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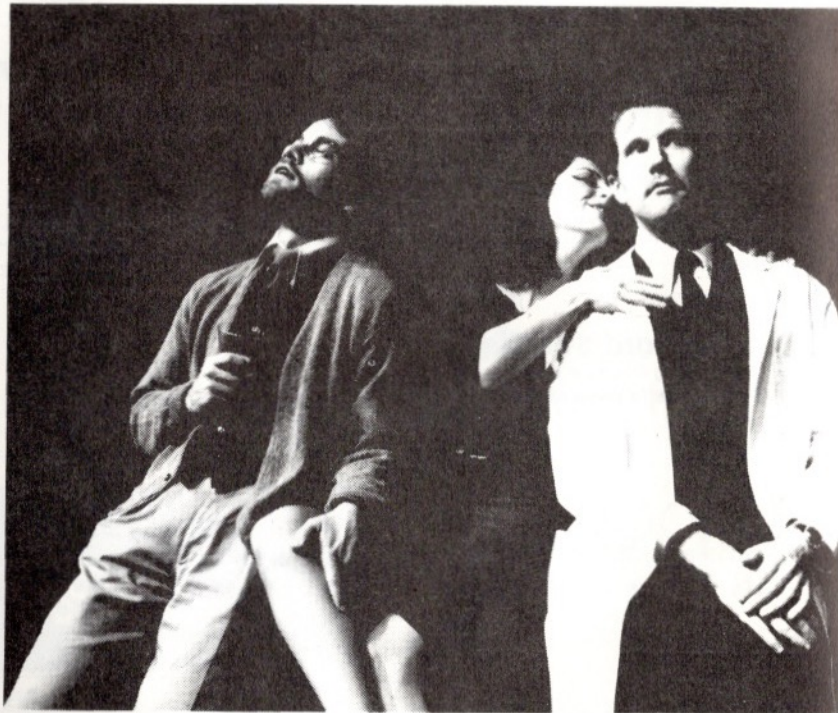
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THE HOTHOUSE

Takes Exclusive Southeastern Bows at the Academy...
on the Boards April 4th through 21st



Harold Pinter's sinister comedy *The Hothouse* will receive its Southeastern premiere at the Academy Theatre on April 4. Directed by Frank Wittow, the play is generally considered Pinter's funniest, combining his usual verbal agility with unexpected hilarious twists.

Set in a government-run convalescent home on Christmas Day, *Hothouse's* humor strikes at the heart of modern bureaucratic anxieties. "In the most general sense," offers Director Wittow, "it's about the madness of bureaucracy. Most bureaucracies satirize themselves, they exaggerate themselves. This is a satire of what happens to a bureaucracy when it goes over the edge."

Pinter wrote *Hothouse* in 1958, but made no attempt to produce it until April 1980. Pinter himself, following a reworking of the vehicle, directed at London's Hampstead Theatre. The play has been produced but once since, at the Trinity Square in Provincetown Rhode Island.

Wittow, the leading interpreter of Pinter in the Southeast, comments: "There is a special place in my heart for Pinter. He has a delicious use of language and a masterful ability to capture the horror and dread that we deal with in dreams. I enjoy Pinter's humor more than any other contemporary writing in English."

IMPROVISATION... ON THE LIGHTSIDE

In keeping with its tradition of innovative and contemporary nightclub entertainment, *Upstairs* at Gene and Gabe's presents Robert Lowe's improvisational comedy theater ensemble, *The Lightside City Players* in *The Next City*.

The show, which opened March 18, features fourteen improvisational players who "call on the audience for suggestions of people, places, and things, emotions, words, and ideas. Then we dig our way out by the skin of our imaginations, and the skills of our trade, creating humorous scenes, situations and solutions."

Led by director/producer Robert Lowe, *The Players* have evolved over the past year through a series of weekly workshops, and most recently playing to standing-room-only crowds at Atlanta's Nexus Theatre.

"Improvisational comedy is the theater of discovery," said Lowe, who has appeared in San Diego productions of *Comedy*, *Comedy*, *Comedy* with the International Blend Players, *Motion* with an improvisational dance troupe, and *Interval* with an improvisational music coalition. "It is an extremely challenging entertainment format and the players bring a wealth of life and performance experience to it."

"The humor we discover with the help of the audience is wry, upbeat and based on trust," Lowe continued. "Our structure is ensemble and our performance is open, friendly and unlike anything you've ever seen."

My therapist and the others before him, don't even have a theory as to why, which is odd because they make something out of everything. Most or a lot of my life deals with things directly or indirectly to being gay. If I'm away for any length of time I miss it.

Like I said I don't always know if it's me or them. There's been 3 gay men that I've been involved with and about 10 others that I've met through them that were friends, roommates and lovers. What I wanted was to tell things that were said and done and you tell me if you thought I acted right under the circumstances. That's what I wanted.

Have you ever read the Catcher in the Rye, there's a part where Holden says he misses even the people that disgusted him. I'm like that I get attached to people I don't even like. I don't feel like going into it, I go into such detail so I won't be misunderstood, but I'm usually taken wrong in spite of myself.

I called the Moonshadow for directions about 6:30 Saturday evening. The girl didn't hang up on me, she asked me if I knew where Emory was, she said "poor thing" because I didn't know. I'm such a pinhead because I don't know where everything is. Really people like me should be herded up and put somewhere so we can be properly looked after. Imagine not knowing every nook and cranny in Georgia. She gave me directions. I may come if I feel like it.

I received my first Cruise, March 4th. Guess what Issue it was Vol. 10, No. 8, Feb 14-20. You know you said that (we need to make a list of all our good luck) in your reply to my thank you note. Well there hasn't been much good luck to list, least not in my life - least not yet.

"A Woman between two worlds"

Butch men relate to me better if I'm in drag and "think" I'm a real woman. Isn't it strange that costuming means so much in our society?

I sincerely hope my words have helped in some small way; and in the meantime, why not be good to ourselves and have a Happy Easter?

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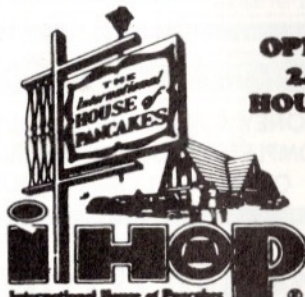
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Expressions of Color

**NEW PAINTINGS BY
MARK VANCE**

**on view at
The Gallery at The Bar
on Peachtree**

Observing the metamorphosis of an artist can be a fascinating thing to watch—and quite rewarding for the serious art lover. It is an ongoing process, with each succeeding transformation revealing a distinct new stage of development—and it can be never-ending. As the artist's personality grows and his style changes, his goal comes nearer yet remains ever more elusive.

Expressing the angst in meaningful art is called talent. Buying the artist's work at the right moment is later called genius.

As the only one "different" in a large family of Polish Catholic farm-people, Mark Vance often sought refuge in the woods, with pad, pencil and paint-box in tow. "Inexpensive Christmas presents" were usually the result of those early efforts: the first stage. His style then was realistic, tightly-drawn, minutely-detailed animal and nature studies in water-color, surely one of the most taxing of the mediums. It was also demanding and a very rewarding teaching time.

But even that production stopped for a three-year period of hibernation. Later on, while employed at a large hospital, Vance realized that his work was as good as—if not better than—that of local artists being shown there. While he did not consider himself "an artist," Vance was competitive, and he did sell.

Another period of stasis and then, catharsis: Vance turned twenty-nine and the die was cast. On his 30th birthday, Vance came to Atlanta. The new museum was opening. He imbibed the energy and excitement of the City and discovered the art of Vasily Kandinsky: Vance fell in love with Atlanta and was transfixed by the Master. "I cried like a baby," said Vance. "Here was this man, painting abstracts, in Russia, in 1880!"

Quick to point out that one does not start out painting "abstracts," Vance had the realist-constructionist background and knowledge and so was prepared for a new way to express himself. It is that venture into the abstract—bold, confident, youthful, mirroring the City, a "city of love" as Vance calls it—that will be on view at The Bar on Peachtree throughout April.



It will be a "new" Vance for some of his avid fans, but most likely not the "last" Vance. Mark is determined to leave a memorable body of work, so people will know he has been here.

Successfully shown and sold at Elaine's Gallery in Buckhead, Vance credits its owner, Elaine Feig, with much of his transformation from determined tyro to selling professional artist. "Elaine is committed to art and to her artists," said Vance. He also lauds Dennis Wirzman, imaginative owner of The Bar on Peachtree, who has given valuable wallspace and promotion to deserving local artists. Showing at Elaine's gave Vance status as one of the successful Buckhead gallery's artists and drew a following from its clientele. Vance, who was The Bar's first featured artist, now wants Midtown to see his new work.

Vance says viewers will see a "whole new excitement and energy" in the paintings, "so open and loose. I'm confident in myself, no longer tight." These are "city paintings, very alive and very exciting!" But the paintings "are about me," continued Vance, "about aggression and happiness, with bright colors and uplifting strokes. I don't hide. These are reflections of the mood I'm in, growing, expanding."

Metamorphosis: it is the artist reborn, again and again, through the inspiration of his talent. Constantly changing, constantly growing.

Yes, it will be a "new" Vance for some, but certainly not the "last." The serious collector will buy now, and at the next stage. And will be able to buy again.

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
