ROYAL DIXON, naturalist, author, lecturer, born in East Sandy, near Huntsville, Texas, 1880. Passed away in Houston, Texas, 1962. Education: Sam Houston State Teachers College, Huntsville, Texas, Morgan Park Academy, Chicago; special student, Chicago University; Columbia University, N. Y. Curator, Dept. of Botany, Field Museum of Natural History, Chicago, 1905-1910. Columnist, Houston Chronicle, Human Side of Life, 1910-1927.

Later broadcast series original stories, 'What I sez, I sez'; Series, Wonders of Nature, Sta. K.T.R.H. Houston, 1953. Mem. Poetry Society of America; Univ. Forum of Am.; Mental Sci. Inst., Denver, Colo., 1939; Lectr. U. of Ark. Extension, 1941. Founder (with Rose Ralbe) and Pres. of N. Y. Salon, Waldorf Astoria, N.Y.C. Univ. Forum of Am.; Little Rock, Ark. Authors and Composers Club; Knickerbockers Storytelling Club; Hon. Mem. Daytona Beach Garden Club, Fla.; Southmore Garden Club, Houston, Tex.; Chautauqua (N. Y.) Bird and Tree Club; Humane Soc., Jacksonville, Fla. Author of numerous books." Royal Dixon's spiritual concept of the Oneness and Unity of the Universe as set forth in his popular series of Nature Books entitled The Human Side Of and The Personality Of: Plants, Birds, Animals, Trees, and Water Animals endeared his name to the Nature Lovers of the World. His first book in this widely read Nature Series was entitled The Human Side of Plants, Pub. 1914 by Frederick Stokes, N. Y.-Later published by Grant Richards, Ltd., London. Excerpts from The Personality of Insects appeared in the Readers Digest 1942 and in four anthologies from 1954-1958 (England, France, U. S., and S. America). His Negro Dialect Stories, Signs in Signs and Half Dark Moon reflected his love for the Negro Race and his sense of their contribution to the Folk Lore of America. He was contributor to many of the leading magazines of America for more than two decades. His latest Nature Articles were published in Frontiers, magazine of Natural History, Phil., Pa. 1954-1959.

He was Nature Instr. on the Staff of Lost Valley Ranch for Boys, Colo., 1949-1958. Author of the book *Americanization*, pub. by Macmillan 1919 which established him as patriotic spokesman for justice and tolerance in *America—Many Peoples*, but One Nation.
