The nonprofit clinic has provided the HIV services for more than 12 years. "We serve people who are already struggling to meet financial and medical obligations," executive director Jerry Larson says. "Paying for an attorney is simply not an option for them."

Admission to the event is \$5. A silent auction of products and services will also raise funds.





PRICE OF PIETY

Some religious leaders promote politics over theology

any bishops and priests in the Catholic Church have begun denving communion to Catholic politicians who support any type of abortionrights legislation. The presumptive Democratic presidential nominee, Senator John Kerry, has recently been told by more than one bishop not to bother coming to the communion table. If Kerry attempts to take communion, those bishops say they will withhold communion from Kerry because of his support for abortion rights.

Now the Catholic bishop of a Colorado diocese has gone a step farther. He has told the priests in his diocese that it is appropriate to withhold communion from any parishioner who supports any candidate who favors abortion rights or gay rights.

The idea that Catholic politicians should ultimately be accountable to their bishops. or the Vatican, first popped up during the 1960 presidential campaign of John Kennedy, the first and only Catholic ever elected president. When Protestants voiced their concerns that, if elected, Kennedy would answer to the pope, Kennedy made it clear he would not. The Catholic Church did not respond by threatening Kennedy. And it certainly did not threaten Catholics who planned to vote for him.

Almost 50 years later, Kerry is saying essentially the same thing that Kennedy said. Kerry has stated that his decisions as president would "be guided by his obligation to all the people of our country and to the constitution of the United States." Not the Catholic Church, and not the Vatican.

So why are so many Catholic leaders threatening Kerry, and politicians like him, who might personally oppose abortion but defer to the electorate and the Supreme Court's 30-year-old decision that Americans have a constitutional right to choose to have an abortion?


It would be nice to believe that those Catholics who are threatening to withhold communion from politicians and Catholic voters do so out of piety, not politics. But, if that were so, those same Catholic leaders would threaten to withhold communion from any politician or parishioner who supports the death penalty, the right to divorce, contraception on demand, stem-cell research, or even the war in Iraq (which the Vatican opposed). They're not.

What is clear from the Catholic leaders' decision to threaten only those who support abortion rights and gav rights is that those leaders are injecting themselves into the political process for political reasons, not religious ones.

And that's okay. If churches-Catholic or otherwise-want to engage in political lobbying on controversial issues like abortion and gay rights, or become the

Same-gender marriage will breed queer folk, opponents fear

ill gav marriage produce more homosexuals? For many who oppose gay marriage, the prospect that it will lead more people to homosexuality is a powerful (if often unstated) reason to oppose it. They need not fear: Gay marriage is unlikely to have that effect, though it will probably make it seem as if there are more homosexuals. But even if gay marriage did have the effect of increasing the number of homosexuals in the population, that would not be reason by itself to oppose gav marriage.

Gav marriage will likely affect public attitudes about homosexuality. Gays will be seen in stable, committed, long-term relationships. Those relationships will enjoy as much respect as the law can provide because they will be accorded rights, privileges, and protections equal to heterosexual marriages. They will be called marriages, both in the law and in our culture. This will provide a

language of ritual in which to speak about gay relationships that is familiar to straight Americans. Gay couples will no longer be "partners," but spouses or husbands or wives. Gay couples will have engagements, weddings, and honeymoons. These words will be used, for the first time, without winks and nods, without knowing exaggeration.

We can expect, therefore, that over time gay marriage will have the effect of softening opposition to homosexuality in general. It will help alleviate some of the stigma that attaches to homosexuality.

That is not the only, or even the primary, reason to support gay marriage. The better reasons to support it are to encourage longterm coupling among gav men and women. to reduce the individual and social miseries and costs often associated with being single, to protect existing gay couples from significant legal and social disadvantage, and to support gay families in which children

are raised. But reducing the hatred of homosexuals will certainly be a welcome consequence of recognizing gay marriages.

For some, however, this positive byproduct of gay marriage carries a significant risk. Gay marriage, in this view, will be a subsidy for homosexuality. And everyone knows that when you subsidize something you get more of it. Similarly, stigma is now part of the cost of homosexuality. Reduce the cost of something and you get more demand for it. Presto, more homosexuals.

Everything we have learned about human sexual orientation over the past half century confounds this seemingly logical conclusion. Human sexual orientation appears to be both unchosen and unchangeable. Whether it is biologically or genetically determined, or simply set at a very young age, sexual orientation does not respond to social influences designed to lead it in a different direction. Efforts to "treat" ->

"religious" arm of a political party, they should be able to do so. But their political efforts should not be tax-exempt.

Lobbying organizations have to pay for the privilege to affect outcomes in elections. They are not tax-exempt. If religious leaders want to turn pulpits into political podiums. they should have to forfeit their tax-exempt status. Otherwise, why not form the First Church of the Human Rights Campaign?

or to "convert" homosexuals have a long history of failure and no reliable evidence

Further, we have no good evidence for the existence of "waverers," people whose sexual orientation is on the line between homosexuality and heterosexuality and who may be led in one direction or the other by social and personal influences. Homosexuals are not created by seduction. recruitment, or propaganda.

As conservative legal scholar and federal judge Richard Posner has concluded, homosexuality appears "to be no more common in tolerant than in repressive societies." For example, there is no evidence that the relative acceptance of homosexuality in the Netherlands and Belgium, both of which recognize gay marriage, has caused an increase in the number of homosexuals.

So gay marriage will not likely increase the number of homosexuals. It will, however, increase levels of happiness among existing homosexuals. How could that be a bad thing?

By helping to reduce the stigma of homosexuality, gay marriage will also increase the proportion of homosexuals who are open and honest about their sexual orientation. That's because the potential costs of being out-like losing a job, alienating family members and friends, and risking hate violence-will be reduced. So after gay marriage is recognized, it may well seem there are more homosexuals than before.

Perhaps, however, even if gay marriage does not increase the number of homosexuals, it will increase the amount of homosexual sexual activity. Again, this would count as a significant cost of gay marriage to many who oppose it.

Will gay marriage lead to an increase in homosexual sexual activity? It is hard to say. On the one hand, we may conjecture that the stigma-reducing effect of gay marriage may lead to more homosexual experimentation, and at a vounger age, by homosexuals and even by heterosexuals.

On the other hand, gay marriage may reduce homosexual activity in other ways. As I have argued, gay marriage would not be a subsidy for homosexuality in general because sexual orientation is immune to a system of rewards and punishments.


But gay marriage will be a subsidy for homosexual monogamy. And everyone knows that when you subsidize something. you get more of it.


So the overall effect of gay marriage may be neither a net gain nor a net loss in homosexual activity.

All of this discussion is predicated on the assumption that there is something bad about homosexuality; otherwise, there would be nothing to fear from an increase in the number of homosexuals or homosexual activity.

And the judgment that homosexuality is somehow bad rests, in turn, on essentially religious grounds. Try as they might to resist this characterization of their position, religion is what opponents of gay marriage must ultimately rest their case upon.

irst and foremost, let me wish everyone a happy Pride Month! I know there are those who complain each year about why we need to celebrate or be proud of being GLBT. Simply put, we aren't. We aren't proud of something in our lives that is immutable and indelibly part of who we are. We are celebrating the fact that we are still here and still thriving in the face of insults and assaults, indignities and inequities. We're alive for one more year. Our lives get better every year, and our worth and dignity as human beings is more affirmed each year. That's worth celebrating.

Second, let me bid a sorrowful farewell to my friend, trusted advisor, and invaluable political teammate Grant Martin. He and spouse Paul Fromberg have moved to San Francisco. Grant managed my three successful council campaigns, my controller's campaign, and the heartbreaking Prop. 2 campaign on city domestic partner benefits. He helped elect friends like Ada Edwards and Garnet Coleman and helped my fellow activist Sue Lovell run a strong council campaign. He launched PVA (Progressive Voters Alliance) from my campaign, and we helped it grow together. He is irreplaceable and will be missed.

Office Update

As I write this, slightly more than 100 days have elapsed since I took office as the new

Overall, the controller's fiscal watchdogs are working extremely well as a team to guard taxpayers' dollars, save money, and maximize the safe investment of public

First, I must commend my 76 staff members for making this job so much easier than it could have been. My three deputy controllers and the city auditor are topnotch professionals who think far outside

the bureaucratic box. They lead a capable and hardworking staff.

The treasury division under Jim Moncur continues to shine. Our investments are rated AAAf, and our debt ratings (essentially the city's credit rating) range from A1 on up.

My auditing division, directed by Steve Schoonover, has found more than \$100 million in potential savings in the past five years through unannounced audits. The team recently exposed virtual lack of controls at a health department pharmaceutical warehouse.

Mary Ann Grant keeps the operations and technical services division humming along, producing vendor and payroll checks, checking to ensure we have money to pay for items on the council agenda, responding to open records requests, and archiving city

When former controller Judy Gray-Johnson left earlier this year to become

finance and administration department director. I was most fortunate to acquire the expertise and leadership of F&A assistant director Susan Bandy. If that name rings a bell, it's because Susan did such an incredible job on the 2012 Olympic effort. Now she directs the staff that produces the monthly financial and operating reports as well as the annual financial report. (Find out more about my team by visiting my web page.)

Mayoral Marvel

Despite a (remarkably) few political missteps with council members and some serious anxiety over city pension underfunding, Mayor Bill White's honeymoon continues with much of the public.

The midnight oil (or an alternative fuel) burns at City Hall, and it's casting light on a range of issues this hands-on mayor is determined to tackle. The pace of change and improvement is impressive.

Performance Audits


I was pleasantly reminded about one of my top priorities this morning when council member Shelly Sekula-Gibbs brought up the fact that last year council passed my motion requesting a charter amendment to allow the controller to conduct performance


She wondered what difference it might have made if my office had been allowed to conduct a performance audit of the municipal pension system and noted that council needs this kind of help scrutinizing city departments.


Previous mayors have fought acknowledging that the controller has this authority. But at the request of Mayor White, my office conducted an unprecedented performance audit of city and Metro street and bridge construction contractors. Although the controller's audit division conducts financial, inventory, and contract compliance audits, it has rarely conducted audits in which we evaluate whether or not performance goals are reached. Interestingly, we found that most of the project overruns were caused by unforeseen conditions or inadequate design work, not the contractors. We also discovered that the records in public works for the period examined were so inadequate that they could not have been effectively used to establish contractor accountability. 





5 business questions for Mattison Grey

mpower, the June 12–13 expo presented by the Greater Houston GLBT Chamber of Commerce, will feature presentations by a range of experts in the community. We checked in with one of these mavens, Mattison Grey, the business and career coach.

Tim Brookover: What can Empower visitors expect from your presentations this year?

Mattison Grey: People can expect them to be fun, educational, and inspiring. My goal is to give people something that they can take home and use immediately in order to get more of what they want.

What is the one point you hope people will take away after they see you? How to stay focused on their big goals.

How to stay focused on their big goals, while managing all the other stuff.

What is one thing people can do to reach their personal goals?

The most important thing people can do is write down their goals in a clear, measurable way and create a "by when" date. In other words, have a way to know when you have reached your goal and make a deadline. A great example of this that we have all experienced: When you were in school,

there was always a date for each test. The test was going to happen whether you were ready or not, so consequently most of the time you were pretty prepared. What would have happened in school if the teacher decided you could take the test whenever you wanted to? Deadlines are absolutely the key to getting things done.

What is a common mistake people make in striving to attain their goals?


The most common mistake people make is not creating a system of accountability. Most people can't truly hold themselves accountable. You have to find some way or someone outside of yourself to hold yourself accountable to do what you said you are going to do. Ask a friend, teacher, or coach to help you stay accountable to your goals. If you know someone is going to be checking on you, you are more likely to do something. I often say as a coach

that my job is to make clients do what they want to do.

Where can people who don't make it to Empower catch you?

On June 25, I am presenting "Reality Selling," a day-long fee-based seminar at the Houston GLBT Community Center that will show how to find out what your customers really want and help them to get it. Anyone whose income depends on the quality of their interaction with people can benefit. Then, in cooperation with the community center, I will be starting a free coaching evening in July. DEATH BECOMES HIM

Writer Dean James publishes his latest murderous mystery

cramped office at Murder by the Book, the mystery bookstore he manages, I notice he's wearing a Rice University shirt. That seems fitting since his alma mater is the setting for his latest book, Death by Dissertation.

His 13th book and one of three to be released in 2004. Death by Dissertation (Silver Dagger Press) revolves around the murder of a Rice University graduate student, Charlie Harper. That character, Simon, is a medieval historian by training, and he writes nonfiction books about medieval England. He also writes mysteries and romance novels under a pseudonym.

A lot of gay fiction has only gay characters doing only gay things in only gay settings Olivia Flores Alvarez: You set the story at and is meant for only gay readers. Your work isn't like that at all. The world you create is very much like the real world. Some characters are gay, some are straight, some we don't know about. You have a mix of characters with different sexualities, from different backgrounds, of different races and personalities.

> I just went to a writers' conference in New Orleans, the Saints and Sinners Literary Festival. It's all gay writers in all different fields, everything from poetry to erotica. Being among them, I sometimes felt that my characters aren't gay enough. Everyone is so political and writes lots of explicit sex and all this stuff. I write for a fairly broad audience.

I want to reach mystery readers, not just gay mystery readers. I write for anyone who likes this type of cozy mystery, where there isn't a lot of violence. Grandmothers can read this and not be upset because there isn't a lot of gore or torture or anything like

I try to write for people who love mysteries. That's my audience, that's who I think of when I write.

I can see where people who aren't gay would want to read this.

My thought, and not to get too political about this, but my thought is that we have Some of your other books are set in England. to get along with everybody. I don't see the

this. This is a light book. I'm not trying to push an agenda down their throat. If I were writing an essay, maybe that would be different. But this is written for entertainment. and my job here is to entertain people.

Maybe people who are not gay will pick this up, maybe even someone who is a little homophobic will read it and then think, "Hey, these characters aren't that bad after all." Maybe.

The main thing is this is written to entertain. And it's not about gay characters vs. straight characters. It's all mixed up. There are some gay characters that are good, some gay characters that are bad. Some of the straights characters are nice, some are awful. Just like real life, there is some of everything.


One of your gay characters that is very, very bad is Charlie Harper, who, it seems, harps a lot. He is a nasty piece of work, isn't he? He is. [Laughs] I enjoy writing nasty characters; they're fun to play with. Plus I think I write them well. I'm sure that says something about me, but I'm not sure what.

This book is out from Silver Dagger Press.

Yes, it's a small press that's doing Southern mysteries. The family that owns it is actually Baptist, so them doing a gay mystery is kind of unusual. But they wanted books that weren't too violent and that didn't have explicit sex. Those aren't the kinds of books I write anyway, so one day I called them up and talked to the person who acquires titles for them and told her about this book and that the main character was gay. They're very broad-minded, which surprised me. That isn't my experience with most Baptists, but maybe I'm not their experience of most gay people. Maybe we surprised each other.

Gurlfriendz is a new band. Still, the members are music-world veterans with over 40 years' combined playing experience. They are ready to rock Montrose with a live show on the Mary's roof on the night of the parade. As usual, Mary's will sell a limited number of tickets for rooftop access. And on the roof with Gurlfriendz is a perfect way to rock into the night.

And the band definitely rocks, performing covers from heavy metal to the all-encompassing rock ballad. The gamut of rock is truly covered from Bush, the hard Godsmack as well as Audioslave. Throw in fan favorites like "When I'm Gone" by Three Doors Down and Nickelback and you'll be jumping and moshing in no time.

Sure, they're a cover band. But, honestly, how often do you see members of the transgender community in a band, much less a rock band? Although Gurlfriendz is the only transgender rock band in Texas, they are not alone in the nation. The San Francisco underground group Lipstick Conspiracy boasts being the first in the trans community to form a rock band. The debut album from Lipstick Conspiracy, which will perform on the main stage at the San Fran pride festival this month, recently hit stores.

No album is in the works as of yet from Gurlfriendz, but one thing is for sure. They rock. Watch out, babes, Gurlfriendz is coming out!

LONG LIVE THE QUEEN

A new documentary profiles Houston drag queen Wendy Chicago

endy Chicago is nothing if not and Mary's, He and editor (and co-producer) candid. As she prepares for a drag show, she glances into the camera and admits with a smile and disarming compact, yet rich, 20 minutes. At less than clarity: "Mama has a little drinking problem.

This startling moment of honesty amid the artifice is just one remarkable scene from a new documentary about Chicago, the 70-year-old Houston drag queen, directed by Walt Zipprian. The film will premiere during a June 18 show at the Axiom, home of the innovative theater company Infernal Bridegroom Productions, where Zipprian is an actor.

Zipprian began working on the docu- leave 'em wanting more."

mentary five years ago. He first saw Wendy perform in 1988 at the Lazy J, the nowclosed, down-at-heel Montrose

"I was at the old Pot Pie restaurant, having breakfast," Zipprian remembers. The waiter mentioned to him and a friend that he was appearing in a show that night for drag queens over 50. "We knew we had to go."

The waiter failed to impress. "But Wendy just bowled me over. She was by far the most creative one. While the other drag queens were trying to be somebody else, she was just Wendy. And she did all these songs by black women-Sarah Vaughn, Dinah Washington."

Zipprian, who had never made a movie, filmed Chicago at her cluttered one-bedroom Hyde Park apartment and backstage and onstage at EJ's

Mark Johnson then faced the task of whittling down 20 hours of footage into a half an hour (the length of a typical network sitcom sans commercials), the film may seem unexpectedly short. Viewers may find themselves wanting more Wendy. But Zipprian packs a tremendous amount of material into the short format: a well-off Midwest childhood, strained family relationships, love, loss, and, of course, a few drag

In fact, the brevity of the film adheres to the hoary show-business adage "Always

"We wanted to tell a short story," Zipprian says. "I also thought that Wendy was interesting for 20 minutes, but she might not be so interesting for an hour." The film opens with Chicago preparing

for a show and concludes with an uncertain yet riveting performance at Mary's. This final scene (actually the first filmed) sums up the particular strength of Zipprian's work: the gaze that is frank, though not unkind or ugly, and the eye for detail. He reveals that Chicago is a survivor, not a high-gloss, Vegas-style queen. Sometimes she forgets the words, and her lip-synching is generally an approximation, at best. She is rangy with a care-worn face. As she totters

across the stage, the camera catches the sparse, indifferent crowd familiar to anyone who has attended a bar show.

Zipprian, who works by day in the medical center, has submitted the documentary to the Houston Gay & Lesbian Film Festival and plans to enter the film in the next round of nationwide festivals for 2005. (In these efforts he gets help from his partner Rob Baker, who handles publicitytype duties. Baker is also an Infernal Bridegroom hand and a talented artist.)

Wendy Chicago will perform after the premiere of the documentary. By the way, she only uses her drag name, Zipprian points out. Even he does not know her birth name. "I thought," the filmmaker says, "she was just too fabulous to go to memory."




What roles does music play in your life?





aragraph 175, the melancholy 1999 documentary directed by Rob Epstein and Jeffrey Friedman, recounted the systemic attacks on and imprisonment of gay men by the German National Socialist regime. As the film explained, men who survived the work camps and concentration camps were not necessarily free after the war, driven underground by the notorious antigay legislation of the film's title. Some were even forced to serve out their Nazi-imposed sentences.

On June 11, the Holocaust Museum Houston illuminates this chapter in our history when it opens Nazi Persecution of Homosexuals 1933-1945. Through photographs and documents from the collection of the United States Holocaust Memorial

Museum, the exhibition examines the history of the Nazi attempt to eradicate homosexuality across the Reich. The exhibition continues through September 19.







ople listen to the radio as hev butter their English nuffin in the morning or on weekend nights en route to their favorite club or bar, but everyone knows that prime time for tuning in to the radio waves is during the time we spend trekking across the city in our vehicles to and from our daily destinations. Some people enjoy the KRBE morning trio, and others listen intently to NPR or sing praises along to Christian radio. Is it news that valuable programming for the GLBT and general community is tucked into off-peak radio hours? Queer Voices, produced and cohosted by Jack Valinski, airs on Monday evenings at 8. Try recording Everwood and tune in. Valinski admits that the hours are not optimal for the maximum number of listeners, but he points out, "We are lucky to have such a space."

The June 1994 OutSmart featured Valinski and activist Deborah Bell as the voices of what was then known as Lesbian & Gay Voices. Valinski and Bell say today that they cannot recall exactly how they met, but KPFT definitely brought them together. With creativity and dedication, their program evolved, and Valinski and Bell became the voices behind a program aimed at the interests of the GLBT community, but also one intended to promote awareness among society.

Of course, such success is not achieved without obstacles. The program faced a major challenge, Valinski recounts, after it was canceled in November 1992 while

Bell was away working on the 1993 March on Washington for Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Equal Rights and Liberation. The powers at KPFT had tried to move away from specialty programs, Valinski says. The supportive community held a demonstration at a station meeting, but Lesbian & Gay Voices was not heard again until March 1993. "Houston has had some of the longestrunning programs in the country devoted to GLBT programming or that are GLBTinclusive, thanks to KPFT, even though at times it has been a struggle," says Bell, who left the program in 1995 in support of her partner, who had experienced conflicts with station management.

"It's also a challenge to keep the show fresh and have new people on, but we are lucky to have people who are dedicated," Valinski says. He is referring to Glen Holt,

Jone Devlin, JD Doyle, and Mary Morissette. "Jone is an incredible book reader, so it's great to see her interview authors. JD probably has the biggest collection of queer music. These people are experts in what they do, but they don't have big heads." Valinski's favorite aspect of Queer Voices is being able to talk to people in the community. He loves the intimacy of radio programming, which he says is like holding a conversation with someone sitting around a table.

Everyone who works on Queer Voices volunteers their time and talents, including Valinski, who also works his whazoo off all year as program coordinator for the Pride Committee of Houston. Valinski, one of the founders of the Pride Committee, also volunteers with the Houston Gay & Lesbian Political Caucus. The Syracuse University graduate earned a degree in radio and television and moved to Houston for a job with an ABC-owned radio station. (Kathy

"Also, hate crimes and the fear of getting bashed for being queer was a big concern," adds Bell. "The murder of Paul Broussard brought that home in Houston. I think we still have to be very cautious, but there is so much more understanding now on both those issues."

Valinski and Bell also mention the 2003 overturning of the sodomy law as a momentous change in history. They have witnessed the GLBT community's progress over the many years, including how the media portrays the community in connection with the Pride parade. "There's more of a balance of who we are, as opposed to previous years when the media would spotlight only drag queens and the leather community," he says. "There's definitely better coverage, which has a lot to do with our visibility." Since media portraval is more positive than not, Valinski remarks, "I thought we'd be a lot further along with how the world is, how the country is. It seems that the country is so divided. The marriage thing is scaring them."

Bell now lives in a rural community outside Temple, Texas, where buffalo have been recently spotted roaming up her driveway. A former Houston Pride parade grand marshal and member of numerous organizations such as the Houston Gay & Lesbian Political Caucus, National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, and Stonewall Democrats, Bell works for a medical institution and remains an activist. As a long-standing member of the National Organization for

> Women (NOW), she also serves as the moderator for an online discussion group known as the Feminist Online Network (FEMNET), which focuses on the greater Houston area, but reaches subscribers in other states and countries. Bell recently returned to Washington for the March for Women's Lives, which took place on the 11th anniversary of the GLBT-rights march in 1993. Bell carried the NOW banner that was carried in the 1978 March for Extension of the Equal Rights Amendment, the first march she attended as a NOW activist.

Valinski has gone from toiling in a large corporation years ago to working for a small organization. He says he is happy as he remains

focused on the things that truly matter to him: community and friends.

For those of you who are new to Queer Voices, when you tune in, you won't ever hear disc jockeys yapping with Jessica Simpson. Queer Voices is a weekly opportunity for GLBT-interest programming where members, events, and issues of the local community are highlighted and discussed. Leaders of national organizations have been featured on the program, but for the most part the Queer Voices team aims to keep the program as local as possible. "Nobody is a star," Valinski says. "We do the program for the community. Stars are the people who are in the program."

There are musicals, ballets, and the final performances of a pop opera. Some productions are allout gay, some gay-inspired, and some so frou frou that they might as well be gay. So march down to a local theater and rejuvenate. Fill yourself with pride and a smattering of culture at the same time.

BOYGROOVE

What else can you do with a boy band but make fun of it? Aaron Macris musical spoof. with book by Chris Craddock, will answer all your questions about drugs, sex, and rock and roll. Jason Blagec, Quincy Starnes, Aaron Stryk, and Doug Thompson play the famous spoiled boys in the band and everyone else in this parody from Canada at Theatre LaB Houston through June 27. The show contains "adult material not appropriate for more sensitive playgoers," which is all the more reason to see it. Through June 27

LA FILLE MAL GARDEE

Wortham Theater Center

In one of those great ironies that Art is so famous for, this comedy ballet about the simple folk premiered in France at the exact time of the Revolution. There are no mythical creatures, no royals, no combo of both in this gentle, humorous tale. Fille (whose English title should be "The Girl Without a Guardian") is a tribute to lusty country life, as fatherless Lise bucks the system and her social-striving mom to marry the man she loves, not the rich nitwit who lives down the road. This classic has been re-staged so many times with all sorts of music (Bordeaux folk songs, Rossini tunes, Hertle and Herold scores) that the only thing left from the original is the charming story. Houston Ballet's production is the justly classic 1960 version, choreographed by the English master Sir Frederick Ashton, using an arrangement of the Herold score from the 1828 St. Petersburg retelling. Look for a maypole, sheaves of wheat, Mom in drag, and the very fey "Butterfly Boy" Alain, who's more content catching insects than paying attention to the abundant feminine charms of ballerina Lise. PSYCHO BEACH PARTY

The great writer/actor/female impersonator extraordinaire Charles Busch always likes to take our most cherished icons and read their beads. He does it with what could be called loving campy bitchiness. Whatever you call it, though, his parodies always end up screamingly funny. Here, he takes those insipid and wonderful Frankie and Annette beach movies and puts them through his distinctively alternative personal food processor: Mom's in drag, Chicklet's psychotic, and her two beach bum macho buddies want to hang-ten with each other. It's so far over the rainbow, you can't get there from here. But once you've gone on a road trip with Mr. Busch, nothing ever quite looks normal again. And for that, we thank him. Through June 19

SEUSSICAL

Country Playhouse

Slammed by those nasty big-city critics, this family musical based on the Dr. Seuss books nonetheless had a respectable run on Broadway and then considerable life in the hinterlands. All your favorite characters are here, singing and dancing up a storm, much like the grab bag of Peanuts in You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown. It's not the Great American Musical, to be sure, but it's got on a big fat smiley-face and makes you feel good when it's over-if you can remember it.

ALWAYS, PATSY CLINE

Premiered by Stages in 1988, Ted Swindley's tribute is a country-fried homage to the late, great Cline. The current remounting has brought a wide Cheshire Cat grin to the company's CFO, for it's in an open run and continuously sold out. Although the book hinges on a Houston Cline groupie (Susan O. Koozin as Louise Seger) and her weekend brush with the singer, it's only an excuse upon which to hang the 27 Cline songs. The truly amazing feat of this production belongs to Julia Kay Laskowski, who channels the voice, the styling, and the very moves of Cline. She is, in two words, splendidly phenomenal. Even though it's mostly an all-singing role, this is still acting of the highest caliber. If you have the smallest soft spot for the unique sound of this most popular of country/western superstars, this show is not to be missed.

CONVENIENCE

If you hurry, you can catch the last performances of Greg Coffin's pop opera, a coming-out story in one of its first regional productions. Vince (Scott Sowinski, so memorable a few months ago in Stages' Bat Boy) has second thoughts about moving in with his lover Ethan (Jonathan McVay, pretty memorable in just about anything he does). He's scared to tell his mom (Susan Shofner), from whom he's been estranged ever since Dad walked out when Ethan was 6. Mom has her own problems. Abe (Thomas Prior), a successful contractor, wants to marry her and move to his dream job in California, but she is unduly cautious because of her unfinished and strained relationship with


Ethan. The wailing ballads and patter rhythms remind us of such disparate influences such as Elton John and Stephen Sondheim, which isn't a bad thing, but there's no great distinction to the score and even less to the shopworn lyrics. avid Sedaris, the acerbic, sardonic, and self-deprecating openly gay humorist/writer, is at his best when life seems worst. His foibles with an eccentric family, employ as a Christmas elf, a homophobic midget guitar tutor, insane neighbors, and tricky French culture/language after moving to Paris with boyfriend Hugh Hamrick have made for riotous reading in best-selling books (Naked, Me Talk Pretty One Day), and the highly anticipated Dress Your Family in Corduroy and Denim (Little, Brown & Company). In this new collection, published this month, Sedaris recounts equally outrageous, painfully funny, and sometimes deeply affecting experiences with a Bad Seed little girl neighbor and her equally monstrous mother ("The Girl Next Door") and paranoia in the wake of the Catholic Church pedophilia scandal ("Chicken in the Henhouse").



My boyfriend owns a house in a very small village of only 12 houses in Normandy, and one of our neighbors was taken to prison for sexually molesting his granddaughter. He got out of prison last summer, and everyone assumed he would move, but he couldn't afford to. The man was always nice to me, and I walked by his house a lot, and he was very lonely, so he started talking to me and inviting me into his house. In this small village when you're an outsider to begin with, and everybody sees you leaving a child molester's house, it doesn't look good. That's a story I never finished [writing], and I don't know if I just wasn't approaching it the right way or being honest when I needed to or it just didn't have an ending.

Do you and Amy ever try to take the other aback?

Amy does that to me more than I do to her. We were in Paris, and I was pointing out that you always see American couples fighting in the street. They're on vacation together and just snap. Generally they don't spend much time together, and often they feel threatened, don't speak the language, and only have one another to depend on, and they snap. I hear fights all the time on the street outside my apartment. I pointed this out to Amy. Then Amy and I were in a crowded place, and she turned to me and yelled "This is my vacation too! Can we please just try to have a good time?" I thought, Damn, that's what I get for pointing things out to her.

Have any of your stories gotten you into trouble with your family or others?

I always let members of my family read a story before its published.

Are you afraid at of that psychotic neighbor child from "The Girl Next Door" discovering your story about her?




in Beverly West's disposable "Cinematherapy" series is from the gay prescriptive. Other titles include Cinematherapy for the Soul: The Girl's Guide to Finding Happiness One Movie at a Time and Cinematherapy for Lovers: The Girl's Guide to Finding True Love One Movie at a Time. This book is subtitled The Queer Guy's Guide to Finding Your Rainbow, . I did not find my rainbow. . Second-rate, tired, and un-illuminating in any manner, this is a gimmick masquerading as a book. If the authors think they can snatch away our community's hard-earned dollars just because they put "gay" in their title, I'm here to warn them-and you. . Abetted by her "best friend and roommate" Jason Bergund, West and her co-writer stagger haphazardly through movie categories such as coming-out, drama queen, finding yourself, or a boy's best friend is his mother. Ostensibly a guide to help gay men find comfort, humor, and inspiration at the corner video store, this is, basically, a book of lists, pumped-up by campy plot synopses. Mercifully, these are brief. There's little insight, less critical evaluation, no history. There's not even any juicy Hollywood gossip. . Mrs. Doubtfire and The Birdcage are covered in the drag chapter; Beaches and Miss Congeniality in the fag-hag chapter, and almost Madonna's entire movie oeuvre placed somewhere (the authors have an awed, unapologetic respect for Ms. Ciccone). There's nothing new here. . Scattered among the unsurprising film examples is extraneous padding like facial recipes and hangover cures, character quotes, and forced acronyms like TSLGT (That Sexy Little-Guy Thang) to describe Tom Cruise in their "Sugar Shack: The Man-Candy Counter." . Worse, it's all written without style and in an annoying twinkie tone that could only be described as Nellie Lite. Cute and fuzzy-wuzzy, their writing wears an oatmeal mask and pink bunny slippers and assumes we do, too. . When it's been "that time of the month, all month long, and you're ready to shed a little of that excess irrigation, watch one of these PMS movies, and weep away the bloat." (Introduction to Male PMS Movies). . "If you're in the mood for a little overkill, paint the town blue with this cinematic triple scoop of rocky road, featuring three world class drama queens, all with a whopping case of the icks." (The Hours) . "As every queen knows, the sour apple 'tini is the way to go when you want a drink that's potent but tasty. Serve up this concoction in an extra big glass and pucker up, buttercup!" (Jason's Barmacy) . If you love movies, this useless little book will only make you mad: at yourself for not mindlessly dictating your own, at the publishing industry for foisting this trifle upon us, and at the sickening waste of trees. -D.L. 



ver notice how hard it is to find the LGBTQ people in airports? Air travel sure throws my gaydar all out of whack. Homo-looking guys turn out to be het men who've been Queer-Eyed. Sauntering women with dykev haircuts are just Canadian.

Then we get the bad news-no food. Airlines no longer offer in-flight meals. Who knew? On this 1,700-mile flight they don't even serve pretzels. My belly gurgles disap-

pointment. We're told we can purchase a restaurant-quality sandwich or salad for \$10. The nerve. I do not have an extra \$10 to spend on what's supposed be included in the deal. It's the principle of the thing. Airline meals are part of our culture. You can't change the rules. It's unnatural. It goes against tradition. Even the Bible says, "Let all who are hungry come and eat." Where's the constitutional amendment codifying the institution of air travel as a sacred union between one person and one meal? (Rumor has it that a few renegade airlines follow a higher law and issue meals anyway.) Why should I have to pay for airplane foodsomething first-class passengers take for granted? It's not fair that some of us are treated as second class. Unequal. Under less-famished conditions I'd raise hell, but there's no fight in me. I'm too hungry. I will have to tough it out.

The crew closes the hatch, and we are


sealed into the oxygen deprivation chamber, a.k.a. the cabin. Nice word choice, but this cabin has no burbling brook nearby. No fireplace. Not even a moose head, although some of us passengers could pass for dead animals, we're so lifeless from breathing recirculated jet fuel fumes. The flight attendant sashays down the aisle checking seatbelts. I try to send him homo vibes.

After takeoff, I open my tray table and set out my travel journal, my wedding photo on the cover. Miss Thang rolls by with his beverage cart. I make a point of glancing at the portrait of Wifev and me, and then up at him, flashing my best "We Are Fam-i-ly" smile. My stomach growls, but you can't hear it over the engine noise. Apparently I've made contact. "Are you hungry?" I nod with my sincerest LGBTQ-solidarity look. He leans in close. "I'll see if we can get you something. Don't tell anybody." At last, I get to cash in on those special rights we've heard so much about. Other passengers don't know I didn't pay like they did. Flyboy serves my food with a conspiratorial wink. I'm happy, in a carbon monoxide kind of way, all the way home.
