## Fagbashers stab, kill man

John Sholl would have been 36 on Sunday, December 27. But on Saturday the 26th, walking down the first block of Throckmorton just off Maple with a new friend he had met earlier that night, Sholl was fatally stabbed by one of a group of three Latin American youths in their mid-twenties.

An eyewitness told Metro Times that he was walking down the same street but on the opposite side when he saw the assailants pass Sholl and his companion going in the opposite direction. As they passed, Sholl's companion noticed one of them appear to punch the victim in the stomach. The three ran to Maple, but when Sholl fell to his knees, then to the ground, they ran back, shouting something about "getting the faggot". Two of them struggled with Sholl's companion, who had run to a house with lights on seeking help, and the third snatched the victim's wallet, at which time the trio fled to their white Monte Carlo, which was parked at Throckmorton and Fairmont.

Ironically, the occupants of the house to which Sholl's companion had fled for aid turned off their lights and refused to respond to his knocking on the door.

Sholl died at Parkland Memorial Hospital at 4:15 A.M., after having been stabbed about 12:30 - just past midnight on the day before his birthday.

The eyewitness, who had gone to a nearby bar to escape the cold, gave his story to the police at the scene. According to the eyewitness' account to Metro Times, he advised officers that an automobile which circled the block repeatedly after arrival of the ambulance appeared similar to that driven by the assailants. The official police report shows that such a car was located, but the official investigator, Linda Fulgham (who went on vacation the day after the killing), denied that it was the same auto. Ms. Fulgham declined to provide any additional information to the Metro Times, protested that the information provided by the police already was excessive, and questioned the validity of the story given Metro Times by the eyewitness.

One of the assailants was described as being in his 20's, about 140 pounds, 5 feet 8 inches tall, with long black hair and brown eyes, wearing a light blue terrycloth pullover and jeans. A second member of the trio was described as being Indian in appearance, with a large nose. The automobile, a white Monte Carlo 2-door, had a red interior.

Sholl was apparently better known by the name of "Richard", the name he had given the young man who was with him at the time of the attack.

## Dallasite survives attempted murder

Peter McClendon's Christmas took place in Parkland Hospital. McClendon, a Hidden Door employee, was recovering from brain surgery following an attempt on his life December 17.

The near-tragic series of events began when McClendon's fellow employee Delbert Groves, a well-liked and respected member of the community, stopped at a local drinking establishment as he was returning from the airport, where he had dropped off a friend.

A young man in his mid 20's caught Groves' attention, and in the course of the conversation which followed, Groves offered to show the attractive youth several of the local bars he had never visited.

Stopping by McClendon's home, Groves picked him up and brought him along for the impromptu tour of the town, which began around 11 A.M. and ended shortly after 4 P.M., when McClendon asked to be dropped off to take a nap. He invited his two companions to come in and take a nap. While Groves declined, "David" (as he had identified himself) took the offer.

The next day, a realtor who had negotiated the recent sale of McClendon's house came by to see why he had not kept an appointment that day. When nobody answered the door, he left a note asking McClendon to call.

On Saturday, the realtor, who had not heard from McClendon, returned to the house to find the note still untouched. Concerned, he went to the Hidden Door, where Groves was going off duty, and, in the company of another friend, returned to the house, where they were able to catch sight of blood and overturned furniture through windows.

Police called to the scene would not break in, but agreed to permit the three do so and to note

for the record that there seemed to be justification for such an action. One of the three went in through a window and opened the door. McClendon was discovered lying on the floor, unconscious and bloody.

The 33-year-old McClendon was rushed to the hospital, where he was given poor chances to recover from wounds inflicted above the temple by a claw of a hammer. Although doctors expressed little hope, the victim showed steady improvement and became increasingly coherent and, within a week, was able to walk the length of the hospital corridor unaided.

According to the victim, the head wound alone was inflicted by "David", cuts and bruises on his legs having resulted from a number of falls when he tried to get up and clean himself after he initially regained consciousness.

To the surprise of doctors attending him, McClendon was able to return home the second Monday following the attack, where one of the friends who have stayed in close contact and have faithfully supported him since he was first hospitalized presently is staying with him during his period of convalescence.

McClendon's 1977 Cadillac, which he had only recently purchased, was intercepted by Fort Worth Police and the driver was sent to Austin, where a warrant had been issued in connection with a homicide in that area. Local police told the Metro Times that Austin is providing photographs of the suspect to enable McClendon to identify his assailant, who may be charged with attempted homicide. McClendon told the Metro Times that "David" quite obviously felt he had killed him and that this seemed to be his intention.

Both Groves and McClendon

agreed that the suspect, whom they described as an attractive young man in his mid twenties, with reddish blonde hair and a neatly trimmed beard and mustache, gave no indication during the five hours they spent with him that he was not a normal gay male who would have seemed at home in any bar in the area.

Fellow Citizens of Oaklawn:

This is an open letter concerning the improper construction and over-development of our community. If the developers continue to rebuild in this uncontrolled manner, the replacement or construction will eventually destroy the heart of our community, the residents.

This development, if carried out without community control, will eventually displace thousands of families and residents of Oaklawn. The present nature of growth will prevent the relocation or residence in our community by us in the near future.

This effect will in turn destroy the foundation of two major minority movements (the gay rights and the Mexican-American political fronts) of which our community is the home. The destruction of our neighborhood could destroy the political cohesiveness and unity of these movements and their gains overnight.

If left up to the City Hall Zoning Board or the landowners, this issue will not be properly

solved to the advantage of the vast majority of our community's residents.

If continued improperly, the impact will be catastrophic to the whole city of Dallas. As we are displaced from our homes, the most balanced of communities in our city will be destroyed for a small group's short term gain.

What to do: Attend the meeting of the Zoning Board on January 8, 1982, call for more information at 670-4118, or just call to complain. Circulate a petition on your block or in your complex. For more details, call B. D. Jewell (522-2015). Remember, this is your community; only we can save it. Endorse a community-backed zoning plan.






