3 Twisters Reported in Houston; 2 Children Killed in San Marcos

Probe of Oily Island Beaches Is Sought

Galveston — An oily black tar-like substance that has washed ashore on Galveston beaches in recent weeks has prompted State Sen. A. R.

Schwartz to call for an investigation. Jeff Kirkpatrick, a Texas Water Quality Board investigator, checked Galveston beaches Thursday and was to examine Bolivar Peninsula today.

Schwartz, chairman of the Senate Interim Beach Study Committee, said "there is something going on out there that is substantially wrong and substantially more than the ordinary pumping of ship bilge."

"I've been going to the beach all my life and I've never seen so much tar out there," he said.

Schwartz said he had sent telegrams to the state water quality board, the Texas Railroad Commission, the General Land Office and to U.S. Rep. Jack Brooks of Beaumont.

The telegram to Brooks asked that the Department of the Interior and the U.S. Coast Guard be officially notified of the problem and asked that proper action be taken to determine the source of the tar and stop its release.

In another development in Galveston:

City Council and East Beach, Inc., a private corporation that owns a 2-mile strip on east beach, reached an agreement on the corporation's role and public entry.

That 2-mile strip from Stewart Beach east toward the jetties has been barricaded by the city for the past three years for the public's safety just as Stewart Beach has been barricaded from motorists.

Under the agreement the corporation will be allowed to build four paved parking lots on its land and charge \$1 parking fee to each motorist.

However, the public will continue to have access on a paved road through the corporation's land to reach public-owned areas free of any parking fee.

The corporation has agreed to cut weeds and level sand dunes in the area near the private parking lots.

15 Injured

2 Students Slain In Miss. Clash

Two students were killed and at least 15 others, including six girls, were wounded or injured early today in a violent confrontation between police and demonstrators at predominantly-black Jackson State College in Jackson, Miss.

About 500 National Guardsmen, on alert since a rock-throwing incident at the campus Wednesday night, quickly moved into the area to help restore order. They were under orders not to fire.

Police said the dead youths, both black students at Jackson State, apparently were killed when officers returned the fire of snipers. They were identified as James Green, age unknown, and Phillip L. Gibbs, 21.

Detective Chief M. B. Pierce said only one of the wounded persons was believed in critical condition. He said several officers were hurt by thrown missiles.

Authorities said some of the sniper fire was coming from the second floor of a girls' dormitory. Campus security police rushed into the building and brought out several co-eds.

Students denied there were any snipers. "There were no shots fired from the dorm at all, and this is one time police

A Stand for Old Glory

He Takes Taunts; Curses for U.S. Flag

San Diego, Cal. (UPI)—All Bill Pierson was doing was minding his own business.

He was going to class, he was at peace with the world, and he was thinking what a beautiful day it was.

Suddenly, just like that, the whole thing changed and for Bill Pierson it wasn't such a beautiful day anymore. On his way to class at San Diego State the other day, Bill Pierson saw something on the campus he had never seen before.

Approximately 150 students were demonstrating to protest the deaths at Kent State. One group of students was yanking the American flag down and another group was trying to pull it back up again. The flag was beginning to look like something on a yo-yo string.

Bill Pierson isn't what you'd call an activist. He's 26, spent three years in the

Navy after finishing high school in Arlington, Texas, then enrolled at San Diego State where he played center with the football team well enough that the New York

Israelis Threaten Egyptian Ships

Tel Aviv — Retaliatory action against Egyptian shipping loomed today following the sinking of an Israeli trawler off the Sinai coast, allegedly by an Egyptian missile boat.

Israel announced that an Egyptian missile boat sank the 70-ton fishing vessel in Mediterranean waters not far from where the destroyer Elath was hit and sunk in 1967.

Meanwhile, Israeli pilots caught Egyptian warplanes trying to raid the west bank of the Suez Canal today and reported shooting down two of them in the second successive day of dogfights over the waterway.

An announcement from Tel Aviv said the Israelis had carried out an hour-long raid against Egyptian positions on the canal when Cairo's planes appeared for a strike of their own against Israeli troops.

Two MIG-17s were downed in the dogfight, Tel Aviv said, with all the Israeli pilots returning safely. Israel reported the same results in the aerial battle Thursday.

It brought to 95 the number of Egyptian planes Israel claims to have shot down since the 1967 war.

A military announcement said the fishing trawler Orli

Psychiatric Meeting Disrupted

San Francisco — Confrontation has produced chaos at the American Psychiatric Assn.

A Thursday panel on issues of sexuality was adjourned before it was completed after it was invaded by representatives

of the Gay Liberation Front and the Women's Liberation Movement.

Shouting obscenities, the 20 young people interrupted speakers as they tried to present their formal papers.

The session, one of eight held Thursday, started calmly enough and the first three papers, dealing with various aspects of homosexuality, were presented without incident.

The shouting first erupted during a presentation by Dr. Nathaniel McConaghy of Kensington, Australia. He discussed a treatment, using painful electrical shock and nausea

drugs, aimed at orienting homosexuals away from sexual attraction to members of their own sex.

Shouts of "torture, torture," rang out from the audience. Dr.

Daniel Cappon, scheduled to discuss the paper, never got to the platform.

As Dr. McConaghy finished, a girl, who called herself Judy X,

Market Soars; Dow Climbs 17

New York (AP)—Stock market prices were up sharply today in quickened trading.

The Dow Jones industrial average was up 17.43 to close at 702.22. A total of 14.56 million shares was traded on the New York Stock Exchange.

Advances widened their lead over declines to about 2 to 1 among issues traded on the New York Stock Exchange.

The gains were strong in electronics, aircrafts, chemicals, airlines and drugs and most other categories were up generally. Glamour issues were among the stronger stocks.

Some brokers think recent market activity indicates it is in a "bottoming phase" and that the sharp decline Thursday before the rally started may have indicated a selling climax.

Phillips Petroleum was trading up on the Big Board. One analyst said the gain might be partially the result of a favorable article in Thursday's London Financial Times about an oil find in the North Sea by a group including Phillips.

One broker said he thought blue chips and semi-blue chip stocks will take hold now.

Analysts say that the early buying today was almost overcome by the supply of stocks for sale at higher prices and a general lack of interest, but that some enthusiasm appeared later.

Storm is Moving Eastward

Three tornado funnels were reported in Houston today—one of them striking the ground in the Sheldon Rd. area—as a vast storm system moved across the state, causing the deaths of at least two children in San Marcos.

The tornado that hit the ground struck between Interstate 10 and U.S. Highway 90 East about 2 p.m.

Arthur Wilson, a retired Houstonian, was working in a workshop in his yard at 8918 Sheldon Rd. when a twister picked up the workshop.

"Went One Way . . ."

"The shop went one way and I went the other," he said. He was not seriously hurt. The corrugated metal shed was moved 50 feet and landed on a fence, he said.

The Texas Department of Public Safety said other property damage had been reported, but was not confirmed.

The storm system moved slowly toward the east after damaging areas of Central and South Central Texas.

Swept Downstream

Two children, a 3-year-old boy and a 6-year-old girl, drowned while being taken from Purgatory Creek in San Marcos. The bodies were swept downstream and have not been recovered.

Rainfall in Houston amounted to .52 of an inch at 11 a.m. But it rose to 2 inches at the weather bureau's downtown station by mid-afternoon.

Some Houston streets were flooded curb-to-curb, but no serious flooding was reported.

Water up to 5 feet deep from Purgatory Creek and the San Marcos River in the college town sent residents to high ground.

A helicopter rescued 150 children stranded on the roof of Travis Elementary School as emergency calls went out throughout Central Texas for boats, food and clothing.

Kids Stranded

"We have kids stranded alone in houses we can't get to, and we are answering emergency calls as fast as we can," said Jene Yee Jr., San Marcos police dispatcher.

Two injured persons were airlifted to San Marcos Hospital.

The U.S. Weather Bureau said
