NEWS

ALAMO KLAN MARCH FIZZLES

SAN ANTONIO — The scheduled May 1 Ku Klux Klan march in this city fizzled, Alan Gellman of TWT NEWS reported. Few people attended, and the gay community shied away, heeding advice to "not honor the Klan with our presence."

Similar advice in Houston averted injuries during an early-April Klan march. Ignoring the Klan in San Antonio also resulted in no injuries or violence.

KKK grand dragon, Charles Lee, told reporters he was filing a class action suit against the San Antonio Police Department because they had kept all crowds at least a block away from his march. Lee vowed that the Klan would return to the Alamo City to march again.

TEXAS DRINKING AGE TO STAY AT 19

AUSTIN — TWT NEWS has learned from Pat Cramer and John Calkin, co-chairs of our gay lobby on Capitol Hill, known as the Lesbian/Gay Rights Advocates (LGRA), that the drinking age minimum for Texans will most likely not be changed—at least not during this session of the Legislature. Thus, 19 years of age will remain the law for two more years, as lawmakers meet only every other year.

It had been heavily speculated at the outset of this year's session, in January, that Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (MADD) and other anti-youth drinking collectives, would force the lawmakers to raise the drinking age to 21. Such will not be the case, however, as the Legislature makes its eleventh and final thrust at the end of this month.

Efforts to quell the issue have succeeded. The proposed legislation most likely will not even reach the floor for a vote.

At best, Texans can expect stiffer laws, fines and penalties for DWIs and other driving infractions, an inside source revealed to TWT NEWS.

HOUSTON'S NEW SEX SHOP ORDINANCE

HOUSTON — When City Council member George Greanias spoke to GPC members recently, he addressed the subject of Houston's proposed new sex shop ordinance. For over a year, meetings have been held with the public to obtain feedback in the form of dialogue on what Houstonians want or don't want from sexually-oriented businesses.

When asked by TWT NEWS what the summarization of public testimony revealed, Greanias stressed that "most people are concerned about clustering—a lot of the same-type businesses in the same neighborhood." The new law will most likely address that subject, he said.

"The public is also concerned about safety and distance. We may see a 500-foot or 1,000-foot separation between these businesses and a church, school or residence—whatever is fair."

Fairness is what the new ordinance will strive for. And, the new ordinance should be available for public inspection soon. After the initial draft has been scrutinized by citizens, a final vote by council will come.

Asked about priorities of public concern, Greanias added that the citizenry is about evenly divided, but there is more concern over nude modeling than with bookstores.

Regarding bookstores, he stressed that the ordinance "would not infringe on individual rights. Most people are not very concerned about what goes on inside. They just want to make sure that the outside environment is not offensive and that pedestrians walking by are safe," Greanias explained.

UPROAR FAVORS SMU GAY GROUP

DALLAS — Ever since April 19, when the Student Senate of Southern Methodist University (SMU) denied official campus acceptance to the new Gay and Lesbian Student Support Organization (GLSSO), the uproar of protestors has not ceased.

About 50 faculty members and about 50 students held a vigil on May 3, accusing the Student Senate, administration and alumni of violating GLSSO's civil rights, Richard Rogers of **TWT NEWS** reported.

Protesting last month's decision, Professor of English, Willard Spiegelman, told the crowd gathered on SMU's main quadrangle that "the ignorance, fear and superstitions which were behind the senate's denial threaten the needs of people in a supposedly tolerant and humane society."

"The SMU Student Senate has proven itself dangerous," he added. "The denial of rights to one minority, no matter how small, is a threat to all."

The uproar was further fueled last week, when the student newspaper, *Daily Campus*, uncovered a story about how SMU administration tried to influence the senate's vote by holding a din-

ner at which an anti-gay speech was given.

Theology students even sent a letter to SMU president, L. Donald Shields, requesting an investigation into charges of foul play by the administration. The *Daily Campus* reported receiving hundreds of letters protesting the senate's decision.

Will all of this campus uproar change Shields' mind? Campbell Read, a statistics professor and advisor to GLSSO, told the *Dallas Morning News* that he doubts Shields will overturn the senate's decision. "Dr. Shields might, in his heart and as an individual, fight for the civil rights of the GLSSO and want to see them recognized. But it seems unlikely in light of the tremendous pressure by the SMU alumni and board of trustees against the GLSSO," Read surmised.

HOUSTON MAYOR AIDING AIDS

HOUSTON — "In this city, 18 are dead, 75 have been diagnosed and at least 275 patients have been seen with suspicious symptoms or infections—AIDS," Steve Shifflet, president of Citizens for Human Equality (CHE), told a crowd gathered on the night of May 2 at City Hall for an AIDS vigil, which was coordinated by CHE and the Montrose Clinic.

The vigil was meant not only to memorialize AIDS victims, but also to announce a positive game plan to defeat the mysterious epidemic sweeping into Texas.

At the heart of the plan is Houston's mayor, Kathy Whitmire, who, in a proclamation, said, "As mayor of Houston, I am committed to making sure that our city is one of the leaders in the fight against AIDS. As mayor, I have undertaken, through a variety of means, to use our resources against this disease. As mayor, I will continue to assure that Houston does everything it reasonably can to further the fight against AIDS.

"I do not believe, however, that we

should lose heart... [as] here in Houston, a major research effort has been undertaken."

Mayor Whitmire was referring to the recent formation of an AIDS Working Group, sponsored by the City Health Department. The group, which has already met several times, is presently developing a definition of AIDS that will facilitate reporting AIDS cases to the Health Department. It is also designing clinical criteria to assist practicing physicians in assessing patients.

The City Health Department is searching for the cause and cure, and its Epidemiology Program is presently collecting data on all cases for analysis. Such an effort was facilitated by a March 12 declaration by the Texas Board of Health that AIDS was a "reportable disease."

Finally, Houston will be an active participant in the upcoming U.S. Conference of Mayors, which has created an AIDS Task Force. Whitmire's acceptance on the task force will help Houston force the AIDS issue at the federal level, **TWT NEWS** learned.

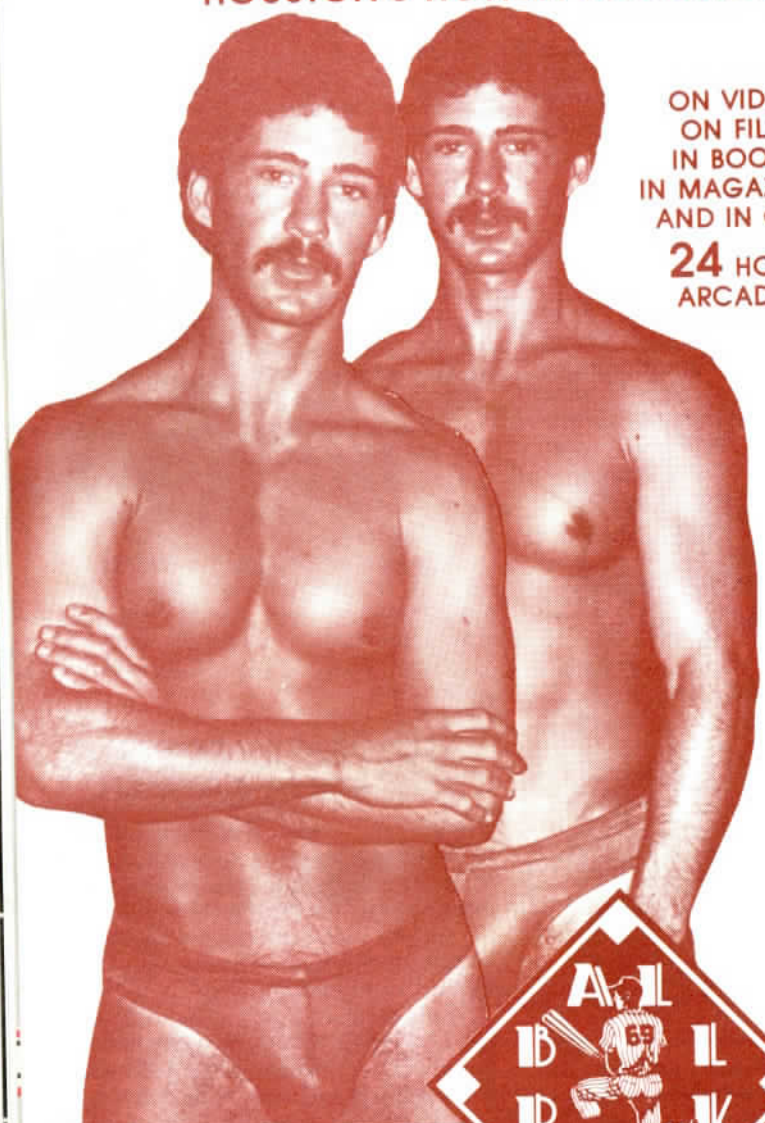
NEW GPC BOARD MEMBERS ELECTED

HOUSTON — On May 4, this city's Gay Political Caucus (GPC) held its monthly general meeting, with the most important item on the agenda being the election of two new board members. The election is required to fill the vacancies caused by the departure of Barbara Cigainero and Linda Jones. Jones was the chairperson of the board.

Candidates for Position 1 on the board, the term of which expires in February 1984, were Sue Lovell and Scott Miller. Both have extensive participation in gay politics and gay-advocated municipal campaigns, both in and out of GPC. These and other qualifications were included by them in a four-minute speech. Lovell won by a clear majority, 67 to 39.

In the other race, the candidates to replace Jones were Annise Parker, Greg

Splash Day Arrests

Dear TWT:

This past Sunday [May 1], three friends and I, as well as countless brothers and sisters, spent a portion of "Splash Day" as reluctant guests of the Galveston Police Department. In our case, we were accosted by officers of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission as soon as we set foot upon Stewart Beach, instructed to put down what we were carrying, ordered to their car and informed we were under arrest for "consumption of alcohol during prohibited hours." After giving our vital statistics, we were told to divest ourselves of all jewelry and valuables before being herded into a "paddy wagon" with other unfortunates and transported downtown to be charged and jailed. During this time, we were subjected to ogles, leers and remarks such as, "We're only picking up queers and dykes" and "You mean you arrested two *straights*?" We were advised of the amount of bail, told that the court appearance date, should we wish to plead, would be at 8:00 the very next morning, and informed that, should we decide to contest the charge, there would be \$200 in court costs, not to mention attorney fees.

Upon our eventual release, we returned to the "scene of the crime" to see if there had been any sort of warning posted prohibiting the consumption of alcohol before noon, and found that the only reference to alcohol was as to its *sale*. Granted, ignorance of the law is no viable defense; however, of my coworkers that I told of my arrest, only two were aware of this law concerning consumption, and I work for a law firm!

The only good that came out of this incident in my opinion was the sense of unity that those of us who were incarcerated felt with each other during our confinement. I have been a resident of this area for most of my 31 years, and have never had any trouble whatsoever with the law, and was appalled that the

City of Galveston would choose this manner in which to swell their coffers. After being the victim of such railroading tactics, I find it impossible to have much respect for or confidence in these "peace" officers. I only hope that some of your readers will learn from our experience. Cyndi Johnson

DGA Fights HB-2138

Editor—The following letter was sent to members of the Dallas Gay Alliance (DGA).
Dear Member of DGA:

If you act *now*, we can stop another attack on Texas' gay citizens!

As you probably know, Bill Ceverha, R-Richardson, has introduced a bill in the Texas House of Representatives that would reinstate and *strengthen* the State Penal Code's section regarding private sexual behavior of gay women and men. That same section (21.06) was ruled unconstitutional and unenforceable by a federal judge last August.

The new bill would make *felons of all gay citizens* and would be used to keep gay people from jobs in food handling, teaching, law enforcement and health care, "or any other position of public leadership or responsibility."

It would be a great joke if it weren't so serious—and it may pass! . . . Your input is needed immediately to stop this assault on our private lives. Please write a letter to members of the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee who are already hearing testimony on HB-2138 and express your views on this legislation.

We also need money to fight the bill. The statewide budget is \$20,000 for lobbying against HB-2138. Please send us your donation of \$25, \$50, \$100 or whatever amount you choose. Designate it "Lobbying HB-2138," and it will be forwarded immediately to Lesbian Gay Rights Advocates (LGRA), our state lobbying organization.

Equal rights for gay citizens won't come cheaply or easily, but we cannot afford to lose the progress gained in recent years.

Austin Lesbian/Gay Political Caucus CRITIQUE

It's time to call for the formation of a new political group of Austin. The action taken by the Austin Lesbian/Gay Political Caucus (ALGPC) in the recent mayoral and city council elections has caused the ALGPC to completely lose the support of a great majority of the Austin gay community. First, they recommended a councilman for mayor who had worked and voted against the gay community during our effort to pass the "fair housing" ordinance. Secondly, they then followed this by failing to endorse any candidate who had the obvious support of the Austin business and professional gay community. ALGPC also opposed those candidates who actively sought the gay vote by campaigning in the gay bars and advertising heavily in the gay media.

We have been told that these strange occurrences were caused by previous personal commitments by a few individual members of the ALGPC.

The ALGPC has a total membership of only 200 persons. The endorsements meeting was attended by 30 of these, and the leadership appears to be limited to only three or four members. The ALGPC has made little effort since their organization to reach out to the business or professional community or the gay community as a whole.

We feel there should be a broad-

based effort to organize a new group that will make a continuing reach to all areas of our community. This group would provide a forum for the interchange of ideas and a basis to meet the current and continuing opportunities facing the political community.

Candidates should be endorsed after consideration of their past record as well as their present platform. Endorsements could and should be based on their commitments to the issues facing the entire Austin community, as well as their support of issues concerning the gay community.

We must erase the divisiveness caused by the past election and correct the faults and oversights of the past. We must do this soon, and we must sustain a continuing effort to work toward solutions to problems such as those brought about by AIDS, the Legislative lobby effort, and the desire for general acceptance of our lifestyle.

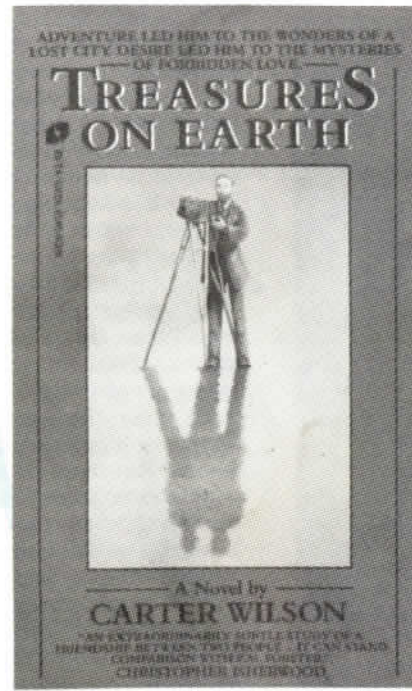

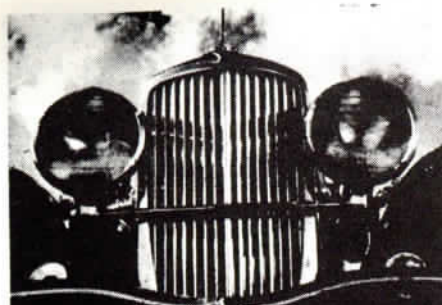
One can find free and proud love between men in any age. In this case, the year is 1911, the place, Peru, and the occasion, the Yale University-National Geographic Society Peruvian Expedition. Carter Wilson has written of a journey of nature's wonders in Peru and an exploration of the human heart and the love shared by a native guide, Ernesto Mena, and the expedition's photographer, Willie Heckler, in his latest novel, *Treasures on Earth*.

What shines most in his work is the careful writing, not expansive or wildly descriptive, that details for us Willie's

thoughts, life history and feelings that lead him to be aroused by, to care for, then love Ernesto as they make their way across the country still rugged and wild.

There are no fancy plot twists or techniques to entice and intrigue, no suspense or violence as Ernesto and Willie come to know each other intimately. What the reader will find is the quietly compelling evolution and discovery of love as the two men share and compare their respective worlds, of the mind as well as the physical worlds they have come from.

Wilson is quite successful in recreating the flavor of the people and the times. As a photographer, Willie has had the opportunity to travel far and wide—he has heard of Walt Whitman and his "universal fellowship of comrades." Willie has been asked to photo-

graph the former president of the U.S., "Teddy" Roosevelt, and his family. Wilson seems familiar with the equipment Willie would be using for the times, and handles this part well.


What may interest those readers who are amateur or professional photographers are the insights gained by the author, and recorded here, when he collaborated on a screenplay about a photographer several years ago. What may interest all readers is the "way of seeing" Willie has, his sense of composition and some philosophical musings on the nature of this "seeing."

The story is divided into four parts. The first is straight narrative in the present tense. Willie's background is prepared and explained and, by part two we come to know Willie up to the present. Next, the year is now 1926, and Willie is looking back on his experiences. But there does not seem to be much advantage taken of the new perspective, usually the opportunity for the author to provide retrospective observations to clarify and enrich the description of what is transpiring.

The third section is back in the "present," 1911. Why Wilson has elected to return to the present is not clear, but of course, he felt there must have been some advantage or plan. In fact, the lost city of Incan gold had not been found

by Hiram Bingham yet, the leader of the expedition and the close personal friend of Willie's who invited him along. Native guides like Ernesto, plus rumor and legend, all direct them in their search for the city of gold called Vitra. What they did find—part of the elaborate Incan highway—was not covered with gold but something just as majestic and magnificent, Machu Picchu.

Only Willie Hickler, Ernesto Mena and the leader of the expedition, Hiram Bingham and his companion, Christina Long, are presented in any great detail. We come to know them more intimately, and we understand and identify with them better, with Wilson's able assistance. Willie is even aware of the term used then for gays, "Uranians," adopted by the informed of the day. The other characters support and accept Willie and Ernesto; there are no hell-fire condemnations, Willie is free to write to his sister about events and conversations with Ernesto about their relationship.

The story is based on the actual expedition as recorded in John Hemmings' book, *The Conquest of the Incas*, written in 1970. The characters and names used are all fictitious, except for the name of Hiram Bingham. The tone and afterglow of the book are warm and thoughtful, worth investigating. The cover illustration equally so.

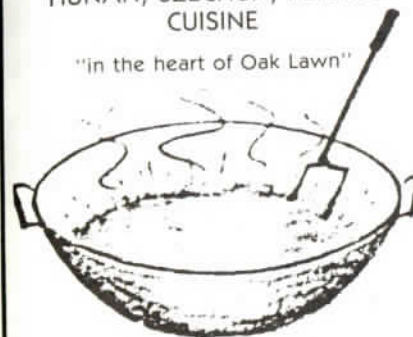

DOCTOR DETROIT

MOTOR CITY
ANSWER TO "DOCTOR
ZHIVAGO"

Old lumpy hair is back and if you are a lover of the *old Saturday Night Live* shows or held any affection for the talents of Dan Aykroyd, *Doctor Detroit* is certainly a bulls-eye hit on your laugh button. If the foregoing does not whet your want of the film, you may just as well wait till it wings its way to the Motorola.

This yarn involves Clifford Skridlow (Dan Aykroyd), who is a college professor of literature in the Windy City, and by chance becomes involved with the underbrush of life, specifically a pimp (Howard Hesseman), by the name of Smooth Walker, and his four girls who specialize in "public relations." To put off "Mom," an underworld queen to whom he owes \$60,000, Smooth Walker invents the tale that he is now under the financial grips of a "Doctor Detroit," who is an underworld boss from Motown. Guess who is tricked and recruited to play this Doctor Detroit to maintain this charade? Four free tickets to the next Lana Turner Festival if you can correctly guess the plot for the rest of this film by the time this review hits the newsstand.

Dan Aykroyd gets my vote as most lovable schmuck and is the 1980's best answer to Jerry Lewis lunacy and W.C. Fields antics. The dance sequence in which James Brown makes a cameo appearance is terrific, but a tad reminiscent of the cameo Aretha Franklin did in *The Blues Brothers*. Overall, Aykroyd has moved out from under the shadows of his *SNL* counterparts and makes it on his own as an embodiment and synthesis of some of the screen's funniest men.

This piece of fluff has more than its fair share of laughs. Although Mr. Movies seriously doubts *Doctor Detroit* will be placed on the syllabi of film courses across the globe, it's worth a gander if you're in the mood for some silliness.

Something Wicked This Way Comes

THE HELL-BOUND TRAIN

I really wanted to like *Something Wicked This Ways Comes*, Jack Clayton's new film based on Ray Bradbury's novel, but about half-way through the picture, I turned to a friend and asked, "When does the next train leave?" While not a great admirer of Mr. Bradbury—have those who constantly suggest that he is one of our "greatest living writers" actually read any of his work?—I do feel that, with the exception of *The Martian Chronicles*, *Something Wicked This Way Comes* is the only piece of fiction by Bradbury that works. Gone in this book are his awful purple passages, which aren't merely simple, but also silly, and pretentious and predictable. Working with one of his favorite themes—an imaginative, precocious boy who comes to know the darker aspects of himself and those around him—Bradbury gives us a wealth of psychological insight, nostalgia, and that particular blend of fear and excitement that comes when an individual moves into adulthood.

Jack Clayton's films, with a screenplay by Bradbury himself, keeps much of the nostalgia, but delivers little of the character insight so important to the novel. Clayton would seem perfectly suited as the movie's director, having directed, on one hand, *The Innocents*, a chilling portrait of psychological evil based on Henry James' *The Turn of the Screw*; and, on the other hand, *Room At the Top*, a different kind of charac-

ter study altogether that starred Simone Signoret. Unfortunately, Clayton's more than ample film technique is dampened by Bradbury's less than adequate script, which reduces the novel to a simple confrontation against Good and Evil. The basic premise of Bradbury's novel is here—a stranger arrives late at night by train in a small town and proceeds to set up a magical carnival where wishes and secret desires are granted—and that's about it. There's little realization of the stream-of-consciousness technique found in the book, and none of its poetic idealization of a boy's reaction to forces at once frightening and enthralling.

Walt Disney Studios produced the movie, and it shows—which is not necessarily a compliment. The sets are fine, and the photography is especially elegant, tinged with the proper golden, nostalgic tones we might associate with memory. Yet since there are really no characters that we can relate to in the picture, Clayton has to rely on spectacular special effects, which ultimately leave you cold. The whole concept of a magical carnival was done years ago in George Pal's *The Circus of Dr. Loa*, admittedly not a very good film, yet a picture with life and some intelligence, not to mention a moving performance by Tony Randall. *Something Wicked This Way Comes* shows, I guess, that a bad writer's best book can still be a bad film. The picture's lack of characterization, the hack theme of Good versus Evil, and the use of big flashy effects *a la* George Lucas, make *Something Wicked This Way Comes* not only intolerable, but also a kind of fake, a *Star Wars* in Winesburg, Ohio

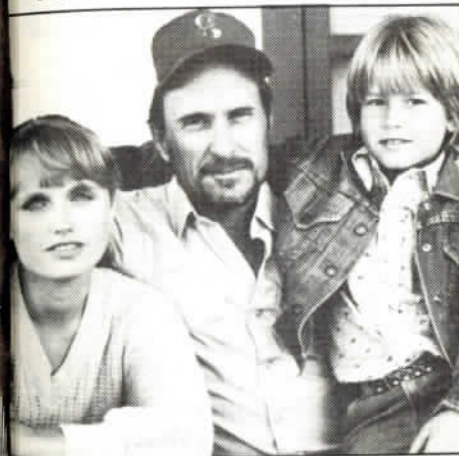
COUNTRY CROSSROADS

Messrs. Hoffman, Newman, Redford and De Niro—eat your hearts out! For my money, it is Robert Duvall who takes the crown as America's most versatile, always naturally believable actor. For certain, his track record is nothing to scoff at, with goodies such as *The Godfathers*, *Apocalypse Now*, *The Great Santini*, *True Confessions*, and many more. *Tender Mercies* is a work of love by Mr. Duvall, similar in effort and engagement to his recent debut behind the camera with the gypsy tale, *Angelo My Love*. In *Mercies*, he plays an over-the-hill country singer who once wrote such classics as "If God can forgive

to an end at a remote gas station somewhere in Texas, with a rather rundown motel at its side. There he meets Rosa Lee, a widow with a little boy, and since he can't pay for his one-night stay, he starts to work as a filler-upper at the station.

Tess Harper, a newcomer, fits perfectly in looks and gestures the part of the simple country girl with modest dreams and honest principles. Allan Hubbard as the kid never upstages the adults with cutesy lines. The whole supporting cast is flawless.

Australian director Burce Beresford (*Breaker Morant*) has developed a warm, sensitive feeling of the Lone Star state and the forgotten lone star who has the chance for a comeback, but opts to settle down. Mr. Beresford likes to film the wide Texas plains with a ratio of one quarter ground, three quarters sky. His cameras are often stationary and distant, as if to avoid intruding on the people whose story they capture.

Tender Mercies has a heart as big as Texas. After *Local Hero*, it is my second entry for my Ten-Best list of '83.

Monday night at 8:00pm, NBC will present *Motown 25: Yesterday, Today, Forever*, a celebration of Motown's 25th anniversary. This week *showbiz* joins in the celebration by saluting the formative years of the "Motown sound," a style which began developing at the beginning of the 60s and which began to fade in the early 70s when the company moved their operations from Detroit to Los Angeles.

MOTOWN: A PERSONAL MEMOIR

Do you remember what you were doing when you first heard about the assassination of John Kennedy? Do you remember the first time you heard the Beatles or Bob Dylan and you knew that the world was changing? Do you remember your first orgasm? Surely everyone carries around some long ago memory that stands out from all the rest—an encapsulated moment which can be recalled with photographic clarity.

My moment occurred not long after I had experienced my first disastrous homosexual romance. On a sweltering afternoon in June of 1964 I was standing in a record store examining a list of new records when I heard the Supremes' "Where Did Our Love Go" for the first time. I was 17 and had been scraping together nickels and dimes for years to buy my favorite 45s, but I had never encountered anything like that 2 minutes and 32 seconds of plaintive and sultry passion.

"Where Did Our Love Go" became the perfect symbol for my first painful

steps into adulthood, and so it is with an admitted bias that I call this record the most sophisticated girl group record ever made. Perhaps it would be more accurate to describe "Where Did Our Love Go" as a "woman group" record, for it has little in common with "He's So Fine" or "Da Doo Ron Ron." Almost 20 years later, "Where Did Our Love Go" still refuses to sound like an oldie.

Within a year after the Supremes had become America's top recording act, I discovered that many of the 45s I brought home had labels with names such as Motown, Tamla, Gordy, Soul and VIP, and that these records were *all* the products of a phenomenal Detroit music factory called Motown Record Corp. In those days the American charts were being invaded by countless British recording artists, but a lot of us considered them to be rank amateurs, and our loyalties remained stateside.

Throughout the sixties, Motown was England's main competition on the charts. Let's see how much you remember about those days.

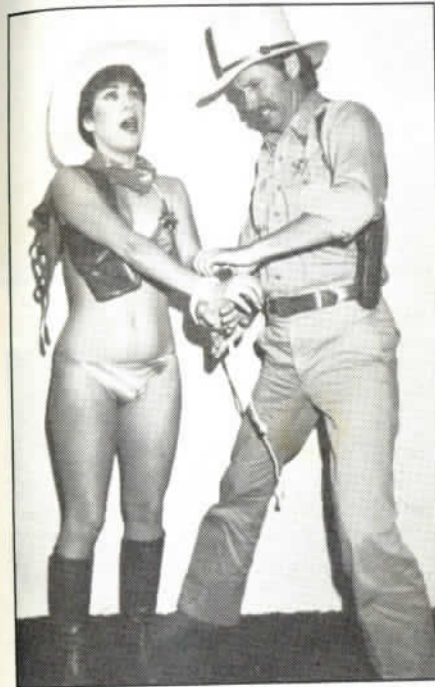

GAY PLAYWRITING CONTEST — The American New Bureau and Fea-

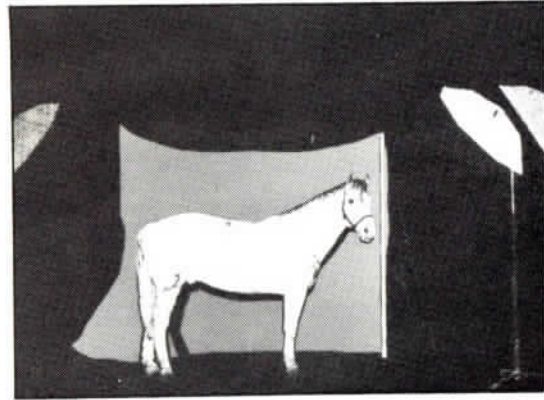
