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
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

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WHITE INVITED TO GPC 8TH ANNIVERSARY

HOUSTON — At the July 20 meeting of the GPC, president Larry Bagneris asked to hear a report from a sub-committee of the Political Action/Finance Committee about the proposed plans to have Texas Governor Mark White attend the anniversary banquet of the GPC as it enters its eighth year of existence in September.

During a phone conversation with White's office, an Austin spokesperson was initially receptive to the idea, though it fell short of an official reply. With the GPC's request put in writing, the governor's office can provide a more considered official response. That letter is now in the mail, David Fields of TWT NEWS reported. The banquet, which will be optional black-tie, would be \$30-40 per plate, and tables for organizations would be \$3.000.

FALL ART FESTIVAL FALLS INTO JEOPARDY

HOUSTON — Michael Groves, president of the Westheimer Colony Association, has informed TWT NEWS that Charlanne B. "Charlie" Holomon has been appointed the 1983 Westheimer Colony Art Festival Director. Mrs. Holoman moved to Houston in 1981 from Birmingham, Alabama, where she had nine years experience as chief financial director and property supervisor of a large real-ty company.

One of Holoman's first duties has been to prepare for the upcoming Art Festival scheduled for this fall. After careful checking, Holoman says she is concerned about the festival's future.

"With only 14 supportive property owners along the Westheimer strip having so far agreed to offer space, the fall festival is in jeopardy." She further told TWT NEWS that twice that many would be needed to ensure a definite "all systems go for fall."

Property owners wishing to save the fall festival may call the new director at (713) 521-0133. It would be a travesty if the fall festival would have to be canceled as was last spring's, many opined. The announcement came on the heels of the cancellation of the spring Festival, which was the only time in the ten-year history of the Festival that it had been cancelled.

In 1982, Mayor Kathy Whitmire and Councilmember George Greanias orchestrated the closing of Westheimer to vehicular traffic—a stiff boost to the already popular eleven-block festival—which attracts three-quarters of a million people semi-annually.

BEEFED-UP C.O.P. PATROL IN DALLAS

DALLAS — With crime in Oak Lawn more visible than ever, Citizens on Patrol—known as COP—is beefing up its surveillance. COP was begun last winter and met with some initial success. However, cold weather "got to the bones of most of the volunteers," a spokesperson stated.

But, COP has received an injection of new spirit this summer, under the leadership of Jim Foster, who told TWT NEWS, "We're not only walking patrols, we now have a radio car that can respond to the Dallas police when needed. Village Security is also helping with this speedy radio dispatching," he added.

Foster noted that Dallas police have been very helpful and have been responding quickly to COP dispatches.

According to Dallas police, crime in Oak Lawn is not really up from last year. It just seems more visible, as more is be-

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ing reported now that standardized procedures for documentation are more widely used.

However, "many more handguns are being used," Foster said. In fact, some local club owners and personnel have recently been confronted by people as young as eight and twelve years of age carrying handguns.

It's a chance to thank him, discuss politics, the police, neighborhood problems, the S.O.B. (sexually-oriented business) ordinance, or anything else on your mind. "Leave your checkbooks at home," club manager Jerry Vann told TWT NEWS, "because this is a getacquainted party, not a fundraiser."

AUSTIN GAY PRIDE WEEK WRAP-UP

AUSTIN — Gay Pride Week in the Capitol City was well attended, Karen Stewart, co-chair of the Austin Lesbian/Gay Pride Week task force has concluded. "We had 250 people at the march to the Capitol, another 250 at the concert, 365 at the gay pride dance, and 165 people at gay skate night," Stewart outlined to TWT NEWS.

However, due to the cost of the gay pride t-shirts, "we have only broken even," she said. To make up the loss, a fundraiser has been scheduled for October 31—a Halloween gay skate night.

Stewart, who is also co-chair of Austin Lambda, reported that there was a general membership meeting of Lambda last Wednesday, July 27. Austin Lambda also hosted the recent Robin Tyler concert on July 21.

MCCD RELATIONSHIP SEMINAR AHEAD

DALLAS — On Saturday, August 20, the local MCCD will offer an all-day "Relationship Enrichment Seminar" for couples in a relationship, couples anticipating entering a relationship, and singles who are interested in finding out what makes a relationship work.

The seminar is scheduled to start at 9:30am and run until 5:30pm. Preregistration is required.

ACLU ENDORSES RUSSELL ORDINANCE

HOUSTON — TWT NEWS has learned from Stefan Presser, staff counsel of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), that the local office "will assist and support" the efforts of Gregg Russell's Domestic Privacy in Employment Ordinance. At the July 28 board meeting, the Greater Houston Chapter of ACLU resolved to fully endorse his amendments.

The ordinance would amend specific sections of Chapter 12 of the Houston Code of Ordinances in order to prohibit discrimination in public employment on the basis of marital status and/or sexual preference.

After reviewing Russell's ordinance, the ACLU said it was convinced that not only did City Council have the authority to amend Chapter 12, but that the amendments would have the legal effect of proscribing discrimination.



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812 WESTHEIMER HOUSTON (713) 526-6050 The ACLU-backing does not come as a surprise to TWT NEWS since the union is on previous record declaring in its policy #261 that governmental discrimination on the basis of sexual or affectional preference is a violation of the equal protection of law. "You can count on whatever support you desire from this chapter," Presser told Russell.

Russell's ordinance has also been endorsed by the Texas Civil Liberties Union of Austin. More recently, the Citizens for Human Equality (CHE), after wavering on the issue initially, came on line last week with an unanimous decision to formally endorse, TWT NEWS was advised by Doug Dexter. CHE president, Steve Shifflet, encouraged other organizations "to join ACLU, TCLU and CHE in the joint endorsement."

21.06 RULING ANNIVERSARY

DALLAS — Members of the gay community will assemble Wednesday, August 17, to commemorate the first year anniversary of federal judge Jerry Buchmeyer's decision which struck down Texas' homosexual conduct law, Section 21.06 of the Texas Penal Code. This event, which is to be held at 8:30pm at Reverchon Park, is one of several activities scheduled to celebrate what has now become known as Gay Freedom Day.

It was August 17 of last year when Buchmeyer rendered his historic ruling unconstitutional because it violated a homosexual's rights of privacy.

DAIRE TESTIFIES AT AIDS HEARING

WASHINGTON, DC — Howie Daire, director of the Dallas AIDS Action Project of the Oak Lawn Counseling Center, was invited to the nation's capital last Monday and Tuesday, August 1 and 2, to testify at federal hearings on AIDS.

Daire was honored to be selected as one of only three such persons from the gay community across America to appear before the subcommittee examining the response of the Public Health Service to AIDS. The investigation comes under the governmental umbrella of Congressmember Jack Brooks (Dem.-Texas), chair of the House Committee on Government Operations.

The chair of the subcommittee, Ted Weiss, (Dem.-New York), who invited Daire, said the "hearing will provide us with the opportunity to review public concerns regarding AIDS and federal response to the disease." Weiss stressed, "We want to make sure that the federal effort is sensitive to the needs of communities at risk."

Prior to his departure to Washington, Daire met in Houston last week with Michael Wilson, Bill Scott and Kent Summerall, all of Houston's KS/AIDS Foundation. The cooperative meeting between Dallas and Houston provided an opportunity for Daire to be apprised of the latest AIDS situation in Houston before leaving to testify.

"No finer, level-headed authority on AIDS in Texas could have been selected than Diare," all agreed. His very professional and articulate statement before the subcommittee was to be included in the printed hearing record, TWT NEWS was advised.

GAY IS HEALTHY OXYGEN & VITAMINS

TEXAS — Never before has the gay community been healthier. More gay men and women are now exercising and taking in more oxygen, joining health clubs in record numbers, eating better, taking vitamins, taking sanitary precautions, getting proper rest, and having resulting higher energy levels for leisure activities.

Why this sudden gay adventure into good living? It's all because of what is now being referred to as "AIDSphobia." The fear of becoming unhealthy is driving the "worried well" to become healthier. It's a known fact that a person's immunity system is less likely to malfunction if the body is healthy, as revealed by doctors' studies.

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
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thinks that oxygen is the most important item on the health list. "You can live for months without food, but only five minutes without oxygen," she states. But, because modern, lazy lifestyles have eliminated walking, running, moving and lifting, most people have consequently eliminated 90% of the oxygen needed to sustain health.

"Vigorous, exhausting, perspirationcausing activity is the type of exercise that will help saturate the whole body with oxygen," Buzbuzian suggests, adding that "these rules of good health in general apply to the good health of the immune system."

Massive doses of oxygen, combined with massive doses of vitamin C, can further enhance the body's immune system, according to Jeffery Lawrence of Cornell Medical Center.

In an article in the American Health Magazine, Lawrence reported his research had found that massive amounts of vitamin C—10,000 to 20,000 milligrams daily—supressed the malfunction of one's immunity system.

A gay male with AIDS, living in San Antonio, is recent proof that vitamin therapy can return the immunity system back to normalcy. In an interview in Calendar, the Alamo City man explained how last April, his T-helper cell lymphacide ratio was down to 0.3—very low, his blood test by the new AIDS clinic at the Medical School for Cancer Research and Therapy, had revealed.

But, just one month later, after taking massive amounts of the recommended vitamin C, his helper/suppressor ratio had nearly recovered by jumping up to 1.6—normal is 2.0, TWT NEWS noted.

Nutritionists advise the increased vitamin therapy must begin with a combination of vitamins A, B and C—known as ACE. To prevent a possible toxic dosage, it was also recommended that ACE be balanced with calcium, zinc and magnesium.

Stories of vitamin C preventing cancer and other illnesses are not new, as several doctors, especially in Europe, have long been supporters of the controversial vitamin-therapy plan.

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
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

Police in Oak Lawn

Dear TWT:

The recent letter by Scot Gordon of Dallas [TWT COMMENT, Vol. 9, No. 18] describing the recent incidents of crime in the Oak Lawn area, concludes by asking why the community doesn't take an active part in crime prevention and support for the police department....

The root of the problem is that self-appointed "community leaders" have such shallow leadership abilities that they are dependent on having a "boogeyman" to kick around whenever they feel the urge or whenever they feel their power slipping away. The police, since they are not likely to respond to such people, make a convenient target. And the reason there is not as much support for the police or

crime prevention in Oak Lawn is because these "leaders" have been very successful at manipulating the people who are stupid enough to believe them.

Certainly, from time to time, the police will enter a bar and check IDs. 

This emphatic language was heartily ratified by the delegates in two (2) two-thirds votes: the first to consider an item not on the agenda, the second to change a standing rule. Jobs; Not Housing

Dear TWT:

With regard to information supplied to TWT NEWS regarding the recently proposed Domestic Privacy in Employment Ordinance." I was disturbed to read in your July 22 edition that the ordinance is, in part, a housing ordinance. Obviously, the source of your information was uninformed since the ordinance addresses only public (city) employment discrimination associated with sexual orientation and/or marital status. I understand this is a common misconception among leaders (of the community), and I would recommend that they review the ordinance more carefully before attempting to educate the community on its content.

Furthermore, with regard to reports given to you that neither CHE [Citizens for Human Equality) nor GPC had any intention of endorsing the ordinance, may I point out that CHE did vote to "endorse in concept the fordinancel as a future community agenda." That decision was made by a unanimous vote at the July 12 meeting of CHE. Additionally, the ordinance is currently under consideration by the GPC. At the July 20 meeting, the majority of the caucus voted to sustain the ordiance by "referring it to the GPC as a future agenda item." Other organizations, such as the American Civil Liberties Union, have also expressed support for the ordinance.

As for the time of introduction of the ordinance, I have never suggested that introduction take place before the election. My proposal has simply been to obtain broad-based community support for the ordinance. I believe that the ordinance

should be presented to city council through GPC after commitments from candidates on such a proposal are obtained before the screening committee this fall. I'm sure that an appropriate time can be established at some time in the future for introduction before city council.

I hope that I may have your assistance in helping the community to better understand this proposal.

THE DANCE **Andrew** Holleran

Nights in Aruba, by Andrew Holleran; 240 pp.; fiction; William Morrow and Company, Inc. 105 Madison Avenue, New York, New York 10016: hardcover, \$12.95.

Following his last successful novel, Dancer From the Dance, Andrew Holleran has written a more sedate, serious and moody fictional piece entitled Nights in Aruba. Aruba is a resort and tourist colony in the Carribean where Paul, the main character relating the story, lived as a child. The tone is sedate. but not dark: Paul's life as he shuttles between New York and his life with gavs there and home, in a small town in Florida, is perfectly ordinary.


His story begins in the present and introduces us to his life as he goes back in time, as flashbacks are wont to do, beginning in Aruba. Holleran treats us to straightforward narrative as Paul recounts his life in the Army in Germany, in Jasper, Florida (with his parents), and in New York. The strength of Holleran's story is in his characters, with little plot development.

The main appeal of the characters lies in their realism. Holleran has carefully developed them; they are the novel's main attraction because the reader can identify with them. We share their

hopes, dreams, attitudes toward getting and keeping lovers, attitudes on how, or how not to, tell parents about them, selves, etc.

The novel is rich in questions we all ask ourselves and others about our lives, our choices and our beliefs about our place in the world. Paul sees his parents and their choices, their lives. He sees his mother as more approachable than his father, whose life is settled in. to a routine early on. He also thinks of his friends' parents and their relation. ships with their parents.

Another area he explores involves his lovers and would-be lovers over the years. His life with them, short or long full of doubts and questions sometimes membered, and learned from. His ultimate questions, reserved for himself were about himself-what he felt, what he wanted, and what he got,

Holleran did not try to encapsulate a personal philosophy in any of his characters. They each had questions they tried to "create" in the best way to fit what they saw in the world and in themselves. There are no labels such as existentialist, buddhist or cynic, to provide the pat answers to all the ques tions.

What makes this novel even more in triguing is a most important elementtime. The story takes place over thirty years; time that lends hindsight to events and choices, and the understanding and meaning that accumulates. Paul is able to see his life and the life of his parents in a way that gives him perspective and insight.

As stated earlier, there is no strong plot that supports the novel. Paul moves through time and space, back to his years with his mother in Aruba and back to the present; he spends up to nine months at a time in Jasper, Florida with his parents every few years, to escape New York. He returns to New York to escape his parents. Most of the "action" exists within the characters.

All of it is told in the first person by not answered, was to be savored and re paul, yet - perhaps not surprisinglywe don't find out his name until almost the end of the novel. What makes this story so personal and real is Paul's viewpoint, which is subjective and involved in the events and people around him. Holleran provides no coldly objective third-person recitation of events.

Andrew Holleran has written a warm, get the answer they felt was truest and human novel of people's lives in a way that may-possibly-communicate his own feelings, tapping his own fund of experiences in a way all writers must. to some degree. If Holleran wished to entertain and enrich, he has succeeded on both counts, and leaves one looking forward to his next book.



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CROSS-COUNTRY CHASE

This is one of Chevy Chase's funnier pictures. This is also one of the National Lampoon's wittier screen efforts in recent years. Too bad it's all relative. Let's face it, Mr. Chase hasn't had a satisfying picture since Foul Play, and the Lampoon bombed with Class Reunion. which was as embarrassing as it was insulting, and they wouldn't even release another finished epoch. Movie Mad-

Vacation isn't much better than all that, but better it is. Much of the action sees the movie's Chase family on the road again and again. In their oddshaped station wagon they attempt to cover the distance from the Windy City to LA, where a Disneyesque amusement park is their target. Behind the wheel is

a rather enthusiastic household head (Chase) chauffeuring an attractive, only marginably excitable wife (Beverly D'Angelo) and two easy-to-bore kids (Anthony Michael Hall and Dana Barron). who refuse to be impressed by the House of Mud and other infamous sights along the way. Imogene Coca joins the foursome for part of the ride and plays the one-sided, unlikeable role of cranky, nasty and, as the script points out repeatedly, smelly Aunt Edna. Other bit players are SCTV and SNL stars such as Eugene Levy, John Candy and Brian Doyle-Murray, but don't expect to see them for more than a couple of minutes at the most. A mysterious blonde. played by Sports Illustrated's swimsuit sensation Christie Brinkley, and her conveniently phased appearences, drive the impressionable driver crazy.

Vacation has its outrageously hilarious moments (about three); it also gen-



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orates multiple chuckles and doesn't mind infantile bathroom jokes. If you absolutely and positively have nothing beter to do, if you appreciate mild, non-

demanding humor, and before you consider seeing Staying Alive for the first or Flashdance for the ninth time, go and say hello to Chevy.



HIGHWAY TO HEAVEN

Truly I say to you: This is the feel-good film of the season. You don't need to be into old-time religion to feel the irresistibly rhythmic spirit of Say Amen, Somebody. The stars of this thrilling documentary are an energetic bunch of black folks who sing the gospel like there's no tomorrow.

Amen makes for an all-different, uplifting entree on this summer's movie menu. This film by George T. Nierenburg observes gospel originator Thomas A. Dorsey, and other wonderful, big-heart-

ed and often big-bodied spiritual singers who are known mostly in gospel circles. They include Willie Mae Ford Smith, the Barrett Sisters, and the O'Neal Twins. These unspoiled amateur artists, who consider their vocal talents a God-given gift, deliver new and old hymns with a healthy mix of amazing grace and immense emotion. Their vibrant, captivating performances have a contageous effect on the audience, and the clapping and tapping around you in the theater may, at times, resemble the goings-on in your town's most soulful Baptist church. And somebody next to you might even say "Amen."





GOSPEL BLUEGRASS — The Gay Unitarians will commemorate the first anniversary of Judge Jerry Buchmeyer's federal court ruling which enjoined Texas' criminal statute concerning homosexual conduct by hosting a theatre party. The GU's are inviting all interested people to join them in attending Cotton Patch Gospel, the longest running musical in Dallas history. The performance will take place on the eve of the anniversary, August 16 at the Biblical Arts Center located at 7500 Park Lane at Boedeker Drive. The cost per ticket is \$6.40.

Cotton Patch Gospel is a retelling of the gospels of Matthew and John which includes 17 bluegrass songs that are the last work of **Harry Chapin**. This version of the gospel, however, is set in present day Georgia. The change of setting is



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eflected in song lyrics such as "It ain't easy growin' up to be Jesus," and "he's waitin' on a call from the man upstairs even though he lives in a one story house." The vignettes which tell the story of Christ have also been updated. For instance, Matthew is introduced as an Internal Revenue Service auditor and Jesus makes his triumphant entry into Atlanta ("The Big Peach") in a white volkswagon convertible instead of riding a donkey as recorded in most versions of the Palm Sunday story. When lesus reappears after his death, he has a cup of coffee and pecan pie with the twelve apostles. Tom Key, who co-wrote the musical, plays the part of Jesus as well as 20 other roles in the show.

Sure, those 9-to-5 jobs paid the bills, but there had to be more to life. . . . There had to be


a way to recapture the innocence of youth, that lust for life, those goals of victory.

Oh! I can't go on. It's just too horrible to recount. Must life be so unjust and cruel??? No. I decided to enjoy it!!!




