What is the most important information I should know about TRUVADA?

- · Some people who have taken medicine like TRUVADA (nucleoside analogs) have developed a serious condition called lactic acidosis (buildup of an acid in the blood). Lactic acidosis can be a medical emergency and may need to be treated in the hospital. Call your healthcare provider right away if you get the following signs or symptoms of lactic
- . You feel very weak or tired.
- . You have unusual (not normal) muscle pain.
- . You have trouble breathing.
- . You have stomach pain with nausea and vomiting.
- . You feel cold, especially in your arms and legs.
- You feel dizzy or lightheaded.

. You have a fast or irregular heartbeat.

- Some people who have taken medicines like TRUVADA have developed serious liver problems called hepatotoxicity, with liver enlargement (hepatomegaly) and fat in the liver (steatosis). Call your healthcare provider right away if you get the following signs or symptoms of liver problems.

- TRUVADA is not for the treatment of Hepatitis B Virus infection. Patients infected with both HBV
 and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) who take TRUVADA need close medical follow-up for several
 months after stopping treatment with TRUVADA. Follow-up includes medical exams and blood tests to
 check for HBV that could be getting worse. Patients with Hepatitis B Virus infection, who take TRUVADA and then stop it, may get "flare-ups" of their hepatitis. A "flare-up" is when the disease suddenly returns in a worse way than before.

What is TRUVADA?

TRUVADA is a type of medicine called an HIV (human immunodeficiency virus) nucleoside analog reverse transcriptase inhibitor (NRTI), TRUVADA contains 2 medicines, EMTRIVA" (emtricitabine) and VIREAD" (tenofovir disoproxil fumarate, or tenofovir DF) combined in one pill. TRUVADA is always used with other anti-HIV medicines to treat people with HIV infection. TRUVADA is for adults age 18 and older TRUVADA has not been studied in children under age 18 or adults over age 65.

HIV Infection destroys CD4 (T) cells which are important to the immune system. The immune system helps fight infection, After a large number of T cells are destroyed, acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) develops.

TRUVADA helps block HIV reverse transcriptase, a chemical in your body (enzyme) that is needed for HIV to multiply, TRUVADA lowers the amount of HIV in the blood (viral load). TRUVADA may also help to increase the number of T cells (CD4 cells). Lowering the amount of HIV in the blood lowers the chance of death or infections that happen when your immune system is weak

TRUVADA does not cure HIV infection or AIDS. The long-term effects of TRUVADA are not known at this time. People taking TRUVADA may still get opportunistic infections or other conditions that happen with HIV infection. Opportunistic infections are infections that develop because the immune system is weak. Some of these conditions are oneumonia, herpes virus infections, and Mycobacterium aviu

It is very important that you see your healthcare provider regularly while taking TRUVADA. TRUVADA does not lower your chance of passing HIV to other people through sexual contact, sharing needles, or being exposed to your blood. For your health and the health of others, it is important to always practice safer sex by using a latex or polyurethane condom or other barrier to lower the chance of sexual contact with semen, vaginal secretions, or blood. Never use or share dirty needles,

Who should not take TRUVADA?

Do not take TRUVADA if you are allergic to TRUVADA or any of its ingredients. The active ingredients of TRUVADA are emtricitabine and tenofovir DF. See the end of this leaflet for a complete list of ingredients.

What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking TRUVADA? Tell your healthcare provider if you:

- . are pregnant or planning to become pregnant. We do not know if TRUVADA can harm your unborn child. You and your healthcare provider will need to decide if TRUVADA is right for you. If you use TRUVADA while you are pregnant, talk to your healthcare provider about how you can be on the TRUVADA Antiviral
- are breast-feeding. You should not breast-feed if you are HIV-positive because of the chance of passing
 the HIV virus to your baby. Also, it is not known if TRUVADA can pass into your breast milk and if it can harm your baby. If you are a woman who has or will have a baby, talk with your healthcare provider about the
- have kidney problems or are undergoing kidney dialysis treatment.
- · have bone problems.
- have liver problems including Hepatitis B Virus infection.

Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and nonon medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Especially tell your healthcare provider if you take: . COMBIVIR®, EMTRIVA, EPIVIR®, EPIVIR-HBV®, EPZICOM™, TRIZIVIR®, or VIREAD, TRUVADA should not

- be used with those medicines. Drugs that contain didanosine (VIDEX", VIDEX EC"). Tenofovir DF (a component of TRUVADA) may increase
 the amount of VIDEX in your blood. You may need to be followed more carefully if you are taking TRUVADA and VIDEX together.
- REYATAZ® (atazanavir sulfate) or KALETRA® (lopinavir/ritonavir). These medicines may increase the amount of tenofovir DF (a component of TRUVADA) in your blood, which could result in more side effects. You may need to be followed more carefully if you are taking TRUVADA and REYATAZ or KALETRA together.

Keep a complete list of all the medicines that you take. Make a new list when medicines are added or stopped. Give copies of this list to all of your healthcare providers and pharmacist every time you visit your healthcare provider or fill a prescription

How should I take TRUVADA?

- Take TRUVADA exactly as your healthcare provider prescribed it. Follow the directions from your healthcare provider, exactly as written on the label.
- The usual dose of TRUVADA is 1 tablet once a day, TRUVADA is always used with other anti-HIV medicines. If you have kidney problems, you may need to take TRUVADA less often
- TRUVADA may be taken with or without a meal. Food does not affect how TRUVADA works. Take TRUVADA at the same time each day.
- . If you forget to take TRUVADA, take it as soon as you remember that day. Do not take more than 1 dose of TRUVADA in a day, Do not take 2 doses at the same time. Call your healthcare pro if you are not sure what to do. It is important that you do not miss any doses of TRUVADA or your anti-HIV medicines.
- . When your TRUVADA supply starts to run low, get more from your healthcare provider or pharmacy. This is very important because the amount of virus in your blood may increase if the medicine is stopped for even a short time. The virus may develop resistance to TRUVADA and become harder to treat.
- . Do not change your dose or stop taking TRUVADA without first talking with your healthcare provider. Stay
- under a healthcare provider's care when taking TRUVADA. . If you take too much TRUVADA, call your local polson control center or emergency room right away.

- What should I avoid while taking TRUVADA?

 Do not breast-feed. See "What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking TRUVADA?"
- . Avoid doing things that can spread HIV infection since TRUVADA doesn't stop you from passing the
- . Do not share needles or other injection equipment.
- Do not share personal items that can have blood or body fluids on them, like toothbrushes
- . Do not have any kind of sex without protection. Always practice safer sex by using a latex or polyurethane condom or other barrier to reduce the chance of sexual contact with semen, vaginal secretions, or blood.
- . COMBIVIR, EMTRIVA, EPIVIR, EPIVIR-HBV, EPZICOM, TRIZIVIR, or VIREAD. TRUVADA should not be used with these medicines.

What are the possible side effects of TRUVADA?

TRUVADA may cause the following serious side effects (see "What is the most important information I

- . Lactic acidosis (buildup of an acid in the blood). Lactic acidosis can be a medical emerg to be treated in the hospital. Call your doctor right away if you get signs of lactic acidosis. (See "What is the most important information I should know about TRUVADA?")
- . Serious liver problems (hepatotoxicity), with liver enlargement (hepatomegaly) and fat in the liver (steatosis). Call your healthcare provider right away if you get any signs of liver problems. (See "What is the most important information I should know about TRUVADA?")
- . "Flare-ups" of Hepatitis B Virus infection, in which the disease suddenly returns in a worse way than before, can occur if you stop taking TRUVADA. Your healthcare provider will monitor your condition for several months after stopping TRUVADA if you have both HIV and HBV infection. TRUVADA is not for the treatment of Henatitis B Virus infection.
 - . Kidney problems. If you have had kidney problems in the past or take other medicines that can cause kidney problems, your healthcare provider should do regular blood tests to check your kidneys.
 - . Changes in bone mineral density (thinning bones). It is not known whether long-term use of TRUVADA will cause damage to your bones. If you have had bone problems in the past, your healthcare provider may need to do tests to check your bone mineral density or may prescribe medicines to help your bone mineral density.

Other side effects with TRUVADA when used with other anti-HIV

 Changes in body fat have been seen in some patients taking TRUVADA and
other anti-HIV medicines. These changes may include increased amount
of fat in the upper back and neck ("buffalo hump"), breast, and around
the main part of your body (trunk). Loss of fat from the legs, arms, and face may also happen. The cause and long-term health effects of these conditions are not known at this time.

The most common side effects of EMTRIVA or VIREAD when used with other anti-HIV medicines are: dizziness, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, headache, abdominal pain, depression, rash, and gas. Skin discoloration (small spots or freckles) may also happen with TRUVADA.

These are not all the side effects of TRUVADA. This list of side effects with TRUVADA is **not complete** at this time because TRUVADA is still being studied. If you have questions about side effects, ask your healthcare provider Report any new or continuing symptoms to your healthcare provider right away. Your healthcare provider may be able to help you manage these side effects.

How do I store TRUVADA?

Truvada

- · Keep TRUVADA and all other medicines out of reach of children.
- Store at room temperature up to 77 °F (25 °C).
- Keep TRUVADA in its original container and keep the container tightly closed.
- . Do not keep medicine that is out of date or that you no longer need. If you throw any medicines away make sure that children will not find them.

General information about TRUVADA:

Medicines are sometimes prescribed for conditions that are not mentioned in patient information leaflets. Do not use TRUVADA for a condition for which it was not prescribed. Do not give TRUVADA to other people, even if they have the same symptoms you have. It may harm them.




































SET 'EM UP, JOE

I got a little story I think you oughta know

oe Lieberman. U.S. senator from Connecticut for 18 years. Al Gore's running mate in 2000. The almost vice-president. Now he's a loser to a political neophyte, Ted Lamont, a gazillionaire who got out his checkbook and rode a wave of anti-Bush, anti-warin-Iraq sentiment to victory in the Connecticut Democratic Primary on August 8, 2006.

Who knows what that result means for the state of Connecticut since Lieberman has declared he will run in the fall as an independent? Who knows what it will mean to Democratic races nationwide this fall? But then again, who knows what Lieberman really is anyway?

To me, Lieberman's always been an enigma. I've never been a fan. I didn't like it when Al Gore picked him as his running mate. I didn't like his history of opposition to affirmative action, his support for the privatization of Social Security, and his chumminess with big business on corporatewelfare issues. Of course, I was glad he was a

gay-rights supporter but that, by itself, was not good enough to make him a V.P. candidate I could get excited about.

After Lieberman and Gore were defeated in 2000, and after he returned to his Senate work, Lieberman continued to disappoint Democrats. It wasn't just his initial support for the invasion of and the war in Iraq. Loads of Democrats backed the war. It was the other positions he took, like siding with the Republicans to pass legislation to try to keep Terri Schiavo alive and voting for the Bush/Cheney energy bill. It was his consistent pattern of voting with the Democratic Caucus most of the time, but defecting on critical pieces of legislation to hand Bush and Republicans important victories in close calls.

After crawling into bed with the enemy on too many occasions, Lieberman started trying to resurrect his Democratic credentials when his Senate race got tight. He cited his mostly Democratic voting record. He appeared regularly with other elected Democrats. He even started criticizing Bush.

But Connecticut Democrats didn't buy it. Perhaps it was the kiss—the moment when Dubya bussed Lieberman's check after the State of the Union address. Or perhaps it was the editorial Lieberman wrote in The Wall Street Journal, in which he castigated other Democrats who had become critical about the war in Iraq and Bush's handling of the war.

Whatever it was, Connecticut Democrats turned Lieberman out in favor of a political neophyte, Ted Lamont, whose highest elective office had been as a Greenwich selectman whose previous experience was dealing with municipal budgets and potholes.

But Lamont had something Lieberman didn't. He had the chutzpah to say that Bush was wrong, that the war in Iraq is wrong and getting worse, and that it's time to change strategies or at least recognize that the current strategy is not working. (He also had buckets of money in which to spread his continued on page 22

n the past few weeks, gay-marriage advocates pursuing their goal by filing lawsuits have suffered several defeats. The most surprising and most significant of these came in New York, where the Court of Appeals rejected state constitutional claims to same-sex marriage. I want to explore some effects of the decision on the cause of same-sex marriage.

First, rulings in other state courts may follow the New York decision. Right now, litigation is pending in eight state court systems. We await decisions from the high courts of two states, New Jersey and Washington. [EDITOR'S NOTE: On July 26, after this column was written, the Washington Supreme Court announced its decision to uphold the ban on same-gender marriage.] New York is a large state, and its courts are well regarded.

At the same time, it's a politically liberal state. The New York decision could provide cover, jurisprudentially and politically, to judges in other states who want to reject gay-marriage claims but who are concerned

about the perception of legal elites that they are denying the next great civil-rights cause. If New York's high court can do it, rejecting these claims can't be blind bigotry or ignorance, can it? Thus, the New York decision could be influential on this issue in a way that a ruling by, say, the Alabama Supreme Court would not be. The New York opinion may therefore damage the prospects of gaymarriage litigants elsewhere.

AFTER NEW YORK

With the Empire State gay-marriage ruling, the fight must focus on legislatures

I would not make too much of this, however. Judges will tend to have a view of the issue going in, and I doubt that they will be converted by the opinion of four judges in Massachusetts in one direction or four judges in New York in the other direction.

A second effect may be to soften the remedial demands made by future gay-marriage litigants. Instead of insisting on full marriage or nothing, as the New York plaintiffs did, perhaps litigants will be more likely to settle for an alternative status, like civil union or domestic partnership, that offers the benefits and rights of marriage without the name. This might marginally increase their chances for success.

Future state courts might see the current landscape as offering three models for resolution of gay-marriage claims: Massachusetts (full marriage), New York (nothing), and Vermont (civil unions, with directions to the state legislature to work out the details). They might see the Vermont resolution as a middle position between the extremes of New York and Massachusetts, allowing them to give gay couples the benefits and protections of marriage without risking the political backlash that comes with the word marriage.

A third effect should be to reduce and to delay litigation arising from inter-state conflicts in marriage law. New York is the third most populous state, with a high concentration of homosexuals. Its residents, especially in New York City, are highly mobile. In short order, its gav married residents would have moved to or traveled in other states, gotten -

anti-Bush, anti-war message.)

At the end of the day, Connecticut Democrats dumped Joe 52 percent to 48 percent. Joe's response to the election results:

"Of course I am disappointed by the results, but I am not discouraged. . . . For the sake of our state, our country, and my party, I cannot and will not let that result stand."

Why didn't he fight the 2000 election results with such vigor? How arrogant for him to proclaim that he is going to save the Democratic Party from itself.

The Democrats in Connecticut have spoken, and Lieberman should let that result stand. What he really needs to do on his way out of the U.S. Senate is to have one more for his baby, and one more for the road.

into legal conflicts with each other or with third parties, and sought some out-of-state recognition for their relationships.

I think discordant state policies in this area can be dealt with under traditional legal principles. And these conflicts will occur any-

way, since we already have gay marriage and alternative status in a few states. But there is no doubt the sheer number of such issues coming from New York would have heightened tensions over the gav-marriage issue very quickly and added to calls for a national resolution through a constitutional amendment.

Fourth, perhaps there's a silver lining in the New York loss. Losing such an important judicial decision may force the gay-marriage movement to emphasize legislative progress, which will produce gains that are more durable and less likely to infuriate opponents than are court victories. In past columns, I have argued for an emphasis on legislative progress toward gay marriage.

Will the New York decision re-order priorities toward legislation? Certainly in New York the legislature is for now the only available arena. But with Republicans fairly comfortably in control of the state senate and presently the governor's mansion, gay marriage is not coming to New York anytime soon. Instead, New York will have to be one of the states where, if progress is to be made at all in the near term, it will have to be made by degrees.

Outside New York, the decision might be the beginning of the end for the strong emphasis on litigation that has marked the early part of the gay-marriage cause. Despite the exaggerated claims of some federal amendment supporters, there aren't that many state court systems likely to be hospitable to gay-marriage claims for the foreseeable future. (The federal courts are hopeless, as litigation strategists know.) While gay-marriage litigation strategists might once have hoped to build momentum for a state-by-state judicial sweep, producing a few initial court victories in very friendly states that would lead to later court victories in less friendly states, that hope has been diminished by the New York defeat and even more by the political backlash against gay marriage.


Once existing litigation has worked its way through those few state court systems where litigants have a reasonable prospect of success, as such litigation is now doing, gay-marriage advocates will have to turn primarily to legislatures.

As with other social and political movements in this country, the courts will have helped along the way by highlighting the strength of the principled arguments and especially by getting some isolated experiments started. But there will be no substitute for making the case to the people and their representatives.

PICTURE OF HISTORY

Dispute over the River Oaks Theater may change local preservation standards

riving down West Gray, I often glance at the River Oaks Theater to see what's playing.

The smell of popcorn and memories still envelop me when I walk through the theater doors and look around at the ornate decoration.

I slow down today and stare at the 1939 Art Deco theater façade. Someone else's imagination sees another colossal 21stcentury high-rise instead.

The Landmark River Oaks may not be there when I turn the corner from Shepherd in two years. This could indeed be a turning point in Houston's growing historic preservation movement. Tear down the River Oaks and the Alabama Theater (a.k.a. Bookstop), which was beautifully refurbished in 1984? What's left in Houston that's much older than the River Oaks? Ah. Could this be the question that's startled so many people lately? (To join other concerned Houstonians, see peti-

riving down West Gray, I often glance tions at www.historichouston.org and www at the River Oaks Theater to see .ipetitions.com/petition/riveroaks/).

The answer isn't pretty, especially when we look around at other American cities. With one of the country's weakest historic preservation ordinances, we've managed to keep bits and pieces of important Houston history:


- gracious Old Sixth Ward and Heights Victorian homes;
- 1920s bungalows in Montrose and the East End;
- a handful of the hundreds of historic homes in Freedman's Town, now a national historic district in name only;
- a dozen or so buildings downtown, including homes in Sam Houston Park that are arranged somewhat like a "house museum"—most of the park's homes are not historically significant and they're certainly no longer part of a living, breathing historic neighborhood;


 and scattered landmarks in original locations

As the iPetitions website notes, the two theater's Art Deco design represents "a handful of viable retail buildings of their age and style in the city."

Some of you may remember the rebirth of Montrose. In the late 1970s, gay men started moving into the neighborhood and restoring the 1920s bungalows. So many good restaurants followed that Montrose became known as one of the city's best dining destinations—and so close to downtown.

Unfortunately, many of Montrose's old subdivisions lack strong deed restrictions. We all know Montrose has changed. Don't get me wrong—there's nothing wrong with townhomes. But hundreds of them—in different materials, different styles—plopped down like Legos left by children can lead to chaos and destroy neighborhood character. At some point, enough is enough. →



Another sign that historic preservation may be at a crossroads: Even Barry Klein, one of Houston's staunchest property-rights advocates, who opposes historic preservation ordinances in general, told the *Chronicle* that he signed a save-the-theater petition because he has a soft spot for the River Oaks.

It's just hard, isn't it Barry, to let go of those childhood memories of Saturday morning movie fun clubs and \$1 family nights? If I wanted to live in a city with only a present and a future, I could move to one of the new megacities in China. But I love Houston, and I just want to preserve the few historic structures we have left.


Remember when Saturday Night Live





EMS personnel? Considering re-airing it this month to recognize the fifth anniversary of the tragedy, the network is now worried that, if it doesn't edit actual dialogue to excise the f-bomb being uttered by rescue workers as they struggled amid the wreckage, the FCC may levy Janet Jackson/Nipplegate-like fines for "indecency." Now that's tragic.

Remember Tom Ryan, that openly gay firefighter with the New York City Fire Department, who so eloquently called the rain of debris emitting from the exploding towers, "an evil tickertape parade"? Ryan, who helped bear the funeral coffin of gay Catholic priest Mychal Judge, went on to establish FireFLAG/EMS, a nationwide support group for gay and lesbian firefighters and emergency service personnel. 





TIM ROBBINS is the most dangerous kind of artist: He has an opinion, and he isn't afraid to voice it. This month, he brings his production of 1984 to Houston. "Unfortunately, it's more relevant than it's ever been," he says during a freewheeling conversation about politics, the president, the war, and gay marriage

im Robbins is an intelligent and outspoken activist, who also happens to be an actor, director, producer, screenwriter, and writer. In 1995, he directed Susan Sarandon, his longtime companion and mother of their three children, in her Oscar-winning role in Dead Man Walking, for which he was also nomi-

ed as best director. About 10 years later, he picked up five awards (including an Oscar and Golden Globe) for his supporting-actor role in Clint Eastwood's Mystic River (2003). • Now he is directing again, this time with the play 1984, which will be performed in Houston at the end of September, presented by Society for the Performing Arts. • Our discussion begins with 1984, then digresses into George W. Bush's ineptitude, but rebounds into homosexuality, marriage, and much more. Our conversation ends with his 25-year association with The Actors' Gang, a gonzo punk L.A. theater group (which makes its Houston debut with 1984), which is not unlike Houston's own Infernal Bridegroom Productions. →

Blase DiStefano: While the U.S. seems to be regressing back to the year 1984, how about you and I go forward to the play: Why is 1984 relevant in 2006?

Tim Robbins: Unfortunately, it's more relevant than it's ever been. Picking it up now. you see how interesting and prescient the writing is in the book.

I think one of the first things you do is go, Well, he was wrong, because Big Brother isn't watching us. OK, there's a lot of cameras all over the place and, OK, yes, there is technology in which a chip can be inside of a television that can watch you while you watch television, blah, blah, blah.

You go back and read it again, and you come across sections that say, We're not really interested in monitoring about 85 percent of the people. It's only about 15 or 20 percent that we really care about. Those are the people in the positions of power and people in positions of influence within the government and industry and journalists. And then you start thinking, That's kind of true. You

can't work for a major newspaper or in a government position or high finance job and truly believe that your emails are not being looked at by somebody. You can't believe that your credit records and financial transactions aren't being checked by some overseer. You get into a position where you have access to the power structure, and your freedom diminishes more and more and more.

In fact, what he [the author, George Orwell] was saving in the book wasn't that Big Brother is watching everybody, but that Big Brother is watching the people that could

pull the curtain back on Big Brother. It's definitely within the capability of the government—the NSA [National Security Agency], the CIA, the FBI-to monitor these kind of people, and I'm sure they do.

They could be monitoring you . . . easily.

And I bet they are. I think part of the reason why they are hiding on this NSA issue and they don't want to come clean on it is that they're monitoring way more people than are suspected of what they initially got the power to do it for. I think they are monitoring political enemies.

> That's what happened with Nixon. That's what happens when you have an administration that does not have the truth on their side, does not have the moral rectitude.

When did you first come out against the war?

I first came out against it in October 2002 and then did some advocacy in early 2003, then started appearing on shows about a month or two before we went to war. If you were to believe conventional wisdom, when the shit hit the fan on that, there was an awful lot of press and an awful lot of chatter on

talk radio about me being a traitor, friend of Saddam, terrorist lover. You name it, there was an epithet for it. It was pretty pervasive on talk radio, and at the time I became aware of the fact that it was hitting hundreds of newspapers. [The National Baseball Hall of Fame cancelled an appearance by Robbins at that time. Likewise, a Florida United Way chapter conference on women's leadership cancelled an appearance by Sarandon.

However insignificant it probably was in the scheme of things, it was very significant at the time because it was taking two prominent peace activists-in fact, not even at that

> point peace activists, but activists for a little more inspection time for the weapon inspectors before we rush into anything-and taking them to task for their opinions, basically sending a message, as Ari Fleischer [White House press secretary at the time] said outright, "You better watch what you say."

> If I, for an example, lived in the suburbs and saw this backlash, I might have just crawled in a hole and hid for a couple of months and thought that it probably wasn't safe for me to go outside. However, I live

in New York City, and the next day I had to walk my kids to school. I'd be out in the streets every day and ensuing weeks after that. And I gotta tell you, from my unique perspective on all this, that there was nothing but support out there on the streets for me. In the course of four months after that happened, there was two incidents where people said negative things, and they were white males and both in Suburbans and both drove away after they said what they had to say.

What about the public at large?

The illusion in this country is that there is a rabid war-mongering public that will boycott movies if you're in them and that you pay for your beliefs, because you're not being enough of a patriot. The real truth, as we found out from our tours across the United States with Embedded, is that I was exonerated. And we're talking about going to places that are red states and places that are conservative in makeup. The real American out there is an entirely different animal-a person who is tolerant of different opinions, who respects and honors your rights, and will defend your right to express your views. The average American is not the talk-radio American.

What the neo-conservatives have done over the last 20 years is create the illusion that the majority is the minority. Any time a popular opinion is expressed by either a politician or a person in show business or sports, any time a popular opinion is -





Thank God there was New York, But there's still freakin' vahoos from New Jersey that come in and try to find some guy to beat up. And that was that way when I was growing up, too, but at least there were communities starting to form and at least there were other people that made you believe that you were part of something and not just an outcast in your little town in Georgia.

And then there's the whole gay marriage thing. I know that you're not married, but what are your thoughts on gay marriage?

Well, it's really interesting, because a couple of years ago someone called me up and said, "We're doing this gay marriage thing, and we want you to host it." And I said, "Guys, I gotta tell you [laughs], I'm not married, so I can't really be an advocate for marriage."

But the idea that when you are with someone for a while that you should be able to be at their side in a hospital room, that you should be able to share all of those kinds of intimacies—absolutely, and that's something that's clearly going to change and it's only a matter of time.

The best advocate for change in this country has been MTV. I don't know if you've made that connection, but my kids [aren't aware of that stigma that was there when we were growing up. On The Real World and some of these reality shows, there are gay characters. They are real people, and they are humanized. So there's a whole different way of looking at things for kids from late 20s down.

Yes, it's very encouraging. An off-the-wall question: Susan said she had a long-term relationship with a gay man. Have you ever had a long-term relationship with a lesbian?

Yes, I had a long-term relationship with a lesbian, but not an intimate relationship. You're not going to lead me down a path where I'm going to go, "Some of my best friends are lesbians."

[Both laugh] No. We're not going there. Instead, we'll go down the red carpet. On the 1993 Oscars, you and Susan spoke about Haitian political refugees with AIDS. Do you remember the reaction?

Oh, it was like we had just taken a dump on the carpet.

[Laughs] So it was major.

It was really extraordinary. It was my first real, first-hand taste of what happens when you go against the grain in this country. I got the newspapers and did the research about what people said and how it was reported.

Susan went off to Mexico on a vacation, and I was left with the damage control. Pretty much no one wrote what we said, and it was even changed. People said that we said that all people with AIDS should come into the country and that we should pay for their medical expenses. The reaction was "Start with your own apartment" and that kind of stuff, but no one said what we said, which was really interesting because it begs the question, Why?

Because it was political?

I think it was because it wasn't being reported. [What we talked about at the Oscars] was an internment camp for Haitians that had tested positive to HIV. So in the spirit of those red ribbons that everyone was wearing that night in Hollywood, we were calling attention to the fact that there was an actual prison camp for people that had tested positive. Now, it seemed like it was in the spirit of the evening to me and to Susan, in that those red ribbons were supposed to be representing an awareness of an issue. Well, let's be aware of this issue.

The embarrassing thing for Hollywood was that it was Clinton that we were protesting. He had just been elected, and I think that probably didn't sit well with a lot of people in Hollywood. It had been six or seven months this place had been open, and Clinton had talked about it in the campaign and had promised during the campaign to shut it down. It was now four months into his presidency, and he hadn't done a thing about it. There were protests to try to gain attention, but no one was reporting on the protests. It had fallen off the press radar. So when we went up there and spoke for 24 seconds about it, it all of a sudden brought it back into the press radar.

The way I look at it is that when you are the press and you are supposed to be writing this stuff and then a couple of actors embarrass you with this truth and you have to report it, you're going to report it from your emotional point of view at that point. If you are at the Oscar cocktail party for your newspaper, and you're the person that's supposed to be covering stories like that and someone says: "What's that about, Joe?" And you go, "Oh, uh, well, that's this thing that's going on." "So it's still open?" "Yes, it's still open, but, you know, it's gonna get closed." The bottom line was that it was embarrassing to the press and it was embarrassing to Clinton. And, by the way, within a week, it was closed down.

Did that get reported?

No. So the overall message of it was that we were advocating for people with AIDS to



It still does. One of the first plays to confront the burgeoning crisis, it remains the best of the lot. Renowned as a preeminent gay rights' activist (he helped found both ACT UP and Gay Men's Health Crisis), Kramer with his crusader's zeal sometimes overwhelms and smudges the dramatic arc, but his searing passion and moral outrage are absolute. Agitprop theater has never been more sympathetic, or alive.

With Lorenzo da Ponte's sparkling libretto, this eternally fresh work is easily accessible and packs quite a wallop as it chronicles the downfall of the world's legendary seducer and his hellish finale. Up-and-coming star, the Polish baritone Mariusz Kwiecien, assays the dissolute Don, with Canadian soprano Alexandra

Ullman worked on his allegorical chamber opera as official music director of the camp. Death takes a holiday, causing havoc in the world, until the despotic emperor agrees to be his next victim. A performance was rehearsed and scheduled, but when the SS heard the not-so-subtle allusions to Hitler, they banned the opera and sent Ullman and his librettist Peter Kein to Auschwitz and their doom. Amazingly, the work itself, with its influences of Mahler, Weill, and Schoenberg, survived, smuggled out of the camp. Hearing the piece brings an almost unbearable sadness and outrage, as it bears overwhelming witness to the Holocaust. In partnership with Houston Grand Opera, under the baton of internationally acclaimed conductor James Conlon, the performance (part of the October 29-November 12 Jewish Book & Art Fair) will be a thrilling, emotional testament to the supremacy of music to triumph over death.

Reel Time

For its 10th year, the Houston Gay & Lesbian Film Festival compacts to a single weekend and moves downtown

ob Arcos was only 18 years old when he began his movie-molded career working at Landmark's Greenway Theatre. Six years and dozens of indie reels later, Arcos has taken on the challenge directing the Houston Gay & Lesbian Film Festival.

Now in its 10th year, the festival, which is September 22–24, will have a much different look this year.

The biggest change film fans will notice may be that they won't be spending as much time—or fossil fuel—traveling to and from the films' venues. This year, all eight films, plus the perennial audience pleasers, *Boys Shorts* and *Girls Shorts*, will be screened at the opulent, downtown-chic Angelika Film Center.

"It's such a blessing to be able to house it in one location," Arcos says. "We're going to be able to give it that community film festival feel, where people come and just mingle with each other."

Another big change: This year's festival is limited to three days, a considerable pairing-

down from earlier years when films were spread out over two weeks.


As far as Arcos is concerned, change is good.

"I hope people see this film festival as something that's going to be growing every year after," he says. "It's been growing for the past 10 years. And each year there's trial and error, but this year there are so many things that are working for us."

The festival's selections were put together by Kristian Salinas, who has acted as Houston curator for the last three years (now living in Los Angeles, Salinas worked in the film department at the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, then as film series coordinator at Rice Media Center, when he lived here). Serendipitously fixed in the roster chosen by Salinas is George Michael, a documentary about the tabloid darling/gay popicon, directed by Southan Morris.

"We're ecstatic about that presentation,"
Arcos says. "He gives his side of the story on
everything from his relationship with his former
Wham! soulmate, Andrew [Ridgely], to his →

current relationship with his boyfriend," he says, wryly adding, "and all the little incidences that have happened in his life."

The opening-night feature film, Fat Girls, is set in a Texas high school, and features Houston native Jonathan Caouette, whose own film, Tarnation, was acclaimed upon its 2004 release ("A Life Up on the Screen," October 2004 OutSmart). The Friday kickoff event will be framed by a prom theme, Arcos says, and attend-

ees are encouraged (though certainly not required) to don prom togs.

"We're going to set up a little space there with the balloons where they can have photos taken to remember the night." he adds.

Arcos believes this year's festival will be the best yet.

"In 10 years, the film festival has learned a lot," he says. "It's taken the right steps to actually solidify itself in our community as a great, great film festival."





"I've visited the halls of suicide, popped some tops, and loved some beautiful women," Money proclaims. "Yes, I've had my sleepless nights, but I've also seen God's face, and I write about these things in my music. 

A Time for Lance

Houston filmmaker Lance Marshall keeps busy making his movie A Time to Prey, acting in a locally produced sitcom, and taking the stage in The Normal Heart

Lance Marshall is one face you don't want to overlook in the sea of talented Houstonians—not that you could miss his svelte looks.

Marshall is one of Houston's up-and-coming on the arts and film scene. You might recognize him from karaoke nights at JR's. A few years back, his shining face and impressive vocals led us all as we drank and sang the night away. Now, a couple years later, he has moved on to larger stages and more meaningful roles.

I had the chance to meet with Marshall on a warm Saturday morning at Empire Café on Westheimer to talk about his exciting and tumultuous journey from the Houston bar scene to the often cathartic experience of becoming a serious artist.

Immediately, his gregarious and charming personality was evident. While standing at the counter perusing the menu to decide on our morning beverages, he noticed one of Empire's signature drinks and quipped, "A SugarDaddy—I've been looking for one of those for a while!" Amid what became one of many rounds of eyewatering laughter, I ordered my strong black coffee (it had been one of those Friday nights) and he, with a smile on his face, ordered his SugarDaddy.

As we took our seats outside, hoping against hope that the humidity and heat wouldn't be at their typical highs, Marshall's

partner, James Oxford, joined us. Marshall and Oxford met about a year and a half ago on, believe it or not, Gay.com, during a very trying time in Marshall's life. Now, through the trials, Marshall and Oxford tend to finish each other's sentences and have adopted a "kid," a little Corgi they've named Holly. Instantly you can tell these two are great for each other. Introductions made, we soon settled into our conversation—and, as with most things, we started with beginnings.

While in Waco studying at McClennan Community College, Marshall accepted a position at a professional theater company in Houston.

"I had a friend that lived here in Houston who encouraged me to audition for a theater here in Houston. So I came down and auditioned, and both of us got a paid position as actors/singers/dancers at the theater. It was a great opportunity and an exciting experience, but it wasn't where I belonged. So I decided to leave the theater after about a year on contract."

These days, Marshall is a busy man. His schedule for Saturday seemed overwhelming: 10 a.m., interview with me; 1 p.m., shoot downtown for a locally produced television sitcom; and then rehearsal for the current Theatre New West production of *The Normal Heart*. All the while he was editing his independent film, A *Time to Prey*. Oh, and he holds down a day job at Karen Derr & Associates Realty (his boss, Derr, is one of the A *Time to Prey* actors). Oxford is a risk manager for an energy-trading firm.

The sitcom, As Told by Me, debuted last month on the Houston MediaSource public-access cable channel (Channel 17 on Time Warner). In this series about three roommates, Marshall plays an über-butch straight guy, Ceasar, who gets all the girls. As we


discussed the series, Marshall's on-camera girlfriend, Callie Murphy, walked into the café. On the subject of Marshall, she was all praise,

"He is so talented and hilarious! Everybody loves him. His personality is so energetic and magnetic."

This production of the groundbreaking Larry Kramer drama, which centers on a group of individuals in New York during early years of the AIDS epidemic, features Marshall as "Southern bitch" Tommy Boatright. As Marshall put it, "He's super fantastic with two snaps and around the world!" The challenge for Marshall, he said, is to transition from the butch straight guy of As Told by Me to the flamboyant Boatright. "I occasionally find myself walking on to either set, still in the previous character. and acting the complete opposite of what I should," Marshall said. "It's a big transition from girl-crazy to catty."


The biggest thing going on in Marshall's life right now, other than Oxford, is the screen thriller/drama A Time to Prev. "Think Requiem for a Dream meets Crash. It's really intense," he said. From the film website, www.atimetoprey.com: "This film is a dark look at the lives of people whose childhoods were less than perfect, far less. These people live with a past that few can imagine." To get the film from Lance's screenplay to the screen, Marshall and Oxford started their own production company, Watergun Outlaws (www.watergunoutlawsprod .com). They are working with local indie filmmakers Larry Czach and Chris Spisak, who made Jack Everyman, a movie released earlier this year in which both Marshall and Oxford appeared.

Marshall explained that making A Time to Prev has been cathartic for him, because most of the material in it comes from his past, though it isn't autobiographical. The majority of Marshall's experiences actually occur to one of the female leads in the movie. "It ended up being very clear as to why the characters played out the way they did," he said. "I needed to witness what had happened to me and what I had done, not re-live it. This way it became a healing process for me."

Marshall still gets emotional when talking about the film. Being that the movie comes out of a troubled past, it is not for the faint of heart, he warns. Marshall and Oxford plan to host a private screening in Houston before they submit it to the Sundance Film Festival in 2007.

The journey has been long and hard, but this Houstonian is all smiles and hope. Difficult times are certain to be ahead, but through all this, Marshall has found his peace. He said that he hopes that his movie-and everything else he does-helps people to "find what makes them happy, and do it."





A year after
Hurricane
Katrina hit, life
goes on for New
Orleans public
official and former Houstonian
Larry Bagneris.
He advises, "If
you really want
to help New
Orleans, come
and visit us."

t's been just over a year since the Gulf Coast was hit by Hurricane Katrina. Moments later, New Orleans' longdeteriorating levees gave way, resulting in the flooding of the historic city. Since that time, much finger pointing, name calling, and blame-game playing has ensued.

But life goes on, especially New Orleans' gay life.

"If you stay in the areas where the tourists are, you'd never know the city was hit by this awful, awful tragedy," says Larry Bagneris. "All the residential neighborhoods were destroyed, but the old stuff that you couldn't replace, thank God, has stayed intact."

A former Houstonian, Bagneris was one of the original founders of Pride parade here. He returned to New Orleans in 1986, where he has remained active in city politics with an emphasis on GLBT issues.

Now executive director of the Human Relations Commission in New Orleans, Bagneris' love for the Crescent City, its people, and its heritage is evident as he reflects on the events of the past year. He was forced by Katrina to evacuate his city, something he had never done before.

"We're so spoiled in the South, especially in New Orleans. We make jokes out of hurricanes," he says. "I just close my shutters and sleep through it, and wake up the next day. Two days later the electricity would be back on, and everybody's back to work."

August 2005 brought a new twist to the old theme. "I woke up Sunday morning [before Katrina hit] and saw the size of that thing taking up the entire Gulf, directly headed for New Orleans. I knew we had to get out of there."

Along with more than 150,000 of his fellow New Orleanians, Bagneris headed for Houston. Once here, when the enormity of the storm's devastation became apparent, coupled with the "incredibly unbelievable non-response coming from the federal government," Bagneris helped form the Pride Houston Hurricane Relief Fund. The collaboration between Montrose Counseling Center and Pride Houston collected and distributed more than \$40,000 to provide necessities to displaced GLBTs.

A year later, Bagneris still marvels at the way Houstonians responded to the emergency.

"Your mayor and your government really stepped up to the plate to help our residents," he says. "The gay community certainly went out of their way to make sure that people that evacuated to Houston were treated like family. So a big thank you to that community. Big, big, big."

A one-man visitors and convention bureau, Bagneris gets right to the point when asked what else Houstonians can do to continue to help restore the city.

"If you really want to help New Orleans, come and visit us," he says. After Southern Decadence [the annual "Gay Mardi Gras" which apart from 2005—in the immediate aftermath of Katrina—has taken place uninterrupted for the last 34 years over Labor Day weekend], Bagneris recommends New Orleans Halloween, a three-day fundraiser for local AIDS service organizations.

"There are costume balls, and, of course, the bars are all packed," he says. "You'll have a wonderful, wonderful time. Our food, our music—none of that's changed. And certainly, the gay community hasn't changed. It's just gotten closer, tighter, and more supportive of each other.

"Come visit us, get a hotel, spend your money," he adds, laughing, but with reflection. "To be honest with you, I'm more interested in people having a good time than filling the coffers."


If there was one lesson to be learned from Katrina, Bagneris believes, it is that "life is too short.

"So get back on the road and start enjoying those wonderful things only New Orleans has to offer."

Let the Good Times Roll Again

Storm survivor: Larry Bagneris returned to New Orleans on September 28, but not immediately to his home, which had sustained considerable wind damage. Like many of the city's employees, he was assigned quarters on a harbored cruise ship-which. in this case, was no RSVP cruise. "One would think that staying on the cruise ship would be a real treat," he says. "But let me tell you, when you're living there, it's not a treat at all. The rooms are about the size of a box."



Center to Center

In the aftermath of the Hurricane Katrina devastation, the Houston GLBT community rallied in a myriad of ways to offer support to New Orleans and the Gulf Coast and to evacuees who arrived here ("After the Storm," October 2005 *OutSmart*). Among these efforts: a fund established by the Houston GLBT Community Center to raise money for the Lesbian and Gay Community Center of New Orleans. As of June 2006, the Houston center had received more than \$5,600 for the New Orleans center. Donations arrived from across the country, says Houston center president Christopher Bown, including several GLBT centers in California.

In Serving in Silence, the system doesn't keep Margarethe Cammermeyer down



fter serving in the army for over 20 years, divorced mother of four Colonel Margarethe Cammermeyer (played by Glenn Close) unexpectedly falls in love with a bohemian artist (Judy Davis). During an interview to receive a higher security clearance, Cammermeyer reveals she is a lesbian. Refusing to recant her admission, the army initiates proceedings to discharge her from service. New theater music and songs from the stage

efore he had a hit with LaBelle's cover of his song "Lady Marmalade," gay record producer/songwriter Bob Crewe was credited with making Frankie Valli and the Four Seasons one of the top pop acts of the 1960s. Jersey Boys: The Original Broadway Cast Recording (Rhino) tells the story of the group in song. The talented cast works its way through the Four Seasons' catalog, which included memorable numbers such as "Sherry," "Big Girls Don't Cry," "Walk Like a Man," "Can't Take My Eyes Off You," and the comeback hit "December 1963 (Oh, What a Night)." Kudos to John Lloyd Young, who does a wonderful job of recreating Frankie Valli's distinctive singing style, falsetto and all.

It's not as if Stephin Merritt's songs weren't already theatrical to begin with. Even at their most electro, as performed by Magnetic Fields (one of his musical units), Merritt's songwriting, which owes as much to Stephen Sondheim as it does to the Pet Shop Boys, has an unsurpassed level of drama. I am continually drawn to the country-tinged "Papa Was a Rodeo," a song that remains nearly unparalleled in its ability to



elicit tears and laughter, all in the space of just a few minutes. The consistently prolific Merritt (why do you think, in addition to the Magnetic Fields, he has the bands the 6ths, Future Bible Heroes, and The Gothic Archies?), who in recent years has dabbled in movie soundtracks, has also created works for the theater. Showtunes (Nonesuch) compiles more than two dozen of Merritt's compositions, collaborations with Chen Shi-Zheng. Although they are not in the settings we have come to expect from Merritt. they nevertheless bear his mark (just listen to "What a F-king Lovely Day!" and "Fan Dance Cha-Cha"). It's understandable that he would want to share these tunes with his fans, but I'm sure there are many who are rubbing their hands together in anticipation of his next, more accessible offering.

Thank the Goddess for Canada. Aside from queer acts such as Tegan & Sara and The Hidden Cameras, the fertile Canadian music scene has, in recent years, provided us with wonderful artists such as Feist, Broken Social Scene, Stars, and, of course, The Arcade Fire. The Bell Orchestre, a side project by The Arcade Fire's Richard Reed Parry, features openly gay drummer Stefan Schneider. Recording a Tape the Colour of the Light (Rough Trade) is a grand piece of instrumental music that flirts with atmosphere and mood. "Les Lumieres, Pt. 1" is a luminous piece of ambience-setting. But don't get too comfortable, because "Les →





Lumieres, Pt. 1" kicks out the jams like nobody's business. Now that they have you on your feet, the Bell Orchestre sounds like they are determined to keep you up and moving with "Throw It On a Fire." "The Upwards March" combines a subtle hint of rhythm with a repetition reminiscent of Philip Glass, before it spills over into a gentle dance number.

A born performer, 87-year-old Chavela Vargas has been elevated to lesbian icon status. Well-known not only as a purveyor of the traditional Mexican song-style known as ranchera, Vargas was also as an out lesbian at a time (the 1950s and 1960s) when such a thing could put an end to both a career and a life. If, like me, you may be unfamiliar with Vargas, the exquisitely packaged Chavela at Carnegie Hall (Silver Label, which is the GLBT lesbian imprint of Tommy Boy Records) is a pleasing introduction. Clearly adored by her audience, Vargas has a palatable connection with her fans and puts on the kind of show people remember long after the concert has ended. Fortunately, such an occasion-recorded in September 2003-has been captured and preserved on this recording to be enjoyed and cherished. Of the singer, the gay Spanish film director Pedro Almodovar has said, "Chavela belongs to an ancestry of singers on the way to extinction. I'm talking about Edith Piaf, Judy Garland, Billie Holiday...geniuses whose brilliant and explosive talent caused their early demise. For me, to know Chavela has been like knowing them all. A miracle."

Acclaimed gay jazz pianist Fred Hersch knows how to put on a show, whether he is performing his own tunes or someone else's. In Amsterdam: Live at the Bimhuis (Palmetto) is a showcase both for Hersch's composition (the originals "A Lark" and "At the Close of the Day") and his interpretive skills (Hoagy Carmichael's "The Nearness of You." Jobim's "O Grande Amor"), as well as his incomparable piano plaving.

Gregg Shapiro is a past recipient of the annual OutMusic award that recognizes contributions by non-musicians in furthering the work of GLBT performers.

Rhino continues their overhaul of The Cure's lengthy catalog by issuing re-mastered and soupedup versions of their work from between 1984 and 1987 (as well as Robert Smith's side project The

Glove, from 1983). In doing so, they're really setting a new standard for reissues. There is such a thing as too much content when it comes to a reissue, but Rhino has found a perfect balance. First off is a booklet accompanying each album-full of lyrics, notes, and photos from each era. Then there are the albums themselves, which have been re-mastered and then each relegated to its own disc, album continuity preserved. The mastering most affects The Top, which, being the oldest of the lot, needed it most-and it sounds as fresh now as it did upon its release in 1984. The second disc of each set is packed with unreleased material-non-album tracks, live bootlegs, and home studio demos. The Head on the Door is the record that

really shines here, with the demos on the second disc, sometimes stripped down to just brief instrumentals with a drum machine, help to expose the layers of Smith's brilliant songwriting process. It's a process that has worked for the better part of 30 years now, and as long as he continues, it appears as if Rhino is going to stay right on his heels. From Rhino (www.rhino.com).



Alison Bechdel, creator of Dykes to Watch Out For, releases a graphic memoir

efore a word is even written, a memoir is a weighted undertaking. Add detail, such as the writer being a lesbian, and the book is already bent in an interesting direction. On top of that, the lesbian author's father is bisexual. Where can you possibly go from there? Let's see. How about that the father's untimely death. at the age of 44 in 1980, might have been a suicide, and not the accident it was presented as. Oh, and one more thing. Since the author is Alison Bechdel, whose beloved

Dykes to Watch Out For comic strip has been running in LGBT publications around the world for more than 20 years. the 240-page memoir is told in graphic form.

Fun Home: A Family Tragicomic (Houghton Mifflin). Bechdel's picture-perfect graphic memoir, brings her family story

to life. The same precision she brings to her drawings, she applies to the deeply personal story. Because the illustrations tell so much of the story, the economy of language borders on the poetic, making this one of the great literary achievements of the year. Alison Bechdel: I had attended BEA before, once or twice. But those times, I was with Firebrand Books, a small feminist press. I mostly went just to meet the various reps and distribution people who handled my books. I observed all the big author signings from afar, and felt rather out of the loop.

What was this year's experience like for you?

This time I did one of those book signings, up in the big corral. It was quite a change. From outside to inside.

Fun Home has been embraced by Entertainment Weekly. You received a rave review, which qualified the book for the magazine's "A List," and the book was also included and recommended in the summer book preview. How does it feel to be receiving those kinds of accolades?

Very, very odd. It feels good, but also unnerving. I've gotten used to a rather low profile over the years, and also to feeling increasingly bitter and jaded about never seeming to get as far as I'd hoped with my comic strip. I'd like to think that sort of external approval didn't matter, that it's all about the work. But in fact, getting a little recognition is a very constructive, positive experience.

In the acknowledgements page you thank your mother and brothers "for not trying to stop me from writing this book." How important was it to you to have your family's cooperation when it came to writing Fun Home?

It was very important. It might be impossible to do something like this without hurting someone, but I felt like I at least wanted to keep people in the loop about what I was doing. My mom and brothers objected to a few things in the book. I changed some of it, and other stuff I argued to leave in. Then did so. →

Moss Hart. A Prince of the Theatre Jared Brown

portrayed in such pedestrian, plodding style. • For all his mega-watt success, Hart was constantly down, except for the relentlessly upbeat face he showed to the public during work. A classic manic depressive, he would work on three projects simultaneously, was never satisfied with his phenomenal triumphs, and religiously spent twice a day at his psychologist's. Hart married late and had two children, but never shook the rumors that his lifelong incurable depressions occurred from his sublimation of his homosexuality. · But you'd never get an inkling after suffering through Brown's uninteresting and-then-he-wrote style. There's no

personal history here at all. The immense craft and the hard






The concept of queer parents has changed radically in recent years. Do you think that if your father had been of a later generation, that things might have turned out differently for him in terms of his sexuality?

Absolutely. In a way, the book is a sociological study of these two generations of gay people. My dad came of age a decade before Stonewall. I came of age a decade after. My circumstances were completely different from his, and I was able to make choices he wasn't. Some of that was about historical circumstances, but some of it was just who he was. In the book I try to sort that out a little bit.

Six Feet Under gave many people insight into the daily operation of a funeral home [Bechdel's father was a third-generation funeral home director]. Did you watch Six Feet Under and did you think it was an accurate portrayal?

I couldn't watch that show. It premiered very early in my work on my memoir, and when I first heard about it I felt devastated. Like, "Oh, God, someone else is telling my story." Eventually I did watch two episodes, and the parallels were pretty stunning. The father who gets killed in an accident. His surreal funeral in the family's own funeral

home. The gay brother. The wacky sister who drives an old hearse. My brother drives an old hearse!

There is a proverb that goes "A picture is worth a thousand words." When telling this story, how did you decide what to illustrate and what to write?

Well, theoretically, the words and pictures are interdependent. You don't say something in the text that you can show in the picture. And you don't put something in the picture that's more economically handled in the text. There's a sort of logic to it that you start to internalize after doing it for a while.

Is there a particular order in the creative process? Do the pictures or the words come first? I do tend to start with the words. But at a certain point I hit a wall with just words, and can't complete my ideas unless I start thinking of the story visually.

Fun Home is such a deeply personal work.

Do you think that you will continue to explore that realm?

Absolutely. I really love working autobiographically, and am beginning a new project in that vein.

With Fun Home, how does it feel to be a part of the ongoing evolution of graphic literature?

I'm feeling pretty fortunate about the timing of everything. Graphic narratives are moving from the subculture to the mainstream in a very similar way to how queer narratives are moving into the mainstream. I feel like I was in the right place at the right time. Though of course I've been doing both these things for nearly 25 years.

Eric Orner's The Mostly Unfabulous Social Life of Ethan Green has been made into a movie. How would you feel if you were approached about making Fun Home or Dykes to Watch Out For into a feature film?

I really don't think Fun Home would translate to film. I mean, I suppose someone could do it, somehow. But to me it's very much a sequential graphic story. There's not a lot of action. It's very internal, there's lots of narration, it has long essayistic passages. It's not like a movie that follows a simple threeact structure. I just can't see it. DTWOF, on the other hand, might be cool as a movie. I'd prefer to see it live action, I think, and not animated. Animation is mostly so shoddy. I think it would just look dumb, you know?


Friday, fried catfish).



did my radio spot this morning. Once a month, our local Air America affiliate Linvites me to the studio to read one of my lesbian humor columns and shoot the breeze with the host. I get to joke around, chat with fans who call in, and talk about all things queer.

Today, as usual, the host had me read my essay, laughed in the right spots, and played the canned applause at the end. Then she took a call from a listener.

Now, I assume folks in this show's audience enjoy an occasional lesbian point of view and can appreciate the tongue-in-cheek (or wherever) tone of my humor. Sometimes listeners call in with supportive comments. But this was no fan call.

It was a man named Mike. I should have known Mike was a troublemaker when he opened with "How can I say this without anyone taking offense?"

Apparently Mike listens to progressive

and I mean that literally.

After years of coming out, sitting on gay panels, and patiently educating everyone who will listen, you would think queer activists like me could count on a little R.E.S.P.E.C.T. (I hear you, Aretha.) But nooo. Mike felt entitled to douse my 20 minutes of public levity with dismal Bible references—notably side-stepping Love thy neighbor, Welcome the stranger, and Judge not.

Mike rambled on. "Homosexuality is an illogical lifestyle choice because a man and a woman fit together. Two women or two men do not."

Illogical? Don't fit? People who think same-sex couples don't fit together haven't seen me and Wifey, the reigning sovereigns of mesh and merge. But Mike wasn't interested in an image of loving embrace. He was fixated on Adam and Eve and the lifestyle thing.

> "Lifestyle? What do you know about my lifestyle? You think my being a lesbian tells you anything about how I live?" I noticed the host put down the volume on my mic. Guess I was shouting. I should've known better than to engage with the supreme bizarritude of this a-hole, but I couldn't help it.

> Mike kept trying to get a word in edgewise, blubbering tired b.s. about gayness causing disease, but I was on a roll. I felt it was my moral and revolutionary duty to interrupt, to stop this caller from further fouling the airwaves with his ignorant spew.

> "You sure know how to kill a party, Mike. You're bringing us down. This is supposed to be a humor segment. You're not funny."

> Time was up. The host thanked me, announced the upcoming news program, and signed off. I left the studio feeling rattled and ungrounded.

I thought of all the things I wouldacoulda-shoulda said to Mike. Don't you have a dial on your radio? If you can't handle 20 minutes in Queerland, change the channel, Buddy. Why listen if you know it's going to tweak your rigid binary heterosexist eensyweensy worldview?

Come to think of it, I can say all that on the air next month. After all, my blatantly queer-positive perspective is exactly what the talk show host invites me to bring to the program. How cool is that? Amidst the rightwing bluster of Bill O'Reilly, Lars Larson, and Dr. Laura, our town sustains a progressive commercial radio station-what a giant step forward from the pre-Ellen past.

Things have improved, but the crap is still out there. Some people have a huge problem with the mere existence of queerfolk and, amazingly, continue to believe they can Bible-thump us out of it. Fortunately, most LGBTQ people feel fine about who we are, and I for one am going to continue writing and broadcasting as if my readers and listeners are-and should be-okay with that.


The word "inspiring" should be used sparingly, but that's the only description possible for George Frederic Handel's sublime 1742 oratorio. There's nothing quite like it in all the repertory. Although the work is about Christ's life. Charles Jennens' libretto is mainly Old Testament passages set into three sections: Birth, Passion, Aftermath. In his typically speedy mode, Handel composed his masterwork in either 21 or 24 days. He had problems with censors and sensitive prima donnas, and the premiere in Dublin, one year after he completed the piece and under his leadership from the harpsichord, was a modest success. It took decades for this unique composition to work its magic. But once it took hold, Handel's radiant music remained forever with us, as majestic and haunting as the day the "great Saxon" finished it.

hold in this blah, blah, blah from our mouths because we just needed attention. The real truth is that the advocacy worked. It shut down the place.

The Actors' Gang is 25 years old. Congratulations, by the way.

Thank you.

Can you take a few minutes to tell me how The Actors' Gang came about and why you've stayed involved since its inception? We started at UCLA. I'd say we were kind of outcasts at the department to some degree. We were interested in punk rock music and a little harder form of theater than was being done at the department. So we wanted to bring a new performance energy into our work. The material we were more inclined toward was more European-influenced theater-Dadaist, Absurdism, Expressionism, Brecht.

And they weren't doing much of that there?

They did some Chekhov, and that's about it. But it wasn't necessarily that it wasn't a good department as far as broadening your perceptions with regard to theater-in fact, I had my first introduction to Ubu the King and Brecht at UCLA. It was that the kind of mode of performance wasn't as high octane as we wanted to bring. We were inspired by this aggressive political music, and we wanted to reflect that in our own stage performance. So when we brought Ubu the King out of UCLA into Hollywood, we brought it into this out-ofthe-way theater at midnight. We picked up a crowd of people, most of whom had never seen theater before. All of them had never seen theater like this before, because we were hot, sweaty rebels [both laugh] doing an outrageous kind of Dadaist play from 1900.

At midnight.

Yes, and scaring the hell out of half of our audience and the other half coming out of it saving, "That was the most interesting thing I've ever seen."

So we didn't have a lot of discipline or, for that matter, a mutual vocabulary. It was kind of like the baby got born, but it didn't have parents yet, and it was rearing its very large head on the L.A. theater scene.


Luckily, after we'd done about three or four shows. Georges Bigot came to town with the Le Théatre du Soleil from Paris. After they performed at the Olympic Arts Festival in 1984, he stayed behind and did a workshop in commedia del l'arte using masks. Four of us in The Actors' Gang took that workshop. And it was the right thing at the right time.

It was form, discipline, training, vocabulary—all fitted into our worldview and fitted into our energy. It gave us focus, and it gave us a way to channel this anarchic energy into a specific theatrical energy.

The four of us took this back to the rest of the gang, and we started working on a production using the form that we had learned in this workshop.

What was that production?

It was called Methusalem, The Eternal Bourgeois, written in 1922 by Yvan Goll from Germany. It was an Expressionist play, a very interesting play in that it was part of that movement of people who by 1920 had become disillusioned with the whole idea of the Russian revolution. In other words, these are the first people that realized that the Bolsheviks had sold out and that this new country was already becoming corrupted by loss of the



idealism of the revolution. A lot of these early idealists were thrown in jail and killed. And this play was part of that.

The play fit into our worldview at the time. We were kids that had grown up in a free society, and we were also kids that had grown up protesting to a certain degree some of the things that had been going on in our teenage years. But we'd also been kids that had been labeled Communists, right? And that was about as far from the truth as you could imagine. This play really spoke to that, because it was indicting this whole nonsensical idea of communism as being something that was actually idealistic and actually good for people, which was very confusing to our critics.

I don't think we ever followed a specific po-

litical line other than we believe in the idea of theater as a place to express ideas in an entertaining way.

What's the best and worst thing about being an actor?

Well, the best part of being an actor is this: You have no idea where you are going to be two months from now. Sometimes you get advance notice. Like last year, for example. It was June. I got a script. A month and a half later I was in South Africa. The year before that, a project came up, and I went to China, India, Dubai [in the United Arab Emirates], and England, all on one job, and none of those are places I would choose to go to. But because you are an actor, you go where the vision of the director is taking you, so you wind up in these really interesting situations, learning things that you'd never thought you'd learn. And because your job is empathy, because your job is trying to find out about human beings and the human condition, the more you are placed in these kind of unique situations, the more you have, the more material you have to do your work.

And the worst thing?

It's difficult to have these very short, intense, deep relationships with people. The idea that you're kind of a gypsy. For the next eight weeks, you're going to be in a family with these people and you're gonna be in working situations where it's best to be empathetic, vulnerable, and feel a real emotion with these other people. So it's difficult to come to the end of that and go, "OK, that's over with."

One final question: Both you and Susan have Oscars and many other awards. Is there a special place in your house that they're kept? To be truthful, we keep them in the bathroom.

It's kind of the bathroom by the front door, and the kids call it the famous bathroom. At first I thought it was a way to just go, Here's a way to show that these don't mean that much. We'll just put them in here. We'll just collect them in here. Then I realized that if we have guests over, it's kind of the bathroom they use, so it's a way of showing off. I mean, the delivery person or anyone coming in, that's the one they use. It's not like we're hiding them.


