motorcycle capable of touring with full campgin gear (including friend or boy) aboard.


Each month we share **Club Scene** at our regular meeting and enjoy the articles and information we find there.




Cleveland Happenings

We started the weekend on Thrusday night, with the club hosting Club Night at the Tool Box. Alabama Slammers were the


drink of the evening. For a Thursday night the place was almost packed.




mier of the movies taken during GFR XII (thanks to Loen Groves). And, over \$200 was received for the club's Get Well fund.



The Black and Tans "Beer Bust" at Griffs, will be following closely on the heels of December's great anniversary weekend.




Any club member wearing his colors will be warmly welcomed in LA by me and the Satyrs MC, of which I am proud to be a member.


U.N.C.U.T. Forms

Although you never need a reason to party in New Orleans, the Knights d'Orleans Anniversary is a definite plus.


Lancers 6th Anniversary



Rosebud Enduro

Rosebud '83 was a smashing success! The design of events, timing of the schedule and addition of friendly men made all the planning of the host clubs worthwhile. Events outside the campsite, however, cause one to pause and reflect.

A beautiful enduro day began with the Dallas MC directions at the south gate of the Rosebud campsite and a short drive into the Falls County seat, Marlin, Texas. Along the way, bikers and their buddies answered observation questions and stopped along the banks of the Brazos River. Passing by the Falls County courthouse in Marlin, bikers enjoyed reading the historical signs and tasting the sulphurous waters for which Marlin is so famous. My buddy and I were the first to

leave Marlin and head a few miles down the road to Chilton. It was then that a pleasant enduro turned into a lesson for enduro bikers.

Some say he knew in advance of the enduro route, others that he saw our bikes pass by his office in Marlin—it matters not. The Falls County Sheriff stopped the first biker out of town. The sheriff began by calling in the Texas Highway Patrol and stopping any other biker who slowed. Those who were stopped were charged with "illegal lane change," "attempting to cause an accident," or "illegal turns." No speeding violations were issued but everyone was harrassed. Bikers were told not to talk to one another, all drivers licenses were checked for outstanding warrants, and all inspection

stickers and proofs of liability were verified. Bikers were questioned as to club affiliation, "where the party was at," and so forth. The sheriff made clear his view on "bad bikers." No biker was jailed or detained for more than an hour. All bikers were clean in the legal sense... and no biker reported any incident with the citizenry. What happened? It appears to be a clearcut case of official southern bigotry and harrassment. And, it should be a lesson to all enduro bikers.

If you plan on being an enduro participant at any run, don't preclude something like this from happening to you. A few guidelines:

- 1. Ride straight and sober.
- 2. Obey local laws.
- 3. Check your inspection and liability before the run.

- If you are stopped, cooperate as much as you are legally required to do and be a realist in dealing with local authorities.
- 5. If another enduro participant is stopped, use caution in "rescuing" them. Slow down only if you can afford being stopped yourself. While I'm not advocating abandoning a brother, I am telling you to use caution.

As a participant in five enduros from the Rosebud campsite, I can say the local population has always been friendly, helpful and just goodhearted country folk. This incident doesn't change my mind about them. But it only takes one bad apple if that apple is wearing a badge.

Cheaters of SF



Wayne Jakino, present and past president of the CGRA is one of the driving forces that have brought many of us the thrills and excitement of a great rodeo.




