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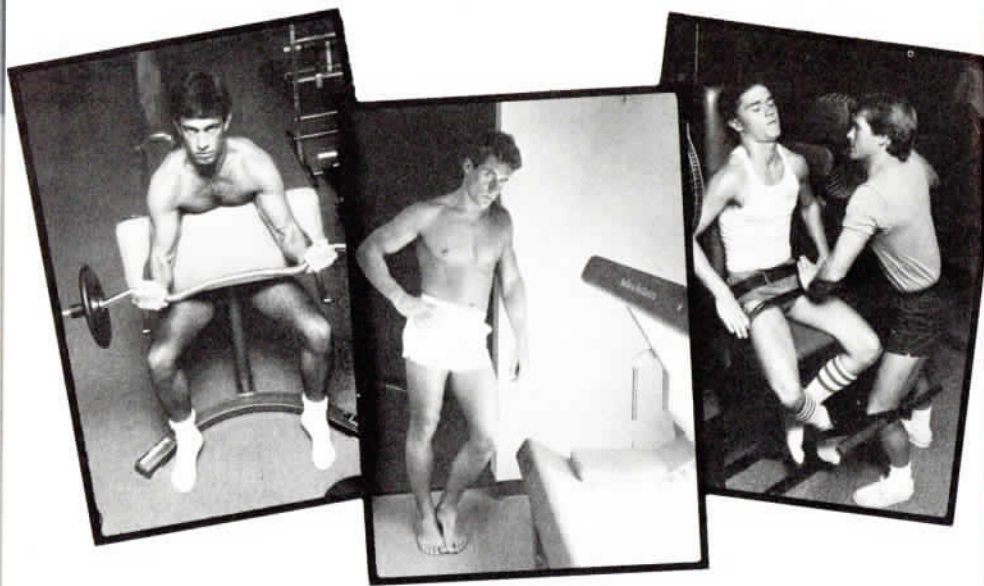
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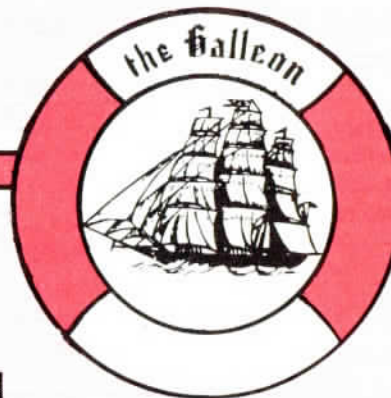
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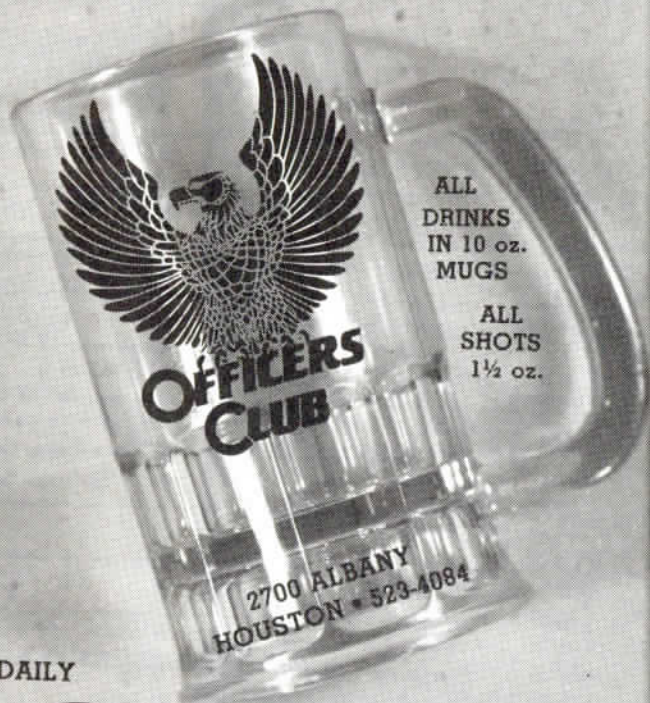
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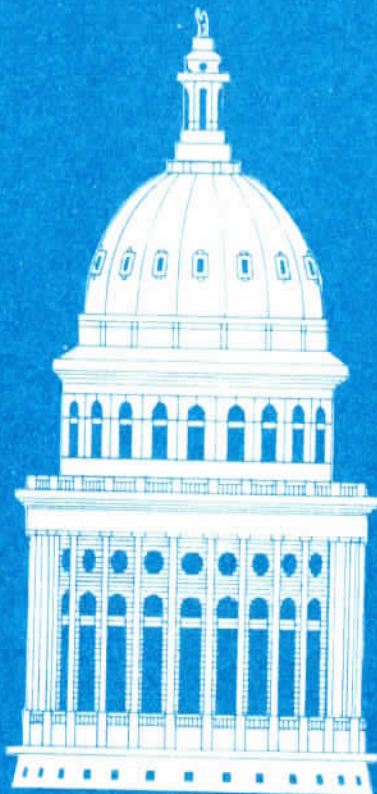
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TEXAS-OU WEEKEND COMES TO DALLAS

DALLAS — It all started years ago when the football teams of the University of Texas in Austin and the University of Oklahoma in Norman decided to meet in Dallas for what has become known as the "big shoot-out."

Now, years later, tradition dictates that Dallas be annually invaded on the second weekend in October with "Hook 'em Horns" and "Boomer Sooner" fans tooting their horns in a downtown traffic jam.

Although the main focus is the Texas-OU game this Saturday afternoon in the Cotton Bowl, many who journey to Big D never even go near the game. Some get only as close as the Texas State Fair, situated next to the Cotton Bowl.

Others don't even get that close. Crowded dance bars, overflowing bath houses, jammed cruise clubs, hundreds in line to eat, and many others unable to find a place to lodge are all a part of the biggest weekend of the year in Dallas.

Texas-OU Weekend is to Dallas what Fiesta is to San Antonio or Mardi Gras is to New Orleans. Like most Texans, most wouldn't miss it.

MCC DALLAS CHOIR AT MCCR HOUSTON

DALLAS — The choir and orchestra from MCC Dallas have planned a visit to Houston to provide music for the Sunday morning service at MCCR in that city this Sunday, October 9. This is the second such visit in the last two years. The Houston choir has been in Dallas providing the service music on two previous occasions, a spokesperson told TWT NEWS/Dallas.

Both choirs will combine with the musicians of both churches to present

the choral anthem "My Eternal King," written by Jayne Marshall of Dallas. The same anthem was presented by the combined groups in Dallas last spring.

"Planned activities have always been part of the party atmosphere when these two groups come together," it was stated. A dinner and singing party are planned for this Saturday night after the combined rehearsal Saturday afternoon. The dedicated volunteers of the MCCR choir are responsible for all arrangements for meals and housing of the Dallas guests.

Both choirs are known in each city for quality music, and are collecting a national reputation for works presented at national church conferences and district church meetings.

COLUMBUS DAY AIDS VIGIL

WASHINGTON, DC — Quite a few Texans are planning to attend the much-talked about National Candlelight Vigil for AIDS, which has been firmly scheduled for Saturday, October 8 in the nation's capitol. The vigil is to be a sober, determined demonstration for increased federal funding for AIDS-related research and health care, plus a public expression of support for people with AIDS.

"We believe that only by demonstrating our deep concern to the power brokers before the Congress, the president and the non-gay media, will the federal government realign its national priorities to conquer AIDS," Carlene R. Cheatam, coordinator, explained.

The vigil will be preceded by several events. On the day before, Friday, October 7, the public will be lobbying the Congress. Then, on Saturday afternoon, there will be an educational forum on the health issue.

Saturday night at dusk, the candlelight march will take place down Penn-

sylvania Avenue. Assembly will take place on the mall at 5:00pm.

Among the honored supporters of the AIDS vigil are Senators Ted Kennedy and Lowell Weicker, Ted Weiss, the Rev. Troy Perry, Bella Abzug, Virginia Apuzzo, Mark Segal, Malcolm Boyd, Dianne Feinstein and Ernest Morial.

GOVERNOR WHITE APPOINTS HALL

AUSTIN — Texas Governor Mark White has appointed Houston City Councilmember Anthony Hall to the Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. The announcement was made on September 22, **TWT NEWS/Austin** learned.

Hall, the representative from District D and a lawyer, was a State Representative for six years and is presently a member of the State Democratic Executive Committee.

Hall is currently seeking At-Large Position 4 on the Houston City Council. He has been actively seeking the gay endorsement with bar-to-bar campaigning

at the grass roots level, and is being openly supported by several gay clubs. Although Hall had scored higher than his opponent, Nikki van Hightower, during September's GPC screening, he lost the official GPC endorsement in a membership vote, 90-39.

Hall kicked off his campaign last Monday, October 3 with a reception at the Hotel Meridian, **TWT NEWS/Houston** learned.

Hall is remembered for speaking in 1981 from the platform in favor of repealing the 21.06 penal code on sodomy.

ALGPC HAS KEY POSITIONS OPEN

It was an exceptionally interesting exchange because of the strong qualifications of the speakers, Jerry Diggin and Dr. Marion Johnson.

Diggin, past secretary of the Dallas Gay Alliance, currently serves on the

City of Dallas' Human Services Commission. Also speaking, Dr. Johnson of Leadership Dallas, has been working to help pass the DART referendum.

The latest issue of the GAUNT monthly newsletter was dedicated to the memory of Bob Gallamore, who passed away on September 8 after a long and courageous fight against cancer. "To most of us in GAUNT, he was a very dear friend," a spokesperson said. "Bob, an early GAUNT member, will be especially missed for his spirited views, wisdom, love of music and learning, and his warm personality."

BAR OWNERS MEET OVER HARASSMENT

HOUSTON — GPC president Larry Bagneris, Jr. met with several local bar owners and business persons on September 28 at Kindred Spirits to discuss recent situations which have been perceived by some as harassment by the police and fire departments.

Various comments from the group session detailed recent events such as the nine-bar paddy wagon pick-up of mid-September. Although nothing concrete was resolved, several seized the timeliness of the situation to explain how certain candidates running for certain offices in the November election would endeavor to improve police/fire department relations with the gay community.

Bagneris was quick to point out that renewed efforts with city officials were progressing to help relieve the tension building in the gay community on the eve of the election, Scot Roberts of TWT NEWS/Houston observed.

SAN ANTONIAN GETS RECOGNITION

SAN ANTONIO — The San Antonio Gay Alliance (SAGA) has informed Tim Ramm of TWT NEWS/San Antonio that its chair, Dr. Edwin Clark "Toby" Johnson, has received national recognition for his literary efforts.

Johnson is to be interviewed in the October 13 edition of *The Advocate* by Rich Grzesiak, senior editor of the *Philadelphia Gay News*.

The occasion for the interview is the recent publication of Johnson's latest book, *In Search of God in the Sexual Underworld: A Mystical Journey*. The book has been described as a report on "teenage prostitution and the sexual revolution from a mystical perspective."

SAGA expressed their pride in seeing Johnson receive national recognition for his writing on comparative religion, mythology, religious meaning and contemporary mystical thought.

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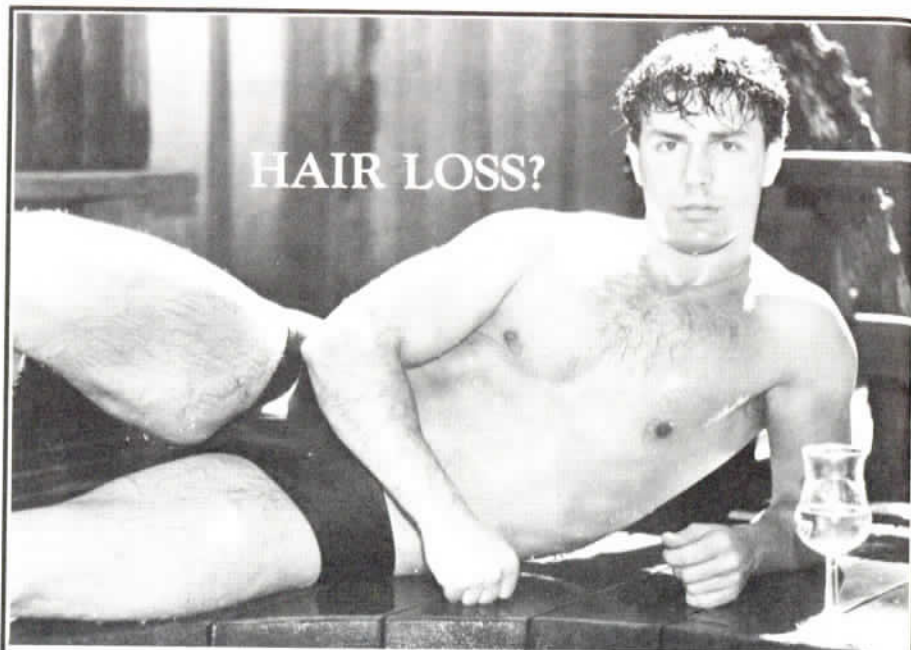

Fire Drill

Editor—The following letter was sent to Houston's mayor.

Dear Mayor Whitmire:

We would like to bring to your attention something that happened Saturday night, September 24, 1983, at Rich's Disco, 2401 San Jacinto [Houston].

A friend of ours from San Antonio was visiting us for the weekend. . . . He had never been to Rich's and had heard good things about the club, so we took him there. We arrived at about 11:30pm. . . .

At about 12:30am, an announcement was made that the entire club was going to participate in a fire drill by order of the Houston Fire Department. It was also announced that upon reentering the club, everyone would be able to drink free for the remainder of the evening.

The club was emptied in a matter of minutes and in a very orderly manner. Some people were allowed back into the club, but only 150 people. We found out that 150 people would be let into the club for free drinks. The club would then be cleared and 150 more people would get in. We could not have gotten in before 2:00am.

We have been to other clubs throughout the Houston area where there are as many people in a smaller space and no one is hassled. The same thing happened two weeks ago, September 10, 1983, but no one was allowed back in. Why is Rich's being harassed like this?

We realize that there are fire codes and standards in regards to clubs and restaurants, but unless all are patrolled equally, no one club should be singled out.

Rich's responds

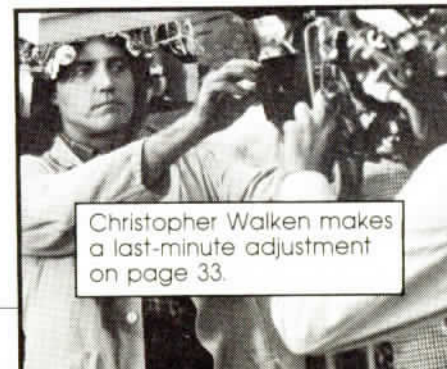
It would make for a better story if I could report that the fire department was harassing us, but that's not the case, as they were interested in your safety.

Certain parts of Houston are restricted in developing past their sewer capacities, which were established prior to a federally imposed building moratorium; i.e., our original occupancy permit was based not on the "live, safety load design" of the building, but rather on how many times the federal government allows us to flush our commodes.

With the cooperation of the city at all levels and all departments, a resolution to the problem has been reached. Additional waste water capacity has been purchased and the fire department no longer has to enforce an occupancy restricted by federal edict. All parties agree that our building was designed to surpass every applicable building code. We take pride in this.

Some concern was stated in your letter as to why it appears that only Rich's received so much scrutiny from fire department officials. I hope my response answers your question. As a patron of any bar or business establishment, you have the right to enjoy that establishment free from the fear that negligence on the part of the ownership or management might interfere with your right to life. Should you have a question concerning a life safety situation at another establishment, ask the management. If they don't give you a satisfactory answer, you have the right to inquire to the appropriate public official, be it a fire marshal, police officer or even the mayor.

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GAY SON'S MOTHER SPEAKS OUT

... Because 70% of the AIDS victims happen to be homosexual men, it is currently believed to be, and is called, a "homosexual disease," something to be both feared and despised. It is being used to further the gap between the gay community and the straight community.

Though many "island" people, innumerable drug users and persons who require blood replacement have contracted AIDS, it seems to be the homosexuals who are held responsible for this "modern plague"; in some areas they are being called the "new lepers." Mob hysteria, growing out of lack of knowledge and understanding, is causing panic that is quite alarming. Many people are avoiding having the slightest [contact] with gay people—to refuse service to them, and even going so far as to wear rubber gloves when either attending or serving them in public places.

If this paranoid behavior is allowed to continue, many homosexuals could find themselves without jobs or places to live; public buildings closed to them. Untold numbers of hard working, decent and respectable citizens will suffer because of AIDS. [A disease] of such proportions does, understandably, cause panic, but it must be dealt with sensibly and through the proper channels. Much medical research is needed and the funds for this must be made available.

Were AIDS indeed a purely "homosexual disease," where has it been hiding up till now? Throughout recorded time, homosexuals have been

around. They have lived, loved, worked and helped build this country. They have died in its wars. Each generation has produced more gay men. Has AIDS lurked then in the blood of millions, suddenly to erupt in the 1980s in New York and San Francisco? ...

... Does this suggest that it is not an isolated germ or virus breeding only in the blood of homosexuals? Something is causing this sudden surge of an unknown illness. This cause must be found. To condemn "carte blanche" all gay men for creating, quite suddenly, a "dread plague" is both stupid and callous. This is becoming a social problem rather than a medical one. ...

I have written this, not only as a crusader searching for an answer—a solution to the AIDS situation, but as a mother; the mother of a homosexual son whom I love very much and of whom I am very proud. He is a fine young man—honorable and decent—warm and caring—a credit to his profession. He shares his life with another fine young man. Together, they have created a comfortable and happy home, enjoying a faithful and loving relationship.

I pray that my son will never be a victim of AIDS, but if he is, I will be there to care for him, still with love and pride. Now is the time for all those who care about a gay person to come forward with all the moral, emotional and economic support they are capable of—to come to the "AID" of our loved ones and all those who are so unfairly bearing this awful stigma.

We Speak for Ourselves

Occasionally when a gay person goes to a member of the "helping profession" for counseling, one may find one's self in a showdown between the counselor's misinformation about being gay and what the individual experientially knows to be true. Jack Babuscio has written *We Speak for Ourselves* as a guideline for all who help or counsel others. The strength of the book in that regard lies in the self-narrated stories of gay people.

The benefit for persons who may be

thinking of going for counseling is two-fold. Most importantly, they will realize that they are not alone in the feelings and "problems" they have. But also, the person can determine when the counselor has the best interests of the client at heart, and if the counselor is informed enough to be compassionate and truly helpful.

The book was written in London, thus the references to the English population and the available social services there. But the problems, and solutions, are the same in both countries. Babuscio has individual gay men and women speak about their feelings, what's important in their lives and how they view their homosexuality.

Some uniquely British expressions are found in the text. Terms such as



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"poof," "ginger" and "bird" all refer to gays or have perjorative connotations, Clubs in England are "members only," and the corresponding institution to our bars are what they call pubs.

The first chapter lists the problems the book will discuss in later chapters and sets the stage for discussion of the real difficulties gay people have. What Babuscio first does is warn the counselors to become aware of internal bias, misinformation and ignorance that would hinder clear analysis of the situation and prevent meaningful help.

It must be noted that Babuscio subscribes to the theory that "experience . . . determines the pattern of sexual responsiveness that becomes characteristic of a [homosexual] person . . . [in the time] from eighteen to twenty months of age." Other authorities have claimed that inherent, unlearned tendencies, unrelated to an individual's environmental experiences, determined sexual behavior.

But talking about origins of homosexuality smacks of assuming homosexuality is a disease caused by a particular element or set of circumstances. As Babuscio points out in another place, "[A] new generation of homosexuals exists . . . concerned with probing the creative possibilities of being gay in the present rather than locating the causes

of homosexuality in the past."

He also goes into more depth than most on the negative emotional consequences of homosexuals "passing" as straight, assimilating and expressing the opinions and attitudes of popular (oppressive) straight society. This process is clearly demonstrated in literature when authors had to change all the pronouns of a gay novel for it to be accepted. Roger Austen wrote *Playing the Game* (once reviewed here) documenting and analyzing this phenomena.

Other chapters include discussion of society's religious objections, the grief reaction of individuals who discover they are gay and of parents who learn of this accidentally or at the desire of the individual. What the counselor must acknowledge also is the non-representative sample of gay people seen. Such a biased view, based on this sample, does not apply to the large majority of happy, healthy gay people.

The forward of the book is written by Malcolm Boyd, social activist and Episcopal priest. Each chapter has notes at the back of the book, as well as sections entitled "Where to Get Help and Information" and "Suggested Reading." To go to a counselor is a difficult, sometimes painful step. For that counselor to be misinformed or even ignorant of the problems only compounds the pain.

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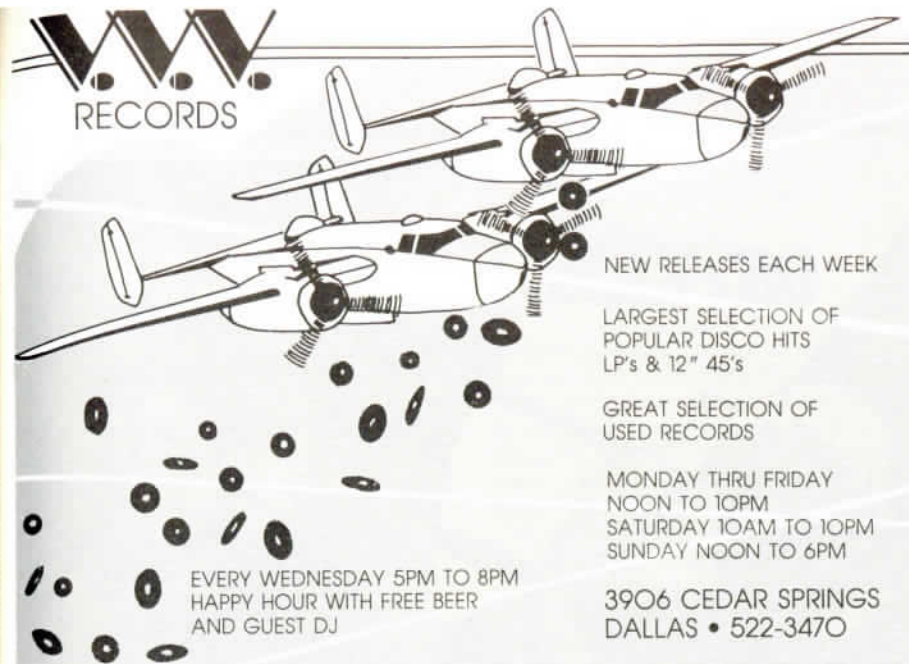
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THE OSTERMAN WEEKEND

NO TIME FOR AGENTS

The Osterman Weekend is a cleverly made film. It has a good story and acting of matching quality and enough cat-and-mouse twists to keep the story fascinating. It is certainly one of the better suspense films to be presented in recent years.

The Osterman Weekend is about a yearly reunion of four guys who are old college buddies. John Tanner (Rutger Hauer) is this year's host, but the glitch in this reunion is that he has been contacted by the CIA (John Hurt) and shown that his three friends are Soviet agents. Not the kind of information you need after making four pounds of potato salad just for the occasion. The CIA wants Tanner's help by continuing to host this soiree and allow them to create a situation where one of them might want to become a traitor to the Soviet Union. But all is not as it seems, and there are several ulterior motives to be discovered in this puzzle.

In spite of the fact that we are asked to swallow several premises which are a bit farfetched, *The Osterman Weekend* works from beginning to finish. The timing and story development are well con-

structed and keep the action quite believable. The comic relief moments are well spaced and don't let the film take itself too seriously. The twists of having the chasers become the chased and the chased becoming the chasers are good to the last frame.

John Hurt gives one of his best performances since *The Elephant Man*, and is terrific as the shrewd and calculating intelligence officer. Rutger Hauer was perfectly cast as our television host whose agreement of cooperation was more than he bargained for, as was Craig Nelson, who offered a great performance as the steel-belted survivor. The rest of the cast was also good, although a few of the characters, like Sandy McPeak's cocaine snorting mama, seemed to be unnecessarily dramatic.

Unless the quality of films improves over the next couple of months, it is quite possible *The Osterman Weekend* may gather a few Academy Award nominations for itself. Not that it is all that good, but so many are so dreadfully awful. Yet this is well worth the wait in line, and for the money, you will certainly be entertained.

AN AMERICAN GIGOLO IN PARAGUAY

Beyond the Limit is just that. It went beyond the limit of bad and right into the heart of awful boredom. It had all the excitement of a stalled car: Just when you think this engine is going to turn over and we are all going to get *somewhere*, it clunks out again.

Richard-humps-her-later as there is important work to be done. There are people to be cured and political militants to be helped. These militants will be helped because they are former friends and have scary stories to tell about Richy's poor imprisoned father.

It is all very simple. Richy will give drugs and information to the militants so they can kidnap an American official and bargain to have six of their political friends freed from jail. In the meantime,

Richard Gere plays a doctor living in some exotic little Central American town. We know he's a doctor because he tells everyone he is and has the *Gentleman's Quarterly* look to prove it. He meets a drunken British consul (Michael Caine), whom he takes to a local brothel, and there he sees this hot little number with a very unattractive dot on her forehead. Unfortunately, Gere does not play a plastic surgeon and the dot never gets fixed.

It is almost the old Richard-sees-girl, Richard-humps-girl story. In this case,

Richy begins having an affair with Michael Caine's wife, none other than the lady-with-the-dot. Things go humping along quite nicely until the militants, in the spirit of Larry, Moe and Curly, mistakenly kidnap Michael Caine instead of the American official.

Richard comes to the medical rescue, but it makes little difference because everyone gets caught and shot in the end by the military. The only climax to the film is the one Richard has in bed. And personally, the beefcake is starting to get stale.

THE BIG CHILL

THE SELL-OUT OF THE DECADE

The Big Chill will grab the big award for best picture next April. How's that for a big-mouthed prediction?

This is a smartly made, highly-commercial picture for all in the family. It takes a similar route as *Ordinary People* or *Kramer vs Kramer*, so you know what to expect: clever writing and real folks dipped into realistic situations. The story is not very new, yet very lifelike. A bunch of friends who were very close during the late and stormy 60s meet a dozen years later for a solemn occasion, the funeral of one of their buddies. They spend the weekend at a South Carolina house to see how their outlooks have changed in the course of time. Can they go back to the level of friendship they enjoyed many moons ago, and, more importantly, do they want to? Or does the presence of dear friends of youth only remind them that they lost track of adolescent ideals, that they in fact all sold out in one way or another? Two of the men acknowledge, not without an ounce of pride, that they are now on the affluent side and have accumulated a bundle, but they harmoniously maintain that money has no significance in their lives.

Unfortunately, all characters have

achieved stardom in their individual careers, one literally as a TV P.I. We also have a doctor, a lawyer, an entrepreneur, a journalist and a drug dealer. There would be more conflict and contrast if there were a player present who had preserved more of the free-spirited mentality of growing up. Maybe the dead friend who pulled the plug personally and wasn't decent enough to leave a note was such a stubborn specimen.

The acting is first-rate with Jeff Goldblum as the fast-talking *People* Mag reporter having the best lines. Featured in equally important lead roles are William *Body Heat* Hurt, Kevin *Sophie's Choice* Kline, Glenn *Garp* Close, Tom *Mr. Goodbar* Berenger, JoBeth *Poltergeist* Williams as well as Mary Kay Place and Meg Tilly. They all make a wonderful ensemble in a film that could easily be transformed to the stage. Writer (with Barbara Benedek) and director Lawrence Kasdan, whose writing talents were behind such blockbusters as *The Empire Strikes Back*, *Raiders of the Lost Ark* and *The Return of the Jedi*, have given us a sometimes talky, sometimes nostalgic movie with a biting, home-hitting brand of humor. The soundtrack features classics from the last great period of rock and touches a nerve inside. Let's face it: I'm a sucker for the sixties.

LIVE OR MEMOREX?

Brainstorm is two movies in one. Half of it is interesting and often thrilling entertainment. During the other half, things slowly but surely get out of hand; the movie's heretofore marginal credibility fades fast and is replaced by a gimmicky spectacle of visual effects which reach bombastic proportions. The basic premise of *Brainstorm* is that some highly sophisticated lab technicians developed an elaborate recording device which is capable of capturing brain waves activated by the five senses known to humans. In other words, if you put on a computerized set of headphones, you can reexperience—and almost relive—what some other person "recorded" before. If you buy this premise—you buy the movie. At least until it turns into the before-mentioned extravaganza.

The fingerprints of Douglas Trumbull, who devised the special effects for *2001—A Space Odyssey*, are evident here. Much of this awkward shift in pace and storyline, I assume, has to do with the tragic drowning death of Natalie Wood, which occurred before the film's completion. Director Trumbull does not let it seem too obvious that one of his leads was written out of the script by a higher authority. Ms. Wood had sparse appearances throughout *Brainstorm*.

One matter I find mildly disturbing is

the pretentious data lingo of computer films like this and *Tron* and *WarGames*. Maybe I ought to enroll in a crash course for computer gibberish at a local IBM drive-thru, so I can follow the movies of data bank robbers on the screen more closely. There is one especially amusing sequence in *Brainstorm* when a brain tape enthusiast is utterly exhausted after endless reruns of someone else's sexual climax. This makes me wonder if a gay climax and all the imagery connected would be satisfying if plugged into a squarely straight mind.

Louise Fletcher is impressive as the chain-smoking lab artist and gives a fine, credible performance. There is something about Christopher *The Deer Hunter* Walken I like very much, but can't pinpoint. His slightly off-center and not-at-all unattractive looks hold a certain magnetism. His stubborn hunt for the ultimate trip of reliving somebody else's death could have been more gripping and better explained.

It felt good to see Ms. Wood again, yet it was also immensely sad. Her role is rather tame and calls for few emotions on either side of the scale. Cliff Robertson as the supposedly nasty big-government dude remains a pale cardboard figure.

This flick features an abundance of storyline holes. Tricky photography and Dolby Sound, which makes you expect the rumblings of *Earthquake* to start at any second, fail to overcome the flaws.

Starring roles in such diverse films as *Parrish* and *Susan Slade* enable Ms. Stevens to show off her wide-ranging abilities as both a comedienne and as a dramatic actress. But it was her continuing role in the long-running TV series *Hawaiian Eye* that catapulted her to stardom.

Talking to Ms. Stevens is like talking with a very mature little girl. At a petite 5'2", she's an energetic, miniature bundle of energy. She still has that same small "Gidget" voice, but her ideas and thoughts are very big. She was a pleasure to talk with.

TWT—Ms. Stevens, is it all right if we take pictures while we talk?

Connie—My hair looks like shit! I went to the store to buy a bottle of conditioner and grabbed a bottle of red henna instead. I've been scrubbing my hair since 7:30 this morning.

TWT—How are you enjoying *Vanities*?

Connie—It's okay.

TWT—Do you relate to the character you're playing?

Connie—In only one aspect. I'm crazy about my children. [The character Connie plays has children.] They're the greatest gift I've ever been given in my life. My character is rather sedate. I was the wild one in school. Not a sexual kind

of wild. I was always getting in trouble. I always, and still do, look around the bend to see what's on the other side.

TWT—How did the Three Debs come about?

Connie—I was in high school singing with this boy; he's the lead singer in *The Lettermen*. We formed a group. These girls heard me and asked me if I could read music, and I said, "Sure!" It was about a year later they found out I couldn't read a note of music. I got away with it for a while.

TWT—You have studied music since then, though. [Connie has studied music composition at both UCLA and Pepperdine.]

Connie—Yeah, but I kept getting kicked out. If you don't show up for three or four classes, they sort of excuse you from class permanently. I would like to do a film score someday.

TWT—We understand you have a big hit in Japan right now.



Connie—Can you believe that? It's called "They're Jealous of Me." Carole King wrote it, and I recorded it in 1960 or '61. The Japanese are having a big 60s revolution right now. They all look like I used to look. Ponytails and all that. They went to Warner Bros. and bought up all the masters of all the popular tunes of the 60s, and my tune was one

of them. We were judging a contest there—myself, Nancy Wilson, Lionel Richie and Joe Cocker. One by one, the contestants came out in full skirts and sounding like me when I was 18. Nancy leaned over to me and said, "That one's even got your old skirt on."

TWT—What do you think about that image you used to have?

Connie—I didn't think about it until about a year ago. It seems so long ago. I'm amazed at the impact it has had on my life. I'm not really like that little bubbly blond, but I get paid so well to play it. I end up kind of cornered into that type character. I ran into a little girl at a disco one night, and she came up to me in this whispery little voice and said, "I'm so glad to meet you. I was just up for a part and they wanted a Connie Stevens-type character, and I got it." It was a little embarrassing. She bounced away. I guess I was like that then. Now, I'm an old broad and I love it. I feel good about my



life. I still sound the same, my voice didn't grow up. The things I say now are different, though. I've done all the things I wanted to do as a kid.

TWT—Is there anything you would still like to do?

Connie—I want to see the whole world. I've already seen most of it. I would like to be a filmmaker. I've been

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writing and I have five properties, and I came real close last year. It's a six-hour miniseries that deals with the American Indians during the Civil War.

TWT—Could you tell us about your project, Windfeather, in Arizona?

Connie—The Indians have gotten a rough deal, I think, mainly because of how they are portrayed in the films. They were always the bad guys. They really got the shaft. I started working for the American Indian Movement because I saw, with my own eyes, some of the injustices that still prevail. For instance, I have two children; you cannot get a child out of the hospital without [the child] getting six shots. You'd have to steal your own child because it's a law. The Indian child is the only child who is not immunized by law. They just don't bother. Now, it's available to them, if they can get to a medical center, if they bring their baby in. I saw four Indian children with polio. We wiped out polio 20 years ago. Indian reservations are ignored by the bureaucracy. The reservation I was at, the Indians were hauling drinking water anywhere from five miles to 122 miles. The Papagos Indian reservation is as large as the state of Connecticut. That's a lot of people. They are still



ignored. They store their drinking water in these big vats and it's like, green, and there's bugs floating in it. The bureaucracy is so kind, they give them chemicals

to throw in the water and tell them it's safe to drink. I have two dogs. If I see a fly in their water, I change it. They are drinking water that's not even fit for a dog. This is why I got involved. I have no ulterior motive. I'm not in it for the publicity; I don't need it. It's just that there is not one single American who should be without the basic necessity of water. I'm working on raising funds simply to dig wells in these reservations.

TWT—How do people find out more about Project Windfeather?

Connie—They can write to Project Windfeather, 8306 Wilshire Blvd., Suite 421, Beverly Hills, CA 90210. These are facts: the Kickapoo Indians are fighting for citizenship, and rightfully so. When the map makers made the maps, they left them out. They live in an area right outside of Texas. They're not Mexican, and they're not Americans. There's 880 of them left, and they're not entitled to anything. When they graze their cattle, they have to lease the land from America. That's a sin. I'd love to meet the guy who made up that law.

TWT—You seem like such an independent person. Are you?

Connie—I'm vulnerable emotionally, but I can move this house if I have to.

TWT—How do you react to criticism?

Connie—I don't get much of it, but when I do, I evaluate it for what it's worth. Sometimes it's constructive, but if I don't think I'm worthy of it, I just totally disregard it. I've been at this since I was 15 years old. I've already made the major mistakes I'm going to make. My horizons are much higher now. I can't be bothered with something as petty as criticism.

TWT—What are you doing after *Vanities*?

Connie—I open in Atlantic City two days after I leave here. This is sort of a lark for me. I'm having fun. I don't think it's a great play. I wish I had chosen another one. It's a fun play.

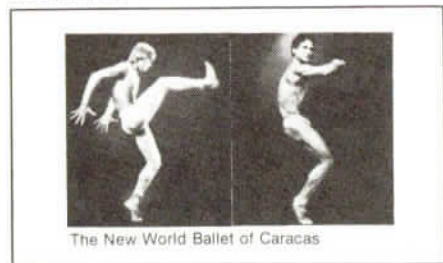

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HIGHLIGHT 

SEX IS STILL GOOD . . .

says Texas Psychotherapist Bill Scott

Earlier this year, several men prominent in Houston's gay community died of AIDS, and within the next six months, business in Houston's gay bars may have decreased as much as 20-40%.

There is a definite connection, according to Bill Scott, psychotherapist and board member of the Houston KS/AIDS Foundation, Inc. He explains a sequence of events that is both natural and predictable—and carries a promise for greater hope and health in the future.

"It's the loss process," says Scott, "that the gay community went through last spring—and that we will go through again if we experience another death or series of deaths from AIDS. We can emerge from the experience, though, as psychologically stronger people if we face our loss and experience the painful emotions long enough to complete the psychological cycle."

He explains that at the beginning of the cycle, people, as a community or as individuals, will deny their loss to escape the accompanying pain. "The notion that a disease like AIDS cannot affect *me*, that death overtakes people

who somehow are *different* from me—this shields us for awhile."

But the cycle continues for the psychologically healthy individuals and the community at large. The phase of denial gives way to the second stage of the cycle—which bar owners experienced with dismay at their drop in business. The community moved into the stage of confusion and isolation. Many people withdrew to acknowledge their loss—of friends and of a lifestyle that seemed to carry more freedom. Individuals can feel very vulnerable at this stage, since facing the reality of death means experiencing one's own mortality.

People get depressed at this stage, and the rage and anger that always accompany depression lead the way to the next stage of the cycle. As anger is openly expressed, the depression lifts and the person becomes more active. Responsible expressions of anger often take the form of community activism and association with social causes—gay political rights, for example.

And finally the cycle of loss runs its course as the individual enters the final phase of integration—integrating the

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experience of loss into the experience of life. Going through the cycle does not bring about an immunity to later losses, but it does bring a greater strength in dealing with those losses, Scott says.

As a group, Houston's gay community has pretty much accomplished the work of living through the loss of friends, of a familiar lifestyle, of sexual freedom, Scott believes. People are going back into the community, back into the bars.

... FOR YOU

What the Houston community has largely failed to do, however, is educate its members on how to retain sexual activities as part of their lifestyle. A report of a 1981-82 survey by Michael B. Wilson, M.Ed., shows that only 12% of the gay men studied acknowledged that their lifestyle changed due to AIDS, including a change to safer forms of sex.

"It is *not* healthy to cut out your sex life," Scott says. "The struggle for sexual liberation has been a very healthy part of the gay movement. It has led to more mature relationships. It is important not to feel guilty about our past sexual behavior.

"Taking precautions to keep from getting AIDS is not a matter of giving up sex; it is a matter of adapting sex. There is such a thing as safe sex."

While it is still important to educate people on what is *not* safe (especially the exchange of high-risk body fluids—semen, urine, feces, blood), Scott maintains that a lot of possibilities are left for anyone willing to be creative. "Think, for instance, about what has turned you on in the past—even as long ago as childhood when a condom might have been an erotic, forbidden object. Think of what it is you like about your partner's body; you can imagine an endless variety of touching and talking to stimulate erotic responses. Fantasize—and try telling him about it."

... FOR BUSINESS

Not only is an understanding of safe sex good for the individual, it is good for those places where individuals meet and talk and share information.

"Many people are looking for a place

where people will not laugh at them for wanting safe sex," Scott has found. A bar can function as educator—and can make use of this fact in its marketing.

While posters, brochures and other visual displays can promote the advantages of responsible sex, the bar can become known as a place where the customers are informed about safe sex. Scott cites examples on the West Coast, where San Francisco bars and Los Angeles baths proclaim "Safe Sex Only."

Having some assurance that persons in a given bar are knowledgeable about safe sex saves people the embarrassment, even ridicule, that they might experience when approaching an individual who finds the idea of safe sex laughable.

That individual probably has not gotten beyond the early stage of coping with problems: denial that the problem exists. Scott explains that admitting a need for safe sex is admitting vulnerability to AIDS. Incapable of facing this painful reality, some people get "stuck" in the denial stage and do not grow beyond it.

This is a person whom a "safe sex bar" will lose, Scott cautions, and the person will go someplace else where he can escape difficult psychological demands. Similar individuals will find the same place—and their bar will get a reputation for unsafe sex. It was these very bars in San Francisco and Los Angeles that closed for lack of business, Scott says.

Spreading the word on safe sex has another advantage for individuals whom Scott calls the "worried well," many of whom have gone back to former sexual habits rather than giving up sex. These people have taken on the added guilt and anxiety that comes from knowing that what they are doing is not good for them.

So, while the gay community is re-integrating after experiencing its losses, a good opportunity is present to build a stronger, healthier identification—one that includes the knowledge and practice of safe sex.



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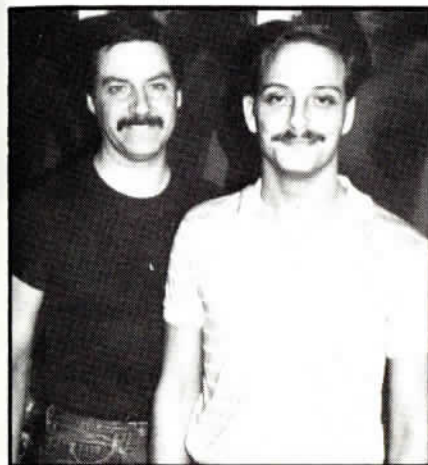
