Regents Deciding On Daily Texan's Charter Future

Austin (AP) — University of Texas regents were deciding today whether the presently student-controlled Daily Texan newspaper should have more guidance from the UT journalism department.

Renewal of a charter for Texas Student Publications, Inc., is a major item on the regents' agenda.

TSP, a nonprofit corporation, has a 50-year charter that expires July 1. The corporation publishes The Daily Texan and other student publications.

Chancellor Charles A. LeMaistre of the University of Texas System originally recommended a 10-year charter, with a TSP board of directors consisting of five students from the department of journalism, the president of the student body and three faculty members and two professional newsmen selected by the university president.

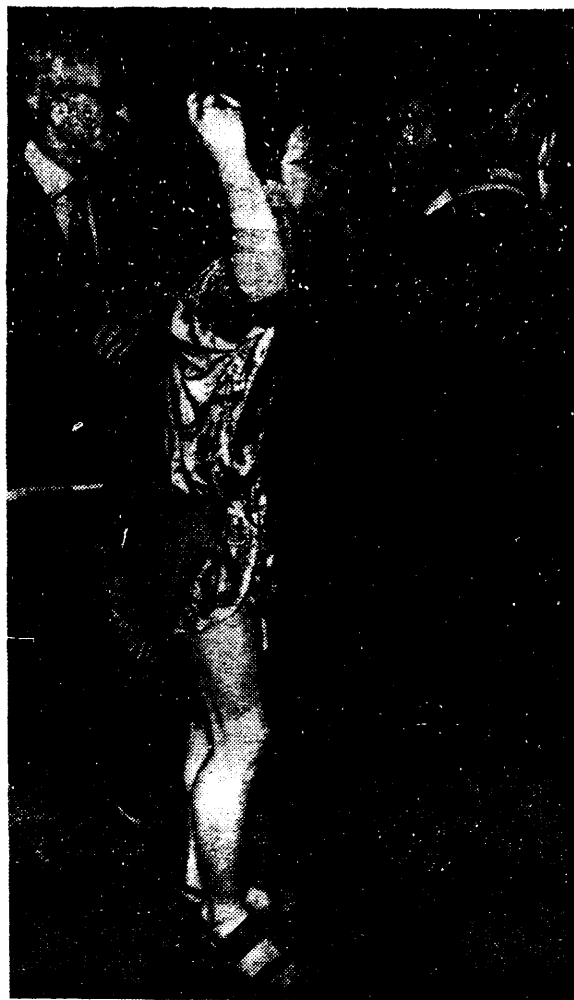
The present TSP board, which has a student majority with the president of the study body and four students elected at large, has asked that some of the students on the new board be elected at large. LeMaistre said he would consider the request.

The new charter recommended by LeMaistre also proposes that the editor of The Daily Texan be appointed by the journalism department-dominated TSP board. The present editor is elected at large by the student body.

LeMaistre also asked the regents to authorize a mandatory fee of \$3 per student to support the newspaper. Currently, the Texan receives \$4.10 from each voluntary student blanket tax paid.

"I do not feel that student government should control the student publications board, as is now the case," LeMaistre told the TSP board this week.

Opposition to LeMaistre's plan has been led by Andy Yemma of Austin, the 1970-71 Daily Texan editor, and Miss Lori Rodriguez of Mission, the new Texan editor. They claim, among other things, that the changes are largely because the Texan has been outspokenly critical of university administrators and regents, particularly former regents Chairman Frank Erwin Jr.

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Gay Libs Unfurl Signs, Methodist Meeting Adjourns

San Antonio (AP) — The Gay Liberation Front, a homosexual group, unfurled protest banners at a conflict-ridden Methodist meeting Thursday and a flurry of shouts and scuffles followed, forcing an early adjournment.

Earlier Thursday, Wil Schaefer, who was stripped of his rights as a minister after acknowledging that he had lived with both his wife and a female divorcee at the same time, burned his Methodist minister's credentials in what he called "a symbolic act of disgust."

The Gay Liberation Front's outburst came during a routine business session near the close of the Southwest Texas United Methodist annual conference.

Members of the homosexual group, seated in the balcony, suddenly unfurled long paper banners.

The group's demonstration was in support of Gene Leggett of Dallas, an admitted homosexual who was suspended from the ministry during an emotional session of the conference earlier this week.

The conference's Board of Ministry, without amplifica-

tion, had said Leggett was unacceptable for the ministry. He was suspended by a vote of the ministers.

As two banners were unfurled from the balcony railing of a downtown church, two men jumped up and angrily tore them apart.

This brought a Gay Liberation member — wearing a dress and sporting a thin mustache — to his feet.

"You're interfering with freedom of speech!" he shouted to the men in the balcony.

There were shouts of "pigs" and "fascists" from other corners of the big church.

Banners unfurled from another section of the balcony were allowed to remain.

One of them bore the words, "Accept Gays or Deny Christ."

Another banner stated: "You are not from God; and this is why you will not listen."

There were more shouts and the audience of several hundred persons was in an uproar. The presiding bishop, the Rev. O. Eugene Slater, immediately adjourned the meeting.

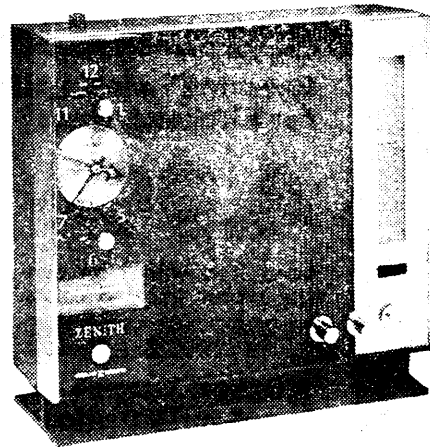

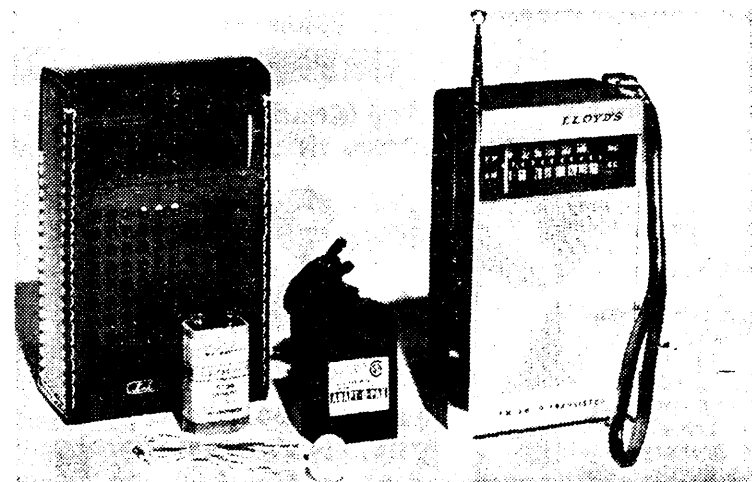
