



AIDING AIDS, MAKING SEX SAFE

LOS ANGELES — In a national effort to replace public panic over AIDS with a positive program on health and pleasure, TWT NEWS has learned of a new project, "Making Sex Safe," coordinated by Dr. Bruce Voeller and Mr. David Goodstein in cooperation with the Mariposa Education and Research Foundation.

Dr. Voeller, former professor of Developmental Biology and Biochemistry at Rockefeller University and founder of the National Gay Task Force, is currently president of Mariposa.

Working with Goodstein, owner of *The Advocate*, Voeller is spearheading a drive "to make sex safe from disease. We believe that we now know how to make sex safe in the world," he said. "For sometime now, we have been working together to solve the devastating problem of STD [sexually transmitted diseases]."

Although uncertain as to the cause of AIDS, it is generally thought by researchers to be either sexually transmitted or caused by a virus. Most, however, suspect that a virus may be responsible.

The commonly suspected viruses are CMV (Cytomegalo) and Epstein-Barr virus. Both viruses are members of the herpes family and have been found in the body fluids and tissues of many AIDS victims, Voeller's report stated.

Working forward in research on this premise, a serious and important breakthrough was found about two years ago. Voeller, with his colleague Tom Watson, developed a lubricant containing an ingredient approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) as safe for human use, including foods.

Laboratory tests have proved that this lubricant has the ability to kill STD

agents. Results were stunning. Within 60 seconds of exposure, Herpes 1 and Herpes 2 viruses were killed completely. Also killed were the bacteria causing syphillis, trichomonas, chlamydia, amoebae and gonorrhea. Gonorrhea is second only to the common cold among infections in the U.S.

The fact that herpes viruses are highly susceptible to the lubricant suggests that the AIDS-linked CMV and Epstein-Barr viruses may be vulnerable as well. Before it can be marketed in the U.S., however, the product must undergo extensive clinical testing.


The chance to eradicate STDs, possibly including AIDS, appears to TWT NEWS as singular an opportunity as the one Jonas Salk faced on the eve of conquering polio.

To complete expensive clinical research that will allow this to happen, Mariposa must raise \$1 million. Until now, Goodstein had personally funded the research project. Even though STDs and AIDS are not strictly gay diseases, it would be historically significant were gay people to find a solution.

AIDING AIDS IN SAN ANTONIO

SAN ANTONIO — This city's recent "Safe Week" campaign was a resounding success, with over 350 community members receiving tests and many more getting answers to questions regarding gay health. "San Antonio can be proud of the fact that the response here surpassed even that of Denver, the city where the 'Safe Week' concept originated," coordinator Jim Hallorean told TWT NEWS.



"In response to the current crisis in gay men's health, the people who first brought 'Safe Week' to Texas are ready to expand the scope of effort to more than a single annual week of STD [sexually transmitted diseasel testing." Hallorean continued.

While STDs remain a great problem in both the gay and non-gay populations, the "Safe Week" committee conceded that the current situation demanded more attention as AIDS/KS continued to spread in the community.

Last week, TWT NEWS reported that San Antonio had reported its first known AIDS case, as Danny Costilla had been diagnosed with KS-related

symptoms.

The "Safe Week" committee announced that they proposed to develop and implement community-based activities directed toward education, referral and victim assistance.

Two of the local committee members plan to attend next month's National Lesbian/Gay Health Conference and the second National Forum on AIDS in Denver, It was through last year's conference in Houston that "Safe Week" was introduced to Texas.

Plans are also underway for a benefit to be held in this city to coincide with Gay Pride Week. While final details remain to be worked out, the fundraiser promises to be guite an event, Hallorean promised.

DGA CELEBRATES 7TH ANNIVERSARY

DALLAS — The month of May marks the seventh anniversary of the Dallas Gay Alliance (DGA). Originally known as the Dallas Gay Political Caucus, the umbrella name of DGA was adopted a couple of years ago to broaden the scope of the organization, TWT NEWS

At last week's regular monthly meeting, past DGA presidents and guest speakers chronicled the seven-year achievements of the organization. Don Baker, DGA's most recent past president, recalled how the Alliance had grown from just two dozen members in its 1976 beginnings, to a membership of nearly 600 in 1983.

In explaining how the Dallas GPC had patterned much of its structure from Houston GPC by-laws, guest speaker Larry Bagneris, Houston GPC president, contrasted Houston as being more "contentious" and Dallas more "harmonious," adding, "Let us be diverse, but let us be unified."

The "mother" of the Alliance, Dr. Harryette Ehrhardt, talked of the Dallas Area Women's Political Caucus, of which she is president; DGA vice-president Bill Nelson traced the history of the Alliance: resident historian, Phil Johnson, presented a memorable slide show; and current DGA president, Mike Stewart, stalwartly addressed the subject of how only hard work can win the battle for human rights.

PRAYER SERVICE FOR AIDS VICTIMS

HOUSTON - This Sunday evening, May 22, the Grace Lutheran Church, 2215 Waugh Drive, will hold a prayer service on behalf of AIDS victims and researchers working on an AIDS cure. Doors will open at 7:00pm.

Rev. Akerman, pastor of Grace Lutheran, will officiate with participation by representatives from M.D. Anderson Hospital and the AIDS/KS Committee.

The service will include a free will offering for AIDS. Literature will be available in the church lobby. The public, regardless of religious affiliation, is invited. Akerman told TWT NEWS.

The switchboard is staffed by trained volunteers on Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings from 6:00-11:00pm. During other hours, a taped message is used. "All calls are kept confidential," Bond stressed.

Eighteen volunteers participated in the initial training on April 18 and 19. Current volunteers will continue with ongoing training programs, contact person Glen Carlson stated.

NEW LESBIAN MOTHERS GROUP

HOUSTON — Eleven women and one infant attended the first organizational meeting of the newly-formed Lesbian Mothers group. The meeting was held on Mother's Day, May 8.

Lesbian Mothers, a support group of Choices, is open to all biological mothers, grandmothers, adoptive, expectant and stepmothers, as well as those lesbians raising children of friends or lovers.

"For many at the first meeting, it was their first contact with other lesbians who are raising children," Judith Stevenson reported to TWT NEWS.

Lesbian Mothers will meet bi-weekly a few more times until a structured agenda can be detailed. The next meeting will be this Saturday, May 21 at 210 Fairview, Apt. 1, beginning at 6:30pm. Thereafter, meetings will be the first and third Saturdays of the month.

RESEARCHERS NEED HEPATITIS PATIENTS

GALVESTON — The Medical Branch of the University of Texas at Galveston is looking for patients with chronic hepatitis B infection to obtain a large-scale study. The research is being collaborated with Stanford University Medical Center in California.

Referrals from physicians of patients, as well as self-referrals, are needed to obtain a study population for the investigation, Richard B. Pollard, M.D., assistant professor of Internal Medicine and Microbiology, detailed to TWT NEWS.

Patients will be enrolled in the study for one to two years, Dr. Pollard said. "We hope this will be a definite study of methods to eradicate and halt the progression of chronic hepatitis B virus infection"—an infection that remains prevalent in the gay community.

The study, partially funded by the National Institute of Health, is now underway and is seeking gay patients. Referral patients need only have been diagnosed as having chronic hepatitis B virus to qualify. Call (409) 761-4979 or 761-3111 to enroll.

RESTRUCTURED MONTROSE CLINIC

HOUSTON — The Montrose Clinic has been undergoing a restructuring phase ever since the arrival of the new, energetic administrative director, Frank Berrier, last November. All examinations for sexually transmitted diseases (STD) are done by doctors and nurses, "not unqualified people off the street," he said.

The operation has become very professional, observers have noted. The clinic even employs a bonded cashier to ensure the accurate accountability of all funds for bookkeeping.

The clinic now also employs a program coordinator for volunteers. Bobbi Wixson joined the clinic last month to fill that post and to operate the volunteer program.

In order to ensure that medically qualified people staff the clinic, a minimal fee schedule was instituted to provide operational monies. "However, those who can't afford the full fee may work out a payment plan," Wixson told TWT NEWS.

To clear up any misconceptions regarding the service fee charged, Berrier outlined the following. The fee for a complete STD test is \$15. Compared to

\$95 to \$120 charged by most doctors, the clinic's fee is quite a drastic dis-

The \$15 test includes blood testing for syphilis, gonorrhea cultures and a physical examination for over-35 related STDs. Treatment and medication are also included in the same visit. The same fee also covers a return visit for test of cure, repeat blood tests and cultures, Berrier explained.

The clinic, which opened in October 1981 as a free clinic, began its minimal fee charge last fall in order to continue operating, to cover costs, and to improve medical care and service.

To this day, the Montrose Clinic remains the only clinic of its type in Texas.

GAY CELEBRATION AT THE SUMMIT

HOUSTON — There's no doubt about it. There will be a GPC celebration at the Summit to climax Gay Pride Week. The money has been secured. The Summit has been rented. And, the tickets, soon to go on sale, are being designed by graphic artist Dennis Dunwoody.

Tickets will be priced under \$10, which is a bargain price to see a topnotch entertainer. TWT NEWS has learned that Tina Turner is topping the list,
followed by Melba Moore. Frank Collins
of Numbers has been coordinating the
GPC entertainment efforts through appropriate booking agencies.

"It will be an evening of entertainment, not speeches," Larry Bagneris, president of GPC, stressed. Mayor Kathy Whitmire has been invited to keynote the night of gay pride celebration, which will begin after the 5:30pm parade down Westheimer is finished.

Tickets will go on sale prior to Gay Pride Week, which runs from June 16-26 in Houston. All profits from the Summit concert will go to GPC to fund the annual operation of the caucus, which includes endorsing candidates for city and state elections.







This letter is in regards to my outrage over House Bill 2138. I'm asking you to vote AGAINST this bill passing!

I can't believe that persons in government such as yourself and your committee members can take positive action in favor of this bill. I have children of my own and can understand the concerns of other parents in regards to such health issues as Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS), but to label a group of people as the source of this disease is total lack of regard to individual rights, and lack of understanding of a very serious health problem. I don't think that any gay or non-gay wants to die! I am also sure that every attempt in the gay community is being made to get funding to cure AIDS.

I have to agree with Mr. Jim Barber when he said that this bill was "totally inept in dealing with a medical problem. This is a medical issue, not a moral issue." I don't believe that such a wide range of voters can actually buy all the propaganda and claims made in ignorant statements like "the spread of the gay plague."

Passing a law against homosexual conduct is not going to make AIDS go away, and it certainly is not going to wipe out homosexuality. I feel that sufficient funds for research, and cause of AIDS, makes better sense than a "Hitler-like" attempt to do away with a certain group of people, and make them a "cause of the problem" instead of working to correct the problem.

Passing this bill, Mr. Pereto, will only show a backward mentality on the part of what I would like to think is a very progressive legislative body.

I think that any documentation stereotyping gays in a bad light will only hurt the Consitutional doctrines set down long ago by a group looking to respect the rights of "all men," equal and free. Government is getting itself too involved in matters totally private; we all will pay the price if it continues!

I cannot believe that the fine men of our

Legislature take Mr. Bill Ceverha at all seriously! If this is any indication of your governing ability, then we are in very serious trouble. Mr. Ceverha's so-called "expert," Paul Cameron, statements about public health disaster caused by the promotion of a lifestyle that he states is injurious to its participants and all members of society, are ludicrous. His statement about 25 encounters in an hour appears to me to be a physical impossibility.

I can understand outlawing deviate behavior of any kind, but to get imbecilic about laws that lock and chain our freedoms should require more study by professional, competent individuals, and not so-called "experts."

Thank you for taking your time to understand my position in this matter.

The fellow who answered the phone could not have been more pleasant. He said there simply wasn't enough money in the lesbian community to support such an establishment. To think of going with a gay male friend of mine for an hour's workout three times a week, with piped-in music (for added energy?), is not as unusual as one might think. Many women now into the fitness craze, I feel, would spend \$25 a month to be amongst their own kind.

Oh, now I know there are a few of us out there who wouldn't dream of socializing with the gay men. For that matter, there are also a few gay brothers who the thought of working out among "fish" makes them wince. But those small-minded ones need not dictate our lifestyles. I'll bet secretly those types (male and female) really desire getting to know one another and are just scared. Oh, but REAL men don't get scared, and REAL dykes can live without men—sorry, I forgot. It's all just too silly.

Getting back to the clubs. I understand the "baths" or "tubs" are quite beautifully appointed. There are many rooms there for one thing or another. Everyone has a good time. Why, in Houston, there's even a bathhouse convenient to the bus station—just the spot for a weary traveler!

All of this came about when I read Dee Smathers' article about softball in TWT [Vol. 9, No. 5]. The illustration of the woman pitching pictured a rather paunchy lesbian. Just a few pages forward, another illustration of a batter, a male this time. HE was slim and trim, SHE was not. That brought to mind the fact that many of us lesbian women are rather plump.

In my mind, I try to group us gay people into one big family, ALL equal and ALL happy with each other. I fantasize a lot. 



Principia Martindale, by Edward Swift; 325 pp.; fiction; Harper & Row, Publishers, Inc., 10 East 53rd Street, New York, New York 10022; hardcover, \$14.95.

Those who read and enjoyed Edward Swift's previous success, Splendora, will find many similarities in writing style and types of characters in his new book, Principia Martindale. But there are startling differences that make his latest novel, set in the small town of Judson, Texas, a unique statement that stands alone.

Principia Martindale is the main character, raised in New Bethel in a Christian home, with a Christian education. She felt she was called to serve the Lord as a foreign missionary and enters Hillister Baptist College, where the reader first meets her. One could not


call Principia a fanatic, actually, but she is one of those members of the church who holds a passionate and unrelenting communion with the spiritual, to the exclusion of all else.

Though "all fall short of the glory of God," Principia was close to being the "perfect" Christian, and all those around her sensed this, including her roommate, Tawnya Louise Baker, who had a much-less-than-chummy relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ. Principia was firmly ensconced in the arms of the church and nothing would ever pull her away.

As an "Invincible" (a program that once actually existed in the Baptist churches), Principia was sent out during the summer to do missionary work around the state in the Vacation Bible Schools held in small churches each year. Her first stop (her only stop) is in

judson, with a church in great (total) disrepair, and with a very small population living there. On her journey to Judson, she meets Brother Anthony Leggett, a character who had a major role in Splendora.

Principia stays to help rebuild the Christian spirit in Judson, and becomes faith healer. Later, with the help of the leader of the Invicibles program, Corinda Cassy, Principia becomes the centerpiece of a grand spiritual center in the desert on the site of Judson, which has been torn down to make way for the new buildings. What is disappointing to this reader is Brother Leggett's rejection of his gayness since Splendora. He later asks Principia, during one of her sessions, to make, to heal him to become straight.


Swift does not engage in outright satire of religion, but he himself subtitles the book "A Comedy in Three BEST ARCADE IN TOWN Acts." Some of the characters seem caricatures of those committed to a body of religious thought. The other central character, who begins the book, is Donald Applebee. He spends most of his time coloring coloring books. was expelled from a Baptist college, and is the source of Swift's comments about what a healthy degree of skepticism and independent thought might be about religion.

The theme that the life of Principia Martindale illustrates is stated by Applebee, "A little religion never hurt nobody ... But a whole lot of it has sure as hell done a mess'a harm. That's what I have to say." His ultimate statement (Swift's) thus makes Principia Martindale much broader in scope and in application to today's society. The vehicle may be attractively and humorously packaged, but the message it carries becomes deadly serious in the end.

What may be the key trick that pulls this novel off is Swift's careful handling of the characters. All the religious heavyweights take themselves seriously: the other characters provide the balance necessary to maintain the point Swift tries to make. The third class of character, Corinda Cassy (in a class of her own), is a religious heavyweight as well, but lost the faith long ago. She is carried along by the momentum of her past works and programs.

There is much food for thought here, if one so chooses to partake. The characters are just a sample of what can be found in those small Texas towns in the southern United States, and what make Principia Martindale most entertaining.



Blue Thunder is a chase film that tries very hard to be different. Despite a fast-paced script and a talented cast. the movie still screams "formula!"

The time is now. Roy Scheider (French Conncection, All That Jazz) is a helicopter cop for the Los Angeles Police Department. He is asked to test a newly-developed helicopter over the skies of LA. This helicopter does everything but cook breakfast. It can fly 200 mph. Its heat sensors can see through walls. It is tied in with the network of computers that link law enforcement agencies around the world.

Appropriately enough, the copter is being tested for crowd control during the 1984 Olympics in LA. But Murphy (Scheider) begins to see there is something more to this "Blue Thunder" than he is being told.

Murphy soon makes it his personal mission to expose "Blue Thunder" to the world. This brings him up against an old Viet Nam War "buddy," Cochrane, portrayed with an evil flare by

I won't reveal any more of the pla because there isn't really that mur more. In an action film, which Bill Thunder certainly is, plot is seconda to the chase.



A SMALL-TIME CROOK AND NO GENTLEMAN

Jesse is iinxed. He says so himself. What this means, according to Jesse, is that he has the devil's blessing. Nothing bad can happen to him. The young man, as portrayed by Richard Gere, enjoys life in the fast lane; he lives for now and for himself and has as little consideration for later as he has for others. He is a loony dreamer who feeds on erratic impulses; his mood without prior warning switches from mild-mannered to wild-tempered.

Breathless is patterned after the 1959 French half-classic, A Bout de Souffle, which made overnight stars of its direc-

tor, Jean-Luc Godard, and its leading duo, Monsieur Belmondo and Mademoiselle Seberg. Valerie Kaprisky in the Jean Seberg role plays a charming French student to whom Jesse feels attracted, as he does toward fast cars and cabriolets. These sporty machines all have one thing in common: Jesse carnapped them. Our hyperactive hero is a habitual thief and street-smart thug who thoroughly despises the bourgeois concept of collecting cash through ordinary work. Instead, he thrives on being an escape artist who seemingly attempts to get himself into an ever

Mr. Gere has picked another winner for a movie. His character does not fit the most liberal "good guy" definition, yet you can't help liking him, although you wouldn't want to have him as a friend. His Jesse, who lives in an awful pair of checkerboard pants through most of the picture, seems ready to trade in the real world for a cartoon cosmos anytime. The actor proves that he believes firmly in equal rights: In his love scenes with Ms. Kaprisky, he has no qualms about showing as much skin as his female counterpart does. Valerie Kaprisky is a fresh face and absolutely

believable as she slowly but surely falls for the small-time gangster and catches his contagious lust for danger. Jesse's passion for well-aged rock tunes makes for some ideal high-speed background beat, featuring encores of Jerry "The Killer" Lee Lewis' brilliant rendition of "Breathless."

Director Jim McBride tells a fastpaced story with lots of standard chase footage. Don't look for moral values in this one. As I started out, Jesse foolishly believes that he has the devil's blessing. Is that why I enjoyed the hell out of this move?

and I wonder why nobody asked me this before, but I tell you-I'm not gonna answer you, because I think it's very stupid.""

That story didn't end there. She was then introduced to the other journalists of the magazine and was asked, "How is Richard Gere in real life?" She replied, "Awful! You can't imagine!" This particularly excited them, because they probably envisioned a headline like, "RICHARD GERE IS AWFUL TO WORK WITH." But Valerie didn't allow them their pleasure for too long, when she stated, "Don't be too pleased. He's really wonderful."

My curiosity surfaced at this point, and I asked how it felt to make love in front of a camera with people watching. "It's scary and exciting at the same time. Since I was someone else [Monical, I could do anything I wanted to do. In a way, it was very exciting to make love to someone I didn't know at all. It's like when people go to a prostitute, they can ask anything, 'cause they're not gonna be judged. . . .

"Being intimate, you use your souvenirs and how you feel when you're relaxed and feel really good with someone, and you know he's trying to do the same. You're building sort-of a secret between the two of you. . . . "

Since I had supposedly ended the interview much earlier, I neglected to notice that my tape had ended. So the remainder of our converstion is only in my mind. Suffice it to say that she continued her discussion about making love in front of a camera; but we also discussed other aspects of the same topic, and the fact that we both like men made the atmosphere more comfortable. She autographed a photo for me, which read, "Dear Blase, how was it talking to Valerie Kaprisky?"

It was wonderful. I just have one word to say, "It was wonderful."



Luciano Pavarotti was born in Modena, Italy in 1935. Surrounded by the sounds of Care Schipa and Bjoerling, young Pavarotti dreamed of becoming a great tenor. It would be ye later that he would seriously pursue an operatic career, when he began teaching school Modena.

After two years of teaching, he began to study singing in hopes of becoming an open tenor. In 1961, he made his deubt in La Boheme in Reggio Emilia, and was immediately engage to sing in theatres throughout Italy. After touring with Joan Sutherland, Mr. Pavarotti appea at almost every major opera house in the world, receiving great acclaim, which prompted many to compare his voice to the greatest singers of all times.

His operatic repertoire includes the great lyric roles as well as some of the more drama roles he has acquired in his full maturity. Mr. Pavarotti's television appearances have incl ed the first Live From the Met, telecast opposite Renata Scott in La Boheme in 1975; al recital from the Metropolitan Opera House in 1978; a joint concert with Joan Sutherland, wh was telecast live from Lincoln Center in 1979; a trio concert with Ms. Sutherland and Man Horn in 1981; and most recently, the 1982 Met productions of Der Rosenklavier and Idome the same year he starred in his first movie, Yes, Giorgio.

Mr. Pavarotti's extensive discography includes more than 27 recordings of complete ope and oratorios, and 19 solo and concert recordings. His solo recording of Neopolitan Sor was listed in Billboard Magazine's Pop Listings, a first for an operatic artist.

We recently spoke briefly (10 minutes) with Luciano Pavarotti at his suite in Houston prestigious Four Seasons Hotel. The following are some of his sentiments on life in the ope

PROFILE

CONCERT AND OPERA COMPARIsons - Although they are very different, I like them both. An opera has singing and acting, where a concert does not. With a concert and orchestra, you just have the best of an opera. They are more difficult. You must really love the public to be able to stand alone on a huge stage and sing.

SINGING IN A 17,000-SEAT THEA-TRE (HOUSTON'S SUMMIT) - I hope the acoustics are good. First of all. good enough for me; I have to hear myself. I've sung to crowds that large before with no problems.

HOW IT FELT TO MAKE A MOVIE -The experience was great. It was very nice to be involved with such professional people outside of the opera. I was very happy with the result of the movie [Yes, Giorgio]. We wanted it to be light, without heavy drama. There's no message to the whole world in it. I'll have to see how the movie does in Europe, where it is running right now, before I could say whether or not I'll make another one.

HIS TASTE IN MUSIC - I like all types of music, classical, pop, even modern music. Good music is good. If I drive from here to El Paso, I'm sure I'll hear something on the radio that I will like. I have a feeling it won't be opera, but I will still like it.

HIS STATURE - [Pavarotti is 6'1". 45 years old, his weight is near 300 and constantly fluctuating.] This weight is dangerous. I enjoy my friends, and I party all over. I lose 15 pounds easily in a performance, but gain it back that night at a party. A fat man can find a girl; a fat girl is not good. I need a certain amount of weight for my breathing in singing, but only to a level.

VANITY? - First of all, I think all opera should be sung in the original language. All tenors should be Italian. It's a question of pronunciation and feeling. It has to come from the heart.

HIS MOST UNUSUAL EXPERIENCE I wish I could tell you. It's a very funny story, but it's just too personal. You must get me drunk first.





We spoke with Mr. Pavarotti on the day he arrived in Houston. It seems by the time his stay was over, he had sworn he would never play Houston again. He did not like the way he was treated (he did not wish to attend parties), and he was very unhappy with the reviews in the papers the day after his performance. Who said there's no tenor "prima donna"?
