## THE NEWS IN BRIEF

## Supreme Court nixes Longstaff appeal

In keeping with a long record of refusing to hear any gay-related appeal cases, the U.S. Supreme Court officially announced May 29 that it would not review the decision of the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans, in which Richard Longstaff was denied the right to citizenship.

The court's decision not to hear an appeal signals the end of an eight year struggle by the Dallas resident to become an American citizen. Leonard Graff of National Gay Rights Advocates, the public interest firm which represented Longstaff, pointed out that the Supreme Court is refusing to face reality, since the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco has deemed it legal for gay men and lesbians to enter the country, while the 5th Circuit Court in New Orleans denies them citizenship.

Jean O'Leary, also of NGRA, pointed out that the government may now commence legal efforts to have Longstaff deported but, should such efforts be made, 'We intend to keep fighting this issue. There is no rational reason for excluding lesbians and gay men from American citizenship.'

A British citizen, Longstaff moved to Texas in 1965, where he worked for some time for Braniff before opening his two popular Union Jack clothing stores in Houston and on Dallas' famous Cedar Springs Strip, a location he has occupied for about ten years.

Longstaff is well known and respected among leaders of the community who is always willing to do his share and work with community organizations toward a better community, both with time and dollars.

Longstaff was originally determined unfit for citizenship due to the fact that he was gay and therefore lacked good moral character; then later charged with not advising immigration authorities of his "psychopathic personality."

## Lovers to be separated

Richard Adams and Tony Sullivan first met in Los Angeles while Tony was visiting and fell in love. In April of 1972, Tony left his native Australia to be

with Richard. Then, in 1975, the two obtained a marriage license lawfully issued in Boulder, Colorado, and petitioned the Immigration and Naturalization Authorities to grant Tony resident alien status (as is done for heterosexual couples).

Thwarting their plans, the Colorado Attorney General ruled the marriage invalid, and INS officials agreed, in writing: "You have failed to establish that a bona fide marital relationship can exist between two faggots." Finally, the Board of Immigration Appeals ruled that Tony is indeed deportable and that "we do not find that the respondent's separation from his 'life partner' will cause him hardship, emotional or otherwise...."

The matter has been appealed to the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals, and an answer is expected in several months. If that answer is negative, hope becomes thin since, should the two attempt to go to Australia together, it seems likely that Richard would become the subject of the same treatment. For Richard and Tony, there is only time to wait and hope.

## AAA on the firing line

National Gay Rights Advocates have taken on the case of Steve Jacobs and John LaBedda against AAA Motor Club of Maryland. The two men had complained to the Howard County Office of Human Rights because they were refused the spousal discount, despite the fact that their relationship has lasted ten years, while newlyweds of a week or less can have the same benefits.

## Olympia (WA) mayor bans anti-gay discrimination

The mayor of Olympia, Washington, Charles Royer, has issued an executive order prohibiting discrimination against gays in the provision of basic city services, reports *Seattle Gay News*. The order came following a report that city firefighters had refused to help two gay men for fear of being exposed to AIDS.

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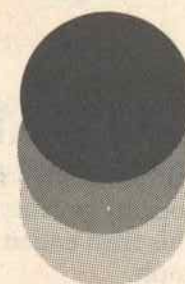
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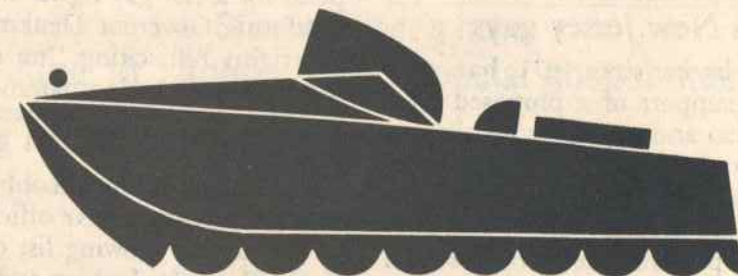
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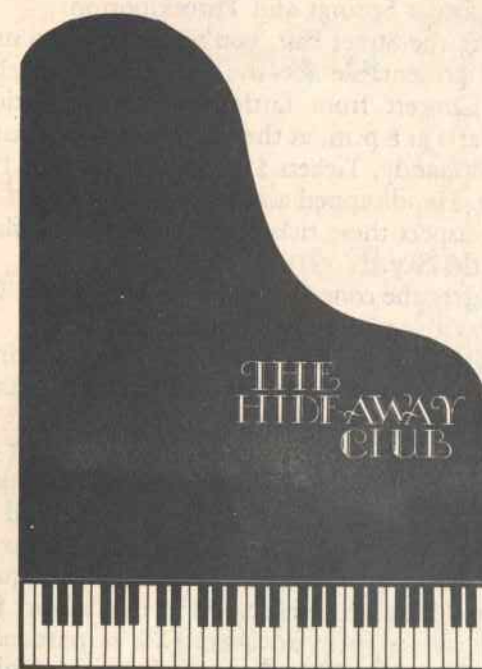

### NOW backs New Jersey gays

NOW, a gay rights backer since 1971, has come out hard and fast in support of a proposed New Jersey bill to pass lesbian and gay rights legislation.

Commented national NOW president Judy Goldsmith: "Every day twenty million Americans live with the harsh reality that they could lose their jobs regardless of job performance if their sexual orientation becomes known. They could be denied a professional license critical to their economic survival or well being. They could be denied the educational opportunities that would provide a basis for future employment. They could be denied housing, insurance, credit, even seating in restaurants or theaters."

More specifically, a New Jersey survey found that more than 20% of those responding had lost a job because of their sexual orientation; nearly 6% had been denied housing, and close to 40% had been harassed in a motel, restaurant or other public place.

### Gays lose mayor, gain rights bill

Laguna Beach, California, which until recently had one of only four openly gay mayors in this country, lost its mayor as his term ended; but it was on a note of distinct triumph.

On the night that Robert Gentry stepped down and resumed his seat on the city council, his proposal for a city gay rights ordinance—offered after California Governor Deukmejian vetoed the state gay rights bill, citing "no need"—was passed by the governing body unanimously.

### National March gains supporters

Gay Rights National Lobby and National Organization for Women have officially added their names to the rapidly growing list of endorsers of the National March for Lesbian and Gay Rights, scheduled for this year's Democratic National Convention, where they will compete with the likes of Jerry Falwell and Phyllis Schlafly for the ears and credibility of the delegates who will be in San Francisco to make the final decision who will be the Democratic candidate for President and what the party's official stance will be on various topics.

Although the Dallas Gay Alliance has not yet endorsed the March, a spokesperson told *Metro Times* that this was more from a lack of time than any other reason and that the matter should be considered soon.

Afterwards, if you need a drink, Tavern Guild member bars will be offering free drinks for your armband from the march at 10 p.m.

**FRIDAY, JUNE 29:** The DGA camps it up in their film series with the classic *Some Like It Hot* (now, wasn't that the one with Tony Curtis and Jack Lemmon in drag?). Tickets \$4, shows 8 and 10 p.m., at the Gay Community Center.

Meanwhile, those who missed it earlier can catch—and, we dare predict, enjoy immensely—the Turtle Creek Chorale's concert at 8:15 p.m., Bob Hope Auditorium, SMU Campus, \$7 tickets, don't be late!

**SATURDAY, JUNE 30:** Sports fans, now hear this—it's definitely your day, as the 1984 Challenge Cup Series, sponsored by the Oak Lawn Tennis Association, meets with Houston's best (give Houston a chance to go up against some good stuff once in a while, don't you know?). Be at Kiest Park at 9 a.m.

energy to plate glass windows are manufactured here now.

The second largest city in Pennsylvania has a population of approximately 425,000 people, but the greater metropolitan area includes over two-and-one-half million inhabitants. It was founded in 1758 by a young army major named George Washington, and named Fort Pitt in honor of the famous English prime minister.

Some of America's foremost industrialists, Andrew Carnegie, Henry Ford Frick and Thomas

Mellen settled here in the last century. It was the latter's descendant, Richard King Mellon, who was one of the key contributors to Pittsburgh's revival—so much, in fact, that some local wags dubbed it "the Mellon Patch." The American Federation of Labor (AFL) was first started here in 1881. The *Post-Gazette* was the first newspaper established west of the Allegheny Mountains. A very worthy successor in today's world is *Out*, one of the finest gay publications in the U.S.A.

Pittsburgh has the hottest bar scene in the TriState area of western Pennsylvania, eastern Ohio and northern West Virginia. The bars are open Monday through Saturday until 2:00 a.m., but private clubs are open much later and on Sundays... but you must be a member. Some restaurants serving food also remain open Sundays. The city's two private clubs are Norreh at 1226 Herron Avenue and the Travelers Club at 6525 Hamilton in East Liberty. Norreh has an upstairs bar for women, basement cell for leathermen and everyone else on the main floor. The Travelers follows more of a disco format.

Zacks at 334 Fourth Avenue is a new disco, jam packed on weekends, with den and game room downstairs, while Players at 430 E. Eighth Avenue in Homestead is the in spot for younger women. Pegasus is another ever popular downtown disco at 818 Liberty Avenue. The Crossover at 1241 Western Avenue, on the north side of West End Bridge, is the best levi and leather cruise bar for hundreds of

miles around, but should be facing stiff competition from the new Pittsburgh Trucking Company at 730 River Avenue. The Holiday at 4620 Forbes Avenue, in Oakland, is Pittsburgh's oldest gay bar, but attracts some of its youngest and best looking preppie levi and western gays. Other spots include Shawn's and the Tender Trap.

Pittsburgh has three baths, the Arena, Club Pittsburgh and Schumes. For books try the Book Stall at 3604 Fifth Avenue in Oakland, and for cruisy areas pick up a copy of the new '85 *Bob Damron Address Book*. The new gay Beaux Arts Ball is held annually in May, this year at the William Penn Hotel, which may never be the same again. Besides costumes, fun and all night parties, it also serves a good cause. Two other big parties are held on Memorial Day and Labor Day. Sponsored by the Pittsburgh Tavern Guild, they attract thousands of gay men and lesbians. The proceeds benefit the Lambda Foundation, a sort of gay United Way.

I like to stay at the Pittsburgh Hilton at Gateway Center, which is centrally located above the confluence of the three rivers. The Sheraton, Hyatt at Chatham Center, and newly remodelled William Penn are all good hotels, too. The top gay dinner house is Jackson's, at 1241 Penn Avenue, but some women visit Wildsisters at 27th and Jane. For casual, mostly straight dining try the Grand Concourse and other new restaurants in Station Square, Del's, Figgin's, or C. J. Barney's for marvellous

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As you drive into Pittsburgh from the airport, you travel through rolling hillsides and the Fort Pitt Tunnel. . . then pow! Point State Park and the soaring skyscrapers of the Golden Triangle hit with an unexpected impact. You should visit the University of Pittsburgh, with its unique 42-story gothic Cathedral of Learning, the old Pittsburgh and Lake Erie Railroad Station, which is now an entertainment complex called Station Square. Carnegie Institute, Phipps Conservatory, Allegheny Observatory, and Heinz Hall, home of Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra. The new PPG Place is a must for architectural inventiveness. For a thrilling view of the city, take the Duquesne Incline Railway to the top of Mt. Washington, and if you're a Steeler or Pirate fan, try to catch a game at Three Rivers

## A Memoriam

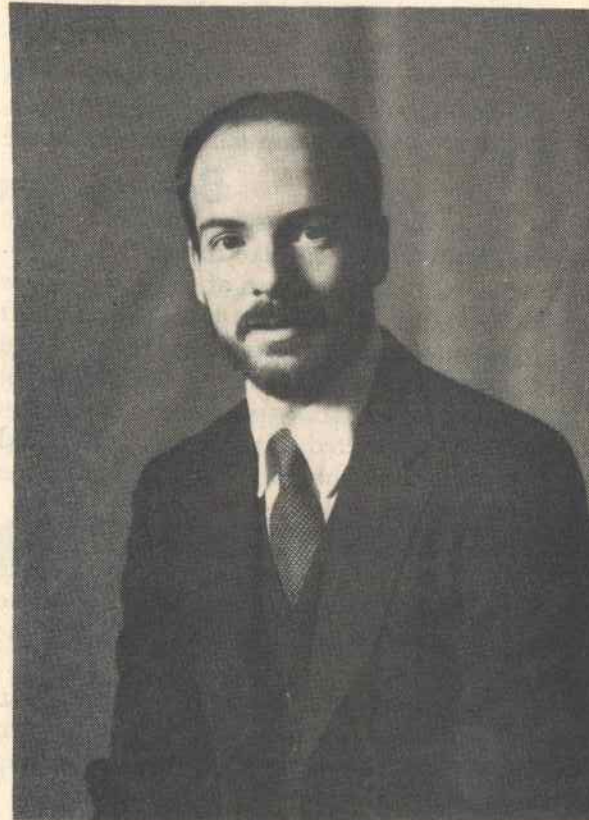
A memorial fund for singer/entertainer Joel K. West has been established to assist various community agencies.

Joel West died May 12, 1984, following a brief illness coupled with severe occupational stress.

A computer programmer, the 34-year-old West was also a musician who graduated Magna Cum Laude from North Texas State University in 1974 with a degree in music. He performed in dinner theatres across the United States for a number of years before returning to Dallas, where he became an ensemble member in Casa Manana productions of *South Pacific*, *Mame* and *Macabaret*. With the Dallas Summer Musicals, West also appeared in *Man of La Mancha*, *Gigi*, and *No, No, Nanette*. For the past five years he was a soloist with the Unity Way Church of Dallas.

A memorial service was held at First Community Church in Dallas on May 17, with a musical tribute provided by the Turtle Creek Chorale, members of the Dallas Bach Society, and choir members of the St. Thomas Aquinas Roman Catholic Church. Paul Riedo served as organist. Piano accompaniment was provided by Dallas jazz performer Jim Abbott, who had acted earlier as Mr. West's regular accompanist.

West willed his body to the Living Bank and Southwestern Medical School to aid the sick and for medical research.



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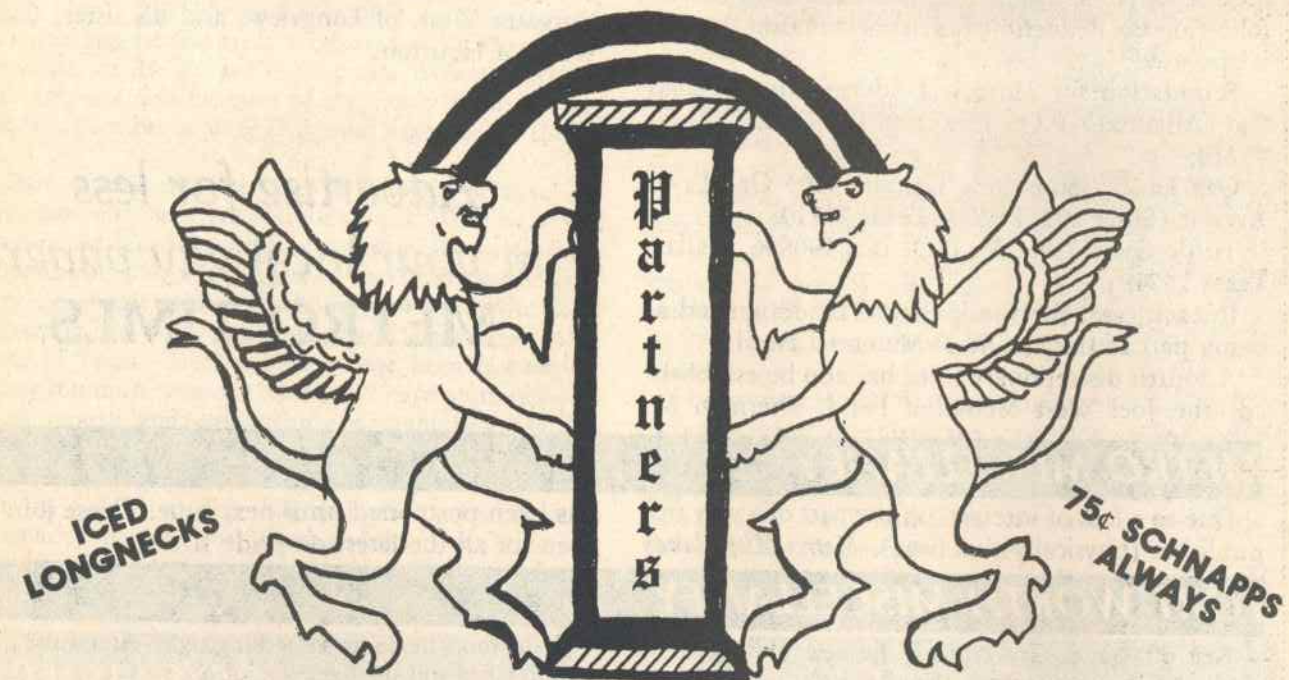

Now, she did give us this material by a capable but publicity shy writer which we felt fit right in with Gay Pride Week, so look at the schedule in the ad we donated for times and places, and read on about Sharon Huber.

Sharon Huber's community involvement goes back a

long way, since she moved to Fort Worth from Saint Louis. Her active involvement with the gay community organizations began three years ago with the Center for the Community (hospitality chairperson, programming, Crisis Line work). She now is serving as co-chair of the best and biggest Gay Pride Week ever in Fort Worth, vice president of the Tarrant County Gay Alliance, sister to the Emperor and Empress of the Court of the Golden Lions, a member of W.A.D.S., and a member of Lambda.

Part of this may be due to Huber's personal enthusiasm with her city. She comments, "The unity and love in Fort Worth are really remarkable! We have a lot of organizations working together that have made some very significant strides over the last few years. The Court System in Fort Worth is the oldest and largest court in the state of Texas. Court members have been involved in many community service efforts and have promoted progress, growth, and unity within our community. The Tarrant County Gay Alliance has assumed the responsibility of establishing the first Legal Defense Fund in Fort Worth. [More on this later.] Lambda has made a dramatic impact on Fort Worth and the North Texas area with its plans for a gay retirement center. Lambda also recently opened the Lambda Community Center for

Community services and functions. W.A.D.S. was established to help the community wherever it was needed. They sponsor the annual street fair each year during Gay Pride Week and sponsored the benefit show that raised the most money for Toys for Tots in 1983."

As vice-president of TCGA, Sharon is in a position to update us on the Legal Defense Fund, which was set up in February. Its original purpose was to assist Sharon Dunn financially in the court battle to regain her 7-year-old son, with a total commitment which limits other uses of the fund until this case is over. Although TCGA has raised \$2,400 already, Dunn's attorney has requested \$3,500 as his retainer, leaving a whopping \$1,100 still desperately needed immediately. Donations may be mailed to TCGA, P.O. Huber sums it up: "The gay community of Fort Worth is finally being recognized as a strong and vibrant part of this nation. We have proved that with unity between our gay brothers and sisters that we can accomplish our goals and dreams. Fort Worth needs more women actively involved in our many organizations..."

"We are strong. We are united. We are Fort Worth, Texas!"
