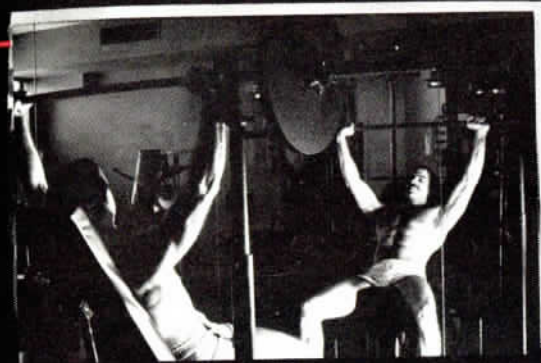

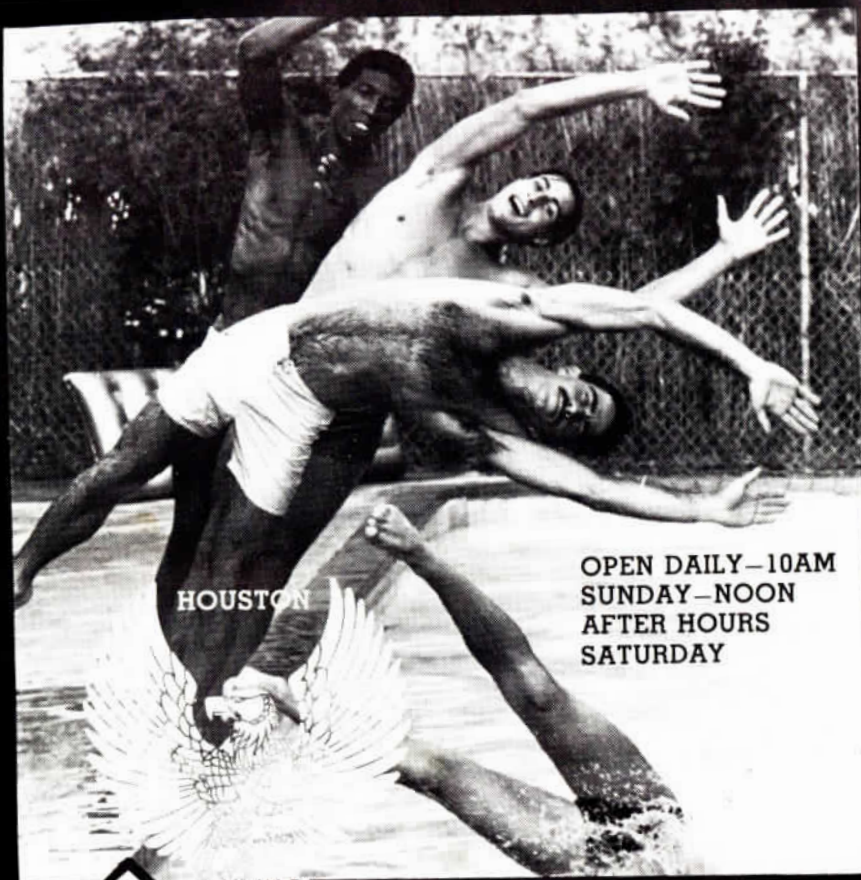

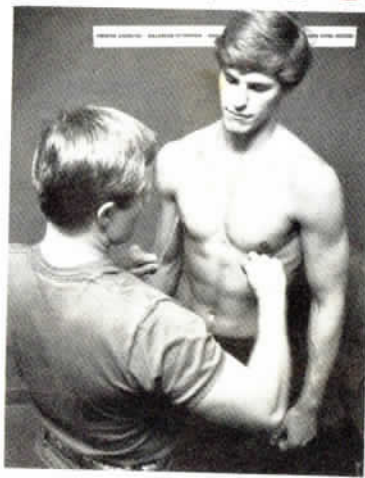

GAY PRIDE WEEK IN FORT WORTH

FORT WORTH — Texas' first Gay Pride Week began a week ago, on June 11 in this city. It climaxes this weekend with an all-city event.

This Saturday, June 18, the Gay Pride Week Association, in cooperation with most clubs in Tarrant County, jointly participate in the annual picnic on Raina Lea Hill in Forest Park. The public is invited to the afternoon affair as there will be beer, drinks, food, fun and games.

This year's theme is "Pride, Unity, Growth; Fort Worth—Where the Pride Begins." This year's celebration marked the first time Fort Worth had organized a full week of gay pride activities under the newly-formed Fort Worth Gay Pride Association, Jerry Cassidy of TWT NEWS reported.

GAY PRIDE WEEK IN AUSTIN

AUSTIN — Gay Pride Week begins next Monday in the Capitol City. It will mark a week-long celebration in Texas' most liberal city, where "being out" and living the gay lifestyle are not hampered by police harassment. Truly, Austin gay men and women have much to celebrate. This year's theme is "One Voice for Human Rights," Jay Cherin of TWT NEWS reported. Karen Stewart of Austin Lambda is the appointed chair of the Austin Gay/Lesbian Pride Week Task Force.

The events included in this year's celebration are a gay roller skating night at Hot Wheels Skateworld on Monday, June 20 at 8:00pm, a concert featuring local gay and lesbian entertainment at Emmajoe's on Wednesday, June 22 at 7:00pm, a benefit dance at the Holly-

wood for the entire Austin gay community on Friday, June 24 at 10:00pm, and a march on Saturday, June 25, 11:00am, from Chance's at 900 Red River to the south side of the State Capitol, where there will be a rally with speeches by political activists, entertainers and community leaders. The task force has asked Mayor Mullen to officially proclaim the week June 20-26 Austin Gay/ Lesbian Pride Week.

The week-long celebration will climax on Sunday, June 26, with the annual Pride Week Picnic at Waterloo Park at noon. The picnic and fair should be well attended since the park is in the middle of downtown. All Austin gay and lesbian organizations are invited to set up a booth at the picnic, where they may distribute information about their group, or have a fundraiser. The Metropolitan Community Church of Austin will hold its Sunday services at the part at 5:30pm, Cherin reported.

In addition to the events planned by the task force, local bars concurrently celebrate this important week.

GAY PRIDE WEEK IN SAN ANTONIO

SAM ANTONIO — This city's first official Gay Pride Week lasts eleven days, beginning on June 19 and lasting until June 29, Alan Gellman of TWT NEWS has learned from the San Antonio Gay Pride Week Committee.

Gay pride begins on Sunday, June 19, with a carnival at Our Place to benefit the Battered Women's Shelter. That same evening, the Mr. Alamo City Pageant at Bonham Exchange will benefit AIDS research and the SAFE Week Committee.

On Tuesday, June 21, there will be a reception for filmmaker Robert Epstein at the residence of Dub Daughtery a

On Thursday, June 23, at the 2015 Club, gay bar and business owners will star in Proprietors on Parade beginning at 10:30pm. On Friday, June 24, the San Pedro Mining Company will host a benefit at 10:00pm. Then, on Saturday, June 25, Cahoots' High School Senior Prom Party will be held. All three events benefit AIDS.

The celebration continues on June 26 with a gay pride picnic in San Pedro Park. Fajitas, corn on the cob and potato salad will be provided by Tejas Riders and Thunderbird MC. June 27 will be highlighted by a reception for LGRA lobbyist Bettie Naylor. Then, on Tuesday, June 28, a rally will be held at Bonham Exchange at 7:30pm with Naylor, Don Baker, Lee Harrington, Larry Bagneris and others as honored guests.

Gay Pride Week climaxes on Wednesday, June 29, with a Bettie Naylor appreciation party. For further information, contact (512) 227-1550, said Don Kirkland, chair of the Gay Pride Week Committee.

GAY PRIDE WEEK IN HOUSTON

HOUSTON — This city's ten-day Gay Pride Week (GPW) celebration is underway. This year's theme is "Unity Through Diversity." GPW began last Tuesday, June 14, with a Flag Day celebration at Kindred Spirits, followed on Thursday, June 16, with the anniversary of the raid on Mary's. A Salute to the Bars marked the June 17 observance.

This Saturday, June 18, two events are scheduled. The Houston chapter of Family and Friends of Gays holds a noon reception at Liberty Bank. Later, at 3:30pm at Levy Field, the Montrose Sports Association (MSA) Softball All-Stars compete against the Oak Lawn

Softball Stars of Dallas. In previous, MSA had played the Houston police and fire departments, **TWT NEWS** recalled.

Black and White Men Together (BWMT) celebrate their Juneteenth emancipation on Sunday, June 19. The Montrose Art Alliance presents a gay and lesbian art show at the Tropicana, Monday night. A 20% contribution from all Tropicana memberships sold from June 20-26 will be donated to gay pride.

The annual MSA Variety Show will be held at 7:00pm at Numbers on June 21, followed on Wednesday by an Educational Forum at 9:00pm at Channing Hall, First Unitarian Church. The Gay Switchboard, Montrose Clinic and Montrose Counseling Center are mutual sponsors.

Gay pride continues on Thursday, June 23, with National Day of Remembrance services at the Metropolitan Community Church of the Resurrection (MCCR) beginning at 7:30pm. Thursday is also Texas Bay Area Gay Day with two activities scheduled: a 1:00-5:00pm car wash at Wilde & Stein, and a 7:00-11:00pm swim party at Houston Guest House.

Friday, June 24, is Gay Latin Day as the Gay Hispanic Caucus sponsors their annual celebration at Noche y Dia Ballroom beginning at 9:00pm. Saturday, June 25, is highlighted by the Fred Paez Memorial Concert at the University of Houston Cullen Auditorium beginning at 8:00pm. The Montrose Symphonic Band, MCCR Choir, Montrose Country Cloggers, Montrose Choice and Bayou B'lu will be joined by the Oak Lawn Symphonic Band of Dallas.

The big climax to Gay Pride Week comes on Sunday, June 26, when a two-hour parade of floats, bands, clowns, convertibles, animals and pride marches down Westheimer beginning at 5:30 pm. It will be immediately followed by GPCelebration '83—a Tina Turner-Pamala Stanley concert at the Summit.

Eighty thousand Texans are expected to see Texas' largest gay pride parade. Over 17,000 are expected at the Summit blowout, **TWT NEWS** was told.

GAY PRIDE WEEK IN DALLAS

DALLAS — This year, Dallas has a very hefty Gay Pride Week (GPW) schedule. The theme is "Out of Obscurity—Into a Dream." Metroplex readers are referred to page 31 for complete details.

TWT NEWS, however, has compiled from various involved sources the following compendium of gay pride highlights in chronological order. On Friday, June 17, there will be a reception from 7:30-8:30pm at 4001, a barbecue from 6:00-7:00pm at Chaps, an 8:30pm candlelight march from the Oak Lawn Library to MCCD for services, and a Dena Kaye show at Chaps.

Saturday, June 18, is highlighted by the fourth annual Oak Lawn two-day tennis tournament opening at the Samuel Grand Tennis Center beginning at 9:00am, an arts and crafts bazaar at Crossroads Market beginning at 11:00am, Lesbian Rights Task Force (LRTF)

workshops beginning at noon at the Dreyfus Club on White Rock Lane. Pat Bond, Chocolate Waters and Nancy Scott will be featured in an LRTF night of entertainment beginning at 7:00pm at the Hospitality Room of the Budweiser Pavilion.

Razzle Dazzle Dallas, the lavish annual gay pride party-event of the year, climaxes the evening at Centennial Hall on the Texas State Fairgrounds. Buses will shuttle riders from Cedar Springs and Throckmorton.

On Sunday, June 19, the Oak Lawn Tennis Tournament finalizes at Cole Park Tennis Courts at 9:00am, the Arts and Crafts Bazaar continues at Crossroads Market, and the LRTF sporting events begin at 11:00am at Reverchon Park.

Sunday's emphasis begins at 4:00pm, when the annual Dallas gay pride parade marches down Cedar Springs to the climax at Lee Park for the annual rally, scheduled for 5:30pm. Later, at

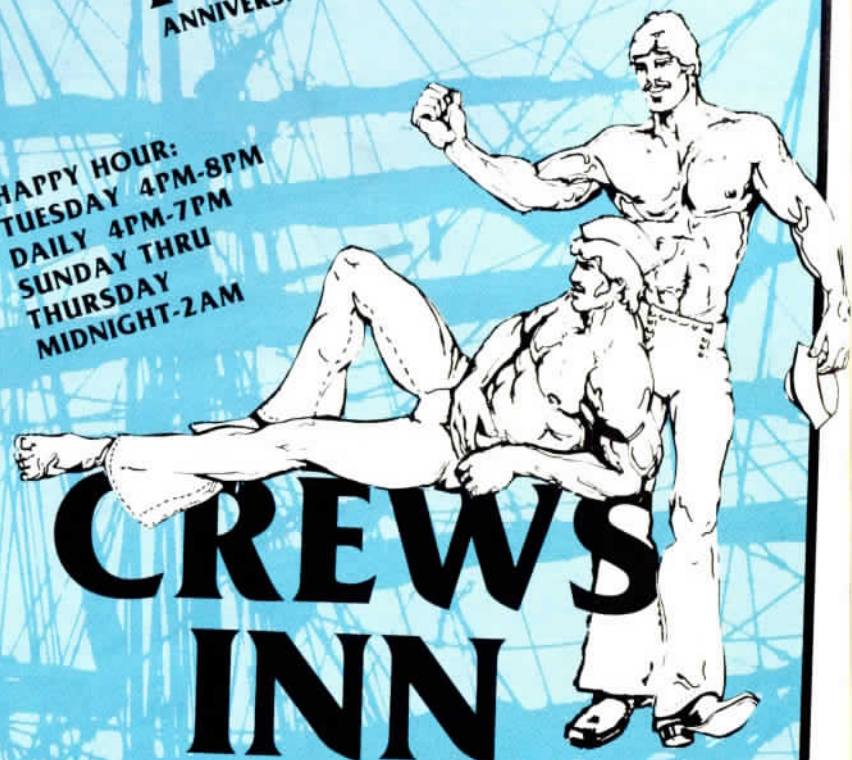

Support Summit Rally!

Dear TWT:

The Gay Pride Week Committee has made a bold move in having the rally after the parade in the Summit. I am certainly looking forward to this day; however, certain people in our gay community do not like that they will be charged the outrageous fee of \$9.65 per ticket. The GPWC has explained that this ticket price compares to the simple cost of five drinks in any of our local watering holes. This cost does not seem to be the main issue—it is *support* for what GPWC has planned. To be financially secure, this event *must* be patronized by the *majority* of our community. Thus the individual must make the decision . . . to spend the money on the ticket price to the Summit rally.

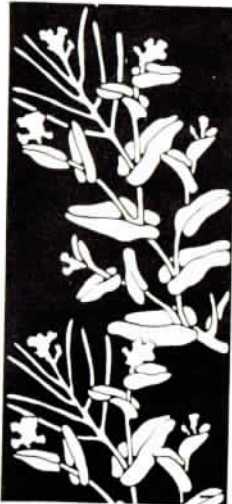

OUR GAY LOBBY

This is the second part of a two-part series of SPECIAL REPORTS on the accomplishments of our gay lobby during the 1983 Texas State Legislature. With the current session having concluded on May 30, TWT met in Austin with the three pivotal members of the Lesbian Gay Rights Advocates (LGRA) in their offices on Colorado Avenue overlooking the State Capitol. The following is a transcript of the conversation recorded between Bettie Naylor, Pat Cramer and John Calkin, with Chuck Patrick of TWT.

TWT — Last week we discussed how the gay lobby orchestrated the defeat of House Bill 2138, State Representative Bill Ceverha's sodomy bill. Although that was the centerpiece of concern for gay rights this year, what other anti-gay bill did the gay lobby keep a watchful eye on?

Calkin — I think to some degree the bill that would have raised the minimum drinking age from 19 to 21 would have affected the younger gay population, because other than bars, there are really no other major meeting places for gay youth.

TWT — Why didn't the drinking age minimum get raised to 21?

Naylor — There was just no real support for that measure. Even the PTA did not have a strong enough organized lobby effort. Also, they couldn't show

how raising the drinking age would solve anything.

TWT — What happened to the legislation which would have required VD testing for all citizens?

Cramer — We never fully understood it. You see, I have a good friend who is a federal VD control person here in Austin on loan to the Travis County Health Department, and she does VD work. She informed me that they already have, under the power of the current law, the power to arrest people who refuse treatment. Evidently all this bill would have done was to have extended the arresting powers to some other folks, perhaps even suspected contacts. My friend added, however, that they never arrest anyone.

TWT — Tell us what happened to the senior citizens legislation that Debra Danburg of Houston was working on?

Naylor — That bill would have extended to the elderly, including gays, who are in nursing homes or day care centers, a bill of rights.

TWT — Did the bill get stymied in committee, or what?

Cramer — It did get a hearing. It got passed out of committee unamended. It also eventually got out of the calendar's committee and it was going to be heard on the floor. What happened was that Debra [Danburg] called me up from the House floor, practically in tears, that Mr. Ceverha had a copy of her bill in his hand and had underlined the words "sexual orientation" and was waving and showing it around the House floor. He was furious. Interestingly enough, you need five votes [signatures] to bump a bill off the local and consent calendar, which was where the bill was placed.

Naylor — But, it had no opposition. So it should have been gavelled on through. Usually, such a bill is going to go through.

Cramer — Interestingly enough, Ceverha could only get four signatures. Mr. Lewis was off the floor at the time, and Mr. Berlanga of Corpus Christi, who is speaker pro-tem, was at the chair and

accepted it from Ceverha. He took it off the calendar, even though it didn't have the necessary five signatures. But, what could Danburg do? This was the speaker pro-tem who was breaking their own rules. So, who could she have appealed to when the person in charge of the rules breaks them, except the speaker, who had taken it off the calendar.

TWT — What happened?

Cramer — Danburg went and spoke to speaker Gib Lewis back in his chambers. What they agreed to do was remove "sexual orientation" and put the bill back on the calendar.

Naylor — Debra got some good publicity out of it. I guess it's no secret that there is no love lost between Ceverha and Danburg. Ceverha wanted to take the opportunity to needle her.

TWT — What makes Bill Ceverha run? What's he like? Why is he so against gay people?

Naylor — It's strictly my personal speculation. There is no question about that fact that the man has got a personal problem.

TWT — Do you mean homophobia?

Naylor — Oh, definitely!
Cramer — There are many other con-

servative legislators who never touch the homosexual issue, like Smothers, Naylor — Smothers was the black legislator from Dallas, who is no longer in the Legislature. But, when he was around, Ceverha had a cohort in him. He was willing to be overt on the House floor.

TWT — Do you feel this anti-homosexual behavior on the part of Ceverha is sincere, or simply a vehicle to ride for press and publicity?

Naylor — I think he knows that his having a personal problem with it is going to always gain him press. But I think he's also sincere. He really does have

a problem with homosexuality. Calkin — And he really does oppose homosexual conduct.

TWT — Bettie, when did you first hear of Ceverha?

Naylor — The first time I ever heard his name was right after there had been openly-gay delegates elected to the Texas Democratic convention in Fort Worth. Larry Begneris, Louis Young, and I think Al Calkin and I, were on that panel. At the time, Ceverha had said he was opposed to teaching it in school and having people be open about their lifestyle. Ceverha actually believed that if homosexual conduct were legalized, that everybody would then become homosexuals.

Calkin — Now he's taken that one step further. Ceverha now says that if you legalize homosexuality, it's going to be a health threat.

TWT — Looking back on this 68th session of the Texas Legislature, can the gay lobby say that your job would

have been much easier had it not been for Bill Ceverha?

Naylor — Definitely.
TWT — Is he the major vocal enemy we have?

Naylor — Yes. There may be a very few others who may join him, but he is the main catalyst. Hollowell, from near Waco, can cause trouble, but not like Ceverha has and does.

TWT — Aside from these negative forces, what positive legislation that would affect gays was introduced during this past session?

Naylor — Bill Blanton introduced a bill that would have made it possible to only ticket certain misdemeanors. Homosexual conduct would have been one of those misdemeanors. The city of Austin, of course, already has that. For instance, possession of less than two ounces of marijuana is a misdemeanor offense which can just be ticketed.

Cramer — The object is to diminish the crowded conditions in the courts. The Dallas and Arlington County Commissioners are the ones who pushed for the passage of this bill, and asked Blanton to introduce it.

Calkin — The bill would have given the police officer the option of ticketing people for any of these offenses, rather than taking them downtown, booking them, and putting them in jail.

Naylor — But, that bill didn't get very far, because the war-on-drugs lobby knocked that out.

TWT — We have spent most of our time talking about the Legislature. Let's turn our attention now to the governor, Mark White. He's a force to be dealt with, too. Bettie, since you've known Governor White for a long time, tell us about what you know to have been going through his mind over HB-2138.

White hoped that the gay lobby would kill that bill in committee. You see, it's my personal opinion that White does not have any specific problem with homosexual conduct.

TWT — Tell us about your first early dealings with Governor White.

Mark White first came to me when he

was running for attorney general in San Antonio, and he volunteered to me that he didn't have any problem at all with homosexuality. He realized that it was too often used too effectively as a political tool. He thought that wasn't right. He was also aware of the Texas A&M case that was going on at the time. I was very impressed that he would even know that was going on. But he did, and he was concerned.

TWT — Let's backtrack to last fall, when Governor White, then State Attorney General, challenged the 21.06 decision.

Naylor — I think he felt an obligation as attorney general of the state to appeal that law, just as he did other laws and challenges to the Texas Constitution. I do not condemn what he did. I know many who do. But, I knew he felt that, as attorney general, he didn't really have much choice in the matter in being faithful to his oath of office. Simply stated, Mark White doesn't want to meddle in the private lives of the citizens of Texas.

TWT — What are White's goals?

Naylor — He's quite a politician, and I don't think there's much disagreement over his wanting to achieve an even higher office than governor. But, again, I say he sees the role of Texas government as one of staying out of people's private lives.

TWT — If there is to be a special session of the Legislature called in July, will there be any more gay issues to be addressed? For instance, is 2138 dead?

Cramer — Yes!

Calkin — As far as other gay issues, presently, we are in a posture that the Texas Employment Commission [TEC] may cease to exist on the first of September because a bill did not get out of session.

TWT — Explain how this would affect gay rights.

Cramer — We wanted to get listed on the laundry list of non-discrimination in employment, a clause that said you couldn't discriminate in employment on the basis of sexual preference.

TWT — Let's explain this fully, from the beginning.

Cramer — The proposed Equal Employment Opportunity Commission would have allowed workers to bring employment discrimination cases to the state level rather than to the federal level. It had a whopping list of protected classes: sex, creed, race, religion, political, handicapped, etc. We, the gay lobby, had originally spoken of trying to get sexual orientation included in that "laundry list."

Naylor — It was obviously omitted, as was marital status.

TWT — Do you think the special session will resolve this exclusion of sexual preference?

Naylor — If it does not, we will no longer have a TEC.

TWT — So that more money can be allocated for school teacher salaries, the special session may have to deal with an increase in the liquor tax.

Naylor — True. There are a number

of things which have been labeled as the "sin taxes," which include liquor, video games, cigarettes and other things that are considered "sins"; things that could easily be taxed to bring additional revenue into the state.

TWT — Will the liquor tax increase pass?

Calkin — There are going to be strong, concentrated lobbying efforts now to increase certain things. I think they'll be hard pressed to do it, though.

Cramer — A meeting was held in Austin in late May to get some organized effort among the bars to lobby against the increase. In Danburg's of

rice, there have been many letters written by Houston bars and restaurants who are opposed to increasing the liquor tax.

Naylor — It should be very interesting to see what happens. If we know the inner feelings of the liquor lobby, then we'd know how it would come out.

TWT — Would each of you give an overview of this past session of the Legislature?

Cramer — I was basically very pleased with the statewide efforts by the lesbian-gay organizations on our lobby board. We represented El Paso, Denton, Houston, Dallas, Austin and San Antonio.

Calkin — Plus representatives from the Democrats and the Texas Lesbian Gay Task Force. We did a great job of fundraising to pay for our lobby.

Naylor — Lobbying expenses are very high. Statewide mileage, printing, telephones, and the cost of having a lobbyist. When we needed letters generated, we sent out pleas, and we did get a good response.

Cramer — We are going to have to continue with our lobbying activities because the folks on the other side who oppose us are going to continue their lobbying efforts, especially the groups out of Dallas, such as the Dallas Doctors Against AIDS. At our June 11 board meeting, we discussed some far-ranging plans about educating legislators about the gay community. You see, it's very obvious to your gay lobby that very few legislators have any idea as to what the gay community is about.

Calkin — And that's why they basically have to act in ignorance.

TWT — I suppose many are surprised to learn that there even exists a gay lobby; that we're that well organized.

Naylor — I think that's changed. I think we are expected to be on Capitol Hill just like the automobile dealers association, the association of businesses and any other major lobbying groups.

TWT — You're saying that our time has come?

Naylor — Yes, I think they know that gay people of Texas are going to have a lobby, and that it's not going to go away.

TWT — No doubt about it, our gay lobby has come a long way since starting in 1979.

Naylor — Yes, and I can remember one of the first stories I ever heard back then, which shows you just how far we've gone. When I first started lobbying for gays, one of the first parties I ever went to had as one of its guests, Tip Hall of Denton. He came in late, said a few hello's, and immediately started telling a "queer joke." Everybody in the room who knew me wanted to die, and kept hoping he'd shut up. But he didn't. When he finished his joke, no one laughed. And he didn't know quite why. He went over to get a drink. As soon as he got his drink, I walked over and introduced myself; told him who I was and who I represented. He gulped real hard and said, "Well, I don't think I'm going to stay." He turned around and walked out. Later, he told a lot of our mutual friends in Denton about the incident and how he had met me very painfully, I might add. Well, the other day, I was standing outside the House gallery, when Hall came out with some women. They were probably there to discuss with him the teachers' pay raise. One of those women I happened to know real well, told me that he put his arm around all three of them, pointed at me, and said, "See that little grey-haired lady over there? She's up here lobbying for the gays." And they all said, "Oh, yeah, we know, we know who she is." And, Tip Hall said to them, "And she's doing a hell of a job!"

TWT — Bettie, Pat, John, you three are doing one hell of a job. Your work is much appreciated. Indeed, we should all support our gay lobby.

Calkin — Right you are. Send your donations to P.O. Box 822, Austin 78767.

TWT — Thank you and keep up the surveillance during this summer's special session of the Texas Legislature.

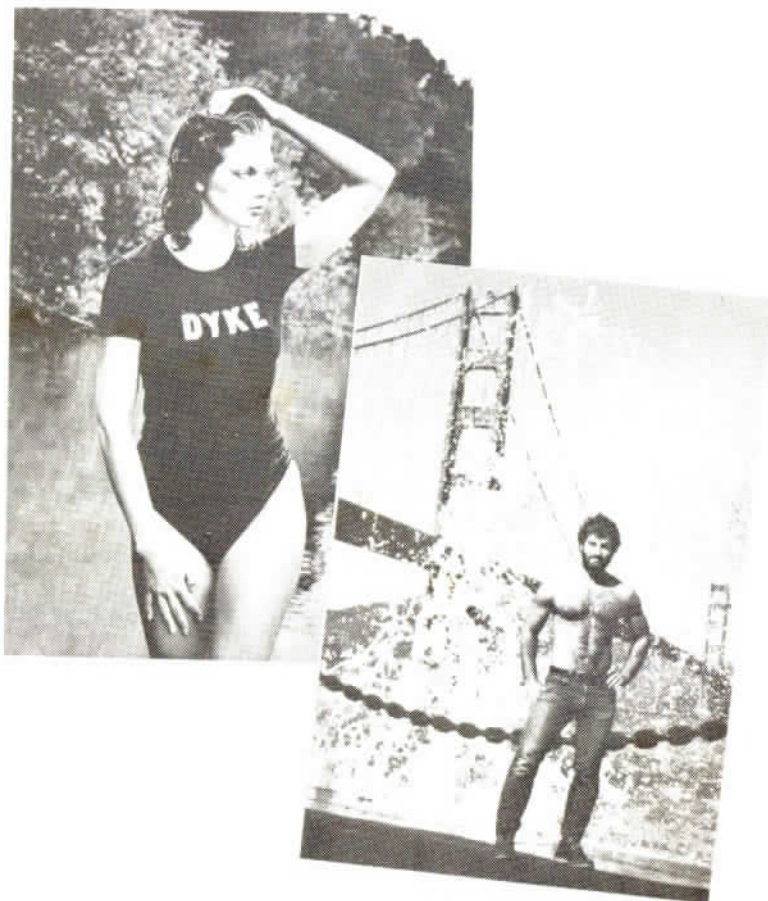

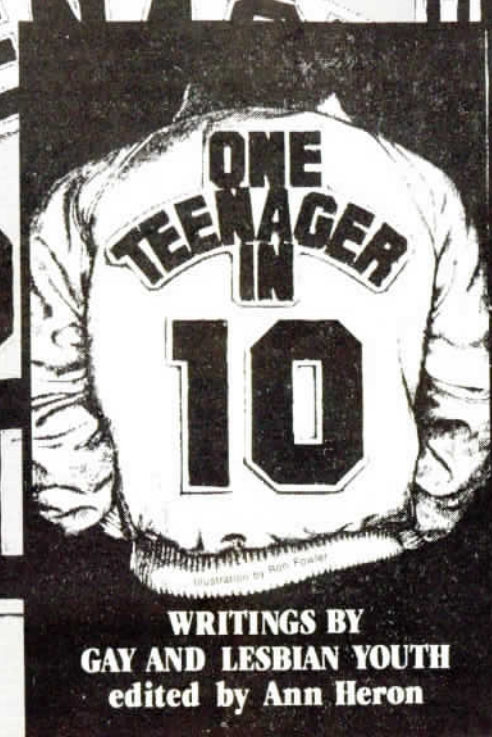

One Teenager in 10: Writings by Gay and Lesbian Youth, edited by Ann Heron; 116 pp.; Alyson Publications, P.O. Box 2783, Boston, Massachusetts 02208; softcover, \$3.95.

Gays are unique as a minority in that there are no clear physical characteristics that could distinguish them from other people. It is not uncommon for many not to realize they are not the only person who likes her/his own sex. The result is fear, isolation and extreme loneliness. Suicide is sometimes the reaction to this. Alyson Publications has followed up the book *Young, Gay and Proud!*, with a book of letters about the lives of young gays and lesbians in *One Teenager in 10: Writings by Gay*

and Lesbian Youth, edited by Ann Heron.

Young, Gay and Proud! collected important facts about the lives of gay people, provided health information and debunked the myths teens have heard from peers and non-gay adults. *One Teenager in 10* is a series of letters from gay youth as a follow-up to the previous book. The letters graphically illustrate the consequences of censorship, little or no sex education in the schools, and the perpetuation of fear and lies advocated by the religious right.

The authors range in age from 15 to 24, eleven women and 17 men from all over the United States. Grammatical corrections were applied sparingly; the level of writing ability and clarity of their

presentations are consistently good. The degree of emotion expressed in the letters varies a great deal, often unrelated to the degree of pain and oppression received by the families and friends.

The content of their stories is remarkably similar, no matter where the authors lived or the degree of acceptance they have experienced. Most of them realized at a very early age they were gay, whether they accepted it at the time or not. The gays and lesbians here chose to tell a close friend first about their feelings, with decidedly mixed results, of course. The dilemma comes when a person needs to trust someone, but what they have to say may cause them to lose that person as a trusted advisor. It's a risk many take to end the private hell they may have lived in for years.

Some made no mention of their religion in their struggle. Others concluded that they could be religious first and then gay. Those who had control of their coming out process made sure they had all the information and were accepting of themselves. Those whose families found out by accident suffered a great deal, the letter providing release and containing pleas for help in their struggle. Some of the letters are testaments to the indomitability of the human spirit to prevail against those

who would literally try to destroy them. One story in itself would be enough to provide a convincing argument for understanding and information to families of gay people. The horror story of Jim, 17 years old, living in California, is in chapter ten. He uses terms such as extremist, perfectionist, conservative, to describe his parents. His parents harassed him, prevented him from receiving his grades and credits from high school, beat him up, had him committed, tried to bring charges against his lover, sold his thousand-dollar silver dollar collection, and sent private investigators to capture him and ransack his apartment.

The purpose of these letters is to share the experiences of gay teens isolated from information about others like them, whether they live in a small town or large city. The authors exhibit a crying need for acceptance and self-respect, and freedom to be different. One other important need is to know that they are not alone, that there are others like them, simply to know that there are whole organizations of people ready to help if they can.

There is no holding back. Topics about incest, overcoming physical handicaps are included as well. Voices of strength under adversity will make this book an inspiration for those who read it.

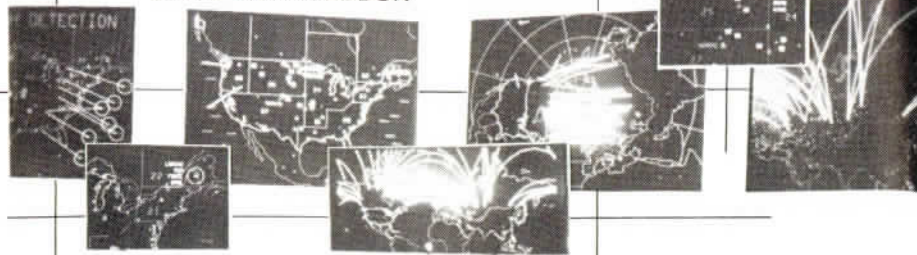

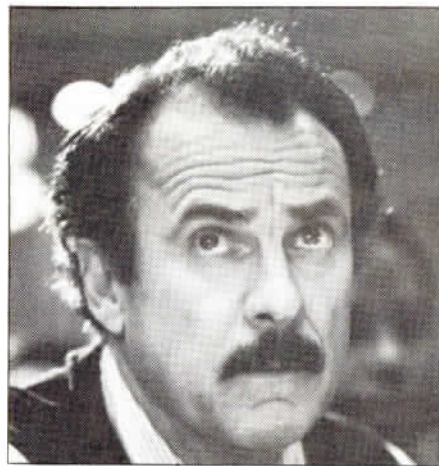

ATARI ARMAGEDDON

There's hope for one of today's indisputed minorities among us. All you like-minded souls out there who managed not to get carried away with the *E.T.*'s and *Jedi*'s at a theater near you—there is an exciting, thrilling alternative: *WarGames*. And the amazing thing is, this futuristic drama set in 1983 appeals to

own data terminal at home and gains access to other computers, including his school's, which willingly accepts his suggestions for improved grades. It is by accident that David lands in the ultimate data bank, namely that of the almighty Defense Department. What the whiz kid initially thinks is nothing but a sophisticated new video game he stumbled upon, turns out to be danger-

ously real to the military bigwigs and the rest of the planet. The colorful computer screens in Uncle Sam's underground command stations go haywire, because all the indications are that the Soviets are about to launch the final nuclear showdown. The book by Law-

rence Lasker and Walter F. Parkes has sufficient funny moments and, at the same time, raises two fascinating questions: whether an all-out atomic battle is winnable; and who is in charge—man or machine? With the U.S. government recently branding two Canadian anti-nuke documentaries as propaganda, the makers of *WarGames* were overly concerned not to take sides on this touchy, imminently pertinent issue. But you wouldn't expect a movie of this genre to come up with answers, anyway. However, riveting entertainment it does provide. When watching the semi sci-fi action, I felt reminded of *Dr. Strangelove* and *2001*.

Matthew Broderick, who played in *Max Dugan Returns* and off-Broadway in the gay, Tony-winning *Torch Song Trilogy*, is innocently naive and credible as the boy on whose small shoul-

ders the fate of the world is resting. Dabney Coleman (*Nine to Five*, *On Golden Pond*, *Tootsie*) demonstrates his versatility as the military's computer wizard. Cute Ally Sheedy, as David's rather platonic girlfriend, asks the questions a computer-ignorant audience might ask and, therefore, her role is an absolute necessity to keep you abreast of all the bytes and pieces of the storyline.

John *Blue Thunder* Badham's direction is smooth and effective; Arthur B. Rubinstein's score provides all the acoustic highlights wherever and whenever necessary. *WarGames* maintains a rather logical path—and although there are a few holes and flaws in the script, they should not impair the viewing pleasure. *WarGames* is chilling edge-on-the-seat entertainment. It is also entry #4 on my '83 top ten.

MOVIN' ON

Angelo My Love, a film by Robert Duvall, has much that pleases and little that seems forced or unnatural. The dialogue is astonishingly natural, important in a film which uses improvisational material, and has the cadences and humor found in everyday speech. Duvall spent four years and his own money making the movie, which is a hybrid, part documentary and part fiction. It deals with a young boy from

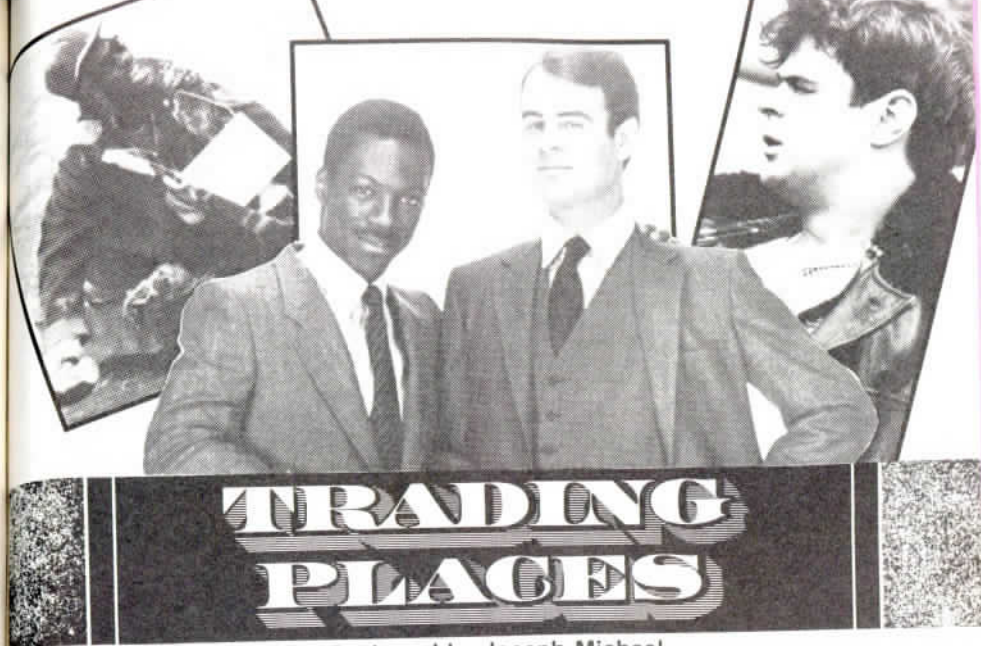
New York, Angelo Evans, whom Duvall met in the late 70s. Intrigued by the eight-year-old—then passing out handbills—Duvall decided to make a film about his family and his gypsy heritage and lifestyle.

Although Duvall set out to make a piece of fiction at first, the real-life characters simply could not be properly handled by a script, so Duvall incorporated Angelo and his relatives straight into the movie, allowing them to create their own lines. *Angelo My Love* is filled almost to the bursting point with vignettes, absurd twists in the plot, and many fine performances, particularly from Angelo Evans himself, a street-wise young man with a winning smile and temperament. Ostensibly, the film deals with the Evans family attempt to find a thief who stole a family-heirloom rug, but it turns into a kind of autobiographical free-for-all about Angelo and his 15-year-old brother Michael.

Duvall presents the gypsy lifestyle without comment or judgment, and so his film is hardly a critique of that community. Although at times some of the real-life characters seem stiff and uncomfortable before the camera, *Angelo My Love* remains noteworthy for its free-flowing style and the buoyant responses from most of its participants.

PRINCE AND THE PAUPER IN PHILADELPHIA

Trading Places is a film about two brothers by the name of Randolph Duke (Ralph Bellamy) and Mortimer Duke (Don Ameche) who own a stock brokerage firm and have a running argument on whether environment or heredity is the determining factor of human nature. To answer this question, they decide to take their star stockbroker, Louis Winthorpe III (Dan Aykroyd), and a fast-talking street tough by the name of Billy Ray Valentine (Eddie Murphy) and have them "trade places" through an elaborate set of circumstances that they have orchestrated, and watch the results.

The reason *Trading Places* is not a terrifically funny film is that too much time is spent watching the demise of Dan Aykroyd and the rise of Eddie Murphy in their new roles. It would have been funnier if we could have seen them struggling with their new stations in life. The movie is loaded with scenes that just slow down the action, and found me muttering "Do I really need to watch this?"

The foremost saving grace of *Trading Places* is Eddie Murphy. The rest of the cast is good, but Mr. Murphy is just a damn funny man. One of my favorite scenes is watching him go through a Bruce Lee routine with some guys he has met while in jail.

Although Dan Aykroyd is not allowed to pull out all the stops, he is allowed some opportunity to strut his stuff. His classical scene is the drunk-and-stealing Santa Claus, who has to catch a bus to get home, only to get caught in the rain, after unsuccessfully attempting suicide on the bus. Ralph Bellamy and Don Ameche are perfect as the scheming Duke brothers, who have a love-hate relationship with each other and the rest of society. Denholm Elliott, as the dutiful butler, is also quite enjoyable to watch but unfortunately, the rest of the cast is given little to do.

Trading Places makes for good summer viewing. Although not what Mr. Movies would call "\$4.50 worthy," it would certainly make an adequate matinee.

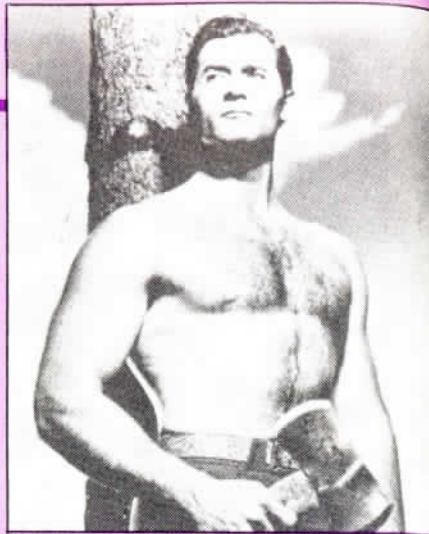

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO — The **Hollies**? If you can think back to the second half of the 60s (I meet more and more people who can't—or won't!), you may remember such ditties as "Bus Stop," "Stop Stop Stop," "Carrie-Anne" and "He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother" exploding over the rock 'n' roll air waves. **Graham Nash**, of course, left this British Invasion rock group in 1968, eventually becoming a member of **Crosby, Stills & Nash**, and after a few more personnel changes the Hollies continued into the 70s with such hits as "Long Cool Woman" and "The Air That I Breathe." Now, in an era when virtually any kind of comeback seems inevitable, the original members of the group, including Nash, have reunited for some new recordings. The comeback album is called "What Goes Around ..." and, oddly enough, the comeback single is a remake of the **Supremes'** "Stop in the Name of Love." ... The **5th Dimension**? Let's see, prime movers **Marilyn McCoo** and **Billy Davis, Jr.** left the group in the early 70s, and in 1976 a new version of the 5th Dimension competed with **Diana Ross** by putting out their own version of "Love Hangover." Diana won. Now there's still another incarnation of the group, and while I can't tell you who is included in the 1983 line-up, I can tell you that their comeback single is a remake of Diana's 1971 hit "Surrender." What goes around. ... **Terry Jacks**? Does anybody remem-

ber the **Poppy Family**? That soft-rock group, made up of husband and wife team Terry and Susan Jacks, had one major hit record in 1970 called "Which Way You Goin' Billy" and, after they split up, Terry topped the charts in 1974 with "Seasons in the Sun." "No." He was *adamant* in his refusal. "Give me that Barbie."

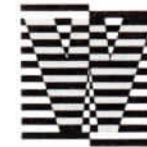
