State Representative Rick Noriega, District 145, was scheduled to speak at the September 4 meeting of the Caucus at press time.

Caucus raises its own rent at Community Center

Challenge issued to other Center tenants

The Caucus Board of Trustees voted unanimously in August to voluntarily increase the rent for the Caucus office in the Houston Lesbian and Gay Community Center. The board decided to increase the rent by 50 percent and to challenge other Center tenants to do the same.

"The Community Center is very important to Houston's GLBT community and we want to do our part to support the Center," said Caucus President Ken Jones. "We're sure the other tenants will want to do the same."

The Caucus was the first tenant of the Cen-

ter, moving into the building in the spring of 1998.

"The Center is a 'hub' of Houston's GLBT community," said Caucus trustee and Center Advisory Board member Clarence Burton Bagby. "As we move forward to begin a capital campaign for a permanent home for the Center, we need to also ensure the short-term financial stability of this essential community asset."

"We really appreciate this generous and very public show of support by the Caucus for the Community Center," said Center President Tim Brookover.

Caucus Voter I.D. and Database Project continues

The Caucus Voter I.D. and Database Project is continuing, with volunteers filling the Caucus office at the Community Center most every Saturday afternoon.

"We're thrilled by the enthusiastic response from Caucus members," said Caucus Trustee Ron Grose, who has been assisting on the project.

Jack Valinski has been updating and

enhancing the Caucus computer system to allow multiple volunteers to work on the project at once.

"We really appreciate Jack's work on this project," said Caucus President Ken Jones.

The project entails matching the 10,000-plus names on the Caucus mailing list to their corresponding voter registration

information from Harris County. This will allow the Caucus to target actual voters with direct mail and prevent wasting mail on non-voters.

The Caucus has purchased Harris County's voter registration rolls for the project.

The effort will also allow facilitate the targeting of voter registration efforts.

Sanchez supports GLBT equality; gets teacher groups endorsement

HOUSTON — Democratic gubernatorial candidate Tony Sanchez wowed members of Houston's gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender community last spring with promises for a state government that "will fairly represent all Texans." Sanchez appeared at a private home in Montrose and spoke to the crowd of about 75 people for about two hours.

Sanchez also said he supports domestic partner benefits and opposes bills that would outlaw gay and lesbian parenting and foster parenting.

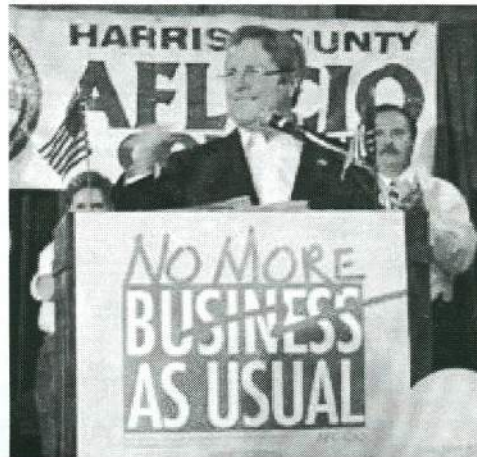
Sanchez also detailed his support for the Texas Employment Non-Discrimination Act, a bill that has been introduced in each of the last several sessions of the Texas Legislature by openly-gay Austin State Representative Glen Maxey. He also stated his support for Dallas State Representative Harryette Erhardt's education bill banning discrimination based upon sexual orientation in Texas schools.

The Texas Federation of Teachers (TFT), the statewide organization with over 40,000 members throughout the state's education community, endorsed Sanchez for governor in the November general election.

"We are impressed with Tony Sanchez's actions as an advocate of public schools and we appreciate his commitment to make education a top priority," said TFT President John Cole.

Affiliated with the American Federation of Teachers and the second largest affiliate of the Texas AFL-CIO, the TFT recognized Sanchez's commitment to listen to educators as well as state leadership on education issues.

"We must fully utilize the innovation and intelligence available to us to create excellence in our system. We will not rest on the laurels of our



predecessors. I want to look beyond tomorrow to develop a dynamic system that responds to individual needs and breeds excellence and success," Sanchez said. "As Governor, I will build consensus to achieve these long and short-term goals."

Caucus PAC endorses almost 50 candidates

5 general election.

Groups of four to eight interviewers screened each candidate for 30 minutes and reviewed candidate questionnaire answers before the full committee made its recommendations.

After weeks interviewing candidates, the Caucus PAC Screening Committee brought forth recommendations for the membership to endorse.

"Our screeners dedicated numerous hours and we're extremely grateful to them," said Screening Committee Chair Clair Koepsel.

"This is an outstanding group of candidates that really impressed our hard-working screening panels," said Caucus PAC President Ken Jones. "We do regret that although we did endorse a Republican in the primary, no Republicans responded to our invitation to screen."

The Caucus is the South's oldest gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender civil rights organization, having been founded in 1975. Its affiliated PAC endorses candidates and campaigns on their behalf.
