When Exxon and Mobil merged, the lowest conservative denominator won out

he push for equal rights for sexual mithe newly merged Exxon Mobil Corporation announced that they will not be offering domestic partner benefits, even though Mobil had given them to their employees. Mobil employees who were already receiving these benefits will be grandfathered in, but new hires and the vast majority of Exxon Mobil's 121,000 employees are out of luck.

In addition, the new mega-company will jettison Mobil's nondiscrimination policy, which spelled out that sexual orientation would be protected. Exxon Mobil's personnel policy does not specifically bar discrimination or harassment on the basis of sexual orientation, although they do list

other minorities by name.

Last May, Exxon shareholders had voted down by a 94-percent margin a proposal to grant partner benefits and to bar discrimination based on sexual orientation, following the recommendation of the Exxon board.

The Exxon Mobil policy has been creating an uproar among gay activists, both national and local. A Houston group led by Dan DiDonato is planning a protest and incorporating as a nonprofit group: the Equality Rally.

"The Equality Rally is starting a campaign," says DiDonato, "to let the corporate

leaders of the Exxon Mobil corporation know that their action to rescind domestic partner benefits and their retraction of the antidiscrimination policy for the employees of Mobil is not appreciated, and will not be tolerated by the communities throughout our country. The purpose of the Equality Rally is to demonstrate our feelings on this issue in a peaceful

Texas being such an oilpatch state-Exxon's headquarters are in Irving, right outside Dallas-many in

norities has taken a step backward, as obligation to organize opposition against this Exxon Mobil incarnation became the first anregressive policy.

"We in Houston/Dallas have an obligation to 'set the pace' for what is likely to be a long, protracted international project," says longtime Houston muckraker Ray Hill.

Nationwide, activists are also preparing for the long haul, planning such strategies as protesting at Exxon Mobil's spring shareholders' meeting.

"This move could become their Exxon Valdez of the new millennium," says David M. Smith of the gay civil rights group Human Rights Campaign. "Exxon clearly hasn't learned from past experience that creating a

company to persona non grata, as its new nounced inductee into the GFN's Corporate Hall of Shame. (See GFN's 50 Most Powerful Gay-Friendly Public Companies in Corporate America at www.gfn.com.)

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force has been campaigning for dialogue between Exxon Mobil officials and representatives of the gay and lesbian movement.

"Benefits comprise approximately 40 percent of a worker's compensation," says Kerry Lobel, NGLTF executive director. "This means that Exxon Mobil's decision to withhold domestic partner benefits puts the oil giant squarely at odds with the notion

of economic justice in the workplace. Consumers should remember this injustice when they choose where to spend their hardearned dollars."

Domestic partner benefits are offered by nearly 3,000 U.S. companies, including more than 80 Fortune500 companies; 52

percent of the Fortune500 now explicitly ban sexual orientation discrimination in their nondiscrimination and anti-harassment statements. (A complete list of employers offering domestic partner benefits is available at http://www.hrc.org/worknet.) Chevron, BP, Amoco, Shell, Atlantic Richfield, and Texaco

gays and lesbians, according to Wayne Besen, spokesman for the Human Rights Campaign.

So far, Chevron has been the leader in showing what a gay-friendly oil company can do. Chevron was sponsor last year of "Creating Change," the annual training and skills-building conference put on by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force. Chevron's Lesbian & Gay Employee Association even feted their CEO at their San Francisco holiday party, according to CLGEA co-chair, Houstonian Susan Guerrero.



HISTORY IS MADE IN VERMONT

State Supreme Court rules gay couples entitled to equal benefits and protections

hus wrote the Ver-mont Supreme Court on December 20, 1999: "We hold that the state is constitutionally required to extend to same-sex couples the common benefits and protections that flow from marriage under Vermont law."

This history-making decision has been joyously greeted by gay and lesbian groups across the

"This is a legal and cultural milestone," said Mary Bonauto, co-counsel for the couples who challenged the ban on same-sex marriages. "The court recognized that same-sex couples need and deserve the same legal rights and protections other people take for granted."

The ruling was made in a lawsuit filed by three gay couples after each had been denied a marriage license by their local town clerk; the case had been appealed up to the Vermont Supreme Court, which found that limiting marriage benefits to opposite-

sex couples was in violation of the Vermont constitution's "Common Benefits Clause" that the government ought to be "instituted for the common benefit, protection and security of the people, nation or community, and not for the particular emolument or advantage of any single person, family or set of persons who are part of only that com-

The progressive court ruling did not actually legalize same-sex marriage in Vermont; that will be decided by the Vermont Legislature when they reconvene this month. But the court mandated that the Legislature must either expand the marriage laws to include gay couples, or create some other sort of domestic partnership clause that would give gay couples all the benefits and privileges of marriage.

"We are thrilled that the Vermont Supreme Court had the wisdom and courage to hand down this historic, landmark decision," said Winnie Stachelberg, political director of the Human Rights Campaign. "There has never been a logical or justifiable reason to exclude samesex couples from marrying, and this decision validates the unfairness of exclusion. This is a tremendous victory for gay and lesbian couples in Vermont who are now one step closer to being considered equal in the eyes of the law."

The Vermont Supreme Court left open the crucial question of whether the state would have gay marriages versus domestic partnership agreement. Both gay advocacy groups and the Vermont Supreme Court would prefer that Vermont go for gay marriages, but the court left that up to the lawmakers.

Reaction from Vermont lawmakers has been mixed. Peter Shumlin, the president pro tempore of the Vermont Senate told the New York Times that he expected it would be much easier to get votes for a domestic partnership law than one creating full-fledged marriages, but "both are strong possibilities." Vermont Gov. Howard Dean, a Democrat, told the New York Times that he thought the Legislature would pass a domestic partnership law. On CNN, Gov. Dean indicated that the Vermont Legislature would not pass a same-sex marriage bill but that he would support passage of comprehensive domestic partnership legislation. According to the Associated Press, Dean said that same-sex marriage "makes me uncomfortable, the same as anybody else."

Now that Vermont has taken such a decisive step toward granting equal rights to gay couples, what does this bode for the rest of the country? Can we all trot up to Vermont, get a marriage or domestic partner license, and come home and enjoy legal protection? You guessed it: Hold your horses, not quite yet.

MCCR plans to move into a new grand facility

ince it started as an informal ministry in 1972, Houston's Metropolitan Community Church of the Resurrection has met in living rooms, a printing warehouse, even a TV repair shop. Now, the home church for much of Houston's gay and lesbian community has outgrown yet another facility. MCCR's Rev. J. Dwayne

Johnson told his congregation on Christmas Eve that the church planned to move from their Sixth Ward home of 20 years to a new larger building, at 2025 West 11th Street near Ella Boulevard. Pending final inspections and congregational approval, the closing is tentatively set for mid-March.

Under contract from the Evangelistic Temple for \$2.35 million, the 37,000 square foot property is grand indeed. The sanctuary has seating for 1,575 people. The church complex includes two chapels, a bridal dressing room (perfect!), a gymnasium, classrooms and offices, a full commercial kitchen, and a full-immersion baptismal tank.

"This is an exceptional opportunity for Resurrection to continue its trend of ministry growth," said Rev. Johnson. With the new large facility, Johnson hopes to expand the church's education, family, and personal counseling programs. It will also allow room for the church's new bookstore, Resurrection Inspirations, and their gay and lesbian archive. "Probably not many people are aware that Resurrection is the

custodian of the largest gay and lesbian archive in the state of Texas," says Rev. Johnson.

MCCR has been looking for a new home for two years, having out-

grown their current building on Decatur Street in the Old Sixth Ward, the historic neighborhood off Washington and Silber just to the northwest of downtown. The Decatur building was MCCR's first "proper church." The congregation bought the former Tabernacle Baptist Church in 1979, renovating the derelict church considerably over the years. In addition to happy memories, the Decatur property

also carried the scars of vandalism, broken windows, gang activity, robberies, and even cross-burnings by the Klan.

Teaching an orthodox Christian theology based upon the beliefs found in the Nicene and Apostes Creed, the Resurrection MCC denomination was founded by the Rev. Elder Troy D. Perry in 1968 as a response to homophobia and rejection from other churches. Headquartered in West Hollywood, the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches has a worldwide membership of more than 32,000 people in over 300 churches.



y husband proposed to me over a White Chocolate Raspberry Truffle heesecake he had flown in from California's premier restaurant, the Cheesecake Factory. Had he proposed over Sara Lee instead, I would still be single. And had the mother of Cheesecake

Factory proprietor David Overton had a penchant for pound cake instead of cheesecake, Overton may have ended up competing with Sara Lee among the vast frozen confections in your local grocery store.

But Mom's coveted family recipe was so beyond your average dessert that it inspired Overton, a teacher at the time, to swap his books for baking. Now, instead of scraping to make ends meet, Overton is

breaking ground for his 34th restaurant this one in San Francisco-and planning two more Y2K openings in Atlanta and West Palm Beach.

From its first conspicuous Beverly Hills location in the early '80s, it was only a matter of time before Overton brought his wildly popular restaurant to Houston. Amid the fast-food and high-ticket restaurants sprinkled throughout Houston's most popular shopping scene, the Galleria was begging for a place with Everyman appeal. What it got was a California clone that brags better than Texas itself: great food, and more of it, for less than a decent steak.

Like many a good Houston restaurant, the wait is long. Even at 6:30 p.m., fairly early for a Friday night, we waited an hour and a half (at least they offer beepers so you can build your appetite while perusing the Galleria). Nabbing a table at the cramped yet well-stocked bar, we figured the wait would be scenic at the very least. Astonishingly high ceilings over the downstairs bar belie the second story, which is the main dining area. The decor is Grecian contempo rary, neutral tones with vivid splashes of metallic rust and black, accented by columns. Not exactly understated but very distracting, which comes in handy since you'll have trouble conversing above the din. Then again, with a menu like this, who needs to talk?

LIFE IS SHORT

But don't eat your cheesecake first, or else you'll miss the other hearty fare dished up by the Cheesecake Factory

> Roughly 18 pages of fat-laden appetizers and multi-content salads, chicken, pastas, pizzas, fish, steaks, sandwiches, and breakfast to ponder can propel a normally sane person into an existential crisis. In fact, after reading every tantalizing description, you may be too exhausted to order anything but cheesecake-or too wary to order from a kitchen that tries to accommodate so many different tastes. A cheesecake restaurant from California offering blackened red Cajun chicken pasta does seem a tad suspect ... like IHOP offering Crepes Suzette.

But after poring over the appetizerstwo pages worth-you'll be happy the Cheesecake Factory didn't stick to its namesake. From its fresh Thai lettuce wraps (\$8.95) to its positively luscious sweet corn tamale cakes (\$7.50), these mini meals are enough for an entrée, although you'll be hard-pressed to find anything remotely

entrées are under \$13.95 and can feed two starving diners.)

In the appetizer department, a musthave are the chubby, overstuffed avocado eggrolls (\$7.50), oozing with avocado, sun-





dried tomatoes, red onion, and cilantro and served with a sublime tamarind-cashew dipping sauce you'll want to eat by the spoonful. Other seemingly unoriginal appetizers all had their own California twist. For example, no reasonable carnivore would contest the meaty buffalo wings (\$7.50); you could eat more than one without numbing your tongue, and they don't drip. Leave it to a California transplant to

healthy. This place makes its living off of cheesecake, so don't go thinking they've skimped on fat anywhere else. With appetizers priced between \$5.95 and \$8.95 per massive dish, combine one with a dessert for a filling and relatively inexpensive evening. (It's obvious this place makes its profit from turnaround, since almost all



the bruschetta (\$5.95) was crisp and flavorful, about as strong a compliment you can pay to a mix of diced tomato, onion, garlic, and basil.

If you like pasta and have room for an entrée, don't miss Evelyn's Favorite Pasta (\$12.95). Evelyn is my hero, her favorite pasta being a salve for us indecisive, orally fixated folks, whose motto might be: If you can't make up your mind between entrées, just combine them all! Perfect al dente penne pasta sprinkled with olive oil, garlic, and Parmesan, tossed with Kalamata olives, sun-dried tomatoes, roasted eggplant, red bell peppers, broccoli, and pine nuts. So simple-yet so hard to keep from crooning with each tender, chewy mouthful.

A little jaunt back a few pages will take you to juicy, thick hamburgers (made with Certified Black Angus beef), grilled portabella, and fresh tuna burgers, every possible sandwich combination outside of a deli, even Mexican and Asian dishes that, not surprisingly, hold their own against their native competitors.

On the lighter side, you won't go wrong opting for any of the bountiful salads, although, again, plan on sharing or leaving with a doggy bag. The Santa Fe salad (\$10.95) comes heaped with lime-marinated chicken, fresh corn and black beans, cheese, tomatoes, and enough cilantro and peanut sauce to keep your fork moving against your

will. The spicy Thai vegetable noodle salad (\$9.95), again with cilantro and a spicy Thai peanut vinaigrette, is a hands-down favorite, as is the herb-crusted salmon salad (\$10.95) served chilled in a wonderfully tart balsamic vinaigrette.

But the real jaw dropper here is the dessert menu. No matter what you thought about cheesecake until now, it was a misconception. This stuff will move you like no other, especially their signature white chocolate raspberry truffle (remember the marriage proposal?), the pièce de résistance that propelled the Cheesecake Factory to national fame.

To prove my point, my companions and I conducted a taste test with five varieties of cheesecake. They were all fantastic, we agreed, but my favorite had normally polite friends reduced to Darwinian tactics vying for the last bite. The plate was scraped

clean within one and a half minutes, even the two excessive dollops of whipped cream. Two close seconds were the Kahlua almond fudge cheesecake, with its hint of Kahlua and thick fudge and chocolate-covered almonds; and the coffee Heathbar crunch cheesecake, a creamy, heady rendition of the candy bar.

Given the two-hour wait even after our three blissful hours of oral indulgence, it's safe to say The Cheesecake Factory won't suffer the fate of past Houston restaurants in times of economic distress. And for those of us who live for great desserts, we'll no longer have to ship their famous cheesecake from 1,500 miles away. There's only one minor problem with its Galleria location. You'll need to plan strategically and do your clothes shopping before lunch.



ShowtimeOut **GAY LIFE IN SMALL-TOWN AMERICA**

Harvey Fierstein, Terrence McNally, & Paula Vogel unite their distinctive voices into one script for this Showtime movie

hese three respected gay playwrights combine their talents for Common Ground, a drama that depicts how the "small towns" of America may have reacted toward homosexuality over the past 50 years. This multi-generational drama, set in the fic-

titious small town of Homer, Connecticut, explores the 1950s, written by Paula Vogel, the 1970s, written by Terence McNally, and 2000, written by Harvey Fierstein. Common Ground is directed by Donna Deitch, who gave us Desert Hearts.

Johnny Burroughs (Eric Stoltz) has lived in Homer his entire life and has watched the characters' different experiences from the center of town:

As a nonprofit organization, it depends on approximately 450 volunteers supporting a small staff of full- and part-time employees to keep things humming. Together, they are able to help 2,000 people with HIV and AIDS annually.

To find out what makes us the best place to volunteer, a good place to start is with Dena Gray, Bering Omega's new director of Volunteer Services and Community Outreach. Last June, Dena stepped into the shoes vacated by Joanne Reich, who got an offer she couldn't refuse in New York with the Methodist Church.

Dena is a graduate of the University of Houston and a former volunteer with several Houston AIDS organizations. Her job is recruiting and placing Bering Omega volunteers. She ensures that we always have enough volunteers, and she matches people's skills and interests to the areas they will enjoy the most and in which they feel they can be most effective.

Why volunteer at Bering Omega?


Most of us have at least one talent we probably take for granted: a green thumb, a flair for communication, or fluency in Spanish, for example. Perhaps you're artistic or a good cook.

Maybe you're good with people. Or maybe your talent is quietly bringing order to an office setting. These skills and many others are highly valued at Bering Omega. where volunteers find satisfaction in applying their assorted abilities.

Dena observes. "When small tasks are done, like taking [a hospice] resident out on the patio and letting the sun hit their face, seeing their expression is just the ultimate blessing. All those little daily activities really make the volunteers know what they're doing is important.... Even if it's just visiting with a resident, that's so appreciated-and what do you really need for that besides a good ear?"

As to what makes people want to volunteer in the first place, Dena says, "I think one of the reasons is that they know someone who has HIV or AIDS, or they've cared for someone at the end stage of their life. After going through the grieving process. or as a part of the grieving process. they want to continue that service and give back to other people in the same situation."

Secondly, students often volunteer-especially those major-







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ing in medicine, social work, or psychologyin order to augment their studies with a practical, real-life learning experience. But, although students may come for academic reasons, they frequently become involved in the lives of people here, and stay.

A third frequently cited reason is simply the desire to help. Dena has found helping oth-

ers gives you an irresistible sense of purpose.

"So the reasons they come are different, the experiences they have are different." Dena says, "but I think it really all goes back to, 'I feel needed, and this is a calling that I have."

Additionally, "There's a lot of interaction with the human side of our clients, the heart and the soul, and a lot of connection at that level. The intensity is hard to escape. That's what I think keeps our five-vear volunteers, our ten-year volunteers [coming backl. That's what keeps people constantly calling, saying, 'I want to get involved."

What, exactly, do Bering Omega volunteers do?

When you think of volunteering for HIV and AIDS community service, perhaps the first thing that comes to your mind is bedside care. While many volunteers are

needed to provide that service, there are plenty of other opportunities as well.


Our Adult Day Care Center and Hospice Program need van drivers (we supply the van) and people to assist with activities and field trips. Our dental clinic needs reception-

ists and people to help patients fill out forms and get to dental chairs. The clinic also needs volunteer hygienists and dentists. Our In-Home Respite Program depends on volunteers to visit the homebound, relieving the isolation of prolonged illness. The Support Network and Hospice Program need people with skills or training in emotional

> Now you might say, "I really want to volunteer, but I'm not comfortable dealing with the clients." No problem.

The Adult Day Care Center and Hospice Program need help with cooking, cleaning, clerical duties, maintenance, and lawn care. The Financial Assistance Program can use daytime office and computer assistance. The Advocacy Project needs help in community planning, advocacy forums, and research. Prefer to work at home? Perhaps our email and fax action alert network is your thing. Plus, we have special events, public relations projects, and fund-raising opportunities as well.



Volunteers in all our programs receive complete hands-on training and all the tools they need to provide quality assistance. They get trained not only by our staff, but by other volunteers, who frequently offer a different perspective.

How much time does volunteering take?

Most Bering Omega volunteers work in four-hour shifts, but they decide how many shifts they want to work. Some come in once a month; others once a week. Some even come in three or four times weekly. We're flexible and allow for various scheduling limitations. We can accommodate the nine-to-fivers who need to volunteer evenings and weekends, as well as the retiree and student's preference for day shifts during the week.

"We try to make the schedule as accommodating to volunteers as possible." Dena says. "We don't ever want to lose a volunteer."

BYOF (Bring Your Own Friends)—or make new ones

Sometimes friends like to volunteer together, signing up for the same shifts. But other people find they can't help but form new friendships at Bering Omega.

After a shift, when volunteers want to talk about the experience at home, they sometimes find their listeners just don't get it. The best people to talk to are those who have shared the same feelings or experiences. That common ground tends to generate great friendships.

Another issue is, of course, confidentiality. Volunteers are taught to honor the privacy of those they serve. So, again, that increases communication between volunteers and builds relationships.




"Our oldest volunteer who, sad to say, passed away this year, was about 70," says Dena. "And our youngest was 15. She would come in and cook brownies before school. When she left, the entire place almost just fell apart. We have one college student who's 17. He's here every day for a few hours, and he is just as magnificent as the older volunteers, so all the different ages really add to the diversity of experiences here.

"We have everybody here. It's not a very segregated community. We have full-time volunteers here from Germany and one full-time volunteer from Montana, and the dynamics that exist there are just hilarious. Every day is interesting. We have gay/straight. We have all the different ethnic populations represented, so when you walk in, you feel like that 'one world' that people always talk about really exists."

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

But forgiving Matthew Shepard's killers is going to be tough

have always found it difficult to forgive those who are not Ltruly sorry. To get over the horrible deeds of those who never repent. To find goodness in those whose only regret is being caught.

Matthew Shepard's killers are individuals I have difficulty forgiving. They lured the 105pound young man from a bar.

They drove him to a remote area. They tied him to a fence. One of the killers. Aaron McKinney, pistol whipped Matthew. Then, they left him tied to a fence. Eighteen

hours later, a bicyclist found him. Five days later, Matthew Shepard died.

When the murderers were caught, they expressed no remorse. Instead, in an attempt to justify their heinous acts, they blamed their childhoods, each other, and even Matthew.

Russell Henderson, McKinney's accomplice, pleaded guilty on the eve of his trial in April in exchange for a life sentence in the Wyoming penitentiary.

When McKinney's murder trial began, we learned that McKinney had an explanation for pistol whipping Matthew and leaving him to die. McKinney said Matthew made an unwanted sexual advance toward him. That act, explained McKinney, caused him to fly into a blind rage.

In other words, Matthew Shepard allegedly bought his own death sentence by touching McKinney's crotch. That unwanted advance caused McKinney to "lose rational control" and to kill Matthew, said McKinney's lawyer

to the jury. Yet again, the murderer would become the victim. Rather than remorse, a Wyoming jury would hear excuses. One more time, it would be the fag's fault. Or

so it seemed at the beginning.

But that was not to be, said the trial judge. Reason prevailed in a Wyoming courtroom when the trial judge said that McKinney could not present his contorted argument that Matthew's murder was motivated by McKinney's so-called gay panic. At least this time, a jury would not be permitted to hear evidence that an individual's bigotry can legally excuse homicide.

Whether an individual is legally entitled to offer up a "gaypanic defense" will have to be



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

der trial. After another gay man has died at the hands of a straight man so filled with hate that he believes his hate can justify murder.

This time, however, the murderer was permitted to cut a deal. With the help of Matthew Shepard's parents, he avoided a possible death sentence by pleading guilty in exchange for two life sentences.

By granting McKinney his life. Matthew Shepard's parents showed that the gay-panic defense is completely baseless. Indeed, could McKinney's rage from an unwanted sexual advance remotely compete with the rage that the Shepards felt in

losing their son? Hardly.

Matthew Shepard's parents are truly amazing individuals. From somewhere within themselves they were able to muster up mercy for the one who showed their son no mercy.

Personally, I'm glad Matthew's parents could find in Matthew's death a lesson to teach-that hate never justifies taking the life of another.

I am not so magnanimous as Matthew Shepard's parents. I hope Aaron McKinney learns a different lesson in a Wyoming penitentiary. I hope he learns that unwanted sexual advances-perceived or real-do not justify murder. And, I hope he learns it the hard way.

chapter titled "A Place at Which

Finally, even more telling is the effect of A Place at the Table on what Bawer called the "silent majority" of gays. In the early 1990s, gav women and men were coming out of their closets from every nook and cranny of America. This wave included a lot of people who were uncomfortable with the prevailing notion of gays as a radical, sex-obsessed fringe. What they saw to their dismay was a gay movement that often reinforced that stereotype, failed to reflect their outlook and attitudes, derided religion, deliberately offended middle-America with its language and dress, and increasingly called itself "queer."

Even though his book put forth few wholly original arguments. Bawer spoke to this generation in a way no one had before. One of my gay friends told me that as he read A Place at the Table alone in his living room, he came across passages that literally caused him to jump up on his couch and shout "Yes!" It was an experience shared by many others for whom reading the book was a revelation. Finally, someone was speaking for them and to them.

Bawer told them they could, indeed they must, be a part of a cause that had somehow always seemed alien.

So in the wake of A Place at the Table, this new generation got involved in politics through groups like the Log Cabin Republicans and made the moderate Human Rights Campaign the largest and richest gay political organization ever. They insisted that gay organizations put issues like marriage at the top of the agenda. They went back to church. They published their own essays in Beyond Queer, a book that self-confidently "challeng[ed] gay left orthodoxy." They set up a popular website, the Independent Gay Forum (http://indegayforum.org/), for their writings. They refused to sit still for lectures-from either the gay left or the religious right-about who they should be and what they should think.

A Place at the Table wasn't solely responsible for all of this. Much of it would have happened anyway, sooner or later. But the book brought it together, nurtured it, and sent it on its way. Bawer's world, to a very large extent, is now our world; his methods, our methods; his goals, our goals. He wrote the book of the decade and changed gay politics forever.

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


The Golden Globes and Proposition 22 share 'Will & Grace'

LAMBDA CENTER

Lifere's a place for that New Year's resolution. Formed in The early 1970s, the Lambda Center provides a safe community meeting place for gay and lesbian Alcoholics Anonymous meetings, as well as Al-Anon and other offshoots-and January is always the biggest month for attendance. • According to the president of the Lambda Center (who remains anonymous in keeping with the AA code), about 10 percent of the general population has problems with alcohol, as opposed to about 35 percent of the gay and lesbian community. So often, bars are a primary way for socializing. Even more, gays and lesbians have to deal with so much societal and internal oppression that it's no wonder many seek escape through alcohol. . The Lambda Center offers a refuge and entry point for gay and lesbian alcoholics who seek recovery. It was started in the mid-1970s when a small dedicated group said how much a gay AA center was needed; it's challenging enough to face one's drinking problem, without having to face prejudice because of one's sexual orientation. "I stopped drinking on February 5, 1984," says the president of the Lambda Center. "If there had not been a gay AA meeting that day, I would [never have gotten into the program]." . All meetings are freethe center uses donations to cover costs (which run about \$8,000 a month, if you'd like to help out). Located in a spacious building one block north of West Gray and just east of Montrose, the center has a friendly welcoming atmosphere, although all within use the anonymous firstname tradition of AA.
