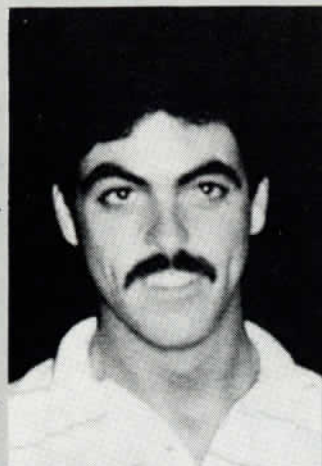

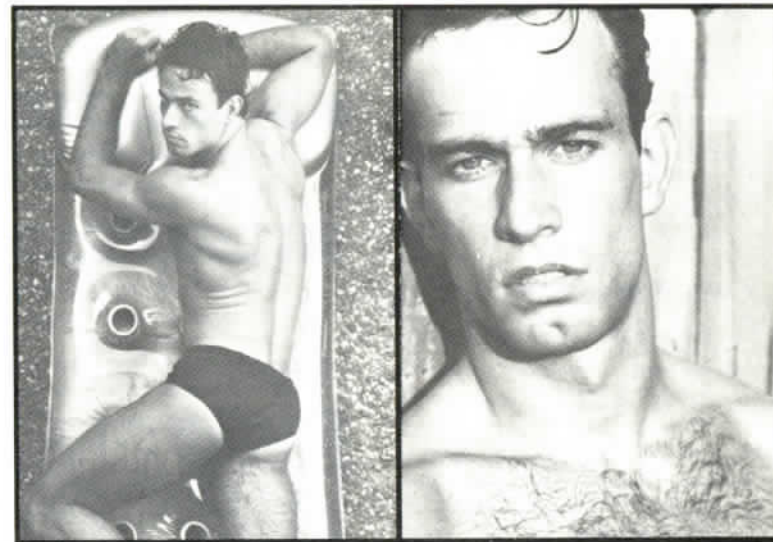

DALLAS MEN SHOT; ONE IS KILLED

DALLAS — Two bartenders in their early 20s, who have been employed by JR's Bar on Cedar Springs, were targets of an early-morning shootout and robbery on the Fourth of July. One is dead, the other injured—all for just tip money.

After closing the bar, Rick Curley and Robbie Taylor drove to their residence in the 4100 block of Holland, near Wy-cliff. When Curley got out of the car, "three black men jumped him, never saying a word, and opened fire," Taylor told investigators. Taylor, still in the car, reached to save Curley by pulling him into the car, at which time Taylor was shot.

Taylor, originally from Fort Worth, was injured in the shoulder and hospitalized at Parkland Hospital, where he was described in fair condition.

Curley was rushed to the hospital, where he later died of gunshots to his torso. Curley had moved to Dallas from Missouri two years ago.

The shooting occurred around 3:20 am, Richard Rogers of TWT NEWS learned from Detective Johnson. Dallas police, with only sketchy leads to pursue, were investigating the murder.

WESTHEIMER ART FESTIVAL RETURNS

HOUSTON — TWT NEWS was pleased to learn this week that the Westheimer Colony Association will again sponsor the Westheimer Art Festival this fall, on Saturday, October 15 and Sunday, October 16. The 10-year-old, semi-annual street festival will be held on Westheimer from Bagby to Yoakum, from 9:00am till dusk.

Carl Rentz, out-going president of the Association, announced the member-

ship voted to reinstate the popular festival, which was cancelled this past spring. He noted there is a new spirit among the property owners, businesses and shops along Westheimer, and with-in the Association, that will ensure the Houston community a bigger and better Art Festival for the fall.

"We received many calls from artists and craftspeople, aside from the public, when it was announced that there would be no spring festival," Rentz said. "However, to explain that the festival was cancelled to protect the quality of the art to be shown provided that sense of continuation in the high caliber of craftsmanship the Westheimer Colony Art Festival has acquired over the past ten years," he noted.

More than 750,000 people semi-annually take part in this art festival known throughout the U.S., Canada and Mexico. There were 400 artists showing their creations during the show held in October 1982.

ALAMO AIRMAN DENIED BENEFITS

SAN ANTONIO — Airman First Class Ray Orsini, 27, who has medical reports proving he contracted AIDS while serving at Lackland Air Force Base, was granted a medical discharge last week by a three-member Physical Evaluation Board. A medical discharge, over an honorable discharge, was authorized because of his "bad conduct," the board ruled.

The military's reasoning for "bad conduct" was that Orsini's bisexual lifestyle had caused him to contract AIDS.

Orsini, now stationed at San Bernardino, California, said, "Although it's possible I might have contracted AIDS from a few bisexual experiences, I maintain that it most likely was from living

in close contact with other airmen at Lackland."

By the USAF placing the blame on his lifestyle, they have taken the fault off the military, and thus been able to deny Orsini all of the usual disability benefits due him.

TWT NEWS has learned, however, that Orsini's attorney, Tom C. Alfsen of San Antonio, is looking into an appeal, pending a final decision by the military.

The chair of the Texas Human Rights Foundation (THRF), attorney M. Robert Schwab, told TWT NEWS, "We are alarmed and dismayed that this type of problem has occurred. We will carefully investigate the facts to see if THRF is able to provide litigation assistance."

Joe Porro, of Houston's Citizens for Human Equality (CHE), who had traveled to San Antonio to act as Orsini's counsel, commented that the Air Force experienced a difficult task dealing with the case, since it "marked the first time the military had to deal with the AIDS issue in relation to disability benefits."

Meanwhile, CHE has decided to provide living expense money to pay off Orsini's debts, CHE president Steve Shiflet told TWT NEWS.

GAY RADIO NOT TAX-EXEMPT

HOUSTON — KPFT-FM, a radio station located in Montrose and owned by the Pacifica Foundation, is not exempt from taxation, Attorney General Jim Mattox ruled last week. Pacifica had contended that KPFT's education and cultural programming qualified as a charitable purpose.

Mattox's opinion was that "it is exceedingly doubtful that Pacifica could be deemed to be organized exclusively to perform religious, charitable, scientific or educational as defined by the tax code."

The ruling therefore places in doubt whether private donations made to KPFT are also not tax-deductible. The gay community of southeast Texas has consistently been one of the station's

largest contributing groups because of a long-standing, popular Thursday night, two-hour gay radio program entitled "Wilde 'n' Stein," hosted by Ray Hill.

The ruling will not affect or change the future of the gay radio program, TWT NEWS was assured.

TEXAS STUDENT CONFERENCE

HOUSTON — The Texas Gay and Lesbian Student Organization Coalition (TGLSOC) met for their 1983 summer conference in this city on June 24-25. TGLSOC, consisting of 13 organizations representing various Texas campuses, chose these dates to coincide with Houston's Gay Pride Week, Jay Cherin of TWT NEWS reported.

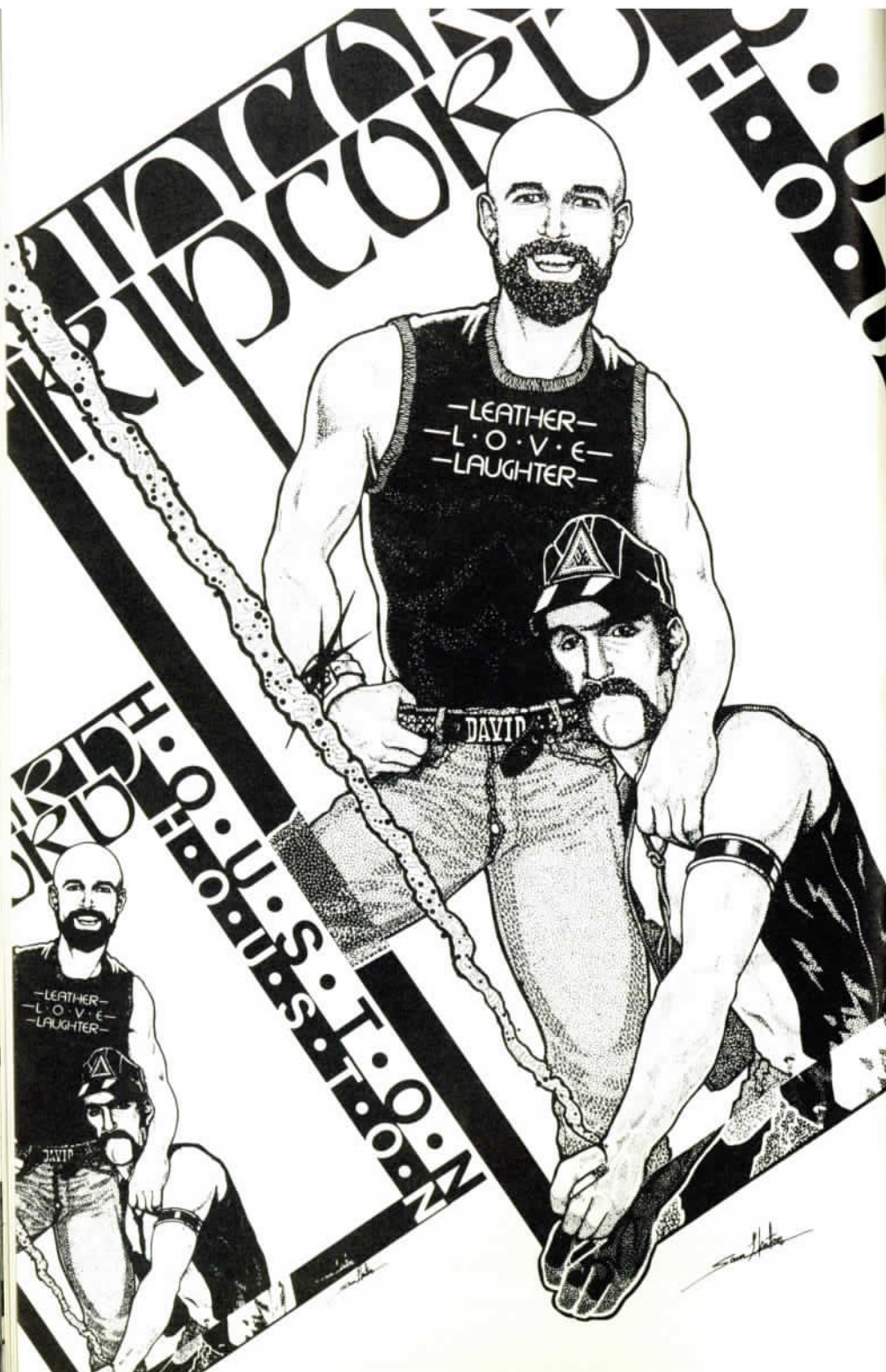
TGLSOC officers met to discuss the agenda for the 25th Board of Representatives meeting, which was chaired by Ruth Sathre, female co-chair of the Coalition. The statewide group decided to work on ways to reach out to various campuses represented.

The Gay Publications Recommendation Committee was established to prepare a list of books they will urge all Texas universities to acquire. The list will be compiled through the use of several gay bibliographies put out by national organizations.

The Coalition, in keeping with its stated purpose of helping new gay student organizations form in Texas, has established a task force which will deal specifically with relations between universities and gay organizations on their campuses. This task force grew out of the great concern drawn over such organizations as the Gay and Lesbian Student Support Organization (GLSSO) at Southern Methodist University and Gay Student Services (GSS) at Texas A&M.

The representatives also chose the organization's logo, and decided to hold their fall conference in Dallas, to be sponsored by GLSSO.

New members of TGLSOC are Gays at Angelo State and the Lambda Chris-



tian Fellowship of Brazos Valley, which serves the A&M community.

GAY HALFWAY HOUSE MOVES

HOUSTON — The Montrose Guest Recovery House moved last month to 401 Avondale, taking over the building previously occupied by the Fred Paez Center. In addition, the house was presented with renovation funds by the Texas Commission on Alcoholism. In the past, the halfway house had operated exclusively through donations and volunteer workers.

The new house now also has a program director, Susanne Baggett, and a night supervisor, Chad Edwards. "Our program concentrates on a family atmosphere and offers a safe, comfortable place for gay men and women to get sober," Baggett explained to TWT NEWS.

Currently, the house has five men and two women residents. Plans are to ac-

commodate 10 people, Edwards added. Since its inception on April 25, 1982, the house has helped 17 gay people recover from alcoholism.

The house originally opened because "seven gay drunks got sober, called themselves a board of directors, and cared," Don Winn explained. The rundown building on Chenevert looked like a flophouse in a sleazy neighborhood, battling fire marshals to stay open and begging for furniture, food and clothing.

Now, over a year later, things are looking up. The larger and more comfortable home now has a 90-day recovery program. "Alcoholism is a devastating disease that robs a person's mind, heart, body and pocketbook," Baggett said. "One out of four gay people is an admitted alcoholic," a sobering statistic.

"If you are gay or lesbian, have lost everything to alcohol and want to sober up, you're welcome at the all-new Montrose Guest Recovery House," TWT NEWS was told. Call (713) 749-9339.

GPC EVALUATES SUMMIT CELEBRATION

HOUSTON — Although the complete figures are not in, GPC president Larry Bagneris lauded the gay pride celebration at the Summit, as well as the spirit of gay pride throughout the week, and hoped the momentum of energy of Gay Pride Week's success will continue far into the future. Bagneris' remarks were made at a June 29 GPC Interface meeting. The Summit celebration was not a financial success, TWT NEWS learned, but as Ray Hill reminded the group, the Spotts Park rally of last year cost only \$5,000 less than what is owed by GPC now.

A "debriefing" and evaluation of the Summit project will be held and presented to the GPC board on July 19, one day prior to the general assembly of the caucus. Safety of celebrants and autos, air-conditioning, cleanliness and more, were all cited as reasons for the Summit location. The Summit celebration cost \$56,000; the GPC owes no money to vendors, was within the budget, and generated \$37,000 in ticket sales.

It was discovered that certain Ticketron outlets, such as in Pasadena, would not admit they were selling tickets for the Summit concert.

Also discussed at the meeting was "the embarrassing incident" with the Gay Atheists' float in the parade. Because they had not shown their complete presentation for approval, as it appeared in the parade, they have been banned from future gay pride parades for four years, it was decided, David Fields of TWT NEWS reported.

AIDS-PHOBIA SPREADS TO SAN ANTONIO

SAN ANTONIO — It would seem that the fear of getting AIDS, which is known as AIDS-phobia, is spreading faster than the disease itself. Even in Central Texas, where less than one percent of the nationwide cases of AIDS have been reported, the ridiculous hysteria mounts.

In San Antonio, women are reported shunning gay hairdressers. The *Express News* newspaper reported in a front-page story on June 20 of "several women who have switched to female hairdressers out of fear of contracting the disease by having their gay hairdressers even touch them."

However, the owner of one large, posh Northside Alamo City beauty salon, whose staff is almost entirely gay, said AIDS-phobia hadn't affected his business. Logically, it shouldn't, as the "chances of transmitting AIDS from the sort of contact that occurs at a beauty salon would be all but impossible," Dr. Frederick J. Buckwold, of San Antonio, responded.

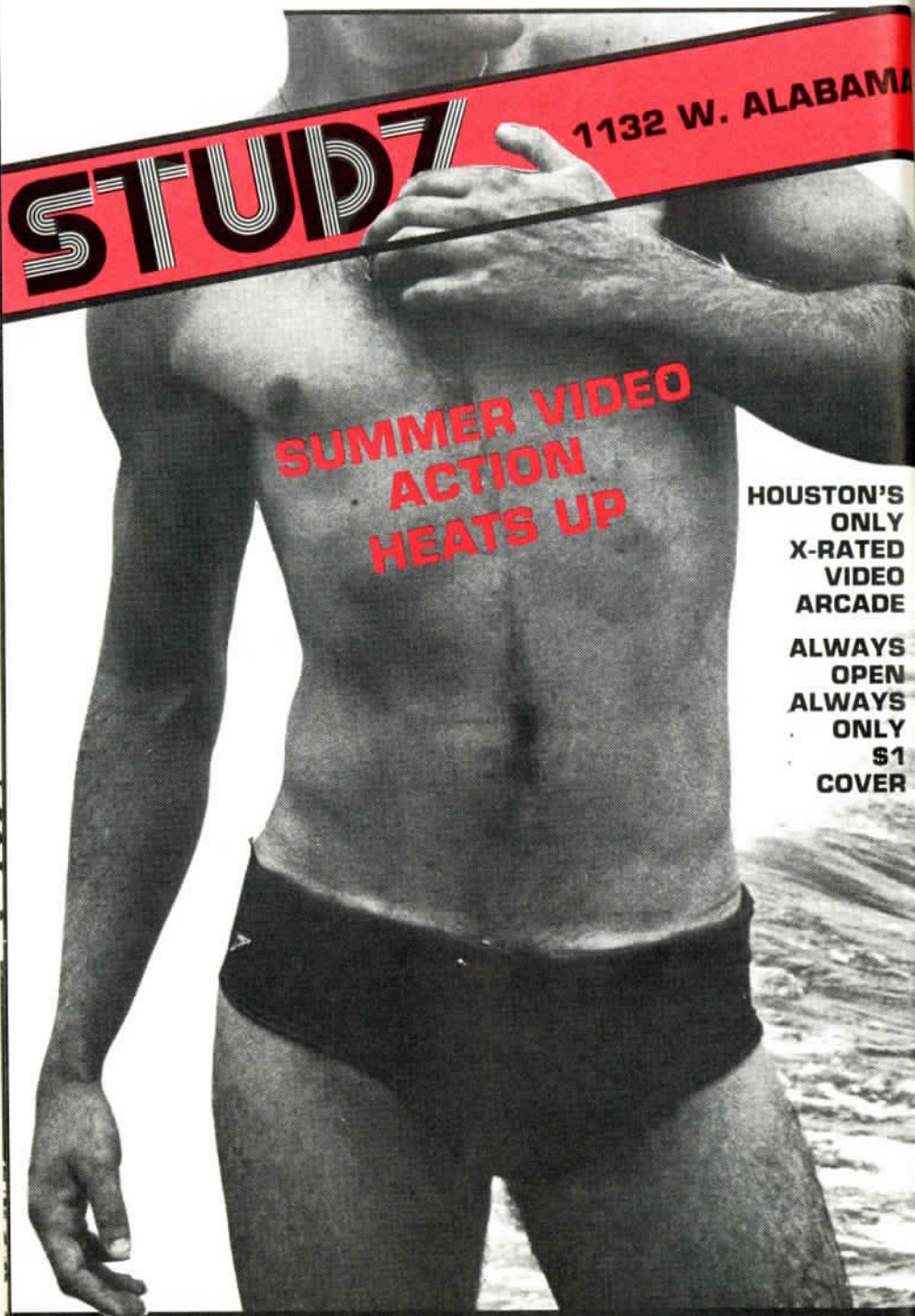

AIDS-phobia has also spread to San Antonio's paramedics, who have asked for protective "spacesuits." EMS (Emergency Medical Services) personnel had also said they did not want to perform mouth-to-mouth resuscitation on patients. Dr. Daniel Kisner, associate professor of medicine at the UT Health Science Center, labeled the demands of EMS as "far and away excessive."

San Antonio's AIDS-phobia is needless, since the city has reported only ten cases of AIDS, and there have been only four confirmed AIDS deaths in the past year, San Antonio Metropolitan Health District officials reported.

Dear TWT:

Am I mistaken? Wasn't the theme of this year's Gay Pride Week "Unity Through Diversity"? You would never have known it, if you had witnessed the reaction of some of the crowd to the float sponsored by the Gay Atheist group (GALA). As the GALA float passed by the judge's stand, they were greeted with booing and jeering.

What was particularly appalling was that standing by me were three men who were extremely vocal. My friend and I recognized them as members of MCCR. When I confronted them, they became angry and abusive, and said that the GALA members were going to hell and so would I. I never expected to see gay people openly harassing other gay people at an event of this nature because they had a difference of opinion. It marred my enjoyment of the parade. How can we hope to gain the public's respect when we cannot even respect each other's right to our own personal beliefs?

I am not an atheist and have attended MCCR from time to time. I do not think that the church condones this type of behavior in its members. The fact that people claim to be Christian is negated by such a lack of love and tolerance. After all, didn't Jesus say, "We should love our enemies"? Perhaps MCCR needs to examine why some of its people are not getting this message. The reason I left the church I grew up in was because of its intolerance. I would hate to see this same spirit develop in our gay churches.

CHINA HOUSE



China House, by Vincent Lardo; 204 pp.; fiction; Alyson Publications, Inc., P.O. Box 2783, Boston, Massachusetts 02208; softcover, \$4.95.

A new gay gothic novel has cropped up among the new gay books out from Alyson Publications. *China House*, by Vincent Lardo, attempts to fit the genre with all the ingredients needed to qualify. This book is not the first gay gothic out though. *Gaywyck* holds that distinction, written by Vincent Varga and published in 1980. To compare the two would not be totally unfair.

The literary style of gothic novels was popular in the late 18th century and early 19th century. Large, brooding mansions in Europe or New England, surrounded

by an aura of evil or a desolate legacy of crime or madness or both, is the setting for most novels of this type. The "romance" part of the genre is between two men though, in *China House*, and the time is now.

Due to their similarities as part of the same genre, *Gaywyck* and *China House* can legitimately be compared. It is hoped that Lardo read *Gaywyck* to gain some pointers on how to construct his own novel. In some ways, it seems he had, but if he did, he took the wrong parts and did not take enough. *Gaywyck* is richly complex, a longer novel, more suspenseful, and with much more depth to it.

What *China House* does is take the reader jerkily forward and back in time without warning. The reader is left

scrambling for his/her temporal balance while trying to find out what is going on when. The whole novel becomes erratic and disjointed with this technique. Though flashbacks and flash-forwards (if there is such a word) can be used to good advantage, Lardo must do it with his next book.

Where this most interferes with the success of the book is in the feeling of suspense built with each unexplained, unnatural or supernatural occurrence. Just as the reader is horrified by what has just occurred, the story leaps forward in time and the reader is left feeling, "But what about . . .". The spell of suspense Lardo had woven has been broken and cannot be renewed.

Scott Evans is the character with the tragic past, but his relationship with Michael (the son of the chauffeur to the Evans family) is far less interesting than the one between Dr. Howard Roth, the psychologist specializing in the supernatural, and his son Ken, the successful romance novelist (how appropriate). Ken is gay, and several years ago he and his father decided not to talk about each other's respective sex life.

Lardo puts a lot of time and energy into insinuating and implying more about the Roth's close relationship than appears on the surface, but does not go so far as to intimate incest. Scott's fami-

ly donates heavily to the institute Dr. Roth works for, and calls him in to investigate the old family home, China House, where his twin (Tom) accidentally died as a child.

Scott is obviously disturbed about his lost twin, and the events at the house do not help any. When others hear the sounds and cries coming from the "twin's room," Dr. Roth begins to doubt his sanity, and his sense of what is real after his own experiences. But Lardo supplies some cheap scares in Dr. Roth's dreams that artificially bolster an aura of evil.

Unfortunately, the author does not allow his suspense to build, to form a pattern that clearly shows the reader the impending doom that threatens them all. This is one of the major elements of the gothic novel found in *Gaywyck*, and the popular novels of that genre in the late 18th century.

Episodes of sex are sparse and restrained. A major element of Dr. Roth's life, his assistant, Alice Miller, aggressively pursues her boss in the sexual arena. His son has a liaison with Scott. There are no violent deaths or accidents as one might expect. *China House* is relatively successful as a first novel for Vincent Lardo, requiring only some fine tuning and adjustment to render it more satisfying.

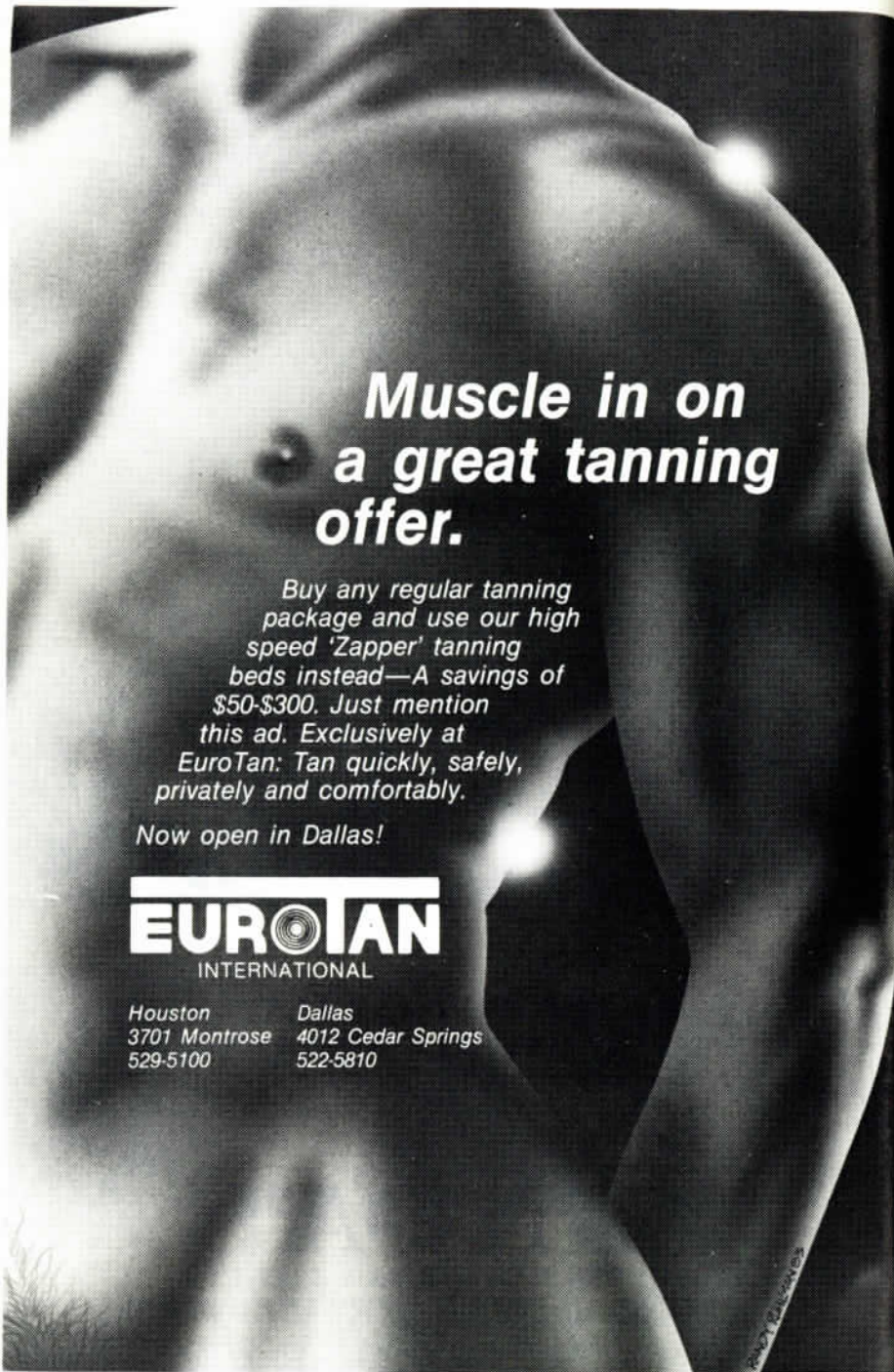

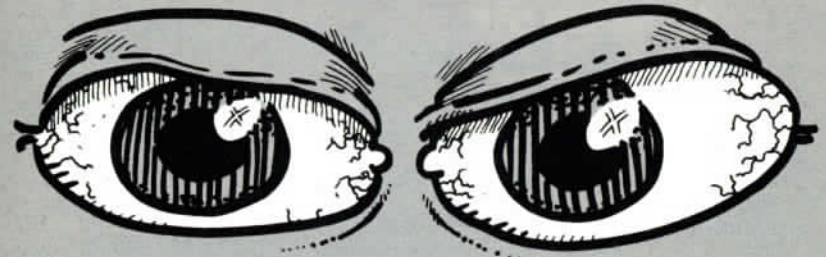

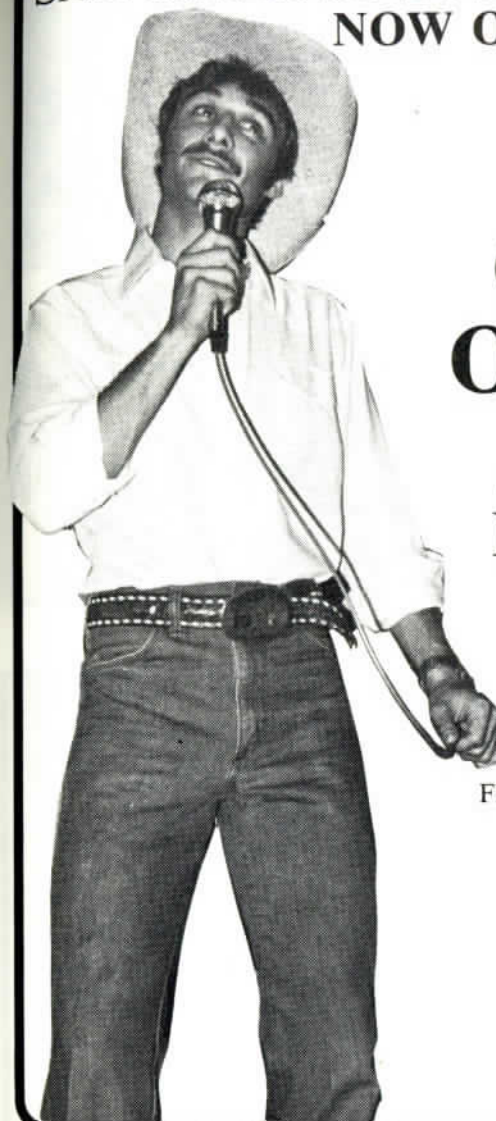

Mary Steenburgen as seen in 1979's *Time After Time*.

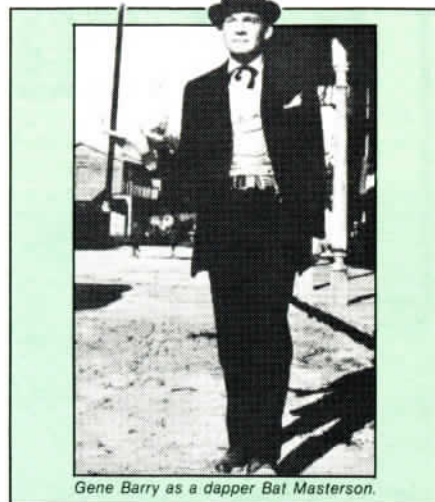
STARLIFT — Arkansas-born **Mary Steenburgen** hasn't yet reached the cinematic heights of, say, **Meryl Streep**, but she is, in my opinion, easily one of the finest of current American film actresses—just consider her work so far. Making an outstanding debut in **Jack Nicholson's** 1978 western *Goin' South*, she continued to receive critical acclaim for her work in *Time After Time*, *Melvin and Howard* (for which she won a Best Supporting Actress Oscar), and *Ragtime*. In spite of all that talent, it's probably a bit early for us to find her on the covers of *Time* and *Newsweek*, designated as the greatest find since **Mary Pickford**, but this fall, with the release of her latest film, *Cross Creek*, her star is bound to rise at least a little higher. *Cross Creek*, faithfully adapted from the autobiography of **Majorie Kinnan Rawlings**—Pulitzer Prize-winning author of *The Yearling*—is the story of a woman who forsakes the ease of middle-class suburbia for a relatively isolated and harsh existence in a Florida wilderness. Majorie Rawlings, who died in 1953, was an extremely independent woman. At the edge of a treacherous swamp she not only discovered herself, but also pro-

duced a handful of books which have been hailed as "literary milestones"—the most famous being *The Yearling*. Directed by **Martin Ritt**, and co-starring **Rip Torn**, **Dana Hill** and **Joanna Miles**, *Cross Creek* was received with a standing ovation when it was shown at the recent Cannes Film Festival. It doesn't have any sledgehammer special effects, but, who knows, it could turn out to be a sleeper.

VIDEOLA — Can you hardly wait for a TV movie based on the life of **Esther Williams**? Never mind—whether you like it or not, a lavish video biography of the former aquacade/movie star will soon begin production, with Esther herself actively participating. Titled *Million Dollar Mermaid—The Esther Williams Story*, the project will utilize home movies, candid behind-the-scenes footage from her MGM period, as well as "recreated" events from her career. Also expect lots of water. . . . That epic miniseries version of *The Far Pavilions* is turning out to be *the* miniseries to look forward to. Starring **Ben Cross**, **Amy Irving**, **Omar Sharif**, **John Gielgud** and **Christopher Lee**, the film is sizing up as sort of a *Gone With the Wind* of India.

Originally the spectacle was planned for both theatrical and TV versions, but don't expect both of them to show in this country. Look for it on HBO-cable. . . . You may be interested to know that negotiations are currently underway for bringing *Blue Thunder* to TV as a weekly hour-long series. Well, they had to do *something* with those expensive helicopters!

GADZOOKS — Murky quagmires. Eerie corridors in mysterious castles. Giant spiders, omnipotent beasts. Damsels in distress and valiant hunks, I mean, soldiers. These are all to be found on the planet Krull at a time that belongs neither to the known past nor to the foreseeable future, and *Krull* is also the name of the long-anticipated new film from **Peter Yates**, director of such diverse films as *Bullitt*, *The Deep*, *Breaking Away* and *Eyewitness*. Yates and his extensive crew have been in various stages of production for nearly two years to bring us *Krull*, and the result is a sort of galactic medieval fairy tale. Sci-fi epics come and go, but *Krull*, which opens July 22, is a biggie and could be the one to give the Spielberg/Lucas crowd a run for their money this summer.

A FINAL NOTE — Whatever happened to Bat Masterson? Beats the shit out of me, but I *can* tell you where **Gene Barry**, who starred as Masterson in the 1958-1961 TV series, is these days. He's currently headed for Broadway as star of the musical version of *La Cage Aux Folles* and, if the rave Boston review is any indication, it looks as if producer **Allan Carr** has a smash hit on his hands. 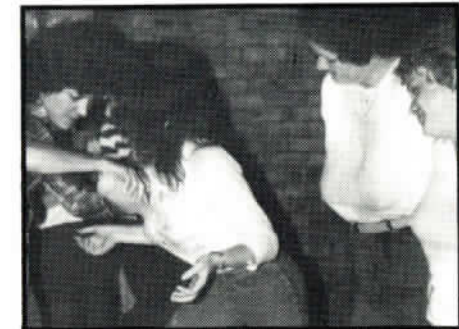

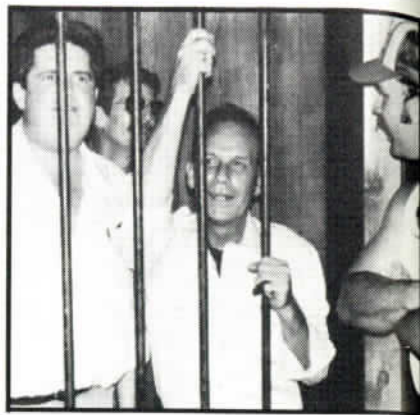

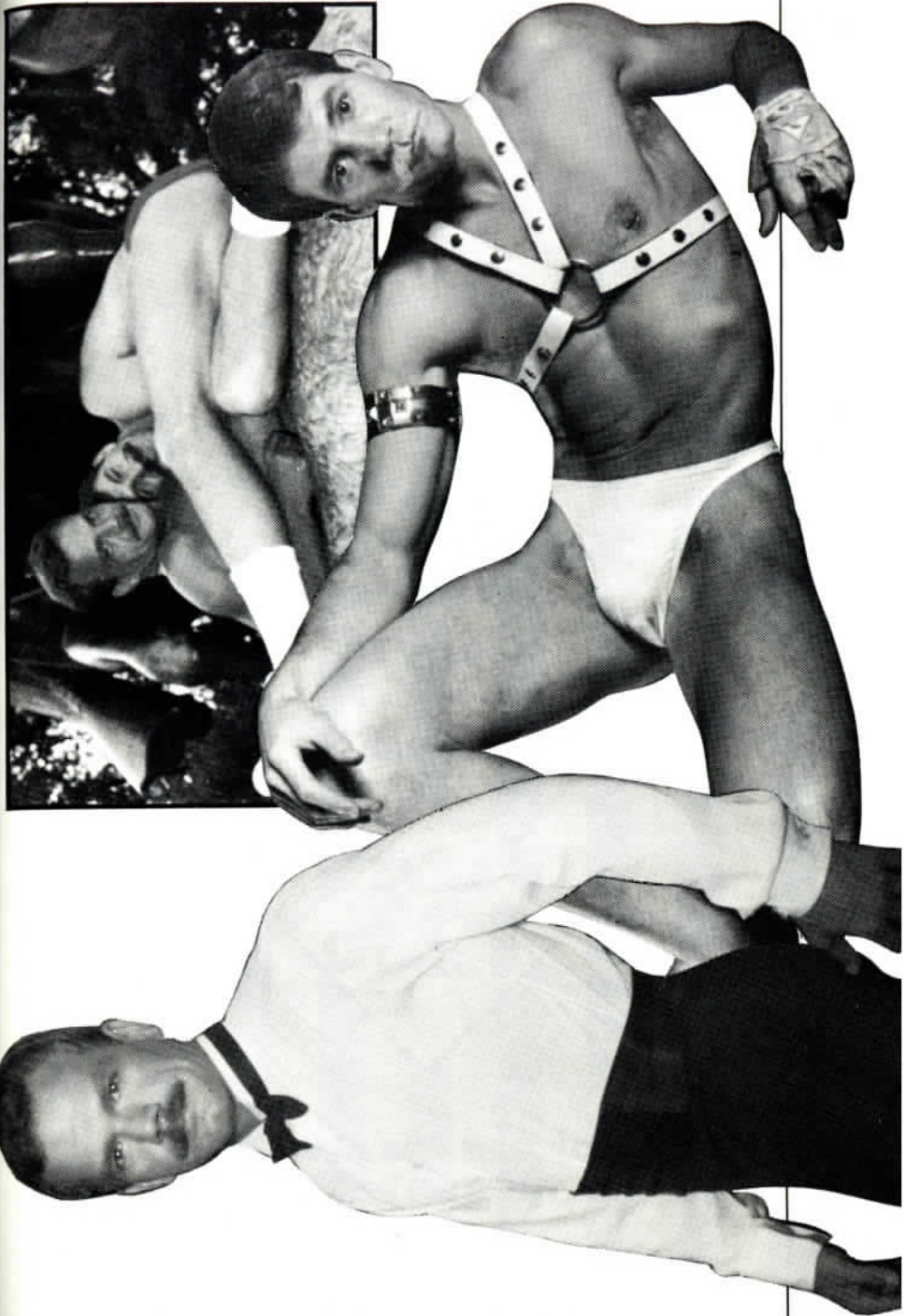
John and Phil, who are close friends, respect each other and work-out together, are both 31, both Sagittarians, both were runners-up in Mr. Dallas '83, both are bicycling enthusiasts, and both had the idea to be photographed frolicking in Lee Park on the famous bronze statue of Civil War hero, Robert E. Lee (1807-1870). The statue of the general for the South was dedicated on June 12, 1936.

Architect Mark Lemmon and sculptor A. Phimister Procter teamed up to present the statue to the City of Dallas in cooperation with the Dallas Southern Memorial Association and the Lee Memorial Committee. The Dallas Park Board provided the location of Lee Park, and erected the base as a WPA Project.

The soldier accompanying General Lee represents the entire youth of the South in the Civil War, to whom Lee was a great inspiration. The soldier was not originally intended, but was added at the sculptor's whim, as an aide-de-camp. Sculptor Lemmon almost didn't get paid for his work, in a big 1936 controversy, because he had added the aide and because the aide should have been on Lee's left, rather than his right.

The impressive building in Lee Park behind the statue is a replica of Lee's Virginia home.
