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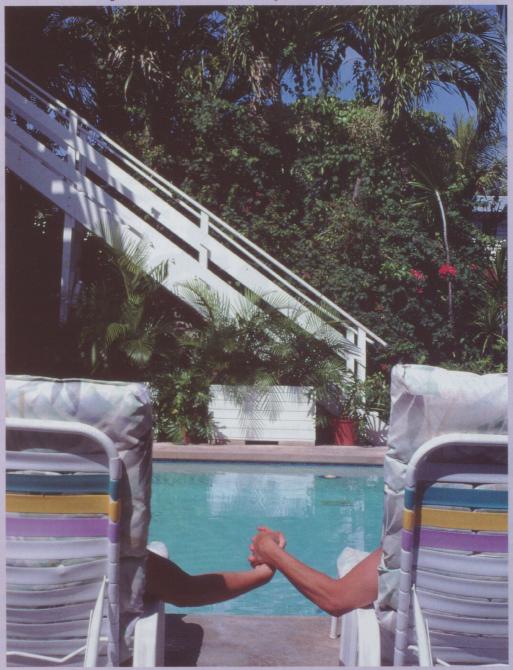

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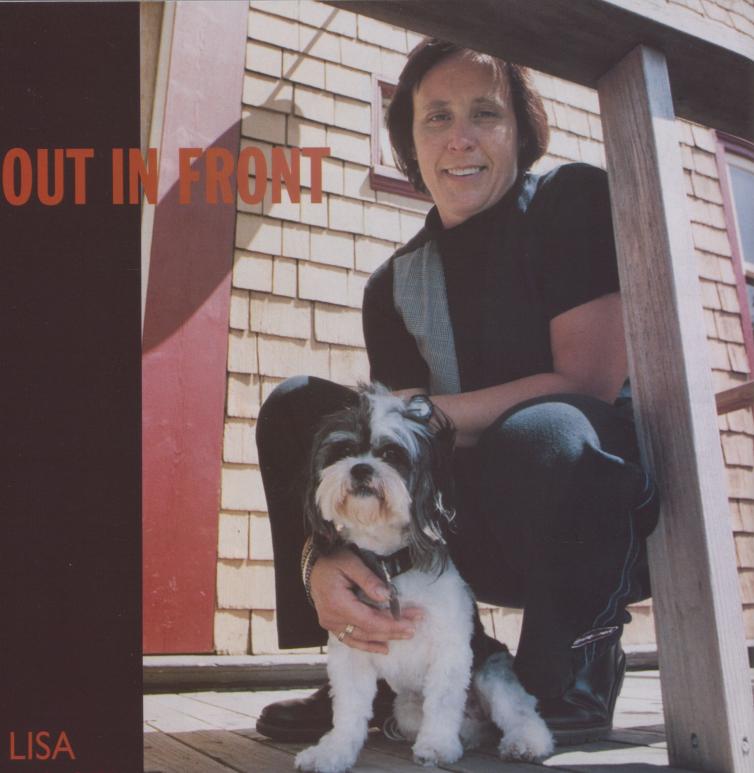

Now, twenty-two years later, Vogel's dream is a thriving entity. With around seven thousand participants, the annual festival is a tremendous opportunity for beginning artists, as well as for old pros. "We have always been committed to presenting new artists on all the stages, often as much as half the bill," explains Vogel. "That's risky sometimes, but ultimately there's more risk in less diversity." Though Vogel is undoubtedly one of the most influential women on the music scene today, she is quick to give credit where it is due. "The vision that keeps [the Festival] moving forward has been ever changing for the last twenty years, stimulated by each festival and the womyn who work on it and come to it." — Maggie Bittel

#### LEGALIZE SAME-SEX MARRIAGE

I've been a United States Navy sailor on active duty since 1989. I joined the service for its great opportunities, such as job experience, travel, and leadership training. I love my job and I'm proud of what I do.

I'm writing to put a message out to our gay/lesbian/bi communities about why it's so important for us to have legal marriage rights. A lot of people don't care about getting married or don't see why it has to be legal, but I want to explain how it affects those of us in the military.

See, hetero-married couples get extra money for being married and are eligible for special allowances for their dependents. So they can afford to take their loved ones with them overseas or on long-term duty. Lesbian and gay people in the service, however, a lot of times can't even afford to take our dependents with us to different states when we are transferred. Some of us really love being in the armed forces, but we're silently forced out because we can't handle the thought of being separated from the ones we love most for three to five years.

So my request out to our gay/lesbian/bi communities is to keep writing your congressmen, governors, and the President to get same-sex marriage recognized by the law.

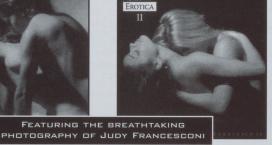
#### A TRUE HERO

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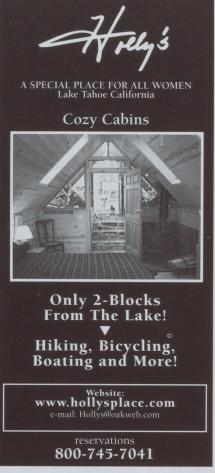

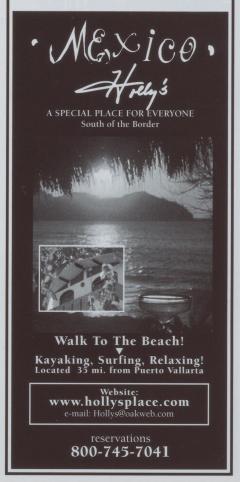

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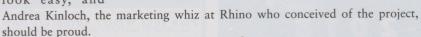


#### HOW TO SPEND YOUR LAST TEN DOLLARS

This new CD, due out in October from Rhino Records, fills the void left by all those dance music compilations that supposedly targeted the "gay community" but always appealed more to the boys than the girls. Complete

with every woman from k.d. to Ani, Sandra Bernhardt to Phranc, Women Like Us traces twenty years of lesbian musical herstory.

Securing artists for the compilation was complicated by industry licensing procedures and attempts to please everyone. But the result makes it look easy, and

#### HAWAII UPDATE

This summer, Hawaii lawmakers gave the stamp of approval to a bill granting gay and lesbian couples the right to apply for "reciprocal beneficiary" status with the state. Under the new legislation, gay and lesbian couples will be eligible to receive a host of new benefits, including family and funeral leave, domestic violence protection, and hospital visitation rights. The "reciprocal beneficiary" certificate costs only eight dollars and will be available to any couple in co-habitance for at least one year.

Unfortunately, the sixty benefits included in the "reciprocal beneficiary" bill still come up painfully short when compared with the three hundred and forty state-sanctioned benefits enjoyed by heterosexual couples in Hawaii. Even more disheartening is that the "reciprocal beneficiary" bill only scraped by the legislature on the condition that Hawaii's November 1998 ballot include a proposal for a state constitutional amendment restricting legal marriage to heterosexual couples.

These sobering facts help to paint a clearer picture of the marriage-rights battle that continues to rage in Hawaii. While the attitude on the mainland seems to be that lesbian/gay marriage in Hawaii is inevitable, the reality is that the state's more conservative legislators have been planting effective roadblocks in the path of lesbian/gay activists ever since the Hawaii Supreme Court first declared a ban on same-sex marriage to be unconstitutional back in 1993. Piecemeal concessions such as the "reciprocal beneficiaries" bill are designed to appease moderate lawmakers and ultimately may slow the process of achieving full and equal recognition under the law.

#### WHAT IN THE WORLD

- Two British lesbians face a reduction in welfare benefits after refusing to tell authorities who donated the sperm for their pregnancies. The Child Support Agency maintains that British law requires them to seek support from fathers when mothers are on the dole unless conception took place in a formal medical setting via an anonymous donor. A British family-values group has denounced the women for turning themselves "into farm animals."
- Argentine gays and lesbians can now claim a widow or widower's pension when their partners die. The only stipulation? The couple must have been in co-habitation for at least five years.
- The parliament of Denmark, the world's first country to ratify gay marriage, recently banned lesbians from obtaining artificial insemination in state-run or private clinics. Only heterosexual women in committed, long-term heterosexual relationships will be eligible for the procedure. Looks like it's back to the ol' turkey baster.
- The state police of Australia's New South Wales have placed several ads in gay and lesbian publications in hope of recruiting more queer officers. One such ad reads: "Join the NSW Police. We guarantee you'll get sensible shoes."
- The second annual African Gay Games, which took place in South Africa in late June, featured such events as ballroom dancing, Hollywood Lookalike, korfball and rugby.



#### NATURE OR NURTURE?

A Montana sheep researcher asserts that about ten percent of rams appear to be homosexual. "In sheep we clearly have homosexuality that's determined by brain structure," says researcher Anne Perkins, who has studied sexual behavior in sheep at the U.S. Sheep Experiment Station in Idaho for the past decade. Her research has established a



link between same-sex preference and brain structures regulating some hormones. She hopes that eventually she will be able to develop a blood or genetic test that will effectively measure the hormonal variation.

#### SPERM DONOR SUES LESBIAN MOTHER

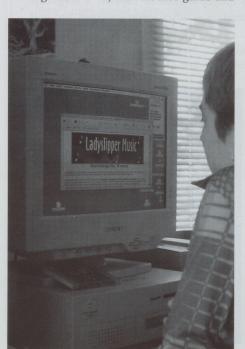
A man who provided sperm to a Illinois woman for artificial insemination is suing for joint custody of the one-year-old child, despite the fact that he had wanted nothing to do with fatherhood at the time of conception. The mother claims that the donor had promised to

allow her and her girlfriend to adopt the child. As a sperm donor, she argues, he has no legal right to be involved in the child's upbringing.

Lawyers for both parties confirm that the case raises issues for which there is no precedent in the Illinois court system.

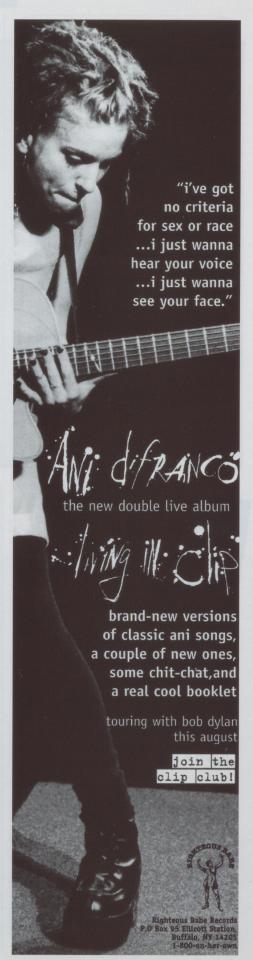
#### SONGS IN CYBERSPACE

Longtime followers of the women's music scene and new explorers alike will find something new in Ladyslipper's multimedia catalogs. Having published a music catalog since 1976, the resource guide and



independent record label now boasts a home in cyberspace. Consistent with Ladyslipper's primary goal of increasing public awareness about the achievements of female artists, the online catalog features fifteen hundred titles, including hundreds of sound clips and new releases not yet in the printed catalog. Found at http://www.ladyslipper.org, the site is an excellent resource, featuring thirty musical categories, as well as selections in comedy, videos and books. Although the site can take ten to twenty minutes to download, it's worth it to get all those free samples in the comfort of your home. The artist biographies and album synopses include humorous commentaries and in-depth musical descriptions.

For the cost of a regular long-distance phone call, the Listener Line will give your ears immediate gratification. #### **HEY! BABY**

Twenty-year-old Shelly Pirroni is an insightful and brave queer activist. Raised in Belchertown, Mass., Pirroni is now a junior at the University of Vermont (UVM). Pirroni questioned her sexuality during high school and came out during college.

Pirroni's mother has had a hard time accepting her sexuality, which has caused some difficulty in their relationship. "My experience with my mother has been the fuel for my activism. It has been a source of pain, but also a source of motivation. Love between us is still strong, but there's some pain there." Although Pirroni's mother has not always been supportive of her sexuality, her father has been understanding. "My father has been an incredible source of love and support to me," Pirroni says.

Pirroni is president of the Gay, Lesbian & Bisexual Association (GLBA) at UVM. "The GLBA is the only resource for queer and questioning students on

campus. Right now our mission is to get a paid staff person to be a liaison between LGBTQ students and the administration. One of the problems with us being a student-run group is that in three or four years most of us will be gone, and new students will have to take over. If we had a staff person who could work for

the LGBTQ students on campus, we'd be a lot better off." Pirroni fears that the only way the administrators will listen to the GLBA's request for a paid liaison is if something very drastic happens, like a suicide relating to a student's sexuality.

Pirroni feels that UVM could do more for queer students. "I can see the way UVM exploits our group — we're expected to do panels and are told they're wonderful, but, when we ask for money, all UVM can provide is pencils and coffee. I won't accept the fact that they don't have enough money,



because I believe it is an excuse. You can have a student club, which isn't much of a threat, but a paid staff person would pose a threat, and UVM doesn't want that."

Family is very important to Pirroni, and she has used her own experience to feed her activism. "I want to

keep fighting until we can all come home to the dinner table and talk about our partners at the table regardless of their race or gender. I believe that heterosexism is different than a lot of other 'isms' because it separates people from their families. I was actually hesitant about doing this article, because of my mother. But every day that I deny who I am, a part of me dies. Maybe what I say and do will help another person not to have the - Gina De Vries same experience."

#### TITLEIST HAS MORE THAN BALLS

We weren't the only ones pissed off by the April Sports Illustrated article on the Dinah Shore Golf Tournament, held annually in Palm Springs, Calif.

Titleist, a golf equipment mega-corporation, pulled an estimated one million dollars of advertising from Sports Illustrated after the article appeared. According to a Titleist representative, the CEO no longer wished to support a magazine which had demonstrated such a "condescending mindset toward women and golf in general."

An excerpt from the feature reads as follows: "Better known as a lesbian spring break, the four-day [Dinah Shore] celebration is less about sports than babes -

hordes of them, gaggles of them, giggling and groping and making out with abandon."

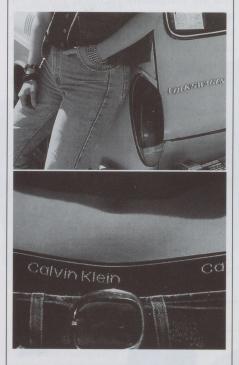
Gaggles of them? It doesn't stop there.

#### Gender Euphoria

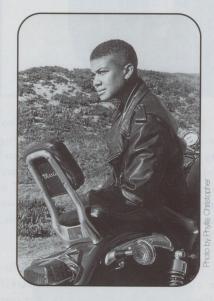

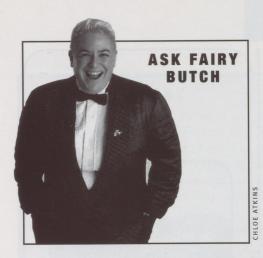

We recently decided to adopt a beautiful African-American baby boy, but are concerned about how to best instill a sense of cultural pride in our son since we are white and so are most of our friends. What do you recommend?

Make new friends, Cupcake! That little cherub simply must see himself reflected back to him in ways that our culture considers significant, namely,

gender, and especially race. Why not work that queer angle to cultivate some African-American pals? Be forewarned though, Ma Chérie: absolutely no one wants to be tokenized or to be anthropologist fodder — find folks with whom you can share genuine interests and affection. Try cultivating African-American male friends by posting a notice with the local Black And White Men Together chapter, requesting a mentor for your son. It may be a bit soon for the gentleman to share his experiences with him, but it is prudent to cultivate relationships with mentor-minded Black men to share in your son's life.

On your way home from the queer community center, well, perhaps after a latte, drop by the neighborhood library and peruse its offerings on African-American culture, literature and history. While you're at it, pick up some pop culture mags like Ebony and Essence, and enroll in an African-American Studies course at the local community college. Though nothing will propel you from Wonderbread to Roots in one fell swoop,

gaining knowledge about African-American history is a first step in building a bridge to the culture of which you will soon be a part.

Though it is as unwise as it is unnecessary for you all to become members of an all-African-American community, you really must integrate your social circle. Join a racially-mixed house of worship, if you are religiously inclined, live in an integrated neighborhood, and by all means, surround your son with children and adults of all colors. Whatever it takes, tulip, begin to broaden your community now before the kid breaks through the primordial morass of infanthood and wonders what's up. Though you face certain obstacles in parenting by virtue of both your lesbianism and your race, with education, community-building, and tons of unconditional love, I feel sure that the three of you can create a fabulous family.

The Ashiko Style Standing Drum origins are also rooted in African culture. It can be personalized by choice of wood, hide

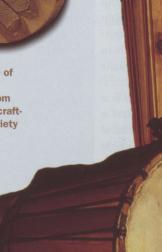
and fabric. The drum can be played on

#### Review: Born in Flames

I never before had the opportunity to review Lizzie Borden's 1983 film, *Born in Flames*, primarily because one couldn't see it anywhere, with the possible exception of an occasional screening at a lesbian film festival. In fact, I first saw *Born in Flames* at a local college in 1989 — and I watched a print with shoddy, almost indecipherable sound.

Born in Flames was kept from video release for years by the costs of music rights, but that — and the poor sound prints — have been set right. First Run Features, which has shown a true commitment to bringing good works by lesbian and gay filmmakers to home video, is releasing Borden's classic.

Strictly speaking, *Born in Flames* is a science-fiction tale. Set ten years after a socialist revolution, the film depicts a band of gun-toting women who decide to fight the patriarchy, including taking over the media. When the leader of the Women's Army is mysteriously killed, women from all walks of life — lesbian, straight, black, white, Latina — rise up to overthrow the system.

Born in Flames took Borden four years to make — she shot on weekends when cast and crew were available — and ultimately cost forty thousand dollars. Its style is rough and gritty, a look often embraced by wave after wave of low-budget filmmakers who followed after Borden. But

make no mistake: *Born in Flames* was one of the first ultra-low-budget independent films and one of the first feminist films to include lesbians and female violence.

This is not a video just to rent; it's a video to own. And I can guarantee that Lizzie won't be sipping champagne with her share of the profits — she'll be making another film.

#### On the Big Screen

Two films that have been doing the cinema circuit and are bound to hit home video soon are Kevin Smith's *Chasing Amy* (not to be confused with Kevin Bacon's *Losing Chase*) and Emma-Kate Croghan's directorial debut, *Love and Other Catastrophes. Chasing Amy* — whose director also brought us *Clerks* — is about comic book artist Holden, who goes to a comic book convention and meets Alyssa, another comic book artist. He falls in love with her, but her sexual past gets in the way — that's right, she swings both ways. Not for the weak.

If, however, you want to relive your college days, Love and Other Catastrophes,

about Australian college students, may be the film for you. In addition to the usual collegiate angst and misadventures, one of the lead characters is a lesbian who (in a departure from mainstream movies) actually has a girlfriend. The film is hilarious in spite of its cuteness. And since I mentioned it, be sure to check out *Losing Chase*, a truly intelligent film about the complexities of love.

#### On the Little Screen (Besides Reruns)

Now that all the prime-time TV shows are in reruns for the summer, it's time to head to the video store and catch up on our movie viewing. If you haven't already seen them (and even if you have), consider popping one of these into your VCR:

Diabolique — The 1996 remake with Sharon Stone, Isabelle Adjani and Kathy Bates sizzles with a lesbian subplot and a new feminist twist to the ending. Diabolique has been remade several times, and the Stone/Adjani version is the best since the 1955 original with Simone Signoret and Vera Clouzot.

Heavenly Creatures — This is the true story of teenage love and matricide in New Zealand, featuring Kate Winslet as the teen who grows up to be mystery novelist Anne Perry. Yes, I said "true story."

The Berlin Affair — Director Liliana Cavani can't stay away from the Nazis: This 1985 film will remind many of her 1974 film, The Night Porter. In The Berlin Affair the wife of a Nazi diplomat falls in love with the daughter of the Japanese ambassador, a relationship soon swallowed by Nazi politics. Best of all: no subtitles.

Although the film is ultimately depressing, it is also incredibly empowering. Trust me — you'll want to take up kick boxing.

Shame — This isn't a lesbian film, but a feminist film from Australia about date rape. Following the pattern of the classic Westerns, a stranger rides into town to right wrongs — in this case, a woman lawyer on a motorcycle who kicks some serious butt when it comes to the town's male residents. Although the film is ultimately depressing, it is also incredibly empowering. Trust me — you'll want to take up kick boxing.

## **PHENOMENON**

obody does it like Sara Lee — the bassist, that is. With a résumé that includes the Indigo Girls, Ani DiFranco, B-52's, Gang of Four, Thompson Twins and League of Gentleman, the forty-one-year-old Brit has rightfully earned the title "bass slut," playfully given to her by Ani DiFranco. The only other female bassist who comes close in comparison (having played with David Bowie, Tears for Fears, Boy George, Sophie B. Hawkins and Donny Osmond) is Gail Ann Dorsey, who happens to be Sara's ex-girlfriend of four years.

#### **Overcoming Sexism in Music**

Lee has plucked her grooves in a predominantly male-centered music biz and bass world for the past twenty years. Long before the current Woman in Rock era, Lee had established her professional career in the testosterone-ridden rock 'n' roll world. women bassists during my time....I dealt with my fair share of studio engineers and producers who looked at me and thought, 'You're the bass player?'...There was one record with Gang of Four where they actually replaced my part while I was out of the studio for a couple of hours." Even nowadays, Lee experiences sexism in the boys' club. "I did a studio session last year in L.A. surrounded by these heavyweight session guys and the guitar

'You're the...? Oh, you're the bass player. Okay.' But then the next day he said, 'Wow, you really play well with the drummer.' And I was like, 'That's what I do, you know.'"

Lee's immense talent has dissolved sexist barriers in the music industry and made her a much sought-after bassist. Lee's reputation precedes her — She finds that she often works with artists who already know her work and like her style of playing. Based on word-of-mouth endorsements, Lee has been pursued by the likes of the Robyn Hitchcock Band, the B-52's and Ani DiFranco, among other big names in music.

#### Indigo Girls

player said,

With the Indigo Girls, however, serendipity played a big role in initiating their working relationship. In 1988, when Lee was in the studio with her band The Raging Hormones, Scott Litt, the Indigo Girls' future producer, was in the

same studio next door with R.E.M. He heard Sara playing and then two years later, when the Indigo Girls needed a bassist for *Nomads, Indians, Saints*, he thought of Lee. Sara remembers that "it was very lucky because Raging Hormones was a very funky band. We happened to

be recording a ballad that day. He heard my melodic side with my bass and felt it would be very appropriate for the Indigo Girls. If I'd been playing a funky song, I probably wouldn't have gotten the job. It was one of those fortuitous moments."

After the initial collaboration, Lee's own spunk helped establish a long-running relationship. Lee didn't expect to see the with them, because "very often as a session player you record a record and you months later, she saw that the Indigo Girls were playing in New York, where she lives, so she decided to check out their live performance. "So I went to see them, and of course I was blown away. I was sitting in the audience and I was just hearing my bass lines that I'd done on the record. And I thought, 'This is a tragedy that I'm not playing these lines with them.' So I went backstage to see them after the show and told them I really enjoyed the show, but the only thing was that I wished I was playing with them. They said, 'Do you want to play tomorrow night?' And I said sure. So I did the second show in NY with them and I got on the bus and I've been on

Lee has an "extremely compatible" relationship with the Indigo Girls, largely due to the creative freedom they bestow upon her. "They love what I do and I love what they do. When I started working

with them in 1990, they just said 'Make up your own bass line.'" The Indigo Girls foster this spontaneous spirit on stage as well, something Lee really appreciates. "They were the first band that for me took risks on stage. They invite friends up when they're in a town; they're far more adventurous than anybody else I've played with in terms of getting on stage and having a good time, taking musical risks and not being worried if we make a mistake. They were definitely a band that I could improvise with to a certain degree," Lee remarks admiringly.

And after seven years of working with the Indigo Girls, Lee has developed a strong friendship with them. Such a good friendship, in fact, that Amy Ray visited her several times while she was on tour with Ani DiFranco in 1996 (even making cameo stage appearances with Ani). "We missed each other. Amy also was a big fan of Ani's music...and I think she was missing playing music and playing with a band and being out there. I think there was a number of things that converged and she thought, 'I'll go out on the road for a while."

#### **Ani DiFranco**

During the Indigo Girls' hiatus in 1996, Lee joined Ani Di-Franco's traveling roadshow. Apparently, DiFranco feels lucky to have had Lee around. "Touring with somebody is pretty much like having your heads ducttaped together and being put in a cardboard box for months. It's very intense, and I'll tell ya, there's pretty much no one

I'd rather be in that box with than Sara. She's a babe."

Lee feels similarly about her experience with DiFranco. "I had an absolute blast playing with her," she exclaims. Part of the fun, according to Lee, was feeling like a primary member of a band. "It was very different from the Indigo Girls. The Indigo Girls are very much Amy and Emily and then we're the backup band. To play with Ani felt much more like a band, especially when we started to jam around in sound checks and start coming up with ideas that

she then wrote songs from. I'd be playing a groove with the drummer. She'd like it and she'd jump in and play the guitar and then we'd start expanding it. And I actually was able to sing — I love to sing."

Musically, it was a perfect fit between Lee and DiFranco. "It was a very funky, groovy musical situation, which is very appealing to me. Ani's definitely inclined to be funky. She just didn't have a bass player playing with her and backing it up and strengthening the groove." So enter Sara Lee for some strong groove support and out comes "a really rocking outfit." Though it was a just a three-piece band, "it was a very powerful unit. It was very exciting to be playing that music and knocking them dead. It's a very rare and exciting thing for a session musician to have that experience. I loved it." Lee merged efforts again with Ani on her newest studio album, set for release in fall. Both Lee and DiFranco hope to work together in the future.

#### **Working with Lesbian Icons**

Lee's long and fruitful career in music has been interwoven with a large lesbian

> following of the artists with whom she has worked. She is very grateful for what this support has given her, which is "a mutually supportive community of women friends, peers and fans - from which you can gain strength." The lesbian/women's community that surrounds Lee has been a source of positivity for her. "It's been

very empowering to work with strong, motivated women. It's a constant source of inspiration."

After twenty years in music, what else is left for Lee to do? Her own work, naturally - the next step for this talented musician is to produce her own album. And judging from the wealth and diversity of Lee's musical experiences, it's likely to be fun, fresh and definitely funky. In the meantime, we can count on Sara Lee to spice up the music world and keep the low end grooving strong.

#### INDIGO GIRLS

Shaming of the Sun

There has never been anything flashy about the Indigo Girls. Since signing with Epic Records in 1988, Emily Saliers and Amy Ray have

taken a bluecollar approach to their craft, embarking on marathon tours and churning out one solid record after another. That is why their sixth studio album is such a pleasant surprise.



While Shaming of the Sun is still very much a homegrown effort, the Girls incorporate an array of creative touches that set it apart from their previous discography. Strings, banjo, mandolin and even bouzouki are used to add flavor and texture to their sound. On "Burn All the Letters," the backing vocals of Native American ensemble Ulali are employed, lifting the song's coda to an earthy nirvana.

As usual, Saliers surrenders the harder-edged material to Ray, concentrating on gentler melodies such as the standout "Everything In Its Own Time." Ray, who wrote her songs primarily on electric guitar, kicks up the volume a bit, infusing some of the live energy missing from the band's earlier studio work. Her "Shed Your Skin" is a grooving highlight, complete with a hip-hop sample looping underneath.

That the Girls are able to write about their passion for women as a detail rather than a driving point is a deliciously honest treat. Saliers' "Caramia" oozes with desire: "With your head on the bed board/The anguished repeat/The sweat of our sadness/The twist of the sheets;" and Ray displays a twisted sexual wit on "Don't Give That Girl a Gun."

Shaming of the Sun is unquestionably the Girls' most ambitious album to date, and with the added flash, their most fun.

oshi Reagon's adolescent injury may have been a stroke of bad luck for professional football, but it was a blessing to the music world. In forcing Reagon to give up her sports-star aspirations, the injury gave her the time to take her music more seriously. Now, nearly two decades later, Reagon has just come out with her fourth album, Kindness, and is already planning her fifth.

Kindness, a departure from her usual eclectic mix of rock, blues, reggae and traditional gospel, draws on folk, blues and ballads, with a little funk thrown in for good measure. Her easy tremolo slips through the strains of each song, gripping, coaxing, seducing, whether it be a call to solidarity, as in her passionate rendition of Ferron's "Misty Mountain," or a lullaby to her own lover, as in "Darlin'."

Reagon's melange of dedicated followers has created a groundswell through eager proselytizing. Her original fan base, comprised mostly of white lesbians, has gradually widened to reflect the diversity of the people in her life. But Reagon, while grateful for the change, is careful not to dis her original audience. Some people, she says (without mentioning names) "have a tendency to hate the bridge they walked in on."

Reagon has always been "out," though the media rarely seems to dwell on her sexuality. Reagon herself thinks that people are beyond caring. Aside from the comforting affirmation the media gives the gay community, she sees all the speculation about people's sexuality to be unwarranted and sensational. "I don't think it's even

something to get obsessed about," she declares. "I don't care if Whitney Houston ever comes out. I don't care if she's a lesbian; I don't care if she's not. Who cares?" Instead of wasting time on poolroom gossip, Reagon suggests that lesbians should be diverting our energy into our communities. "It's great if people can be role models," she continues, "but I think that [change has] really got to happen on the day-to-day, who-you-come-home-to-level."

Kindness



Despite her assertion that the public has no business prying into celebrities' private lives, Reagon does feel that performers have a responsibility to be real, a lesson she learned at her mother's knee. "From where you are, from who you are in your everyday life, that's where you make change. I'm a musician and that's where my strength is. I don't see the point in living a bullshit life as a musician and then coming up with some other thing I do on the side to say, 'This is how I display my politics about humanity.' Why not just be who you are all the time? Whatever your gig is, make change through your strength."

The words seem to echo from the past as though spoken by Reagon's illustrious mother herself: Bernice Johnson Reagon, former civil rights activist and founder of

Sweet Honey in the Rock. And indeed, Johnson Reagon has been a tremendous influence in Reagon's life. Reagon has written and co-produced with her mother, and has performed on Sweet Honey albums. Johnson Reagon cites Toshi as her strongest musical collaborator, a mantel that her daughter wears proudly.

A divining rod, or any amount of good sense, would tell you Reagon's one to watch. But she's too busy to participate in the "why isn't Toshi famous yet?" discussion. Frankly, if fame comes knocking, she may be too busy to heed it anyway. She's been honing her production skills over the years, as well as tossing around the idea of playing some heavy metal. "I'd like to do a rock and roll thrash band next," she offers. But right now, she's got her hands full, what with publicizing Kindness, working on a dance/music/text piece, writing a detective novel and preparing for her next album. That album, she says, is going to be "with a band and with a band sound and with a lot of different collaborations and even more hybrids of musical ideas.

"That'll confuse people even more," she laughs, "but the world's wide open, so why not?"

## SINGING TO BE FREE

he first time Faith Nolan went up on stage she was sixteen years old. "There was a place called the Black Musicians Union in Toronto," recalls Nolan. "I was playing, 'Sometimes I Feel like a Motherless Child.' I remember my hand was trembling — I could hardly strum and my voice was trembling. I was shaking from head to foot."

Born in Halifax, Nova Scotia, where her parents were coal miners, and raised in Toronto's working-class Cabbagetown area, Nolan has been performing for over twenty years. She is a singer, songwriter and political activist. Nolan sees music as a cultural tool which she uses in her political work, a politic firmly grounded in her roots as a working- class, African-Canadian lesbian. Over the years, Nolan has toured across Canada, Europe, Japan and the United States. She has performed at such wide-ranging venues as universities, picket lines, demonstrations, schools, women's prisons, music festivals, shelters and unions.

Nolan's music blends the styles of blues, jazz and folk, following in the tradition of Odetta, Josh White and Bessie Smith, yet with a style uniquely her own. In 1986 she released her debut album, *Africville*, which was the first album and songbook about black history in Canada. It covered slavery to the 1969 displacement of black people in Africville, Nova Scotia, who were relocated by the Canadian government after a long history of racist treatment.

In 1987 Nolan put out *Sistership*, and *Freedom to Love* was released in 1989. Her latest CD, *Hard to Imagine*, was launched in the summer of 1995. "My aunt was murdered by this man who was obsessed with her," Nolan explains. "The song, 'Hard to Imagine' is about when someone's been murdered. It's really hard to imagine, especially when it's someone

you knew or someone in your family. It's also hard to imagine a peaceful world, a world of equality."

Some of her songs are funky and jazzy. Some are reggae. Primarily though, they are blues-based.

"I got into listening to the blues when I was twelve years old. As a performer, I've always been deeply moved by the blues. I love the honesty, the emotional intensity. It speaks about working-class people's lives. You can hear the struggles of black people in it," she says.

She is currently working on a jazz CD, which should be released sometime next year. Nolan's CDs are self-produced by Multicultural Women in Concert, a non-profit collective of women artists. She is self-distributed by W.r.p.m., Womyn's Revolutions per Minute, Canada's only women's distribution company. Both are based in Toronto. She produces her albums herself because, "if you make an album and someone else produces it, then that person

owns it for the rest of your life. Do it yourself and stay poor — but at least you'll own your work," she advises.

Nolan has been out as a lesbian since she began performing. "I can never hide the fact that I'm black. Being a lesbian is something I could be silent about, but I believe that the struggle of equality for lesbians and gays is similar to the intense hatred that was felt for black people during slavery. We are so enslaved, we have to watch where we walk if we hold hands. We don't have our civil rights. To be out as a lesbian is to say, 'Yes, you may hate me, you may not hire me, but I have to speak out, because I want my equality, I want my freedom and I won't have it if I'm silent."

Several years ago, Multicultural Women in Concert purchased seventy-five acres of land two hours north of Toronto. This collectively owned women's land is named Camp Sisters in the Struggle, or Camp SIS for short. Last summer, with the help of many women, they began to build the main structure. This year they plan to finish the building, which will be a main dining hall, washroom and shower room. Eventually the camp will be open all year round, and there will be political and cultural workshops, music, art, dance, theater and wood working. It will be a retreat and health center for women in crisis. Sometime in the future they plan to build a recording studio on site.

Nolan has no regrets about the path she has taken as an out lesbian focusing on political songwriting and performing instead of pursuing a mainstream recording career.

"I don't want to spend my time knocking on some bigwig record-executive-who's-snorting-cocaine-engaging-insome-debauchery's door so I can sell, sell, sell. I think musicians should be creating music that is of the most humane quality."

Faith Nolan is doing just that.

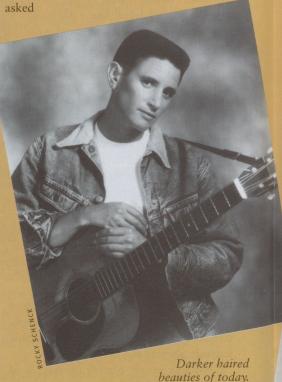

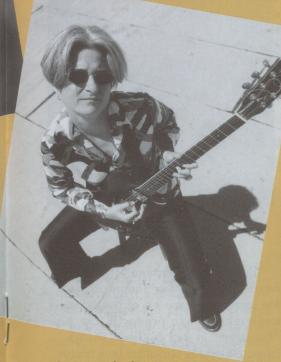

G: When people ask for more universal themes in my songs, I always wonder if they would be asking that of straight people. One aspect of homophobia is that we're not supposed to be "shoving our sexuality down people's throats." People don't even see that everyone's being relentlessly heterosexual in our faces all the time.

P: Right.



G: It completely informs their work and they're not being critiqued, or even asked about it.

P: They don't even see it. It's not even a topic of conversation.

G: It's not like my desire is for queer dominance.

G: Exactly. And I want to be a part of a movement that is about increasing tolerance, where we do tolerate differences and are figuring out all of the ways in which we are similar and all the ways in which it behooves us as humans to be together without fighting or killing or hating.

P: Growing up as a junior dyke separatist it was a big challenge for me to let go of the stuff that I learned when I was really young. And I'm still getting challenged the inclusion of bisexual and trangender to gay and lesbian student unions at colleges, y'know all of this has been very educational to me as a lesbian. I cannot say that I have always been a completely enlightened liberal tolerant lesbian. I haven't. When these straight people have a hard time

opening their minds, y'know I'm having a hard time opening my mind, too. We're all in the same fucking boat.

G: I like to hang with the people who want to embrace the challenge. Because that's why I'm here: to be constantly opening up to a world that can be hurtful and repressive. I want to be big enough to embrace...Anyway, why don't you tell me what you're doing next?

P: I'm bringing back my Hot August Phranc show [Phranc performing in drag as Neil Diamond]. I haven't done it in years. And my new record will hopefully be out by fall. I have a lot of stuff I've been trying to write for the last five years, about my brother's death, and losing a lot of friends. So it'll be about murder and life and love and loss and everything. And I'm myself to performing all over, all the time.

P: Then I'll also be doing the Phranc 'n' Stein show. [Gertrude Stein's poems put to Phranc's music]. It's really a multi-media piece because my cardboard sculptures of the objects we're singing about are hanging around us, and the actual text of G: Good.

Tender Buttons is projected above the stage. Kind of like the opera.

G: I thought that show was really good when I saw it at Michigan last year.

P: It's interesting to perform and collaborate in a different way. And your next

G: Well, I had a transformational experience at my aunt's funeral last year. All my relatives are intense Christians. And when we sang the hymns everybody was bawling. I had this unprecedented experience where some of these Christian songs about God which had never really meant much to me before became this vehicle for her

spirit. It was weird, but something I've been looking for because I want to be touched musically. Honestly, I've gotten kind of bitter and cynical post-Two Nice Girls and I have been looking for my spiritual center inside of music. Outside of "the business" and "making it" and schmoozing. Those stupid things don't remind me of my punk beginnings when it was just about the music. And the really predictable chord changes and simple melodies of gospel have really freed me up.

P: There's something very powerful about simplicity. It's like coming back to folk music again. It clears the path for all the emotions to come through. So we're kind of in the same place. 'Cause the record I'm making now is all about spirituality. It's not the stuff that drove me in the punk world. This was triggered by death, same way as you, and it's like when I play the music it brings up emotions...it makes me cry, it makes me really happy.

G: That's exactly what I'm looking for.

P: That's the record that I'm making.

### FUMBLING TOWARDS SARAH

about every performer, at some point in their career, there are stories of them being gay," says Sarah MCLachlan of the rumor that has buzzed around her name for years. "But I don't know, I probably played into it, too. I have a lot of gay friends, and if the general public sees me hanging out at a lesbian bar — which I've been known to do — then rumors will fly."

Since signing her first record deal at age nineteen, M<sup>c</sup>Lachlan has drawn in millions with her pensive beauty and moody soprano, but the lesbian community has found a particular empathy

within her dark velvet music. "One thing I really want to project when I write lyrics is no gender bias. There is very rarely 'he' or 'she' in there. Especially 'Good Enough,'" the singer/songwriter says, acknowledging the song some considered proof positive she was a lesbian herself. "That was about loving and respecting women for sure. Absolutely, you could take that as lesbian bent, or you can take that as a very close

friendship between women, and then there's also the mother element in there as well. But for sure I can see how my lyrics perpetuated the myth."

Myth?

"Sooorry," M<sup>C</sup>Lachlan says, simultaneously revealing both the truth and her Canadian roots.

In February, M<sup>C</sup>Lachlan's lesbian fable came to an end when she clandestinely wed Ash Sood, the drummer in her band. "It was pretty much the hardest secret I've ever had to keep," she says of the event, which took place in Jamaica. "We planned it for two months and my parents didn't even know...but it was fantastic."

Heterosexual Shangri-la aside, McLachlan says she's wistful to see her faux lesbian status go, admitting she took pleasure in the speculation surrounding her orientation. "I liked it," she says with a laugh that is somehow both mischievous

and innocent. "It was fun!" M<sup>c</sup>Lachlan, twenty-nine, has just rolled out of bed following a late night mixing "babies" for her new record in a Montréal recording studio. Charming and down-to-earth, she happily — if groggily — chats about what is poised to be the greatest year of her career thus far. "I was looking at Lollapalooza last year and thought, 'God, there are no women represented here,"

the Nova Scotia native explains. "There's so much amazing talent out there and I thought it's just really strange that there's nothing like that...so, I just got a big wish list together and asked my agent to give these people a call."

As fast as you can say "speed-dial," MCLachlan's management helped her create Lilith Fair, a thirty-five-city mega-festival featuring what is being touted as the most impressive list of female performers in history. The jaw-dropping line-up includes Tracy Chapman, Mary Chapin Carpenter, Paula Cole, Shawn Colvin,

Sheryl Crow, the Indigo Girls, Jewel and, topping the bill, M<sup>c</sup>Lachlan.

"It's simply a celebration of women because women are fantastic, women are beautiful," McLachlan says of her creation. "I wanted to prove we could do this, because four years ago promoters would have laughed at us if we had wanted to put all these same women on one bill. They wouldn't have taken a chance on it. They now realize that people can stand hearing two women back-to-back on the radio. They're not going to turn the channel. There was a

really silly old-school attitude that prevailed about that for a long time. There certainly is a lot of sexism in the music industry, and it's interesting to see it turn around so quickly, although I think the sexism is still there. But public demand overrides it. People want this."

The public also has been longing for a follow-up to M<sup>c</sup>Lachlan's 1994 multi-platinum smash *Fumbling Towards Ecstacy*,

but, the singer admits, she has been reluctant to produce. "For a long time I thought I should just quit, that *Fumbling* was my swan song," she says. "I thought, 'I'm not going to get any better than this.' I thought that, for me, it was the perfect record, and I had so many mental blocks."

It's easy to understand M<sup>C</sup>Lachlan's reverence for *Fumbling Towards Ecstacy*. Her fourth album was a gorgeous, celestial undertaking that produced the hit "Possession" as well as "Good Enough." Its success quickly carried her from relative obscurity to VH-1 staple, where she led the wave of Nineties female musicians that made a tour like Lilith Fair possible.

Alas, fame does have its price, and two years of constant touring contributed to M<sup>c</sup>Lachlan's thoughts of early retirement. "I just wanted to try and get my life back together, because I'd been out for so long,"

she explains. "It's like being in outer space. It's very alienating and, at the same time, you're so in the middle of things. Your perception on every level gets pretty messed up. It took me a long time just to find myself again. I had to find out that I could write again, because for the longest time writing was just truly the last thing I wanted to do."

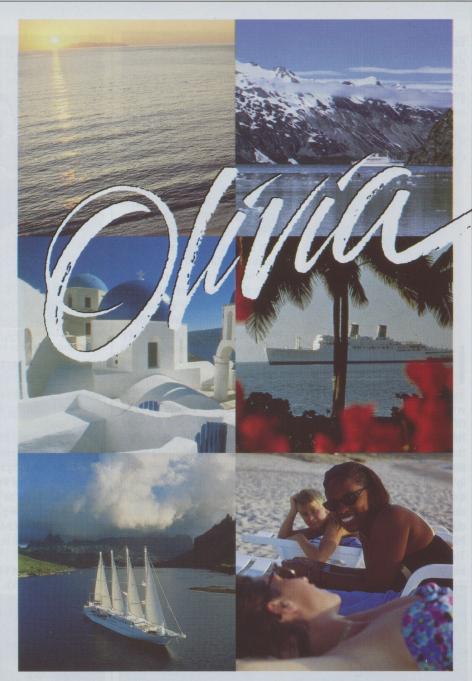
So McLachlan holed up in her Vancouver home and began renovating, gardening, "anything besides writing." After several months of reclusive solace, she was finally centered and confident enough to begin work on her new record.

M<sup>c</sup>Lachlan will unveil the appropriately titled Surfacing mid-summer. "I'm incredibly excited about it. It's dark and...I think it's even more honest than the last

record," she offers. "I keep trying to chip away at myself and it's really honest from the place I'm at now. I've been doing therapy and learning not to deny that you have a dark side, and learning to love your ugliness, because we all have it. I love seeing that in people, that ability to lay yourself out so nakedly and say 'I love myself regardless of all this, I love myself because of all this.' I just find that very refreshing in our society, so it's fun to be able to be at that place myself — be so close to that place. It's been an empowering trip."



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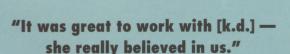

n a matter of a few years, The Murmurs have blossomed from quirky student actors and budding musicians into somewhat bewildered stars blinking in the phosphorescence of Hollywood's stark limelight. After their debut album, Who Are We, released on an independent label in 1992, Grody and Hailey were quickly snatched up by MCA records. Since then, they have put out The Murmurs (1994) and the five-song CD White Rabbit (1995). This summer they will be coming out with Pristine Smut, featuring

tight." They started off as college pals — back then, Grody drawls self-mockingly, they were "you know...actors." When they graduated, a few of their college friends started a small theater company in Brooklyn: Open Window Theater Group. It wasn't long before Hailey and Grody started to play quitar and sing together seriously, practicing seven days a week for about five hours a day. They eventually decided to do a show at Open Window. According to Grody, everyone was extremely responsive, and a few friends suggested they start taking their music seriously. So they did.

Their first show as The Murmurs was far from perfect. Grody winces as she recalls the experience: "Our guitars were going out of tune but we kept playing anyway...I'swear to God if there had been a window, I would have jumped out and left the show...Leisha literally had to slap me in the face because I was like, 'I'm getting outta here, I'm getting outta here!' It was a disaster."

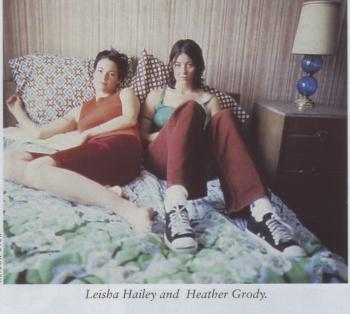

From that 'disaster' of a show, however, Grody and Hailey have blossomed into what is now a four-woman group with a mainstream fan base as well as a solid lesbian following. Having k.d. lang as a producer has helped, of course. "It was so great to work with her," says Grody. "She really believed in us and it was her first time producing a girl band. That was something she really wanted to do. For us, it was just something unfathomable to think we'd ever be working with her." Grody says that k.d. would try to "bring out our character of who we are



live, [but] on tape. It was really exciting; really good energy and she'd listen to our ideas." k.d. was careful not to change their unique sound.

Aside from the California tour, The Murmurs will also be appearing at the Michigan Womyn's Music Festival. It's their first time playing, but it will be Grody's second time attending. Her voice escalates with excitement as she talks about her first experience last year.

"I had the best time of my life last year. I was like, 'Oh my God we've gotta play here!' You can't even understand how excited I am. Leisha has never been there, so she has no idea, and neither has the drummer.

"It's funny," she confides, "some of the dykes there become like security officers. They get such attitude. It's like their big chance..." She trails off into lighthearted laughter.

Part of her excitement of the Festival can be attributed to both her and Hailey's love for women's music. Hailey is a "huge Natalie Merchant fan," according to Grody, who herself prefers groups such as Elastica, The Breeders and Sleater-Kinney. While their musical tastes may vary slightly, together they "click." They manage to balance harmonies with an unmistakable clarity. Their lyrics are gritty and direct as often as

they are sweetly fantastical. The Murmurs' sound may have changed a bit on their upcoming album — with the addition of the two new band members, as well as k.d. lang's hand in production — but the strength and passion connecting Grody and Hailey will most certainly come through and remain clearly their own.

## The Second Coming of Sosa by Shannon Lee Turner

he first time you listen to Lourdes Pérez, listen to her alone in the dark. There in the stillness, her music will caress you, hold you, heal you, surround you — you might even find tears streaming down your face at the clear calm strength of her voice.

Pérez sings bravely of familia and memoria, of love and anger and the ache of loneliness. Her imagery is startlingly beautiful; she transports her audience to a

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world characterized by "coffee...dark-roasted in the fire," "the laughter of love," and "the dancing of the wind." Yet amid the poetry of her lyrics lie bold challenges to colonialism, military rule, greed, homophobia and classism.

In the lively song "Luisa Capetillo," Pérez pays tribute to the Puerto Rican labor organizer of that name, who was arrested in Cuba earlier this century for wearing men's clothing in the streets: "'Disgrace!' said the judge/'Sacrilege!' shrieked the priest/Smiling she went, knowing the absurdity of those who would judge her..." Pérez herself chuckles as she explains that "A lot of people want to remember [Capetillo] primarily as a labor

scends language. Drawing together the colorful threads of musical traditions as diverse as Puerto Rican plenas and aquinaldos, blues, Pan-Latin nueva canción, even elements of folksy American "wimmin's music," she creates a feeling of wholeness amid contradiction, an empowering message about identities that will not be lost on anyone who has ever struggled with a fractured sense of community

Perhaps the best example of Pérez's ability to communicate through music alone is the song "La Carta." With its resounding "call and response" pattern — a musical tradition indigenous to Africa — the song evokes a powerful sense of solidarity and unity,



Yet despite Pérez's clear genius for communicating intense emotion and complex ideas with only her voice and her guitar, American promoters continue to balk at her decision to sing only in Spanish. Recounts manager Annette D'Armata wearily, "A lot of times they'll ask me, 'Doesn't she sing anything in English?' Or they'll say, 'I just don't think my audiences have the attention span to sit through an entire hour of music they don't understand."

Pérez refuses to bow to the pressure, however, a decision that is more about creative integrity than anything else. "I can be the most honest and emotional when I'm singing in Spanish," she says simply. "My language is the creative place that I go to when I write...that's where my creative images come from."

Look for Pérez's new CD Vestigios this fall. Painting a colorful mosaic of women's strength, the new compilation is a series of anecdotes, memories, and portraits. One of Pérez's goals with the album is to challenge the American notion that "women's music" is primarily a white-dominated folk phenomenon. "The movement of music from women is broader," she declares, adding "I have a lot of respect for [Anglo] traditions, but they are not my traditions." Pérez is also eager to improve lesbian visibility in the music world of her native Puerto Rico. To this end, she has included a song on the album Vestigios with "super-traditional" Puerto Rican rhythms...and openly les-

bian lyrics. Pérez is planning to go on tour this fall to her country of birth, and it will be the first time she has ever performed live there. While a bit nervous about the possibility of confronting some homophobia, the singer offers quietly that "there is a strength in doing work that speaks clearly about who you are." ■

organizer, but she was also a cross-dresser." And judging from Pérez's descriptions of Capetillo's starched pants and slicked-back hair, she was a mighty dapper one, too.

In a slightly different vein comes the velvety acoustic piece "Tengo la Vida en Las Manos," a song that honors the simple, potent wisdom of folks not formally educated. Pérez paints a picture of a powerful woman who has learned her lessons in the school of life. "I only have these two hands and the history of my people," comes the haunting refrain, "I don't know about verbs or adverbs...but I know that love is equal with roses and I know of your black eyes."

With lyrics this compelling, it is easy to fall for Pérez. But even those who don't understand the words seem to flock to her shows — a testimony, perhaps, to the raw power of the music itself. Now dropping to a whisper, now soaring into rich dulcet tones rivaled only by the legendary Mercedes Sosa (to whom she is often compared), Pérez tran-

n the early Nineties, Toni Gogin — then a drummer and guitarist with The CeBe Barns Band started getting the urge to record her music. But it didn't take long to realize how limited her options were. "I didn't want just some guy recording us," she remembers. "There was no one we wanted and there were no women."

In 1994, Gogin moved to Portland. Taking inspiration from the women she met there, she and a partner bought some recording equipment and taught

themselves how to use it. By the end of 1995 they had started the label Horsekitty, and were recording their own music and that of their friends. As their expertise grew, a broader mission evolved: to help women and queers record their music and learn about the industry while doing it.

Looking back on those days, Gogin says, "When I was young,

help for girls and queers wasn't there. So many boys have bands and record their own music....Girls need to learn about this."

Jody Bleyle (of Team Dresch) experienced the same frustrations as Gogin back in the early Nineties. Independently of Gogin, she formed Candyass, in 1993, in order to provide women with some recording options. To date, her company has served Kaia, Vitapup, The Lookers, and of course Bleyle's own band, Team Dresch.

Last April, Gogin and Bleyle joined forces to form Candyass/Live Transmission. One of the major benefits of the partnership is that it gives both of them the chance to continue their music without neglecting their business. (Both women spend a lot of time of tour: Gogin is currently jamming with Cypher in the Snow and Bleyle is with Hazel.)

In theory, their new business should run like a well-oiled machine: Candyass finds a band it wants to represent. Bleyle and the musicians work out details such as release date, tour dates, song order, cover art. The band goes in for a recording session at Live Transmission. Gogin finishes up the eight-track while Bleyle han-

dles the marketing and promotion. The band sets off on tour just as the CD arrives in fan mailboxes or indie record stores across the country.

Unfortunately, reality isn't quite so streamlined. Candyass/

pendence by never insisting that musicians signed with Candyass record with Live Transmission or vice versa. Bands who do record in-house get terrific deals, though. Recently Live Transmission recorded a band for around fifty dollars — thousands less than with other studios. Gogin charges a low hourly rate and even waives the fee for bands which suffer from a serious lack of funding.

The business even has a company web page (designed by Emily "The Metallic Blue Goth" Kingan) that reviews other queer and female bands on various labels and provides commentary about environmental concerns.

No one is properly paid, of course, but as Bleyle says, "We don't really care about the pay because we're building the future and creating community." Although they have only a few employees, there are always friends, musicians, babies, cats and dogs in the offices. Everyone got in on the phone interview with CURVE, including high school intern Ilanya Strauss

icture it: A young singer/songwriter sits, quite out of her element, at a snobby, upper-crust restaurant. Across from her is a fiftysomething man. But wait — it's not what you think. Clive Davi, a record company mogul who has signed the likes of Patti Smith, Annie Lennox and Janis Joplin, has flown to Vancouver to meet an eccentric new talent named Kinnie Starr. The conversation flows and the two connect, but one thing is missing: Davis can't stay in town to see her perform live. Kinnie then asks the highbrow crowd if she may interrupt their meals and perform a spoken-word piece for her guest. She does, the restaurant watches in glorious awe and voilá! a new fan base is born.

Kinnie Starr may be a lot of things, but she is definitely nobody's puppet. This West Coast woman is confrontational, political and emotional. She aims to get her music heard, to incite, to get people to react. And react they have: Fans flock to her shows. The media gushes. Labels climb over each other begging her to sign on the dotted line.

But enough speaking on her behalf: It's time for this challenging, articulate woman to speak for herself.

DS: What performer most prompted you to act, or re-act?

KS: PJ Harvey. Definitely. Singlehandedly. Just for being guttural. She's the person who got me off of acoustic guitar and got me to write songs from that deeper place. Listening to her stuff made my whole body feel really weird

Live Transmission has only a few employees, and financial difficulties constantly loom on the horizon. Neither Bleyle nor Gogin had much startup capital, the business still has no corporate backers, and recording equipment is extremely expensive — a good microphone runs about seven hundred dollars.

Despite financial difficulties, the business has managed to hold fast to its original ideals. Over half of the bands handled by the duo are women-led and almost all are queer or have a queer member. Gogin and Bleyle respect every band's creative integrity and inde-

Candyass/Live Transmission is actively creating a community that dares to "redefine punk, go beyond identity politics and prove that queer rock isn't just about who you sleep with." na Egge is a walking divining rod. Some artists are like that — blessed with an intuitive sense for reading situations, people, maybe even the future. Something, that inner water rod perhaps, brought Egge east from Silver City, New Mexico to Austin, Texas to pursue a



dream already emerging from deep within her.

River Under the Road, Egge's first CD, is a debut masterpiece worthy of a songwriter decades worldlier than this mere twentyyear-old soul. For a songwriter who professes to write from what she knows, she seems a bit young to be generating such rich depth.

But ask her the story behind one sweet, insightful lyric line and she'll paint an entire character portrait of someone dear to her. Or she'll tell a childhood story uncomplicated, yet laced with intricate, exponential memories. Egge could grab the ripples of heat rising off of scorched pavement and turn it into a song. It is this ability to see beyond what's there that makes her a great songwriter.

Jimmy Dale Gilmore — along with Austin bass-legend Sarah Brown — co-wrote the title cut from Egge's River Under the Road. The track rips and sways like an international flatbed on a country bridge. Rumbling currents swirl beneath the surface, in giddy anticipation of the mystery that lies ahead (and below): "It goes much farther, deeper and darker than the road above could ever go...."

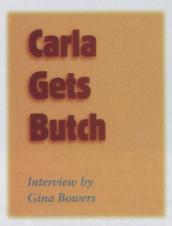
Gilmore has just invited the engaging young singer to join his 1997 East and West Coast road tours, but it's difficult to imagine Egge ever becoming cocky about her charmed career. She is



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sweetly shy about her own success, and quick to credit those who have supported her, including her partner Amy Pancake (who designed the cover art for *River Under the Road*).

Ana Egge is a rare talent. While many musicians are still coming into their own at her age, Egge is far more than a diamond in the rough.



e're not really married to any genre of music and that annoys a lot of people, but I can't help it. I get bored," Carla Bozulich admits. Impatience, in her case, proves to be a virtue: Witness the meteoric rise of her band, The Geraldine Fibbers. Within eight weeks of its conception, the fivemember group — including stand-up bass and violin — independently recorded a ten-inch single and were soon signed to Virgin Records. After touring the United States and Europe with their debut album, Lost Somewhere Between the Earth and My Home, Carla and her fellow Fibbers returned to the studio. "This is the only interview we're gonna do while recording and you're from CURVE, so it's kinda cool," says Carla as she sinks into a leather couch, lights a cigarette and begins our chat.

### **GB**: Is there a theme to your new album?

**CB:** Yes. The album's called *Butch*. The recurrent thread through the album is gender issues and ambiguity, as far as sexual orientation. I wanted to name the album *Butch* because



it's a very homo-specific word. It just means so much to me, that word. It's a state of mind, really. It's usually used in reference to a woman, but it doesn't have to be...

What else can I say? It's for the butch inside us all. It was an alternative to the title *Bitch*.

## That fits into your gender ambiguity theme.

Yeah. There's a lot of stuff on the album about power as a woman. I'm a person that refuses to lay down and be walked on. The album is about reaching that place where you're ready to just fucking kill someone or die before you're ready to let that happen again. Because, as a woman, you deal with that. I'm pretty fucking good at it and I don't take shit.

### How do you relate to your audience?

I feel like I plug directly into whatever people are feeling or thinking. We opened for Joan Osborne last year, and one of the shows was all ages. The whole front row was taken up with little girls and their mothers. It was obvious from the first note that we struck that they were horrified. The mothers were helping the little girls cover their ears. I'm an empathic person, so I suddenly

started feeling what they were feeling.

## Are you seeing anybody right now?

Mmmm...I've had a date or two recently. It's kind of one of those best friend scenarios. We'll see what happens with that. I don't know.

When CURVE interviewed Jenny Shimizu a while back, she mentioned you.

Yeah, I read that. That was real nice of her.

#### You two dated, right?

Yeah. That was five years ago. She used to look really solid. She's a solid gal. She still carries that with her, but she used to be a solid hunk of a girl. She's really an excellent person — fun, funny, gorgeous.

#### And your friend, your "best friend?"

(Smiling) Gorgeous as well. Pretty. Smart. Excellent kisser. It's a little scandalous, I think. That's why I'm a little reluctant to talk about it. I don't know if she would want me to or not.

#### Is she married or something?

(Laughs) No, no. It's just really a tangled-web situation, you know?

I haven't had many girlfriends. I've had a pretty intense history, and a lot of it has to do with the things that men do to their girlfriends and to the women in their life, and some of it's not very nice. Girl Land is very pleasant territory for me because I'm relatively inexperienced, I guess. It's kinda cool because I feel really awkward and naive and not very good at it. Like, I don't feel all confident in what I'm doing. And it adds a sweet element to the whole thing that is lost for me with boys.

#### **COMING OUT — AGAIN**

his is a column about coming out. I'm not dissecting poor Ellen again. Or even that delectable little morsel, Anne Heche. But once the country gets a buzz for something, like coming out, it's hard to veer out of the media vortex. Call it political gravity — we all feel the pull.

I've been an out dyke since high school — more than a quarter of a century. Very young and sweetly naive, I came out before I understood what the closet was. My parents discovered my lesbianism when I was expelled from my all-girls school for being a "bad moral influence." Nothing could have been more terrifying than my parents finding out. Once they knew, disclosure held no fear.

Being an out dyke before it was trendy had its downside: harassment, lost jobs, violence. Yet I have never considered "passing," even when I've had the opportunity. Some people consider passing a stage of denial — pretending you aren't what you know you are. That's probably true, which is why I have decided it's time to come out. Again.

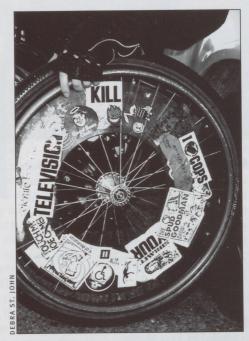
I'm not declaring my lesbianism for auld lang syne. That's about as public a record as one can have without tattoos and marquees. I'm a lesbian — still, always, wouldn't have it any other way, love it, can't imagine a better choice. I'm coming out about something else — harder, scarier, more alien.

I am disabled.

It's difficult to say, even though I've been practicing. Difficult, because I don't really want to accept it - as I imagine all those Ellens out there didn't really want to accept their lesbianism — because life is harder as a disabled person, just like life is harder as a lesbian. It's difficult because, unlike lesbianism, disability is a difference I wasn't born with; it's new for me. I haven't had twenty-five years of public confidencebuilding around it. I don't have a movement supporting my coming out; I don't even know what movement there is or how to access it. Until last year, I didn't know much about disability and certainly never thought I would be among the one in forty Americans who are disabled. Just like all those people who didn't know anyone queer before Ellen, I didn't know anyone disabled.

I'm a media maven. I read newspapers, magazines, books; watch TV news, tabloid talk, prime time. While most of America debated the Ellen question, I've been wondering where the disabled characters — and actors — are.

There is only one actress with a disability on TV, a deaf actress on a daytime soap: Amy Ecklund on *Guiding Light*. Another deaf actress, Marlee Matlin, starred in two prime-time series, *Reasonable Doubts* and *Picket Fences*.

Both shows are gone now, and Matlin with them. Now the only person in a wheelchair on national TV is ABC news reporter John Hockenberry. I have seen only one disabled character in a prime time TV program, the head doctor on *ER*, and her disability has never been discussed, never been part of a storyline.

It was this lack of visibility that led me to the coming-out question. Being disabled is a major part of my life now, as important as my lesbianism — but more obvious, to me and other people. I actively think about being disabled in a way I never considered my lesbianism, because being disabled affects everything I do but being a lesbian doesn't.

Just as straight folks don't think about what it is like to be lesbian or gay, abled

people don't think about what it means to be differently abled. Although I think of myself as a fairly cognizant person, sensitive to political difference, I was clueless about disability until crutches, wheelchairs and questions of access became a permanent part of my life. Living my life openly as a lesbian for all these years has been hard, but not untenable; living as a disabled lesbian for the last year has been extraordinarily difficult. I had no idea it could be so hard; I wonder how I could have been so ignorant of these challenges before they affected me personally. I marvel at the strength of other disabled women, yearn for role models beyond the new wheelchair Barbie (who looks just like regular Barbie, only in a wheelchair) or the movies of the week in which money, privilege and superhuman courage conquer all.

Disability made me reconsider the coming-out debate. What do I tell people? Will my disclosure jeopardize me in vital ways — like job opportunities or relationships? Disability made me reconsider passing. Just as many of us have been shunned for disclosing our lesbianism, disability can bring out the worst in other people. Do I pretend I'm not really disabled? Do I try and pass my disability off as an accident from which I will recover, because that will make others more comfortable and protect me from the discrimination most disabled people experience?

And what about our own community? Where do disabled lesbians and gay men fit in our "looks-ist" standard? What kind of access have we provided for those disabled by something other than AIDS? What kind of supports exist for disabled queers or their partners? Has our inclusionary movement addressed non-AIDS disability?

All these questions arise as I declare myself a disabled lesbian. That disclosure makes me aware of my difference in a way I haven't experienced since I first came out as a lesbian so many years ago. Perhaps coming out isn't as magical as we claim, but declaration is the first step toward visibility and visibility breeds awareness. With our voices we gain power — for ourselves and for those still struggling to speak.

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#### **NEW BOOKS TO NOTE**

n the introduction to the new edition of *Gay & Lesbian Online* (Peachpit Press \$16.95), Jeff Dawson writes of the Internet, "So what is this potentially new species measured in bits and bytes? It is us, in all our variety: The queer Oz, cyberqueerdom, lesbigay digitopia..." True words, in my experience. If you still aren't plugged in, but want to be, you might find Dawson's book a treasure trove of information. It's a resource guide broken up into categories such as Activism, Adult Children of Heterosexuals,

African-American, Art — and that's just the A's! Each chapter includes web addresses and other info on related sites.

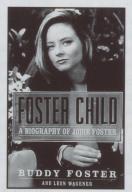
But enough of cyberspace. On the other end of the technological spectrum we have *zines* — those little magazines usually photocopied and stapled together as acts of love and revolution. They have been big stuff in the queer communi-

ty since the early Nineties, originally traded in the mail through the Fact Sheet Five circuit. I myself was guilty of publishing several loud-mouthed creations myself back then, and can proudly say that I helped launch the widespread commercial distribution of these critters. Now you can find zines for sale at almost every queer and women's bookstore across the country and in Canada, too! Celebrating this rapid proliferation comes A Girl's Guide to Taking Over The World: Writings from the Girl Zine Revolution (St. Martin's \$14.95), just out from that dynamic New York duo Tristan Taormino and Karen Green. The book draws on the history of girl zines but concentrates on those readily available today, and includes excerpts from zines like Hip Mama, Fat Girl, Femme Flick and Princess. For the most part, the pieces in Girl's Guide are written and published by women in their late teens and early twenties, and many are proudly, defiantly queer.

Young women and girls also star in two exciting new anthologies which have recently come our way. Jo's Girls: Tomboy Tales of High Adventure, True Grit, and Real Life (edited by Christian McEwen, Beacon \$19) and Girls: An Anthology (edited by Edith Chevat, Laurie Piette and Angie Argabrite, Global City Press \$14) share the same spirit, some of the same authors, and even an overlapping story ("Ruthy and Edie," by Grace Paley, appears in both collections). Both books are good romps into the high-spirited world of girls throughout literature.

To see what young girls are actually reading today, check out the *Girls to the Rescue* series, edited by Bruce Lasky

(Simon & Schuster \$3.95). The series features multicultural girl heroines in a format accessible to middle-school-age girls.

Despite the title, My Life as a Boy (Algonquin \$16.95) is another book likely to attract lots of attention in the women's community. It traces the life of well-known feminist author Kim Chernin and includes a rather odd account of how the growth of her inner boy-persona precipitated her shift toward lesbianism. Hmm.

Moving into a more fantastical realm, several new science fiction/fantasy books with lesbian themes deserve our attention. Melissa Scott, author of the award-winning novels Shadow Man and Trouble and Her Friends, now presents a sequel to an earlier novel, Dreamships, in Dreaming Metal (Tor \$22.95), which explores the theme of artificial intelligence with her character Celinde Fortune, a controversial illusionist. Another Lambda award-winning author, Maureen F. McHugh, is finally available in paperback. China Mountain Zhang (Orb \$13.95), is quite the trip worth taking, especially if you have a love for both science fiction and Chinese culture/politics. For a sampling of

some new voices in the fantasy field, check out *Bending the Landscape: Fantasy*, a collection of primarily queer selections. Edited by well-known authors Nicola Griffith and Stephen Pagel (Borealis \$19.95), this anthology is the first in a series which will also include science fiction and horror books.

Speaking of fantasies, actress/director Jodie Foster certainly occupies a special place in dyke daydreaming. Don't miss the new book called *Foster Child: A Biography of Jodie Foster* (Dutton

\$24.95), written by none other than her brother Buddy. There's not a lot of queer content about Jodie here, but one fact that fascinated us was that the siblings' mother was allegedly in a long-term lesbian relationship with a woman named Jo D., for whom Jodie was named!

Placing Jewish women's herstory into a fictional context, Judith Katz,

author of one of my favorite novels, the Lambda-winner Running Fiercely Toward a High Thin Sound, now gives us The Escape Artist (Firebrand \$12.95), which takes place in the Jewish community of Buenos Aires at the beginning of this century. And being Jewish myself, I fully appreciate Rebecca Alpert's Like Bread on the Seder Plate: Jewish Lesbians and the Transformation of Traditions (Columbia University Press \$24.50). Alpert, an out lesbian and one of the first women to be ordained as a rabbi, advocates welcoming lesbians into Jewish tradition primarily by presenting new interpretations of the Torah, usually seen as condemning homosexuality.

Finally, reminding us to be gentle and compassionate with ourselves comes the Women's Retreat Book by Jennifer Louden (Harper San Francisco \$17). Whether retreat means simply taking a wonderful long bath, exploring your creativity through art classes, finding new spiritual direction through "imagining the divine" or going to a commercial center just to get away for a spell, this book will inspire you to take your own rejuvenation seriously.

oshi Reagon's always been a star on the rise, never quite reaching her apex. Hopefully Kindness, her new album out from Smithsonian Folkways, will bring her closer to mainstream acclaim. # THE HEALTHY TRAVELER

ff to Michigan this summer? Travel can wear down your immunity and leave you prone to disease. Be sure to protect yourself with a few easy-to-follow routines:

# TO BEAT JET LAG

Melatonin, the natural hormone that controls the body's clock, can help to reduce symptoms of jet lag and is readily available over the counter. Take it for two days prior to your departure and for two days after your arrival to help adjust the sleep cycle. Melatonin should be used only sparingly, as no one knows the side effects associated with long-term use of this hormone.

If you drink a glass of water every hour that you are in the air you can avoid all the symptoms of dehydration, such as dry mouth, light-headedness and constipation. Alcohol or caffeine worsen dehydration, so it's best to avoid these substances while flying.

You can get some exercise while on the plane by getting out of your seat and walking around at least once an hour. Qi Gong, a Chinese breathing and energy-moving exercise, can help tremendously. Visualize your muscles tensing and relaxing as you

draw breath into your lower abdomen. Some airlines offer in-the-seat aerobics on long flights. Take advantage of these programs when possible!

When you arrive, consider taking overthe-counter Chinese herbal pills called Curing Pills once a day for three days. These can help with jet lag as well as constipation. Again, you can take melatonin for two days after arrival; but do not use it for more than a total of four days.

If you have the time and money, get an acupuncture treatment soon after arrival. Ear acupuncture as well as body acupuncture can help to reharmonize your system quickly.

# **RELIEVING DIGESTIVE DISTRESS**

Changes in water, stress, time changes and bacterial infections all can contribute to digestive problems when you travel. Take Lactobacillus acidophilus before leaving home and continue taking it during the course of the trip. A standard dosage is one-fourth to one-half a teaspoon two to three times a day in a glass of unchilled water. Eating miso soup also can be very helpful.

If you get cramping or diarrhea, take some of the Curing Pills mentioned in the jet lag section. To help with nausea or

# GINGER TEA

Ginger tea is used for nausea or motion sickness when there is no burning sensation in the stomach or intestines. Get some fresh ginger at the grocery store (organic preferred). Cut two to three slices and place them in a cup of water. Boil for ten minutes. Drink this tea every few hours or after meals.

motion sickness, take some ginger pills, which can be found in health stores; or brew up some ginger tea (see sidebar).

If you are prone to bacterial infections, it may be wise to have your physician give you an antibiotic prescription before you leave. However, many women who have taken enough lactobacillus prior to leaving on a trip find that their immune systems are equipped to stave off infections naturally.

For motion sickness, press on the acupuncture point about two inches above your wrist crease on the inside of the arm.

# STAYING ABREAST

The Activist Cancer Patient — How to Take Charge of Your Treatment by cancer survivor Beverly Zakarian, hits right on the mark. Activist groups which fund annual hiking trips for cancer patients — in a misguided stab at empowerment — should instead be handing out this book for free at every meeting, rally, support group and workshop.

Zakarian's book, now one year old, addresses the importance of the cancer community organizing itself and lobbying the FDA and the government research apparatus the way ACT UP has done for the AIDS community. "On the basis of number of people affected alone, there should be at least ten times the number of drugs for cancer as AIDS. The number of drugs approved to treat HIV- and AIDS-related conditions in recent years is



about equal to that for cancer, a breathtaking statistic," Zakarian writes. She goes on to explain how the psycho-

logical barriers to change begin in the doctor's office, with the patient's overdependence on her physician. "If someone runs into a problem getting a treatment, it is rare [for her] to think that the system is wrong," she writes.

The book serves also as a guide written from a patient's perspective: on what's wrong with the medical system; how doctors are reluctant to aggressively diagnose at the earliest possible stage; and the reluctance among patients to organize and fight for the release of more drugs and meaningful research. Additionally, Zakarian breaks down the complex world of clinical trials to its most basic components.

After her 1985 diagnosis with ovarian cancer, Zakarian established CAN ACT, the country's first grassroots cancer patient organization. She spoke before Congress, the President's Cancer Panel and the FDA. Disillusioned with the rigors of politics, Zakarian now concentrates on writing articles about cancer treatment issues.

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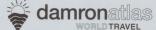


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# DREAM LOVER Lyn Denison

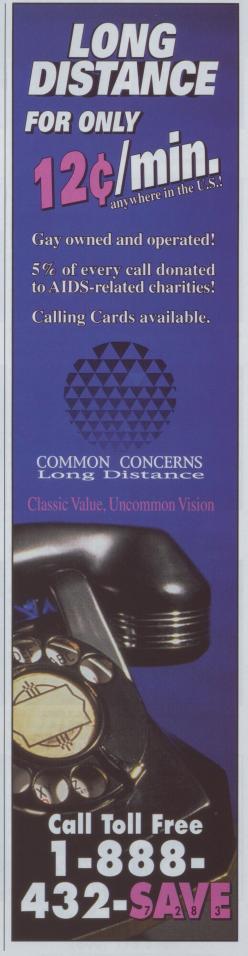

Sigh. Will it ever be possible for someone to organize a pro-woman event and not be goaded into making baldly anti-feminist statements? We dare you.





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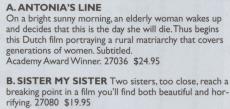












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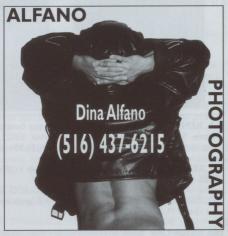
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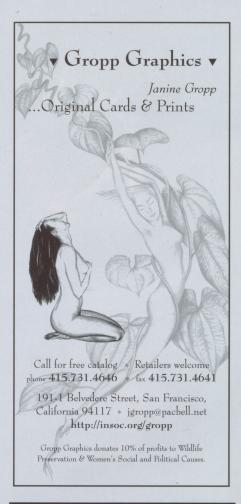
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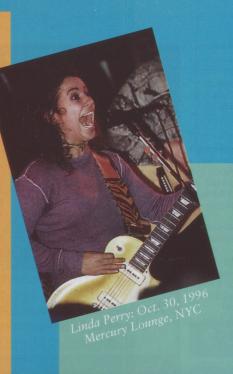
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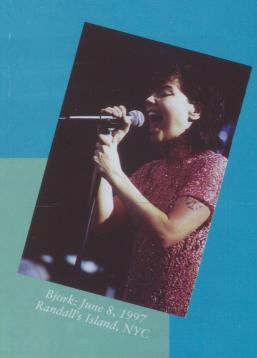
