Queer characters return and Queer Duck premieres





Gays Protected?

inally, some good news. Sort of. Many in the community know about the 1998 murder of Marc Kais, by his ex-lover Ilhan Yilmaz, outside Urbana restaurant. Yilmaz had been stalking and threatening Kajs for about seven months. Kajs had sought protection from the Houston police numerous times, including the early morning before his death when Yilmaz actually chased Kajs into the police storefront on Westheimer. The police told Kajs they couldn't help him because he didn't have a restraining order and sent him away. That morning after Kajs got off his shift waiting tables at brunch at Urbana, Yilmaz came for Kajs with a gun, chasing him down Montrose and shooting him eight times before also killing himself.

Marc Kajs's mother, Gloria Swidriski, has sued the city of Houston, saying that they are responsible for her son's death, asserting that they did not take adequate action to protect people in domestic violence cases, especially when the

partners are gay. The case had enough serious implications that the national ACLU filed a brief on its behalf.

What people may not know is that the city of Houston's lawyers contended that the police were not required to protect Kajs because gays and lesbians are not protected by the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment of the Constitution. (That's the one that says "[No state shall] deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.") And a U.S. District Court decided in favor of this incredible piece of reasoning, according to Rosenberg.

So the good news is that on December 12, 2001, the U.S. Court of Appeals in New Orleans reversed the lower court's opinion and said that, yes, gays and lesbians do deserve equal protection under the law, including in domestic violence cases.

Basically, what Marc Kajs' mother has won is the right to a trial. A date has not yet been set.

Calling Gay Vets

A Houston chapter has been formed of the Gay, Lesbian & Bisexual Veterans of America, a national group with chapters from Palm Springs to San Antonio. Calling themselves America's "unwanted warriors," GLBVA dedicates its efforts to overcoming the ban on gay service in the military and on creating a sense of pride in gay service members and veterans.

There was a local chapter of GLBVA about a decade ago, but after several years of existence, it faded away. The Houston GLBVA meetings will be held the first Monday of the month at the Houston Lesbian & Gay Community Center, 803 Hawthorne. fter 11 years of teaching the Positive Art Work shops, Patrick Palmer is passing on the, er...paint brush. To recognize his years of work teaching art to HIV-positive students, the National Council of Jewish Women will honor Palmer on February 5 with the Hannah G. Solomon Award; named for the group's founder, the award is "the highest honor given by the organization to individuals who have been a catalyst for social change."

Palmer originally got the idea for the classes after his best friend, Jim Hemesath, died in 1990. "In my attempt to do 'something,'" Palmer said, "I realized all I could do was teach and paint! So I set up the course, which originally was just a 10week workshop which never stopped."

The classes were originally at the Art League, and then moved

National Briefs

RELIEF FOR 9/11 GAY WIDOWS AND WIDOWERS

Gay and lesbian partners of those killed in the September 11 terrorist attacks on the United States will be able to apply to the federal victims compensation fund for relief.

Congress directed the Justice Department to make rules for how the claims should be heard and gave broad discretion to Kenneth Feinberg, who was named to oversee the fund. Feinberg (whose title is "Special Master") is required to award funds based on individual circumstances. Feinberg will therefore consider the merits of each same-sex partner claim under the regulations, and can provide recovery to same-sex partners based on a variety of determining factors. The Special Master can grant the same funding to same-sex partners as married spouses would receive should he determine the partner was a "dependent" of the victim.

"Gay and lesbian survivors will get relief from the fund, and we applaud the Justice Department and Ken Feinberg for achieving this important federal milestone," said Rich Tafel, executive director of Log Cabin Republicans. "We would have preferred that the

regulations were more specific and the recovery process simpler, but we are fully confident that Ken Feinberg, on behalf of the Bush administration, will settle every case fairly and equitably."

LGBT YOUTH-RUN ACTION

On April 10, the Gay, Lesbian, and Straight Education Network (GLSEN) will stage the Day of Silence Project, in partnership with the United States Students Association -making it the largest youth-run LGBT action in the country.

First started in 1996 by students at the University of Virginia, the Day of Silence Project is a full-day action in which students take a vow of silence to protest the discrimination faced by LGBT people. Instead of speaking, participants hand out "speaking cards" printed with a message that explains why they have chosen not to talk. The Day of Silence Project now occurs in hundreds of high schools and colleges across the country.

"The Day of Silence Project can be a tremendously powerful launching pad for youth

to make a concrete difference in their school communities," said Chris Tuttle, national student organizer.

NOW WE CAN GET THEM!

Two AIDS activists were jailed November 28 in San Francisco under the new federal anti-terrorism legislation, with bail set at \$500,000 each, in a case that calls up concerns about Bush's use of the September 11 attack to eliminate our civil liberties.

Michael Petrelis and David Pasquarelli were arrested as a result of a "phone zap" action, in which they urged people to call public health officials and news reporters about the proposed Model State Emergency Health Powers Act, what they describe as an AIDS quarantine proposal.

"The men currently languish in jail with little prospect of release," said a letter protesting the arrests signed by such gay public persons as Steve Ault and Harvey Fierstein. "The prospect of high bail and escalating criminal charges for protest is a genuine threat to civil liberties.

"All of these cases send a clear message to others who might engage in protest. In this new legal and political climate, activists must beware."

HIV - Related Weight Loss / "Wasting"

Montrose Clinic / Body Positive Wellness Center is doing a research study to see how a 12-week weight training program with nutritional counseling, with or without an oral anabolic steroid, affects lean body mass in men with HIV related weight loss.

All study volunteers will have 12 weeks of supervised weight training, and will receive nutritional counseling. Participants will be assigned by chance to receive an oral anabolic steroid or a placebo. Odds are 50/50 of receiving the steroid.

THERE IS REASON FOR OPTIMISM THIS NEW YEAR

Three blows against gay victimhood

"SANCHEZ FOR GOVERNOR"

Why Republicans are nervous and Democrats are cautiously optimistic

ith Republicans holding every statewide office in Texas, most would think it's a bad time to be a Democrat in Texas. Not me. I think it's a great time to be a Democrat in Texas. To fully appreciate the possibilities of what Democrats might do in next year's November elections, consider the recent Houston mayor's race.

Just last month, Orlando Sanchez-an incredibly conservative Republican in a largely Democratic city—came within a few points of pulling off a major political upset that would have been a feather in the Republican Party's cap and the first nail in the Democratic Party's coffin. Both parties know that their political destiny lies largely in the hands of the fastest-growing voting bloc in the nation-Hispanics.

That's why both national parties poured money into a local city election. That's why George and Barbara Bush appeared in an ad

with Sanchez. And, that's why former New York Mayor Rudy Giuliani taped an ad for a candidate he doesn't even know.

Republicans are scared. They realize that if they are to keep their iron grip on Texas politics, they are going to have to make inroads into the Hispanic community. In Orlando Sanchez, Republicans saw an opportunity to finally put an Hispanicfriendly face on a party that is so institutionally xenophobic that its platform seeks the "immediate adoption of American English as the official language of Texas." (Do Spanishspeaking Hispanics really pose a greater threat to the King's English than native Tex-

Now, even though Sanchez lost, Republicans are saying that his close finish indicates they really are making inroads into the Hispanic community. They point to the fact that the number of Hispanic voters from the last mayoral election-when Brown defeated Rob

Mosbacher and carried a majority of the Hispanic vote-doubled. They brag that this time, Brown got only 25 percent of the Hispanic vote. Sanchez got 75 percent.

What the Republicans ignore, however, is that while Sanchez did get 75 percent of the Hispanic vote, Brown got 98 percent of the African-American vote. In other words, if the Hispanic community had stood behind Sanchez like the African-American community stood behind Brown, ex-council member Sanchez would be Mayor Sanchez. The problem for Republicans is that 25 percent

ay writers, newspapers, and organi-Tzations tend to emphasize the bad things that happen in life. And 2001 was, in some ways, a bad year for gays. The fourth largest city in the country, Houston, voted to ban health and other benefits for the same-sex domestic partners of gay city employees. The military maintained-at least officially-its "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy despite the wartime need for personnel. And, of course, the long national nightmare that is Britney Spears continues with no end in sight.

Nevertheless, tucked away in news summaries about antigay ballot initiatives and the latest tussles with the Boy Scouts, three little items might have escaped your attention. Each is good news, though victim-mongers out there will manage to find the cloud in the silver lining. Here they are:

(1) Survey shows gays feel more accepted. The Kaiser Family Foundation re-

cently polled by telephone 405 randomly selected, self-identified gays in 15 major U.S. cities. Pollsters interviewed the subjects about their experience of discrimination and their encounters with verbal and physical abuse. The survey found that 76 percent of gay people believe they are more accepted now by their fellow Americans than they were a few years ago.

According to the Kaiser Family Foundation's survey of the general population, more Americans than ever before report knowing someone who is gay: 62 percent now say they have a gay friend or acquaintance, as compared to 55 percent three years ago and just 24 percent in 1983.

Gay Americans are heeding the call to come out of the closet. And that honesty appears to be paying off in the form of unquestionably softened public attitudes about homosexuality.

Skeptics will point out that the Kaiser

survey hardly eliminates doubts about how deep acceptance of homosexuality really is. There are, to begin, the usual questions about survey methodology. Because the survey required gay people to identify themselves as gay (query: what survey of gay people could avoid relying on self-identification?) the sample might have been skewed and the results therefore flawed.

But it's hardly clear which way the "flaw" of reliance on self-identification would cut in a survey asking respondents whether they feel accepted. On the one



of the Hispanic community is so solidly Democratic that they refused to support an Hispanic candidate who is a Republican.

And that's what spells trouble for the Republican Party in Texas. Next fall, there will be another Sanchez on the ballot. This time. the Sanchez will be named Tony. And, this time, the Sanchez will be a Democrat.

If Hispanic voters across the state turn out next November like they did in the Houston mayor's race, Governor Rick Perry will be in trouble. Because instead of carrying 75 percent of the Hispanic vote as Orlando Sanchez did, this Sanchez could carry more than 90 percent of the Hispanic vote. If that happens, the Democrats can take back the governorship as well as other statewide offices.

Republicans say they're not worried. They point to Governor Perry's approval ratings, which are hovering around 60 percent. And, they point to preliminary polls, which show Perry has a 30-point lead over Sanchez (48 to 18 percent, with 34 percent undecided).

Republicans should not be so comfortable with these numbers. After all, when George Bush ran against Ann Richards, Richards had 60 percent approval ratings and a 30-point lead over Dubya just 10 months before the election. We all know how that turned out.

Year 2002 just might turn out to be an okay year to be a Democrat in Texas. It's about time.

with enough self-confidence to reveal their sexual orientation to a stranger over the phone may overestimate the degree to which others accept them; further, they may have sought out jobs and circles of friends where they really are more accepted. On the other hand, because of their openness, these same people may encounter more overt hostility than gays who remain closeted.

The survey also had some bad news. Some 74 percent of the respondents said they had encountered antigay verbal abuse, and 32 percent said they had been subjected to physical abuse or property destruction because of their sexual orientation.

But because we don't know when these incidents occurred, and because we have no comparative data from the past, it's hard to know whether there has been deterioration on the abuse front. It's possible that as more gays come out, especially in smaller towns and rural areas, they will be easier targets for the remaining homophobes who mean to do them harm. This suggests rising acceptance may paradoxically accompany a transient rise in hate crimes.

(2) Survey says gays are richer than straights. A new online survey of 6,300 selfidentified gay respondents sponsored by OpusComm Group in cooperation with Syracuse University has found that the median combined annual household income among gay couples is \$65,000. That's 60 percent higher than the U.S. median household income.

This might sound like good news. It suggests that, whatever obstacles gays face in life, we have overcome them to a large extent.


But the survey met immediate criticism. Dr. Lee Badgett, an economics professor at the University of Massachusetts, lambasted the survey's methodology, arguing that Internet users are not representative in that they tend to be wealthier and better educated than the general population. Badgett's own research has shown that individual gay men make less on the job than straight men. Her research has also shown that gay women earn about the same as straight women, though both groups earn less than men.

What's at stake in this debate? For gay magazines and newspapers, it's about luring potential advertisers who lust after wealthy readers. For gay civil rights advocates, however, surveys like this undercut the case for employment discrimination protection. If we're already better off, why do we need civil rights laws to make us equal?

(3) Survey says gay teens are less suicidal than we thought. Two new studies debunk the common assertion of gay civil rights groups that gay teens are three times more likely to attempt suicide than their straight peers. The studies, conducted by a Cornell University psychologist, found that gay teens are only slightly more likely to attempt suicide. Research heretofore on the topic had interviewed teens from support groups or shelters, where the most troubled vouths are found.

The Cornell studies concluded that gay youth do indeed have more difficult lives. "But most gay kids are healthy and resilient," says the researcher, Ritch Savin-Williams. He adds that studies exaggerating their suicide risk "pathologize gay youth, and that's not fair to them."

Evidence, even if not conclusive, of increasing acceptance, higher levels of income, and less dramatic suicide rates may not serve the cause of portraying gays as helpless victims of homophobia in need of state protection. But it gives some reason to cheer in the new year.





By listening to the residents of Matthew Shepard's hometown, The Laramie Project hopes to learn something about our own heart of darkness . . . and light



The Rock in the Road

Pedaling his mountain bike, University of Wyoming freshman Aaron Kreifels was having a good workout late Wednesday afternoon, October 7, 1998.→







His thighs burned. He had made it to the top of Cactus Canyon, but twilight was setting in, the temperature dropping. Riding back down, he took whatever trails looked easiest. He kept getting stuck in sand. He wanted to turn around but kept pushing forward. Although near the subdivision of Sherman Hills, on the outskirts of Laramie, he wasn't sure where he was. That's when he hit the rock. He flew over the handlebars and landed, surprisingly unhurt, in the middle of the dirt road. Brushing himself off and checking his bike, he noticed a shape near the rough fence that bordered the far back property line of a distant house under construction. A scarecrow, he thought distractedly, someone's put a scarecrow there for Halloween.

But as he walked his bike along the side closest to the dark figure slumped down against the fence, instead of straw, he saw hair on its head. The chest of the formless shape slowly moved up and down. The ground was black with blood. The grotesque shape had a face. The only clear patch of skin was where the tears had washed away the blood. Aaron Kreifels had found Matthew Shepard.

Watershed, November 1998

Matthew Shepard doesn't appear in The Laramie Project, but he infuses every line by his presence and every heartache by his absence. This is Laramie's storyhow the citizens of this very all-American town in this very all-America Wyoming react to a most horrific, senseless crime of gay bashing.

When Moisés Kaufman, award-winning gay author of Gross Indecency: The Three Trials of Oscar Wilde and artistic director of NYC's form-breaking Tectonic Theater Project, first heard about Matthew Shepard's murder, he knew instinctively he had found his next subject. Within a month, he and his company of 10 actors would travel to Laramie and interview anyone who would talk to them about Matt. Over the next year and a half and six more visits to the town, the group talked to more than 200 residents and amassed 400 hours of tape recordings. Out of this gargantuan amount of raw research, the Tectonic Theater gleaned, edited, and honed their new theatrical documentary into a razor-brilliant dissection of this clarifying moment in time when our collective hearts stopped.

"When Matthew was murdered," says Kaufman in a recent conversation with OutSmart, "our initial reaction was the same as a lot of people in the country: Oh my God, sorrow, sadness, shock. In the

days that followed the murder, you couldn't open a newspaper or turn on the TV without seeing a picture of Matthew, or at least seeing the event. . . . For some reason, this one resonated. This was a moment where we said, Wait a minute, what's going on?! It was a watershed moment in our culture."

Hapless, Hopeless Young Men

On the road toward humanity, Aaron McKinney and Russell Henderson took the path of least resistance. These young men, both 21-consciously or not-had committed themselves to living without dreams. Theirs were indeed lives of quiet desperation, filled with roiling frustration and volcanic outbursts of rage. Broken homes with messy divorces, petty criminal acts, heavy drug and alcohol use, the mire of poverty, low-rent girlfriends, the crushing weight of endless grimy boredom coupled with the mocking self-knowledge of no future-all coalesced into their strong bond of friendship. Both high school dropouts, neither would ever go farther than Wyoming state prison. Neither of them could dream any wider.

Once, Henderson might have soared. He was actually a good student: on the honor roll, an Eagle Scout, a Future Farmer of America. But his demons-a neglectful alcoholic mother, restrictive pinched Mormon grandparents, probable boyhood sexual abuse-caught up with him and he was too timid to defend himself.

Together, these two made a very lethal pair.


Matt Galloway, bartender at the Fireside, remembers the two as scruffy and gruff, with dirty hands, who paid for their \$5.50 pitcher of beer with dimes and

Unfortunately, Matt Shepard, nattily dressed as usual, was seated at the bar that night. Easygoing and garrulous, Matt could talk to anyone, and usually did. Earlier that evening he had attended a meeting of U.W.'s Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgendered Association, which he had joined two weeks prior. According to friend Romaine Patterson, Choo-Choo (as Matt's closest friends called him) was stoked about school and heartily enjoyed helping LGBTA with their preparations for Pride Week. After the meeting, when he couldn't convince anyone else to go out with him to the bar, another friend drove him home and watched him walk safely into his apartment.

No one knows why he later decided to go out by himself. Matt showed up at the bar at 10:30 p.m. By midnight, he had left with Henderson and McKinney.

The Director

With his spiked black hair, cool downtown style, and effusive charm, Rob Bundy (pictured), Stages' artistic director and director of The Laramie Project, might be a grown-up Bart Simpson, occasionally tweaking the nose of his older sister, the refined, Tony-winning uptown Alley, with his provocative productions and imaginative stagings. Last August, he directed



The Laramie Project at the prestigious Chautauqua Institution in upstate New York, and he's chomping to have another go at it and present it to Houston audiences.

"It's really a play about hope," Bundy explains in his office filled with Stages memorabilia. "For the gay audience member, it talks about how a community awakens to understanding that the 'other' is not so foreign. It's presented in human terms-this enormous sense of hope because the whole nation suddenly woke up and said, This is wrong. For the straight community, it was a quote/unquote Mom and Dad who were saving our son was brutally murdered because he was different. I think that welcomes the straight audience to look at Matthew Shepard as actually one of [their] own children.

"It asks the question what happens when bad things happen in good communities. It's about a community coming to terms with and learning how to accept that we are like this-[realizing that] the whole 'live and let live' mentality is as flawed as the 'don't ask, don't tell' mentality. It is this really beautiful journey from grief into hope. When the Tectonic Company came in and started interviewing people, it gave them an opportunity to

start to articulate their thoughts and feelings about this event. In doing so, the community was able to heal."

"Hey, guess what? We're not gay and we're gonna jack you up!"

A surprised and frightened Matt sat between Henderson and McKinney, handing over his wallet as commanded. But they beat him anyway. First with fists, then the butt of McKinney's .357 Magnum. The undersides of Matt's arms would be covered in bruises from trying to ward off the blows. By the time they drove out past the sleeping subdivision, the front seat was splattered with blood. Matt never had a chance.

Matt pleaded, but to no avail. They

tied his hands together behind his back and then tied him to the fence rail. They kicked him repeatedly. McKinney kept beating him with the gun. They took his black patent leather shoes, in case he freed himself and tried to escape. They mocked his pleas to stop and hit him some more, cracking open the back of his skull. They left him for dead.

Dry Statistics

The latest national report from the FBI, released November 2001 and covering the previous year, shows a two percent increase in hate crimes. Defined by the American Psychological Association as "violent acts against people, property, or organizations because of the group with which they are identified," hate crimes

have held steady at around 8,000 per year.

In Texas, even with our newly passed James Byrd Jr. Hate Crimes Law, the crime rate dropped, but the number of hate crimes rose from 267 reported in 1999 to 286 in 2000, an increase of seven percent. Texas is one of 42 states with a law that recognizes hate crimes as a category. Wyoming, the Equality State where Matthew Shepard lived and died, does not. Half of all reported hate crimes last year were committed against blacks.

The Texas State Department of Public Safety has released these figures: Aggravated and simple assault: 31 percent of hate crimes. Intimidation: 27 percent. Race: 56 percent. Antigay: 17 percent. Religious bias: 15 percent. The remainder were ethnic or disability bias.





The perpetrators of 55 percent of hate crimes were white, 10.5 percent were black, and 32 percent were of "unknown

Eighty-four percent of hate crimes were against individuals, with 8.5 percent against religious organizations.

Quo Vadis Matthew?

The death of Matthew Shepard galvanized the world unlike any other gaybashing murder. Moisés Kaufman sees it in almost political terms as a defining moment for America, one whose cascades of meaning flowed together at the most opportune moment.


"There were several things that contributed to this. One is the symbolic nature of the crime: It was a crucifixion. And you can't do that in this culture without getting an incredible amount of attention. He was young and a student, very pretty to look at, a very good-looking young man. In that sense he was cameraready; we could all identify with him. So that his being murdered meant something very, very different than an African-American drag queen who goes home with someone and gets murdered at home. This was a victim that all of America could very quickly digest.

"But we were ready for this to resonate. If the exact same murder had happened 10 years ago, we weren't there yet. Our awareness and our consciousness as a nation is slowly evolving. And now we're ready to understand and think about things that until now we weren't ready to do.

"I'm very interested-and the company's very interested—in what we call watershed moments: moments where a certain culture is faced with itself. Like the trials of Oscar Wilde, when an event happened of such magnitude that it served as a lightning rod. If you listen at moments like that, you can hear the ideologies and the beliefs and things that form a certain culture at a certain time. If you read the transcripts from the trials, you can hear how Victorian men and women were thinking and feeling and processing their lives, not only about homosexuality but about Victorian society, about education, about class, about religion.

"So the idea was that if we went to Laramie and we listened to the town, we might capture something about where not only Laramie, but perhaps the entire nation, was at the end of the millennium. Not only in relationship to homosexuality, but in relationship to class, education, violence, religion-all the ideological pillars of our culture." ->

"The play is very uplifting," says Chris Jimmerson (pictured above), artistic director of Unhinged Productions and coproducer of Laramie. "You come away really believing that, as a culture and a society, we can move past our hate. Actually, what happened to Matthew may help some people: seeing how this one event very personally affected a lot of people besides the direct victim of the event."

"This is such an all-American play," says director Bundy, "-both the good and the bad, the open and the closed. It's all there. It's not hoity-toity poetry onstage. It's the residents of Laramie, Wyoming, sharing their thoughts and feelings in their own words. This is not a straightbashing play, either. All the characters on both sides of the issue are so fairly rendered that it allows the audience to identify with them, understand them, and really see them. It's very nonjudgmental, which is really important. It's something I strive to honor."

I give you life in the memory of one who no longer lives


Matt Shepard was not perfect, as his parents constantly had to point out to counter the martyrdom backlash, especially during the media frenzy in the weeks after his death. He did rash, foolish things to mask his fear and insecurity, usually to his own bemusement. He was a little skin-

ny guy, 5'2", 105 pounds, size 7 shoe. But everyone who ever met him remembers his beaming smile and gregarious nature. He was a very likeable, winsome young

And he was strong, his character sound. Twice he was beaten up by straights who thought he was coming on to them. Once, on a summer holiday in Morocco before high school senior year, he was accosted and raped by a street gang. But he had the fortitude to report his humiliation to the police. When he left the country, the local police were so impressed by this stalwart young American student that they gave him souvenirs. And lately, he had met an older man from Denver over the Internet. After weeks of lengthy correspondence in which they had gotten acquainted and secure with each other, Matt invited him to Laramie for their first weekend together. Brian was to arrive October 9. Matt was lying in the hospital unconscious that day, dying.

For 18 hours he was tied to the fence on that windy Wyoming high plain, under blazing stars, then unrelenting sun. He was bleeding to death, his head bashed in, suffering hypothermia during the nearfreezing night, before Kreifels literally stumbled onto him. At the hospital, the doctors couldn't operate because his head was so mangled. How he managed to hold on for as long as he did-until his parents arrived from Saudi Arabia to say their last goodbyes-is yet one more example of Matthew's incredible will to live and his love for life.

Matthew Shepard's story is first among equals of those who have suffered senseless torments because of sexual orientation. He means as much to the world as he does to the characters depicted onstage in The Laramie Project. He may never have craved the attention nor the notoriety from victimhood, but he has it now. He is our symbol of hope, as blazing as the canopy of stars over his broken body. And we will never forget.



THE PAPERBACK In the aftermath of the Matthew Shepard murder, the people of Laramie, Wyoming, as well as the world, were trying to understand the hate and fear that could bring about such a tragedy. In November 1998, award-winning play-

wright Moisés Kaufman and nine members of his theater company traveled to Laramie. What they found were the voices of real people responding to tragedy in their midst. Matthew Shepherd was not the only hate crime.

Although the death of Matthew Shepard and the community aftereffects have been immortalized on stage in Kaufman's Laramie Project, as has the murder of transgender Teena Brandon in two powerful films, sadly these young people have not been the first-nor will they be the last-victims of senseless violence and hatred against sex-

As a web sidebar to The Laramie Project, OutSmart has compiled descriptions of four recent hate crimes, two occurring in Houston last year. These killings probably will never be dramatized nor carry the emotional weight that overlay Shepard and Brandon's deaths, but every victim needs to be commemorated if only to keep us vigilant, wary, and angry enough to continue the fight for change and social equality. HOW TO GET REAL

Real healthy, that is. Ten steps for actually achieving your health goals in the new year.

his year I'm gonna . . . whatever. Heard it be-fore? Maybe even said it before? What's kept you from reaching those lofty goals, anyway? Chances are it wasn't a lack of desire. Well, this year will be different. Take charge of your health and plan for success this year with the following tips for a fantastic you in 2002!

1) SET A GOAL: What is your goal? It doesn't work if you say you're going to eat better this year but you don't know whether you want to gain

weight or lose it. So, be as specific as possible. Outline what you want to accomplish with your physique, and write it down. Nothing helps you more through the tough times (when you feel like quitting) than being able to review your game plan. Setting your goal gives you direction and guides you through making the right decisions when it comes to your fitness routine.



2) FIND A GYM: Weight training is a must for healthy living. If you aren't currently a member of a gym, then take time to research your options. Sure, you can always send away for one of those "home gyms" that are advertised on TV, but, come on, will it really have a chance when

> the first thing you see when you come home from work is your TV or refrigerator? Probably not. Put your money to better use. Join a gym.

Just make sure that you research your gym eptions before signing on the dotted line. Make sure the gym suits your equipment or group class needs, that it's near either work or home, and that it is clean, safe, and friendly. If it helps, make a list of what's important to you before you approach a gym membership desk, and interview at least three locations before making your final decision. If sales staff apply pressure to have you commit immediately ("We're only extending this special offer for today . . . "), then mark them off your list and move on. Gyms like these are more interested in their sales numbers than they are in their quality.

3) GET HELP: There's something to be said about knowing what you know. If you know enough to realize that you plus that weight bar can cause serious injury (even death) to yourself (and possibly innocent bystanders), then you are smart enough to know when it's time to seek the help of a professional. Personal trainers are excellent guides in this area.
