composed cinematography by Stephen Goldblatt and a dash or two of *draculinary* gore. This could have become a major classic. In the end, there is only the potential for some sort of a cult classic. If you feel the hunger to consume a quite different, occasionally gambling and experimental offering, this one's for you. Just don't expect a whole lot of logic, okay?

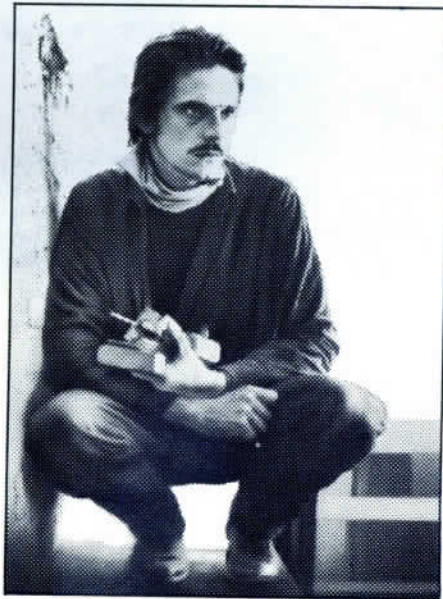
MOONLIGHTING

CLAIRE DE LUNE

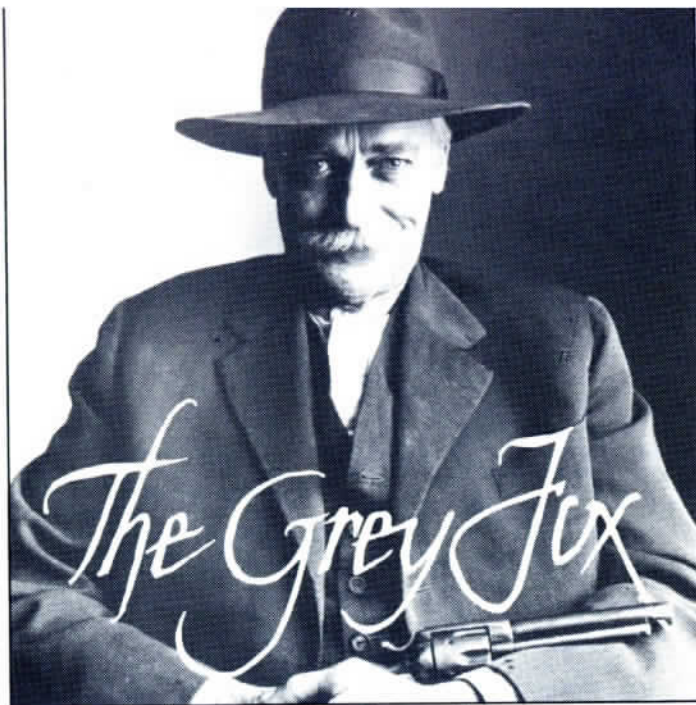
The most interesting aspect of Jerzy Skolimowski's new film, *Moonlighting*, is its multiple levels of meaning, from compassionate character study to an ironic parable about individualism and ideology. I never much liked Skolimowski's other movies (his best known work, *The Shout*, was praised by some critics, although I found it very loud and very boring), but his inventive camera work, wealth of details and creation of atmosphere make *Moonlighting* a moving and intelligent work. Jeremy Irons plays a Polish building worker, Nowak, who enters England with three colleagues—Kudaj, Wolski and Banasazak

—to do renovation on a house belonging to their boss. For their effort, they will earn a year's wages for a month's work, and their boss will defray British building costs. Eventually, Nowak learns about a military crackdown against Solidarity, and does not tell the others (who cannot speak or read English), hoping to finish the house and somehow find enough money to get back to Poland. When faced with additional costs of building materials, Nowak bilks the local supermarket for food, and soon becomes a skilled thief.

In an interview, Skolimowski noted his fascination with Bresson's great film, *Pickpocket*, and noted that he hoped to "explore the mechanics of stealing" in *Moonlighting*, "although it had to be in relation to something like stealing food." His film can indeed be seen as a Bressonian study of interpersonal relationships under intense social pressures as well as an almost improvisatory political tract. Much of the film's power comes from Jeremy Irons' cool, naturalistic acting style, his face constantly filled with confusion. Irons' portrait of a man desperately trying to remain in control of his life during a complex situation is both compelling and comical. Yet Skolimowski and Irons probe deeper into the difficult theme of a man whose good intentions are gradually exposed as demonstrations of moral bankruptcy. Nowak should, for example, be able to exercise a certain kind of autonomy in London while he is away from his boss; yet Nowak mechanically follows his orders, against his own and his fellow workers' wishes. *Moonlighting* becomes an ironic portrait of an individual caught up in an absurd world and his inability or unwillingness to deal with it.

Bill Miner, an audacious and dignified bandit of the later part of the 19th century, served over thirty years in San Quentin before he was released in 1901 at the age of sixty. Unable to adjust to the new machinery and urbanizations of the century, Miner eventually began to rob trains and was imprisoned again. Phillip Borsos's film, *The Grey Fox*, explores the motivations behind Miner's actions, and deals with them with an ease and simplicity that is refreshing. The movie is not an elaborate celebration of Western horse opera conventions, but rather a warm character study of a man who remains an individual throughout the film. Frank Tidy's photography gives the landscape true epic proportions: His use of color, from the bright blues of a morning sky to the rich, dark browns of earth and hills heighten the mythic elements of the story. The movie looks professional, but it has nothing of "professionalism" about it. In other words, *The Grey Fox*

is not afraid to raise questions and never attempts to cater to our emotions.

Bill Miner is certainly Richard Farnsworth's best role to date—he even gets the woman (played by Jackie Burroughs, who is elegant, deep-voiced and sexy). I last saw Farnsworth in *Comes a Horseman*, and he was the main attraction in that mannered, "revisionistic" Western. Once again, he displays an easy-going, non-threatening acting style in *The Grey Fox*, aided by a Mark Twain mustache and shy grin. Miner is, surely, a criminal by conventional standards of the law, but he becomes a kind of Robin Hood, a savior fighting the encroaching railroads. Borsos, Farnsworth and writer John Hunter trust their audience enough to allow a depth to Miner's character that is lacking in many Westerns, and the resulting portrait of a man misplaced in time has an immediacy and interest that is absorbing.

RICHARD FARNSWORTH

From Stuntman to Star

What do Montgomery Clift, Henry Fonda, Guy Madison, Roy Rogers, Troy Donahue, Robert Walker, Dan Duryea and Cliff Robertson have in common? Richard Farnsworth has doubled as stuntman for all of them (and almost any other actor who happened to be about six feet tall and weigh about 160 pounds) in the forty years he was a stuntman in motion pictures and television. His speaking parts, in mostly B westerns, consisted of inconsequential lines like, "Which way did they go?" or "How many were there?"

He's been in over 300 films, and that's a conservative estimate. "An actor couldn't do that, but as a stuntman or an extra, I would spend two or three days on a picture, then go to another. You'd only have to work on ten pictures a year for thirty years to do 300 pictures. And I know I did a lot more than that."

Not until 1965 did Farnsworth receive screen credit, which was for his role as an old Indian medicine man in *Texas Across the River*, a film starring Dean Martin and Alain Delon.

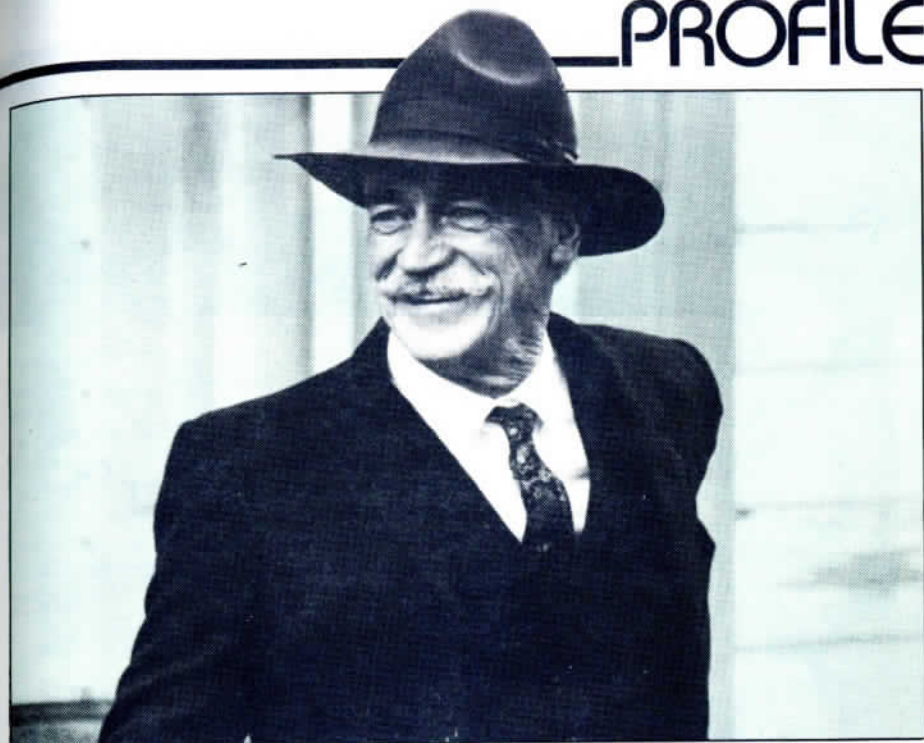
"As an actor, supporting actor or featured player, I've probably done twenty films. I had a role in *Roots*—I cut off John Amos' foot; I was the manhunter in the jungle in *Papillon* [starring Steve McQueen and Dustin Hoffman]."

He has had supporting roles in *Resurrection* with Ellen Burstyn, and *Comes a Horseman*, with Jane Fonda and James Caan. In 1978, he received an Academy Award nomination for the latter film (as Best Supporting Actor), and he won both the National Society of Film Critics Award and the National Board of Review Award that same year.

He gives Jane Fonda some of the credit. "She's a real pro. She helped me a lot, 'cause we had a few scenes to-

gether that were kind of heavy. I could look at her and react. It really helped in those instances to get me in a more serious mood."


In *Resurrection*, he was only in one scene with Ellen Burstyn, but their exchange of feelings and emotions was beautiful. "Again, with Ellen Burstyn, who is a wonderful actress, if you just knew your lines, you wouldn't have to worry how they came out. She was in the role so far ... she was so dedicated. I'm not sure it would've worked with anybody else but her, in that instant. It seemed easy with her."

From stunts to supporting roles, Richard Farnsworth now has the starring role in *The Grey Fox* (review on page 35). "It's quite a bit different than the other westerns I've done," Farnsworth says. "People aren't weighted down with 100 pounds of guns and ammunition; it isn't a shoot-em-up, which

has been overdone. It's an outdoors film, an honest film."

Of the thirteen nominations it garnered for the Genie Awards (Canada's equivalent to our Oscars), *The Grey Fox* received seven. Although Genie is only four years old, the past three recipients for the Best Foreign Actor award are impressive: George C. Scott, Jack Lemmon and Alan Arkin. Richard Farnsworth is the latest winner.

Farnsworth lives in Hollywood with his wife, and they spend quite a bit of time at their ranch in Northern California when he's not working. They have two children and three grandchildren. "In fact, my son has doubled for Sylvester Stallone in *First Blood*. He does all the blood and guts stuff that I never did."

"I've got a great life," he says. And with *The Grey Fox's* critical acclaim, it seems it's getting even better.

LUNATIC FRINGE — I'm sure some of the readers of this column will appreciate the significance of finding a few words about the new **B-52's** album on the page immediately following Mr. Grahame's salute to the late **Buster Crabbe**. Let's face it, if Buster had cleaved unto **Yoko Ono** he might have begotten the B-52's. But, on to the subject at hand. *Whammy!* is the title of the B-52's latest album and "whammy" is also a good word for describing the music on all of their albums. To say that *Whammy!* has better production and a superior mix, compared to the group's previous efforts, is not to say that it's their best record: *The B-52's*, their 1979

debut, is still their masterpiece of basic essentials craziness. FURTHER TRACKS — The latest girl group to ease on down the glittering well-worn path to girl group fame is Motown's **Mary Jane Girls**, whose "Candy Man" single is currently streaking into the Top 20 of *Billboard's* "Dance/Disco" chart. The song, which has been described by group member **Jo Jo McDuffie** as "a message song for women," is featured on the girl's debut Gordy album—*Mary Jane Girls*—which was written, arranged and produced by **Rick James** (he lends a helping larynx on "Prove It"). Another new group, the **Violent Femmes**, on Slash Records, is not a girl group at all, but is a three-man

band. On the other hand, **Sister Sledge** is a girl group, and they're back with *Bet Cha Say That to All the Girls*. . . . Try this on for size: "Ricky," a new single by "**Weird Al**" **Yankovic**, is a parody of **Toni Basil's** "Mickey," and is about, uh, Ricky Ricardo. Kaye Ballard, Imogene Coca and King Donovan all have quite extensive lists of credits they have earned throughout their distinguished acting careers. The trio is currently at Houston's Windmill Dinner Theatre where they are performing *Beloved Enemies* through May 29. We met with Kaye and Imogene in the *Celebrity Lounge* of the theatre, and chatted with them about their past and present lives in the "business." Both ladies are most charming and amicable.

Kaye Ballard's first break came at "The Bowery" in Detroit, where she was discovered by Spike Jones. After touring vaudeville houses, she moved to New York, landing a role in *Touch and Go*. She toured London with the show, and gave two Command Performances for the king and queen. The rest fell into place with Kaye being on the cover of *Life Magazine*, and her recording of "Lazy Afternoon" from the play's score became her first major hit. She has appeared in many productions, one of which Dallas honored her as Best Actress of the Year for her performance in *Gypsy*. Kaye is perhaps best known to the public through the NBC television series, *The Mothers-In-Law*. She recently completed a one-year run in the Broadway musical, *The Pirates of Penzance*, and presented her one-woman show at the Burt Reynolds Theatre in Florida.

King Donovan most recently appeared with the national company of *Whoopie!*, and played on Broadway in *Mornings at Seven*. He and his wife, Imogene Coca, have toured in 30 shows together. Their joint ventures began in New York on Broadway in *The Girls of 509*, during which they were married. King has appeared in over 50 films, including *Singing in the Rain*, *The Invasion of the Body Snatchers* and *The Defiant Ones*.

Imogene Coca's career began at the early age of 11 with the blessings of both her mother and father, who were also in show business. While gaining experience in the theatre, she appeared in about ten Broadway revues. Eventually, she appeared in television's *Show of Shows*, where she worked opposite Sid Caesar. Imogene's last New York appearance was *On the 20th Century*, for which she was nominated for a Tony Award, and was also awarded a Drama Circle Award in Los Angeles. She has had the honor of receiving three Emmy Awards.

TWT — The two of you have known each other for years, I understand. How does it feel to finally be working together?

Ballard — First of all, I want to go on record as saying that Coca has taken a not so great part and made it wonderful. So has King. It's a thrill to be working with them professionally.

Coca — We've worked the same rooms in New York for years, but never together. We're very relaxed together.

TWT — Ms. Coca, you recently appeared on the "soap opera," *One Life to Live*. Are you a soap fan?

Coca — Oh, yes. I watch them when I have a chance. When they called and asked me to do the part, I love the character [a cleaning woman], so I did it for fun. It was fun.

Ballard — I performed one day on it [*One Life*]; I was a cleaning lady, too. I got a kick out of it.

TWT — Ms. Ballard, when you performed in *Minnie's Boys*, was this with Shelley Winters?

Ballard — No, no. It was the original cast and we did it in Pittsburgh. It wasn't with Shelley, but it was the

original cast.

Coca — Getting back to what we were talking about, I wonder why soaps are so popular. Talk about decadent. Years ago, you didn't admit to watching them. People would call to ask me to go to lunch and I would tell them I was ill or something.

Ballard — Tallulah Bankhead didn't die until she saw the outcome of one of them.

TWT — Are you going to have a chance to see *Sugar Babies* while you're in Houston?

Ballard — I really hope so. Isn't it wonderful what happened to Mickey [Rooney]? That's the way show business is. You go through hot and cold periods. [Mr. Rooney was an honorary Oscar winner this year.] Sometimes it's so depressing. You wonder, why can't I get that part or that really good show. Then, one day, the phone rings and your life changes. You hang on for those moments. I think I'm a little bit better. I only did one series that was a total success [*The Mothers-In-Law*]. I've never been asked to do another. That just infuriates me. Television is a wonderful yet sinister thing. I must



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have been really good in that show, because that's all people remember me for. I got a lot of fan mail from people who thought I was on that show forever. I was only in it for two seasons. The same goes for Coca. Look at all the wonderful things that she has done that people don't remember.

Coca — When you aren't on television, people think you're not working. This is an honest-to-God true story. I was touring with Sid [Caeser], and we were playing in this huge tent in San Jose. This particular night, I was running late, so I took a cab to the show. This taxi driver recognized me and asked, "Whatever happened to you? Why did you retire? You were so good!" I couldn't get the words out. I was saying, "But, I'm not . . . I'm not . . ." So we got to this huge tent you couldn't miss, and I pointed to my name on the marquee and said, "See, here I am." He didn't even hear me. He said, "That's a real shame, you were so talented!"

Ballard — Someone said it was good to see me make a comeback. I never left. I just finished 53 weeks on Broadway in *The Pirates of Penzance*.

TWT — Didn't you make a movie called *Thursday the 12th*?

Ballard — Oh my god! How did you know about that? They changed the name to *Pandemonium*. I played Donald O'Connor's wife. Eve Arden was in the movie also. It was the most "bad-taste" picture you could think of. One of the characters dies in a vat of chocolate.

TWT — Ms. Coca, you just made a movie called *National Lampoon* with Chevy Chase. When will it be released?

Coca — I'm not really looking forward to it being released, actually. I really enjoyed working with Chevy. I had fun doing it, but I don't like my character very much. She's terrible. She's the most obnoxious person imaginable.

TWT — Are there any memorable events in your pasts you could share with us?

Coca — Most of my favorite things

happened off-stage. But I really enjoyed doing a show called *Happy Birthday* in a small theater in New Jersey. The whole show was perfect. The cast, the director, everything. That's one of my favorite moments.

Ballard — *Gypsy* is my favorite. It was with the original cast. I performed it in Dallas. This show [*Beloved Enemies*] would make a perfect television movie. It's so real. It's today. I'm doing my grandmother in this show. I say and do things that are so like her it thrills me. I'm very proud of this show. There's talk of doing the show off-Broadway. And there's talk of a TV pilot.

TWT — Have you ever played in a gay cabaret?

Ballard — My god, I've spent my life playing the gay cabarets. The Blue Angel and others. I want to tell you something. If a club is sophisticated or chic, you can attribute it to the gay cli-



entele. They are the ones that love Coca, Judy Garland, Streisand, all these people. The guys are the ones with good taste. I've been so lucky to play these clubs. They cater to really great names. Josephine Baker, Cole Porter, Noel Coward. I worked there [the Blue Angel] with Charles Trenet, Jhaun Ceblaut, incredible taste and talent. These places have taste. I don't understand kids today who have so much talent and not taste. They think it's cute to pick their nose or say "snot." It's not cute. It's very bad taste. But, tell your readers, *Beloved Enemies* does have taste. Come see it.

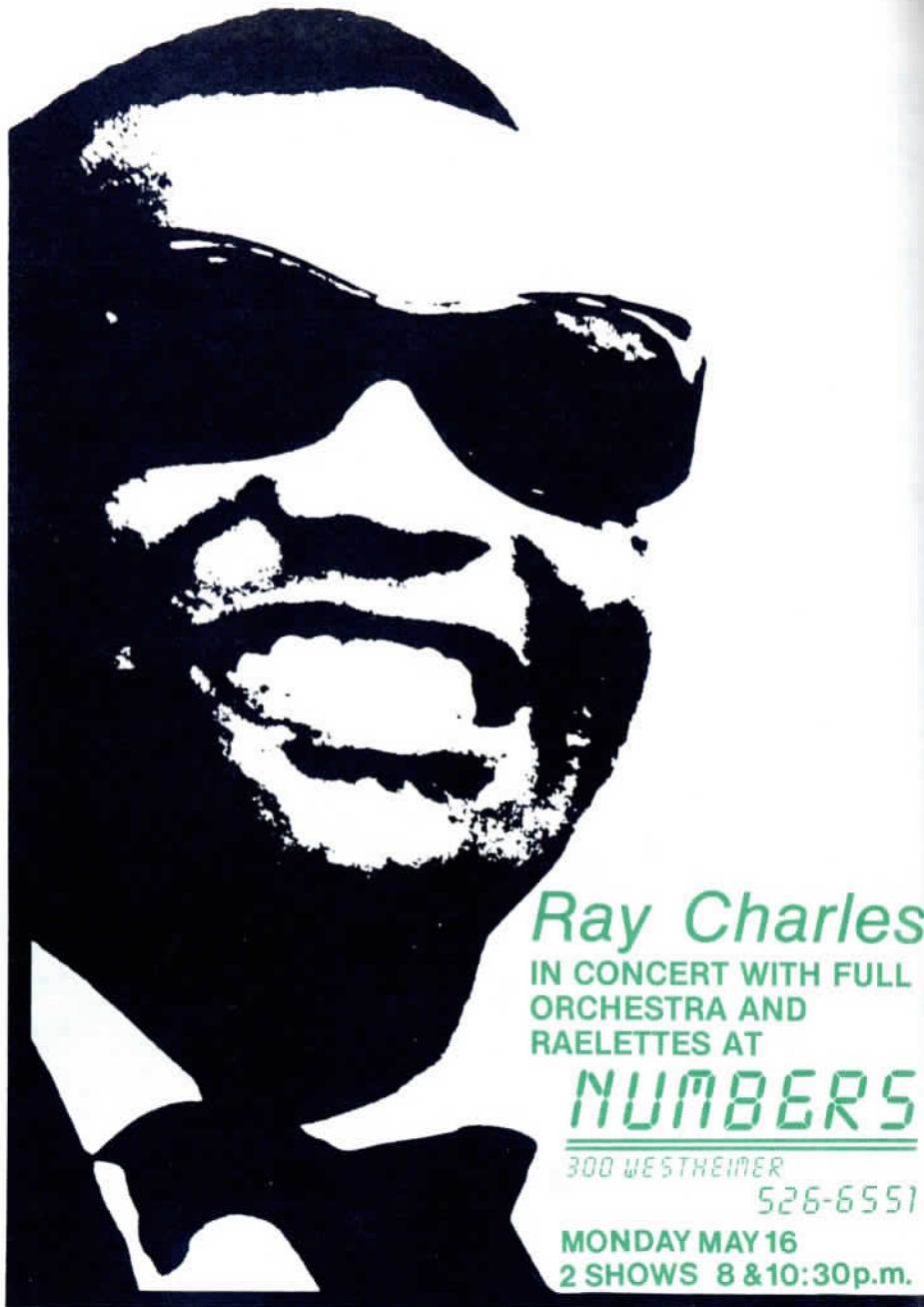

HOW SHE CAME TO TEXAS — I was born in Philadelphia, and my dad was transferred to Virginia where we stayed for ten years, after which my brother moved to California, and I followed. Then, I traveled to New York on a college tour and decided to live there. I started singing in the cabarets and clubs there. I had my own band there. I got a record contract in Berlin, and went there to perform. I went to Germany and then San Francisco and to Los Angeles.

I moved back to New York where I met Frank, and finally moved to Dallas when he was transferred there. My relatives live in Houston, so I'm here in Texas to stay.

HER VOICE TRAINING — I tell peo-

ple I learned to sing by the S&M method. My brother would line up my sisters and myself and say, "You sing this, this and this!" If we were off, he would bend our fingers back until we got it right. Later on, I found this wonderful voice teacher in New York who had this method of holding my throat and working one vocal cord at a time. This brought out a voice totally foreign to me, but it was my own. This is how I developed my own style.

HER NEW ACT — Numbers will be the first place to do my new show. It has costume changes, and it's not the usual three or four numbers, it's a full-length show. It's hard to describe, so I guess you should come see it. You *will* be there!

THINKING BIG IN TEXAS — The reason we started our own company right here is partially because the big labels can really screw-over an independent artist. Why should I go to California or New York to record when there's so much talent here in Texas? We use local musicians, studios, sound equipment, everything. I have found the best

musicians here, with contemporary synthesizer equipment and the knowledge that goes with it. When I'm in the studio recording, we work like 16 hours a day. I love traveling, but it's nice to be home doing the same thing.

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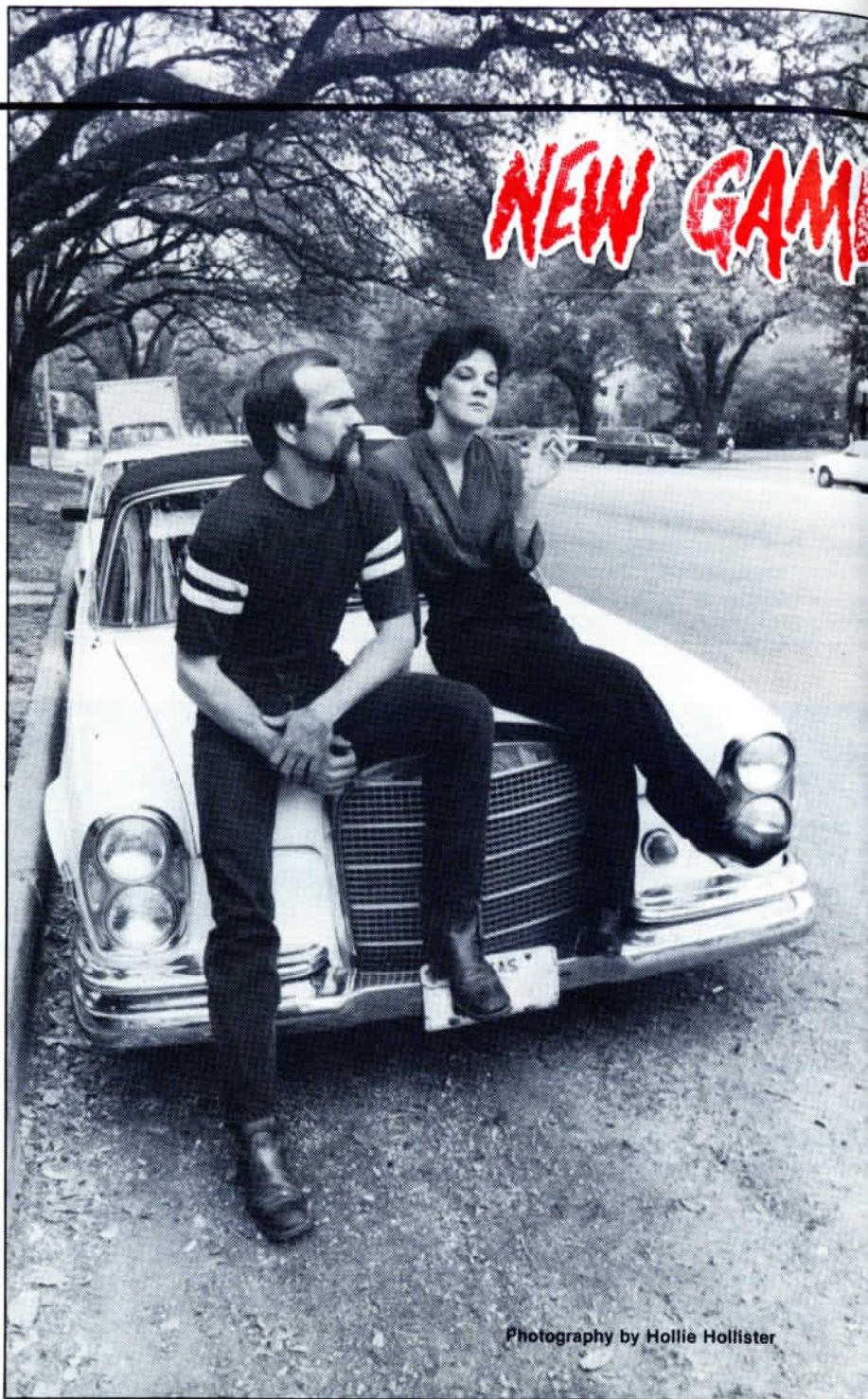
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NEW GAME IN AMERICA: S&M?

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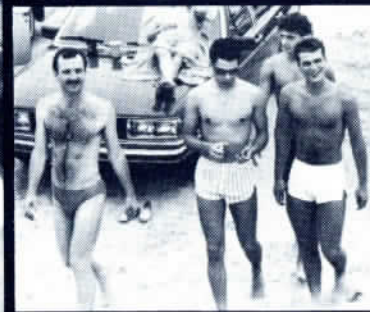

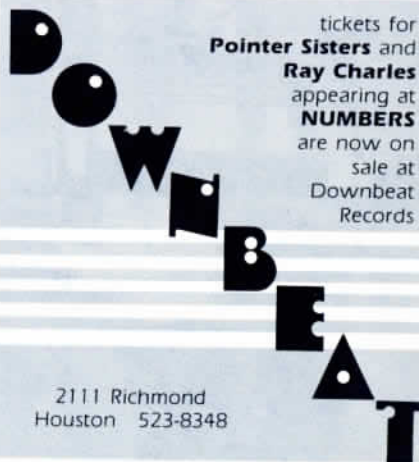
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STARSCOPE
