George H.W. Bush a Witness at Maine Same-Sex Wedding

ormer President George H.W. Bush was an official witness at the same-sex wedding of two longtime friends, his spokesman said.

Bush and his wife, Barbara, attended the ceremony as private citizens and friends of Bonnie Clement and Helen Thorgalsen, who were married on September 21, spokesman Jim McGrath said.

Thorgalsen posted a photo on her Facebook page showing Bush signing the marriage license as a witness. She captioned the photo: "Getting our marriage license witnessed!"

In the photo, Bush is seated in a wheelchair, a stack of papers on his lap and his left hand poised with a pen. Mismatched bright-red and bright-blue socks peek out below the cuffs of his blue slacks.

The forty-first president has deep ties to the area and owns a compound in Kennebunkport, a small coastal town. Thorgalsen and Clement own a general store in neighboring Kennebunk. They were honeymooning overseas and didn't immediately respond to an e-mail seeking comment.

Gay marriage became legal in Maine in December.

One of Bush's sons, former President George W. Bush, opposed same-sex mar-

riage and in 2004 announced his support for a proposed constitutional amendment to outlaw it. But his wife, Laura Bush, and daughter Barbara Bush support gay marriage, as does his former vice president, Dick Cheney, whose daughter Mary Cheney is

A spokesman for George W. Bush declined to comment on his current feelings about same-sex marriage or his thoughts about his father's official role in a same-sex wedding.

In July, George W. Bush made headlines when he said he wouldn't comment on the issue, saying he "shouldn't be taking a speck out of someone else's eve when I have a log in my own." He later explained that he just wasn't going to answer the question because he was out of politics.

His brother, Jeb Bush, a former governor of Florida and a potential presidential candidate, has said samesex marriage is an issue best left to the states to decide. In a speech in June, he told the Faith & Freedom Coalition that the nation needs to be supportive of nontraditional families. -AP

Same-Sex Marriages Must Be Allowed in New Jersey, Judge Rules

ame-sex couples must be permitted to marry in New Jersey, a State judge ruled in late September, arguing that the parallel label "civil unions," which the state now allows for gay couples, is illegally preventing them from getting federal benefits.

The judge ordered that same-sex marriages be allowed in the state starting October 21. The office of Gov. Chris

Christie, however, indicated the case would be appealed to a higher court.

The ruling cites the U.S. Supreme Court's June rejection of part of the federal Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA), a move that allows legally married samesex spouses to receive federal benefits.

After the DOMA ruling, some federal agencies are extending benefits continued on page 14

to legally married same-sex couples, but denying them to same-sex couples in "civil unions," Judge Mary Jacobson of the Mercer County Superior Court wrote in

"If the trend of federal agencies deeming civil union partners ineligible for benefits continues, plaintiffs will suffer even more, while their opposite-sex New Jersey counterparts continue to receive federal marital benefits for no reason other than the label placed upon their relationship by the state," Jacobson wrote.

"This unequal treatment requires that New Jersey extend civil marriage to same-sex couples to satisfy the equal protection guarantees of the New Jersey Constitution," she continued.

Jacobson ruled on a lawsuit that six same-sex couples and their children, as well as gav-rights group Garden State Equality, filed against the state.

New Jersey has recognized civil unions between same-sex couples since 2007, after a New Jersey Supreme Court ruling that said the state must allow same-sex couples all the rights and benefits of marriage. As far as state rights and benefits went, civil unions and marriages differed only in label, Jacobson noted.

Friday's ruling comes more than a year after Christie vetoed a bill that would have legalized same-sex marriage in the state.

On Friday afternoon, Christie's office said it had wanted "the issue of marriage equality" to be on the ballot this November. but said the legislature scuttled the effort. It also indicated that Jacobson's ruling would be appealed.

"Since the legislature refused to allow the people to decide expeditiously, we will let the Supreme Court make this constitutional determination," read a recent statement from Christie's office.

New Jersey is one of four states that offer civil unions, but not marriage, to same-sex couples. The others are Colorado, Hawaii, and Illinois.

Same-sex marriage is legal in thirteen U.S. states and the District of Columbia: California, Connecticut, Delaware, Iowa, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New York, Rhode Island, Vermont, and Washington.

Same-sex marriage is banned in every state not mentioned above, except for New Mexico, which has no laws banning or allowing it.

ExxonMobil to Extend Benefits to Same-Sex Couples

xxonMobil, which has been bashed by gay rights advocacy groups for years over unfriendly employee policies, announced last month that it will start offering benefits to same-sex couples.

Beginning October 1, ExxonMobil employees in legal same-sex marriages will be eligible to receive health insurance coverage for their spouses, the oil giant said in a statement.

The company's decision was less of a change of heart than it was a technical update stemming from this summer's Supreme Court decision to recognize same-sex marriages for federal purposes.

"The decision is consistent with the direction of most U.S. government agencies," ExxonMobil said in the statement. "We have made no change in the definition of eligibility for our U.S. benefit plans. Spousal eligibility in our U.S. benefit plans has been and continues to be governed by the federal definition of marriage and spouse."

ExxonMobil has long been criticized for having anti-LGBT policies. It currently has a lawsuit pending against it for discriminating against a lesbian applicant, and it received the lowest "corporate equality" score of any U.S. company in last year's Human Rights Campaign rankings.

The recent announcement was therefore welcomed by gay rights groups.

"After years of stubbornly refusing, we commend Exxon for joining the majority of the Fortune 500 business leaders that already treat gay and lesbian married couples equally under employee benefit plans," Tico Almeida, president of Freedom to Work, said in a statement. "It's a shame Exxon waited until after the Labor Department issued official guidance explaining that their old policy does not comply with American law, and now it's time to move forward."

A growing number of companies have been updating their policies to become more LGBT-friendly. This summer, Walmart announced it will offer benefits to same-sex and domestic partners. As of the beginning of this year, 89 percent of U.S. companies provide health benefits to same-sex couples, according to the Human Rights Campaign. More News →

Suit Challenges Pennsylvania's Non-Recognition of Gay Unions

wo women who wed in Massachusetts before moving to Pennsylvania asked a federal court last month to force their new home state to recognize their marriage, just as it does for opposite-sex couples.

The plaintiffs, Isabelle Barker and Cara Palladino, say they are being denied about six hundred marriage-related benefits, from filing joint state tax returns to co-owning property. They also have encountered reams of paperwork for health-care coverage and prepared legal documents to protect the interests of their son-red tape they say wouldn't be needed if their marriage were recognized.

"My Massachusetts marriage certificate is the same as any other couple that comes from Massachusetts," Palladino said. "It seems to me that that's the essence of discrimination. If you're taking the same piece of paper and you're treating it differently because of our status. that doesn't seem fair."

Pennsylvania is the only state in the northeastern U.S. without same-sex marriage or civil unions. Like thirty-six other states, it also does not recognize gay marriages performed legally in other jurisdictions. The lawsuit asks a judge to declare unconstitutional the state law barring recognition of such unions.

At a news conference overlooking Independence Hall, lawyers for Barker and Palladino said the statute infringes on the pair's constitutional right to travel among states without penalty and violates the guarantee that states will respect each other's judgments and decrees.

The lawsuit notes Pennsylvania honors opposite-sex marriages performed elsewhere "without qualification or question." Yet the plaintiffs "are denied the basic rights that were conferred on them by another sovereign federal court by the American Civil Libstate, solely because of a discriminatory, arbitrary and irrational distinction," it says.

Palladino and Barker lived in Massachusetts when they got married in 2005 and moved to Philadelphia later that year when Barker got a job at Bryn Mawr College. The couple had a son in 2009, and Barker said the boy has begun asking if his parents are mar-

"And it's sort of befuddling to us that we don't have a really clear answer for him about that," Barker said. "If we lived in Massachusetts, we would have a very easy answer: 'Yes, of course."

Their lawsuit, which names Gov. Tom Corbett and Attorney General Kathleen Kane as defendants, is at least the fifth pending legal case regarding gay marriage in Pennsylvania. A representative for Corbett did not immediately return a request for comment.

In one of the other lawsuits, Kane has refused to defend the state law defining marriage as between one man and one woman. After the U.S. Supreme Court threw out part of the federal Defense of Marriage Act earlier this year, she called the Pennsylvania marriage statute unconstitutional.

Corbett's office is now defending that case, which was filed two months ago in erties Union of Pennsylvania on behalf of thirty-two gay couples.

That complaint parallels a separate challenge filed recently, in which twentyone same-sex couples sued in state court to overturn Pennsylvania's ban on gay marriage.

In another lawsuit, the state Health Department has sued to stop a Montgomery County official who decided on his own to issue marriage licenses to same-sex couples. A couple who married using one of those licenses also has filed their own lawsuit.

Barker and Palladino's legal complaint was coordinated by the Equality Forum, a Philadelphia-based gay-rights organization.

Pasta Maker Barilla Under Fire for Antigay Comments

T talian pasta maker Barilla is in hot water for antigay remarks its president made in an interview last month.

Company president Guido Barilla said on an Italian radio program that he wouldn't feature same-sex couples in his company's commercials because he prefers the "traditional" family.

Soon after, LGBT advocates began calling for a boycott of the company. Many flocked to Twitter using the hashtag #BoicottaBarilla.

"Sigh. I'd like my pasta without the side of homophobia, thanks," one Twitter user wrote.

Another directed a tweet at the company: "Dear @BarillaUS I will no longer be feeding my LGBT family your pasta. We are a @Bertolli family now!'

Barilla issued a statement, titled "Guido Barilla's Clarification on Gays," apologizing for the remarks.

"I apologize if my words have generated controversy or misunderstanding, or if they hurt someone's sensitivity," the statement says. "I have the utmost respect for anyone, without distinction of any kind. I have the utmost respect for gay people and for everyone's right to express themselves. I've also said-and I would like to reiterate-that I respect gay marriages. In its advertising, Barilla represents the family-because it's what welcomes everyone."

The apology wasn't enough for LGBT advocacy groups.

"These insulting antigay comments will not only lead to LGBT people skipping Barilla, but their family members, friends, and co-workers as well," said a spokesman for gay rights group GLAAD. "Homophobia is bad for business-plain and simple."

This isn't the first time consumers have boycotted a company over its stance on LGBT rights. Bars around the world have stopped serving Russian vodka in protest of the country's antigay laws, and customers boycotted Chic-fil-A after its CEO expressed his opposition to same-sex marriage.





care of. I'm not going to admire the decor or write an opera. The last thing I want to do is to stand there trying to figure out if I am the cow or the bull when both of them have things hanging south. In one restaurant. 

Loved Ones in Need

The cost of caring for an aging family member

s the U.S. population continues to age, and overall longevity increases, the issue of long-term care insurance has remained front and center in terms of the impact it can have—both for those needing care and those who offer informal caregiving to a loved one.

Caregiving is usually defined as "unpaid assistance that is provided by family members,

friends, and neighbors, in order to help ill and disabled individuals remain in the community." Factors such as the changing nature of the family, as well as increased life expectancies, have significantly influenced the nature and the extent of caregiving today.

The True Cost of Giving Care

It may seem surprising that most longterm care for older adults is actually not provided in nursing homes, but rather on a more informal basis in private homes or other community-based settings.

> Unfortunately, while most people would not hesitate to offer care for an aging partner, this arrangement often comes at a very high cost. Due to the physical and emotional strain that caregiving can entail, caregivers who are employed in addition to providing care to a loved one are more like

ly to have their own health negatively affected. Given their added responsibilities, caregivers typically have less time to exercise and get sufficient rest.

The financial cost of caregiving, while somewhat different depending on gender, is quite staggering. For

example, according to the Met Life Study of Caregiving Costs to Working Caregivers, men who leave the workforce early or reduce their working hours

in order to provide care for a loved one lose an average of more than \$89,000 in cumulative wages. When also considering a man's reduced Social Security retirement benefits due to his decreased wages, the total loss can be in excess of \$144,600.



For female caregivers, the financial cost is even more substantial. In one scenario, a loss of wages of nearly \$142,700 is coupled with lost Social Security benefits of approximately \$131,351 and a \$50,000 impact on pension/retirement savings to bring the average lifetime cost of providing care to around \$324,000.

Sources for Financing Long-Term Care Needs

While providing care to a loved one can take its toll on future income and savings, current savings are also depleted relatively quickly if other sources of financing are not in place.

Contrary to popular belief, government sources such as Medicare and Medicaid provide very few reimbursements to cover long-term caregiving. For example, in order to qualify for limited Medicare funds, an individual must be considered "home bound," while Medicaid typically requires that an individual's assets be at his or her state's poverty level. (This differs from state to state, but is generally in the range of \$2,000 in total assets.)

There are, however, ways to plan for long-term care needs that can lessen both the physical and financial impact that a caregiving situation can bring about.

Long-Term Care Insurance


One option is to purchase long-term care insurance. Today's long-term care insurance policies cover myriad expenses, including a number of home-care options. This can allow a partner who needs care to receive the services that he or she needs, while the other partner continues to earn income and retain savings and assets for their originally intended purpose.

Likewise, many current long-term care insurance policies will allocate a certain amount of benefit to cover expenses that the caregiver incurs—even if that individual is a friend or family member. (Older policies often provide benefits only when trained medical professionals provide the care.)

In addition, long-term care insurance benefits can be increased over time by opting for the inflation rider. This can help a great deal in covering the rising cost of medical care—and it can be particularly beneficial for younger applicants who may not need to file a claim for several decades.

Many of today's long-term care insurance policies also offer premium discounts to domestic partners who both apply for coverage at the same time. This can help keep the overall cost of coverage down, while ensuring that money will be available should the need for care arise.





insurance policies, there are also "hybrid" plans offering a combination of benefits. For example, a combination annuity and long-term care insurance plan can consist of either an immediate or a fixed annuity that has a long-term care rider attached.

These plans allow the gain in the annuity contract-funds that would otherwise be considered taxable income-to be paid out as a tax-free long-term care benefit. In addition, the annuity holder can retain the increases in account value in the fixed annuity if these funds are not all used for long-term care needs.

These plans can offer a great way for someone who may not otherwise qualify medically for a stand-alone long-term care policy to obtain coverage. And, if the longterm care benefits are not needed, the policyholder still retains those benefits from the fixed annuity.

Combination life insurance and longterm care policies are also gaining more popularity. With these plans, a policyholder may be able to make one lump-sum deposit into the plan, and a certain multiple of those dollars can then be used for long-term care expenses, life insurance coverage, or a combination of both.

These linked-benefit plans can also allow one to leverage two benefits in a single policy. And, given that the plan was funded with just a single lump-sum premium, the policy is considered paid in full-and, therefore, there is no risk that premium payments will go up in the future.


Even if the policyholder never uses the long-term care benefits, their loved ones can still benefit from the life insurance proceeds. It is important to note, though, that a medical exam is still required in order to qualify for this type of plan. In addition, depending on the plan, the long-term care benefits may need to be received in a skilled-care facility.

In any case, it may be a good idea to review existing life insurance coverage and/or fixed annuity policies in order to determine whether a hybrid plan that also offers long-term care benefits would be more beneficial. In certain cases, individuals might be eligible for a Section 1035 tax-free policy conversion to a new plan that provides more appropriate benefits.

The Bottom Line

In any type of long-term care planning situation, it is essential to discuss your needs with a qualified professional who is well versed in providing tax and financial solutions for those who are approaching retirement, and specifically to individuals and couples in the LGBT community who may have unique planning needs.



Making History while Running a City

It's been a busy four years for Mayor Annise Parker

he Houston mayor's office in City Hall is impressive—not so much for its grandeur, but from a sense of the power and responsibility that has resided within its walls for almost seventy-five years. And for the last four years, a member of Houston's LGBT community has been the person occupying that office.

When Annise Parker made history on December 12, 2009, by becoming the first openly gay mayor of a major U.S. city, it seemed like an impossible dream had finally come true. A woman from our community was now the most powerful person in the city.

Parker won reelection on November 8 2011, and is now aiming to be reelected to a third and final term on November 5, 2013. Although she has a city to run and a campaign to wage, she graciously accepted an invitation from OutSmart magazine to look back on her nearly four vears in office and reflect on those two busy terms.

Office politics: Mayor Annise Parker is comfortable in the Houston mayor's office and wants to spend two final years there

sprawling metropolis called Houston is run. From here the orders go out, and back here is where the buck

Visitors wait in a lobby area until shortly before their appointment with the mayor. They are then ushered into an anteroom next to the mayor's office. This room also serves as the mayor's press conference room. Convenience and efficiency

are essential in this office. The mayor is the most powerful and sought-after person in the city, and her staff must combine hospitality with discipline in order to make it all flow.

> The mayor's huge inner office boasts a large conference table at one end and a comfortably intimate conversation nook at the other. The mayor's working desk is on one side of the room, facing

work tables on the other. On the tables are stacks of papers and briefing booklets. The office is imposing, yet friendly—busy, but not cluttered; orderly and without fussiness.


Easily visible on Parker's desk is a snow globe of Houston, and also her fountain pen collection. "This pen belonged to my grandmother, who was a schoolteacher," she says. "I recently had it restored."

What Does Houston's Mayor Do?

Asked to describe what she does as the mayor of Houston, Parker pauses. There is no slick sound bite, no rehearsed narrative. She ponders the question, and then says slowly and distinctly: "The mayor runs the city . . . leads the city . . . markets the city . . . and loves the city."

She smiles, pleased with her response. Then she sets out to explain her answer in more detail.

"I run Houston because this is a strong-mayor city," Parker explains. "I'm the CEO, and the Council is the board -

of directors. I have a tremendous amount of administrative authority. In fact, I have all the administrative authority. Additionally, I preside at the Council

meetings, set the agenda, and have a vote. Houston is one of the strongest-mayor cities in the nation.

"I lead Houston by being the public face of the city," she continues. "When there is a crisis, I am the person people see and hear. When things go wrong, I am the person who has to make sure they get handled. If a hurricane is coming in-and thankfully, one hasn't vet-it's me and the

county judge who are standing out there, calling the shots and telling people what to do.

"I market Houston by spending a great deal of time promoting good business here-I'm the head cheerleader for the city," Parker says. Earlier this year, she and her partner, Kathy Hubbard, flew to Istanbul to publicize Turkish Airlines' new non-stop service between the two cities.

"I love Houston, because one couldn't put in the amount of hours it takes if they didn't," Parker finishes. Her schedule is constant, seven days a week, and she is "on

call" at any hour of the day or night.

Parker's Major Accomplishments

Parker has lots of pride in her administration's accomplishments. When asked to identify four major ones, she focused on these:

· The economic recession-"I came into office at the lowest point of the recession, and was able to help right the ship, sail it through the storm, and

get it to where we are today. I had to make difficult decisions to re-focus and turn the economy around-without raising taxes or making short-term decisions that would have impacted the long-term health of the city." · Houston's infrastructure-"I was able to

have productive discussions with Housto-

city's infrastructure. We undertook a massive project of overhauling the water/sewer system and adjusting the rates. We went to the voters with the Rebuild Houston program to create a new dedicated revenue source for this system, which must fund itself. Then we asked voters to approve bond money once again to continue this investment. When a house has problems, you have to fix them. But Houston had not been doing this."

nians about the critical issues of our

· Redistricting-"In 2011, we added two new Council seats. We literally had to move every [district boundary] line in the city. It was the most complicated redistricting ever done in the city. We brought people together, we had a transparent process, and we showed how it could be fair to everyone. Although Harris County and the State of Texas are still litigating their redistricting, the City was never sued."

· Homelessness-"I picked up something no one wanted to deal with for a very long time. Last year we chose to move the needle on homelessness. There is much left to do, but we have dropped the homelessness rate by 25 percent. In one year, we brought together resources that hadn't worked together before, and we -

housed five hundred chronically homeless veterans. I can't prevent homelessness, because there will always be situations where people end up in circumstances beyond their control. But I can solve the problem of people who have been on the streets for years. We are on track to end homelessness in the next two years."

But along with the accomplishments in political life come the disappointments. Parker says the worst political loss for her was the traffic red-light cameras controversy. "It was a no-win situation right from the beginning. Doing away with the cameras was the wrong thing to do. But I respect the democratic process, and the voters voted. The cameras are now gone. but the city lost a lot of money-from revenue and from the broken vendor contract." The issue cost Parker a lot politically, too, and dogged her for months after the issue was settled.

The Mayor's Proudest Moments

Parker says that the victory celebration following her first election was undoubtedly her most exciting night of the last four years. "That's when everything seems possible," she says. "The harsh reality of all the things that have to be done hasn't hit you in the face yet."

But in everyday terms, she says her most triumphant moment was when the Council gave a supermajority vote to her proposed overhaul of the water/sewer system in early 2011. "That's not a supersexy thing," she says, "but it was very significant.

"We knew there was a problem. We identified the scope, we outlined the issue for the Council and the public, and we presented different options for correcting it. We worked with the Council to find the option that was the most appropriate. We came to agreement, and we got it done. It was the right thing for the right reason with the right outcome. It was the bestexecuted thing we've done.'

The benefits of that new infrastructure plan were soon felt throughout the city. "It helped us get through the drought of 2011." During that time, an average of seven hundred water-main breaks were occurring daily. The new revenue stream enabled the replacement of aging pipes in Houston's 7,000-milelong system. The majority of failing pipes were giving way as they expanded in the heat. The soil that usually provided pressure on them was now dry and unable to provide stability. With the new financial plan in effect, the City was able to deal with the unexpected crisis without losing traction on the long-term goals.

Mayor Parker's moments of greatest pride come from seeing the performance of the City's more than twenty thousand employees. "I love it when a whole team executes a plan, or when a department does something amazing," she says.

"There have been cave-ins from massive water main breaks in freezing weather that caused giant sinkholes-and City employees have been out there in the middle of the night making repairs. If an ice storm is expected, Public Works crews are pre-stationed around the city, ready to go to work immediately.

"And we are now on the map for major sporting events," she continues, "because we execute so well. The NBA All-Star Game and the NCAA Final Four ran like clockwork. Visitors came and enjoyed the event, and it's been a smooth experience for them. Traffic is heavy, but it moves quickly. Thousands of City employees and other Houstonians make every aspect work."

Moments of Emotion

"The worst moments are when we lose an employee in the line of duty." Parker says. "And public memorials really tug at my heart." On May 31, 2013, the worst tragedy in the history of the Houston Fire Department occurred when four firefighters were lost while containing the blaze at a burning hotel.


Parker and her partner immediately went to the hospital to offer support to the families. During that time, a news conference photo of an obviously stricken, tearyeved mayor hit the media outlets.

"I don't do drama and a lot of emotion," says Parker. "Not that I don't feel it. But my normal state is to close the door and deal with it privately. But that night I was overwhelmed with emotion, and I felt that it was a time when I had to deal with it publicly. People needed to grieve, and I had to let myself be the face of it."

The Daily Routine

"We are the level of government that functions every day," Parker says. "We function 24/7 and we have a direct impact on people's lives. Whenever we solve a problem or get something fixed, it's a great feeling."

But the job is also demanding of her time. "I'm picked up at 8 a.m., unless there is a breakfast meeting scheduled. and then it's earlier." Her daily staff meeting begins at 8:30 a.m. and can run from thirty to sixty minutes. "That's when I find out what blew up overnight-figuratively and literally." →

Making History . . .

The rest of the day is scheduled in half-hour increments. "It's meeting, meeting, meeting, a speech at lunch to a civic association, and then more meetings." The mayor tries to walk back in the front door of her home at 8 p.m.

Weekends are different, but still demanding. Usually there is an earlymorning kickoff of an event that she is asked to attend. During campaign season, there are candidate forums. She is asked to judge events ranging from a school reunion cook-off to the Art Car Parade

Most weekend evenings are filled with various galas and charity fundraising parties. Occasionally, Parker may have a few hours to herself and her family on the weekends. "I ask my staff to try to keep one day a month, usually a Sunday, totally free of any activities," Parker says. She admits even that is not always successful.

"The sheriff is here," an aide announces as we wrap up our conversation. It sounds like a cue to end the interview, but the mayor's assistant says calmly, "That just means he's next in line."

Parker's Legacy

Asked what she would like her legacy to be, Parker says it shouldn't be a building with her name on it. "I'd just like to be remembered as having led the City wellmanaging it through difficult times, undertaking an amazing amount of projects, and leaving it better than it was.

"It's a great gift to me to be able to make decisions that shape the future of my home town," Parker says. "To be able to work with professionals and Council members to do things which are truly transformative—to work on things like the expansion of the Bayou hike-and-bike trails that will pay off for Houstonians for generations to come.

"During my administrations, there have been no scandals. People have disagreed with some of the things I've done. but we've been honest and ethical. I've told the voters the truth—whether it was pleasant or not-and I've accepted accountability for my actions."

From the beginning of her campaign for the mayor's seat, Parker has been careful not to be stereotyped as "the lesbian mayor." She's responded to the issue when asked, but always moved on to the real issues that face the city.

When she was first elected in 2009, the international media attention was unparalleled. But it gave Parker an amazing opportunity to pivot away from the gay issue and focus on showing the world what

Houston has to offer.

"Now we are always showing up on 'Ten Best' lists," Parker says. "And none of this is made up. My election just gave Houston an opportunity to sell itself. It has evolved from a 'big small city' to an

urbane, cosmopolitan place."

Although Parker has avoided the onedimensionality of being "the lesbian mayor," Houston's LGBT community will always think of her as "one of our own." The deafening applause that greets her each year as she and Hubbard ride in the Pride Parade

demonstrates the depth of that pride.

For the older generations in our community, she represents the sea-change that has occurred in Houston during the last few decades. The Police Department that once raided gay bars with impunity now reports to a

lesbian. That same department whose harassment of LGBT citizens led to ruined careers and reputations a few generations ago is now tasked with protecting the life of a lesbian mayor at all costs, even if it means sacrificing their own lives.

For the younger generations in our community and beyond, Mayor Parker is a role model, a celebrity, and a hero. Sometimes when she is out and about, not in an official role, a young child might approach her and ask if she is the mayor. Assured that she is, the young fan asks her to pose for a picture of the two of them together, and then seeks a hug. "That is the coolest part of being Houston's mayor," Parker says.

It Takes Only One Vote to Become First Lady

Kathy Hubbard loves Houston's vast diversity

ouston's First Lady, Kathy Hubbard, longtime partner of "the first out lesbian mayor of a major U.S. city," has been making some history of her own during the last four years.

The role of Houston's First Lady is undefined, and each of Hubbard's predecessors had her own way of handling the job. The visibility of recent mayoral spouses has run the gamut from Elyse Lanier's office in City Hall to Frances Young (Brown)'s chosen near-invisibility. Kathy Whitmire, whose husband died five years before she became mayor, remained single during her ten-year administration back in the '80s.

The position is also unfunded—if the mayor's spouse accompanies the mayor on a trip, they pay their own expenses, including airfare. About the only thing they are truly expected to do is to be at the mayor's side during the swearing-in ceremony.

Our current First Lady met with OutSmart magazine in late August and talked about her experiences in fulfilling this role. She is warm and approachable, attentive and genuine. She approaches life

with a calm pragmatism that is tinged with a of four children, with two sisters and a mischievous sense of humor.

"A Naturalized Houstonian"

Hubbard was born in Boston and grew up in chilly Buffalo, New York. She is the oldest

trip to the Galleria that sold Hubbard on the city. "I was amazed when I saw people of all races and nationalities there," she remembers. She fell in love with this diversity and moved to the city the next year.

Her entire family has been very supportive of Hubbard's twenty-three-year relationship with Annise Parker. Although her parents still live in Buffalo, they have attended every one of Parker's swearing-in ceremonies—three as council member, three as controller, and two as mayor. They hope to return to Houston next January if Parker wins a final two-year term on November 5.

Coming to Grips with a New Role

During Parker's first mayoral race, Hubbard says that she was too busy with the campaign to think about what she might do as First Lady. While candidates for mayor need to talk about what they will do if elected, the spouse's role is rarely a topic of discussion. "It only takes one vote to become First Lady," Hubbard says with a smile.

The reality that she might have a very public position hit her during the 2009 victory party after the election that put Parker into a runoff. "Someone came up to me and asked if I would be a host at the next annual picnic of their nonprofit organization." At first Hubbard didn't understand, but then realized people were already starting to get in line to win her attention.

Even on the night of Parker's runoff election victory, Hubbard took nothing for granted. It wasn't until she and Parker stepped onto the stage at the victory rally that it became real. "It was one of those thunderbolt moments," she says. "I knew I would remember this for the rest of my life. It suddenly seemed like we could accomplish anything, and I thought, 'Wow, maybe there is hope for world peace."

What Does a Houston First Lady Do?

Hubbard is frequently seen accompanying Mayor Parker to fundraising galas and other events. With her usual gracious style, Hubbard often poses for pictures with attendees and answers questions from local society reporters.

But the bulk of Hubbard's effort is spent representing Houston and her partner at consular events. Houston is a port city and conducts business with many foreign countries. As a diverse melting pot, Houston has large populations of citizens from around the world who have made Texas their new home.

Houston is home to ninety-four busy

consulates that host public events to celebrate their countries and their cultures. Hubbard says it's not possible to accept all the invitations she receives. Instead, she tries to attend events where several consulates join together to celebrate a common interest.

Fittingly, her biggest event is the annual reception for spouses of consulate officials. "Most of the attention is given to the officials throughout the year," says Hubbard. "So we organize one big event annually to recognize their spouses, because families are important, too."

The event is held during the holidays, and the venue used to be the beautiful "Rienzi" mansion in River Oaks that was willed to the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston. "But we outgrew that," Hubbard says, "and now it's held in the newly renovated Julia Ideson Library."

Accomplishments that Matter

As she reminisces, Hubbard highlights four accomplish-

four accomplishments she feels have been especially important:

Gay inclusion—Hubbard says she has tried to be involved in anything where the heterosexual spouse of a mayor would traditionally participate. "I believe we've helped people see that gays are just like everyone else, and that we belong here."

Adoption—"We brought attention to the importance of giving children a home," Hubbard continues. "Our own children are all past eighteen now, and they are doing fine. Having gay parents hasn't affected them adversely."

Good will—"I've always been interested in people getting along with each other," says Hubbard. "It's still hard for me to understand why so many don't seem to be able to. I've done what I can to foster acceptance of all people." $\,$


The environment—"Healthy planet, healthy people," says Hubbard. Hubbard's public role has given her many new opportunities to spread the word about the importance of recycling and protecting our environment. She has teamed up with predecessors Elyse Lanier and Andrea White to continue promoting bayou cleanup efforts.


The Ups and Downs of Political Life

On the positive side, Hubbard says that being the First Lady has increased the size and importance of her contact list, affording her the ability to promote favorite causes and to help link people who share similar goals for the city.

Hubbard says she also gets to make trips to interesting places. When Mayor Parker visited Turkey last spring to promote the new non-stop flight linking Houston and Istanbul, Hubbard joined her. She was especially moved by a tour of Anıtkabir, a mausoleum dedicated to Mustafa Kemal Atatürk, the founder of modern Turkey.

On the flip side, Hubbard says she doesn't get to see as much of her partner as she used to. "Three days a week she →

is out the door at 7 a.m. for a breakfast meeting, and we're lucky if she arrives back by 8 p.m."

Hubbard says she also misses spending time with old friends. "We just don't have the luxury of 'hanging out' with the kind of schedule we have to follow. And when we do find some free time, we often pull up the drawbridge and enjoy staving home.

"I can't go slumming to run errands anymore, either," she laughs. "Some of the outfits I used to wear just don't work when you're the First Lady of the city."

In addition to her First Lady duties, Hubbard still runs her own bookkeeping service. "I'm thankful for great employees," she says, when asked how she gets it all done.

As for her children, they miss seeing their other mom. "They practically have to make an appointment," she sighs. "But then, they have discovered they get the best seats in the house at sports events and the rodeo! Life compensates."

Hubbard is philosophical about it all. "As the old saying goes, 'Everyone gets what they need, but no one gets all that they want."

Being a Part of Human Rights History

During the 2009 mayoral campaign, an opponent sent out a mail piece that clearly featured Hubbard standing with her partner at an inaugural ceremony. A headline asked, "Is This the Image Houston Wants to Portray?" The implication was that it wasn't-but voters didn't buy that outdated attack strategy.

Hubbard says she doesn't take the negativity personally. "I understand their psychological construct, and the fact that they think we violate their beliefs and values."


But there is a line that cannot be crossed. Hubbard mentions a mailer from a self-appointed "Texas Ethics Advisory Board" that condemned her support of Planned Parenthood. The mail piece included pictures of Hubbard's children. "How dare they endanger my children's lives! Adults can disagree civilly, and there are ways to go about dealing with differences. But only cowards hide behind children!"

Other than these rare episodes, Hubbard says people have gone out of their way to be welcoming. "If there are people who are purposely excluding me, I guess I haven't had time to notice-because there are so many people who are kind and accepting."

Hubbard ends the interview with a favorite memory of Mayor Parker's appearance on The Colbert Report. "He asked her if she had a partner, and Annise said she did. Then he asked her if she called me the First Lady. 'No,' Annise responded, 'I call her Kathy."

PLAYWRIGHT Edward Albee

Edward Albee is a celebrated playwright who won three Pulitzer Prizes and three Tony Awards. Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?, his first Broadway play, helped establish Albee as one of America's greatest playwrights.

Born Edward Harvey in Washington DC, he was adopted as an infant by the prominent Albee family of New York. The family's ownership of a national theater chain nurtured Albee's passion for the arts. Albee and his parents were constantly at odds over his desire to pursue a career in theater. After failing out of two private schools, he graduated high school and matriculated to Trinity College.

In 1949, Albee dropped out of Trinity to pursue a career in writing. He moved to Greenwich Village, an artistic epicenter. Albee experimented with writing poetry and short fiction before finding a niche in playwriting. Albee's early off-Broadway shows received praise for their unconventional themes, including homoeroticism. He made his Broadway debut with Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?, which earned him his first Tony Award.

Albee has written more than twenty-five plays. His willingness to experiment with various styles earned him Pulitzer Prizes for A Delicate Balance, Seascape, and Three Tall Women. He received two additional Tony Awards for The Goat, or Who is Sylvia? and a revival of Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?

Since moving to Greenwich Village, he has lived an openly gay life. Recognized for pioneering the depiction of homosexuality on stage, Albee weaves same-sex relationships throughout his work.

He lived for thirty-five years with Jonathan Thomas, his partner, until Thomas's death in 2005. Albee received a Special Tony Lifetime Achievement Award and The Academy of Achievement's Golden Plate Award for exceptional accomplishment in the arts. →



andy Carter describes herself as an "out, Southern, black, lesbian, social justice activist." She has been advocating for human rights for more than forty-five years. Born in Albany, New York, Carter was raised in orphanages and the foster care system. After high school, she attended Hudson Valley Community College before dropping out and moving to New York City. She met a group of people at the League

for Spiritual Discovery and traveled with them to San Francisco. In 1969, she joined the War Resisters League.

In 1992, Carter became a public policy advocate for the Human Rights Campaign. The following year, she helped establish Southerners on New Ground, an organization that integrates people of color, immigrants, people with disabilities and working-class members of the LGBT community in the South. She cofounded the National Black Justice Coalition, the only national organization focused on African-American LGBT civil rights.

In the 2000 election, she participated in the statewide voter empowerment campaign, which produced one of Florida's largest

turnouts of black voters. In 2008, Carter was a National Co-Chair for Obama Pride.

Carter won a Spirit of Justice Award from GLADD for advancing LGBT rights.

The National Organization for Women called her "one of the nation's leading African-American lesbian activists."

She is the National Coordinator for the Bayard Rustin Commemoration Project of the National Black Justice Coalition. Carter lives in Durham, North Carolina. →



BELGIUM PRIME MINISTER Elio Di Rupo

b. July 18, 1951

■ lio Di Rupo is the prime minister of Belgium and head of the Socialist Party. He is the first openly gay man to lead a nation.

One of seven children born to Italian Catholic immigrants, Di Rupo was raised in a small town in Belgium's French-speaking Wallonia region. His father died when Di Rupo was one year old. Because his illiterate mother was unable to raise seven children. Di Rupo and two of his siblings were raised in an orphanage.

Di Rupo earned a master's degree and a doctorate in chemistry from the University of Mons-Hainaut. As a student, he became active in the Socialist Party. In 1982, his political career began when he became a municipal councillor in Mons, where he later served as mayor.


Di Rupo has served as a member of Parliament, a member of the European Parliament, and as Belgium's deputy prime minister.


In 1996, Di Rupo's personal life came under fire when he was falsely accused of having sex with underage males. During the media frenzy, he recalls being pursued by

journalists, one of whom blurted out, "Yet, they say you're a homosexual!" Di Rupo replied, "Yes. So what?" His political future was not hindered. Three years later, he was named president of the Socialist Party.

In 2011, Belgian journalist Francis Van De Woestyne documented Di Rupo's rise from rags to riches in a biography titled Elio Di Rupo. Une Vie, Une Vision (One Life, One Vision). In 2012, Di Rupo was appointed prime minister by King Albert II.

Prime Minister Di Rupo is credited with saving his nation from an economic crisis. In 2003, with Di Rupo's support, Belgium became the second nation to legalize same-sex marriage. →





ason Wu is a fashion designer who became an overnight sensation when the first lady, Michelle Obama, wore one of his gowns to the inaugural ball in 2009. The First Lady chose a Wu design again for the inaugural ball in 2013.

Wu was born in Taipei, Taiwan. His parents, who own an import-export business, recognized his creative talent at age five. His mother would drive him to bridal stores so he could sketch the dresses. Wu learned to sew by producing doll clothes.

When Wu was nine years old, the family moved to Vancouver, British Columbia. He attended Loomis Chaffee, a prestigious Connecticut prep school. At sixteen, he was designing doll clothes for Integrity Toys. A year later, Wu was named the company's creative director. Wu attended the Parsons School of Design in New York. In 2004, he dropped out six months before graduation to intern for designer Narciso Rodriquez.

In 2006, at age twenty-four, Wu launched his own label and presented his first ready-to-wear collection. His clients include Ivana Trump, actresses January Jones and Kerry Washington, and RuPaul, for whom he designed six RuPaul dolls. In 2008, Wu was recognized with the Fashion Group's International Rising Star Award.

Ikram Goldman, of the Chicago boutique Ikram, introduced Wu's designs to Michelle Obama. Wu created a sparkling white chiffon inaugural gown for her and submitted

it to Ikram. Wu didn't know until he saw the First Lady on television that she had chosen his design. Wu, who was twenty-six, became the youngest designer to outfit a first lady for the inauguration. "I was over the moon," he said. "I didn't think it was my turn yet."

Wu's inaugural ball gowns for Mrs. Obama are on display at the Smithsonian Institution.





San Francisco.



osé Sarria was a drag performer, singer, and activist. He was the first openly gay man n the world to run for public office.

Sarria, who was of Latin-American descent, was born in San Francisco. He was raised by his mother and grandmother, who allowed him to dress in women's clothes. During World War II, Sarria enlisted in the army. His fellow soldiers discriminated against him because he was gay. Sarria became friends with some by giving them tours of

Sarria began performing at The Black Cat, a San Francisco gay club. His shows, which included warning guests of police extortion and raids on gay bars, were a hit. Although the messages were often serious, Sarria presented them humorously and with a gay twist. He became famous for his closing song, "God Save Us Nelly Queens."

In 1961, Sarria became the first openly gay candidate for the San Francisco Board of

Supervisors. He lost, but received 5,600 votes, demonstrating that a gay voting bloc could wield political power. The possibility of empowerment laid the groundwork for the election of Harvey

In the 1960s, San Francisco gay bars were being shut down. The Tavern Guild of San Francisco organized a drag ball to protest. Sarria was crowned Queen

Sarria cofounded the Imperial Court System, an international organization that raises money for people living with HIV/AIDS and other causes. In 2006, a street in San Francisco was named in

a Rainey, called the "Mother of the Blues," was one of the earliest known American blues singers and recording artists. She is recognized as one of the first great female blues vocalists.

Born Gertrude Pridgett in Columbus, Georgia, she was one of five children in a family of performers. From age fourteen, she sang and danced with traveling minstrel shows. At eighteen, she married singer Will "Pa" Rainey, and took the stage name Ma Rainey. Billed as the Assassinators of the Blues, the couple toured the Southern minstrel circuit. In 1916, Rainey separated from her husband and began touring the nation with

In 1923, Paramount Records signed Rainey. Over the next five years, she recorded more than one hundred songs with some of the great musicians of her era, including Louis Armstrong and Thomas Dorsey, the "father of black gospel music."

In 1928, Paramount considered Rainey's classic style of blues no longer fashionable and terminated her contract. Before that, she recorded one of her last songs for the

label, "Prove It On Me Blues," which was cited as a watershed for its lyrics about lesbian desire. In the mid-1930s, she returned to her hometown, where she was the proprietor of two theaters.

Her song "See See Rider Blues" was included by the National Recording Preservation Board in the Library of Congress National Recording Registry, and was inducted into the Grammy Hall

In 1983, Rainey was inducted into the Blues Foundation's Hall of Fame. Seven years later, she was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

In 2007, the Gertrude "Ma" Rainey House and Blues Museum in Columbus, Georgia, opened to

Transgender Hero **Gwen Araujo**

b. February 24, 1985 d. October 3, 2002

wen Araujo was a transgender teen who was the victim of a brutal murder. Her attack brought national attention to the issue of violence against transgender people.

Born in the San Francisco Bay area, Edward Araujo Jr. underwent hormone therapy in high school and adopted the name Gwen Amber Rose Araujo. She left school because of incessant bullying and ridicule.

The night Araujo was murdered, she attended a party at the home of Jose Merél. According to police reports, there were four young men involved in the attack-Michael Magidson, Jose Merél, Jaron Nabors, and Jason Casarez. At trial, Nabors testified that Araujo had consensual sex with a few of the men before it was revealed that she was biologically male. Araujo was beaten and strangled to death, hog-tied, wrapped in a blanket, and buried in the Sierra Nevada foothills.

In exchange for his testimony against the other defendants, Nabors pleaded guilty to voluntary manslaughter. The other three men, charged with first-degree murder and committing a hate crime, invoked the transgender "panic defense," claiming that the victim provoked the attack by having sex under false pretenses. By invoking this defense, Magidson and Merél were convicted of second-degree murder and acquitted of the hate crime. Casarez pleaded no contest to voluntary manslaughter.

Araujo's murder helped bring awareness to the incidence of violence against transgender people and the "panic defense." In 2006, California enacted the Gwen Araujo Justice for Victims Act. The law allows a judge to instruct jurors not to consider their anti-LGBT biases during deliberations. That same year, Lifetime



aired an original movie, A Girl Like Me: The Gwen Araujo Story. The case was the subject of a 2007 documentary, Trained in the Ways of Men.

Each November, communities across the nation hold a Transgender Day of


Remembrance to memorialize the dozens of transgender people like Gwen Araujo who are murdered every year.



Does Lane Lewis have what it takes to turn Texas blue?

ooking at a recent electoral map, Harris County is a blue island floating in a vast Republican-red sea. While the razor-thin marin of Obama's 2012 victory in Harris County may seem like a temporary fluke, this small blue island is instilling fear into Republicans nationwide, according to Harris County Democratic Party Chair Lane Lewis. Why the concern? Harris County may be the key to turning that surrounding sea a different color-blue.

With 25 percent of all Texas votes coming out of Harris County, Lewis may very well hold that key to future Democratic victories in elections on all levels. "What I realized is that I was standing in the center of a storm," he says. "If we can [permanently] flip Harris County [by delivering substantial and consistent margins of victory], we can flip Texas. If we flip Texas, the White House is ours for generations."

Turning Texas blue isn't feasible if Democrats aren't fully engaged at all times, Lewis says. After his unanimous election in 2011, Lewis presented his vision for the party that included more fundraising and, most notably, yearround organizing-a system that has just begun to pay off. In the 2012 presidential election, Obama won 49.38 percent of the Harris County vote to Romney's 49.33 percent. "My vision is that if Harris County can go blue three cycles in a row in 2012, 2014, and 2016, it's game over," he says.

A political and community organizer since his teenage years, no one knows the

power of good organizing better than Lewis. "My first big political act was coming out," he says. "From there, I wanted to make it better and easier for others

to come out and live as the people they were born to be."

In 1987, Lewis gave his first speech in front of the Houston City Council at age nineteen, speaking out against an ordinance that would only allow people twenty-one or older to patronize nightclubs that served liquor. "The place was standing-room only," he says. "I was hooked. I realized that my voice and my words could actually influence and make a difference on politics and on people's lives."

It wasn't until 1991 that Lewis re-entered the political sphere. His work as marketing director for a treat-

ment facility that specialized in LGBT issues led him to the Houston GLBT Political Caucus-an organization where he would later serve as president. There he met prominent activists Sue Lovell, Ray Hill, and Annise Parker. "They actually listened to my opinions and were actually interested in what I had to say," Lewis says. "Probably because

I was so interested in what they had to say."

The caucus also led Lewis to community leader Bill Scott, and together they formed The Lewis-Scott Youth Cen-

ter, the nation's first organization to provide shelter to LGBT street kids living with HIV. Up until that point, LGBT youth were completely overlooked when it came to funding.

A civil rights history buff, Lewis became fixated on an idea he had read in The Autobiography of Malcolm X-you can't take your argument for civil rights to a government that oppresses you; you have to take it to the United Nations to make the world recognize your plight.

Through Ray Hill, Lewis was able to do just that. Hill brought

Lewis to the initial meeting for Stonewall 25, the 1994 Stonewall anniversary march on the United Nations to bring global attention to the needs of LGBT people. When he heard their plan, "I almost fell out of my chair," Lewis says. He went on to serve as both the youth constituent and chair for the direct-action working group for the organization.

The Houston bar where Lewis was working in 1998 seemed an unlikely place for history to be made. Everyone who knew Lewis was aware that he was focused on 21.06, which made homosexual sex illegal. "I was like a dog with a bone with 21.06," Lewis says. "I wanted it gone. So I had put feelers out everywhere I knew."

A Friday night in October brought Lewis just what he was looking for. A bar regular named Mark, who was a semi-retired →



deputy, came in and said, "I think I've got something for you." A few days later, Lewis received a copy of the police report by fax that detailed the arrest of John Lawrence and Tyron Garner. "As soon as I saw it, I knew I had it," Lewis says. "I knew this was it, but I also knew I had to keep them from pleading out."

After convincing Lawrence and Garner to trust him, Lewis called Lovell, Hill, and Parker. They all agreed that the men had a case and that Mitchell Katine should be their lawyer. "The reason I called them is that, from the very beginning, I didn't want this to be my case," Lewis says. "This was a community case. Mitchell was well-liked in the community and had spent years giving away his legal services. He had paid his dues and he deserved it." The case went on to the U.S. Supreme Court as Lawrence v. Texas, one of the most prominent victories in gayrights history.

"Think about it like this," Lewis says. "If I want equality for all gays and lesbians, the ultimate prize, other than changing the hearts and minds of the naysayers, is equality in job opportunity-your ability not to be fearful and to be protected at your job for who you are. But you can't go right there, can you? If I want to be protected in my job, then I need to be protected in my personal life. That means legalize marriage. But I can't go straight there either. So where do I start? I can't be protected in my job if it's illegal for me to be gay-21.06. I can't be legally married or comfortable in my relationships, married or otherwise, if it is illegal for me to be in those relationships [because of Texas Penal Code] 21.06. So 21.06 wasn't about me personally. The goal was job equality and protection under the law."

Lewis credits Hill for advice he still uses in his political career today. "We were sitting at lunch one day, and Ray told me that the antigay movement had already lost; they just didn't know it yet," Lewis says. "We've already won-we just need to start acting like it."

After Lewis left a teaching job in 2009, he decided to take that mentality a step further. He ran a solid campaign for City Council in District A and lost by only a small margin. Undeterred, he was soon elected as Chair for Texas State Senate District 15. There, he ran a phone-bank program that turned out 63 percent of targeted voters in 2010, "which was unheard of," he says. "I think there was some hope that 'if he can do that in Senate District 15, I wonder what he could do for the whole county."

When Gerry Birnberg, former Harris

County Democratic Party chair, announced he was stepping down in late 2011, Lewis got his opportunity.

Lewis hit the party with something they'd never done before—a mail ballot program. Postcards are mailed to county residents age sixty-five or older, allowing them to easily request a mail ballot. The party then provides follow-up phone calls to ensure these people have received their ballot applications, ballots, and have gotten their questions answered.

The Republicans usually receive about 24,000 straight-ticket Republican votes from their mail ballot program, which they've been doing for years, Lewis says. Democrats at the time were only receiving about 3,000 straight-ticket Democratic votes. "With those numbers, we've practically lost all the races already," he says.

"I think Texas is a blue state. I just don't think we're voting. If you look at an electoral map, and you've got New York that is blue, California that is blue, and if you [could make Texas] blue, you can pretty much give up on the rest of the United States and still win the White House. The only reason we're fighting over all these other states is because Texas is red."

The initial year of the Harris County Democratic Party's mail ballot program more than quintupled the number of

straight-ticket Democratic votes, totaling around 17,000.

Lewis explains that beginning on January 5, 2014, each voter that previously cast their ballot by mail is going to get another call from the party to offer them the chance to vote by mail in the spring primary. "I'm trying to create habit," he says. "And, on January 5, a new law goes into effect that says you no longer have to request a mail ballot every time there's an election. From now on, if you request a mail ballot once, they will automatically send you a ballot for all the elections for the year. You don't have to request another one for twelve months."

The party has now partnered with Senator John Whitmire and Senator Sylvia Garcia to run a mail ballot program in their districts for municipal nonpartisan elections. "We're not telling them who to vote for, we're just saying every election matters," Lewis says. "And if you're a Democrat, every election matters to you, too."

Another benefit to the program is that you don't have to show a photo ID if you vote by mail, Lewis says. He argues that the Republican Party is attempting to suppress voters within the county-a trend that is occurring nationally following the Supreme Court's decision last summer to strike down key elements of the Voting Rights Act.

"Republicans don't have any ideas," Lewis about owning the White House."

says. "All they do is sit around complaining about other people's ideas. Their policies have failed. So the only way they can hold on to power is to disenfranchise voters. What the Supreme Court said in their decision on the Voting Rights Act was not that preclearance is illegal, just that the system they use is out-of-date. I am very hopeful that our Congress will lead the charge to fix [these new voter-suppression

laws] and not leave it the way that it is."

Unlike the Republicans, Lewis says he isn't interested in separating voters into groups. He is the first chair of the party to eliminate minority outreach coordinators, in an effort to move away from identity politics. Instead, he has field organizers responsible for organizing every voter in a district, regardless of their identity. "Too many politicians think if they can just speak Spanish, they'll get the Latino vote," Lewis says. "Latinos do not vote their language, they vote their culture and they vote their need. And their need is not for me to speak Spanish. Their need is for health care and education.

"It's about looking where you want to go, and backing it up," Lewis continues. "21.06 wasn't about 21.06, it was about equal opportunity to work. Flipping Harris County is not just about flipping Harris County, it's

OutSmart: How has your background shaped your politics and made you best qualified for this position?

If elected, what do you hope to accomplish in the next two years?

It is unfortunate that at this time the most important issue to tackle at HCC is a stron-

ger board ethics policy and more transparent business practices. Simply put, we must rebuild the trust

in our board with the communities we represent. Once that is accomplished, I would like to turn to the really important issues of clear and complete communication with our students about the excellent opportunities available to them through Houston Community College. We need to increase our visibility within the communities we represent and have real conversations with our workers and our students. We can't afford to continue to erode the trust our community has bestowed upon the college without causing significant harm to the workforce training that our economy depends on to remain competitive.

What steps will you take to ensure HCC students have the skills they need to enter the Houston workforce upon graduation?

We must first ensure that the programs we invest in are aligned to the workforce needs in our community. Our programs must focus on the major job-growth industries and ensure that we are graduating students with the most up-todate skills and information required to hit the ground running upon graduation. It is imperative that we develop a more formal system for gathering industry and community leader input regarding workforce needs and community concerns.


How can HCC better provide an equal opportunity for students to succeed, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity?














Same-sex Marriage in Texas

... from a lawyer's perspective

hat a difference a few months makes! When last we wrote about samesex marriage, the U.S. Supreme Court had not vet issued the historic rulings in the United States v. Windsor and Prop. 8 cases. Now we have the blessing of the federal government for same-sex marriage, and it seems that every few days we learn of more benefits that will apply to all couples, regardless of their state of residence.

There have also been a few setbacks in states that prohibit same-sex marriage. Although some have refused to follow the federal government's lead, there seems to be an escalating trend toward acceptance. We had the opportunity in August to confer with other legal professionals across the country, and most are hopeful that discriminatory laws will fail-possibly sooner than anyone anticipated.

In the meantime, we are busy getting the word out and adapting to the changes that acceptance brings. While Texas remains a "non-recognition" state for most state-administered benefits, there are an increasing number of federal benefits that apply to all same-sex married couples, regardless of domicile. As of this writing,

here's what Texas samesex couples who were legally married elsewhere need to know.

Federal Income Taxes

If you are in a samesex marriage and remain so through the end of the year, you and your spouse are

required to file either "married joint" or "married separate" federal income tax returns beginning in 2014 for the 2013 tax year. If you were married on Decem-

ber 31 of any of the three prior tax years, you have the option, but are not required, to file amended tax returns. Texas does not have a state income tax, but if you are a wage earner in a state that does require you to file a state income tax return, check with your local tax advisor about how to file

> in that state. There is no such thing as "common law divorce," so if you were legally married, have separated from your spouse, and have not divorced before the end of a tax year, you are required to file under the "married" status.

Federal Estate and Gift Taxes


All same-sex spouses are now entitled to the unlimited marital deduction for avoiding gift and estate taxes, regardless of domicile. Consult with your tax professional for advice on how to recover gift or estate taxes that were paid because your marriage was not recognized.

Tax-deferred Retirement Savings Plans

The fall of DOMA has opened the door for application of spousal benefits and protections for employer-provided retirement plans. While not all retirement plans are affected, those governed by ERISA must now acknowledge and protect the spouses of same-sex married employees. If you are married and have not named your spouse as a primary beneficiary on ERISAgoverned benefits, you should complete a new beneficiary designation with your spouse giving the required consent for you to name a non-spousal beneficiary.

Employer-provided Health Insurance

Employers who provide health insurance for same-sex married employees may no longer assess the costs of a spouse's insurance to the employee and withhold -

taxes for that portion. Spouses are also entitled to COBRA coverage if a qualified employee loses his or her job.

Immigration

Same-sex spouses can sponsor their nonresident alien spouses for U.S. residency, subject to requirements that are now the same for all married bi-national couples.

Military Spousal Benefits

Military benefits are available to the same-sex spouses of active-duty military personnel on the same basis as oppositesex couples.

Veteran's Spousal Benefits

The Department of Justice has determined that VA benefits will extend to all same-sex spouses. Regulations that currently limit the availability of benefits to opposite-sex spouses will not be enforced.

Civilian Federal Employee Benefits

The Office of Personnel Management, which oversees benefits for civilian federal employees, issued one of the first post-Windsor policy changes extending benefits to all same-sex spouses of federal employees. Federal employees who were married at the end of June were notified to enroll their same-sex spouses in the applicable benefits program within sixty days.

Social Security Retirement, Disability, and Death Benefits

As of this writing, the Social Security Administration has not issued guidance on whether it will ignore the current regulations defining a "spouse" based on the laws of the state of the applicant's domicile when benefits accrue. SSA has started paying benefits for eligible same-sex spouses who live in recognition states, and has asked that all persons who may be eligible for benefits file claims even if they currently live in a non-recognition state.

Dissolution

Divorce is generally not available to same-sex married couples in Texas. There are two dissolution cases pending at the Texas Supreme Court that are set for oral argument later this fall. While these cases are pending, same-sex divorces are being granted on a limited basis to residents of Travis County as long as all issues are agreed. Until Texas courts are fully available, couples who married in California, Delaware, Washington DC, Minnesota, Vermont, or Canada and now live in a non-recognition state can return to those jurisdictions to obtain a court-ordered dissolution of the marriage. All others must


establish residency in a recognition jurisdiction to obtain a divorce.

Faisal Alam presents 'Hidden Voices: Lives of LGBT Muslims'

wasn't intending to start an organization," says Faisal Alam, a queer-identified Muslim activist. "I struggled with trying to reconcile my sexuality with my faith. I didn't know how that was going to happen. I thought I was the only one who was dealing with these issues."

This was all before 1998 when, at the young age of nineteen, Alam used an international email Listserv to create Al-Fatiha, which was once one of the largest Muslim LGBT organizations in the nation.

Since then, Alam has been selected as an "Innovator" by Advocate magazine and has been recognized by Genre magazine as a "Founding Father." He has received several awards and recognitions for his activism, and has been touring the country presenting his lecture "Hidden Voices: The Lives of LGBT Muslims."

In this presentation, Alam shares LGBT stories

(including his own) about growing up in Islam-stories that reveal some of the issues that LGBT Muslims face. Despite the criticism he has received, he has found a platform where he can speak about issues that, according to Alam, "most people do not often think about. People do not think about LGBT Muslims. and if they do, they think that people are being killed because of it, or that there is really no way to reconcile [their sexuality and their faith]."

Among the many Muslim organizations developing in the U.S., the Muslim Alliance

for Sexual and Gender Diversity (MASGD) is one that Alam and several other organizers created this year. Many of these groups are work-

ing to debunk the myth that LGBT Muslims do not exist and that all Muslims are homophobic.

"We have really come a long way with the exposure [that LGBT Muslimsl have received and the work we have done to make our presence known, both within the mainstream LGBT community and the mainstream Muslim community. That also has a lot to do with the progressive vision of Islam that many of us are pushing," Alam says of the strides MASGD and similar organizations are making on behalf of LGBT Muslims globally.

Organizations such as MASGD and Muslims for Progressive Values, a similar group that promotes LGBT and women's equality and other progressive causes, are all pushing to create an environment where Islam can be more inclusive and accepting on issues such as gender and sexuality. Alam believes that things are quickly changing for both the LGBT Muslim community and the mainstream Muslim population.

Alam explains this evolution in thinking: "The rhetoric was always 'Our religion condemns homosexuality, there is no place for homosexuals within our faith, the Quran says that homosexuality is forbidden. and that is the end of the story.' [But then the thing that really changed the conversation we were having with mainstream Muslims was 9/11. September 11 really changed a lot of different things, because now mainstream Muslims (have much bigger issues than simply worryingl about what is going on with queer

> Muslims." "All of a sudden. American Muslims are dealing with Islamophobia and hate crimes and this real, vis-

ceral backlash that also affected LGBT Muslims in a different way." he adds.

According to Alam, for many American LGBT Muslims, "Islamophobia is seemingly a bigger issue than homophobia, and much more visible to people in regards to our skin color and our names. The sexuality becomes secondary to people. Many more LGBT Muslims are taking on a political identity-being Muslim and asserting a cultural

Alam also believes the atmosphere is changing for LGBT Muslims because of congressmen such as Keith Ellison (D-Minnesota) and →

Andre Carson (D-Indiana), These men are the only two Muslims in Congress and, according to Alam, "Both of them are very supportive of LGBT issues.'

"They have also become bridge builders for bringing these issues to light." Alam explains the similarities between the LGBT community and the larger Muslim community: "They are oftentimes facing the same struggles. They are both ostracized, and they are both viewed as minorities. The same religious figures and the same political figures [often speak out] against both communities."

For many individuals, there is this seemingly vast difference in ideologies between the Muslim communities and the LGBT communities; however, regardless of the differences, there is a similar prejudice that both groups are facing in America today.

The progressive Muslim

groups like MASGD, and individuals like Alam, are working diligently to reduce prejudices held by both Muslim and non-Muslim individuals.

Alam believes that Muslim youth are changing as well. "There is a second generation and now a third generation of Muslims that are growing up in the United States that have been exposed to issues of sexuality, and are much more open to conversations and dialogue around issues of gender and sexuality," Alam adds.

God willing, these conversations will remain open and individuals like Alam will continue to make progress toward acceptance and tolerance.

I-Fatiha, a Washington DC-based organization that advocates for the rights of LGBT Muslims, is just one of several such groups around the world.

Founder and former director Faisal Alam points out that most traditional scholars of Islam consider same-sex acts to be sinful, and many believe that having a gay or lesbian sexual orientation is unnatural. Yet he shares his story of faith and sexual identity around the world as a way of opening conversations about how Islam and homosexuality are not mutually exclusive

With more than 1.5 billion followers, Islam is the second-largest religion in the world. An estimated six to eight million Americans call themselves Muslim, and Islam is the fastest-growing religion in the United States. It's impossible to estimate how many of them are gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transgender

Alam's presentation "Hidden Voices: The Lives of LGBT Muslims" has been featured at more than 125 universities and colleges across the country since 2003. While highlighting the diversity of Islam around the world and in the United States, "Hidden Voices" explores the legacy of colonialism and sodomy laws within the Muslim world, and the suppression of LGBT rights around the world under the guise of the so-called war on terror.

Alam has been profiled in numerous national publications, has received many recognitions and awards for his activism on behalf of queer Muslims, one of thirty "Young Visionaries Under 30" by the Utne Reader. In 2005 the Equality Forum honored Alam as one of "40 Heroes" who have "made a defining difference in LGBT civil rights over the last forty years.

In 2011 he was invited to the White House to attend President Obama's annual White House Iftar Dinner, the traditional breaking of the fast at the end of Ramadan.



















Health Care

An issue of LGBT equality

ommunity leaders from across the country gathered at the White House on September 12 to learn how they can help hundreds of thousands of uninsured LGBT Americans get health care coverage under the Affordable Care Act (ACA). The briefing featured remarks from Valerie Jarrett, senior advisor to the president; Kathleen Sebelius, Health and Human Services secretary; and LGBT health-care and health insurance reform experts from across the country.

On the same day that these Obama administration officials were touting the advances in LGBT rights over the past five years and policy wonks were explaining how the LGBT community would benefit under "Obamacare," Republicans in the United States House of Representatives were busy with their fortieth attempt to derail or repeal the historic

health reform law.

Secretary Sebelius, addressing LGBT leaders who were gathered at the briefing as well as a wider online audience, seemed confident that the House effort would fail.

"Thanks to all of you, this law is now a reality, and it is going to happen in spite of some of the best efforts

of our friends at the Hill," she told the crowd. "This is what we call a law. It was passed. It was signed. It was upheld by the Supreme Court. And the president got re-elected. This is a law, and the people are entitled to these

As Sebelius stressed the importance of making sure LGBT Americans know their rights, responsibilities, and options under the ACA, she also stressed President Obama's firm belief that health-care reform is an essential part of the fight for LGBT equality. "Here is the fact you all need to keep in mind," she said. "One in three LGBT

adults in America doesn't have health insurance. We are talking about a community that can be hugely impacted by what's about to happen."

Insurance Inequalities

Like many people across the country, LGBT Americans have often struggled to get the health care they need, when they need it. The HIV/AIDS epidemic is a constant reminder to our community that adequate health care can literally mean the difference between life and death. Yet too often, barriers like the lack of insurance stand between the LGBT community and good health.

Research commissioned by the Center for American Progress not only shows that LGBT Americans lack health insurance at higher rates than their heterosexual counterparts, but that being uninsured results in more disparities. Because not all LGBT families are recognized under the law, employer-based health insurance is not always an option for spouses or partners, resulting in higher costs to obtain health insurance for our families. High numbers of LGBT Americans also report putting off getting care because it is too expensive.

LGBT individuals have encountered discrimination in the health-care system

> for decades, and many studies have shown that LGBT people are affected by chronic diseases, such as breast cancer and HIV/ AIDS, at a higher rate than other Americans. Getting

access to health coverage is indisputably an LGBT equality issue.

Improving LGBT Access to Care

The ACA makes investments that will help address health disparities that exist within the LGBT community. Funding →

is in place to promote a more diverse and culturally competent health-care workforce, and to support community health centers such as Houston's Legacy Community Health Services. Through increased research and data collection on health disparities, policymakers will have the knowledge and tools they need to continue to address the health needs and concerns of LGBT people.

Starting in 2014, the ACA prohibits insurers from denying coverage or charging a higher premium based on pre-existing conditions, including HIV or AIDS. The law also prohibits insurers from charging someone more because of gender, sexual orientation, or gender identity. The ACA will help ensure that LGBT Americans will receive ongoing treatment of chronic diseases by ending lifetime dollar limits on key benefits, as well as restricting the use of annual dollar limits.

Under the ACA, health insurance plans will also have to provide preventive care, including annual checkups, mammograms, HIV testing, cancer and diabetes screening, and vaccinations-all without co-pays or deductibles.

The Out2Enroll Campaign

To access all of these benefits, people must have a health insurance plan. Uninsured Americans can find coverage in the online marketplaces that are scheduled to open on October 1. The open enrollment period runs until March 31, 2014.

To encourage LGBT Americans to sign up for the new health insurance plans under the ACA, the White House briefing also announced an outreach effort aimed at uninsured LGBT Americans.

Out2Enroll will work at both national and state levels to link LGBT communities with their new coverage options under the health reform law. The centerpiece of the campaign is a website-out2enroll.org-that is tailored to LGBT community concerns and includes information about key issues such as same-sex partner coverage, transgenderinclusive coverage, and LGBT-inclusive discrimination protections. Out2Enroll will also work with partners such as Enroll America, Community Catalyst, consumer health advocates, health centers like Legacy Community Health Services, and LGBT equality organizations to host regional forums and conduct state-level advocacy campaigns to educate LGBT communities about available coverage and to encourage enrollment through the online health insurance marketplaces.

The Out2Enroll campaign will launch on

October 11, National Coming Out Dayan observance created to raise awareness of and empower the LGBT community. This day advocates something simple, yet elusive—that people need the freedom to be who they are. That freedom won't be fully achieved until the LGBT community feels it is being served by the nation's health-care system.

Legacy Community Health Services will have trained staff members available throughout the clinic on October 11 to assist anyone who is interested in learning about their health insurance options under the Affordable Care Act. October 11 will be a great opportunity to show your pride and help raise community awareness about the importance of health care as an LGBT equality issue. Since open enrollment will run until March 31, 2014, there is plenty of time to explore and understand your options.

Just a Little Bit Gaysian

An interview with comic/actor Alec Mapa

lec Mapa is everyone's favorite gay bestie. His no-nonsense, boundary-pushing comedy has kept American audiences rolling for nearly two decades. An awardwinning one-man show I Remember Mapa chronicled the Filipino comic-actor's rough start in Los Angeles, and garnered rave reviews. That led to memorable television roles, from Suzuki St. Pierre on Ugly Betty to Vern on Desperate

Now America's Gaysian Sweetheart is all grown up-an acclaimed columnist and LGBT activist with a husband and a son. But Mapa's comedy remains raw and riotous. His new stand-up special will explore what it's like to be a gay dad-in a way that only he could do.

This month, Mapa is headed to Houston to perform one night only at OutReach United's 2013 Coming Out Party. The annual event raises money for Houston-area LGBT nonprofits such as Montrose Center and HATCH. We caught up with Mapa packing his bags.

A.J. Mistretta: You've been conspicuously absent from TV lately. What gives?

Alec Mapa: You're just not paying attention. I hosted an all-new reality show for AMC called

Showville, which ran for eight episodes, and I was on the Tonight Show with Leno twice. If that's me being conspicuously absent,

I'd need to pick better hiding places than AMC and NBC.

Fair enough. I never watch Leno. So you have this risqué-some would say raunchy-stage persona. Is that you, or is that just for the show?

I ramp up my energy onstage, but I'm not like that in real life. Nothing's worse than a comic who's "on" all the time. That's exhausting. I talk about sex a lot because, with all the talk about sexual freedom in the gay community, we're all still ashamed about taking it up the butt. 

'The Book of Matt'

Are there hidden truths about the murder of Matthew Shepard?

atthew Shepard. Hate crime. It's hard to say one of these without automatically thinking about the other, even though it's been exactly fifteen years this month since Shepard's gruesome murder.

Now Steven Jimenez, a former NYU professor-turned-journalist, has published The Book of Matt (Steerforth Press), releasing this month, that goes into painstaking detail about the events leading up to, during, and after the attack. He prompts the reader to question whether Shepard knew his attackers and why this may have in fact not been a hate crime at all.


But do we really want to know every detail of this murder case? Matthew Shepard's story has posthumously helped move the LGBT community forward in its quest to show the struggles involved in gaining equal rights on several fronts. He has become the poster child for hatecrime activism in America. Might it be best to just let

sleeping dogs lie? The informa-

tion that Jimenez presents is tough to read at times. as the picture he paints is not the

same as the one in our heads. We have seen Judy Shepard, Matthew's mom, in numerous interviews and at Human Rights Campaign events. So why, fifteen years later, would we want to read about Matthew's involvement with drugs and hustlers and everything that is part of that scene? Maybe it's just because

Jimenez presents his findings and conclusions in a comprehensive fashion that brings all of the questions to light.



He was unafraid to ask tough questions, and he seems to have been quite thorough in his thirteen years of research and

lections from their families, girlfriends, and other key players in the case. Particularly interesting are the people connected to Henderson who did not commit the assault, but did nothing to prevent it.

Getting into Aaron McKinney's psyche is much more challenging. Violent behavior, drugs, and an alleged challenge to his heterosexuality all played a role, according to Jimenez's research. He lays out the possibility that McKinney knew Shepard quite well, and the two may have spent some time together dealing crystal meth and hustling. McKinney would hustle for drugs or for the money to buy drugs, and he ran in a circle that occasionally included Shepard. Their involvement as sex partners is also suggested by various

The insights and perspective of Cal Rerucha, the Laramie prosecutor handling the case, are also important. During his thirteen years of research. Jimenez spent some one hundred fifty hours with Rerucha, extracting his legal point of

> view. And while Rerucha did push for a death sentence, he believes that Shepard's murder was driven by drugs.

Jimenez is not the first or the only one

who has researched the Shepard story. Other writers include JoAnne Wypijewski in Harper's Magazine in 1999, and Moises Kaufman, the director and co-writer of The Laramie Project.



in a way that invites you to decide what it all means. Do these details diminish the legacy of Matthew Shepard? So much

good has come out of this tragic episode in LGBT history, including the Hate Crimes Prevention Act of 2009, named in honor of Shepard and James Byrd Jr.

But the questions are still there. The Book of Matt may offer the most complete and well-researched account of who Matthew Shepard was, and how and why the events unfolded as they did on October 6, 1998. in Laramie, Wyoming. And, if it was truly a hate crime.

'Matt Shepard Is a Friend of Mine'

New film features archival footage from home movies, photos, and journals to help tell this personal story

ichele Josue met Matthew Shepard overseas at The American School in Switzerland (TASIS) in the early- to mid-1990s. It was their first time being away from home, and with their shared love for acting, they became very much like family.

According to Matthew's mother, Judy Shepard, Josue and several others were the greatest people her son had ever met in his life. To Matthew, they would always be the most important.

This month marks fifteen years after the death of her friend, and Josue is set to premiere the film at the Mill Valley Film Festival. Told from a deeply personal perspective, the film is intended to show a side of Shepard that the world may not be familiar with.




"It's still painful when I think about my friend. I feel guilt for not being there, confusion about what happened, and anger about what they did to him. I miss my friend and I'm not ready to let him go," says Josue, "and that's why I'm making this film, because if the world knows our Matt, the real Matt, I know

they won't be able to let him go either."

Archival footage from home movies helps tell the story of Shepard's life, as well as the photos and journals he left behind. Viewers will follow Josue as she travels to Laramie, Wyoming, Morocco, and various other locations that are important in telling his story.

These stories from the people who knew Shepard best are the highlight of this emotional film. Those who share their memories of Shepard include Zeina Barkawi, his best friend, and Walt Boulden, his guidance counselor.

"Matt was the type of friend I thought I would know my whole life. But on October 12, 1998, we lost him forever. And the Matt I knew became 'Matthew Shepard' to the world," says Josue. -Jed Ocot



This year's Bayou City Art Festival Downtown has over three hundred artists

ne Bayou City Art Festival Downtown, held October 12-13 this year, features native-Houstonian artist Svd Moen and her "Little Planets" series. The photographic works are created by altering a panoramic photo to produce a round image. The creative and unique "little planets" are otherworldly yet familiar, especially to Houstonians and those who are acquaint ed with the Texas Gulf Coast. Moen's works invite the viewer into a whole world she creates from a single location. They are alluring, whether one recognizes the landmarks or not. "To be chosen as this year's featured artist is an absolute honor," Moen says. "Photography is the core resource for my explorations of self-expression, and I'm very excited to be able to share this with the patrons of Bayou City Art Festival Downtown as this fall's featured artist."

Just as Moen's works of art engage the viewer to interact in her created worlds, the Bayou City Art Festival offers a unique experience where festivalgoers interact with over three hundred artists who are required to be present and available in their respective booths for the entire show. Bayou City Art Festival board member Joseph K. Plumbar says his first involvement with the festival was as a collector. "I fall in love with a new artist at every festival," Plumbar says. "Last year I fell in love with Linda Lesperance. I haven't talked with her recently. You see, talk about personal-we're friends now!" Having participated in the artistselection jury, he says over a thousand



artists apply from all over the world, but only 330 are chosen each year.

Bayou City Art Festival accepts work in eighteen dis-

ciplines: clay, digital (not photography), drawing (pastels, ink, pencils), fiber and textiles (decorative), functional

art (includes furniture, wearable art, etc.), glass, jewelry, leather, metal, mixed media 2-D (minimum of two media used to create), mixed media 3-D, paintings (acrylic, oil, or watercolor), photography (digitial or computer manipulated), photography (traditional film, no machine enhancements),

printmaking, sculpture/3-D (one media-stone, clay, glass, metal, or wood), and wood. The organization's executive director Kelly Kindred says, "Houston is not only a melting pot of various cultures, but also has incredible art media, and Bayou City Art Festival takes pride in celebrating its local artists and art forms, as well as those from across the country. We are honored to present one of our city's own, Syd Moen, as this

Plumbar, who says the event makes for a very exciting evening. Each \$100 ticketholder has a one-in-four chance of "stealing" a work of art which has been donated by participating artists and valued well above the ticket price. This year, attendees are encouraged to wear pirate attire in keeping with the "Treasures of the New World" theme.

Plumbar says, "This year's festival will be larger than ever. The main stage has been expanded, and we'll have more bands from both Austin and Houston. We're still the fine-arts festival, but we're going to have more emphasis on the festival theme." The revamped music lineup includes the Suffers, Kashmere Reunion Stage Band, Bombon, Hardproof Afrobeat, and many more. To add to the festival atmosphere, there will be activities for children in the Green Mountain Energy Creative Zone, special areas for adults, including a wine garden and an Adult Creative Zone presented by The Tinderbox. New to the festival this year. the Adult Creative Zone offers adults the chance to create their own works of art. including an industrial lamp or a screenprinted tote. And, of course, it would not be a festival without dozens of food and beverage vendors.

Bayou City Art Festival is a nonprofit organization that provides financial support to its nonprofit partners, and 100 percent of proceeds from festival tickets and food and beverage sales are given to them. Bayou City Art Festival has partnered with fifteen local nonprofit organizations, which volunteer their time to help staff the festival. These organizations include The Orange Show, Lawndale Art Center, SNAP, and the Museum of Fine Arts Houston.

The festival attracts at least 30,000 art patrons each year and has raised more than \$3 million since it began more than forty years ago. Sunshine magazine ranks the art festival as one of the top ten in the nation.

Houston's Mental-Health Crisis

You can help

n October 12, hundreds of folks will be walking with a purpose: to raise awareness for mental health.

The nonprofit Walk for Mental Health Awareness-Houston is actually hosting a three-day event this year, but awareness of mental health issues and funding for solutions should be a 365-day-a-year event.

Just how bad is the crisis in mental health care?

"In Houston, it's probably better than anywhere else in the state," says Dr. James McSwain. "But it's still terrible. The Harris County Jail treats more mentally ill [inmates] than the entire State of Texas mental-health system combined."

Think about that for a minute. And then think about the fact that the Mental Health and Mental Retardation Authority of Harris County treats fifteen thousand people per month

Dr. Mc-Swain, who will be speaking at the walk, knows very well the plight of the mentally ill. His eldest son,

Phillip, was diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia at the age of twenty-four. By thirty-one, he was dead from an overdose of alcohol and medication.

"Paranoid schizophrenia is a brain disorder like Alzheimer's disease, yet

> ment. Government clinics are overwhelmed and don't have the funding they need, and private clinics that can handle long-term treatment for patients are incredibly expensive.

"The Menninger Clinic here is like the M.D. Anderson of mental health hospitals," he says. "But for my son to stay there for six months, to receive the treatment and training he needed would have cost us \$1,000 a day. And they didn't take insurance."

So many people suffering from mental health issues wind up falling through the cracks. They can't get into treatment centers because they can't navigate the intake processes, they may not know where to go for help, or they may have no support system.

Many wind up homeless. They may commit petty crimes and wind up in jail, which is where Dr. McSwain's son wound up. "We actually tried to keep him there as long as we could," he says sadly. "Because he was getting better care there than we could get him on the outside."

Dr. McSwain says that most of those fighting mental illness are young and don't have the support of grown children who can advocate for them that -

Alzheimer's patients have-making it easier for politicians to ignore the problem. "Even when the Affordable Care Act kicks in." he says, "it won't be much better, since the insurance companies don't want to pay for long-term treatment. They want a Band-Aid fix and then send them off."

From a strictly economic point, it would make a lot more since for the state to fund mental health systems fully. When a bill was introduced earlier this year to fund a pilot program to transition mentally ill inmates into community facilities, Sen. Joan Huffman (R-Houston) said: "It costs around \$137 per day to keep someone behind bars, as opposed to \$12 per day for community mental health services. The majority of the individuals in the Harris County iail never received the services they needed-services that would have kept them out of jail in the first place."

The jail's medical budget is almost \$50 million a year, about half of which is spent on mental-health care. An estimated 25 percent of the inmates receive psychotropic

"When I tried to get my son into a state facility. I was told he needed to show up across town and wait in line for several

hours to meet with someone who, if he qualified, would schedule an appointment with a counselor in a couple of weeks." sighs Dr. McSwain. "If he could do all that, he wouldn't need help."

This will be the doctor's first Walk for Mental Health Awareness, but since his son's passing in 2009, he has been a devoted advocate for the mentally ill. Besides researching and speaking out on the subject, he's also tried to show families an easier way to navigate the system.

As principal of Lamar High School, he's worked with the nonprofit Communities in Schools to create a one-stopshopping center that provides referrals for families with at-risk teens.

Join the walk or the luncheon the day before at the United Way offices to learn more about the mental health problems in Harris County. Proceeds from the walk aid local nonprofits providing mental health care services.



They Do Their Own Stunts

Gay rodeo is changing attitudes in rural America

he International Gay Rodeo
Association (IGRA) holds its
2013 World Gay Rodeo Finals
October 17–20 at the John
Justin Arena in Ft. Worth. Finalists
from all over North America will come to
compete in "Cow Town" from as far away
as Alberta, Canada. Each year, up to
twenty gay rodeo competitions are held in
places like Oklahoma, Missouri, Kansas,
and most of the western states, to qualify
for the annual World Gay Rodeo Finals.

Ken Pool, a rodeo announcer and former IGRA rodeo director, grew up in Tomball, Texas, in the sixties and seventies. He recalls that he had no gay role models back then in Tomball. In 1976, Phil Ragsdale organized the first gay rodeo as a charity fundraiser in Reno, Nevada. Reportedly, Ragsdale had trouble getting local ranchers to provide livestock for a gay rodeo. Pool says, "Gay rodeo was started because we didn't have a place to compete; we weren't welcome at other rodeos."

Pool continues, "While this is no longer as true today, gay rodeo still has a great function by being open and welcoming. Straight people who join us appreciate that." And Pool says straight rodeo athletes are now competing in IGRA events all over the country. "They

come for the camaraderie. The level of competition is good, but the level of fun is much

greater than other venues. I believe this is real outreach and education. These are people who have horses; they're not involved in a traditional urban gay environment. They wouldn't necessarily be involved knowingly with gay people."

Today, many women are involved



in the rodeo both as competitors and as volunteers. "When you talk about outreach to straight people, we're very inclusive. If a straight woman wants to ride bulls, there are very few places she can go to do that except here," explains Pool. There are competitions for both women and men in all events, so women can ride broncs and men can barrel race and pole bend. All participants compete against whichever sex they identify as.

Contestants this year in Fort Worth will compete in bull riding, bareback brone

riding, steer riding, chute dogging, roping events (such as team roping and mounted breakaway roping), and speed events such as barrel racing and pole bending. Both men and women ride the same rough stock livestock under the same rules and requirements. Roping teams can be made up of any combination of men and women.

Besides the inclusiveness and camaraderie, the level of professionalism

of the IGRA is also a big draw. Both horse professionals and amateur horse enthusiasts are attracted to IGRA's wellrun rodeos. Pool says he believes this is the reason that IGRA rodeos are making an impact on rural America. As far as straight cowboys and cowgirls who choose to join in the competitions, he explains it starts with the families in the stands. "Suddenly there is a group of ten people who have never been to a gay bar, but they're attending our rodeo, and they stay. And they bring friends back on Sunday, and next they say, 'I want to compete." He adds, "The Denver rodeo has a whole contingent of straight families who want to be a part of the group because we are a nonprofit and they know we give money back to the community." Each IGRA chapter's events are fundraisers for that chapter's local designated charities.

Pool, who was Mr. International Gav Rodeo 2005, likes to say gay rodeo is three-quarters rodeo and one-quarter circus. The IGRA may be breaking stereotypes, but the "camp" events add some comic relief as only gav rodeo can. These events include goat dressing. where a team of two puts jockey-style underwear on a goat. There is also a steer-decorating event, and the wild drag race is a three-person team-one in drag, and the other two helping the drag queen get on a wild steer and cross the finish line. Pool says it's probably the most dangerous event at the IGRA finals. He reports that no one has ever been killed in the event, but several have been hurt. The "camp" events are great for those who want to compete but who are not skilled on horseback. The IGRA also sponsors educational rodeo schools for novices who want to learn how to rodeo. One such workshop was held last March in the Houston area at the Pasadena Fairgrounds. Most IGRA events also include country-western dance competitions.

While there is, of course, a level of danger for the competitors, the IGRA has strict rules regarding safety and animal welfare. The association has an international Animal Issues Committee whose LGBT cowboys and cowgirls track issues related to animal use, annually review animal use and welfare policies, and report directly to the IGRA annual convention.

According to Pool, the Gay Rodeo Finals draw in thousands of participants and are often second only to Pride events as the largest gay gatherings in a host city. This is the third year Fort Worth has won the bid for the event, which spans three days.

As for the seemingly opposing worlds of conservative rural America and gay rodeo, Pool states with the pride of a longtime organizer and participant, "People who come to gay rodeo are more concerned about how you treat your horse, or how well you ride, than who you are sleeping with afterwards."



'Call Me Kuchu'

The struggle continues



ussia's recent antigay law banning the "propaganda L of nontraditional sexual relations to minors" has the international community up in arms. Celebrities are boycotting the upcoming Winter Olympics in Sochi. LGBT bar owners are pouring their Russian vodka into the streets.

But with time, headlines fade-even when conflicts are not resolved. Call Me Kuchu reminds us not to forget those headlines-especially when they read, "Kill-the-Gays Bill Proposed in Uganda."

Directed by filmmakers Katherine Fairfax Wright and Malika Zouhali-Worrall, Call Me Kuchu follows the life of David Kato, Uganda's first openly gay man, and his small band of "kuchus," a local term for "queers."

This is not your average activist documentary. Kato and his followers are living in a country where homosexuality is illegal and punishable by incarceration for up to fourteen years.

Merely existing is a constant battle, as locals seem fixated on eradicating homosexuality from

the country. The local tabloid publishes pictures of any LGBTidentified person with headlines reading, "Hang Them," to feed the public's obsession with hatred. When interviewed for this film, the newspaper's editor showed no remorse.

The intimate stories told by Kato and his followers reveal just how deep the horrors for LGBT people in Uganda run. We meet Stosh, a trans-man who suffered through a "corrective" rape after a man caught him fooling around with a young woman when he was still a teenage girl. This same man infected him with HIV.

Then there's Naome, a feminine lesbian with two children she provides for after leaving a loveless heterosexual marriage so she could be honest about her

And of course there's Kato, a teacher and activist who, despite his strong will and leadership, is constantly scared to sleep alone in his bedroom for fear of being murdered in the night.

Overcoming hardship, they find strength and hope in community. It's all laughs and smiles during anniversary parties and household drag balls,

held out of sight in the privacy of their homes.

Outside those walls, smiles are scarce. American evangelical leaders, who no longer get much support for their antigay message at home, have found new believers in Uganda. Ridding this nation of homosexuality will return the country to prosperity, they say. Ugandans must take action against "sodomites" who "corrupt" and "recruit" their children.


This message resonated with Ugandan parliament member David Bahati. In late 2009, he submitted the Anti-Homosexuality Bill, often known as the "Kill the Gays" bill. The bill prescribes life imprisonment for "the offense of homosexuality" and the death penalty for "aggravated homosexuality."

Kato fought hard against this bill until January 2011, when a man he had previously been kind to bludgeoned him to death with a hammer. Kato was forty-six.

Although this tragedy shocked both the filmmakers and Kato's friends, his death was not in vain. The murder sparked international condemnation, and his killer was ultimately captured. The anti-homosexuality bill was also tabled shortly after Kato's death, but it has since been revived.

Kato's band of followers yows to never give up the fight. Until this bill is killed once and for all, a luta continua-the struggle continues.

After The New Normal and Smash, NBC tries again

hope it runs for a million years," says Megan Hilty. "Or at least seven." The actress is very happy about being reunited with Sean Haves (Will and Grace) in the new NBC sitcom Sean Saves the World. Last season, the pair was seen in a five-episode story arc on the cherished if embattled musical drama Smash. On

Smash. Hayes and Hilty played co-stars on

Broadway in an ill-advised musical based on Dangerous Liaisons, Though Smash barely got through its second season, it amassed an intensely loyal cult following that continues to support its reruns on the Ovation Network, and its DVD release.

Smash, along with The New Normal, were both cancelled this past summer after struggling in the ratings. Both series featured gay characters in leading roles and were expected to be huge hits. Both debuted with great fanfare and initially brought in decent numbers. No one is sure what happened when both series ultimately failed. Yet NBC, which brought both shows to the airwaves, is willing to try

"The New Normal didn't have Sean Hayes," says TV legend Linda Lavin

> (Alice). "He's an extraordinary talent."

In the new series, Hayes plays Sean! He's a single gay dad whose wise, wisecracking teen

daughter (from a previous marriage) has moved in with him. As he struggles to be the best dad he can be, he also searches for Mr. Right, deals with the boss from hell, and spars with Lorna, his overbearing but loving mom (Lavin). Hilty plays Liz. Sean's best friend.

"Sean Saves the World is an identifiable story about a gay single dad as he balances his home and work life," says Lavin. "I'm delighted to be a part of it. It's a terrific company filled with talented people and talented writers."

"Sean Hayes is magical, incredibly funny, and a nice guy," says Hilty. "Liz is kind of a mess. She talks before she thinks, but she has the best intentions. They met at his wedding to a woman, and she outed him!"

The fast-paced trailer now posted at nbc.com gives potential viewers a glimpse of what to expect when they tune in to Sean Saves the World.

"If you're gay, then how did you and Mom have sex?" inquires daughter Ellie (Samantha Isler). as Sean nervously drops a pile of dishes. "Fish have the right idea," says mom Lorna. "You just drop them and go!"

"She's a force of nature," Lavin says of Lorna. "She's a very energetic, funny woman, with a strong affection for her son. They see life the same way, and she's very committed to his happiness."

Hilty feels that Sean's gayness is incidental to the story. "It's just another detail of who he is," she says. "It's not 'OMG, he's gay!' He just is. That says a lot about where we are now."

In the aftermath of the New Normal/ Smash failures, we'll have to wait and see whether or not Sean Saves the World clicks with viewers. The online trailer is genuinely funny, and the buzz around the show has been positive, so perhaps this time the Peacock Network will enjoy the kind of success they saw with Will and Grace.

"When you start a new show, you hope for a long life," says Lavin. "You hope for growth, and for a substantial income for those working on the show."

Tune in to NBC on Thursday, October 3, at 9 p.m., for the premiere of Sean Saves the World.





Painful Tales

Successful gay American men of color tell their stories



For Colored Boys Who Have Considered Suicide When the Rainbow Is Still Not Enough **Edited by Keith Boykin** 2013 • Magnus Books (magnusbooks.com) 280 pages • \$15.95 • paperback

eith Boykin has had a lot of experience with the despair of being a gay American black man who was bullied and humiliated in childhood for not living up to an über-masculine image.

In the introduction to his new anthology For Colored Boys Who Have Considered Suicide When the Rainbow Is Still Not Enough, Boykin recalls trying to estimate the number of U.S. gay men who have recently committed suicide, including friends. These personal tragedies moved him to request submissions for a new anthology about black men who suffered through their childhoods and coming-out periods. The resulting book is a remarkable group of essays from successful men like himself who have distinguished academic and professional backgrounds.

Their stories, however, are marked with pain. Most seemed to know very early-at five or six years of age-that they were gay, and most of them also had childhood sexual experiences. Their communities and relatives forced them into the closet with name-calling or threats.

Only a few of these writers were effeminate; several were pro football or basketball players, and others served in Iraq. While they all finally found their way to sanity and inner peace, their struggles cost them

their adolescence. relatives, friends. jobs, and sometimes even their parents.

Daren J. Fleming, in "The Night Diana Died," remembered when he was part of a group of four out black men attending

Millikin University in central Illinois. He and his "boys" went shopping before a theater party, and some of them were "flaunting" on the streets when several white men in a pickup tried to run over them. Later, at the party, a girl came up to Daren and told him the "townies" had infiltrated the party and were looking for them to beat them. Other students helped them to narrowly escape the party. It was a bone-chilling experience followed by a rash of anti-black and homophobic incidents in the

constituent service—"customer service" if you will—is the primary duty a district council member owes to their residents. To be sure, District J has its ongoing needs and challenges: crime, blight, litter, infrastructure in need of repair, etc. Addressing those tasks is a matter of management and attention. However, one of the biggest challenges facing District J specifically, and southwest Houston generally, lies in addressing the public's sometimes-negative perception of the area. I take seriously my role in using the "bully pulpit" to tell the real story of this part of town. I use every opportunity to educate the larger community about our unique diversity, our great and affordable housing stock, our good schools and solid neighborhoods, our flourishing social service network, and our business opportunities. Telling that story is an ongoing task that I welcome.

As the incumbent, how will you continue to make District J an "opportunity-foreveryone" district?

By now, many folks know that I coined the phrase "District J is the Ellis Island of Houston." It is true. Over fifty different language groups call the area home, call-

ing attention to our differences in worldview and life experiences. However, there is one common idea that unites us: we all chose to live in District J. One of the exciting aspects of serving this part of Houston is having the opportunity to work with each of the many different communities. Each of those communities is doing their part to strengthen and better their chosen home. My job is to help those communities be connected in purpose and communications and to provide them with the municipal resources needed for their work. I am committed to making sure that each of these communities has a place at the table as we build our future together.

How do you plan to lower the area's crime rate and protect all residents of your


One of the challenges I am called to address is the public's perception of crime in southwest Houston. To be sure, we do have criminal activity in District J-as do all districts. Most people do not realize that District J is three times more densely populated than the rest of the city. We have over 9,000 persons per square mile, while the remainder of the city has a density of about 3,100 persons. Yet, District J does not have three times the amount of crime experienced by the rest of the city. Our crime rates are average in comparison [with the rest of Houston]. Toward that end, I have worked hard to assist com-

munications between the city's Midwest, South Gessner, and Westside HPD command stations and the neighborhoods they serve. By working closely with HPD, we have been able to target crime hot spots, tear down a dilapidated condominium complex, close down sexually oriented nightclubs, and monitor human trafficking locations. Using surplus dollars from the District J operating budget, I was able to recently contribute over \$15,000 to each of the Ranchester, Westwood, Gulfton, and Richmond police storefront offices. Those dollars will supplement the operating budgets of those locations. Working with the Greater Sharpstown Management District, the Harris County Attorney, and the City Attorney's office. we have been able to target lawsuits and additional police resources toward addressing prostitution hot spots. I am pleased with the aggressive approach we have been able to take in fighting crime

Is there anything else about yourself that you would like our OutSmart readers to know?

I am grateful for the privilege of serving the people of District J and proud to be the first openly gay man to serve on the Houston City Council. Thank you for giving me this privilege to serve you.
