





# HOUSTON'S BIGGEST GAY PRIDE PARADE

HOUSTON — This year there are 18 professionally built floats entered in this city's June 26 Gay Pride parade. "Last year, we had 12," a Gay Pride spokesperson told TWT NEWS. Thus, "this year's parade down Westheimer promises to be the biggest and most professional to date."

After the 5:30pm parade, the celebration at the Summit will begin. Doors will open at 7:00pm, with cocktails, dancing and no speech making. Singer Pamala Stanley is the opening act.

Star of the show, Tina Turner, announced that her high energy act will begin at 8:30pm. The ticket price has been held to \$9.65 to allow more to attend. All tickets are for reserved seating.

A media blitz of radio advertisements will commence on June 15. The day before, a press conference will be held at Kindred Spirits for all various media news departments.

This year's outstanding service to the community award was given to Carl Hayes for his untiring efforts reflecting gay pride.

# GAY PRIDE WEEK

LUBBOCK — The Lubbock Gay Alliance (LGA) has finalized plans for this city's first Gay Pride Week, June 19-26. TWT NEWS learned from LGA president, Steve Williams, that the theme will be "The Right to Live, The Right to Love."

Highlights of the week will include an Entertainer of the Year award on June 19 at Papillon, a gay pride rally on June 23 with Mike Stewart, Dallas Gay Alliance president, speaking, and a picnic at White River Lake Island on Sunday, June 26.

There will also be a Gay Pride Week awards banquet on June 25 to honor those who have made significant contributions to the Lubbock community, program coordiantor, Valerie Gold-Neil, stated.

Original artwork for Lubbock's first Gay Pride Week was executed by local artist, Kent Hicks, and will be on sale to benefit LGA.

The LGA, founded in late 1982, now boasts a mailing list of 150.

# FORTH WORTH'S GAY PRIDE WEEK

FORT WORTH — Gay Pride Week (GPW) comes to this city early this year, making the celebration the first GPW of 1983 in the State of Texas. It also marks the first time this city has had an organized week full of activites. Last year's celebration lasted only one day, and included a picnic in the park.

This year's theme is "Pride, Unity, Growth; Fort Worth—Where the Pride begins!"

GPW kicks off this Saturday, June 11, as each bar operates under the banner "Support your local bars; they support you."

On Sunday, June 12, "There is Pride in God's Love" highlights a special service at the Agape Metropolitan Community Church. The Rev. Elder Erhardt will officiate at the special GPW service.

Mr. and Ms. Gay Pride will be selected on Monday, June 13, in a contest held at The Other Place. The Tarrant County Gay Alliance will sponsor the benefit.

Activities at the Center for the Community are slated for Tuesday, June 14. Later that same evening, Tequila Sunrise will hold a GPW event. On June 15, the Downtowner presents a Roaring Twenties costume party. On June 16,



The Other Place presents a special GPW show. And, on June 17, the Corral and the South Jennings Crossroads bars of the 651 Club, Lumber Company and Come Along Inn, get into the gay pride act with events.

On Saturday, June 18, the annual gay pride picnic on Raina Lea Hill in Forest Park will be held. Gay Pride Week will culminate on June 19 as Fort Worth participates in the Sunday parade in nearby Dallas.

Posters, buttons and t-shirts are on sale around the city to help raise money for Gay Pride Week, Jerry Cassidy of TWT NEWS said. "Sharon and Pat have been excelling in their saleswomanship." it was reported.

# TEXANS RAISE OVER \$30,000 FOR TEXANS

HOUSTON — Over \$30,000 has been raised in the past several weeks by Texans for Texans is the jubilant news from Walter Strickler and Terry Clarke of the Barn, coordinators in the Lone Star State for this month's Rocky Mountain Regional Rodeo.

In previous years, Texas clubs have raised money for Multiple Sclerosis in conjunction with the annual National Reno Gay Rodeo. This year, however, local clubs decided to put the thrust of their efforts on local charities through the June 3-5 rodeo in Denver. Unlike Reno, Denver allowed each individual club to raise money for its own favorite local charity, rather than be dictated to direct all monies to MS.

Charities benefiting from the various statewide fundraisers included the Montrose Clinic, Montrose Counseling Center, Montrose Guest Recovery House, Houston Gay Switchboard and KS/AIDS Foundation.

Clubs participating included Snuffy's Saloon of San Antonio, plus Kindred Spirits, Ripcord, Briar Patch, Brazos River Bottom, Mary's and Barn of Houston.

An accurate and accountable financial report of all individual monies raised was formally sent to Mr. Wayne Jakino of the Colorado Gay Rodeo Association in Denver, TWT NEWS was advised.

# DALLAS CITY COUNCIL SCORES A FIRST

DALLAS — This city has become the first in Texas, and one of the few in the nation, to pass an official resolution asking the federal government to release more funding for AIDS.

The action came at City Hall on June 1, as Councilmember Craig Holcomb of Oak Lawn's District 5 presented a resolution requesting significant new federal funds to be allocated, within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services for Research, into the cause, transmission and cure for AIDS.

Annette Straus seconded the resolution. It then passed by a unanimous vote of the Dallas City Council, Richard Rogers of TWT NEWS reported.

Prior to the presentation, three prominent Dallas gay leaders spoke on behalf of the resolution's passage. They were Mike Stewart, president of the Dallas Gay Alliance (DGA); Bill Nelson, vice-president of DGA; and Howie Daire, founder and director of the Oak Lawn Counseling Center, and also founder and director of the AIDS Action Project and Hotline. Daire stressed to councilmembers that the disease was no longer just affecting gays, but now affecting all segments of society.


# LESBIAN MOTHERS MEETINGS GROWING

# MCC AUSTIN DEFINES MISSION

AUSTIN — How does a church comprised mostly of gay people define itself? That was the question posed to the Metropolitan Community Church (MCC) of Austin recently by pastor Joan Wakeford. Members and friends of the church met May 22 at an informal potluck to decide as a group what the mission, goals and objections of MCCA would be, Harry C.S. Wingfield reported to TWT NEWS.

The first and most important item on the agenda was deciding the mission of the church in Austin and to the world. After considerable discussion, it was decided that the mission of MCCA is a unified Christian outreach, through witness and interaciton, to reach unchurched people, with a special ministry to the gay community.

In order to reach this goal, special task forces were set up for every aspect of the church, including worship, Christian education, evangelism, special ministry to persons with unique needs, such as substance abuse, gender identity problems and other counseling needs, as well as outreach to hispanics and other minorities.

Plans were also made to set up covenant families within the church this summer. A music festival was also planned for late October.



# SOB'S, BUD & TINA AT GPC MEETING

HOUSTON - On the first Wednesday in June, the regular monthly meeting was shortened so work could continue on the mailer to be sent out announcing details of the Gay Pride Week (GPW) festivities at the Summit. TWT NEWS reporter David Fields later learned from GPC president Larry Bagneris that this shortened meeting also gave GPC board members the opportunity to hear considerations, pro and con, concerning the sexually-oriented business (SOB) ordinance written by City Councilmember George Greanias. In an unusual move, the meeting was closed to the media, although mintues were available afterwards.

Under the then-current articles of incorporation, the GPW Committee was disallowed a donation from Budweiser by the Texas Alcoholic Beverages Commission a few weeks ago. The amount of \$12,000 for GPW can now be received with the help of Governor White's office in facilitating the addition of an amendment to the articles of incorporation, after a talk with White's office.

Last week, Bagneris received a letter from that office confirming a sub-paragraph had been added, and stating, "To increase understanding of social, racial and sexual minorities, and to encourage the acceptance of the tolerance of alternative lifestyles, so that together, the citizens of the City of Houston and the State of Texas may work together in a spirit of peaceful cooperation to build a better society where we all can live in peace."

The GPW Committee is now classified as a civic organization, able to receive such funds under law. Bagneris brought this before the body to demonstrate the impact the Houston GPC has in Texas.

With the mailer now out for GPW, papers signed for the Summit, and Tina Turner booked, the GPC turned its attention to fine-tuning preparations for Gay Pride Week.

# \_\_\_\_SPECIAL REPORT OUR GAY LOBBY

A CONVERSATION WITH BETTIE NAYLOR, PAT CRAMER AND JOHN CALKIN

# BY CHUCK PATRICK

This is the first of a two-part series of SPECIAL REPORTS on the accomplishments of our gay lobby during the 1983 Texas State Legislature. With the current session having concluded on May 30, TWT met in Austin with the three pivotal members of the Lesbian Gay Rights Advocates (LGRA) in their offices on Colorado Avenue overlooking the State Capitol. The following is a transcript of the conversation recorded between Bettle Naylor, Pat Cramer and John Calkin, with Chuck Patrick of TWT.

TWT — Before we review the gay lobby's accomplishments during the just concluded session, let's retrace the beginnings. When was the gay lobby first organized to defend gay rights?

Naylor — It all began in 1979—three sessions ago—during the 66th session. It was known then as the Human Rights Advocates.

# TWT — What were the major accomplishments of that first effort?

Naylor — We got a rider taken out of the appropriations bill that had been put in during the session before [1977], which would give universities the authority not to have to recognize gay campus organizations. This would have meant that universities wouldn't have had to let gay organizations use campus facilities.


TWT — Who was responsible for introducing this bill back then?

Calkin — The bill had been introduced by Bill Ceverha back in 1977. It was introduced on the floor of the legislature to the appropriations bill.

Cramer — And the first time that we had a gay lobbyist, which was in the 66th session, two years after Ceverha had introduced his proposal, his rider was removed!

Naylor — It was removed on a point of order. In retrospect, it should have been taken out of the appropriations bill originally in conference committee because it was not germaine. But, nobody wanted to raise that issue. But because it was in there, we were able, two years later, to very quietly go about our business of lobbying to raise a point of order and in fact take it out.

Calkin — Had there been a gay lobby two years before, in the 65th session, the rider would have been taken

out in conference committee. But we weren't there then with a gay lobby.

TWT — Fortunately you were there in 1979... and also two years ago during the 67th session. Highlight 1981 for our readers.

Naylor — Two years ago the major accomplishment of the gay lobby was to keep all major legislative action against the gay community silent. As a result there was nothing done against Texas gays and lesbians.

TWT — Coming forward to the past session, which just ended on May 30, 1983, your efforts were most successful in keeping Ceverha's house bill 2138 from coming to a floor vote. Tell our readers how this ill-fated sodomy bill developed and when you first became aware of it.

Cramer — It goes back to Jim Mad-

Naylor — And to the Don Baker 21.06 case, last August's decision that homosexuality was no longer illegal. It was, in fact, unconstitutional since it discriminated against a certain group of people—gays.

TWT — Therefore, since Texas would have been without a penal code on sodomy for the first time, the legal wheels were set in motion.

Cramer — Actually, what happened was that when Maddox announced that the state would not appeal the judge's ruling because his team of lawyers had told him and advised him that the state had no basis for such a suit, he announced publicly that the state would not pursue an appeal.

Naylor — It was the same day of the filing deadline . . . at 6:00pm. It was issued from the attorney general's office as an administrative matter. That went directly around to all of the pertinent state offices at 8:30am that same morning. By 1:00pm, Ceverha filed his bill. Ceverha had "the thing" ready to go in the event there was to be no appeal. He was prepared.

Calkin — It was not prepared, however, by the legislative council. I suppose his reasons for doing it that way were to keep it as quiet as possible.

TWT — But it didn't stay quiet very long, because after it was filed it became a very noisy issue. Every newspaper was glaring with sodomy bill headlines and indepth descriptions of the hearings. What was the tone of those hearings which you attended?

Naylor — They were terrible! The day before the hearings, Ceverha had sent a letter around to his colleagues.

Cramer — The letter said, "Dear Colleague: I invite you to join me in cosponsoring this legislation" and had explained that Texas had had a sodomy law on the books since the 1850s . . . and that Texas was not ready to put the stamp of approval on homosexual behavior.

Naylor — He also had a video tape playing all day while they were in session. It was in the speaker's lounge.

### TWT - A video tape of what?

Calkin — Dr. Paul Cameron talking about AIDS and how homosexuals are a threat to public health, part of the CBS-TV documentary on Gay Power—Gay Politics, and the third segment was scenes from the movie Cruising.

Naylor — And it ran continuously. However, a friend of ours told us that when they went in the lounge they would turn it off.

Cramer — This is how he prepared the members of the criminal jurisprudence committee who were going to hear his sodomy bill legislation later in the day.


# TWT — What did our gay lobby do to keep this horrible bill in committee?

Naylor — Immediately after the bill had been filed, we notified all our friends that it was coming up and we were going to do everything within our power to keep it in committee. And, of course, these legislators were willing to help us do that because nobody wanted that bill to get to the floor. Nobody wanted to have to vote on such a controversial bill.

Cramer — You see, there are an awful lot of people in the legislature who feel homosexuality is not a prob-



lem. But, they all have various reasons why they couldn't come out and vote publicly for homosexuality.

TWT — Thus, it was politically safer not to have to vote on it at all. Did you ever feel that 2138 would ever reach the floor for a vote?

Cramer — I was worried. Considering the makeup of the jurisprudence committee, had there been enough pressure brought to bear on the representatives from rural areas, they might have felt pressured to vote for it. But, I think the pressure probably would have had to come from some of their larger contributors, rather than just the folks who indeed did write-in, who were mainly just the fundamentalist churches in the Dallas area.

Naylor — There could have been, at any point from the time that legislation was introduced, a concerted effort on the part of a lot of pressure groups to have tried to get that bill out of committee. But, there, we were in luck. With maybe just two exemptions, the members of the committee really did not want to make homosexual conduct illegal! They really don't want to do that.

Calkin — But the way the bill was presented, they had a problem. They didn't know how to separate the fact that homosexuals are the people who have AIDS, and simply just legislating homosexual conduct.

Cramer — In fact, the information they got is what helped them to form their opinion. But, there was a conflict for these committee members. You see, the people on the committee would have liked to have been able to do something about AIDS, yet they didn't want to condemn the gay community. They had trouble separating the two things.

TWT — By using such fear tactics, do you feel that Cameron and Ceverha lost a lot of Capitol Hill credibility?

Naylor — I would hope so. I can't speak for Cameron, except that I do know there were real problems before he even came to Austin as a speaker. There are some real problems with his

credibility even within his own association... some real questions about him. As for Ceverha, had there not been an AIDS issue, Ceverha would probably not have gotten any support for his bill.

Cramer — Another thing that we had to watch over was that, a month before the hearing, he invited his house colleagues to co-sponsor his bill. I was going down to the chief clerk's office every day to see who had signed on. And thankfully, only one House of Representatives member signed on to that bill. If there had been bunches of them, that would have put a lot of pressure on the committee. Thankfully, there was only one freshman representative from Round Rock who signed on.

Naylor — By contrast, two years ago, the bill that was introduced that would have raised the occupation tax from \$15 to \$1,500 on peep show movie machines had some 40 co-sponsors.

TWT — Where do you think you played your greatest part in keeping 2138 from becoming Texas' new sodomy law?


Naylor — Where our lobby efforts were most effective was in keeping Ceverha from putting an amendment on another bill.

Cramer — Also, had we not been there, some watered-down version of 2138 might have made it out of committee.

TWT — Do you think the current mood of the Texas Legislature has matured to the point that homosexuality is no longer a great issue?

Naylor — I think all the legislators hope it never will be again. It's too controversial of an issue to deal with and vote on.

On that note, we conclude Part One of our conversational forum with our gay lobby in Austin. We will continue our conversation forum next week when we will discuss topics aside from 2138, such as VD testing laws, gay senior citizens legislation, raising the drinking age to 21, and the new liquor tax increases; plus Governor Mark White's feelings about gay rights.

# Spirit of Cooperation

... A feeling pervades that our community's organizations are unwilling to work together to fight AIDS. Not true! Admittedly, there have been misunderstandings and hurt feelings, but most have been due to a simple lack of communication. Our community is in a transitional period. Organizations are beginning to network and figure out how to cooperate. This networking is not yet formally structured, but it is happening.

... Mayor Kathy Whitmire's AIDS Working Group is coordinating epidemiological surveillance and the official projects conducted in Houston by the various governmental and private agencies. Its list of members is impressive, City, County and State health officials: City Councilmembers Dale Gorcznski, George Greanias and Eleanor Tinsley; City Comptroller Lance Lalor, M.D. Anderson Hospital officials; and the KS/AIDS Foundation president.

Citizens for Human Equality is involved in community education and political lobbying projects. GPC is also supporting local, state and national lobbying activities. The Montrose Counseling Center is working with the KS/AIDS Foundation to provide a myriad of services for patients and their families and friends. The Gav Switchboard of Houston, the Cancer Information Service and Crisis Hotline are training volunteers to provide AIDS information and medical referrals. The Montrose Clinic provides medical referrals.

Mainstream Houston clergy are now publicly encouraging compassion and understanding in dealing with AIDS patients and high risk groups. . . .

The Diana Foundation held a huge fundraiser; other groups have also expressed an interest in large fundraisers, and many bars have held or are planning fundraisers.

The KS/AIDS Foundation, undergoing its

own growing pains, now has an office, a "hotline" (524-AIDS), and is ready to immediately coordinate volunteer resources from any person or group that calls. (This couldn't be said just a few weeks ago.)

There's a willingness on all fronts to help. And there is a role for every group, every person in this fight against AIDS. While we all determine how to coordinate these roles, we must not be afraid to stumble. We must agree to disagree. . . .

Meanwhile, we must all talk up the positive and play down the negative. There will be enough negative messages coming from AIDS itself. Kent Sumrall

# Gay District Dispute

Editor-The May 12-25 issue of Oak Lawn Today contained the following editorial. which aimed at discrediting an article published in TWT, Vol. 9, No. 6, concerning gay voter strength in Dallas.

Since the recent city council election, it has been reported in the gay press that city council District 5 has replaced District 2 as the city's "gay" district.

Craig Holcomb was the easy winner in District 5 which includes East Dallas and portions of Oak Lawn underneath the Park Cities over to Cedar Springs Rd. Paul Fielding won a hotly contested run-off election against the gay-backed Ricardo Medrano for the District 2 seat which the gay community has claimed as their district in the past.

In a recent story in the gay publication, TWT, the Dallas Gay Political Caucus was reported to be claiming District 5 as the new gay voting district and that "it is unquestionably clear that the bulk of the Oak Lawn gay vote is solidly entrenched in District 5."

councilman Fielding that the gay voter strength in his District 2 was probably greatly increased under the March 1982 Justice Department re-districting. He said this occurred because District 2 and pistrict 5 split up the strip that was claimed by District 3-a finger of territory that stretched along the west side and just south and southwest of the Park Cities. This expansion puts precincts 3302 and 3304, as well as others up to Walnut Hill Lane, into District 2. The re-districting also extended District 2 farther into East Dallas. taking in precincts 1120 and 1213.

Maps outlining the new districts and those boundaries that were in effect prior to re-districting clearly show District 2 to have been extended to include a number of areas previously believed to be principally gay. District 5, likewise, was extended into a portion of Oak Lawn, but is not believed to have offset the changes that occurred in District 2's voter make-up.

Editor-The following letter was sent to Oak Lawn Today in response to the above editorial.

Editor, Oak Lawn Today P.O. Box 190972 Dallas, Texas 75219 Dear Sir:

The facts do not support the claims made in your unsigned editorial "City Council's 'Gay' District Claim Disputed"

(May 12-May 25, 1983).

You suggest that precincts 3302 and 3304, two of the gay community's four largest precincts, were added to District 2 in 1982. In fact, a majority of the voters in both were already in District 2. Prior to 1982 these were "split" precincts, and election returns show that nearly 83% of 3302 residents voting in the 1980 city council election did so in District 2; in 3304 the figure was nearly 80%. The addition of the two remaining small parts of 3302 and 3304 to District 2 is not likely to have changed the makeup of the district significantly.

You claim that the redistricting "also extended District 2 farther into East Dallas, taking in precincts 1120 and 1213." In fact, these also were split precincts in 1980, dividing their votes between districts 2 and 5. At least here District 2 did make gains. Precinct 1213 (formerly 3362) cast a little over 52% of its vote in District 5 in 1980; precinct 1120 (formerly 3363) cast nearly 83% in 5. However, though a majority of the voters in these two areas were new to

District 2 in 1983, neither was completely new to the district, as you suggest. And, while gays represent a sizable minority in both areas, neither can be accurately called "principally gay."

By contrast, the changes redistricting made in District 5 were significant. The 1982 plan took from 5 its 1980 portions of 1120 and 1213 but added to it all of precincts 3311, 1189, 1190, and 1191 from old District 3. Two of these (3311 and 1191) have long been among the four leading gay precincts in the city, and either of the remaining two has probably twice as many identified gay voters as 1120 and 1213 combined. Perhaps you and Mr. Fielding believe these changes in District 5 have not offset those made in District 2, but no one who has looked at the facts could share your belief.

The truth is that gay voter strength in District 2 increased marginally under redistricting, while the increase in District 5 was far more significant. District 5 is indeed the city's leading gay district, as the DGPC has pointed out. The proof is so easy to find that one can only wonder whether your "editorial" represents anything more than a vain attempt to discredit the DGPC. Joe Mosley Dallas, Texas

A few months ago, in TWT's first color issue, the review of Is the Homosexual My Neighbor? Another Christian View appeared here. The purpose of the authoresses was to provide an informed, compassionate view of homosexuality to those of the Christian faith. generally Protestants. The focus of that book was to explain what the Scriptures actually say (with accurate translation) and the status of homosexuality in the Protestant religion.

In the same spirit, editor Jeannine Gramick has collected several adaptations from the presentations given at the First National Symposium on Homosexuality and the Catholic Church, November 20-22, 1981 by New Ways Ministries, and combined them into Homosexuality and the Catholic Church. The various chapters include personal accounts from male and female gay Catholics, a new sociological theory, feminism and morality. Those attending the conference were more than 150 national and diocesan church leaders, as well as members of Dignity, the organization begun in 1969 as a spiritual support group for lesbian and gay Catholics.

The issues are intricate and many This is due to the ignorance and fear traditional in the Church and in the minds of many, that surrounds these issues of celibacy and sexuality, due as

much to the convoluted church doc. trine and "moral theology" related to homosexuality. Specific Scriptual pas. sages are not referred to here, but the fine distinctions of sexual orientation separate from sexual behavior are discussed in several contexts.

The variety of material runs from straightforward, informal personal accounts to technical discussions of historical trends in recent years and the new compassion and willingness to learn new perspectives. Some of these discussions are more difficult to follow and should be read at a more leisurely pace. The material is divided into two parts: homosexuality in a sociological and anthropological context, then a more specific analysis of the churches' (around the country) and the Church's growing acceptance of homosexual men and women in the priesthood.

The editor herself writes Chapter Three in Part One, beginning, "A concern for the person in her or his existential context and social structure demands an interdisciplinary approach to Christian morality." But the most comprehensive and lengthy statement is by Robert Nugent (a Salvatorian priest, and co-founder and co-director of New Ways Ministries) in Chapter Five, "Homosexuality. Celibacy. Religious Life and Ordination."

He begins with a note on the preva-



This also includes the current impact of this issue on admission policy and formation programs, with "bright spots on the horizon" for improvement. There are copious notes and biblio-

graphical references at the end of every chapter. For those who need to open dialogue in a parish or diocese, Homosexuality and the Catholic Church is a good primer and reference work. Nine authors from varying backgrounds convey their concerns and cover the broad spectrum of opinions and arguments for and against the legitimacy of homosexuals among the religious and in the priesthood.

Homosexuality as a civil rights issue in the Church is explored by Theresa Kane in "Civil Rights in A Church of Compassion." She offers some specific responses to Robert Nugent's chapter and articulates three challenges on the issue of homosexuality in the Catholic Church. Her experience stems from her order, Sisters of Mercy of the Union, endorsing the Catholic Coalition for Gay Civil Rights statement distributed by New Ways Ministry. This controversial action and others led her to speak out.



Alfred Hitchcock, with typical irony, called *Psycho* a "fun" motion picture, a black comedy on the American Dream. Although few would ever admit they found the film humorous, Hitchcock's observations demonstrate that he had something else in mind than creating a thriller when he made *Psycho*. Some people, in fact, wonder how the film got its reputation at all as a classic suspense story when they view it today. While we will never know what the audience felt at the first screening of the




Vera Miles is not convinced Norman Bates is cured.

movie in 1960, certainly individuals were not simply frightened, but perhaps perplexed and a little angry, too. The murder of the heroine after the first thirty minutes of the film—surely the longest red herring in motion pictures—must have been an outrageous aesthetic shock. Hitchcock had pulled off one of the dirtiest jokes in his career



with cool, detached aplomb. But the explicit violence and blood-letting of today's films have desensitized many viewers to the more implicit style of a Hitchcock, and is it no wonder that Marion Crane's death in the shower seems to some like a hole in the head?

Yet have those people who complain about the lack of "suspense" in *Psycho* really examined the picture? As Hitchcock got older, his view of humanity became progressively darker and more fatalistic. *Psycho* isn't about terror and suspense; it's concerned with the corruptability in one of America's most prized institutions: the family unit.

peath—seen as an inevitability in the film—comes about through the hands

of the supposedly life-giving Mother, who in reality is a vampire that figuratively devours her own son (Norman Bates becomes Mother). As Bates, Anthony Perkins appears as the protective, sincere son who loves his mother with a faithfulness befitting his position. Yet it is Norman Bates, of course, who murders his mother in an act of amorous rage (incest) and uses her to commit more crimes. In Psycho, then, the family becomes a force of chaos and destruction. ripping the fabric of society.

All this brings me to Psycho II, once again set at the Bates Motel, once again starring Anthony Perkins as a "rehabilitated" Norman Bates. The concept of rehabilitating Bates shows almost immediately that the filmmakers do not understand the original film. In




Meg Tilly "befriends" Norman.

Psycho, Bates was Mother at the end, with no hope of gaining back his own personality. Perkins is still win-

ning in his role; the rest of the movie less so. Besides the problem of "curing" Norman Bates, there are also too many red herrings in Tom Holland's script, and we feel cheated at the picture's conclusion, I expected at least some finesse or subtlety in style from director Richard Franklin, particularly since Psycho II seems hell-bent on recreating the feel of the original, even imitating some of the same shots from Hitchcock's work. (The color photography, however, turns Norman's man-

sion into a kind of Tara on the river Styx.) Imagine a film where the pressing questions are 1) will Norman Bates make good? 2) will someone take a shower? 3) if so, will the woman mime every one of Janet Leigh's expressions? and 4) will she die? Now that's subtlety.

MAD DOC SCREWS TOPS

Just answer the following two questions, will you? One: Are you a fan of that wild and crazy guy? Two: Are you into Mel Brooks' peculiar brand of movie madness? If your response is a double yes, I recommend you to catch an el-cheapo matinee show of The Man With Two Brains. However, if you have a history of going genuinely bananas over Mr. Martin's eccentric escapades, you should go all the way and invest in a full-price ticket. The rest of you be warned: Steve Martin has been a lot funnier when guesting on The Tonight Show, and director Carl Reiner orchestrates a succession of zany situations. but a Mel Brooks he's not.

This is Mr. Reiner's third collaboration with the bizarre silver-haired comic (after *The Jerk* and the superbly crafted Dead Men Don't Wear Plaid). In Brains, Martin plays a noted neurosurgeon who loves "slimy things"; that's why he goes for brains. His innovative name is Hfuhruhurr, which by itself evokes what seems like a few hundred cracks that alone are hardly funny enough to carry the picture. The oddball doc has perfected a gray-cell operation nicknamed the "screwtop method" which, he believes, will immortalize his name through all eternity "and bevond." One of the "victims" on his operating table is Kathleen Body Heat Turner, whom he winds up marrying. She suffers from a strategically recurring post-surgery headache which makes it impossible for her to engage in alleged marital obligations. Dr. Hfuhruhurr's increasing horniness is adequately manifested in a windowsmashing scene which is triggered by a certain protruding, steel-hard instrument that is part of the doctor's physique. With not much cooking in the getting-laid department, can anybody blame him that he eventually falls for a talking brain that is neatly stored in


The story, written by Reiner, Martin and George Gipe, is a bit obnoxious and a bit silly with long, boring stretches and way too few hilarious moments.


And, Mr. Martin, if you think this is a rather rude review, all I can say is: Well, excuuu-uuuse me.




Tom Berenger: The Big Chill

Contrary to a rumor I'm planning to spread, the new Burt Reynolds/Julie Andrews film is not called Mary Poppins and the Bandit. Actually it's called The Man Who Loved Women and is the latest project of Blake Edwards. . . . Look for Debbie Harry to star with Rick Springfield in Hard to Hold. . . . Sean Penn, already a Rolling Stone cover boy on the strength of three theatrical films -Taps, Fast Times at Ridgemont High and Bad Boys-next stars in Racing With the Moon with Elizabeth Mc-Govern. (She'll be seen later this year in the Sergio Leone blockbuster Once Upon a Time in America, with Robert De Niro, Treat Williams and Tuesday Weld.) ... # Thursday. September 27

Sixteen. Two more years to go. At least I'll have my driver's license in a week. That should get me out once in a while. The party was semi-fun. This had to do with Dad insisting that we'd

drink Kool-Aid—or Pepsi at most; he also figured 9:30 to be the ideal time to blow the whistle. Just when everyone was getting into the mood. Well, what can you expect when "the boss of the house" is a minister. Of course, my

buddy Greg tried to be the life of the party and prove once again that he sure knows how to handle chicks. They were always surrounding him and giggling at his silly jokes. Sometimes I wish I had some of his talents. But after all, a dozen kids showed up; this proves that I'm not exactly unpopular either. At least Jane did not fall too much for Greg's crap. It's good that I have her as a girlfriend. She's a lot of fun. I can talk to her about almost anything.

### Friday. September 28

Greg dropped by with a couple of joints. We snuck out and went to Arrowhead Pond. There we sat on the old bridge and got high. Was weird watching the fish floating below us in slow motion. The smoke sure messed with our brains and zoomed us into one of our sillier moods. As usual Greg soon went into details about his recent love encounters. He always talks like crazy when he's up on something. Explicitly, he described how he made it with Beatrice, the best looking broad in class. As has happened before, his story got us kind of horny. We went into the bushes and jacked off together. He came fantasizing about Bea; I came seeing him come. Thank God everything looked cool when Bill, our new black farmhand, showed up suddenly on his bike. What's up, guys? he asked. Nothing anymore, Greg exclaimed, and we were laughing our heads off.

## Friday, October 5

Dad actually let me have the pick-up. I drove to town to Jane's house and invited her to go see *Porky's* at the drive-in. She gladly accepted. We first stopped at the "Rising Sun" for a couple of beers. Little to my surprise, Greg and a bunch of other folks from school were hanging out at the place. Greg begged us to take him with us. I explained that drive-ins were made for twosomes. He wasn't thrilled about that theory, but understood. The other guys made a few cracks and inquired when our engagement would be. I smiled and put my

arm around Jane's shoulder. This was a definite boost to my image.

The movie turned out to be pretty boring, which didn't seem to bother Jane. Somehow, the stupid picture had her all excited. She told me that she





really digs me. We kissed. Her hands touched areas they had not touched before. Noticing that I was a little bit on the passive side, she tried to encourage me, saying things like she'd do stuff with me she wouldn't do with anyone in the whole world. I claimed I wanted to watch the movie. She's so

sweet. All she said was that it was all up to me. Whenever I was ready, whenever I wanted to . . .

Then, big trouble at home. Mom and Dad were waiting up for me. It wasn't even 11 when I showed up. But they had gotten a call from Jane's folks who were worried about their little darling. Dad's immediate verdict: so much for the car! plus all that baloney about trust and responsibility—I had obviously failed in both categories.

# Saturday, October 6

Time for the long sermon. It wouldn't surprise me if Dad had stayed up half the night to prepare this one. He sure knew his lines. We had been harvesting the corn off Richmond Field. Just before sunset he took me aside: he offered me a big red apple and got one for himself. We sat down on the grass at the roadside next to the tractor. He explained that he didn't want to be too harsh on his son. Then a little tearjerking: he and Mom had really been worried last night about me ... and that girl. That's why they had been so upset. The eternal optimist in me asked if they weren't upset anymore and if that meant I could still have the pickup. I would get another chance. He said that with a kind and amiable smile. I'm sure that sort of a smile is taught to anvone who's out to become a minister. They probably spend hours and hours rehearsing it. Dad got into an endless lecture. About the goals in life. About school and how important it is to develop one's brain capacities. Only after everything upstairs is in tip-top shape should a young person be entitled to some of the pleasures in life, in other words, to do some limited fooling around. And only-this is most important, son-only if the heart is totally with it. It turned out that their worries had to do with my age. With his infallible logic he concluded that I was all of a sudden capable of not only endangering and changing my own life but also that of some innocent young girl. I personally don't see that danger at all.

I didn't argue with him, though. Let's face it, he basically means well; it's just that his way of getting his point across tends to be a bit boring and very time-consuming.

### Sunday, October 7

Another sermon, this time in church. What a day, I'll never forget this one. From the beginning: A few times before. Dad has shown a tendency to somehow turn real-life episodes into some kind of "divine messages" for the whole congregation. Today he focused on young people in general and their lax moral values in particular. I looked over to Jane, who was sitting at the other end of the packed house, next to her parents, all clad in neat Sunday clothes. She waved at me: we both knew Dad was in a way referring to us. It was basically a repeat-performance of what he had told me yesterday, just a little bit more in general terms. His climaxing message went like this: I understand that our teenagers are curious about sex, but listen, boys and girls, all those gifts and rewards that are out there for you have to be earned first, through a serious, honest and positive life. He sounded again like a cross between teacher and preacher. Although the boys and girls definitely were not too impressed with his words. their producers sure were. The people in our community get off to his style. And they don't seem to mind his outspokeness anymore: it has long become clear that he is not a liberal with loads of wild and progressive ideas; he's just not afraid to touch any subject whatsoever. That used to be a bit unusual for our town, but the folks have come to like it.

And then there was his final prayer. I'm afraid that he's always in form and lets us stand for a quarter of an hour or longer while he talks and talks. God also had to be patient today; thank Him it took only ten minutes this time. But that was enough. Holy Toledo! I could not believe my ears when I heard his final sentences. I distinctly remember

every word of them and probably always will: And also, Father, in these days of immorality help us to protect our children from the dangerous influences of homosexuals who seem to be gaining more and more power in this great country of ours. Help us defeat their cause, help us get them off our streets, help us save our great country against perverts. I thank you, Father, for the love and strength you give us. Amen. Holy shit. As I heard his words, I didn't need to think, I simply felt it; I had denied it long enough; however, this very minute it became evident to me, totally clear and without a trace of a doubt. I am one of those Dad is all of a sudden trying to get off the streets. Holy fuck! It's funny, I've always had some idea, but I also succeeded in keeping certain doubts alive. But today I know it's true. I'm actually one of the perverts my old man is warning against. It hurt. Every single word he said hurt. Only now, as I'm writing these lines, I'm wondering if he perhaps has a clue about me. He's a smart cookie, you know. But . . . no way! He doesn't know a thing, otherwise he would have held a whole long speech on the subject and skipped all that nonsense about boys and girls. Anyway, I better make sure my diary remains locked at all times. What in hell made him turn with such strong words against this one group? I have to find out. I have to ask him, But how, without turning red like a tomato?

### Saturday, October 13

Not a lucky day. I was at the "Sun" with the rest of the gang as usual on Saturdays. Though I had intended to stay sober and stick to Pepsi Light, I quickly realized that Miller Lite would do a better job at loosening my tongue. It was almost 10, shortly before Dad's deadline, when I finally managed to get Jane outside with me. We walked over to that park bench near the little lake. Naturally, Jane was expecting some romantic escapade. As we sat down, she complained that it was cold, thus convincing my arm to hold her close to



me and shelter her from the mild October breeze. I wished I had brought another can of beer along, for my tongue still wasn't loose enough. But I had looked to her as my test case, so be it! I'm queer, I said. You're drunk, she said. I repeated my statement in a few more words. She shook herself free and ran back to the bar. Don't tell the others. I velled after her. For a minute I considered drowning myself in the lake, and I probably would have, but I remembered just in time that it was only three feet deep, Instead, I took the bus home, and now I'm in bed with tons of self-pity and watery eyes.

### Sunday. October 14

Jane called early in the morning and asked if I was feeling all right again. Why, had I been sick? I had confused her so, she said, she didn't know what to think. Neither did I. I said . . . and, no, I wouldn't see her at church. My father at the breakfast table dropped his orange juice as he overheard my words. The news of my not attending church was greeted with as much shock as if World War III had just broken out. Dad knew he couldn't order me to go. So he blackmailed me. If you don't show up, son, I'll put you under house arrest all week. And now, I guess, I'm under house arrest all week. That does, of course, not cover school or helping out in the fields. What an irony. Dad has already managed to keep the first one off the streets.

Jane buzzed me again late in the afternoon to let me in on Dad's latest

assault. It wasn't even worse than last Sunday's, only today he spent a bit more time explaining his and his church's views, and apparently also God's personal opinion which, by coincidence, were all the same. Jane asked if this would change my mind. I explained, that is not the way things work.

### Thursday. October 18

One visitor was allowed. Greg came by. We couldn't go to the bridge down at the pond, unfortunately, but had to stay in my room which meant: no joint. Thank God, Jane has kept quiet. Greg reported about his latest successful screw; since he wasn't high, he left out the details. As casual as possible, I asked him in the course of our chit-chat what he was thinking about gays. Queers? Thank heavens you don't find them in Plainview, Texas. When I see one. I'll kick him in the ass!

The lesson of the day: I gotta get out. This stupid town is really for the birds. From the sparse information in *Time* magazine, I get the feeling that there is more going on in some of the bigger cities.

### Sunday, October 21

Dad, I hope, realized that his policy got him nowhere. Again, I didn't go to the temple. The family uproar has died down a little. From certain suggestions, I gather that my parents believe their son is about to become an atheist. Dad has not—yet—decided on another week indoors for me. Jane told me that the perverts this time only got a one-liner in his sermon. At school, the two of us hardly talk. But over the phone she said she'd like us to remain friends.

## Monday, October 22

Since he had driven fifteen miles so far, we had to go all the way back. Noticing that I had run out of topics, he switched back to his monologue, trying hard not to offend me. As we stopped in front of our house, he said he wouldn't attack such people anymore and, instead, he would pray for those poor misguided creatures. I guess that's the best I can hope for at the moment. At the moment.




