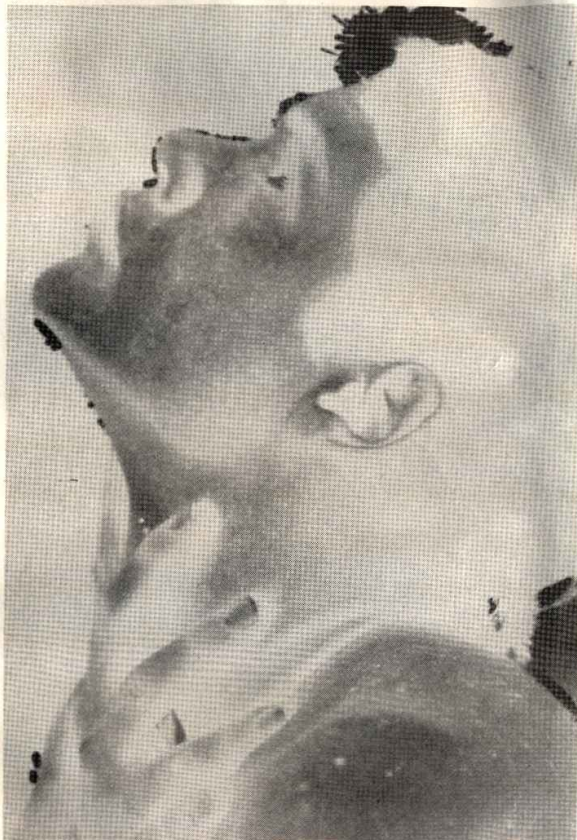

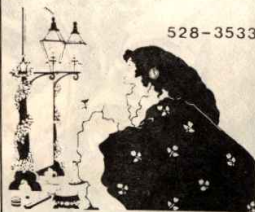

YOU and YOUR BODY

AVOID TOO MUCH SUGAR

The major health hazard from eating too much sugar is tooth decay (dental caries). The risk of caries is not simply a matter of how much sugar you eat. The risk increases the more frequently you eat sugar and sweets, especially if you eat between meals, and if you eat foods that stick to the teeth. For example, frequent snacks of sticky candy, or dates, or drylong use of soft drinks may be more harmful than adding sugar to your morning cup of coffee—at least as far as your teeth are concerned.

Obviously, there is more to healthy teeth than avoiding sugars. Careful dental hygiene and exposure to adequate amounts of fluoride in the water are especially important.

Contrary to widespread opinion, too much sugar in your diet does not seem to cause diabetes. The most common type of diabetes is seen in obese adults, and avoiding sugar, without correcting the overweight, will not solve the problem. There is also no convincing evidence that sugar causes heart attacks or blood vessel diseases.

Estimates indicate that Americans use on the average more than 130 pounds of sugars and sweeteners a year. This

means the risk of tooth decay is increased not only by the sugar in the sugar bowl but by the sugars and syrups in jams, jellies, candies, cookies, soft drinks, cakes, and pies, as well as sugars found in products such as breakfast cereals, catsup, flavored milks, and ice cream. Frequently, the ingredient label will provide a clue to the amount of sugars in a product.

TO AVOID EXCESSIVE SUGARS

- **Use less of all sugars, including white sugar, brown sugar, raw sugar, honey, and syrups**
- **Eat less of foods containing these sugars, such as candy, soft drinks, ice cream, cakes, cookies**
- **Select fresh fruits or fruits canned without sugar or light syrup rather than heavy syrup**
- **Read food labels for clues on sugar content—if the names sucrose, glucose, maltose, dextrose, lactose, fructose, or syrups appear first, then there is a large amount of sugar**
- **Remember, how often you eat sugar is as important as how much sugar you eat**

I LOVE A PARADE by Barney O'Reilly

Wasn't the parade a real turn-on? And Mary's—naturally—had the prize float—what a float—again this year, but with some stiff competition.

More than anything else the Houston gay community has done, I think the parade has succeeded in bringing a sense of community identity to gays.

Did you know how to say "I love you" in sign language before our dear gay friends showed us? Did you know we had a Mystic Krewe of Apollo in Montrose? Or the Houston Community Clowns? Had you ever heard The Mustang band? Had you seen our parents "out of the closet"?

I thought the parade had less political emphasis this time and I'm glad. Larry Bagnieris, I love you, but a parade's a carnival, not a rally. It's a magic thread that weaves a tapestry so that a community — any community — can stand back and look at itself, its diversity as well as its sameness. Few events allow this so well.

Nobody had to tell us that we're not all alike. But the parade visualized this for us and told us at the same time that we have a common element. There is something in all of us that's the same and that sameness makes us different from the rest of humankind—but not very much different. Gay is our ethnicity, our common bond, but we are first and foremost human beings.

There were more straights at the parade than I would have expected. They must have seen that myth about gays sameness go down if they'd not already rid themselves of it. Face to face, it's obvious that there are NO CLONES IN MONTROSE!

Another image the parade looked at—though not nearly so clearly—is the widely held notion that gays are shallow people. Our depth will be more difficult to get across to the general public

because so much of the straight world thinks that if you're gay, baby, sex is it. We are walking sex machines. But the gay lawyers were in the parade this time, along with several religious groups and dear old Granny's Toys for Tots "Christmas in July" surely helped sipel the image that we're sexual robots. And I saw a drama troupe and others that helped show that we have mental and moral and emotional depth as persons.

Let's hope Parade #3, Larry, shows more images of our humanity. Maybe we could flaunt our geniuses from history: The "queen" (nee a real King) who authorized a version of the Bible that is read by millions; that queer who wrote the all-time masterpiece of choral music "The Messiah"; or maybe that pansy who painted the Sistine Chapel and sculpted "Moses" and the "Pieta" (yes, I know about his "David"; too); or that "swish" Beethoven whose symphonies are the most impressive ever written—the "last word" in symphonic music; we could tell them they would not have "Swan Lake" or "The Nutcracker" except for that fruit from Russia; there'd be no "Mona Lisa" but for the Renaissance fairy, that pervert Leonardo da Vinci. 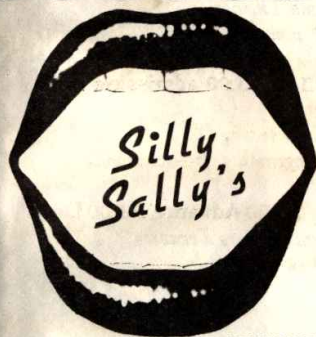
Last weeks softball games determined who would go to Los Angeles, California.

Sure was good to see Mother Ruth at the circus Sunday.



HOUSTON TRAFFIC REPORT

The June 23 Parade concert featuring The Hates fell within Gay Pride Week. As we all know now, several incidents happened then—raid on Mary's, shooting of Fred Paez. We should have been taking more notice.

About 11 p.m., parade Manager David Gaulin and I were watching two stylish gentlemen, who were wearing what the HPD vice squad must consider fashionably gay attire. Soon thereafter, cars parked on the Parade's east side started being towed away.

With their squad car parked in front of a No Parking sign a block away, Officers W. L. Bridges and J. W. Waltmon presided over the citing and towing of cars parked in an area legally uncontested now for seven months.

Houston is a football town, and this was obvious as the wrecker drivers went to work with the same feverish intensity Roger Staubach brought to Tom Landry's two-minute offense. However, due to reasons of intense hostility, I was not able to inquire if this game paid as well for the wrecker drivers as Staubach's did for the Cowboys.

Parade Owner Jerry Manifee tried to dissuade the officers, based on certain assurances *vis-a-vis* parking he'd received from the city. The ensuing pattern was familiar to anyone who's had a run-in with HPD. You're stopped, perhaps for no reason. You believe your rights are being violated (you are, in fact, often the provoked party). You are angry. You believe you have the U.S. Constitutionally protected right to free speech.

This is a mistake. With the HPD, you will be accorded a limited privilege. Question the officer with an angry tone, or answer as if nothing serious was happening. No matter. The officer's fist move is always to assert the power relationship. "You are in trouble, boy. This is serious, very serious... a minimal. So start proving your innocence and let's see some respect" (read that "fear").

The police know 99% of the people they deal with have no political power and no practical recourse when our rights are abused. They pound their

palms with 24" Everready flashlights or nightsticks, and ask if you "want to go to jail? It don't matter to me." Provoked, you start thinking about costs—jail, bail, court, lawyer's fees, lost time, criminal records, a few busted teeth, a swim in the bayou a la Joe Campos Torres, or a last stop like Fred Paez.

The police towed these cars because "they were impeding access on Loretto Street." About two foot of car was sticking out over the asphalt roadway. The city had come out when Manifee bought the Parade seven months earlier and lined out the parking. But they carefully stopped at the roadway. In order to be legally parked, most cars would have to pull up to the sidewalk. The police were technically correct; however, there remain questions.

In the Parade's seven months of operation, there had been many nights when the place was even more crowded, with cars "illegally parked." Those cars were also two-to-three feet in the roadway; they were also impeding traffic. Any half bright downer freak who wanted to spend a night in jail for public lewdness, interfering with officers, or public intoxication could have pointed that out.

Who ordered those cars towed? Why did the city seem intent on provoking violence that particular week? Who in city government profits politically by having pictures of gays (getting their cranials structures altered by mounted police) splashed over the media?

Ugly questions, to be sure. As police sources told me later, they believed the towings were "harrassment." (From experience we knew the towings had been ordered by higherups.) They also said HPD is "changing slowly." I hope these same folks are not in the way when the bricks or bullets start to fly.

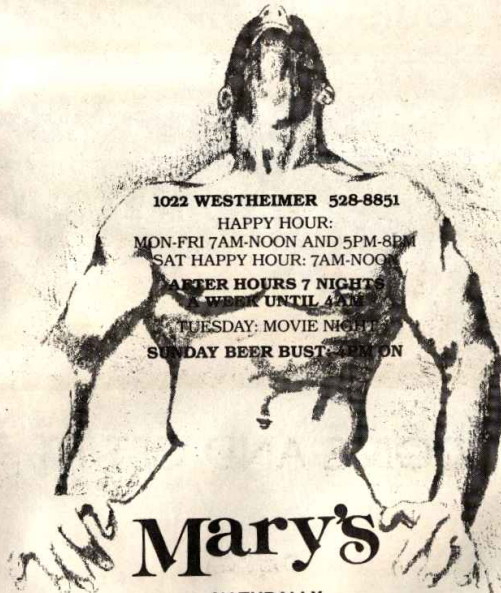

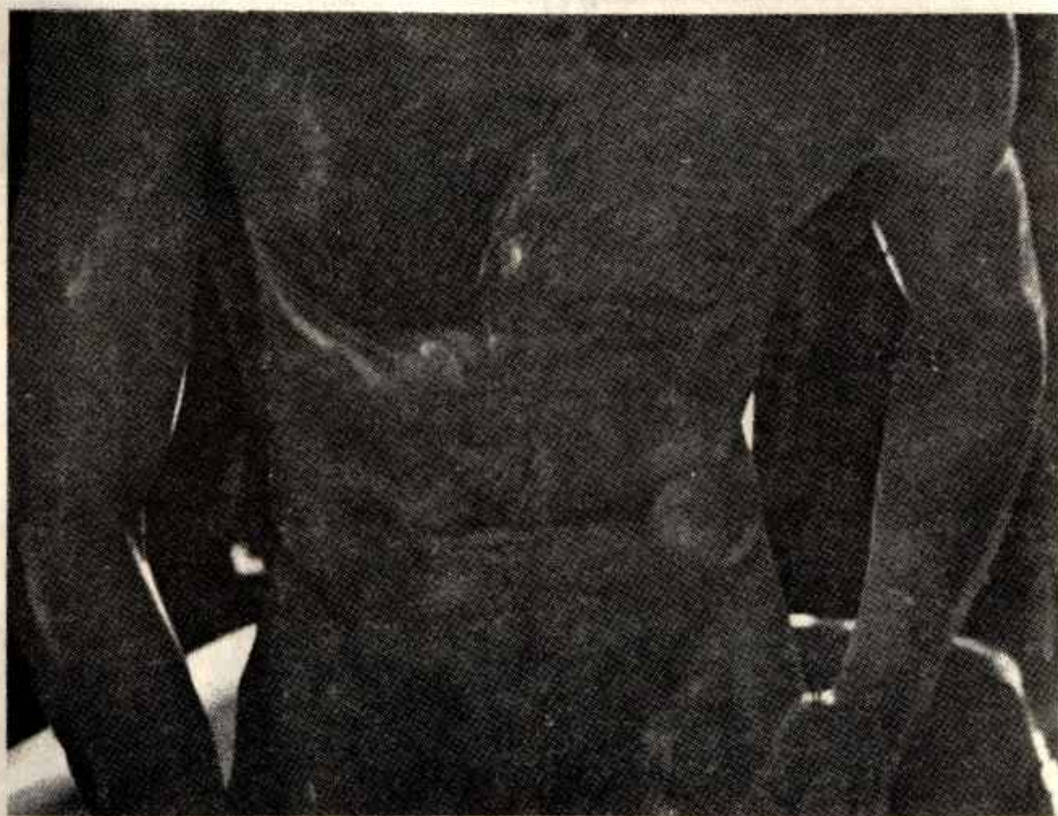
