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

Is this a misquote or is Mr. Odom blind? Was he at the parade?

OutSmart replies: In paraphrasing his quote, Out-Smart may have portrayed Pride Houston president Brad Odom's observation of the parade spectators as less ambiguous than it was.

In the July telephone interview reporting for the article in question, *OutSmart* asked Odom: "You didn't see anybody swarming floats along the parade route, even where the fences were up and the barricades were up?" Mr. Odom replied: "No, I didn't see and I kept checking on things like that. And because of the solid nature of the fence, if people were on the wrong side of it, we had cops directing them back on the right side. In years past, where the crowds came out into the street—I had never seen that before. People said that happened all the time, and I said, "No, that's not acceptable.' And we fenced the entire route."

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
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Local and National Plans Continue for October March for Equality

his year, National Coming Out Day tween community members and their lawmakpromises to hold even more significance for lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender Americans than it normally does.

Coming Out Day" since 1988, a day when LGBT individuals are encouraged to be forthright about their sexuality. The day also commemorates the 30th anniversary of the first March on Washington for Lesbian and Gav Rights.

In 2009, advocates of equality intend to pour into Washington, DC, for the National Equality March, scheduled October 10 and 11.

"We're marching this October to demand ac-

tion from the federal government to protect our rights in all 50 states," said Kip Williams, one of the march's organizers in an August statement to the press. "Real equality can only come from the president, the Congress and the Supreme Court."

Major national LGBT organizations including the Gay Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation and the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches have endorsed the march

On August 12, Human Rights Campaign (HRC), which sponsored national marches in 1993 and 2000, released a statement supporting the march.

"The Human Rights Campaign considers October 11 in Washington, DC, to be a starting point-not a destination," stated Human Rights Campaign president Joe Solmonese. "Those who join us in the nation's capital have more work ahead of them after the crowds clear. They need to become citizen lobbyists, ready and able to tell their senators and members of Congress what this community needs to see: an ENDA that protects every single one of us. Repeal of Don't Ask, Don't Tell. Repeal of DOMA. Protections for our families.'

HRC said it will train march participants to initiate and carry out successful in-district lobby visits, whether they come to DC in person or take their activism on line.

"HRC's work with the October 11 event will focus on mobilizing face-to-face meetings beers." Solmonese continued. "With thousands of LGBT people and allies coming to Washington to make a difference, it's our mission to help them become the citizen lobbyists that they want and

need to be."

Bryan Hlavinka, one of the organizers of a burgeoning local march delegation, hopes to bring Houstonian marchers together at the Equality March under the banner of the Texas flag with other Texas delegations "so we can be out and proud Texans."

Hlavinka is no stranger to civil action on the nation's capital.

"I went to the 1993 March on Washington, and it pretty much changed my life, to be there with all the masses of gays," he said. "I think now is the time. Another march is needed, especially with the progress that we've made, but also with the progress that's vet to come. Especially with the Obama administrationthere have been a lot of promises made, but not a lot of follow through. Now is the time to go and say, 'What's up?"

Hlavinka further hopes LGBT Texans take the opportunity to be part of the country coming together at the march. "Even though we're from a 'red state,' we can make our presence known that we're here and we want equality as well, although it's not in the cards for us vet."

According to domawatch.org, Texas is one of 30 states that has adopted a constitutional amendment limiting marriage to opposite-sex

"As states begin to adopt equality policies, eventually Texas will follow suit, I think as well," Hlavinka concluded. "The more people we get [to join the march], the stronger our presence will be.

"It's a great time to make our voice known across the country."

Equality Texas refrains from endorsing National Equality March

Handley Federation, has chosen quality Texas, the Lone Star facto not endorse the Equality March. "We feel like we need to energize people to work on things that will accomplish some things, specifically," said Paul Scott, Equality Texas' executive director.

"One, we have Annise Parker running for mayor [in Houston]," Scott said. "We need to make sure if people are going to be spending their resources and working, we would like for them to actually travel to Houston to work on her campaign and get the first and only lesbian mayor elected to one of the top five cities in the United States."

During the week of the Equality March, Scott said, Equality Texas is

poised to connect Texans with their elected officials to educate them regarding LGBT issues, addressing safe schools as well as a state nondiscrimination law that protects LGBTs in the workplace, public accommodations, and

"Great things are happening across the country that have immediate results," Scott reiterated. "At the same time we acknowledge the need to galvanize people to create this energy and to respect the fact that people are angry and want to do something. And I think the march is representative of that desire, but at the same time we want to make people understand that if they do go, come back into their communities and find opportunities to make a difference." -N.F.

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THE STONEWALL OF ISRAEL

n Saturday night, August 1, a masked gunman entered Cafe Noir, a known gay and lesbian hangout in Tel Aviv, and began a vicious shooting spree. He killed three innocents and wounded 11. The night was supposed to involve a LGBT youth counseling meeting,

nothing more. The victims were mainly teenagers and many were in the closet to their families.

While Israel may be in the nexus of the torrid Middle East drama, a hate crime like this is completely unheard of. It's the first of its kind. Some are even labeling it "the Stonewall of Is-

rael." On the first day of August, Tel Aviv is usually as spectacular a gay destination as Mykonos or Amsterdam. Sadly, this grotesque attack will bruise the city's rising credibility.

I spent the last academic year in Israel, studying and volunteering throughout the country. I worked the final three months in the new Tel Aviv GLBT Municipality Center, until the saga came to its fantastic culmination at the Tel Aviv Pride Parade. While I will always be faithful to the beads and bedlam of the Houston Pride parade, Tel Aviv's 10th Pride celebration was utterly unforgettable. Tens of thousands of tan Israelis marched through the center of

the city onto the beach, where, as the house music played, they cleansed themselves in the awesomeness of the Mediterranean Sea. It was beautiful.

The LGBT community of Tel Aviv treated me like family, from the gregarious drag queens to the parade planners who

HOUSTON GLBT CAUCUS MAKES ENDORSEMENTS, **PARKER GAINS MORE** SUPPORTERS

THE HOUSTON GAY, LESBIAN, BISEXU-AL, AND TRANSGENDER Political Caucus met August 5 to endorse candidates in the 2009 Houston municipal elections as well as Houston Independent School District board of trustee elections.


Candidates were screened by the caucus for their support of LGBT equality and were then endorsed by majority vote of the membership. Endorsed candidates include: Ronald Green for Houston City Controller, Lane Lewis for Houston City Council District A, Anne Clutterbuck for Houston City Council District C. Wanda Adams for Houston City Council District D. Michael Laster for Houston City Council District F, Ed Gonzales for Houston City Council District H, James Rodriguez for Houston City Council District I, Herman Litt for Council At Large Position 1, Sue Lovell for Council At Large Position 2, Melissa Noriega for Council At Large Position 3, Noel Freeman for Council At Large Position 4, Jolanda Jones for Council At Large Position 5, and Alma L. Lara for HISD Trustee District I. No endorsements were made for Districts B, E, or G.

The caucus previously endorsed Houston city controller Annise D. Parker for the office of Houston's mayor. In August, Parker, currently in her third and term-limited final term as Houston's city controller, added Service Employees International Union, the Houston Organization of Public Employees and Harris County Democrats, and the Unite Here hospitality workers group to her growing list of endorsing organizations.

REAUTHORIZATION SOUGHT FOR RYAN WHITE **HIV/AIDS TREATMENT MODERNIZATION ACT**

ON SEPTEMBER 30, THE RYAN WHITE HIV/AIDS Treatment Modernization Act is set to expire. Sounding the alarm for public support, local HIV/AIDS service providers say millions of Americans living with HIV/AIDS are dependent for their medical care on the Ryan White programs, making it vital that the act is reauthorized by Congress.

"The Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Modernization Act is a critical part of our health care safety net," said Randall Ellis, director of government relations for Legacy Community Health Services. "Timely extension of this legislation is essential to ensure that uninsured and underinsured people living with HIV/AIDS do not experience a gap in the delivery of life-saving medical and supcontinued on page 14

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portive services as our nation transitions into a new health care environment. An unprecedented consensus among those on the frontlines of the epidemic, nearly 300 HIV/AIDS organizations in 45 states across the country, have endorsed a plan that would amend and reauthorize this legislation for three years. Congress must act swiftly when they return to Washington, DC, in September."

Enacted in 1990, the Ryan White HIV/
AIDS Treatment Modernization Act was
named after a teenager infected with HIV who
became a national spokesman for the rights
of people living with HIV/AIDS in the 1980s.
The largest federal program for helping people
with HIV/AIDS, the act makes care available
to those patients who cannot afford treatments
by any other means. Starting with \$220 million
in 1990, funding of the Ryan White programs
in 2005 increased to \$2.1 billion with roughly
one-third of the funding going to AIDS Drug
Assistance Programs, providing HIV-treatment
drugs to low-income patients in all 50 states.

According to an August 26 news release from Centerlink (formerly the National Association of LGBT Community Centers), Ryan White HIV/AIDS programs are the "payer of last resort," helping people living with HIV/AIDS who have no other way of paying for their medication and treatments. Without the programs funded by the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Modernization Act, these people would literally be unable to afford their medical care, the news release said.

Activists recommend that the Ryan White Program be extended for three more years with the recommended changes, such as the inclusion of Such Sums Necessary language, the updating of the Requirement of Name-Based Reporting language, and the extension of TGA eligibility, which has been endorsed by over 270 organizations across the U.S.

PROVES SUCCESSFUL, CONTINUES


MORE THAN 25,800 PEOPLE HAVE BEEN TESTED FOR HIV as a result of a routine screening program for Ben Taub General Hospital's emergency patients. Last year, Harris County Hospital District (HCHD) began testing all patients, ages 18-64, who arrive in Ben Taub's emergency center and require blood lab work. The screenings have detected 178 newly diagnosed HIV-positive cases, representing a .65 positive rate since the program was implemented in August 2008. The testing program also reconfirmed the HIV status of 323 people who had not sought care for the virus.

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LUTHERANS TAKE STEPS TOWARD GAY AND LESBIAN CLERGY

n Friday, August 21, the voting members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in American (ELCA), meeting in Minneapolis for Churchwide Assembly, passed resolutions that will make way for people in "publicly accountable life-long, monogamous, same gender relationships" to serve as pastors and other professional leadership positions. The 4.6-million-member church becomes the largest denomination in the U.S. to take this step.

This is not an objective report. This is a personally engaged statement from a stake-holder in these events. I am a theologically trained, gay, life-long Lutheran. I have not cried this much out of joy since, well, ever.

There will be a process to this. I do not feel it will happen overnight. Also part of the resolutions was a call for respect for the "bound conscience" of other members. This means a congregation is not required to call a gay pastor, neither is a current pastor required to officiate at a same-gender commitment ceremony. The door is now open, however. A gay or lesbian Lutheran now has more options on how to live out his or her faith in the ELCA.

Special mention must be made of the ELCA's presiding bishop, Mark Hanson. He presided over the assembly with grace, wit, and pastoral concern for all the people under his care.

As I write this on Sunday, August 23, I am monitoring comments made on Facebook. Some are full of anger, some of gratitude. We will no doubt lose some members, but perhaps gain some, too. As for me, I've never been so glad to be a member of the ELCA.





PASSAGE OF HATE CRIMES **LEGISLATION IN SENATE** ELICITS MIXED REACTIONS

ON JULY 23, 2009, THE DEPARTMENT of Defense authorization bill, which contains the Matthew Shepard Hate Crimes Prevention Act (bill number S.909), passed in the U.S. Senate.

But while one national organization applauded the passage, another noted the legislation is being used to expand the death penalty.

"Hate is neither a religious nor an American value, and that is why Interfaith Alliance praises the Senate for passing this hate crimes prevention bill," stated Interfaith Alliance president Rev. Dr. C. Welton Gaddy. "Even as we applaud the Senate, we urge them to get this legislation to President Obama, and we appeal to him to sign it into law without delay. It is long past due, but this can be the moment for a ringing pronouncement of our democracy's intolerance of hate and the crime it foments."

The National Center for Lesbian Rights, however, says the death penalty amendment that was added undermines the purpose of the Matthew Shepard Hate Crimes Prevention Act, "which is to reduce bias and discrimination, by supporting a punishment that has been applied in a notoriously biased and discriminatory way.

"There are few facets of our criminal justice system more deeply flawed than the death penalty," according to the statement at nclr.org. "It has been repeatedly demonstrated that rather than deterring violence or curbing crime, the death penalty has been used to perpetuate race and class bias.

"This provision (now on the Senate Defense Department spending bill, which is where the hate crimes provisions have been added) can and must be removed in conference committee where differences between House and Senate versions will be worked out."

MILK AND KING RECEIVE AMERICA'S **HIGHEST HONOR**

NOTED GAY AND LESBIAN LEADERS Harvey Milk and Billie Jean King were among the 16 recipients of the 2009 Presidential Medal of Freedom. America's highest civilian honor, the Medal of Freedom is awarded to individuals who make an especially meritorious contribution to the security or national interests of the United States, world peace, cultural or other significant public or private endeavors.


Harvey Milk became the first openly gay elected official from a major city in the United States when he was elected to the San Francisco Board of Supervisors in 1977. Milk, who was murdered in 1978, is revered nationally and globally as a pioneer of the LGBT civil rights movement for his exceptional leadership and dedication to equal rights.

Billie Jean King was an acclaimed professional tennis player in the 1960s and 1970s, and has helped champion gender equality issues not only in sports, but also in all areas of public life. She became one of the first openly lesbian major sports figures in America when she came out in 1981.

President Obama praised all 16 recipients for breaking down barriers and lifting up their fellow citizens, saying, "These outstanding men and women represent an incredible diversity of backgrounds. Their tremendous accomplishments span fields from science to sports, from fine arts to foreign affairs. Yet they share one overarching trait: each has been an agent of change. Each saw an imperfect world and set about improving it, often overcoming great obstacles along the way."

The awards were presented at a White House ceremony on Wednesday, August 12. ■ State Farm

talk shows and game shows when a real star has to cancel. After he is voted off DWTS (because Sara Evans' texting muscles collapsed), DeLay could move on to:


-Real Housewives of Sugar Land. We know the homes in Fort Bend County are in frequent need of an exterminator. Full circle.

elp can be only a phone call away storm strikes. Help is available in about non-emergency service calls coming into if you know the right numbers. LUnfortunately, many people don't know about helplines or are confused about the 211, 311, and 911 helplines.

211 HELPLINE

The United Way of Greater Houston's 211 helpline handled 575,509 calls in 2008. The 24-hour 211 service (211.org) provides free, confidential information and referral for help with food, housing, employment, healthcare, counseling, children's and veterans' services, and more.

It also serves as a primary information source during disasters. Disaster services include the Special Transportation Registry, which gathers critical information from people who have special needs and require assistance during an evacuation. Call to register at least 48 hours before a

911 EMERGENCY CALLS

The regional emergency number, 911, should only be used in emergencies. An emergency is any situation that requires immediate assistance from the police/sheriff, fire department, or an ambulance. If you're ever in doubt about whether a situation is an emergency, you should call 911. It's better to be safe and let the 911 call-taker determine if you need emergency assistance.

Call 911 in emergencies, including:

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

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

WHEN ANIMALS ATTACK!

New viruses require humans with HIV to take new safeguards

Swine flu, more properly called the H1N1 virus, is a hot topic these days. It is a new never-before-seen-in-humans, strain of the influenza A virus, subtype H1N1. This new "bug" is actually a novel combination of four strains of flu, two of which are endemic in pigs, one is prevalent in birds, and the last is common in humans. So you can see calling it "swine flu" is not quite accurate, but it rolls off the tongue easier than its official name.

The H1N1 virus was first identified in humans in the United States and Mexico in April of this year, but it quickly spread around the globe. On June 11, Dr. Margaret Chan, director-general of the World Health Organization, declared H1N1 influenza a Phase 6 (the highest) pandemic, the first time an illness had been elevated to that level since the Hong Kong flu outbreak of 1968.

Locally, last spring we got a small taste of the effect this viral illness can have on a community. We saw multiple school closings in response to the flu, resulting in hundreds of Houston children having to miss vital classroom instruction days. In addition, many people altered travel plans and limited their attendance at crowded public events or social engagements. As we approach the start of another flu season, we should ready ourselves for the likelihood of similar restrictions as well as other limitations which may have an even more significant impact on our daily lives.

While no vaccine is currently available for H1N1, the CDC reports that 120 million doses of swine flu vaccine will be ready for Americans in late October. The problem is that 160 million of our citizens have been identified as priority recipients. The priority list includes pregnant women, caregivers of small children, persons six months to 24 years of age (because swine flu has been hitting hardest among those age groups), and adults over the age of 24 who have a chronic illness, like say, HIV/AIDS.

Federal medical officials are recommending that persons with HIV get a seasonal flu shot and a swine flu vaccine when they become available. Such a double-barreled approach will hopefully keep healthy those with compromised immune systems who are thus more susceptible to H1N1. So if you are infected with HIV, please consult your doctor right away and discuss getting yourself immunized against this year's potentially serious influenza.

Now, onto another new disease-y topic:

the discovery and documentation of the first human infected with a new strain of HIV that comes from gorillas. Most Americans living with HIV are infected with a strain of the virus that originated in chimps. The conventional wisdom is that Simian Immunodeficiency Virus (SIV), which infects chimps, mutated into a form that could infect humans sometime between 1884 and 1924. It is believed the first transmission occurred as a result of a person eating bush-meat (insert your own lesbian joke here), as chimp, monkey, and gorilla flesh are called in Africa.

The human in question is a 62-year-old woman from Cameroon who is currently living in Paris. Doctors have determined her HIV closely resembles SIVgor, a form of SIV recently discovered in wild gorillas that inhabit western Africa. The infected woman claims she had no contact with apes, or their meat, so scientists do not believe this is a case of direct gorilla-to-human transmission. Rather, researchers have concluded she most likely contracted the virus via sexual transmission from another infected human.

The origins of SIVgor are not yet known. It could be that it is a form of SIV that developed independently of the strain that infects chimps, or it could be that chimp SIV was transmitted to both gorillas and humans and resulting mutations occurred.

Regardless of the origin of this new strain, there is good news. For starters, the infected woman is not symptomatic, nor does she show any signs of an impaired immune system despite being HIV-positive for more than five years. More good news is that scientists believe this new strain of HIV replicates in much the same way as the more common strain of HIV. Thus, they are hopeful the new strain will be similarly susceptible to current antiretroviral therapies.

Both swine flu and gorilla HIV are illustrations of how viral mutation happens, how viruses may jump from one species to another, and how such new strains can impact humans. Moreover, these two illnesses should serve to remind us of why it is so important to track infectious diseases and be watchful for emerging variants. Our health and our future may depend upon it.

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



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Miss America . . .



With—or without—an Emmy, VANESSA WILLIAMS is a champion

anessa Williams made history 26 years ago this month when she became the first black woman to win the title of Miss America. Toward the end of her reign, some scandalous photos surfaced, and she resigned. The photos were offered to Playboy, but Hugh Hefner declined to publish them, saying, "Vanessa Williams is a beautiful woman. There was never any question of our interest in the photos. But they clearly weren't authorized, and because they would be the source of considerable embarrassment to her, we decided not to publish them. We were also mindful that she was the first black Miss America." However, Bob Guccione, publisher of Penthouse, had no such qualms and published the photos. Rather than pursue a lawsuit, Williams chose to go forward with her life, which was apparently a wise decision.

Within a few years, she released her debut album, *The Right Stuff*, and received three Grammy nominations. She would go on to receive 13 more nominations and sell millions of albums. Of her most recent album, *The Real Thing*, Williams says, "After playing a powerhungry character like Wilhelmina Slater on *Ugly Betty* on a soundstage for three seaons, it was a pleasure to step back into the recording studio and be myself behind the microphone."

In 1994 Williams debuted on Broadway in Kiss of the Spider Woman, and in 2002 she was nominated for Tony and Drama Desk awards

for her performance in Stephen Sondheim's *Into the Woods*.

During this period, she appeared in numerous feature films, including Harley Davidson and the Marlboro Man, Eraser, Soul Food (for which she won an NAACP Image Award), Shaft, and the recent Hannah Montana: The Movie.

Since 1984, Williams has appeared in numerous television shows and television movies and miniseries. Her Ebenezer Scrooge character in 2001's A Diva's Christmas Carol apparently paved the way for her Scrooge-like character, Wilhelmina Slater, in Ugly Betty. Her role in the gay-tinged TV series has brought her three Emmy nominations, the third one being this year; one nomination and two Image Award wins; a Screen Actors Guild nomination; and others too numerous to mention.

In 2008, the gay-friendly star received the "Ally for Equality" award from the Human Rights Campaign. Accepting the award, she said, "This award from the Human Rights Campaign makes me feel like Miss America all over again, because I have championed what I sought out to for the past 25 years. . . . I will always be by your side, because the world you're creating is the kind of world I want to raise my children in."

Which brings us to the present. Williams is now working on the fourth season of *Ugly Betty* and is again nominated for an Emmy Award for her role as the cunning, can't-take-your-eyes-off-of Wilhelmina Slater. →

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

What was it like working with Stephen Sondheim [in Into the Woods1?



I ended up singing for him before we started production. And since then I sang for his 75th birthday party out in L.A. at the Hollywood Bowl. He's a phenomenal talent, and I'm so lucky to have had the opportunity to work

And to top it off you were nominated for a Tony Award. You've been nominated for a variety of awards.

Yes, it's great. I've always wanted to do it all, to be able to do theater and movies and television and music. It all comes from the same source, which is my stage background, so it's great that the acknowledgement has come.

I guess while working on Ugly Betty, you don't really have much time to do Broadway.

We only get two months off. Our last day of season three was May 1, and we went back last week. I had my first fitting maybe July 9, and we started shooting July 13. We do 24 shows, and it takes about 10 days per episode to shoot, so it's quite extensive. →

If he's working with you all day on Ugly Betty, does he do this at night?

Yes. Obviously he's got a stand-in if he can't make it, but he doesn't want to have that happen, and it's been crazy. When we were shooting toward the end of season three, we were shooting some horrible hours, and he would run and do a show and come back in the next day. He was running on fumes toward the end there. But he's an amazing guy, and theater is really his forte. He can do anything.

Like you. So what are the hours like? Are they that extensive?

Yes, it depends on what we're shooting. For instance, if we block-shoot three of my scenes in an office, that's all day in the office, and it's a lot of coverage, but it's pretty easy. But if you are doing a walk-and-talk, and we've got to go from my office all the way to the elevator, and then we've got a big scene with everybody on the Mode staff in the conference room, it could go 14 hours sometime. The worst day I had was when I had a 5:30 call and I finished at 1 a.m. That was the worst that it ever got.

Well, at least you would be dressed up in those gorgeous clothes. Would you like to take a few of those home?

I've taken a couple of pretty, simple dresses and bought them in a different color to wear for a press event or something. But a lot of Wilhelmina's suits are vintage Thierry Mugler, so they have been tailor-made or custom-altered to fit me. Some of them have original shoulder pads, as you can tell, which gives it the entire power-suit look. But it definitely gives Wilhelmina a memorable and notable silhouette.

Pat Field and her whole design team are fantastic. She's really incredible, a creative genius. Even though it's the same team, our characters don't look like Sex and the City. And they don't look like anything else that she does. She's fantastic.

You were the first guest on The Wendy Williams Show a few weeks ago, and your mother was in the audience. Are you pretty close with your family?

Oh yes. My mom lives about four miles from me, and I live in my hometown [Millwood, New York]. →









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

But you had moved to California . . .

Definitely part of the move was to come back to the East Coast, so my parents could be part of raising my kids, since my career was active and I wanted to make sure that they had a great home base. Also I knew the schools here since I've gone to them, so there was no guessing game. They are great public schools. I think it was the right choice.

You attended Logo's New Now Next Awards this year and the GLAAD Awards last year and this year, and I know you're a supporter of gay rights. What was your first memory of meeting some-

I think my mom knew a couple that wereone was a teacher . . . both my parents are teachers-one was a teacher and his partner was a hairdresser. I would say that was the first memory. Also we had a great family friend who was a lawyer who was always single and had fabulous apartments and bought a Porsche-didn't know how to drive it but loved the way it looked [both laugh] - and my dad taught him how to drive a stick shift. He was just a lovely, lovely guy. My parents would co-host a pig roast yearly with him. He bought me my first bottle of Opium perfume . . . always fabulous grown-up gifts that made me feel like a mature woman, when I was only in high school.

Apparently your parents were pretty open.

Oh absolutely. Gay men love my mother. She's witty and way more biting than I am-she's Wilhelmina without any stress. Watch out for her and her quips. She's way more hardcore than I am. My dad was one of those great open, loving men that accepted people for who they were. He was the greatest example of being secure and honest and completely open and accepting.

Sounds like a great family.

Yes, I was lucky. Also, growing up as a dancer and in the theater, I don't remember a time that I didn't have gay friends. Even when they're not out-you look back [to] the male friends that would hang around the group of girls, and they were all doing

fabulously well, and nobody was out, but you just knew that they were cool and got


How did it feel to be the first black Miss America? Did it even matter to you?



I know that you received hate mail and death threats. What was that like for the family?



Do you have any idea who you are sandwiched between on the Hollywood Walk of Fame?


Ooh, gosh, I don't know.

The music works brilliantly, describing not-so-innocent Manon as she free-falls through Parisian society, until degraded and penniless, she dies an outcast in the wilds of Louisiana. 

Italian ace opera composer Giacomo Puccini (Madama Butterfly, Tosca) didn't invent verismo, but, boy, did he refine it. Kings, gods, and other fancy types in those daffy Bellini waxworks and those highflying Rosinni warblers were banished, and in their place arose "real" people, somewhat like TV soaps of their day. Sex, scandal, violence, and more sex were the Jerry Springer ingredients for this successful genre, and the Italian public lapped it up like gelato. We still do. Of course, it helps if the music's good, which is a no-brainer when it comes to Puccini and his sliceof-life-on-a-Parisian-barge little shocker. Il Tabarro, Leoncavallo's Pag is a "heavy breather," a late-19th century form of stage realism akin to a Tarantino movie today. It's a backstager about adultery among a troupe of traveling performers. One of opera's most famous tenor arias, "Vesti la giubba" ("Put on the costume") graces this work, as Canio transforms into his clown character while his heart breaks over his wife's infidelity. Eight women in black sleeveless leotards undulate, twitch, and glide through Czech master choreographer Jiri Kylian's Falling Angels (1989). Set to the heartbeat of Steve Reich's hypnotic "Drumming, Part I," the abstract piece with its semaphore movement connotes mystery, romance, and a cryptic feminine beauty. Sly Kylian once said that the piece was about "our profession," whatever that means. Pulsing rhythm of another sort is afoot with Twyla Tharp's sneakers-and-toe shoes propulsive whirlwind In the Upper Room (1986), set to an equally energetic Philip Glass score. In this piece of adrenaline, Tharp doesn't use nouns, only verbs-rush, fly, spin, jump! Sharing the program is artistic director Stanton Welch's world premiere Elements, using Paul Hindemith's astounding "Four Temperaments" and four of HB's dazzling male dancers to represent earth, wind, air, and fire. Der Rosenkavalier-Film and Music

SEPTEMBER 25, 26, 27 When German filmmaker Robert Wiene (Cabinet of Dr. Caligari) adapted Richard Strauss's operatic masterpiece Der Roserkavalier in 1926, the movies weren't talking, let alone singing. But that little impediment never stopped the movies. There was always an orchestra in the big movie palaces, if not a grand organ, or at least a piano and/or violin to play along, even when musicals were made into silent movies. Wiene, the preeminent filmmaker working in Vienna, convinced the maestro and librettist Hugo von Hofmannsthal to collaborate, and both eagerly agreed. Strauss liked the money. Hofmannsthal added characters (the Marchallin's husband), and Strauss slashed his radiant score to a more reasonable length, but added a march not in the opera. Strauss even conducted the Dresden film premiere, although he made a mess of it-apparently the movie ended way before the orchestra did. Once thought lost, the film has been restored by the Filmarchiv Austria and Channel ARTE. At the symphony, the role of Strauss will be played by maestro Hans Graf, but I guarantee the film and music will end at the same time. Houston Symphony. Jones Hall, 615 Louisiana.

Sadly, the fame and fortune didn't last for gay Bart, who in his prime had befriended Noël Coward, Judy Garland, and Princess Margaret. After fame enveloped him-Bart was infamous for often being in a drug-induced haze-he inexplicably sold his rights to the biggest show of the '60s and spent his remaining 30 years desperate for a return to the glory days. 
A Disaster Beginning

The Great Storm roared onto Galveston Island during the night of September 8, 1900, and when the sun rose on a calm -

morning, the largest city in Texas and America's busiest southern port had been flattened. The hurricane was so powerful that the wind speed on Galveston can only be estimated, for the anemometer blew away after topping out at 100 miles per hour. There were so many dead that to bury them the city dumped the bodies into the Gulf, only to watch them float back to the island. Soon, funeral pyres dotted the beach and the scent of burning bodies floated inland to Houston. It was the greatest natural disaster in U.S. history. Writer Ain Gordon (Will & Grace) focuses on one woman survivor whose tale of horror speaks for all. Tony Award-nominated Veanne Cox (Company, 1996) portrays the plucky woman. 

Getting Married

The great 20th-century literary lion George Bernard Shaw delighted in kicking people in the butt. He got his jollies tweaking the complacent, the dull, and the conformist. By dazzling with his wit and flair, he willed them to listen to his rich, cholesterol-laden arguments. This middle-period Shaw from 1908, falling between Major Barbara and Pygmalion, is one of his plays of ideas, or "disquisitory extravaganzas," as he ceremoniously labeled them. It eshews plot and each act breaks for conversation around one topic-in this case, marriage: the whys and why nots of it. It's a delight just to listen to the plummy phrases, the Oscar Wildeesque repartee that makes you laugh out loud, and to Shaw's prescient themes of social and gender equality that infuse nearly all his numerous works. The Bridgenorth's youngest daughter is getting married, and the entire family and friends debate, cajole, goad, carp, seduce, and whine about the state of marriage in England. When one of the daughters asks her father, "Then it's a mistake to get married?" He wisely replies, "It is, my dear; but it's a much bigger mistake not to get married." 
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
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
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Hunger bites

in send-up of the 'Angels in America' controversy

he actor from New England will introduce himself-all of himself-to Houston audiences with a nude scene in Southern Rapture. which this month launches the 31st season of Stages Repertory Theatre. It's not just any nude scene. It caused such an uproar 13 years ago in Charlotte, North Carolina, that a handful of religious-right zealots forced the city council to yank funding for the arts-not the scene itself, but the outrageous overreaction to the idea of a naked man on stage, especially a naked gay man.

"It took a couple of years, but the theater ended up folding." Jon Egging explains, "and a lot of other local arts funding was lost."

The culture war it sparked was so farcical that, a decade or so later, The Actors Theatre of Charlotte (ATC) commissioned playwright Eric Cobie to write-what else?-a farce about a once-peaceful Southern city split to bits over a man dropping his pants on stage. The resulting play, Southern Rapture, premiered at ATC

"All indications are that it went over pretty well," says Egging.

But flashback to 1996 when Charlotte was one of only six cities (including Houston) outside New York to see the entire seven-hour, two-part "gay fantasia" Angels in America. Instead of being a feather in its cap for Charlotte Repertory Theatre, the production ignited a controversy that exploded into national ridicule for Charlotte

when leaders of warring camps tore into each other on Good Morning, America.


Cobie interviewed many people involved in the infamous affair, but he was careful not to tape-record the conversations so that he would be sure to write a fictionalized account of the brouhaha, rather than a documentary. "Documentary style might work in a film or a TV special. but for a stage production, farce plays into the theatricality of the events," says Egging. "They seem, in 20/20 hindsight vision, at this point, farcical."

Adding to that theatricality, Egging gets to play three different characters, including the actor who disrobes, a preacher who stokes the fire, and the playwright who threatens to shut down the production if his play, titled Rapture in America, isn't performed precisely as he wrote it.


"All three say the heart of each argument" in the controversy, Egging explains. "It's an interesting juxtaposition. For an audience to see the same actor in each of those roles, I think, spells out, on a really human level, what each character has to say."


First, the character of Mickey is an "actor's actor," Egging believes, who understands that nudity in the scene "fits into what the script is trying to say."

In contrast, the preacher, his mind in the gutter, hears the play is about homosexuals and immediately imagines two men having anonymous sex in a public park. "He's a preacher in the South, a Baptist kind of guy," says Egging, who adds, "I don't think we want him to →

always be out for fire and brimstone. He's a human being."

Finally, the playwright, one Anton Finewitz, is out to protect his creation. "He says, 'My play is my play, and if you change it, I'll shut you down."

To play each role, Egging says he will "try to set up different physical parameters for each character and how they talk." Angels in America author Tony Kushner "might be somebody to tap into" for his portrayal of Anton, Egging suggests. "Not a straight-up imitation of him, but an amalgamate; a Jewish New York guy, but not 'verklempt,' not a Mike Myers impersonation" (of a Barbra Streisand fan).

As for baring all onstage, Egging says that when he was asked to appear naked, he shrugged, "As long as you guys don't mind."

About six years ago, Egging appeared nude throughout much of a Vermont production of *Snow* by Gordon Porterfield. The two-character play is about a man and a woman "in a dating situation," Egging explains. It had previously been work-shopped in Baltimore with so much nudity that, its author complained, audiences were staring at the actors more than involving themselves in the play. Consequently, the production with Egging had less nudity, he says.

Egging moved from Boston to Houston this year after his girlfriend, Rachel Bush, was hired to develop a stage management program at the University of Houston's School of Theatre and Dance. They live with their 16-month-old daughter in the Midtown area.

Having taught acting, play analysis, theater history, and oral interpretation at Bridgewater State College in Massachusetts, Egging landed a teaching post at San Jacinto College in the spring. This fall, he and two UH acting students will perform *The Complt Works of Wllm Shkspr (Abridged)* at UH and at area high schools.

Jovan Jackson, as an actor portraying a doctor, will appear in the nude scene with Egging. Also cast in *Southern Rapture* are Sally Edmundson, David Wald, Rutherford Cravens, and Pamela Vogel. Directing the show is Kenn McLaughlin, producing artistic director at Stages.

Southern Rapture plays Sept. 16—Oct. 11 (previews Sept. 16—17; opening night is Friday, Sept. 18) at Stages Repertory Theatre, 3201 Allen Parkway (one block west of Waugh Dr.). Tickets are \$26–\$36. Details: 713/527-0123 or stagestheatre.com.

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Hello, Sailors

Bayou City Concert Musicals brings 'On the Town' to Houston town

eonard Bernstein's On the Town is this year's unearthed Broadway musical treasure, which Bayou City Concert Musicals (BCCM) stages this month in a lavish production, with more than 30 performers, including a dozen dancers, and a 19-piece orchestra of union

The show will play five performances only, Sept. 10-13, at Heinen Theater, 3517 Austin at Holman in midtown Houston.

It marks the first time in history that a Houston company has performed On the Town. It fits nicely into BCCM's scheme of showcasing seldom-produced or neglected musicals, especially from years gone by.

BCCM's 10th anniversary season also includes two cabaret events, featuring Roaring '20s music by Cole Porter, and songs of Vincent Youmans ("Tea for Two") from the 1920s and 1930s, in February and May 2010, respectively.

"If you've only seen the movie, then you haven't seen the musical!" Hope exclaims, with big-hearted enthusiasm. "The plot was revised and MGM kept only two songs. One of those was 'New York,

Hope heard the complete score of the musical when he was in high school and got an album featuring three of its four Broadway stars, including Nancy Walker (Rhoda's mom on the hit 1970s Rhoda TV series) as Hildy, the cab driver who taxis the sailors from adventure to misadventure in search of the girl of their dreams. The sailors sing and dance their way through subways, nightclubs, and museums until they finally find their girls at iconic Coney Island.

New York."

Five ballets help move the story along and add to the amount of action that always surprises BCCM audiences who expect a "concert" version of a musical to

currently popular in New York's theater community. "'Concert' just means no scenery and the orchestra is on stage. You won't just get a flavor. You will see the full show, complete with sailor costumes and those wonderful '40s dresses."

The three sailors are played by Kregg Alan Dailey, Adam Gibbs, and Will Luton. "He has handsome, farm-boy looks and strawberry-blond hair. He's perfect for the character of Gabey," Hope says, explaining that Luton graduated from Spring Woods High School and was accepted for studies at College-Conservatory of Music in Cincinnati.

Among the female headliners are Melissa Pritchett, Susan Draper, and Tamara Siler (who played Caroline in Tony Kushner's Caroline, or Change at Main Street Theater). "And in luxury casting, Susan O. Koozin will play Hildy's hypochondriac roommate," boasts Hope. →

"We have six male dancers and six female dancers, all from Sam Houston State University and all as cute as they can be."

"The Heinen Theater is a jewel box of a theater" with free parking and a parking garage close to the front door, says Hope. "And the sight lines are great. With only 300 seats, even on the back row you can still see [the performers'] faces, and when you don't have scenery, it's important to see their faces."

Hope is co-directing the show with Philip Lehl. Ballets are choreographed by Krissy Richmond, with other musical numbers staged by Jenny Franco. Musical direction is by Art Yelton. The conductor is Dominique Royem.

Top ticket price is \$35. Senior citizens' tickets are \$25, students \$15. They are available at 713/465-6484 or online at bayoucityconcerts.org.

Throughout the years, BCCM has donated more than \$150,000 to support various local charities, including the Center for AIDS. On the Town will benefit The Tim Harris Memorial Fund of the Houston Professional Musicians Association for musicians who have suffered a catastrophic illness or injury.

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Prior BCCM productions have included Follies (which OutSmart called a "stirring testament to the depth of talent found in the Bayou City, as well as their matchless star wattage"), Falsettos, A Little Night Music, She Loves Me, 70 Girls 70, Assassins, Fiorello!, and Pal Joev.

Creators of On the Town are a who's who of Broadway's best, with music by Leonard Bernstein (his first Broadway musical), book and lyrics by Betty Comden and Adolph Green (newcomers who also co-starred in the original production), choreography by Jerome Robbins, and direction by George Abbott. Inspired by Bernstein's and Robbins' ballet Fancy Free, On the Town expanded into a fulllength production and opened on Broadway in 1944.

Bernadette Peters was nominated for the 1972 Tony Award for best featured actress in a musical for her role as Hildy in the show's first Broadway revival. Out actress/comedienne Lea DeLaria stole the show in the 1998 Broadway revival with a scat take on Hildy's big number, "I Can Cook, Too." She won Theatre World honors, while Mary Teste, playing Madame Dilly, was nominated for a Tony Award.

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BCCM's 10th anniversary season offers two cabaret programs spotlighting underperformed works of the American musical stage and song book.


Paul Hope serves as master of ceremonies, weaving the history of the music and its creators into special evenings of song.

The cabaret shows start at 7:30 p.m. in the Performance Centre at the Ensemble Theatre, 3535 Main St. at Berry, on three consecutive Monday nights in February 2010 and May 2010.

February shows are titled "Let's Misbehave-The Early Music of Cole Porter" (1909-1929). Among Porter's featured hits will be "Let's Misbehave," "Let's Do It," "What Is This Thing Called Love," "You Do Something to Me" and "You've Got That Thing."

"Tea for Two-Songs of Vincent Youmans" is scheduled for the May cabarets. While serving in World War I, he wrote "Hallelujah," which became a huge hit with U.S. troops and was later included in the musical Hit the Deck. He wrote the music for No. No. Nanette before scoring the first Fred Astaire-Ginger Rogers movie musical, Flying Down to Rio.



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
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Sounding a **New Direction**



Interview with Linus Lerner by Rich Arenschieldt Photo by Dalton DeHart

As the new artistic director of **Bayou City Performing Arts** (BCPA), which comprises the Gay Men's Chorus of Houston, the Bayou City Women's Chorus, and the combined choir known as the Bayou City Chorale, Linus Lerner inherits a 30-year tradition of LGBT music-making in Houston.

he new director is excited about the possibilities that the Bayou City has to offer. "Houston is a key city for me," Lerner says. "There are numerous economic and cultural institutions here, and they are all healthy and vibrant. It is very exciting to be here now.

Regarding the upcoming 2009-10 BCPA season, Lerner was able to be intimately involved in its planning, even as a prospective applicant for the position. "When a person applies for a job such as this one, the interviewers will expect the applicant to create a season of programs, work with the chorus, get to know them, and be very familiar with the organization and its mission." With an impeccable musical pedigree and 23 years of choral experience, Lerner should be able to accomplish all these tasks and extract amazing music from his singers.


The first concert of the season, on December 5 and 8, highlights the Bayou City Women's Chorus and is titled Winterlight. According to Lerner, "This performance depicts the different moods and colors associated with the winter season. I've tried to create an ambience and atmosphere that represents both the coziness and joy associated with this time of year."

The venue for this concert will be Houston's spacious Unity Church of Christianity, and this, to some degree, has influenced Lerner's programmatic choices. "Unity is a perfect venue for this type of program. Because of the resonance in this building, the space lends itself to a more specific type of repertoire-I think the women will sound wonderful here. We will present a wide variety of music, including a very interesting arrangement of 'Santa Baby' and



a humorous piece entitled 'Cold and Fugue Season."

Following Winterlight, the men take center stage at Jones Hall on Tuesday, December 15, whirling in to give us A Twisted Holiday. This is a more unusual musical holiday offering than audiences normally expect. "This concert is unique in that it focuses on music that we hear over the holidays and how -

much of that music we hear," Lerner says. This concert pairs well-known carols with their lesser-known and more oddly inspired counterparts. A Twisted Holiday presents differing musical views: "Carol of the Bells" versus "Carol of the Malls" or "Winter Wonderland" bundled in the same musical brassiere as "Walking Around in Women's Underwear."

Spring repertory for BCPA includes an exhilarating evening of music on Tuesday, March 22, in Jones Hall titled We Can't Stop the Beat, which features both the men's and women's choruses. "This is a very high energy concert," Lerner says. "We will have some special guest performers join us for this show. We are currently trying to arrange some collaboration with groups from the local community, or we may bring in a group from as far away as Brazil to perform with us. In any event, we anticipate a very energetic performance that audiences will enjoy."

Transitioning from a disco beat to a heartbeat, May 2010 brings us It's All About Love, featuring the Bayou City Women's Chorus at Unity Church, once again. "The music in this show is going to illustrate all of the facets of love and what

it means to each of us," Lerner says. "Love may be the one thing that is the answer to all the conflicts in the world." Featured pieces will include "Can You Feel the Love Tonight?" from The Lion King and "Love Changes Everything" from Aspects of Love.

Lesbian humorist Kate Clinton closes the season, hosting the June 19 Let's Misbehave concert, which promises to be an evening full of wit-spoken and sung. Having entertained us for 28 years, Clinton's jokes (in her words) have "supported us through wartime, peacetime, scoundrel time, and economic downtimes."

Pieces for this concert will pique everyone's interest, including "Every Sperm Is Sacred" from Monty Python's Meaning of Life. "Four Jews in a Room Bitching" from Falsettos, and "Everyone's a Little Bit Racist," from Avenue Q.


Though the BCPA programs may be more contemporary in approach, Lerner always aims for musical excellence. "No matter what kind of music we do, whether it's popular or classical in nature, I will always aim for great quality. Even when we sing a country hit like 'Stand By Your Man,' it has to be well performed. That is my focus for this year."

Beyond the current season, Lerner plans to expand repertoire and also the locales where the groups perform. "I have several shows in the pipeline that may include some classical literature or even choruses from opera. The choruses have also received invitations to travel abroad. We have been asked to perform at a diversity celebration in São Paulo, Brazil, and may go to China in 2011. If that trip occurs, BCPA will be the first gay chorus to ever travel to China and perform as an openly GLBT group."

Lerner also wants to collaborate with artists and groups here in Houston. "This chorus has a 30-year history in Houston, and we have done a lot of great work here. I want us to continue to embrace the surrounding community as musical and organizational partners. It's important that we continue to refine our niche. As the GLBT community becomes more accepted within society, the perspective from which we view our mission changes. As we gain more rights in the world, how does that change what this group does? It's all about maintaining a tremendous level of musical quality, embracing diversity within this very international city, and giving audiences a life-changing musical experience."

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


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From Lemons . . . Lemonade

Filmmaker David Purdie finds inspiration amid the ruins of local landmarks

hen award-winning gay filmmaker David Purdie was about to be born, his father rushed out to buy a movie camera to document his son's arrival. In like fashion, when Purdie heard in 2005 that his childhood playground, AstroWorld, was going to be demolished, he bought a Sony Handycam to salvage his memories of the iconic Houston amusement park.

"My father's home movies are the best thing he left us," says the Houston native. "The second I heard that AstroWorld was going to die, I knew I had to do this. I spent the final month filming interiors, and I went on the final day it was open [October 31, 2005]," he says. "Then I went out the next week and starting filming the demolition from the freeway. I had no idea I would get hooked on filming the demolition, but I went back almost every day until May 2006."


From all that footage, Purdie and a friend, film editor Radkey Jolink, fashioned a three-minute film, Astrowhirled, which won first prize and \$200 in the 2008 Aurora Picture Show's annual Extremely Short Films (under three minutes) juried competition. Astrowhirled has since played a dozen times on the silver screen at the majestic River Oaks Theatre.

"It was great to see it up in lights on the marquee," he says.

"After the movie was said and done," Purdie explains, he took a vacation—to Galveston, another favorite childhood destination. "Astroworld and Galveston were the two places I can remember going to bed at night, knowing the next day I was going there! It was huge!"

Something he had never done, though, was stay at the island's historic Flagship Hotel, which stood on the Pleasure Pier that stretched a thousand feet into the Gulf of Mexico. Last summer, Purdie and his friend and Montrose neighbor, Ruth Schulte—deciding to live large—checked into Room 217 →

for a weekend playcation at the Flagship. From the balcony of their room, Purdie videotaped a panoramic view of the oceanfront.

In the next couple of months, they returned four or five times, always staying in Room 217. Purdie kept a video diary of their activity, including dinners at the legendary Balinese Room, which had been an elite private club and casino in the 1940s, and shopping for souvenirs at Murdoch's Bath House and Mermaid Pier—"It was the *OutSmart* of gift shops in Galveston," Purdie explains.

Tragically, all three landmarks were destroyed when Hurricane Ike hit the island last September. "We had no idea when we checked out of Room 217 for the last time that it would all be gone," Purdie says.

Once again in possession of unique historical footage, Purdie made a short film, which he called *Galvest-Gone!* In June, it placed third at Aurora Picture Show's competition, ahead of submissions from across the globe.

On Saturday, Sept. 12, to commemorate the first anniversary of Hurricane Ike, "Galvest-Gone!" plays on the big screen at River Oaks Theater, prior to a midnight screening of *The Rocky Horror Picture Show* with an acting troupe known as The Beautiful Creatures performing scenes during the movie.

The screening marks the first anniversary for Purdie and partner Rob Boyte, who met in Montrose, just hours before Hurricane Ike made landfall and began sweeping through Houston into East Texas.

For 18 years, Purdie has been a waiter, including his current stint at Tony Mandola's Gulf Coast Kitchen on West Gray, but making his living as a film-maker could be in his future. "I don't see myself stopping!" he says. "More and more people have been asking me if I could [film events] for them."

In addition, Purdie cut a longer film from his AstroWorld footage, which he titled *Disasterworld*. It was shown throughout April in continuous loop at ArtCar Museum on Heights Boulevard.

Not too long ago, a management company asked Purdie to film the retirement of one of its longtime employees. "It's now available on DVD," he laughs, soaking in the enjoyment of his new venture and where it might lead.

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It's All About Identity

For Jason Villegas, creating art beats robbing banks

nimistic prints, collages of fabric, depictions of husky men in various stages of undress, and whimsical creations all serve to voice the creative mind of visual artist Jason Villegas, currently exhibiting his work at the Contemporary Arts Museum, Houston (CAMH).

CAMH's longrunning "Perspectives" series. designed to feature new and emerging talent, spotlights the artist in Perspectives 167: Jason Villegas, debuting a new site-specific installation to mark his first solo museum exhibition, on view

through November 1. Villegas's installation combines wall murals, soft sculpture, performance, and video and marks a significant artistic and emotional homecoming.

"This is very exciting for me as a young artist," Villegas says. "Many artists have used this Perspectives series as a springboard for their careers. Other local artists who have exhibited here are currently doing very well, nationally and internationally."

A native Houstonian, Villegas attended Lamar High School and received a BFA in sculpture from the University of Houston. Though now living in New York City, his formative years in Houston were challenging. "Growing up in a Hispanic family without any artistic references was difficult." Villegas says. As a teenager, both his cultural and sexual identity were challenged. "As Mexican-Americans, my parents actually downplayed that heritage while I was growing up, preferring that we acculture into American society."

Additionally, in spite of Villegas's early realization of his sexual orientation, his parents, seeking to reinforce heteronormative standards, essentially dismissed his coming out at age 15. "When given the news, my mother told me, 'You can think about robbing a bank, but that doesn't mean you have to do it.' She was hoping things would change and asked me to 'wait a year.' A year later I told her that I had actually decided to become a bank robber."

This family-imposed repression of self and sex served to make Villegas especially sensitive to issues of identity,


both personally and on a global scale. His artistic journey has mirrored his personal development. Villegas's physical features (he describes himself as "chubby") would place him in the "cub" category within the LGBT lexicon, but he didn't discover that moniker easily. "I always felt subcultural growing up. I had trouble finding my

way, even within the gay world. Amongst my circle of slim, young men, I was always regarded as 'the overweight friend' in my group. It wasn't until some years later that I discovered an active 'bear' community." →

The artist's self definition has influenced his creative output, but is not its sole feature. "Some of my friends have pushed the bear aspects of my art more than I have," Villegas says. "In the last two years I've started doing some bear paintings, celebrating that particular physique. In a recent show at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, I animated a portrait of a bear who had posed for me. I am happy to bring that aspect of my work to those specific audiences, but I must also be true to all of my own creative instincts."

Villegas has a multitude of methods for his artistic expression, many of which are evident in this exhibition. His primary inspiration comes from the unlikely combining of primitive themes and easily recognizable animistic marketing logos, many of which are found on popular clothing. "Important aspects of this exhibit include the animal logo, the polo shirt, and re-purposed clothing," Villegas says. "These elements take several forms. Painting, sculpture, video, and mural are all represented. Fabric portraits are an especially good combination for me right now. This show at the CAM involves so much cloth that there's been a lot of cutting of fragments for incorporation into these pieces.

"In addition to fabric, one of my primary means of expression for this exhibit is found items. I scour thrift stores for various colors and patterns using, among other things, animal logos and items that are associated with a kind of spiritual animism. I combine these aspects with pop imagery which helps to make my work somewhat more marketable.' Commentary regarding the global

marketplace also is prominent in this artist's work. "I've combined luxury items with objects from impoverished parts of the world. This juxtaposition of things that are created in the third world and then shipped and sold within developing countries interests me." Villegas says. "At one point I worked in a clothing store on Madison Avenue. That provided me insight into what wealthier individuals really wanted to possess. Oddly enough, merchandise tags that come with items occasionally inform my work."

The utilization of disparate elements, within a single work or exhibition, challenges audiences, something Villegas is happy to do. "I would prefer that people would not see one of my works and assume that's emblematic of my creative output.

I like to differentiate the physical space of an exhibit and utilize items that are not instantly recognizable as art. Much of my work doesn't fit into a specific genre. People often tell me that I'm not immediately definable. This is great: I've never wanted my work to be a picture on a wall that people would just casually walk by." With a portfolio that includes such titles as "Hamster Infanticide," "Cosmic Anus," and "Infant Blue Whale With Skin Disorder." that's not likely to happen.

After his exhibit at CAMH, Villegas travels to more showings of his work, then returns to New York. "After a few more exhibits. I'll be spending time in the studio and applying for various grants. I've been showing my work for about 10 years, and exhibitions are very important to me. It is vital to me that my work gets seen, but not necessarily sold. I continue to dedicate a significant amount of time to studio work, and I let those efforts speak for me."

Though Villegas fits perfectly within the TBLG (talented bear loving gay) demographic group, in a community obsessed with labels, artistically, this thirty-something cub prefers to remain a vagary.

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


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
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

always said Lifetime was television for women . . . and my friends," admits Lifetime programming executive JoAnn Alfano in her first-ever interview with the gay press— "... my friends and my friend, Kevin, who is the most avid Lifetime viewer of anyone I know. When I got the job, he knew more about the network programming than I did." -

Alfano's pal might have also mentioned just how stale that programming had become, with its tendency to relentlessly air reruns of homo-friendly comedies and women-done-wrong movies of the weak. Granted, we love our Golden Girls and Will & Grace reruns as much as the next gay, and there is a certain pervy pleasure in watching hot has-beens from the Jenny Garth generation take revenge on abusive husbands. But really, was this the best Lifetime could do?

With ad budgets shrinking like a sweater in a dryer, and competitors We and Oxygen breathing down Lifetime's practically geriatric neck, CEO Andrea Wong had to put some serious muscle behind the channel's much-needed makeover-and do it faster than a reality competition elimination challenge. It appeared such a change was finally happening with programming whiz Susanne Daniels. The topical, intelligent drama Army Wives was a critical and commercial hit, causing both advertising agencies to take notice and Jill Q. Public to set her TiVo. Rita Rocks signaled a refreshing foray into original scripted comedy. Then, the coup de grace. The ladies at Lifetime showed some serious chutzpah by stealing Bravo crown jewel Project Runway.

But the resuscitating breath of fresh air suddenly seemed more like a shockgasp in a Nora Roberts plot.

First, Daniels abruptly announced her departure, sending industry tongues wagging about female infighting in the halls of power. Reporters seem to bring up this pervasive and patently offensive sexist view at a moment's notice. It's the







journalistic equivalent of blaming a woman's bad mood on her period; wrong at best, insulting at worst. While it probably makes for juicy copy to insinuate that Wong and Daniels tussled, it strains believability that Daniels would happily send Alfano into the Lifetime lioness den.

"Susanne Daniels was a friend of mine, and I called her to wish her well," Alfano recalls. "Then she said, 'Hey, what are you doin'? Do you wanna go for this job?' It hadn't crossed my mind until that point, and then I was like, Uh, yeah. Okay, yeah, I do!"

Alfano met with Wong and the two hit it off. "I loved so many of the things she had to say and what she was doing with the company. I think we had a really good simpatico."

But just as the Emmy-winning, former 30 Rock producer showed up on the job, the second plot point surfaced. NBC/ Universal promptly sued to keep Runway's gorgeous, profitable legs strutting on their runway. The public rarely cares about such legal haggling, but Runway was such a cultural phenom that the ensuing drama was as closely monitored as Michele Obama's sleeve length.

"Yeah, that happened right after I came here," says Alfano about the Runway nightmare. "We produced the show at that time and we continued to do so, because I didn't know how it would turn out. But separate from that, I just focused on everything else."

Everything else involved Alfano ensuring the network didn't lose precious momentum gained from Army Wives. Plus, there were other non-Runway projects in the pipeline she had to foster, ones handpicked by her predecessor, not herself, which is sort of like babysitting other people's kids while you're birthing your own. And speaking of the new progeny, Alfano's deliveries needed to fit comfortably into the Lifetime family, while hopefully broadening the network's reach without scaring off the core audience. No small chore.

Still, like one of those former Lifetime movies Alfano and company are trying to get away from, the movie doesn't have a downer ending, and the heroine is destined to succeed.

"We're about victors not victims, if you will," Alfano affirms. "And women in power. Not women in peril."

Cue music. Happy music, that is. The Project Runway debacle was settled and the show debuted with a staggering 45 percent increase over the previous season five debut on Bravo.

And that's after combating a controversial location move from its haute home in New York to the fashionably questionable environs of LA, not to mention the Internet fiasco of having most search engine results for Runway taking you to Bravo's website, not Lifetime's. Whatever. An audience of 4.2 million people didn't have any trouble finding their fashion fix on its new home. So naturally, Alfano is experiencing a little relief.

"Oh, lots of relief," she admits from her office in Los Angeles. "I'm so excited for it to finally hit the air and for people to see it. See how good the show is and enjoy it. We've had it in the can for quite awhile."

Other preexisting products in the Lifetime cupboard are holding their own. Respectable numbers kept former Mad TV star and gay fave Nicole Sullivan's Rita Rocks on the air. And Army Wives continued to perform, though its season three bow lost more than a million viewers from last year's highly touted benchmark. Offnet rights to Grey's Anatomy and Medium start stripping in September, perhaps easing some of the heavy rotations of been there/seen that Reba reruns. But it's the new slate, the one spearheaded by Alfano. that is transforming Lifetime from dowdy do-gooder feel-good to a hipper, smarter, younger channel. It's not gay by choice so much as it's increasingly chosen by gays.

Truly, where else is the rainbow coalition to go? Logo's parent MTV is so tightfisted they're forced to grab bargain basement acquisitions featuring Internet "stars" Jeffrey and Cole, a long way from the wickedly inspired satire of Rick & Steve and Rosie O'Donnell-backed Sketch Show of Logo's glory days. And the once unstoppable Bravo has run out of gas, now sucking so hard on their program pipe, there's barely a fume left in the tank. Seriously, even the spinoffs of spinoffs have spinoffs. The most heinous example being the umpteenth Housewives regurgitation, slapping together B-roll outtakes for yawn-inducing director's cut, and then giving homo camera hog Andy Cohen his own interview hour with the peach-holding harpies.

That leaves Alfano and company to slip into the void with one of the most brilliant strategies on cable: keep the loyal core base of women, but open their net just a little with smarter, sharper programming, attracting a more lucrative share of the advertiserfriendly, 18-35 market, while simultaneously seducing the freespending gays who, for the most part, have the same taste.

beyond that, yes, total viewers." But, she admits happily, "We welcome men to the party. We're glad to have 'em!"

Look no further for the perfection of that strategy than in Lifetime's latest hit, *Drop Dead Diva*, a critical darling that garners ratings as attractive (and plussized) as its charming lead, Brooke Elliot, in a star-making performance.

"Diva was a script that was in the community. When I came here I produced a number of pilots and I chose Diva as a series," Alfano explains, voice more humble than haughty. "I read it and loved it. But the broadcast networks had passed on it, and it was such a perfect fit in terms of being absolutely right for this audience."

In lesser hands, the tired soulswapper plot conceit would be just that. But in the hands of Oscar-winning producers Craig Zadan and Neil Meron of *Chicago* and *Hairspray* fame, *Diva* positively sings. And the sometimes fierce duet between creator Josh Berman and Alfano only helps the show hit the high notes.

"He was a very young programming executive at NBC studios when I worked there and I trained him, of all things. So Josh and I have known each other a very, very long time. And the craziness of me being in this position and him being the writer/creator of this series and doing it together, it's that kind of kismet that feels fantastic for both of us. We have a shorthand, and we also have an ability to get really mad at each other and it be okay."

Next month unveils another refreshingly non-anorexic—and, this time, non-white—lead, this one featuring *The View* talking head and *30 Rock* star Sherri Shepherd.

"It's all part of moving the network forward, just trying to broaden the scope and make it more contemporary, more real, more modern, more relatable, but at the same time not changing our brand in a way that our core audience would reject," relates Alfano. "We want to be inclusive of everyone."

Even Alfano's new off-net acquisitions show stunning savvy. Alfano caused an industry ruckus when she scooped everyone, grabbing the mega hit How I Met Your Mother, and before the dust settled on that deal, she snagged The New Adventures of Old Christine, hit series featuring out-gay stars Neil Patrick Harris and Wanda Sykes, respectively.

Upcoming Lifetime movies have nary a Knots Landing vixen in sight. The network just aired the goofily charming Acceptance starring Joan Cusack, and will soon unveil Julia Ormand in The Wronged Man, produced by Hollywood heavyweight Gale Anne Hurd, and Twelve Men of Christmas with Kristin Chenoweth. Continuing to grab overlooked gems, Alfano lifted the Georgia O'Keefe biopic, starring and produced by Joan Allen, after HBO passed.

"I think what brought our eye to that project is, more than just about Georgia O'Keefe being a luminary as a painter, is that she has a really interesting love story in terms of her life and her relationship with Alfred Stieglitz. That is what the focus of the movie is and why it just felt really, really right for us." Alfano's passion grows palpable. "It is an example of the type of movie that we're trying to step up and do—where we're willing to spend more money and to attract greater talent, in the interest of moving the network forward."

That investment is paying off. Two recent films, *Prayers for Bobby* and *Coco Chanel*, racked up Emmy nominations, along with nods for stars Sigourney Weaver and Shirley MacLaine. Not bad for a channel whose production budget on a film is probably half of what HBO spends to simply market one of theirs.

Maybe the new, hipper, sexier, havethe-cake-and-eat-it-too slate is just a reflection of the woman in charge. In addition to having her say on Lifetime, Alfano's not shy about having a life.


"I try to be home somewhere in the sevens because I have twin two-year-old girls." Alfano pauses a moment, perhaps because she realizes how all this sounds. Taking a new high-stakes, high-pressure job at a major cable network. And doing it all with twins? The Lifetime movie coincidences keep piling up higher than diapers in a Genie.

"I didn't give birth," she demurs. "I have to say that. My partner gave birth. We have fraternal twin girls and they're fantastic. Being a mom is great. And I work at a company that's fantastic. There are a lot of parents here, so it's a very supportive environment."

Then, in true mogul fashion, Alfano confesses. "Either fortunately or unfortunately, however you look at it, I don't ever really get off work. You're on a Blackberry, after you put the kids down at night you answer a lot of e-mails and such, and it keeps you tethered in that kind of way. But," she adds, "it also gives you a freedom to balance your life out."

A Lifetime character couldn't have said, or done, it better.

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AND THE EMMY GOES TO... 2009's Emmys air September 20 on CBS

he 2009 Tony Awards could not have been "gaver if Liza was named mayor," as host Neil Patrick Harris sang in the show's "11 o'clock number." The question is, can television's 61st annual Emmy Awards on Sept. 20 out-gay the Tonys?

Same host (NPH), same network (CBS), but this time Harris could even win an award, as he's nominated for best supporting actor in a comedy series for playing womanizing Barney on How I Met Your Mother.

In the race for best supporting actor in a drama series is William Shatner, whose Denny Crane married James Spader's Alan Shore in the series finale of Boston Legal. Oh, and U.S. Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia officiated the same-sex bromance wedding.

Emmys' biggest haul of the night might go to the mother-daughter affair, Grey Gardens, which picked up 17 nominations and surely has Hollywood's brightest gay minds wondering how to evenly split the winged trophy for best actress in a TV movie between stars Drew Barrymore (Little Edie) and Jessica Lange (Big Edie). Their competition, with every nominee playing a real person, includes Sigournev Weaver as a homophobic woman who repents after her gay son commits suicide, in Prayers for Bobby, a nominee for best TV movie; Shirley MacLaine, who was off-therack as inventor of the little black dress in Coco Chanel: and Houston's Chandra Wilson, who went homeless for the holidays in last fall's Accidental Friendship. Wilson is also nominated for best supporting actress in a drama series for Grey's Anatomy.

Our town's Jim Parsons is finally up for best actor in a comedy series for his highly acclaimed Sheldon Cooper on The Big Bang Theory. How did that happen?

Well, this year the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences decided to honor six nominees in comedy- and drama-series categories.

Parsons, 36, studied acting at the University of Houston and co-founded Infernal Bridegroom Productions. Eleven years ago, he played The Worm, in IBP's rendition of Bertold Brecht's In the Jungle of Cities, in a sweltering, corrugated metal barn with no air-conditioning—in Houston, in June! Now he's nominated for an Emmy for working with Johnny Galecki, 34, who was David on Roseanne, and more enticingly, on Broadway he played a full-frontal nude scene as male prostitute Alex in 2006's The Little Dog Laughed. Out actor and Sir Ian McKellen is nominated for playing no less than the title role in King Lear, but let's not dwell on his nude scene.

That extra nomination slot also paid off for our own two-time Tony-winning actress Cherry Jones, whose portrayal of a U.S. president on 24 is nominated for supporting actress in a drama series. OutSmart cover girls Kristen Chenoweth (May) and Vanessa Williams (this month) duke it out for best supporting actress in a comedy series.

Where are Kathy Griffin's gays? On Emmy night, many will be jammed in the closet at Nokia Theater in Los Angeles. secretly hoping for a marriage-equality shout-out should Griffin win again. Newly christened as "Norma Gay," Griffin could pick up two trophies this year. Her series My Life on the D List is the reigning outstanding reality program, and Kathy Griffin: She'll Cut a Bitch is nominated for best music or comedy special.

Other outrageous Griffins are nominated for best comedy series, as Family Guy is the first animated show to make the cut in the category since The Flintstones in 1961. Or so I'm told. I don't watch the show, -

but wouldn't you know, on the one episode I happened to catch, the Griffins flee to Texas, where cross-dressing Stewie enters a "Little Miss" pageant? (My research reveals there was another episode in which Stewie, watching girls undressing in a locker room, remarked, "It appears my wee-wee's been stricken with rigor mortis.") I don't watch United States of Tara either, but Toni Collette reportedly plays a biker dude (sometimes) and must do so pretty well, as she's up for best actress in a comedy series.

I get 400 or 500 channels, vet never see a lot of this stuff. But hopefully, in the list of major nominations, you'll find plenty of hopefuls to root for, even if there's no hardware in sight for makeup or costumes on RuPaul's Drag Race, best boy toy (Branden) on Make Me a Supermodel, or best villain (Wes) or hero (Jake) on this season's The Bachelorette.

Also, you won't find Kyle Chandler or Connie Britton nominated for their deserving work as a straight Texas married couple on Friday Night Lights, or Matthew Rhys and Luke McFarlane as gay newlyweds Kevin and Scotty on Brothers and Sisters. However, both shows are nominated for outstanding casting in a drama series, along with Damages, The Tudors, True Blood, and reigning Emmy champ Mad Men.

red of getting your queer TV fix with Logo's reruns of Queer as Folk and The L Word? Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) recently announced the findings of The 2009 Network Responsibility Index, its third annual report analyzing representation of homosexual characters and themes on television. And the news is good.

ABC ranked tops among the five broadcast networks with 24 percent of programming hours reflecting LGBT content, with little wonder. It's harder, frankly, to name an ABC show that doesn't feature a gay character.

But ABC is not resting on its laurels, rolling out *Modern Family*, whose mere previews are already cracking us up. ABC's new comedy takes "an honest and often hilarious look at the composition and complexity of family life in 2009." In it, Jesse Tyler Ferguson (Mitchell) and Eric Stonestreet (Cameron), with their newly adopted

Vietnamese daughter, represent the gay nucleus in an examination of a . . . well, modern family starring Ed O'Neill (*Married With Children*) and Julie Bowen (*Boston Legal*). Sept. 23, 8 p.m. ABC (abc.go.com).

Otherwise on gAyBC, Desperate Housewives returns for a sixth season, after knocking off Edie (Nicollette Sheridan) and knocking up Lynette (Felicity Huffman). Gay sons, gay neighbors . . . gaygaygay. Sept. 27, 8 p.m. ABC (abc.go.com).

Brothers & Sisters enters its fourth season, after last season framing not only a same-sex wedding but featuring ongoing, nonsensational gay themes in every episode. As the long-suffering matriarch, Sally Field is up for yet another Emmy Award (see page 83), adding even more credibility to the show that has become PFLAG's best friend. Sept. 27, 9 p.m. ABC (abc.go.com).

For those who need a distraction from the raging national health care debate (but not too much of a distraction), *Grey's Anatomy* is now in its sixth season. For this go'round, Jessica Capshaw, playing resident lesbian Dr. Arizona Robbins, gets an upgrade from part—time

Eight percent of NBC's programming features a queer character, GLAAD found. This month, in Heroes' fifth "volume," the ever-indestructible Claire (Hayden Panettiere), now a college student, finds herself living with lesbian Gretchen (Madeline Zima). Is our favorite teen super heroine super enough to avoid becoming a LUG? Sept. 21, 7 p.m. NBC (nbc.com).

CBS saw the greatest decline among the broadcast networks this year, dropping to last place with only five percent of its programming being LGBT-inclusive content. But don't forget the NFL returns this month: the Houston Texans start their eighth season here at home, facing off against the New York Jets, replete with its skintight knee pants and unbridled ass-slapping. Admit it—it doesn't get much gayer than that. Sept. 13, noon. CBS (cbs.com).

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

opera/rock hybrid. On Old School (Decca), they put Wagner through a Led Zeppelin process on "The Ride," while Mozart is dipped in Queen on "King of the Night." Handel's "Help Me (Jove, in Pity)" and "Walk" turn out to be two of the most sweetly accessible tracks on the disc. Verdi gets funky on "Brindisi Libera (pop the cork)," while Bach sounds like he belongs in a Broadway musical on "You're Not Alone."

Britain's got more talent than just Susan Boyle and Paul Potts. Competitors Escala, an all-female string quartet (remember Bond from a few years ago), are ready to sweep American audiences off their feet with their self-titled debut disc (Syco Music/Columbia). Drawing on an interesting range of material, including Led Zeppelin's "Kashmir" (on which they are joined by Slash), Paul McCartney's "Live and Let Die," and the Nina Simone chestnut "Feeling Good," as well as more classically minded compositions by Handel and Barber, Escala proves that they have pluck.

David Garrett is another young wizard of the strings and he burns them up on his new self-titled disc (Decca). He raises the temperature on Vivaldi's "Summer" and follows it with an exquisite arrangement of "Nothing Else Matters" by none other than Metallica. Garrett also restrings the late Michael Jackson ("Smooth Criminal"), Queen ("Who Wants to Live Forever"), AC/ DC ("Thunderstruck"), and Bill Withers ("Ain't No Sunshine"), and narrowly avoids sounding like elevator music.

Like Escala, pianist William Joseph tries his hand at Zeppelin's "Kashimir" and doesn't do too much damage. It's only one of two covers (the other is Morricone's "Cinema Paradiso"), on Joseph's Beyond (Reprise/143), which features a number of collaborations with David Foster (if you have the stomach for that).

Gregg Shapiro is a past recipient of the annual OutMusic award that recognizes contributions by non-musicians in furthering the work of LGBT performers.

The dual lives of TV host and media mogul Merv Griffin

You just can't help it. Much as you try, you can't help picking up one of those tabloids while you're waiting in line at the grocery store. This star divorced that one after he had an affair with this one over there because she split up another star's marriage and . . .


It's just way too much fun to stargaze. Read the new book Merv Griffin: A Life in the Closet by Darwin Porter (Blood Moon Productions, bloodmoonproductions .com), and you'll get an eyeful. Just remember-you've been warned.

One of the most powerful memories Mery Griffin ever had was when his parents were forced out of their home, their belongings confiscated, when young Merv was just five years old. Even at that tender age, he vowed to his mother that he would build her a mansion someday.

Though his father didn't want him to be a performer, talented Merv loved "putting on shows" for neighbors in his aunt's house. That same aunt taught the boy to play piano and, in short order, he was a better pianist than she.

Long before he was a teenager, Porter says, Merv knew he was attracted to boys. That attraction, though his father tried early on to quash it, strengthened during Merv's adolescence.

Because his uncle was a tennis pro who owned a club and gave lessons to Hollywood's elite, young Merv was able to meet and spend time with stars such as Errol Flynn, Johnny Weissmuller, and others.



Though Porter says much of that time was spent ogling men in the locker room, Merv became close friends with people-both men and women-who quickly furthered his budding career. Soon, he was singing for and with some of Hollywood's brightest stars.

Never one to miss an opportunity, Mery manipulated his career at every turn by pouncing on every opportunity he found. Porter indicates that, by the time Mery (the eventual creator or the game

show Jeopardy!) was called for an audition with producers Mark Goodson and Bill Todman, he was well-known and had an established fan base.

And he had quite a reputation in Hollywood . . . for more than just his singing.

Reading like a naked Who's Who of Hollywood, Merv Griffin: A Life in the Closet is, on one hand, a delightful guilty pleasure. On the other hand, it's a bit overwhelming because names are tossed out like fastballs and chronology seems to be merely a suggestion.

Author Darwin Porter says in his acknowledgements that he spoke to "hundreds of people associated with the entertainment industry," and not just about Merv. His research, though staggering, is nothing if not thorough. Astute readers, however, will notice a lot of direct quotes and entire conversations that purportedly happened decades ago, which makes for an engaging read but eventually feels tabloidfakey. While it's true that this book fits with others in the tell-all genre, I would've been happier with just the facts, ma'am.

Still, if you're a hopeless tab junkie and you can't get enough scandal, pick up this book. For you, Merv Griffin: A Life in the Closet will have you hung up and hooked.



FORBIDDEN LOVE. BUBBALA

What happens when a Jew and a Gentile mate



s the English mother of a half-Jewish Agay son, Anne Rosenbaum is the kind of person who . . . no, she is a person, period, who doesn't let nationality, culture, or inherited religious beliefs define her. She's also one of relatively few fictional characters in Chandler Burr's terrific debut novel You or Someone Like You (HarperCollins, harpercollins.com), which is roundly peopled by bold-faced Hollywood names ("Kate," for example, is actress Kate Caphsaw, and her son "Sawyer" is Sawyer Spielberg, son of Steven).

Married to Hollywood executive Howard Rosenbaum, Anne improbably finds herself leading a book club that becomes a big draw for Tinseltown's elite (improbable because "nobody reads in Hollywood," a character quips). But when son Sam, 17, goes to Israel and is rejected by a yeshiva for being impure because of his Gentile mother. Howard faces a crisis of conscience and becomes a "ba'al teshuva," a Jew returned to "G-d." Temple commands that Howard extinguish his "forbidden love" for the shiksa and divorce Anne.

Backed by Sam and Jack, a budding gay screenwriter, Anne fights to restore her marriage by sampling passages from the couple's best-loved authors and channeling her pleas to Howard through members of the book club.

Burr, 46, who is gay, allows that "what happens to [Sam in Israel] happened to me, in real life, more or less exactly as described." It's taken Burr 20 years to process that event into a thoughtful, acerbic work of comic fiction. While I've read that Burr has never had a long-term romantic relationship, it strikes me as odd because his book is a beautiful portrait of a marriage and loving parenthood.

I nominate Angelina Jolie to play strong-willed Anne in the movie version.

Musical headliners promise a gay ol' time at 3rd Annual Galveston Pride 2009




The Color of Silence, was called "one of the finest pop albums of 2000" by Billboard magazine.
