#### A MATTER OF DISCIPLINE

The office of the presidency is not charged with raising, feeding, or disciplining Americans. Its first order of responsibility, constitutionally, is national security and the protection of our borders. The institution of the family is charged with the duties of raising children, yet Mr. Wolf so willingly yields them to Obama's White House [LeftOut, "Spare the Rod, Spoil the World" by Brandon Wolf, February]. I sometimes wonder if there are any responsibilities left to the individual.

Mr. Wolf seems to suggest that our source of success and happiness exists in Washington. Government is not and never has been the source of American greatness. Freedom is that source. #### GLBT CAUCUS PAC ENDORSES ANNISE PARKER FOR HOUSTON'S MAYOR

HOUSTON CITY CONTROLLER ANNISE PARKER earned an early endorsement in the November 2009 race for city mayor from the Houston Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender Political Caucus.

"Annise Parker is the most qualified candidate to lead Houston as our nation struggles through a severe economic crisis," said Kris Banks, caucus president. "Like the rest of our city, the Houston GLBT community is bracing for tough times in the coming months and years. We need a steady, experienced hand to guide us."

Parker's proven leadership and record of fiscal responsibility—along with her sound economic policy ensuring that Houston can continue to fund important priorities like public safety, stronger neighborhoods, infrastructure, and quality city services—were cited in the endorsement process.

"With this endorsement, our members send a strong message: qualifications matter now, more than ever," Banks said. "And no one is more qualified than Annise Parker to lead our city through tough economic times."

## NEW GROUP PLANS TO PRESERVE HISTORY WITH DIGITAL ARCHIVE

wenty-five community members gathered downtown at the Houston Public Library on January 28 to discuss ways to bring historical pieces of Houston's GLBTQ community together and to make them more accessible. During that conversation, a new community-based initiative was proposed: to preserve, collect, and promote wider awareness of Houston's rich GLBTQ history through an Internet-based archive.

"What would you do to protect your valuable papers and photos from a natural disaster—put them where floodwater cannot get to them? Scan them so they might not be lost in a fire?" Brian Riedel, one of the project's collaborators, posited. "But what would you do if those photos and papers were not just yours, but represented the history of a whole community? And what about the stories of our community that have not yet been recorded? What happens to those stories when the ones who know them pass on?"

The group hosts an open community meeting on Wednesday, March 25, 6:30 p.m., in the Montrose Counseling Center's first floor meeting space, 401 Branard St. Details: 713/348-2162.

#### THREE OPENLY GAY MEN RUNNING FOR HOUSTON CITY COUNCIL

A RECORD NUMBER OF OPENLY GAY MEN have declared their candidacy for seats on Houston's City Council.

Jeff Downing, a local attorney, also announced his candidacy for Houston City
Council District A, the seat currently occupied by Councilwoman Toni Lawrence, whose term also expires this cycle. After beginning his law career in the Harris County District Attorney's Office, Downing opened his own general practice firm, the Downing Law Firm.

City of Houston Public Works employee and small business owner, Noel Freeman, is running for Houston City Council at Large, Position 4. An Air Force veteran who has also worked in the office of U.S Congressman John Culberson (R-Tx.), the National Archives, and the National Security Agency, Freeman seeks to fill the council seat currently held by termlimited Ronald C. Green.

A former teacher, Maverick Welsh has announced his candidacy for Houston City Council District H, formerly held by now-Harris County Sheriff, Adrian Garcia. Welsh also served as campaign manager and chief-of-staff for current Houston City Council member and candidate for Houston mayor, Peter Brown.


#### UNITY COMMITTEE TO AWARD TWO SCHOLARSHIPS AT ANNUAL BANQUET

Returning to Sheraton Brookhollow Hotel on May 2, the banquet is one of the premiere single-night transgender events in the nation, organizers say.






#### Milestones

DIED. John Paul Barnich, 63, Texas' first openly gay city court judge, died February 2 from diabetes-related complications. Appointed to the court by Mayor Lee Brown in 1999, Barnich served on the bench until October 2007 when he resigned due to failing health, according to the Houston Chronicle. Founder of the Bar Association for Human Rights and frequent defender of gay rights and HIV-related cases, Barnich was also on the board, for four years as its chairman, of the AIDS Foundation Houston.

DIED. Bruce Neal Metskar, 51, died on January 15. A longtime member of the Montrose Softball League, Metskar also served on the board of that sports organization. Originally from Indiana, Metskar is survived by his partner, Ruben Diaz; two sisters; one brother and many friends.



DIED. Eleanor Tinsley, 82, an eight-term veteran of Houston's City Council who was one of the first women elected to citywide office, died February 10. A fierce advocate of city beautification, Tinsley was also a solid champion of issues supporting Houston's gay community. Tinsely's husband, James, preceded her in death. Funeral services were held February 14 at South Main Baptist Church.

You remember that grinning, former leader of the 30,000-member evangelical movement who boyishly zipped through the hallowed hallways of his mega church on a shiny silver motor scooter.

That's so gay.

Reverend Ted enjoyed not only worldly riches but also unfettered access to the Bush

2 White House, making no bones (sorry) about the influence he exerted over matters not only of church but also state. He took glee in revealing: "The president said, 'Ted Haggard, you need to come to the Crawford ranch and I'll show you what a ride is like."

That's so gay.

There were many more hints about Haggard that had for years set off the gaydar of those of us blessed with that extraordinary gift. There was his warm, full body embrace of young man after young man who flocked to his church in Colorado Springs with glazy-eyed adoration.

That's so gay.

And in an address to a stadium reserved exclusively for men—presumably Promise Keepers—Haggard enthusiastically once noted: "There's loads of testosterone in the room and everyone seems to love it."

So gay.

Named one of the 20 most influential evangelicals in the United States by *Time* magazine in 2005, Haggard fell and fell hard in 2006 when he admitted to snorting meth and cavorting with massage therapist/hookerman, Mike Jones.

"I broke the rules. I shouldn't have done that," Haggard now says in a new documentary, explaining his propensity for sexual hypocrisy like he was caught on a technicality.

Dancing around vocabulary. That's so

Alexandra Pelosi's *The Trials of Ted Haggard* reveals a much different Haggard today than the confident religious leader we met in her *Friends of God* three years ago. When not unemployed, Haggard now skips from menial job to even more menial job, like distributing advertising flyers or selling life insurance door-to-door. Every few months he moves himself, his

family, and their dwindling possessions from loaned homes to bleak apartments to cheap hotels.

Ted is now a haggard Haggard, if you will. In Pelosi's new film we learn that, after The Fall, Haggard agreed to counseling called "spiritual restoration" in exchange for a year's severance pay; he was also unceremoniously banished from New Life church and Colorado state by church leaders. Eighteen months later, those same church leaders declared Ted "100 percent heterosexual," a concept in itself which is so gay.

But Haggard denies ever having said that, himself. Rather, he agrees when his counselor calls him "a heterosexual with complications."

After his sordid story broke, Haggard said in a letter read to his heartbroken congregation that part of his life was "so repulsive and so dark"—a condition he later blamed on the long-term effect of "same-sex sex play" as a teen.

And then a priest molested him and then he became an alcoholic and then he began practicing his wide stance in the Minneapolis St. Paul International Airport. Just kidding about that last paragraph. That would be too gay.

In reality, he told CNN interviewer Larry King, "I have some thoughts in my life and some processes in my life that just don't fit neatly into the boxes, which I think is true for a lot of people."

Yes, Ted, that is true for a lot of people. We call those people gay people.

Trials closes with news that a second man, Grant Haas, has recently publicly accused Haggard of "inappropriate action"—more proof that when you scratch a closeted homo, you usually find more than just one massage therapist under the surface.

Haggard brushed off this latest

revelation, telling King that church leaders knew about his encounter with Haas two years ago, because—get this—he was "already out."

Gay.

Haggard further told King that he didn't choose his sexu-

ality, but admitted that denying it and trying to smother it only made it worse.


Gay.

And finally, though he also told King he is "100 percent satisfied" with his relationship with his wife, Gayle, Haggard also admitted, "I have thoughts from time to time, but not compelling thoughts."

That's not gay. That's just sad. Former GLAAD chief, Joan Garry, blogged last month about Haggard's return to the public eye with a more skeptical eye: "Please remember: he abused his power in the evangelical church and was dismissed. Sounds about right to me. Please remember: when he sympathetically talks about selling life insurance now, remember he should feel lucky he has a job. And please remember: his antigay rhetoric has been fanning the flames of prejudice and discrimination against gay and lesbian people for years. His sermons give permission-for name-calling and gay jokes at the water cooler. Then it ramps up. Employment discrimination, violence. But it all starts with the words of people in posi-

tions of power, often those with pulpits." Okay. I'm back, and appropriately outraged and disgusted.

Strange days, indeed.

## **MOVING BEYOND INJUSTICE**

Thoughts on choosing our battles in the era of Obama

Tt's not an easy task to trump a presidentelect during pre-inaugural media feed-Ling frenzies, But when Barack Obama announced the selection of Rev. Rick Warren to deliver the invocation at his inauguration. the gay community temporarily stole the global spotlight.

There have already been enough words said about the Warren controversy; I don't need to add fuel to the fire. But the incident did provoke me to think deeply about the relationship between President Obama and the nation's GLBT community.

I first read Obama's book, The Audacity of Hope, in the spring of 2008. Obama noted how important the human rights struggles of the 1960s and '70s were in bringing all kinds of disenfranchised groups to the political table. But he also noted that Ronald Reagan probably won the 1980 election because he characterized the rhetoric of these groups as "the politics of victimization."

Obama feels he understands the whole

issue of human rights well, growing up with an interracial heritage. He had to find his own balance between a struggle for rights and a slide into victim mentality. Based on my understanding of Obama's political philosophy of inclusion, the Rick Warren choice seemed logical to me. The outcry from the GLBT community, however, convinced me that this sense of logic wasn't shared by many other gays.

Since Barack Obama is our leader for the next four years, the GLBT community must learn how to work with him. So I offer my own thoughts for others to reflect on, as we collectively determine our community's relationship with the 44th president.

Victimization is, in essence, obsessive grieving. The grief is real. It is justified. It is a normal, natural, and necessary response to injustice and loss. Historically, the GLBT community has been treated with disdain, violence, and alienation. We've been the target of moralists and gay bashers. We've had our basic rights denied and our very existence threatened. To

grieve over such hurts is to be human.

However, as with all grief, there is only one true resolution: to accept our losses and to move on. Accepting our losses doesn't mean that we condone the actions that caused them, nor do we exonerate the people who caused them. It simply means that we have, as all 12-step recovery programs emphasize, "the serenity to accept the things we cannot change, courage to change the things we can, and wisdom to know the difference."

We don't have to look beyond today's headlines to see that resolving grief means that past injustices must be put to rest. Israel and Palestine continue their seemingly perpetual bloodbath that destroys countless innocent lives because neither side can resist seeking atonement for past atrocities.

What I'm suggesting is not a simple "turn the other cheek" attitude. There are very practical reasons to transcend past injustices and join in an effort to find com-

## **KNOW ON 8**

#### A post-mortem on what went wrong in California

ith a switch of just two percent of the votes, the leaders of the "No on 8" campaign would today be heroes. We'd be lauding their powerful advertising campaign. We'd be celebrating their coalition building. We'd wonder at their unprecedented fundraising prowess. And we'd still have gay marriage in California.

But life is a vale of tears, so the conventional wisdom is that the leaders of No on 8 are clueless cowards who squandered a large lead in a blue state in a bright blue year.

Never mind that they were trying to overcome deeply embedded views about something Americans think is the foundation of responsible family life.

Never mind that winning on Prop 8 would have been a first for gay marriage at the polls anywhere in America (except for a brief win in Arizona in 2006, reversed in 2008), including in blue states like Oregon and Wisconsin.

Never mind that the early public polls suggesting a big defeat for Prop 8 were never reliable, and were criticized as such at the time. There was no lead to be squandered.

Everybody now seems to know what went wrong on Prop 8. But the truth is, nobody really knows how that extra two percent might have been persuaded to vote "no."

The main "problem" identified by many critics is that the campaign left gay people invisible. Anti-Prop 8 literature made no mention of gays, instead complaining that it was "unfair" and "wrong" to discriminate against an unnamed group of people. The television ads didn't portray gay families.

This deliberate omission deeply offends a lot of people. The gay-rights command of the past 40 years has been to come out. The logic was recently summed up by veteran lesbian activist Robin Tyler at a post-Prop 8 "Equality Summit" in Los Angeles. "When you get to know us," she said, "you don't want to discriminate against us." No on 8 was a "know-nothing" campaign.

Campaign leaders have defended the

know-nothing approach as the only way to win. Political consultants, whom we're told know better about such things than ordinary mortals, advised them that frank images of homosexuals would turn off persuadable voters. An "openly gay" campaign would not have won. It would have lost by an even larger margin, they claim.

The political professionals may be right. The error of the know-nothing critique is that it treats a strategy for winning the culture war (come out) as a tactic for winning a ballot battle. Coming out is an interpersonal act that works because the person already knows and likes you. It's not something you tell 40 million strangers expecting their immediate understanding and support. Contrary to Tyler's admonition, can you really "know us" via 30-second ads aired over a period of a few months?

But there are a couple of potential problems with the adult, responsible, realistic. political-consultant perspective. First, to







monalities with our detractors, instead of emphasizing our differences.

Real change doesn't occur overnight. It's incremental. In the mid 1990s while I was an employee at Chase Bank, I joined actively in support of the newly established diversity effort that the bank had initiated, and helped found the firm's Pride Team. One of the initial realities we had to accept was this: people can be forced to change their behavior, but not their attitudes. For example, I knew that some people would continue to make Brandon-bashing comments, but now they would have to be very careful just how publicly they made those comments. If homophobic comments were reported to the management, these people would be punished because of the new corporate diversity policies. Their attitudes remained the same, but their windows of opportunity had become much smaller and would continue to shrink, as more and more people came to believe in the value of respecting diversity.

After the Warren controversy broke, the pastor called lesbian rock singer Melissa Etheridge and told her he was a fan. He accepted an invitation to meet her partner and her children. Etheridge said she felt genuinely moved by their meeting. Many critics were quick to label her as "naïve."

Perhaps it is her critics who may be naïve. Change can happen, but it has to be accepted at a pace that is realistic. Progress for our community has come at a pace of "two steps forward, one step back." Let's try to focus more on that incremental one step forward.

Our community has goals that are noble, and it has complaints that are legitimate. But if we don't choose our battles wisely, we will waste political capital, and we may come to be viewed by some as whiners. If we "cry wolf" too often, the day may come when no one listens.

President Obama is determined to lessen the polarization in America. Inviting a man of faith who is not a member of his political base helped to do just that at the inauguration. And as fate would have it, Warren delivered a totally unmemorable invocation. When Aretha Franklin appeared with that über-fabulous big-bow hat, Warren quickly became forgotten history.

We can't expect the president to ignore those people who share views different from his own-or from ours. What we can do is to support his efforts to bring people in this country face to face, with a new willingness to walk in each other's shoes. And when we do, we all begin to discover that no matter what shoes we wear, we all walk on the same common ground.

Brandon Wolf founded the online group, Houston Activist Network (Han-Net), which is now

know whether it's right we'd need to see the actual data-the polling, the focus-group analysis-that underlie this judgment. My untutored sense is that focus groups and polls are often applied too statically and mechanically to real-life politics, which are dynamic and contextualized. Focus groups might have loved New Coke, but the public didn't.

Second, there's a paradox here. Almost everyone agrees that victory in the gavmarriage struggle ultimately requires the deep cultural shift brought on by coming out, by acquainting Americans with the real problems faced by real gay families, and by showing them how gay people are no threat to their own churches, families, and values.

We aren't going to fool people into supporting gay marriage. We can't just coldly claim legal rights. We may persuade gay activists that it's "wrong" and "unfair" to eliminate rights created five minutes ago by four judges. But most people don't believe there's a right to something that's not right. And they need to know a lot more about gay families over a long period to reach the conclusion that gay marriage is right.

How can that be done without talking about actual gay people? And when will it be done on a large scale except when we have the resources and energy to do it, as we do in a ballot fight? Winning in the end may depend on losing a few preliminary rounds in a way that progressively erodes the opposition. Instead, in every single ballot fight in 30 states, we have squandered the opportunity to educate voters for the future. Losing smartly now means winning later; losing ignorantly just means endless losing.

None of this is to say that the know-nothing choice made by No on 8 leaders was wrong in its context. My sense is that leaders of No on 8 reasonably thought they were within striking distance of winning and let their analysis overcome their instincts. They placed the safest bet available and narrowly lost.

Some people would say on principle that we should always reject "closet" tactics, regardless of the political consequences. That's too hard and pure for my taste. If we could have secured marriage in California in 2008 by parading Dykes on Bikes before the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, I would have done that. If we could have won by replaying Pat Robertson's meteorological ruminations. I would have done that, too.


But the hard truth is that in the long run, and in other places, we'll need less "No" and more "Know."





## **CLEAN SLATE**

#### Our new president ushers in an era of hope, optimism, and diversity

he historic election of the country's first African-American president may be the most important election of the 21st century, signifying a new hope in America and throughout the world.

## **FOLLOWING THE EXAMPLE OF ADVOCACY**

What you can do to honor two heroes' legacy

Tudge John Paul Barnich died of dia- humorous, creative, poignant, and even betes-related causes on February 2, 2009, at the age of 63. With his death, Houston lost a good friend and a dedicated public servant.

Barnich was instrumental in the creation of the High School for Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice, and he was the first openly gay man to serve as a city court judge. In addition, he made a lasting impact on HIV/AIDS services in our community.

For starters, Barnich became a board member at AIDS Foundation Houston in 1984 in the early days of the organization's existence. Later, as chairman of the board, Barnich further helped to shape AFH and created some of the services it continues to provide today. However, Barnich's impact extended well beyond one AIDS service organization.

Barnich was a true activist, passionate about his cause and willing to employ

outrageous tactics to convey his message. Once in the early days of the HIV epidemic, Barnich dressed as Death to address city council members about the needs of our citizens who were living with AIDS! Barnich was a role model for other activists, and he will be greatly missed.

We lost another advocate and budding crusader in late December 2008 when Glenn (due to confidentiality issues, I have omitted his last name) passed away of AIDS-related pneumonia. Glenn, a former civil engineer, had recently devoted himself full time to volunteer service within the HIV community.

Glenn spent many hours per week volunteering at Center for AIDS, and he was slated to serve on the Ryan White Planning Council in 2009. In addition, Glenn was working tirelessly with Ruben Rosas (another local advocate) to investigate and pursue prosecution of God Bless Charities, the bogus nonprofit organization that collects donations on Houston streets. We will miss Glenn and his commitment and enthusiasm.

The recent deaths of John Paul Barnich and Glenn got me thinking about HIV/AIDS advocacy in our community: What is being done to nurture and prepare the next generation of AIDS activists in Houston?

There is a leadership training program for HIV-positive individuals administered by the Ryan White Planning Council and facilitated by the Center for AIDS called Project L.E.A.P. (Learning, Empowerment, Advocacy, Participation). This comprehensive, 17-week program informs participants about the needs of Houston's HIV community and services available for persons living with HIV, as well as funding issues, community planning processes, and governmental policy.

Through this program, 35 persons per year gain the knowledge and skills needed to shape HIV services and influence the allocations process in the Greater Houston area. Project L.E.A.P. ensures that those living with HIV have a significant voice in determining the future of AIDS care and funding.

HIV-infected persons interested in Project L.E.A.P. should contact the Center for AIDS at 713/527-8219, or they may apply online by going to centerforaids.org/leapapp.pdf.

Since only a few people per year are admitted to Project L.E.A.P., what can the rest of us do to have an impact on HIV/AIDS in our community? The good news is that there are numerous ways one can serve as an HIV advocate. There are many local AIDS service organizations that need volunteers to help with administrative tasks, client service delivery, or special events. Investigate the volunteer opportunities offered and see which ones fit with your personality, interests, and schedule. Then make a phone call and offer the gift of your time. It will be

People may also serve as HIV advocates by getting educated and simply speaking up about this disease. Inform those in your life-family, friends, colleagues, neighbors-about the ways in which HIV is transmitted, how it can be prevented, the numbers of people infected in our community, the plight of those living with the disease, and the need for tolerance and an end to stigma.

Be visible and vocal in your support of those living with HIV and those working to fight the disease. Attend rallies and events, write your elected officials, and participate in the planning process.

And of course, you can impact HIV care and services in our community by donating to a community-based organization. We have dozens of them in Harris County that provide HIV-related services. You can specify the particular program or service you wish to support with your donation or you can allow the provider to use the funds in the way that would most assist the organization.

One very easy way you can become an HIV advocate is by participating in the 20th AIDS Walk Houston. Go to AIDSWalk Houston.org and register as an individual. join an existing team, or create your own team. Then raise money and walk the Walk on Sunday, March 15. By doing so, you will be making a public statement about your support of those living with HIV and your concern about this important health issue facing our community.





awyers find answers for clients, judges find answers for society," says newly elected Judge Steven Kirkland. A ballot victory last November has now put Kirkland in a position to find those answers for society. He also holds the distinction of being the first and only out-and-proud elected jurist in Harris County.

"I want to be a judge because I've always believed in justice," Kirkland told *OutSmart* in a recent interview. "All my life I've stood up for what is right. I've told people what is wrong, and I've tried to change it."

The 48-year-old Kirkland is a man of transparency who talks with equal ease about his male partner of 22 years, his recovery from alcoholism, and his passion for the judicial process. He comfortably blends a wry sense of humor with a deep understanding of law.

The son of a truck driver, Kirkland was born and reared in Abilene, Texas. "I got out as fast as I could," he remembers. "I came to Houston and enrolled at Rice University. I picked a major, completed my coursework, and graduated with a bachelor of arts degree. I was quite involved in politics at Rice, but I was also an active alcoholic. I didn't have a grip on my sexuality or my addiction."

Participation in a twelve-step recovery program helped Kirkland get control of his alcoholism. "I have a genetic predisposition to addiction," he says. "There is lots of it on both sides of the family. All of my brothers are addicts of some sort and are at various points of recovery.

"I had to get my triggers under control," he reflects. "Being gay was a trigger for the disease. I had to get a grip on my sexuality before I could get a grip on my alcoholism. At age 23 I came out to my aunt and then to my parents. It was one of those late-night sobbing things at the kitchen table."

Kirkland sobered up, started law school, and went to work as a paralegal for the now-defunct Texaco Corporation. He attended night school at the University of Houston's Law Center and graduated with cum laude honors. Following graduation, Texaco promoted him to environmental litigator. He held that position for eight years, until a merger made his position redundant.

For the next few years, he worked as a plaintiff's attorney for Harris County residents filing air pollution lawsuits. "This is not a good jurisdiction for plaintiffs," he notes. "We weren't able to be as successful as citizens needed us to be. But we got what we got at the time."

Kirkland actively entered local politics when his friend, Annise Parker, asked him to manage her city council campaigns in 1991 and 1995. "Neither campaign was successful," he states, "but we laid the groundwork for her 1997 victory." Parker has since served three terms as a Houston City Council member and three terms as City Controller. She is currently a candidate in the Houston mayoral contest.

Kirkland's path to the judiciary was paved in 2001, when his name was submitted to Mayor Lee Brown for consideration as a municipal judge. He was appointed to a part-time position, and later appointed as a full-time judge, then re-appointed by Mayor Bill White.

#### **Campaigning for Elected Office**

In late 2007, Kirkland announced his candidacy for the 215th District Civil Court. He won the Democratic primary against opponent Fred Cook in the spring of 2008. He then faced the challenge of running against 10-year incumbent Levi Benton, an African-American Republican.

No one ever asked about his sexual orientation during candidate forums, Kirkland says, "but there was probably a whisper campaign. I heard one report that cent of the vote. As an openly gay candidate for judge, Kirkland also made history for the Houston GLBT community that night.

On January 1, 2009, Kirkland took the oath of office with his fellow judges-elect during a brief, quiet ceremony at the South Texas College of Law. On January 15, 2009, his investiture ceremony, the judicial equivalent of an inauguration, was held in the ceremonial courtroom of the Civil Courthouse.

Addressing those who gathered to celebrate, Kirkland declared, "We don't make these journeys alone, and I would like to acknowledge a number of folks who have helped and supported me along the way. First is my life-partner, Mark. Mark is both my anchor and barometer, lifting me up and keeping me humble at the same time. He's put up with many strange side trips in our journey together and many impositions, including attending and participating in this event on this, our 22nd anniversary."

#### Houston's Openly Gay Civil Court Judge

As a Texas District Civil Court Judge, Kirkland works with property-damage issues, personal-injury claims, breach-of-

a comment was made at a local meeting of the Greater Houston Pachyderm Club about 'a guy who is running for office who's never been married."

Kirkland neither shied away from nor made a point of his sexual orientation during the campaign. "When I walk into a gay fundraiser and kiss men hello, I don't really have to talk about it," he says. "However I did mention being gay when I was emphasizing the diversity of the Democratic ticket."

Besides his personal qualifications for the job, Kirkland points out other factors that helped elect him last November. "George Bush's unpopularity and Barack Obama's popularity were important," he says. "The Republican brand was tarnished both nationally and locally. And many voters detected a sense of entitlement on the part of some local Republican judges."

On the evening of November 4, 2008, Kirkland led his opponent with 51.3 percontract disputes, and other individual civil matters. He also presides over environmental litigation and suits between corporations. Kirkland feels that a judge needs to listen, to have a breadth of knowledge of the law, to be decisive, to be compassionate, and to be humble. For young people interested in a judicial career, he advises that they go to school, study hard, be connected, learn how to relate to people, exhibit interest in the judiciary, and work internships.

Asked how he likes being a judge, Kirkland responds, "It's fun! I get to hear lots of stories and see the world through the different perspectives of many others.

"It's a great intellectual challenge. That challenge is very stimulating, and when I meet it, it's very rewarding."

#### The Importance of Law

## **Out on the Bench**

Municipal Judge Barbara Hartle is the only out lesbian member of the Texas judiciary

T'm still overwhelmed when I first enter a courtroom, and everyone rises," says Houston Municipal Court Judge Barbara Hartle. The only out lesbian member of the Texas judiciary, 50-year-old Hartle has been sitting on the bench since her appointment in 2006. She moved to Houston in 2002 from Austin.

At the time of her appointment, she says, no one in the GLBT community knew of her presence in Houston. She had been busy with a new job and settling in. "I didn't have time to get involved with the GLBT community here like I had in Austin." When Presiding Judge Berta Mejia introduced Hartle at her swearingin ceremony, Mejia acknowledged Hartle's partner, Vallarie Fisher. "No one in that audience was more surprised than fellow judge Steve Kirkland," she says. "So were City Controller Annise Parker and City Council member Sue Lovell. Annise and her partner, Kathy Hubbard, quickly organized a welcoming party at their home, so that I could meet local GLBT leaders."

#### From Military Brat to Attorney

"I was born on the grounds of the Annapolis Naval Base," Hartle says. "I was one of six children." She graduated from high school in Ohio and then moved to Austin to attend the University of Texas.

"I earned a degree in social work, but Ronald Reagan had recently been elected, and there were no longer jobs in social work," she recalls. "So I went to work as a corrections officer, and my first captain was Margo Fraiser, who went on to become the sheriff of Travis County. The majority of female corrections officers were lesbian, so I never felt closeted."

After being promoted to sergeant, Hartle decided to earn a peace officer certification. She worked at the city jail in Austin, where she was responsible for transporting prisoners to and from the jail. "I was a uniformed deputy sheriff. I handled the paperwork required and worked with people posting bond. Those were interesting times, but I tired of shift work-the 11-to-7 shift was particularly hard—so I became

an adult probation officer."

In 1996, in her mid 30s, Hartle made the decision to move to San Antonio and attend law school. "My parents had a home there and I lived with them. I finished law school and found a job as a prosecutor for the Austin Municipal Court."

Austin was close enough that she could keep watch over her elderly parents. But after her mother's death, her father re-married. "I no longer had a reason to stav in Austin," she says. "My partner's daughter, who lived in Houston, now had two children. We wanted to watch them grow up, so we sold our home, packed the car, and moved here along with my partner's father. We sort of looked like the Beverly Hillbillies," she says, laughing at the memory.

#### **Municipal Court Appointment**

"I first found a job in Huntsville, but after five months of commuting, I knew that wasn't going to work," Hartle says. She

then took a position with the State of Texas working in elder law. "I work with the elder population and their specific legal needs. This has become a very popular field because of all the aging Baby Boomers."

When Mayor Bill White was looking for part-time municipal judges in 2006, he sent letters to members of the Association of Women Attorneys in this area.

"I was a member of that group," Hartle says, "so I applied and was selected for a part-time appointment." She was first appointed in March 2006, and then re-appointed in December 2008.

Municipal judges sit for misdemeanor cases, situations where citizens are fined but are not sentenced to jail-traffic violations, public intoxication, dog barking. There are currently about 22 full-time and 40 part-time municipal judges who report to Presiding Judge Berta Mejia. "I work two nights a week, from 5 p.m. to 11 p.m.," Hartle explains. "I sometimes take cases in the courtroom at the jail, but usually I

am in the downtown location. I have a very active walk-in court, mostly for people who have missed their court dates and are the subjects of outstanding warrants. . . . Most people will deal with a municipal court because of traffic cases," she notes.

How can citizens stay out of traffic court? Hartle smiles and advises, "Slow down. Most traffic violations are for speeding. Usually drivers deny it and most often say they were just going with the flow of the traffic. But we are all human, and sooner or later we all get popped. I was once ticketed

for speeding, as I was coming down a hill," she chuckles. "I denied it, but the officer wouldn't listen!"

She stresses the importance of keeping auto insurance current. "The State of Texas imposes a large surcharge if you let it lapse," she warns.

#### The Integrity of the Legal System

Hartle says that a good judge must have knowledge of the law and be able to show fairness to both sides in a case. "And they must have integrity," she adds.

"There are so many bad jokes about lawyers," she says wistfully. "Some lawyers don't tell the truth, and they can taint the whole field. But most people who represent clients in municipal court care about their clients. They aren't making big bucks. They do what they do to help people who don't have much money and could lose their driver's licenses."

Hartle says that she sometimes catches attorneys making dishonest statements. "I get angry with them. I let them know that they are bringing down the whole field. It's like 10 steps backwards, and the rest of us have to show that this is not representative of the whole legal system. But lack of integrity isn't widespread. If it was, the system would already have stopped working."

For people who feel cynicism about the judicial process, Hartle says the remedy is the same as that for GLBTs who aren't respected. "You should get to know people in the legal field and see that they are genuine, honest, and hardworking people."

Hartle likes being a judge because she likes working with people, she says. "It's the interaction. I learn from other people every day. And at the end of the evening, people often thank me for ensuring that they get their share of justice."

#### Grandchildren Ride in Pride Parade

Though Fisher's daughter, Tara, is also a lesbian, it was not something Fisher knew or even guessed, until Tara chose to come out. Sadly, Fisher's other child, a son, has turned his back on both his sister and his mother.

Tara and her partner, Kim, have a son and a daughter, Dylan and Kyra, both from artificial insemination, using the same anonymous sperm donor. Hartle says that the children are popular and active.

Hartle's and Fisher's grandchildren enjoy coming to her courtroom and watching her preside as judge, she says. "They also love to ride in a convertible in the annual Houston Pride Parade. In 2006, 2007, and 2008, I've marched with fellow out-and-proud judges Steve Kirkland and the late John Paul Barnich. . . . I'm blessed that my family-brothers and sisters and nephews and nieces-are all very accepting," says Hartle. "Even my father. who at first struggled, is now accepting."

Hartle feels that it is important for gavs

to be out, to be true to themselves and not to hide. "Being gay has no impact on my being wise and fair on the bench," she says. "And like many attorneys, if

I am filling out a form and it isn't comprehensive, I add in an extra line and make it so-under marital status, I usually add the classification 'partnered."

#### **How the Judicial System Impacts GLBTs**

The Supreme Court's 6-3 decision in Lawrence v. Texas, the famous Houston sodomy case in 2003, surprised her, Hartle says. "But it was about time. How much more would it have taken?"

Reflecting on California's Proposition 8, she says, "The law as it is written does not say 'except gay and lesbian people.' We all have the right to pursue happiness, but that doesn't seem to be happening for us in this country. More and more, brave gay and lesbian people will challenge this in the nation's courtrooms, and landmark cases will change people's attitudes. I am especially interested in Melissa Etheridge's challenge that she will not pay state taxes in California because she cannot fully partake of the state's privileges."

About the United States Supreme Court, Hartle says, "It's not very representative. Let's hope certain members decide to retire." Asked if there are viable gay jurists who would make good nominees, she pauses for a few moments and then says brightly. "Steve Kirkland! Let's call Barack."

As for herself, Hartle says, "The Supreme Court jurists are really a bit distant-they work mostly with the lawyers. not the people being represented. I prefer to work with people." But would she accept the call if nominated? "Oh, sure," she says. Then a big smile crosses her face as she adds, "I've never hired a nanny, and I've always paid all my taxes, too!" ■



and a process to work out disputes, rather than fighting in the streets. I don't judge people; I judge their actions and behavior. In my drinking days I violated the law and I was punished. We all make mistakes, but we can be bigger than our mistakes and get beyond them."

Kirkland says that there is good reason to respect the judicial system. "One must understand that justice is a process. A lot of people are involved that bring the whole process together. It can take several years of work for some decisions. Even if one can't appreciate a particular decision, they can appreciate the process.

"Broad-stroke criticisms usually don't take into account the context of a decision," Kirkland warns. "Don't listen to Rush Limbaugh—or to a liberal equivalent. Evaluate what is really happening. Don't just have a knee-jerk reaction."

Kirkland dismisses the characterization of "activist judges" as partisan criticism. "A judge is only an activist if the ox being gored is one's own," he says dryly.

Longtime Houston activist Ray Hill feels a great sense of pride in Kirkland's win. "When I began organizing for GLBT equality in 1966, the issue was one of criminal law because we could be sent to prison. Forty-three years later in 2003, that law was declared void when the U.S. Supreme Court struck down the Texas 21.06 sodomy statute. The election of Steve Kirkland to a district court in Harris County is just one indication of how far we have come in less than a generation."

Local gay attorney Mitchell Katine reflects on his own years of practicing civil law. "As an attorney who has practiced in the Harris County Civil District Courts for over 20 years, it is exciting that the citizens of Harris County have finally been able to focus on the merits and abilities of a judicial candidate, such as Judge Steven Kirkland, instead of who the candidate loves or wants to share his or her life with, Judge Kirkland will be an excellent example of a fine judge who also happens to be gay. Judge Kirkland has broken the GLBT barrier in Harris County's civil judiciary. He is the first of many GLBT judges who will follow in his footsteps for many years to come. GLBT issues rarely come up in the courtroom, but with more and more GLBT individuals coming out, it is more likely that the sexual identity of the parties will play a role in some litigation, and Judge Kirkland will be very equipped to handle them with understanding, sensitivity, and good judgment"

To Kill a Mockingbird is the only courtroom movie that Kirkland has ever seen. "The dramatics in courtroom movies are only for entertainment—a real courtroom is not that exciting," he says. "Then again, sometimes it's more exciting!"

Kirkland is not a fan of TV court coverage. "Television in a courtroom is a bad idea," he says. "It affects how people behave. It impacts justice."

He is a fan of the jury system and has great faith in it. "There may be people on juries who don't listen to what the judge tells them to do," he says, "but there is always someone on a jury who does, and they police the process."

Supreme Court Justices Frankfurter, Cardoza, and Marshall are three famous jurists he admires. "I also admire the men who decided the *Brown v. Board of Education* suit," he adds. "There are many great people who have been a part of judicial history."

#### Gay Rights and the Law


"Gays need to be in every walk of life,"
Kirkland asserts. "It's important to be who
we are wherever we are, then other people
can learn to relate to us. Some people
connect with me because I'm gay, others
connect with me because I'm a recovered
alcoholic. Or perhaps it's just that I'm a
Democrat. I put it all out there for people
to decide.


"Being gay doesn't have to hold a person back," Kirkland says, "but it used to hold people back." He remembers two distinct incidents from his campaign. "One young lawyer told me he wanted to run for a judgeship someday but was concerned because he was gay. Another man asked to be removed from my petition for candidacy when he found out I was gay. In both cases, people took the gay issue and limited lives. Until we get lots of gay people who are out in the open, this will continue."

Kirkland looks at the United States
Supreme Court and doesn't see diversity.
"We will change it," he says with optimism, "but not overnight." Will a future
Supreme Court nominee be gay? Kirkland says there are good gay candidates that might be considered. "I know of a federal judge in Florida and a Supreme Court judge in Oregon," he notes.

Would he answer a call to serve on the Court, if President Obama phoned and asked? "I'm available!" he says with a broad smile. ■

## In the Beginning

### Judge John Paul Barnich

September 25, 1945–February 2, 2009

omeone had to be first. In the case of openly gay judges in Houston, the first was John Paul Barnich. Barnich was initially appointed to the Municipal Judge's

bench in 1999 by Mayor Lee Brown, and, thanks to continual re-appointments by Mayor Bill White, served 10 subsequent years

He began his professional career as a schoolteacher for the Houston Independent School District. However, he wanted to do more. Earning his law degree from South Texas College of Law in 1980. Barnich began his private attorney's practice in 1981.

As his practice grew, so did his résumé. A lecturer for Thurgood Marshall School of Law, Texas Southern University, Texas Human Rights Foundation Legal Seminars, and the Houston Bar Association, Barnich was a founding member of the Bar Association for Human Rights and a volunteer lawyer with the Houston Volunteer Lawyers. One of his cases was joined by the U.S. Justice Department, and led to the inclusion of AIDS under the Americans with Disabilities Act.

But Barnich is perhaps best remembered as a pioneer in Houston's GLBT community, originally inspired by a sign he saw on the wall at Mother Theresa's clinic in Calcutta that read, "God is Love in Action."

The affable Barnich also lived by the sentiment of another sign: the one on his office door read, "Be Nice or Leave."

Barnich's countless volunteer hours on behalf of the GLBT and HIV/AIDS community would entail handling untold numbers of pro bono cases. Additionally, he helped form AIDS Foundation Houston, serving on its board for several terms. The Greater Houston HIV Alliance, AIDS Equity League, Houston GLBT Political Caucus, the Harris County Democrats, Texas Human Rights Foundation, and the Annual Conference on AIDS in America also benefited and recognized his leadership and humanity.


One of his proudest legal moments came when, as lead council, he won the case in a suit against a well-known dental franchise for refusing to treat PWAs, forcing changes in the way dentists treated the HIV/AIDS population.

In 1999, he made it look easy as he took the bench beside other minorities of African-American, Hispanic, and Vietnamese judges, saving he felt included in a bigger sense of history, looking toward a future in which a gay man, such as himself, would not be considered a minority but simply as part of the bigger picture of what he called "this great city of Houston."

John Paul Barnich, 63, died last month at Methodist Hospital of complications due to diabetes. Because he walked in them, Houston's judicial halls have been forever changed for the better.

## WALK ON 20 Years Later

Now more than ever, AIDS Walk Houston is vital to area charities

n 1990, Texas Ranger Nolan Ryan logged his 300th major league baseball win. Now-Congresswoman Sheila Jackson Lee was beginning her first term on Houston's city council. And nearly 8,000 cases of HIV, primarily infecting gay men, had been diagnosed in Texas.

Funds to support those ailing Texans were scarce. Texas state senator Carl Parker, a democrat from Port Arthur, had recently denounced state funding for AIDS programs, calling it "pouring money down a rat hole." By necessity, Houstonians were taking more personal responsibility in fighting the spreading, deadly

disease that had insidiously introduced itself to the gay community a mere nine years earlier. "The very first year, 1990, when our AIDS walk was called 'From All Walks of Life,' there were probably -

#### Working, Walking Together

IDS Walk Houston 2009, this year pre-Asented by Chevron, is a community-wide event that attracts thousands of Houstonians each year. Though the walk is produced each year by AIDS Foundation Houston, funds raised benefit local AIDS service 20™year organizations.

"This is one of the things I love most about our partnerships with partner agencies," McCann says. "The partner agencies raise money for their own organizations, using AIDS Walk as their vehicle.

Each of the partner agencies keep 75 percent of what they raise, with 25 percent going to AFH to cover administrative cost.

"We don't require that our partner agencies be solely AIDS service organizations, but they must have programs that serve those living with the disease, or they have some sort of prevention program," McCann continues. "SNAP, for example, has a wonderful AIDS program. They provide either free or reduced cost vaccinations, neutering, and other pet care to the animal companions of people who are living with HIV and AIDS."

200 people-if that-who showed up downtown to raise awareness and funds for HIV," Kelly McCann recalls.

It is impossible for McCann, chief executive officer of AIDS Foundation Houston, which produces AIDS Walk Houston, not

> to be a bit reflective considering how far the walk has come since its inception.

"It's such an amazing thing to think that most of those few 200 people who showed up were people living with HIV who were still healthy enough to walk."

Though HIV and AIDS had been a reality in Houston since the early 1980s, it remained a stigmatizing illness a decade

later, even to the extent that close friends and supporters were sometimes hesitant to be spotted at an event as visible as a public walk.

1990 - 2009

"We made virtually no money," Mc-Cann say. "Of course, we've been very proud to be able to grow the event and grow the impact.

"And we are still so honored to be doing this work, 20 walks later," she continues. "But we certainly realize and are humbled by the fact that we don't do it alone. This is

a true grass-roots, community-wide effort, and we are deeply indebted to the people

McCann hopes for a warm, sunny day for those 15,000-or-so Houstonians who now converge annually on downtown's Sam Houston Park the morning of the walk, adding that only the most extreme weather emergency would prevent the walk from occurring.

"One year, Mexico was burning the sugar cane fields and all that smoke drifted up to Houston," she recalls. "The air quality was so poor it was unhealthy, and we had to move the walk indoors. Thousands of people just walked around and around inside the George R. Brown!

"But, you see again, neither rain nor sleet nor smog nor dark of night will keep people from coming out, and that is a great thing for us and for the HIV community," McCann reasons. "It shows that, yes, people still care about this issue, they still support people living with HIV, and they know that it's still a serious health crisis in our community."

McCann estimates as much as \$6 million has been raised over the years by AIDS Walk Houston, distributed to AFH and partner agencies to help fund a diverse array of programming; for the first time since its inception, last year's walk -



broke the \$1 million mark. She attributed last year's increase not only to the hard work of AFH's staff, but also to the walk's partner agencies. "Those partnerships plus greater and greater numbers of people joining up, becoming team members and raising funds lends itself to—no pun intended—the viral sort of expansion of AIDS Walk that I hope we'll see continue."

But that was 2008. This year's final tally from 2009 may yield a bleaker result.

"Because of the economic problems, all areas may suffer; all sorts of AIDS service organizations are going to be in a whole world of hurt, potentially," McCann says. "There is an increasing need, especially when there is an economic downturn, for the types of services that AIDS Foundation Houston provides—basic needs like food and housing, and certainly greater access to medical care, and greater needs in prevention and awareness."

Despite readily available information regarding knowledge of how the AIDS virus is spread, and valiant attempts by local and national organizations to stem that rising tide, HIV/AIDS infection rates have reached alarming numbers. In 1990, the World Health Organization estimated that 8 to 10


million people were living with HIV worldwide. It is now estimated that 25,000 individuals are HIV-positive in Houston alone, with three more citizens becoming infected every day. Further, new estimates from Centers for Disease Control and Prevention indicate that as many as 55,000 new infections occur in the United States each year.


Compounding those startling statistics, AFH is seeing smaller-than-normal gifts per person, McCann says. The good news is, more teams and individuals had registered for the walk so far this year than in past years.


"We're up nine percent on teams. So we are hoping that everything will kind of come out in the wash, and that we'll have more people giving fewer dollars for the same outcome.

"Even though it would be great if it happened, we don't expect to hit the million-dollar mark again this year," McCann concludes realistically. "But nothing would make me happier than to be proven wrong."

The 20th annual AIDS Walk Houston, a noncompetitive 5k pledge walk, is set for Sunday, March 15, at Sam Houston Park, Bagby at Lamar in downtown Houston. 





Quieter, sunnier, warmer, less crowded and circuslike than usual, this year's Sundance Film Festival, which ran from January 15-25, was also characterized by a plethora of high-quality films. Celebrating its 25th anniversary. the festival was frequently overshadowed by real-world events-Obama's inauguration, news of further economic woe/lavoffs (by Warner Bros. and Microsoft)-yet every day saw premieres of excellent, thought-provoking, audacious works.

For example? In I Love You Phillip Morris, we watched a sweaty, thrusting Jim Carrey eagerly fulfill a man's request to do what used to be illegal between two men in Texas.

Possibly Sundance's most anticipated queer-interest title, the based-on-a-truestory comedy stars Carrey as gay con man Steven Jay Russell, whose romance with another prisoner (played by Ewan Mc-Gregor) and non-stop swindles and prison breaks lead to plenty of laughs and heartbreak. The day following its premiere, the filmmakers—including writer/director team Glenn Ficarra & John Requa (Bad Santa), executive producer Luc Besson,

Carrey, McGregor, and co-star Rodrigo Santoro (who plays one of Carrey's previous lovers)-held a press conference at Main Street's Queer Lounge. Carrey admitted the raucous "ass" scene was a reason he did the movie, and that despite his criminal streak, Russell (who's currently in prison) is a good guy at heart.

"We're all good guvs-your worst enemy is a good guy!" he shared. "I love to get to

the bottom of a character. What lies they believe about themselves. He felt like he needed acceptance. Beware the unloved—they go to extremes to find significance."

The film, still seeking a distributor at fest's close, utilized

director Frank Feldman won Spirit of Slamdance honors for his short, Vapid Lovelies.

Peter Bratt's La Mission received a standing ovation at its premiere. Set in San Francisco's Mission district, it stars Benjamin Bratt as Che, a good-hearted yet violently homophobic Latin father whose teenage son (Jeremy Ray Valdez) comes out. At a post-screening Q&A, the Bratts explained how the character of Che represents our culture, one of using brute force and violence to achieve goals, as well as spark conversations within communities of color. Meanwhile, out writer-director Tina Mabry's accomplished Slamdance feature, Mississippi Damned, addressed homophobia and

generational clash within a poverty-ridden African-American family.

A surefire conversation-stirrer, Julian Breece's stunning short film, The Young and Evil, saw a black teen "bug chaser" attempt to get infected by an HIV-positive AIDS-prevention activist. Equally disturbing, but in a non-real-world way, was Paul Solet's comedy-horror film Grace, in which a lesbian midwife helped her bisexual ex birth a ghoulish, blooddrinking infant. Also darkly humorous, Nancy Kissam's


Drool updated Bound with its tale of a repressed housewife who kills her husband and runs off with her sassy black neighbor, moody daughter, and budding gay adolescent son.

In the desert-dry French absurdist comedy, Louise-Michel, an incompetent FTM transsexual hit man is enlisted to kill a corporate boss. A gay man cruising the beach finds an unexpected connection with a woman in Italy's One Day in a Life. Spun from Philadelphia writer David Brind's 2005 short of the same name. Dare chronicles a love triangle between a gay teen, his female best friend, and the bisexual bad boy they both crush on.

As for lame ducks? Ensemble drama The Informers, based on Brett Easton Ellis' novel, was pointless and vapid, while despite its talented leading ladies—including Rachel Dratch, Amy Poehler, Parker Posey, and Jane Lynch—out director Ryan Shiraki's Spring Breakdown was →









to see more. I felt there really wasn't any rebuttal for [films screened at] Cinemark theaters, which I was surprised by."


As usual, LGBTs crowded the 13th Annual

Less may not be more, but, as Sundance 2009 proved, it was certainly satisfying.



#### 2009 Volkswagen CC

The CC is what Volkswagen calls a four-door coupe, or a German luxury car without the German luxury price tag. The CC engine options are a 200-hp 2.0L engine as standard and 280-hp 3.6L narrow-angle V6 optional. Volkswagen sells the CC in four models: Sport, Luxury, VR6 Sport, and VR6 Motion. All get heated power-adjustible front seats, alloy wheels, electronic stability control, and six-disc CD changer, and all but the Sport get a huge full-width sunroof, dual-zone climate control, rain sensing wipers, auto-dimming rearview mirror, and leather seats. The car will slot in above the top-of-the-line Passat 3.6L, with prices starting at \$27,480 for the CC Sport with a manual transmission and topping out at \$43,255 for a loaded CC VR6 4Motion.



#### 2009 Chevrolet Corvette ZR1

No question about it: the 2009 Chevrolet ZR1 is one of the all-time great cars. 



## **Driving Green**

Save money, save the planet

by Marene Gustin

If visions of Gregory Peck and Audrey Hepburn gaily dashing about Rome on a Vespa aren't enough to make you consider a scooter, think about this: two-wheeling will save you money, and it just may help save the planet.

For attorney Dan Lundeen, zipping around town on his scooter just makes since. "It just seems silly to drive a big car a couple of blocks," he says. "With a good tailwind I can go 35 mph and I don't worry about parking spaces." Plus, he only spends about \$5 every two weeks to fill up his tank.

Matthew Creede, owner of Apollo Scooters, started his store more than seven years ago, at a time when Houstonians were all about the big pickups and SUVs. It's taken awhile, but he's seen sales rise for his scooters, cycles, and Segways. Business was so good after last year's four-dollar gas prices that he now has three locations. Creede says that even using a scooter for half of your driving can save as much as \$100 a week on gas and insurance, plus scooter owners find it saves them time. "Getting around in traffic, not having to hunt for a parking space," he says.

And if that isn't cheap enough for you, how about an all-electric scooter?

Veloteq Corporation is a privately held Houston-based company with a Shanghai manufacturing plant that produces electric scooters. They began selling the scooters in British Columbia, and last spring Gulf Coast Veloteq, a distributor, opened a showroom here in Houston.

"A 750-watt motor takes one kilowatt of energy," Jock Drummond,

GCV president, says. "You plug it in, and it costs about 15 cents to charge. It will run for about 35 to 40 miles off that charge." Veloteq scooters range in price

from \$1,500 to \$2,000 and come with such features as cruise control and antitheft devices. And they come with detachable pedals, just in case.

Classified as low-speed electric bicycles by the Consumer Product Safety Commission, these scooters are street legal, require no registration or motorcycle license and get up to about 20 mph on the road.

But it isn't just the two-wheelers that are available. Houston Electric Cars sells Zenn cars, Skys, and Benjys, which are cute-as-abug e-convertibles. Some are basically golf carts on 'roids, others seat up to 11. These little beauties run \$8,000 to \$21,000, can net you tax credits, and cost less than two cents per mile to operate.

"Plus insurance is cheaper and they're easier to finance," says owner Rick Ehrlich, who started the dealership last summer. The neighborhood vehicles will hit 35 mph and can go about 35 to 40 miles on a four-hour charge. Just plug it into a home outlet overnight and you're ready to roll. Ehrlich says he has no problem dashing about downtown in his peppy e-car. And, besides being practically free to drive—no gas, no oil, no transmission to break down—these little babies just may save the planet.

"An SUV puts out enough carbon gas to fill Reliant Stadium every month," says Ehrlich. "Electric cars make no pollution, and I really think the salvation of the human race depends on solar panels and electric cars."








"This is a play I've wanted to work on," admits director Matt Huff, guest artistic director at Rice for the spring semester. "It's not just a gay play. The characters don't really identify with gays. On a simple level it's a love story. Yes, there is violence and gay bashing, but it's also a romantic comedy."

Stop Kiss is the story of disorganized New York City traffic reporter Callie and her growing friendship with Midwest transplant Sara, who comes to the big city to teach in the Bronx. Though vastly different characters, the two form a bond that develops into a friendship and much more, ending in a street kiss that

sparks violence by an antigay onlooker. Huff is gay, but the two leads at Rice

"I've never done a girl kiss on stage," says Rice junior Caroline Turner, "but I think it will be pretty cool." Turner is cast as Sara, a role originated by Sandra Oh off-Broadway. "I think there's a bunch of me in Sara. She comes from a conservative family like I do, but she's also feisty and curious, and that's what I want to make real."

"The way the couple falls in love is just like any couple," explains Sigrid Owen who plays Callie in Stop Kiss. "Straight. gay, or bisexual, it's all the same."

Both young women admit that the scenario probably wouldn't happen today in New York, but Owen points to the recent defeat of California's Proposition 8 as how relevant the message still is today.

"We fall in love with people," she says. "Not races, genders, or backgrounds. That's what the play is all about. It's encouraging people to ask themselves, 'What do I want?' And I'm trying to ask myself what I want. Being in the play is really helping me grow."

"I grew up in Dallas," Turner says. "And I think this could still happen there today. So it's really an important play for the community, and I'm excited to be in it."

The play moves back and forth through time, showing the beginning of the women's friendship, and the aftermath of the

kiss, as Sara lies comatose in a hospital, and their two heterosexual lovers arrive.

"Structurally it's intense," says director Huff, "as it moves back and forth. And the casting of the two women is central to the success of the play. Finding the right dynamics is crucial." But he thinks he's found just that with Turner and Owen.

"Caroline is really open to the kiss, and I'm really open to the character," Owen says. "I want to make her and the relationship seem real."


"Their tentative first kiss leads not only to shocking violence," says Rice's theater department director Christina Keefe, "but also to a moving transformation. Making choices and commitments is a scary business as Stop Kiss suggests. But what's the alternative?"
















he Joe Goode Performance Group has been making innovative dance for over 20 years. Goode was at the forefront of choreographers who used text with their movement to create interdisciplinary narratives and has been awarded with many honors, among them a Guggenheim Fellowship, and, most recently, the United States Artists Glover Fellowship. The Society for the Performing Arts is bringing the JGPG to the Wortham Center's Cullen Theater on March 6, when Houstonians can see Goode's most recent work, Wonderboy, and a revival of an older piece, Maverick Strain.

#### Neil Ellis Orts: What is it about these two pieces that goes together?

Joe Goode: Wonderboy is the story of the queer boy who discovers himself as an artist, discovers a way to use his sensitivity and his aesthetic feelings, and goes from feeling oppressed to feeling empowered: "I actually can do something a lot of people can't do." Obviously, a very personal story for me.

Twist, and it's very much his story, too. So


that moment when we discovered at puberty, or somewhere around there, that we had this power of making beautiful things and offering insights about the world through these beautiful things that we made, it was a kind of a redemption for both of us. We discovered that we were going to be okay.

With Maverick Strain, it's very different. Maverick Strain is about Americans believing our rugged individual spirit kind of dominates all, that in the end, we're going to walk off into the sunset with our mangy dog, victorious. I think that mythology is something that a lot of us live, against our better judgment. I wanted to point a finger at that, which is, in a way, kind of the opposite issue of the overly sensitive flower [in Wonderboy].

#### I collaborated with a puppeteer, Basil Do you have any thoughts on why dance in particular seems to attract gay men?

I have a piece called 29 Effeminate Gestures, which is about effeminacy. It's about a lavishness of expression, a desire to make one's gestures baroque or larger than life or dramatic, to expand feeling in a big way. I basically feel like gav men-many of us, not all of us-have that desire to express things deeply, to express things artistically even in gesture, even in the way we walk, in the way we wear our clothes. And dancing is kind of a natural extension of that. Absolutely.

I think the more interesting question is why-in the dance world that is populated by gay men-are there so few out gay choreographers? It is kind of shocking to me, even in this day and age that people still try to make this neutral, neutered kind of dance. I still feel like, in the -

residencies and the workshops that we do in the middle of the country, it's this education process. People have never seen a woman lift a man or two men dance really tenderly and erotically together. And it's like-why? What country are we living in?

#### I hope we're coming into an era when that becomes less and less.

It's funny, you know, because we went through this era, and I was very much a part of this era—the era of AIDS and dances about AIDS-and suddenly being gay or having two men and one of them dying became a real kind of topical possibility in dance. And everyone had an AIDS piece. I had 20 of them, but everybody had at least one. And I think there was some progress made there, but really, beyond the issue of death and dying, it's really very hard to make a gay dance that people can look at and respond to, because they don't have the eyes for it.

I'm in my mid-40s and I look at twentysomethings who've grown up post-Ellen and post-Will & Grace and there is a whole different sensibility to them.

There is, and I hate to be the one to say the glass is half empty, but I do feel at the same time, to Letterman and Leno and all those popular culture people, gay is still a big joke. "That's so gay" or "You must be a little light in the loafers." The standard hasn't changed that much. I'm still kind of shocked that the mainstream culture still has a long way to go.

Last year, I spoke with Bill T. Jones and he lamented that, for an American art form that has an enormous number of gay men participating in it, there are some cities where the gay community is completely oblivious to dance.

Most cities, yes, I totally agree with him. What you find mostly, unfortunately-and I think this is where, as a dance community in America, we've kind of failed—is your dance audience is mostly dancers. It's mostly girls who studied ballet when they were little girls and then moved on to other things, but they still love dance and they bring their husbands. But you're right, the gay men are not going out to see contemporary dance. I've worked very hard to cultivate them here in my hometown and I think I've succeeded, but outside of that it's really tough. I think some of them are going to the opera and the ballet because it is a kind of validation: "I'm


an elegant person, so I'm going to the opera and the ballet." But the pieces they could be seeing that really are dealing with some issues that are familiar to them, and frankly dealing in a vernacular in movement and language that is more contemporary with their lives, they're not necessarily getting out to see that stuff. And it's just an education process.


I really feel like you can go into the theater with the expectation that something is going to happen to you...personally. That something is going to become dislodged or rearranged or some slight new perspective or something emotionally is going to open up or be revisited, something you kind of locked away. And that that experience can be a really powerful experience. Go with an appetite for that experience. I'm pretty sure, particularly with this piece of work, [OutSmart readers] get it.



This past January, Senator Chris Buttars was interviewed by Reed Cowan for his documentary 8: The Mormon Proposition. In the documentary, Buttars says, "Homosexuality will always be a sexual perversion. And you say that around here now, and everybody goes nuts. But I don't care."

He also states, "What is the morals of a gay person? You can't answer that, because anything goes. They wanna talk about being nice—they're the meanest buggers I've ever seen."



# TUMBLEWEEDS AND TRANSSEXUALS

A fascinating new documentary focuses on the tiny town of Trinidad, Colorado, population 9,000—and sex change capitol of the world

hen most people think of Colorado, laid-back Boulder, snowy Aspen, and cosmopolitan Denver are the go-to's. But when thousands of others ponder the Centennial State, the little town of Trinidad comes to mind—and its reputation as the "sex change capitol of the world."

To find out how this tiny outpost of barely 9,000 people became the mecca for sexual reassignment surgery, don't miss the remarkable new documentary by noted Austin filmmakers PJ Raval and Jay Hodges. *Trinidad* explores the recent past and ponderous future of the town whose inhabitants are (literally) in transition. The film follows the

fascinating, sometimes frustrating journey of three transsexuals in various stages of the transgender process; Dr. Marci Bowers, Sabrina Marcus, and Dr. Laura Ellis.

It all started in 1969, when kindly old Dr. Stanley Biber performed the first "sex

change" operation in Trinidad. (Culture geeks are probably aware of Biber's name from an infamous South Park episode. if not the hundreds of media articles on the good doctor.) When Biber began his practice, the slice-and-dice procedure of removing a penis and tranforming it into a vagina was a fledgling, workmanlike procedure at best. But Biber revolutionized the process, advancing genital reassignment surgery into something of a medical miracle and surgical game changer. Frustrated by the less-than-artistic aesthetic. Biber created genitalia that resembled the actual genitals and, what's more, they worked remarkably like the real thing. His pioneering efforts drew pre-op transsexuals and those with gender dysphoria from all over the world, and by the time of his retirement, Biber had performed almost 6,000 GRSs.

When Biber did retire, Dr. Marci Bowers left a lucrative practice as an OB/GYN in Seattle to inherit Biber's mantle. But Bowers had one important difference: she'd been there on the other side, whereas the man's man Biber had not. So Bowers gave a certain spiritual resonance to the procedure, and, believe it or not, most residents of Colorado didn't bat a prejudicial eye. The other two Bowers subjects don't find Trinidad as open-armed.

Naturally, *Trinidad* does reveal the small-town folks you'd expect. There are the toothless good old boys in gimme caps who "just don't get it" and the stalwart


church-goer who's scripturally opposed to the whole transgender debate. But *Trinidad* is also filled with dress-shop dowdies who only want to help the new girls in town look better, farmers who realize that without the surgeries there would be no hospital for anybody, and

children of men-who've-become-women who stand by their parent while debating whether to call Dad "Mom." And these transsexuals aren't above the occasional catty Real Houswives of Trinidad behavior either. And those with weak stomachs should be prepared, the doc doesn't spare any Nip/Tuck-like details. From almost shocking, decades-old surgical sketches to vivid, headspinning footage of the procedure, the documentary pulls no punches.

Gripping, enlightening, and frequently deeply moving, *Trinidad* is that rare documentary that educates while it entertains.

n At Last (Telarc), Callaway ust may get her wish "to help the world fall in love." hope in people-the beauty of music and what it can do, whether you're single or with someone or entertaining the thought of being with someone. . . .

### Did the events of the 2008 election, including the passage of Prop. 8 in California, have any impact on your coming out, as it did with Wanda Sykes?

Yes! I was thinking about that today. You're the first person I'm talking to about this openly. I've always been a combination of a magnanimous personality-I love people, I love my audiences, I'm so interested in the world. But I'm also a very private person. I've been partnered with people who have been very private, so it's been an interesting climate throughout my life of those two different emotions and energies going on.

But I think the urgency of needing to elect a leader that was going to bring about the kind of change that was desperately needed-I started to get so much more outward with my friends and my community. For instance, being on Facebook and writing so openly about feelings. Trying to really connect with many people about these ideas and get more energy of a bigger and more powerful "us," I think has been a part [of it]. I think turning 50 last May [2008] was another eye-opening, sobering [laughs] ...

Okay, here I am being an advocate of people being their true selves and fulfilling their greatest potential, and I'm always trying to nurture that in other people, and I looked philosophically at my own life and I realized that for me to own up to that wish for myself I had to be willing to step forward into the light and speak more candidly about my life and what I've learned. Politically, I'm a very political person. Being raised by a journalist [John Callaway], he fostered the idea of always seeing both sides of the picture. I'm a very passionate person and I do feel that, in our lifetime, that it's essential for us to fight for human rights.

There was a great, great victory to have Barack Obama elected as our president. But it was a huge disappointment to have Prop. 8. So I do feel that it's time for me to do my part. That's one of the reasons I'm stepping out.

I'm glad that you mentioned your father, because the coming-out process can be difficult at any age-did you get unconditional love and support from your family? I have it now. Because I'm not a black-andwhite story-I've been very attracted to men. I've had a lot of relationships with men and I'm still attracted to men. But I don't fall in love with men. 






understood that about me, I think they always entertained the thought that maybe the right man would come along. Eventually, I think they realized [laughs] that their daughter was who their daughter was. I'm very grateful that whatever difficulties they had with it, they got through it all. I have an extremely supportive and loving family. I've been out to my friends and so many of my professional cohorts for years...

Harvey Fierstein has been a great mentor and a part of my life. [Sir] Ian McKellan took me aside at a BBC interview years ago in London and told me how profound his coming out was to his creative life. And that haunted me for years. I remember afterward taking a long walk by the Thames and thinking about how much I yearned for that complete freedom to be who I am. I was with a partner at the time who was forbidding me from coming out. That put a big restraint on my own instincts and I kept with that lifestyle for a while because of her. I am now looking forward to seeing Ian McKellan's words come to life as I break out of whatever threads of webbing that I have hidden behind.

How much did the inclusion of "Over the Rainbow," the unofficial gay national anthem, have to do with this disc being released at the time of your coming out?

I think it's a subliminal message for me. I didn't consciously think, "I want a gay anthem on my CD," but in hindsight it's perfectly poetic that it turns out to be that I needed to sing this song. I felt such a reluctance to sing a song that had been so identified with Judy Garland. Being friends with Liza Minnelli, I've always tip-toed around that song. But when I finally dared to sing it on the centennial of Harold Arlen, I felt so much emotion.

And seeing Judy Garland, as a young girl, my first movie musical, I was completely mesmerized by her performance of that song. . . . I feel that that song, almost more than anything else that I sing, expresses a life of deep yearning for a place that is a safe place to be myself. . . .





In 'Nine Lives,' author Dan Baum reveals the survivalist spirit of New Orleans residents

Tt happens every time: you're busy, in a hurry, and somebody starts blah-blahblahing, making a long story longer. You wonder if he'll ever get to the point.

Maybe you even say that: get to the point.

Everyone has a story.

In the new book, Nine Lives: Death and Life in New Orleans by Dan Baum (Spiegel & Grau), you'll read about nine people from the Crescent City: stories, bracketed by storms.

In 1965, Ronald Lewis found something more powerful than Mama: Hurricane Betsy. Betsy went through the Lower Ninth Ward like a hot spoon through a snow-cone, Still, the neighborhood couldn't be kept down by a storm, could it?

All his life, Anthony Wells heard about New Orleans, but it seemed that life took him everywhere but there. He was in Vietnam, Los Angeles, and later, he was bused to Tennessee

**Author Dan Baum** John Guidos hid his secret from everyone, because he knew what they'd say: women's clothes are for women. But inside his mind, John was a woman, believing he was alone in his feelings. By the time John became JoAnn, he knew otherwise.



When you're ready for a good set of stories, don't miss this one. Nine Lives is a book you should make a point to get.


# Art in the Park

### **ACCOMPLICE IN BROUSSARD MURDER RETURNS TO PRISON**

PAUL CHANCE DILLON, ONE OF 10 MEN accused in the stabbing death of 27-year-old gay Houston banker Paul Broussard in 1991, has returned to prison following a parole violation. The Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles determined on January 16 that he violated the conditions of his release from prison when he removed his ankle bracelet, fleeing from his mother's Spring home in early December. This recent flight attempt marked the second time Dillon had removed his monitoring device to escape supervision, officials told The Spring Observer.

Dillon was originally charged with two counts of attempted murder; his incarceration will be complete on November 19, 2011.
