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Gay to be Highly Visible at Democratic Convention

SAN FRANCISCO (IGNA)—"Everytime the major national press has come to San Francisco to cover the lesbian/gay community, they've done hit pieces on us! 'Sixty Minutes' filmed a segment that made Sister Boom Boom appear to be the major gay spokesperson, when he represents merely one viewpoint. The documentary, 'Gay Power, Gay Politics,' distorted the impact of our community on San Francisco.

"In 1980, we nominated a gay man to be vice president of the United States and no one even knows it happened!

"We know that a great many media people are coming to San Francisco in July to write the lesbian/gay story, and that some plan to do a hit piece on us! Those of us organizing the lesbian/gay march to the Democratic Convention plan to put forth the best leaders of our community, people of the calibre of Ginny Apuzzo, Gary Studds and James Baldwin, so that reporters who want to do a fair and honest job covering us will have the materials to work with. Even so, we know there will still be anti-gay hit pieces appearing in the media, because a lot of the press, frankly, doesn't like us!"

Paul Boneberg spends virtually his every waking moment these days trying to shape the impression of lesbians and gay men given by the thousands of media persons who will be descending on San Francisco in mid-July when the city plans host to the 1984 Democratic National Convention. Boneberg, president of the Stonewall Gay Democratic Club, one of three lesbian/gay Democratic clubs in the city, is one of a coalition of gay leaders trying to see that the march from the gay Castro District to the Moscone Convention Center, July 15, the day before the convention opens, surpasses the 100,000 lesbians and

gay men who marched in Washington, D.C., in October 1979.

Boneberg notes that while all three candidates for the Democratic presidential nomination have given some degree of support to lesbian/gay issues, Messrs. Mondale, Jackson and Hart are not even whispering the words "gay rights" in their campaign debates.

"We're not going to get lesbian/gay rights bills; we're not going to get changes in the immigration laws or adequate funding for AIDS research, until there is a discussion. The equal rights of millions of lesbian/gay people are not even included in the discussion being waged across America. The first thing is to get into the conversation. Then we have some possibility of getting some action on our agenda."

Near the top of that agenda is a solution to the AIDS health crisis, as reported cases of the epidemic top the 4,000 mark in the United States. San Francisco's openly gay supervior Harry Britt said the gay community has not received a fair share of help from Washington.

"We face the potential of many thousands of deaths in the next few years," noted Britt. "We want the federal government to pay its share of the cost" to eradi-

cate the disease and treat its victims.

Lesbian and gay leaders of the march stress that it is not primarily directed against the Democratic Party.

"The Democratic Party has really dealt with gay America and offered us the chance to participate and we're doing that," Harry Britt asserted. "It's sad that the Republicans are mostly controlled by straight, white men. That's not America!"

At least one gay San Franciscan is trying to put an especially positive tone to the reception given Democratic Party delegates and the media. Businessman Russ Alley is paying to put this message on a billboard across the street from the Hilton Hotel: "Best Wishes for a Successful Convention. (Signed) The Men and Women of San Francisco's Gay Community."

Calling his billboard a "glorified Christmas card," Alley explained that he was afraid that a march on the convention might be off-putting.

"People look at their TVs in the living room and think that's what gay people are all about. I don't feel it best represents me"

Howard Wallace is media co-chair of the lesbian/gay July 15 march to the Democratic Convention. He explained the march's leaders plan their own billboards, which he said would complement and not clash with Russ Alley's.

"Our signs will probably proclaim the theme of the march: 'We Come From Everywhere!'"

Wallace noted that the most important thing is for a serious message from lesbians and gays to reach the estimated half a billion people around the world who will catch some coverage of the Democrats' nominating meeting. Wallace said that the Alice Toklas Lesbian/Gay Democratic Club will publish special editions of their newspaper to brief delegates and reporters about lesbian/gay history and issues.

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More Gays Appear on Home Screen

SAN FRANCISCO (IGNA)—Gay viewers who tire of Wednesday "Dynasty" nights may soon have some wider viewing choices. Two major networks and a cable TV service have announced plans to air programs with significant gay content.

NBC has a pilot comedy show in the works, "All Together Now," in which Tom Byrd (formerly of the "Boone" series) plays the son who hops out of an All-American family closet.

Showtime has scheduled a six-people mini-series, "Brothers," where two older brothers must deal with a younger sibling's announcement that he's gay.
"Brothers" will air this summer.
Fans of ABC's "The Love Boat" will

find their favorite series sailing into gay waters next season. "The Love Boat" will air a program in which one of the three subplots will feature a gay couple. Actor Roy Thinnes will play an old college buddy of series character Doc who comes out to his old friend.

The new trend in upfront gay TV characters has been hailed by Chris Uszler of the Alliance for Gay Artists: "We're very pleased because they're getting away from treating gays and lesbians as an issue or a problem.

Uszler noted that "there are more of what we call 'happens-to-be-gay' charac-

French Discovered AIDS Virus a Year Ago

Scientists at the Pasteur Institute on Paris' Left Bank discovered the probable cause of AIDS more than a year ago, reports the Associated Press.

Because of modesty on the part of the French and the U.S. feeling that the French results, which were published last May in the American Journal of Science, were unexpected, preliminary and difficult to interpret, the find was kept quiet until the U.S. team discovered what is possibly the same AIDS-causing virus.

Dr. Luc Montagnier, one of three French scientists, said, "We've been talking for six months, but only now, and because our great American colleagues are saying the same thing, do people finally believe us.



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Gay Pastor Leaves Methodist Ministry

The Rev. Paul Abels, for 11 years the pastor of the Washington Square United Methodist Church in Greenwich Village in New York City, has retired from his ministry in anticipation of an upcoming move on the part of the UMC to forbid at its May general conference the appointment of homosexual clerics, reports the Religious News Service. Abels is the only openly homosexual minister in the UMC.

According to the New York Times, Abels, 46, has held "covenant services" for same-sex couples during his tenure at the Greenwich Village church, and has also provided space in the church for gay and lesbian groups.

Abels is retiring with full pension rights and plans to live in Albany, N.Y., where he will rehabilitate an old home and try to develope "a retreat center and conference

Abels also stated, "I feel a deep need to write, and what I want to say I couldn't say as pastor of this church.

Abels says his reasons for leaving are because of a "convergence of a number of forces. I am weary of the struggle-that combined with other personal needs.'

Rescuing Those Who've Gone Over the Edge

There are very few of us who do not enjoy a cocktail on occasion. They relax us after a hard day at the office, or after a particularly intense meeting, or during the more emotional periods of our lives.

And at one time or another, there are quite a few of us who have probably popped a tranquilizer when things get particularly rough or out of focus.

But for most of us, these occasions for alcohol or drugs pass over us like peaceful clouds and we get on with our lives. The drink is not necessary, nor is the tranqui-

For many, however, especially in the gay culture, the fine line between drinking and relaxing for pleasure becomes blurred. The latest statistics indicate that one out of three gay men and women are either alcoholics or drug addicts—or both. One out of three. Think about it.

Most of those who abuse alcohol in the gay culture are men and women who, for one reason or another, have found themselves living on the edge of a society which chooses to condemn them for not being a part of the mainstream of life. Too frequently, this condemnation becomes internalized, and unnecessary guilt feelings rise to the surface. Then the gay man or woman begins to condemn himself for being what he is-gay. If so many people think being gay is wrong, maybe it is, they reason. Consequently, it's something to be ashamed of, something to be hidden. Low self-esteem sets in, the need for an escape surfaces, and the desire for a drink becomes paramount. But drinking, in itself, is a heavy depressant, and so the road leads downward, spiraling to the end of the bottle, draining the last drop, then not finding the self-esteem sought after when all the booze is gone.

For the more fortunate gay men and women who are more comfortable with their lifestyles, drinking still rears its head, primarily because the main meeting places for gay men and women are the bars. And sometimes hanging around for Mr. or Miss Right can take quite a whilesometimes all night. And what do most people in the bars do until tht man or woman jumps off that white charger to carry them away? Going out for a drink or a couple of cocktails becomes going out for a six pack or half a fifth.

And because of the depressing nature of alcohol, after the euphoric state has passed (usually after three or four drinks), it's Depression City.

Then there's always the joint to be smoked out on the bar's patio. There's always the Mandrex to really relax the more tense or the disillusioned and help wipe away the night. Or there's MDA or LSD-or heroin-to make the night a technicolor experience.

One out of three gay men and women are either alcoholics or drug addicts or both.

Some people can drink all their lives and never become alcoholics. Some people can take downers and not become dependent on them.

For others, it's not that easy.

Some of you out there may be asking

Criminals Like Crime

why am I writing about this-knowing full well that I come from a long line of Southern bourbon-drinking boozers and have been seen too often blasted to the four winds. But I can get myself off the hook by quoting F. Scott Fitzgerald: "All writers are children, and 90 percent of them are

You won't buy that? I'm not sure I will, either.

Let me tell you a story.

On as recent Wednesday afternoon, a young man came into my office to relate his experiences. He was young-in his early 20s-and somewhat of an introvert. He was of small stature and appeared to be one of those people who are frightened by life—afraid to reach for any ring, much less catch hold of one.

In July of '81, the young man, I'll call him Randy, decided to openly admit his homosexuality and at the same time started drinking and smoking grass.

Why?
"I couldn't identify with anybody," he said, "gay or straight. I did the drugs and the alcohol to try to fit somewhere.

Locked in McAllen, Tex., two years ago, he decided to move to the big city, thinking that here he would finally find his niche. He did not. Randy went to work for a fast food establishment. Either the devil of fate had pushed him there or he had subconsciously sought it on his own, because "everyone at work was into drugs," he said, "including the management.

He told of parties before and after work-of booze and downers to put him to sleep at night-of speed to get him through his job during the day. He was fired four times because of his temper tantrums-but always asked to come back. Then at the end of October, he quit. "Things just got unbearable," he said,

noting that his intake of drugs and booze was increasing. "I couldn't see a way out anymore ... of starting my life over. And I didn't have anyone to turn to.

Because Randy's father had been an alcoholic, he was becoming scared for himself. He did not want to repeat the mistakes of his dad.

Through his reading of local publica-tions, Randy called a local gay alcholics anonymous group, who referred him to a counselor. After talking with her, he decided to investigate the a gay alcoholic recovery house

Randy was beginning to have suicidal feelings, but did admit to himself that he could not pull his life together alone.

"It just seemed like a dead end," he said of the time.

Randy showed up at the recovery house last November. After staying there for two months (the length of their program), he is now sober and off drugs and is attending college.

But at first, it wasn't easy.

'I was scared," he said, referring to feelings he had after his first interview. "But I couldn't see any other way of getting my life together.'

Randy was asked to dinner with the other men and women who were staying at the house, and he immediately began to withdraw and refused to communicate with anyone.

"I thought I was going to have to live with these people for 60 days," he said, not feeling comfortable with any of them.

But as it worked out, Randy discovered that his fears of not fitting in-of not being accepted-began to vanish.

"I could be myself and be accepted," he said of his experience. "It felt like being in a family for the first time. Unconditional love was something I had never experienced before. We all loved each other," he said still amazed, since everyone had come from different backgrounds.

Randy admitted that it was very diffi-

cult to break his partying routine, especially on weekends, and it was particularly rough for him when two of his roommates left the recovery house to return to their old habits.

'Dealing with that was real strange," he said.

But Randy said that after his first 30 days, "I started feeling happier about verything.'

He admitted by helping others, he was coming out of his shell.

'Things weren't as bad as I thought they were," he said.

I spoke with Harry Teten, one of the counselors at the recovery house, and he said that 58 percent of the people who walk through its doors resume successful, proluctive lives-free of drugs and booze.

He spoke of parties those who had recovered enjoy-free of "spirits" usually associated with those occasions-where everyone is on a natural high.

Then after our meeting, we ran into two people who had visited the recovery house for 60 days, and I was immediately taken aback by their good looks which radiated health and happiness-a rare sight in a world where red eyes and afternoon bags are all too common.

Teten himself admits he is a former alcoholic, and there's a tattered edge to his visage that betrays the years when he found himself downing in excess of a fifth of booze a day.

"But I want people to know that we do make it," he said, smiling. "In 1940, they didn't think homosexuals could sober up.

Apparently, while staying at the house, most of its residents do. And not only do they end their escapes through drugs and booze, they begin to accept themselves for what they are and become less concerned with what most of society would think of them. Upon leaving the home, "proud to be" takes on a special meaning for them.

Gay People Urged to 'Talk Back to the Media'

The Media Fund for Human Rights has announced a major, nationwide campaign to make gay people more critical of the media. The campaign was launched with an exhibit during the November convention of the National Association of Business Councils in Los Angeles. Convention-goers were invited to view a video tape of the media coverage of many gay issues and to respond to a questionnaire. The tape is available for viewing by gay groups around the country

The Media Fund for Human Rights is a tax-exempt charitable and educational organization, founded by the Gay Press Association, the international association

of gay media professionals.

"Local groups have been doing incredibly successful consciousness-raising among media officials in their communities," according to Mike Rutherford, executive director of the Media Fund. "Now the time has come for us to be sending our version of breaking news stories directly into the electronic news systems of the country-and do it on a national level."

It's a task, he says, which will take fulltime professionals, lots of money, and cooperation among gay groups nationwide.

'If we could just match the technical


facilities of the Moral Majority, we could begin to counter some of the 'media fagbashing' which is going on," said Morgan Pinney, CPA, who is chief executive officer for the project.

The heart of the operation of the Media Fund is the computerized electronic network, established more than a year ago by the Gay Press Association and now operated by the Media Fund. The system is now accessible by any group in the country, using any of the popular home computers connected over regular telephone lines to the "host" computer in New York. Any group can leave messages for any other group or disseminate press releases to all groups. Members of special subgroups, such as gay lawyers or gay journalists, will comunicate within their special sections of the system.

"All of this will result in a better and more rapidly informed gay community, and everyone will be in touch with the Media Fund as we send news and analysis directly into the electronic news systems of the country," according to Pinney.

Helping a Friend Through a Crisis:

Judie Smith, program director of the Dallas Suicide and Crisis Center and nationally-recognized authority on teenage suicides, will present the monthly program at the May 14th general meeting of the Dallas Gay Alliance, according to Bill Nelson, director.

Mrs. Smith, who has appeared before Congress and in national media regarding the Plano teenage suicides, will speak on "The Anatomy of a Crisis: How to Recognize It and How to Help.

Mrs. Smith says it is important that support systems within the gay community be developed to spot gays in crisis and prevent needless deaths. "None of us is immune from a crisis," Mrs. Smith said.

"A crisis is a feeling response to an event, situation or belief and it is through these feelings that we can communicate with each other. It doesn't require anyone to be a mental health professional to help someone in crisis. By better understanding what a crisis is, we are then able to better understand ourselves, and the benefit of that is that we then can help someone else when they are in crisis, Mrs. Smith said.

The Dallas Suicide and Crisis Center maintains a 24-hour hotline for callers at 828-1000, and is involved in the training of Gayline volunteers.

Three SF Bathhouses Close as Public Health Director Prepares 'No-Sex' Rules

SAN FRANCISCO (IGNA)—The bottom appears to have dropped out of this city's once booming gay bathhouse business on the eve of release of the rough draft of Public Health Director Mervyn Silverman's no-sex rules.

Two gay sex spas, Liberty Baths and Catacombs, have already closed their doors, while Sutro Baths, San Francisco's only bisexual club, will hold its final "safe sex" fling on June 2.

Sutro Baths' owner Bill Jones said he thought he might take the supply of surplus condoms from his club and hand them out in the bushes at cruisy Buena Vista Park to point out one safe-sex role that the shuttered bathhouses will no longer be performing.

Sal Accardi, the elected spokesperson of Northern California Bathhouse Owners Association, suggested dropping a ton of unused condoms on the steps of City Hall.

Accardi charged Health Director Silverman with discarding the safe-sex program the bathhouse owners have pledged to fol-

Meanwhile seven Northern California bathhouses, belonging to Accardi's association, took out a full-page ad in San Francisco's gay bi-weekly The Sentinel. The ad, containing a half-price admission coupon, bristles with strong language, asserting among other things that "the right of gay citizens to freely associate in gay clubs...is guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution.

The ad charges bathhouse opponents with having the "private political goal of eliminating first the gay baths, then the bars, then all gay businesses and organizations, and possibly the jobs of every gay person.

While the ad's language pledges the bathhouse owners to resist further attacks on their businesses by the ci some of the owners concede that Dr. Silverman's strategy of banning sex at the baths without shutting them down has taken much of the legal wind out of the sails of any possible lawsuit.

Observers of the San Francisco bathhouse scene speculate that a lawsuit might still come if the no-sex rules to be handed down May 7 call from removal of the doors on the popular private cubicles that many owners consider the heart and soul of their business.

San Francisco City Attorney George Agnost said that the new bathhouse rules

ordered by Silverman have been drafted by "AIDS experts."

Law Wilson, a gay man who works as an attorney for the San Francisco Police Department, said that the city's police chief could impose the new rules after a public hearing. Wilson asserted that the new rules would require physical changes in the sex spas, including "no cubicles for sex, more lighting (and the rules would) be explicit in forbidding sexual activity.

Dealing with the Car Dealer

In a previous column, we began our series on buying a new car, and we suggested that you do your homework before you go to a dealer. We began by suggesting that you investigate your own needs, first. That's most important, since the salesman you talk to will undoubtedly try to play on your views of his car and your need for the kind of status owning it will

We also told you that the sticker price on any automobile was totally negotiable, reminding you that any dollar figure posted is only "suggested" list price. Consumer Reports publishes a book that lists actual costs to the dealers themselves, so you can know not only what the car should cost, but if the deal you want to make is a fair one.

Before you talk with the salesman, you'll also have checked out interest rates for car loans, the cost of insuring the modelsyou're that interested in buying, and the book value of any trade-in you intended to make on your purchase.

That's a lot of information to be carrying around in your head, so don't be too shy to write it all down and bring your notebook with you to the showroom. It may seem klutzy to you, but it tells the salesperson that you're serious, and you know what you're doing.

Now, let's say that you've fallen in love with the Toklas convertible with fourspeed manual transmission and vinyl interior. You've checked out its trouble report in Consumer Reports, and you've found that the only thing that has given other owners of the car trouble is the automatic transmission. You've checked out "Blue Book" value on your trade-in, a 1979 Wilde two-door, and it's listed for \$1200 wholesale in good condition. Since your old car is clean and undented, you feel that it's in top shape. Consumer Reports also states that the car you want costs the dealer \$9500, and you know that you can get a loan from your credit union at 13 percent.

You have the background you need. Now you can face the challenge of dealing with the dealer.

Your first shock will probably come at the showroom when you encounter the sticker price. Your Toklas convertible lists at \$12,500, but there are some additions, as well. There's an item called "dealer prep" that raises the cost another \$1500. There are side moldings, racing mirrors, pinstripes and air-conditioning to the tune of another \$900. The car you've been dreaming about will cost you \$14,900. Or at least, so it appears.

Take it one step at a time. Ask the salesman what "dealer prep" involves. There are some legitimate expenses for a dealer included here, such as cleaning the car after its trip to your city and waxing it to the sheen that makes it so pretty. But we all know that cost cannot be more than

about \$80. The dealer has probably also added undercoating, a protective shield against the corrosive effects of road salt and water to the exposed metal that you can't see and a protective finish for the paint job. Both of these may or may not be worth the price being asked. Find out if there is any guarantee offered with either device; will the dealer replace any rusted underparts within a year? How long can you expect your paint to remain shiny and unblem-

If there is a guarantee, fine. You can haggle on the total price. If there is none, ask the salesman whether he offers less expensive undercoating, and tell him you'll have paint protection done yourself. Reputable autofinishers will do the job for you for about \$400-\$500, with a three-year warranty on the results.

The accessories are another matter. Do you really need air-conditioning at all, especially on a convertible? If you want it, that's okay. If not, check the sticker to see how much that option costs and subtract it from the list price you're working with. Do

the same with any other options you don't

By this time, you should have a good idea of what your specific dream car should cost. Ask the salesperson if there are any rebates being offered on this model or if the dealer offers any special loan rates for buying it. Now, figure out what his deal is. Let's say you've reduced the dealer prep charges to \$500 and that you've taken off \$500 for the unwanted air-conditioning. Your car now lists at

There's no rebate being offered, but the dealer will give you financing at 9.9 percent over three years if you pay the tax and license fees and put 20 percent of the purchase price as a down payment. That would be \$2780 with no further haggling, but you still have your old car for a tradein. It's time to see what offer he will make you on it.

Surprisingly, if your car is in good shape, you may be offered more than its wholesale book value. That's the car dealer's way of keeping up his profit on his sale to you, since he knows that if he can stick with his list price, he makes money, and he'll also make a little selling your old chariot on his lot. Let's say he offers you \$1500 for your car.

That still leaves you with \$1280 plus tax and license to come up with for a down payment, though. It's time for you to counter with your deal. Since you know the basic car cost him \$9500, and the cost of your desired accessories are \$400 plus \$500 dealer prep, you can figure pretty well. The accessory and prep figures include his profit, so adding 10 percent to the base price, you can offer him \$11,350 for his car and ask that he take your trade-in as full down payment. Undoubtedly, this won't be a deal, but you've established a fair position from which you can bargain. Your figure, as you tell the salesperson, allows him a 10 percent basic profit, plus his added accessories.

The amount of horse-trading you'll have to do depends on several factors. If it's late in the model year, he may be anxious to sell. If his car is not one of the big sellers, he'll also trade more readily. If the model you want is not a fast-moving item in his part of the country, you'll also find it eas-

One thing, though. Once you've settled on a deal, make sure it's approved by an executive, at least the sales manager. Salespeople in car dealerships love to bait prospective customers into dreaming that they nearly own a car, then report that the deal has not been approved and that the price has to be higher. They know that the buyer is so anxious at that point he will often go ahead with a less attractive deal, just to get his new car.

Buying a car is just like buying anything else; you have to know what you're doing. Inform yourself and be prepared to do some on-your-feet figuring. You'll only go through this experience a few times in your life, and the people on the other side of the deal handle these transactions every day. It's up to you to even the odds for a happy purchase.

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
Love That Gloom and Doom

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Historical Virgin Islands Offer Laid-Back Escape for Lovers ... and Others

On a clear night when the waters of the Atlantic Ocean meet the deep blue of the Caribbean Sea, in that tranquil spot, visitors to one of the three Virgin Islands—after imbibing in one of the islands' famous rum punches—might spy the moonlit ghost ship of Captian Kidd or Blackbeard flowing gracefully over the waves, for anything is possible in this romantic paradise which conjures dreams of buccaneers and invites lovers to stroll along its sandy beaches or become lost on the steep slopes in its lush, tropical foliage.

St. Thomas, St. Croix and St. John are the three major islands which belong to the group, and each has a uniqueness yet shares a historical past which lends an aire of exotic tranquility to these islands of sun, fun and escape from the ordinary drum of contemporary life found in most of America's larger cities.

Originally peopled by the war-like Caribe Indians, in the late 1700s, pirates chose the spot to set up personal kingdoms and to prey on the luxury ships of Spain, France and England which were robbing the new world of its riches. And not only have the islands been ruled by those three historial exploiters, but by Malta, Holland and Denmark, as well.

Denmark, their most recent ruler prior to the United States who acquired the islands in 1917 for \$25 million to keep them out of the hands of Germany, has left the most notable affects on the island, especially on St. Thomas

especially on St. Thomas.

Islanders still cling to their Danish heritage and drive on the left side of the street. Since the roads are narrow, steep and busy, I suggest you go by taxis, which are cheap and plentiful, even if many of the drivers could stand a crash course in Dale Carnegie.

Charlotte Amalie, population 40,000, is the capital city and the only city on St. Thomas named after a former queen of Denmark. The streets are narrow and colorful, with intriguing Danish names, such as Dronningens Gade, Vimmelskafts Gade or Creques Alley. The charming


gens Gade attracts mostly natives.

What I did find were good bargains, because these are duty-free ports, and you can buy booze, cigarettes, jewelry, perfume, cameras, watches and other items for about half what you pay in the States. and you can take five bottles back with



By the way I screech into the gas station, fall out of my car, and lunge for the gas pump while raking a brush through my hair, it is apparent that I am in a hurry. The attendant saunters over, chewing on his first toothpick of the day and hitching up his pants as he watches me clattering around bumping into the gay pump and tripping over my rear tire.
"You're late for work," he notes cheer-

fully.
"Yeah, no kidding," I mutter. He is chuckling. I see no cause for mirth. "Looks like you'll just have to sit on the boss' lap this morning," he suggests help-

Now it's my turn to laugh. "My boss is a woman.

"Oh!" he says. "Now, Jerry Falwell wouldn't approve of that!"

'Well, I don't approve of Jerry Falwell." "You know something, lady? Neither do

My Toyota is sick again. She's good, but old. Very old. Luckily for us, we have a sweetheart of a mechanic who's been performing moderately priced miracle cures on her for the last couple of years. Next to the typewriter repairman, it's Rick that keeps me in business. Grateful for his skills, I've always cultivated his goodwill. This hasn't been difficult; Rick is a real nice guy.

We're standing shoulder to sweaty shoulder. Rick and I, on a hot California day, peering into the mysterious depths of my poor old baby's engine. While Rick pokes around, we're making idle conversa-

"So how come you moved to Califor-

nia?" he asks, and at this innocent question my stomach turns over. It's a deal I've made with myself at this stage in my lesbian identity: I don't have to tell everyone I'm gay, but I won't ever out-and-out lie to maintain the presumption of heterosexuality. And the one and only reason I moved to California was to be around more lesbians.

Rick jiggles a dipstick unawares while I grapple with my own homophobia. It's a frightening enough feeling without bringing my car into it. I mean, this car is old. And Rick knows his stuff and is not greedy. I need his continued goodwill. As nice as he's always been to me, one just never knows how a man is going to react to

lesbianism.
"Well, I, uh..." I start out bravely, then stop for a lengthy pause to clear my throat. Drops of sweat splash on the engine, and the heat has nothing to do with it. Oh well, I think, who needs transportation when you've got your principles? Bus passes are cheap, and besides, the people are so inter-

'I moved here just after I came out of the closet. I figured California was a pretty good place to be a lesbian.

Rick looks up, holding the top to my air filter in one hand, with a smile on his face. Oh, boy, I'll bet you're right about that. Good move."

He replaces the air filter top, wipes his hands on a rag, and tells me it's nothing major; she'll be ready in an hour.

I saw her at the gas station and was instantly attracted: long slim legs in tight dark jeans, rumply spikey somewhat punky hair, a haircut that said, "Oh, yeah," "Sez who," and "Prove it," Straight back and proud shoulders, and over all this, a leather jacket. Getting out of a beat-up Mustang, well, she caught my

I watched her all the way to the cashier to pay the money, then got my heart broken when she started back: my she was a he. Well, there goes the neighborhod, not to mention the attraction.

I don't care what anybody says, you can take all the elements I like-that bit of hood, the pride, the adultness-lay them all on a man, and they just don't come out the same. That's a lesbian for you.

"You a writer?" asks the guy from the gas station on the corner.

'Yep," I say.

We chit chat. He tells me he's working part-time now as a bartender and that he got into it because his friend broke his shoulder and needed somebody to fill in.

"Bartending can get to be a pretty depressing job, can't it?" I ask.

"Yeah, if you listen to everybody's problems. But I work in a gay bar, so it's okay.

This is the first time I've ever heard anybody refer to gay bars as less depressing. This guy must be straight. He's a handsome, bearded, muscular type, but they're straight-looking muscles, not gaylooking muscles.

I say, "Oh, great, what's the name of the place? I'll have to come in sometime."

He tells me, and we chat bars; where do you go, and where do you go? He knows the names of the lesbian bars. I'm impressed; a lot of gay men don't know the lesbian bars, to say nothing of straight men.

I tell him about how I took the apartment I live in because the manager of the building had told me, "We've got all kinds of people here: black, white, red, yellow, gay and straight." We laugh, and then fall silent for a few minutes.

Quietly he says, "Everyone's gay in his own way.


Dear Fans, Amanda looked out those windows and expected to see the Second Coming. All she saw was a jet trail.

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

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


