#### What is STRIBILD?

STRIBILD is a prescription medicine used to treat HIV-1 in adults who have never taken HIV-1 medicines before. It combines 4 medicines into 1 pill to be taken once a day with food. STRIBILD is a complete single-tablet regimen and should not be used with other HIV-1 medicines.

STRIBILD does not cure HIV-1 infection or AIDS. To control HIV-1 infection and decrease HIV-related illnesses you must keep taking STRIBILD. Ask your healthcare provider if you have questions about how to reduce the risk of passing HIV-1 to others. Always practice safer sex and use condoms to lower the chance of sexual contact with body fluids. Never reuse or share needles or other items that have body fluids on them.

#### IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

What is the most important information I should know about STRIBILD?

STRIBILD can cause serious side effects:

- Build-up of an acid in your blood (lactic acidosis), which is a serious medical emergency. Symptoms of lactic acidosis include feeling very weak or tired, unusual (not normal) muscle pain, trouble breathing, stomach pain with nausea or vomiting, feeling cold especially in your arms and legs, feeling dizzy or lightheaded, and/or a fast or irregular heartbeat.
- Serious liver problems. The liver may become large (hepatomegaly) and fatty (steatosis). Symptoms of liver problems include your skin or the white part of your eyes turns yellow (jaundice), dark "tea-colored" urine, light-colored bowel movements (stools), loss of appetite for several days or longer, nausea, and/or stomach pain.
- You may be more likely to get lactic acidosis or serious liver problems if you are female, very overweight (obese), or have been taking STRIBILD for a long time. In some cases, these serious conditions have led to death. Call your healthcare provider right away if you have any symptoms of these conditions.

• Worsening of hepatitis B (HBV) infection. If you also have HBV and stop taking STRIBILD, your hepatitis may suddenly get worse. Do not stop taking STRIBILD without first talking to your healthcare provider, as they will need to monitor your health. STRIBILD is not approved for the treatment of HBV.

#### Who should not take STRIBILD?

Do not take STRIBILD if you:

- Take a medicine that contains: alfuzosin, dihydroergotamine, ergotamine, methylergonovine, cisapride, lovastatin, simvastatin, pimozide, sildenafil when used for lung problems (Revatio®), triazolam, oral midazolam, rifampin or the herb St. John's wort.
- For a list of brand names for these medicines, please see the Brief Summary on the following pages.
- Take any other medicines to treat HIV-1 infection, or the medicine adefovir (Hepsera®).

#### What are the other possible side effects of STRIBILD?

Serious side effects of STRIBILD may also include:

- New or worse kidney problems, including kidney failure. Your healthcare provider should do regular blood and urine tests to check your kidneys before and during treatment with STRIBILD. If you develop kidney problems, your healthcare provider may tell you to stop taking STRIBILD.
- Bone problems, including bone pain or bones getting soft or thin, which may lead to fractures. Your healthcare provider may do tests to check your bones.
- Changes in body fat can happen in people taking HIV-1 medicines.
- Changes in your immune system.
   Your immune system may get stronger
   and begin to fight infections. Tell your
   healthcare provider if you have any
   new symptoms after you start taking
   STRIBILD.

The most common side effects of STRIBILD include nausea and diarrhea. Tell your healthcare provider if you have any side effects that bother you or don't go away.

#### What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking STRIBILD?

- All your health problems. Be sure to tell your healthcare provider if you have or had any kidney, bone, or liver problems, including hepatitis virus infection.
- All the medicines you take, including prescription and nonprescription medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. STRIBILD may affect the way other medicines work, and other medicines may affect how STRIBILD works. Keep a list of all your medicines and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist. Do not start any new medicines while taking STRIBILD without first talking with your healthcare provider.
- If you take hormone-based birth control (pills, patches, rings, shots, etc).
- If you take antacids. Take antacids at least 2 hours before or after you take STRIBILD.
- If you are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if STRIBILD can harm your unborn baby. Tell your healthcare provider if you become pregnant while taking STRIBILD.
- If you are breastfeeding (nursing) or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed. HIV-1 can be passed to the baby in breast milk. Also, some medicines in STRIBILD can pass into breast milk, and it is not known if this can harm the baby.

#### What is STRIBILD?

- STRIBILD is a prescription medicine used to treat HIV-1 in adults who have never taken HIV-1 medicines before. STRIBILD is a complete regimen and should not be used with other HIV-1 medicines.
- STRIBILD does not cure HIV-1 or AIDS. You must stay on continuous HIV-1 therapy to control HIV-1 infection and decrease HIV-related illnesses.
- Ask your healthcare provider about how to prevent passing HIV-1 to others. Do not share or reuse needles, injection equipment, or personal items that can have blood or body fluids on them. Do not have sex without protection. Always practice safer sex by using a latex or polyurethane condom to lower the chance of sexual contact with semen, vaginal secretions, or blood.

#### What is the most important information I should know about STRIBILD?

#### STRIBILD can cause serious side effects, including:

- 1. Build-up of lactic acid in your blood (lactic acidosis). Lactic acidosis can happen in some people who take STRIBILD or similar (nucleoside analogs) medicines. Lactic acidosis is a serious medical emergency that can lead to death. Lactic acidosis can be hard to identify early, because the symptoms could seem like symptoms of other health problems. Call your healthcare provider right away if you get any of the following symptoms which could be signs of lactic acidosis:
  - · feel very weak or tired
  - have unusual (not normal) muscle pain
  - have trouble breathing
  - · have stomach pain with nausea or vomiting
  - · feel cold, especially in your arms and legs
  - feel dizzy or lightheaded
  - have a fast or irregular heartbeat
- 2. Severe liver problems. Severe liver problems can happen in people who take STRIBILD. In some cases, these liver problems can lead to death. Your liver may become large (hepatomegaly) and you may develop fat in your liver (steatosis). Call your healthcare provider right away if you get any of the following symptoms of liver problems:
  - your skin or the white part of your eyes turns yellow (jaundice)
  - dark "tea-colored" urine
  - light-colored bowel movements (stools)
  - loss of appetite for several days or longer
  - nausea
  - stomach pain

You may be more likely to get lactic acidosis or severe liver problems if you are female, very overweight (obese), or have been taking STRIBILD for a long time.

- 3. Worsening of Hepatitis B infection. If you have hepatitis B virus (HBV) infection and take STRIBILD, your HBV may get worse (flare-up) if you stop taking STRIBILD. A "flare-up" is when your HBV infection suddenly returns in a worse way than before.
  - Do not run out of STRIBILD. Refill your prescription or talk to your healthcare provider before your STRIBILD is all gone

- Do not stop taking STRIBILD without first talking to your healthcare provider
- If you stop taking STRIBILD, your healthcare provider will need to check your health often and do blood tests regularly for several months to check your HBV infection. Tell your healthcare provider about any new or unusual symptoms you may have after you stop taking STRIBILD

#### Who should not take STRIBILD?

#### Do not take STRIBILD if you also take a medicine that contains:

- adefovir (Hepsera®)
- alfuzosin hydrochloride (Uroxatral®)
- cisapride (Propulsid®, Propulsid Quicksolv®)
- ergot-containing medicines, including: dihydroergotamine mesylate (D.H.E. 45°, Migranal°), ergotamine tartrate (Cafergot°, Migergot°, Ergostat°, Medihaler Ergotamine°, Wigraine°, Wigrettes°), and methylergonovine maleate (Ergotrate°, Methergine°)
- lovastatin (Advicor®, Altoprev®, Mevacor®)
- oral midazolam
- pimozide (Orap<sup>®</sup>)
- rifampin (Rifadin®, Rifamate®, Rifater®, Rimactane®)
- sildenafil (Revatio®), when used for treating lung problems
- simvastatin (Simcor®, Vytorin®, Zocor®)
- triazolam (Halcion®)
- the herb St. John's wort

#### Do not take STRIBILD if you also take any other HIV-1 medicines, including:

- Other medicines that contain tenofovir (Atripla®, Complera®, Viread®, Truvada®)
- Other medicines that contain emtricitabine, lamivudine, or ritonavir (Atripla®, Combivir®, Complera®, Emtriva®, Epivir® or Epivir-HBV®, Epzicom®, Kaletra®, Norvir®, Trizivir®, Truvada®)

#### STRIBILD is not for use in people who are less than 18 years old.

#### What are the possible side effects of STRIBILD?

#### STRIBILD may cause the following serious side effects:

- See "What is the most important information I should know about STRIBILD?"
- New or worse kidney problems, including kidney failure. Your healthcare provider should do blood and urine tests to check your kidneys before you start and while you are taking STRIBILD. Your healthcare provider may tell you to stop taking STRIBILD if you develop new or worse kidney problems.
- Bone problems can happen in some people who take STRIBILD.
   Bone problems include bone pain, softening or thinning (which may lead to fractures). Your healthcare provider may need to do tests to check your bones.
- Changes in body fat can happen in people who take HIV-1
  medicine. These changes may include increased amount of fat
  in the upper back and neck ("buffalo hump"), breast, and around
  the middle of your body (trunk). Loss of fat from the legs, arms
  and face may also happen. The exact cause and long-term health
  effects of these conditions are not known.
- Changes in your immune system (Immune Reconstitution Syndrome) can happen when you start taking HIV-1 medicines. Your immune system may get stronger and begin to fight infections that have been hidden in your body for a long time. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you start having any new symptoms after starting your HIV-1 medicine.

#### The most common side effects of STRIBILD include:

- Nausea
- Diarrhea

#### Tell your healthcare provider if you have any side effect that bothers you or that does not go away.

- These are not all the possible side effects of STRIBILD. For more information, ask your healthcare provider.
- Call your healthcare provider for medical advice about side effects.
   You may report side effects to FDA at 1-800-FDA-1088.

#### What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking STRIBILD?

#### Tell your healthcare provider about all your medical conditions, including:

- If you have or had any kidney, bone, or liver problems, including hepatitis B infection
- If you are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if STRIBILD can harm your unborn baby. Tell your healthcare provider if you become pregnant while taking STRIBILD.
  - There is a pregnancy registry for women who take antiviral medicines during pregnancy. The purpose of this registry is to collect information about the health of you and your baby. Talk with your healthcare provider about how you can take part in this registry.
- If you are breastfeeding (nursing) or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed if you take STRIBILD.
  - You should not breastfeed if you have HIV-1 because of the risk of passing HIV-1 to your baby.
  - Two of the medicines in STRIBILD can pass to your baby in your breast milk. It is not known if the other medicines in STRIBILD can pass into your breast milk.
  - Talk with your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby.

### Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and nonprescription medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements:

- STRIBILD may affect the way other medicines work, and other medicines may affect how STRIBILD works.
- Be sure to tell your healthcare provider if you take any of the following medicines:
  - Hormone-based birth control (pills, patches, rings, shots, etc)
  - Antacid medicines that contain aluminum, magnesium hydroxide, or calcium carbonate. Take antacids at least 2 hours before or after you take STRIBILD
  - Medicines to treat depression, organ transplant rejection, or high blood pressure
  - amiodarone (Cordarone®, Pacerone®)
  - atorvastatin (Lipitor®, Caduet®)
  - bepridil hydrochloride (Vascor<sup>®</sup>, Bepadin<sup>®</sup>)
  - bosentan (Tracleer®)
  - buspirone
  - carbamazepine (Carbatrol®, Epitol®, Equetro®, Tegretol®)
  - clarithromycin (Biaxin®, Prevpac®)
  - clonazepam (Klonopin®)
  - clorazepate (Gen-xene<sup>®</sup>, Tranxene<sup>®</sup>)
  - colchicine (Colcrys®)
  - medicines that contain dexamethasone
  - diazepam (Valium®)

- digoxin (Lanoxin®)
- disopyramide (Norpace®)
- estazolam
- ethosuximide (Zarontin®)
- flecainide (Tambocor®)
- flurazepam
- fluticasone (Flovent®, Flonase®, Flovent® Diskus®, Flovent® HFA, Veramyst®)
- itraconazole (Sporanox®)
- ketoconazole (Nizoral®)
- lidocaine (Xylocaine®)
- mexiletine
- oxcarbazepine (Trileptal<sup>®</sup>)
- perphenazine
- phenobarbital (Luminal®)

#### **Equality Texas Anticipates a 'Difficult' Legislative Session in Austin**

tet ready to play some defense. That's the message from Equality Texas heading into the 84th Texas Legislature, which begins January 13.

Republicans picked up seats in November elections, further increasing their lopsided majorities in both the House and Senate. And anti-LGBT lawmakers are expected to respond to the spread of marriage equality to 35 states in the wake of the U.S. Supreme Court's June 2013 ruling in Windsor v. United States striking down the federal Defense of Marriage Act. "We've seen that nationally," said Daniel Williams of Houston, legislative specialist for Equality Texas. "There has been a backlash against the freedom to marry in states that have had legislative sessions since Windsor. We're going to see backlash. It's going to be a difficult session. It's going to be a lot of hard work, but we'll prevail."

In fact, the attacks have already begun, with the introduction of legislation in both the House and Senate that would enshrine a "license to discriminate" against LGBT people in the state Constitution. The proposed amendments from Sen. Donna Campbell (R-New Braunfels) and Rep. Jason Villalba (R-Dallas) are an apparent response to the small number of bakers, florists, and other business owners who've faced discrimination complaints in other states for refusing to serve same-sex couples.

In Texas, one effect of the proposals would be limiting cities' ability to enforce nondiscrimination ordinances by allowing business owners to claim religious exemptions. Williams said he also expects a bill to be filed that would bar cities from enacting nondiscrimination ordinances in the first place.

Rep. Jonathan Stickland (R-Bedford) has threatened to file legislation to prohibit the state from providing transition-related healthcare to transgender prison inmates, and Rep. Matt Krause (R-Arlington) is again expected to introduce a proposal that would authorize university clubs to discriminate against LGBT students.

For the third consecutive session, Williams said lawmakers are also likely

to target Texas A&M's LGBT Resource Center, which drew their ire by holding a Lavender Graduation to recognize and celebrate the university's LGBT graduates this year.

And to make matters worse, it could be more difficult to defeat anti-LGBT legislation in the Senate, which is expected to change its rules to allow legislation to be considered with the support of 60 percent of members, instead of the two-thirds majority currently required. "It would be easier to get legislation that's outside the mainstream onto the floor," Williams said. "That works both directions, but it would make it easier for Sen. Campbell to get her 'license to discriminate' legislation to the Senate floor for a vote."

Nevertheless, Williams remains confident the LGBT community and its allies can stave off the attacks. No anti-LGBT bill has passed since the marriage amendment in 2005. "We're very adept at stopping bad legislation, but the way that we stop bad legislation is by massive public outcry," Williams said. "I'm confident because these proposals are not in keeping with Texas values, they're not in keeping with the will of the people of Texas, and if the people of Texas get engaged and contact their lawmakers and continue to participate in the legislative process, we will be able to defeat these. The

only way any of this becomes law is if the people don't get involved."

On the bright side, the 84th Texas Legislature will be the first in history to include two openly LGBT lawmakers, Reps. Mary Gonzalez (D-El Paso) and Celia Israel (D-Austin).

In addition, the session has already seen several firsts when it comes to pro-LGBT legislation. On the first day of pre-filing in November, lawmakers in the House and Senate—including Rep. Garnet Coleman (D-Houston)—introduced measures that would overturn Texas' statutory and constitutional bans on same-sex marriage. "A full array of marriage legislation has already been filed," Williams said. "That's the first time we've had a statutory piece filed in the Senate, and the fact that all four pieces were filed on the first day of filing is telling."

Another first could come in the form of a proposal to ban so-called "reparative therapy" for minors. The Texas GOP added a plank endorsing "reparative therapy" to its platform in 2014, but Equality Texas has submitted petitions to the state's mental health licensing boards seeking to outlaw the practice. Depending on the outcome of the petitions, there could be legislation from either side. "We are positioned to counter any attempt to make the torture of reparative therapy mainstream or acceptable in Texas law," Williams said.

In addition to longstanding proposals to ban anti-LGBT discrimination in employment and insurance, Williams said he anticipates a measure targeting housing bias for the first time in 2015. He's also hoping to see a bill that would prohibit anti-LGBT discrimination in public accommodations for the first time since 2007.

Other firsts include a measure that would ban anti-LGBT discrimination by state contractors, as well as a Senate version of a bill that would allow same-sex couples to have both parents' names on the birth certificates of adopted children. The birth certificate bill was introduced by Sen. Sylvia Garcia (D-Houston), who joined the Legislature midway through the 2013 session. "She didn't really have a chance to flex her -

ally muscles," Williams said of Garcia. "The Houston legislative delegation has led the way for decades on issues that affect the LGBT community and continues to do so today. It's important that we continue to support these lawmakers by telling them we appreciate their efforts, and also by contacting their colleagues and asking them to support those efforts."

#### **Local Out Artist Wins City's Recycled Art Contest**

aseball-bat stair spindles, paintbrush drawer handles, doors made of funky tin, and a sliding door made entirely out of colorful yardsticks. These are just a few of the whimsically beautiful features that out Houston artist Kiki Neumann has created for her repurposed artist studio. They're also some of the unique objects that caught the eyes of judges in the 2014 Greater Houston Reuse Contest. On November 30, Neumann was awarded first place in the contest's art and furniture category.

Neumann has been collecting and repurposing cast-off materials found on Houston's streets for over 17 years. The first item she ever created, Neumann remembers, was a garden bench built out of Hurricane-ravaged backyard-fence wood. She had recently lost her career in paper sales and needed to channel her frustration into something creative. "It's an understatement to say I was furious, and my mother wisely said, 'Pick up a hammer, honey, and make something with your anger," Neumann says.

From there, she continued to use salvaged wood to make smaller creations, such as birdhouses and garden items. She estimates that over the span of 10 years, she has built nearly 4,000 birdhouses. "Let's just say that I am not making any more right now," she says. "Whew!"

When Neumann found herself with no employment prospects and fighting to stretch her money, she began to look on the side of the road for "furniture to paint, fence boards to build with—[I began] begging for cast-off tools and paint. It just amazed me that all sorts of friends, along with strangers that I met at festivals, had so much to share," she says. "They were glad to help me, and

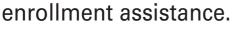

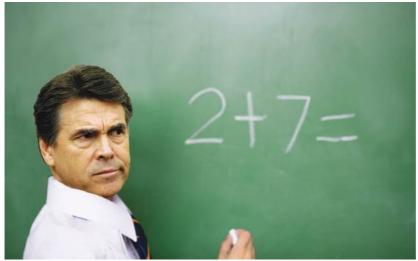

#### **Bi-national Same-sex Couples**

Challenges and solutions

'n June 2013, the United States Supreme Court issued a decision that changed the lives of many in the gay and lesbian community. Yet, while the overturning of a portion of the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) impacted LGBT Americans and their families in a number of different ways, bi-national same-sex married couples had a particularly large amount to gain from this decision.

This is because not only were these couples previously denied the overall range of federal benefits and

rights that are associated with marriage in general, but they also typically deal with the additional stresses of having to find the legal means to remain together in the same country.

#### **The Additional Hurdles** that Are Faced

Today, there are many thousands of bi-national same-sex couples who reside in the United States. Previously, based on the Defense of Marriage Act, neither a United States permanent resident nor a U.S. citizen was able to sponsor a same-sex spouse for immigration the way that an opposite-sex spouse can, with the

eventual movement toward United States citizenship.

Likewise, U.S. permanent residents have always been able to sponsor an opposite-sex foreign spouse for permanent residence via marriage. These rules, however, have traditionally forced same-sex bi-national couples to take other measures in order to continue and maintain their relationships within the United States.

In some cases, the non-U.S. partner has been able to obtain a temporary work, student, or tourist visa. Unfortunately, this route really only allows the couple to



stay together physically for a set and limited amount of time. It can also be quite costly-and it leaves a lot of "loose ends" because it is not a permanent solution in terms of residency or citizenship.

In other instances, the non-U.S. citizen partner will simply take the chance of staying in the United States without having legal status. This, however, can cause a substantial amount of stress and anxiety, not to mention the difficulties that it places on obtaining employment, applying for loans, and participating in other types of activities.

For other couples, when the non-U.S. citizen spouse has been unable to obtain a visa, it may mean having to leave the U.S. altogether and move to another country. As of now, there are more than 30 countries worldwide that offer immigration benefits for same-sex couples—regardless of whether they are married or not. While this option has allowed numerous samesex couples to stay together, it has also

meant that many U.S. citizens have had to leave their homeland and other family members and friends.

#### **Providing Strategies and Solutions**

Due to the 2013 overturning of a provision in the Defense of Marriage Act, same-sex foreign spouses of United States citizens and permanent residents are now eligible to apply for Green Cards. This means that the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services will now be required to treat same-sex married couples equally when it comes to administering U.S. im-

migration law.

Non-U.S. citizens have also been getting some help from President Obama and Washington DC. A potential upcoming overhaul of the nation's immigration enforcement system could protect several million unauthorized individuals in the U.S. from being deported—and could provide many with work permits, too.

Over the past several years, several organizations have also been active in assisting bi-national same-sex married couples

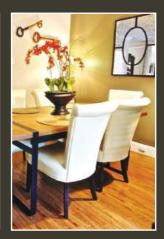
with the challenges that they face, as well as with outlining various strategies for moving forward. Some of these entities include: The Human Rights Campaign, Marriage Equality USA, Freedom to Marry, and Immigration Equality.

In addition, a number of projects have also been launched with a focus on overcoming the many hurdles that bi-national same-sex couples encounter. For example, the Uniting American Families Act was introduced into the U.S. Congress in a  $\rightarrow$

#### **Looking Ahead**

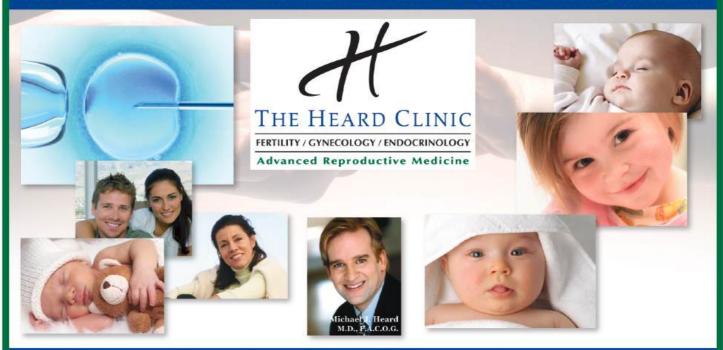

### Nothing but the Truth

An interview with Ty Herndon

ountry singer Ty Herndon, who began topping the country music charts nearly 20 years ago, came out publicly as a gay man just before Thanksgiving 2014. That's something for which country music fans—both gay and straight—can be thankful. A country chart-topper in the 1990s, Herndon's hits include "What Matters Most," "Living in a Moment," "It Must Be Love," and "Loved Too Much," to mention a few. An out and proud gay man, he has a partner of five years named Matty.

Herndon is one of Nashville's LGBT artists working to make the country-music capital a safe and productive place for queer musicians and queer followers of the popular musical genre. I spoke with Ty about coming out, his career, and more in late November 2014.

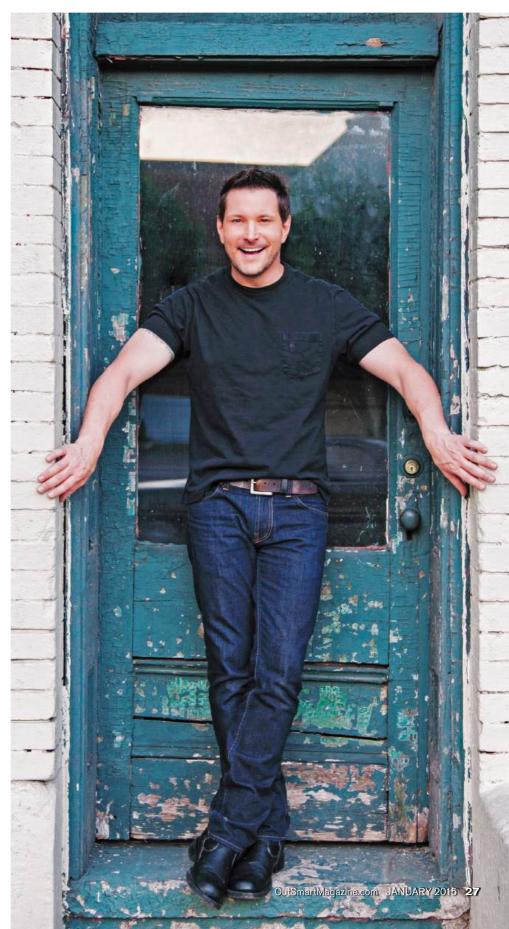
Gregg Shapiro: It's been about five days since your coming-out story ran on people .com and you were discussed on CBS's *The Talk*, CNN, and interviewed on *Entertainment Tonight*. How has the experience been so far?

Ty Herndon: I feel so incredibly blessed. I have struggled with being gay my entire career and life. Of course, I've had so much support from my friends and close family who knew I

was gay. But it's been so freeing for the fans to know—the fans in country music,

especially. They have really been supportive and awesome. There are always going to be the naysayers, and we've had a few of those, but 99 percent of the feedback from the fans and in Nashville has been incredibly supportive. It's blown my mind, to be honest with you. I feel extremely happy. And I feel →

extremely excited about the future, because really, at the end of the day, I just want to be authentic and continue to make great music. That's what I was put on this planet to do; that's my gift. I'm singing better than I ever have. There's lots of music coming in the new year. That really makes me happy.

#### You performed at the Grand Ole Opry last night. How was that show?

I was nervous walking into it. To my knowledge, no openly gay man has ever walked on the Ryman stage and performed. That is the Mother Church. I have so much respect for it. I've performed at the Grand Ole Opry 25 times in my career, but this one was a big deal to me simply because I am a part of the fabric of country music, and I was hoping that I would be accepted. I told my manager last night, "If there's security at the back door, I hope they're just there to shake my hand and say come on in." That's exactly what happened. All of the artists were extremely supportive. We walked onstage to a full house and a big, loving, cheering crowd.

#### Prior to going public, did you consult with other out country artists, such as Brandy Clark or Chely Wright, before making your decision to come out?

Chely Wright and I have been friends for many years. Our paths are so similar in country music. We went to great lengths to hide the fact that we were gay. Five or so years ago when Chely came out, I was so incredibly blown away by her bravery and courage. About six months later, we started talking about it. I didn't want her to be alone out there. It took a while for me to get my courage up, just to wrap my brain around it. I was really fearful about being able to continue working and doing my job, working 200 tour dates a year. That was my main fear. If I don't get to continue to do my job that I love, my passion, I don't know what I'd do. Through Chely, I was able to get educated about all of the fans out there and the new landscape of what my life would be like. I became very comfortable with the fact that I wasn't going to let who I authentically am stop me from making the music I love. God gave me great courage, and Chely was my godsister through all of it, and we did it to-

#### Shortly after coming out, Chely was invited to be the grand marshal at the Chicago Gay Pride Parade. What would it mean to you to be the grand marshal of a Pride parade in

I would be so incredibly honored. Just to know that my LGBTQ brothers and sisters would welcome me in that. I would be extremely

blessed and honored to be a part of something like that. It would be very humbling.

#### Billy Gilman, who also came out on November 20, credits you with helping him with the coming-out process. What does that mean to you?

I have known Billy since he was 12. We were on the same record label, Epic/Sony. I had had a few hit records when they signed Billy. He has been like a kid brother over the years. We had lost contact, and all of a sudden, he's 26 years old. Last year, he reached out to me, and we started talking about his sexuality. I began mentoring him a small amount, because I was also mentoring myself-actually, Chely was mentoring me. I was trying to pay it forward. It's a big decision to take that step. I was really happy that he chose to do that-two hours after I did. That we could take this journey together and be a support system is pretty awesome. Between Billy and Chely and me, who knows, maybe we'll do us a little world tour next year.

#### That would be great. Do you see this as a potential domino effect or more of an anomaly in country music and Nashville?

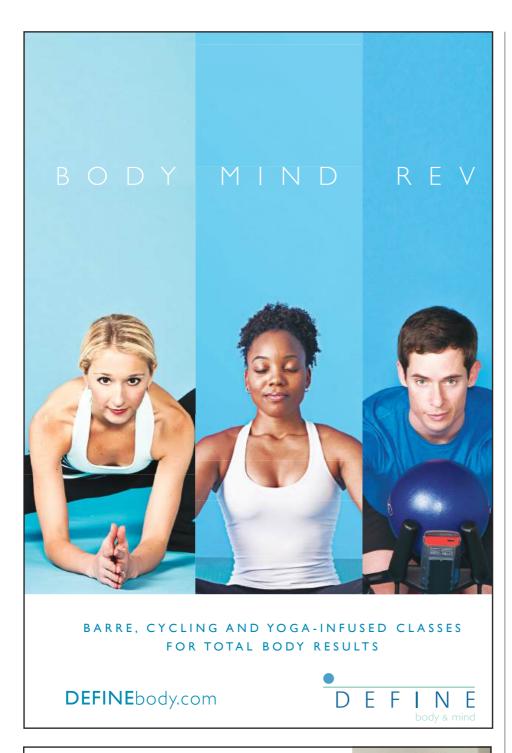
I think country music's growing up. Nashville, in general, is growing up a lot now. Country is so big now—they're on the world stage. If you're going to be on the world stage, you have to be able to have a different mentality. I credit Nashville a lot now. They're moving forward at a great pace. I know one of the things I would love to see happen, and Chely would too, is starting a better coalition of affirmative hearts here in Nashville so we can get an LGBT center open. [By having] Pride and GLSEN come to town, all of these kids in these southern states that we're surrounded by in Nashville would have a place to go when they're kicked out of their homes and churches. [They would know] that suicide is not an alternative, and that they can come and find love and acceptance. That coalition is important to a lot of us in Nashville behind the scenes, as well as the few that have bravely come out.

#### You mentioned people being kicked out of their homes and churches. How much influence did your religious background have in your coming-out process?

I grew up in a great church, with a lot of affirming people. I never had to worry about being kicked out of anything. I grew up in bluegrass and gospel and country music. I had this amazing grandmother who had her own radio show on WPRN in Alabama. I have these strong women in my family. My grandmother was broadcasting live from the senior citizens' center at 90 years old, talking about controversial things. She was awesome. You didn't mess with Grandma Myrtle. But I had no one to talk to about my -

feelings of being gay at 10 years old. I was 20-something when I came out to my mom. I think moms always know. My mother was more concerned about the profession I had chosen to be in. Her main concern was that I [was living] an authentic, good life and that I was healthy. Of course, I went down some roads, and that was not the case. She was right to worry about that. But, to answer your question, I grew up with a very loving God in my life, and that's something I want to pass on to these kids that don't have that.

I'm glad you mentioned your mother's concern with the career you had chosen. You released your major-label debut almost 20 years ago and have been a country music mainstay since that time. Was there ever a point that you considered recording and performing in a genre, such as pop, where there are more openly LGBT artists?

I considered doing a pop record. I actually went to my record label and talked about it. But when you're a country artist through and through and it's in your blood, all you accomplish is a pop-sounding record with a country-singing fella. It just didn't fit for me. I just had to buckle down and fight harder. The harder I fought, the more lies I created, and it was uncomfortable to be in my own skin. At that point, I made a lot of mistakes. a lot of bad choices, and I take full responsibility for those choices. Looking at it from today—the addiction and the hard stuff I put myself through—it is now a part of the fabric of my story. God bless the broken road that has led me to sit here talking to you today. If it's fair to say, sometimes I'm grateful for my mistakes, because I don't think I'd be the man I am today if it wasn't for them.

#### If there was a movie version of your life story, who would you like to portray you?

There are very few actors who have great singing voices. I think Hugh Jackman or Neal Patrick Harris would do a great job playing me in a movie about my life. We would have to bring them to Nashville and teach them the cowboy ways. [Laughs]

#### You are embarking on a 2015 concert tour with Andy Griggs and Jamie O'Neal. What are you most looking forward to about that?

I love those two, number one. We're three very different people. Andy's very much the bowhunting, beer-drinkin', redneck fella. He's got a great girlfriend, so he's not the womanchaser. Jamie, on the other hand, is definitely our diva. She's not a diva-in-training—she's a full-blown diva. And I'm the gay guy who's probably just about as country as they come. The dynamic is the crazy friendship. Those guys will play a Pride festival with me, they'll

go anywhere I go. And I will go anywhere with them. I feel protected and loved.

#### You've been with your partner, Matty, for more than five years now. How did you two meet?

Matt and I are about to celebrate our sixyear anniversary. We met through a mutual friend who thought we would be a great match. He was right! We actually talked on the phone for three months before we met in person.

#### Before you came out in People, did keeping your sexual orientation private put a strain on your relationship?

Keeping secrets and hiding my truth almost killed me more than once. So living an open and authentic life is something we cherish now. It was great to have Matt hold my hand on the red carpet in Los Angeles for the Trevor Live Event. I was really proud.

#### I'm sure many of your gay fans are quite jealous of Matty. Would you say you have a "type" when it comes to the men you date?

In the famous words of Carrie Underwood [on how she was never the kind of girl who needed a man until she met her husbandl: "I need that man." He's amazing.

#### When other celebrities, such as authors or actors, come out as LGBT, they are often pigeonholed as "gay" authors or "gay" actors. Would it bother you to be labeled as a "gay" country music artist?

I would prefer to be known simply as a country music artist, but I don't think that's something you can get away from. The difference for me is that I'm proud to be out and represent our community for the next kid who wants to have a career in country music. I pray one day it's not such a big deal.

#### You mentioned that 99 percent of the feedback has been supportive. Is it printable what the remaining 1 percent had to say?

I do not give haters any energy at all. There is way too much good to focus on. There is way too much work to be done to waste time on hurtful comments. I choose to love no matter how closed off someone's heart may be.

#### Finally, Ty, as same-gender marriage continues to make strides across the country, if you and your boyfriend, Matty, were to marry, which song would you like to have sung as you walk down the aisle?

That's an easy question for me. There's a Rascal Flatts song that I referred to, "God Bless the Broken Road that Has Led Me Straight to You." That would be our wedding song. And if I had my wish, I would have my friend LeAnn Rimes come and sing it.

### **Country Outing**

Billy Gilman adds his voice to the growing chorus of gay country artists

ational Coming Out Day is in October, but two country music artists waited until late November to share their good news. Ty Herndon was the first one out of the gate on November 20, followed shortly thereafter on the same day by Billy Gilman. Gilman, like fellow country diva LeAnn Rimes, got his big break when he was just a kid. Possessing a powerful voice and impressive vocal range, Gilman released his major-label debut album One Voice in 2000, at the age of 11. In addition to the titular hit, the album featured a shockingly spot-on reading of Tammy Wynette's "'Til I Can Make It on My Own." That cover, sung with amazing author-

ity, might qualify as an early clue that Gilman would someday come out as gay. Seriously, listen to the song.

Gilman, who continued to release albums through the early part of the 21st century, is in the process of mounting a comeback. Out-SMART spoke with Gilman about coming out and his career in late November 2014.

#### Gregg Shapiro: How does a Rhode Island native, a New Englander, become a Nash-

Billy Gilman: I grew up singing country music. Country music is so huge in my neck of the woods, believe it or not. People find

it hard to believe, but country music is big around here. There's no memory of not having country music in my life. The Grand Ole Opry and watching the awards shows that would come on and listening to Garth Brooks and Pam Tillis—it was just part of my life, and always has been. It's easier than you think. [Laughs]

#### As someone who got his start as a child star in country, did you ever cross paths with LeAnn Rimes, another country-music child star? Was she someone you looked to as a role model?

Absolutely! LeAnn Rimes was so great to me,

and we are still great friends to this day. I met her first when I was 11. I'm sure she took a liking to me because she saw me going through what

she went through a few years before, being a child herself. There's a common factor with her, and whatnot. She's always been a great support system.

#### Do you have any advice for budding child stars?

The one thing I always go back to is that you really have to love it. It has to be what you are, because there are going to be many wonderful opportunities. There are going to be huge ups and corresponding downs to a career. You have to love it to sustain yourself →

and to put up with what you're going to have to put up with. If it's what you are and you live and breathe it, like I have my whole life, you'll be fine. You're going to do well, because you have what it takes. You can't just wake up one day and go, "I'm going to be a singer!" It's tougher than that.

#### On November 20, history was made in Nashville and the realm of country music when you and Ty Herndon both came out as gay. You cited Ty in your coming-out message. How did he help you through this?

It was amazing! I've known Ty for a while. He was on the same record label as I was a few years back. He's a great singer. This was something that I have been going back and forth with for about a month. I was nervous and reluctant. You never know what's going to happen. I was set to do it that day and was reading Twitter and read the he had come out. I was like, "Oh, wow! This is very coincidental and very odd." But things happen for a reason. He really helped me push the pedal to further it. He put me into high gear. He gave me enough confidence to do what I needed to do. He's a very brave person and a courageous artist. He did help immensely in my situation. My hat's off to him, and I'll always thank him for that.

#### How has the response been from your fans?

My fans have been amazing. Even people that kind of followed my career a little bit have been amazing. No matter what you do in life, it doesn't matter if it was this situation, or [if I had] wanted to change genreswhatever, someone is always going to have an opinion. You have to brace yourself for a good opinion or a bad one. Everyone is entitled to whatever they feel. You have to keep a positive head and do your thing. So far, the comments and support have been amazing, and I'm so grateful for that.

#### How did your family react to your coming out?

My family was nothing but supportive. That was really amazing to me. They have not changed. Their support has stayed the same. I am so grateful for that. It's been nothing but positive in that respect. I've always been surrounded by support, and nothing has changed.

#### Would you ever perform at a Pride festival if vou were asked?

Absolutely—if the situation is correct and it's in a respectful manner. That's how I've conducted my business for the past 15 years. I would have no problem doing that. It's for the greater good, and that's what it's about.

## After Gay Marriage, What?

Veteran activist Urvashi Vaid explores that question at a Rice-sponsored lecture in February

n a stunning turn of events for marriage equality in 2014, 35 states now have legalized same-sex marriage. The U.S. Supreme Court let stand decisions by several U.S. Circuit Courts of Appeal to invalidate state marriage bans in their circuits. This effectively voided the bans of all states within those circuits.

Only four of the 11 federal circuits still have bans in effect, and one of them recently decided in favor of marriage bans. When all federal circuit courts do not agree on an issue, the Supreme Court becomes the arbiter. Thus the issue may be on the Supreme Court's 2015 list of cases it will hear. Given the current tenor of the Supreme Court, it is highly likely that they would vote 5-4 against marriage bans. This would finally open up all 50 states to marriage equality.

It's a heady time these days for a community that has been fighting for their rights since the early 1950s. It's taken 65 years of activism to win what seems like the final prize. Understandably, the question in many minds is, "What next?" It's also understandable that for some members of the community, this is game point. What could possibly be left to fight for? The revolution has come to a successful completion, hasn't it?

LGBT and social justice movements for over three decades. She has written three books, and is considered one of today's great thinkers within the LGBT community.

Some of what Vaid will say can be derived from her 2012 book Irresistible Revolution, a collection of nine essays. Many of them are speeches she has given over the

equality when she wrote the book, and Barack Obama had not yet been re-elected to a second term. Her speech will no doubt reflect the changes since the publication of that book.

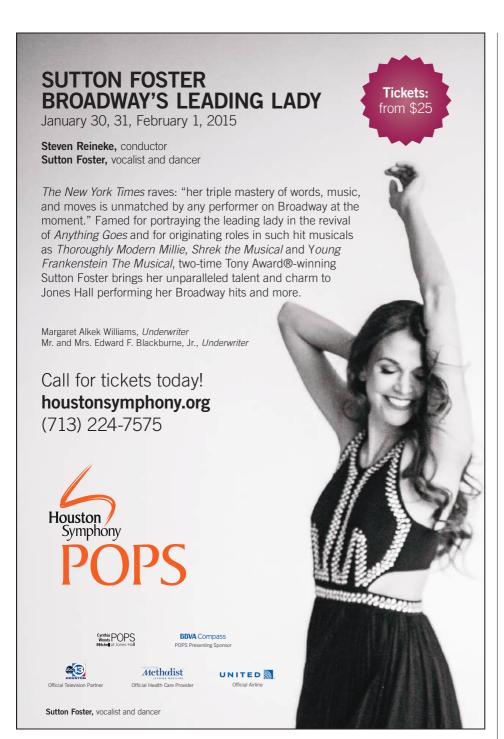
#### **Gay Activism 3.0**

Vaid is pleased with the success of marriage equality, but for her it's far from the final chapter. It's another beginning—a time for re-invention. Marriage equality is a noble

goal, and probably a necessary one, but Vaid believes it was achieved by ignoring large segments of the national LGBT community in the short term—both the people themselves and their issues.

Persons attending her lecture should plan to bring a notebook and pen, because she will not be handing out wreaths of valor for the success of marriage equality efforts. Instead, she will be explaining what needs to done now, why it needs to be done, and how it can be achieved. Vaid thinks far outside the box-a box many people may not have even realized exists.

Certain themes run through each essay of her book, and after finishing it, you pretty well have the mantra: racial →

equality, economic equality, gender equality, coalition building, and re-inventing our national organizations.

#### **Making Revolution Irresistible**

"The responsibility of a writer representing an oppressed people is to make revolution irresistible," Vaid writes, quoting Toni Cade Bambera. Vaid believes that what has long made the LGBT movement "irresistible" was its honesty. "Truth may be unpleasant, unpopular, and sometimes unbearable to speak, but its power is undeniable," she writes.

"The fact that we have come out of the

closet is the truth that has made us successful," she noted in a recent interview with OutSmart magazine. "We have exposed reality and provided evidence. We have shown the nation a wide range of sexual orientation and gender identity-and the many different types of



people within our community."

But Vaid feels great concern that today's LGBT movement is run by mostly white, mostly male, mostly affluent board members and CEOs. There is little involvement with the broader community to set an agenda. Instead, an agenda is set by an elite group and then told to the rest of us. "It's the national organizations' dirty little secret." She believes it's time to change this.

#### **No Queer Left Behind**

What would a re-invented movement look like? Vaid envisions organizations that include racial equality, gender equality, and economic equality in their mission statements, and in their staffing structures.

She evaluates today's national organizations: "We assure the wealthy and powerful that our admission to their club will not rock their privileges or their worldview; we demur that we are just like them, that we believe in what they believe. We are asked to prove our loyalty, and our adherence to their elitist values, by being willing to sacrifice part of our own souls, and our own people, in order to win short-term battles."

This has resulted in a leadership nearly devoid of diversity. Vaid experienced firsthand what she relates in her book. Because she had dark-brown skin, she had to organize a mail and phone campaign in order to win the position of executive director of the National LGBTQ Task Force.

It has also resulted in economic realities

going unaddressed for a large segment of the community. The priorities of an organization are set by their board, and none of the major organizations have either racial, gender, economic, or social justice in their mission statements. Vaid is especially concerned about the lack of strong support for the transgender community and for homeless LGBT teens-a result of weak mission statements.

Vaid also believes that coalition building-like that of the early days of gay activism—is essential to our success. The national organizations need to take stands on issues of the day and actively link arms with others who are fighting for social justice—for example, timely issues such as immigration reform, minimum-wage increases, police



brutality against the black community, and sexual assault of both women and men in the military.

We cannot expect support from others if we do not offer it to them. She rejects the current attitude that "it's not our issue." A movement in a

vacuum does not gain sufficient momentum.

"An LGBT movement focused on more substantive notions of equality would fight for the broadest and most inclusive possible parameters of the issues on which it campaigns, and not the narrowest or safest," Vaid says. She feels we should commit ourselves to the principle of "No Queer Left Behind." For Vaid, "the movement is not 'over' until the weakest among us has seen the benefits of freedom."

# **Out of India**

In 1958, Vaid was born in New Delhi, India, and emigrated to the United States with her parents at the age of eight. An exceptional student, she won a full four-year scholarship to Vassar College. She went on to earn a J.D. at Northeastern University School of Law.

Vaid worked with the ACLU's Prison Project as a staff attorney from 1983 to 1986. She was the public information officer for the Task Force from 1986 to 1989, and then moved into the position of executive director of the Task Force from 1989 to 1992. She returned in 1997 for four years as the director of their Policy Institute.

The next four years were spent at the Ford Foundation, followed by five years at the Arcus Foundation. Vaid is now director of the Engaging Tradition Project sponsored by the Center for Gender and Sexuality Law at Columbia Law School. She lives in New York City with her partner of 26 years, the comedian Kate Clinton. →

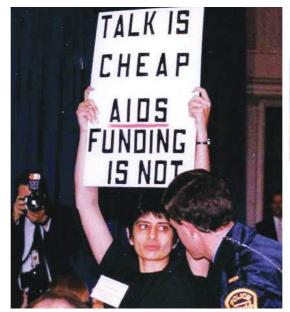
# **Learning to Live Boldly**

Vaid sees activism as "an act of faith." She ponders the bravery of the community's early leaders such as Harry Hay, Del Lyon, Phyllis Martin, Barbara Gittings, and Frank Kameny, who were all living in a world where homosexuality was considered sick, criminal, sinful, and immoral

Activists need a vision, and then the courage to act on that vision. Vaid knows about courage in the face of oppression. In 1990, the Task Force was involved with the HIV epidemic that had already raged for a decade in the community, and was only getting worse.

Vaid was invited to attend what would be President George H. Bush's first and only AIDS policy speech, at the National Community AIDS Partnership meeting on March 29, 1990. The president was talking about funding for babies with AIDS when Vaid quietly opened her briefcase and took out a folded-up sign.

She stood up, faced the president holding the now-unfolded sign that said TALK IS CHEAP/AIDS FUNDING IS NOT on one side and Remember Gay People With AIDS on the other. She interrupted him,

in tandem with an ACT-UP member in the back of the room, and told him that he wasn't doing enough. A security guard told her to sit down and remain quiet, or she would be ejected from the meeting. Once the guard left, she stood up and addressed the president again. The next day, she was front-page news in the Houston Chronicle and other media around the globe.

Looking back, she admits her heart was

beating fast. "I was scared," Vaid says. "But I knew what I was doing was right." Her action had even more effect because she was scheduled to be part of a panel discussion at the meeting. Behind the table tent bearing her name was an empty chair. Time and again, organizers would look toward the empty chair and say, "Urvashi could have answered that question if she were here now."







# **Moral Equality**

Vaid believes that although marriage equality brings with it legal rights, it does not give our community "moral equality." We are no longer considered "mentally ill," thanks to the 1973 American Psychiatric Association's reclassification of homosexuality. Lawrence v. Texas removed criminal penalties in 2003. And a

vigorous fight is now under way in almost every faith tradition challenging the demonization of the LGBT community.

"But full human rights is both legal and cultural change," Vaid says. She feels that we must continue to contest the denigration of our lives by religious leaders who feel they are the sole arbiters of great moral codes. She echoes the words of former secretary of state Hillary Clinton, delivered in an address to the United Nations, that "punishment of homosexuals is not cultural—it's criminal." LGBT equality must be seen as an issue of basic human rights.

"Morality is about ethical choices," Vaid says. "The morality we need at this crucial time is not the 'faith of our fathers' nor the 'traditional values' of our mothers. It will not be found in the exclusionary forms of

fundamentalist religions dividing the world today, even when it is disguised in the rhetoric of community and love. The moral values we need today can be found emerging from people who are creating movements for social justice around the world. These movements put their faith in imagination, not tradition."

### **Know Your Enemy**

Vaid has been involved as a careful observer of U.S. politics and the LGBT community's struggle for more than three decades, and she understands our enemies. "The vision of the right," she says, is "a national identity erased of color or class or gender or religious plurality. They want to 'take this country back' to pre-Civil War times, and they banally invoke 'doing good' while acting really badly against anyone defined outside of the Christian nation.

"Progressives seem unable to face and answer the worries and anxieties of the rankand-file followers of the right. To defeat the right culturally and politically, we have to offer a new and inviting vision."

Vaid sees the movement at a crossroads: "Down one road lies the pursuit of narrow self-interest, single identity, and the old paradigm of LGBT politics as we have been practicing it for the past three decades. Down the other road lies the pursuit of a just society. Both roads are legitimate, but they

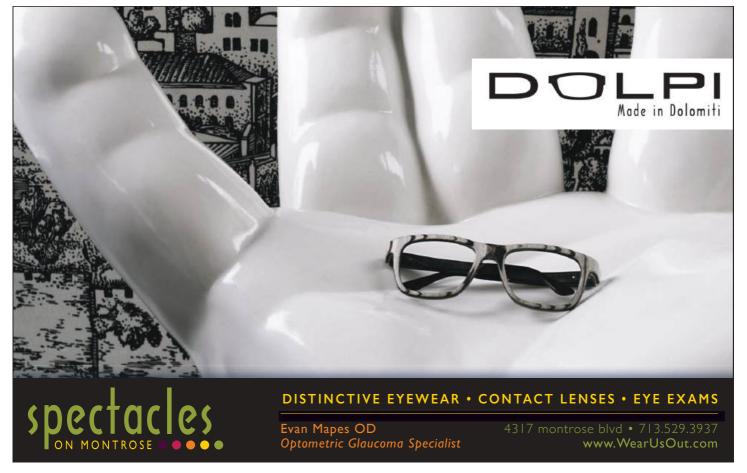
do represent a clear choice in tactics and strategy and goals.

"Standing against us on either side of the road is the same enemy: the theocratic right and supremacists of all kinds-racial, sexual, gender, religious—as well as powerful forces that place profit above human lives. Against these opponents," she continues, "a politics of co-optation, adaptation, and friendship is not plausible. We need a practical politics of cultural engagement and resistance. We need to commit an act of faith."

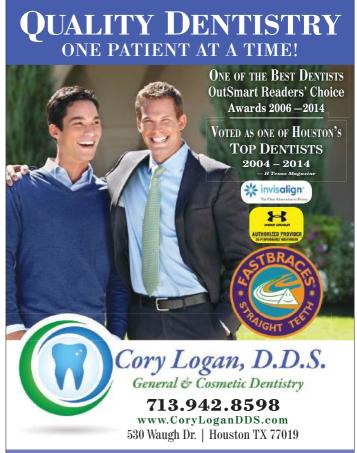
Vaid says that she looks forward to a political realization for the gueer movement that does not limit itself to the status quo. She hopes to see "an emerging wave of liberation that is a multi-faceted movement, whose dominant symbol is not an 'equal' sign, but perhaps the 'greater than' sign, suggesting that we can be greater than the limits of the world in which we find ourselves."

Vaid's lecture will be presented on February 5, 6–7:30 p.m., in the sanctuary of Resurrection Metropolitan Community Church, 2025 West 11th Street, Houston, Texas 77008. Free and open to the public. A reception follows the lecture.

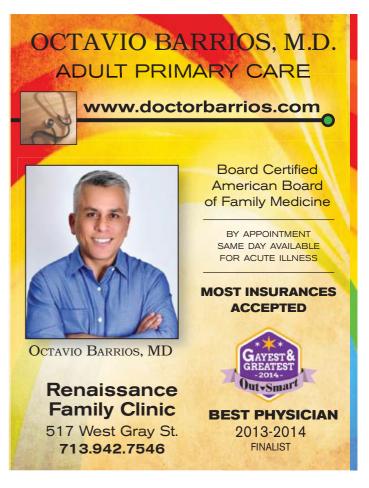

# **Music Man**

Fostering Houston's LGBT music scene has been Andy Mills' passion

e's played the piano for First Lady Jacqueline Kennedy's White House soirées, marched in her husband's funeral procession, managed the hottest bar on Fire Island as well as Mary's Naturally in Houston, bar-crawled with Judy Garland, and was honored as the 1982 Houston Male Pride Marshal. "But I've remained the same person, living and enjoying life one day at a time," Andy Mills says, as he reflected on his memorable life recently with OutSmart magazine.

As he sits in his modest but comfortable apartment on Heights Boulevard, wearing oxygen tubing that gently hums, he is in a happy mood, not one of regrets. He has survived AIDS, and still holds his own against the lung cancer that has left him with but 20 percent of one lung. He is a grateful person, and surprisingly independent despite his delicate health.

### A Pivotal Figure in Houston's **Early Gay Musical Groups**

Mills founded the Montrose Symphonic Band (now the Houston Pride

Band) in 1980 and the Montrose Singers (the forerunner of what is today known as Bayou City Performing Arts) in 1979.

In honor of his distinctive place in Houston's LGBT community, "A Concert and Tribute to Andy Mills" will be presented by the musical groups he founded on January 31 at 7:30 p.m. in the sanctuary of Resurrection Metropolitan Community Church, 2025 West 11th Street.

In 1981, Mills co-founded the national Gav and Lesbian Chorus Association with four other conductors. Later he helped form the Lesbian and Gay Band Association. Today they have grown into international associations that keep choruses and bands around the world connected. "The first com-

bined chorus concert brought together 900 singers in New York City at Lincoln Center," Mills says with pride. "The first combined band concert was 250 musicians in the Hollvwood Bowl."

Mills has chosen to turn his tribute into a salute to all LGBT musicans around the

parents turned to teaching school—his father teaching history and coaching, and his mother teaching English.

At the age of 15, Mills lost his father unexpectedly to a brain tumor. That left his mother a single mom with three kids. She knew fine china well and got a job

globe. "There are now over 200 choruses with 12,000 men," Mills says with amazement. "Also a complete orchestra and 25 bands, representing another 1,000 musicians.

"I love all these people," Mills continues. "Whether I've met them or not, they are all my children." For the first and only time during the interview, his eyes fill up with tears. It's obvious that music and Andy Mills are synonymous.

### Mills' Early Life

Mills was born in 1936 in Freemont, Ohio. He was the middle child, with an older sister and younger brother.

When he was three, his parents opened a horse-riding school near Columbus. "They were both excellent riders," Mills says. When the business venture did not work out, his

### **Piano Lessons**

In the ninth grade, Mills began to take private piano lessons, and he practiced on his mother's upright grand piano. Although she did not give him formal lessons, now and then she would look up from her reading to correct a wrong note.

At school, he sang in the choir and played in the marching band. "I played →

the tuba," Mills says. "That's the only instrument that was still available." He had hoped to play the saxaphone.

In the tenth grade, Mills became the band's drum major. "Big tall hat and tails," he laughs. This gave him his first experience as a conductor, something that he gravitated toward instinctively.

In the summers he worked at the local yacht club, filling boats with gas and washing them. He was able to earn up to \$500 per week in tips. With this financial independence, he started visiting piano bars downtown.

In 1952, at age 15, he walked into the Scenic Bar in Toledo. "All I could see was a sea of men," Mills says. The management knew he was underage, but Mills had already learned how to impress people with his maturity and gentility. They liked him and watched out for him.

He began dating men in the their 30s. "I learned early what the meaning of 'chicken' was," Mills laughs. One night, when he was 17, a date dropped him off at home and his mother happened to see them kiss goodnight.

She told him he needed to see a psychiatrist. He responded, "No, mother, you're the one who needs to see one. Before I came out, I was barely passing. After I came out, I've had straight A's. I've been the student council president for two years, the drum major and assistant band director, a member of the choir and its student director."

### **College Life**

In 1955, Mills graduated from high school. He won a full four-year college scholarship. "It was called 'The Dairy Football Scholarship,' but they were unable to find a football player in the area who qualified academically, so they picked me."

Mills began attending the University of Toledo. "The music department was two rooms upstairs," he says. "It was not very challenging."

But during his first semester, Mills met a 6'9" basketball player, and they fell in love. His new lover had a basketball scholarship at Ohio State, so Mills moved into an apartment with him in Columbus and enrolled in the Ohio State music program.

Mills was excited with the opportunities and facilities at this new educational venue. Because he was working his way through school—and also practicing 30-40 hours each week—he spent six years earning his music degree.

## **Into the Military**

Mills decided that joining the military would be the best way to continue his education. He enlisted in the Navy, and was guaranteed a

position as the concert pianist for the Navy Band. He was required to attend the Army's music school first, to learn the basics of military music. Following that, he attended the Navy's music school in Washington DC.

By 1962, Mills had gotten his foot in the door and was impressing his superiors. When a substitute teacher was needed for music theory, he was assigned the job. Finally he was ready to become a member of the Navy Band. As promised, he was a concert pianist for their symphonic band, and was also appointed an assistant conductor. Being one of the 125 members of the Navy Band was an honor-in 1962, only one in 100 applicants was accepted.

Each member had to play two instruments—one for the symphonic band and one for the marching band. Mills played drum in the marching band. As the official band of the U.S. Navy, their uniforms were customtailored. Located in Washington DC, they were often requested to provide music for diplomatic events.

During his four years in the prestigious band, he was twice requested to play the piano at the White House, as background music for social hours. "Mrs. Kennedy always came up afterwards and personally thanked me," Mills says.

When President Kennedy was assassinated, the marching band was included in the funeral procession on Monday, November 25, 1963. It was a bitterly cold day, Mills remembers. "We wore our peacoats and dress hats. Underneath we had as many layers of undergarments as possible."

The band members assembled at 6 a.m. and were bussed to the U.S. Capitol. They waited in the cold until JFK's body was removed from the rotunda and placed on a military caisson. About 10:30 a.m., the band began marching the route to the White House. From there, they marched to St. Matthew's Cathedral and waited for the hourlong mass to end.

Their final duty was to march in the magnificent procession of military units to Arlington Cemetery. Since the Navy Band was not included in the graveside services. they marched down a side street inside Arlington's gates and were bussed back to their starting point. For nearly 10 hours that day, they were constantly on their feet, standing or marching, all without food or benefit of restrooms.

Mills says that 50 percent of the band's time was spent on the road, as a public relations tool of the U.S. Navy. At the time, there was a new nuclear submarine that the Navy was taking to ports around the world, and they often performed at those events.

# Life in Germany and New York City

In 1965, Mills' enlistment was up, so he left the Navy to follow his new lover, Sam →

Cannon, to Germany where Mills worked part-time as a cook. Now a civilian again, he won an opportunity to study under conductor Herbert von Karajan of the Berlin Philharmonic.

In 1967, at the age of 31, he fell twice and dislocated his wrist. His future as a pianist was over. He dreamed of becoming an opera conductor, but that card was not in the deck that life dealt him. He moved to New York City and began working in restaurants and bars.

Mills quickly distinguished himself, and began managing a restaurant on 13th Street. After the restaurant's bar became the new "in" place to go, he became friends with Judy Garland, who showed up regularly with such friends as Martha Raye and Kaye Ballard. After closing time, he would join them as they bar-crawled until 5 a.m. in the morning.

In 1970, his partner settled in Houston to sing with the Houston Grand Opera. By this time, Mills was managing the Ice Palace, a wildly popular gay disco in Fire Island's Cherry Grove. He spent the off-seasons in Houston.

### **Moving to Houston**

In 1973, Mills moved to Houston permanently and found a job as the dining room captain at the Plaza Club. He was then hired by a club corporation to develop new clubs in such places as Chicago, Las Vegas, and Baton Rouge.

By 1977, he wanted to stay full-time in Houston, and was hired by Jim Farmer to manage Mary's Naturally. This was the beginning of his involvement with LGBT activism.

A small gay band had organized in 1978 and marched in the 1979 March on Washington. The members wanted to do more, and they asked Mills to help them form a symphonic band. He agreed, and the Montrose Symphonic Band was born in 1980.

The year before, Mills had organized the Montrose Singers. The success of an existing San Francisco choir proved that gay choruses could be an effective cultural outreach to the straight community, and Mills wanted to do the same in Houston.

During this time, Marion Coleman was operating her legendary lesbian club, Kindred Spirits. In typical fashion, she offered her bar during off hours as a rehearsal venue.

Mills' growing involvement and visibility in Houston earned him the honor of 1982 Male Pride Marshal—the same year his friend Coleman was elected Female Pride Marshal. Coleman loves to tell a story of how their parade car was passing by Mary's

as Mills' friends on the roof were yelling for him to throw them souvenir doubloons that bore the profiles of Mills and Coleman on them. Several attempts failed before Coleman finally smiled and lobbed a copious supply of the trinkets up to the roof with her softball arm.

In 1985, Mills entered into a relationship with a third partner, whose parents were Baptists. Although they visited once a year and acted cordially, when his partner died in 1988, they literally threw Mills out of the house they had shared. It was a heartbreaking and much-too-common occurrence in those days.

Mills suffered a nervous breakdown, and moved to Los Angeles. He found a job managing a four-star restaurant, and especially enjoyed his friendship with MCCR's Rev. Troy Perry, who lived in the city.

### **A New Direction**

In 1991, Mills returned to Houston, and was hired on as the dining room captain at the very exclusive Doctors Club in the Medical Center. The late Gary Van Otteghem was the financial director there at the same time.

1994 brought a diagnosis of full-blown AIDS to Mills. He was approved for disability income, and regretfully retired from the active and involved lifestyle that he so loved. For the next two years, he tried working as the bar manager at Renata's Restaurant before finally accepting the fact that it left him too fatigued.

Mills did have enough strength to work a few hours a week at Resurrection Church's former location on Decatur Streeet, tending to the yard and planting flowers. He continued this until the church moved in 2000.

In the early 2000s, the Pride Band went through a quick succession of directors, and found themselves faltering. Mills took time to help them plan several events while they regained their footing.

Every four years, the GALA Choruses group that Mills helped create in 1981 holds an international festival, with thousands in attendance. Mills has always made it a point to be there. The next festival will be in July 2016 in Denver.

Mills also enjoys leisurely afternoons now and then, socializing at famiiar clubs such as Brick and EJ's. And Mills tries never to miss any performance by the Pride Band or the Gay Men's Chorus. He utilizes a portable oxygen unit on his trips away from his apartment.

"My life has been exciting—the places I've been, the people I've met," says Mills. His love for music endures because he sees music as the great unifier. "If everyone in the world sang and played an instrument, we'd never have any more wars."

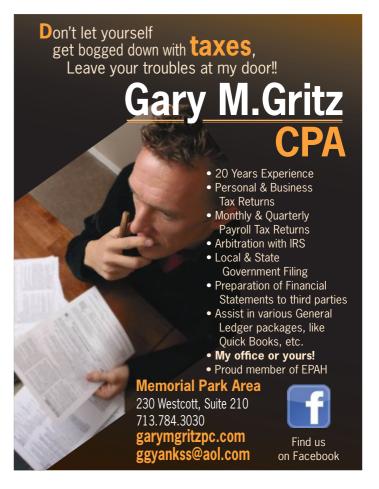

Get healthy (and get covered) in 2015

anuary is a big month for our community. On January 9, the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals has agreed to hear marriage equality cases from Louisiana, Mississippi, and our great state of Texas. Even if we have to wait longer than our friends in, say, Oklahoma, marriage equality is coming. And for those of us who have been fighting for equality for decades, it can't come soon enough.

At the same time, many LGBT Texans are committing (or re-committing) to keep their New Year's resolutions to get healthy. Maybe you've pledged to lose a few pounds, get more exercise or sleep, or quit smoking once and for all.

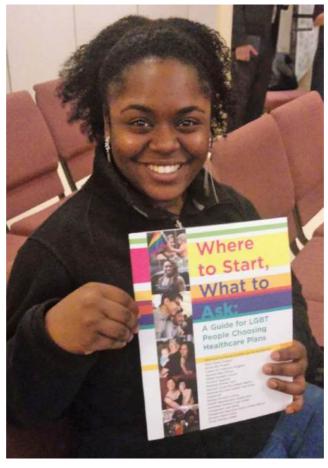
The timing couldn't be more important for the Houston-area LGBT community. Why? Because health, too, is an equality issue. LGBT people are more likely to smoke and have higher rates of HIV and other STIs, mental health issues such as depression, and even cancer. We also face discrimination in the healthcare system: you may have been turned away by a doctor or nurse simply for being gay-or you may not be out to your doctor at all. And one in four low- and middleincome LGBT people do not have the health insurance they need to gain even basic access to a doctor.

This is why the Lesbian Health Initiative of Houston (LHI) is committed to eliminating barriers to healthcare and inspiring health and wellness for LGBT

people—regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity-through integrated education, access, and advocacy programs. Our access programs include biannual LHI

Health Fairs where uninsured and underinsured LGBTQ women and transgender men can get free mammograms, pap/well person exams, blood screenings, flu shot vouchers, and many other preventive services. Save LHI's 2015 Health Fair dates: June 6 and

# THE AFFORDABLE CARE ACT **PROTECTS LGBT COMMUNITIES**

I've seen how the Affordable Care Act has improved my life and the lives of those around me. How might it improve yours? The health reform law is an unprecedented opportunity to make sure our LGBTQ families and children have a basic human righthealthcare. This is particularly important in Texas where we have the highest rate of uninsured LGBT families, children, and individuals. Here are some of the key benefits you should know about as we head into the new vear:

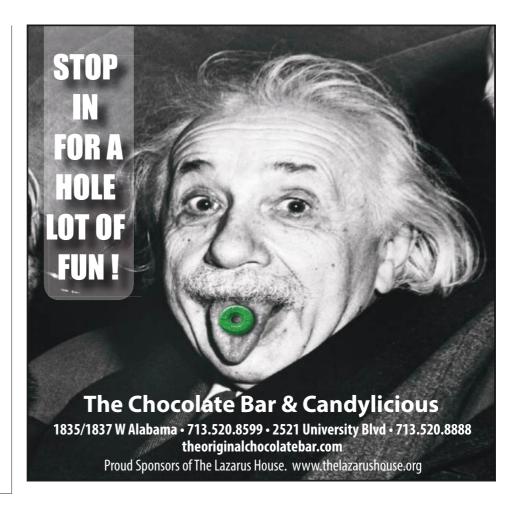
- The Affordable Care Act may be the most significant piece of federal civil-rights legislation for LGBT people. For the first time, it is illegal to discriminate in the healthcare system based on sexual orientation and gender identity. This means that insurance companies—and many hospitals, clinics, doctors, nurses, and other providers right here in Texas—can no longer discriminate against you simply for who you are or whom you love. You have new rights under the Affordable Care Act—make sure you understand them, and educate your friends and family.
- The Affordable Care Act recognizes your marriage, even if Texas doesn't. After the United States v. Windsor decision, President Obama made it a priority to ensure that our families were treated as families. Because of this, all legally married same-sex spouses can enroll in a family insurance plan and receive financial help as a family, no matter where they live. As long as you were married in a state that recognizes it—I'm looking at you, Oklahoma—and you file (or plan to file) a joint federal tax return, you will get these benefits because the Affordable Care Act recognizes your relationship.
- The Affordable Care Act ends discrimination based on preexisting medical conditions and requires insurance companies to cover the treatments you need. Before health reform, insurance companies could charge you more or refuse to cover you altogether if you (or anyone in your family) had asthma, cancer, HIV, high blood pressure, or were transgender. Now, every American has guaranteed access to a health insurance plan, regardless of sexual orientation, gender identity, or medical history. And every plan in the Marketplace has to cover a minimum set of essential benefits that include doctor visits, hospital stays, preventive care, prescription drugs, and mental health services.
- The Affordable Care Act helps make health insurance more affordable by offering financial help. We know our community wants health insurance. The real question is whether or not we can afford it. Luckily,

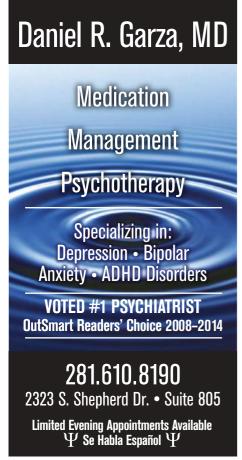
the law provides financial help so you can find a plan that fits your budget. Individuals whose annual income is between \$11,670 and \$46,680 (or between \$23,850 and \$95,400 for a family of four) will be eligible for financial help to purchase health insurance through the Marketplace. So far, the vast majority of people who got covered-more than four out of five people—qualify for some financial assistance. Visit HealthCare.gov to see what you qualify for.

The deadline to sign up for health insurance is February 15, 2015. If you don't get covered by then, you may have to pay a fine—and 100 percent of your medical costs if you get sick or injured.

Millions of Americans have already enrolled in health insurance, and millions more have the opportunity to do so this year. We need to make sure that LGBT people are well-represented in those millions of people. We owe it to ourselves, our friends and family, and our community to be out, be healthy, and get covered.

## COMPLERA does not cure HIV-1 infection or AIDS.

To control HIV-1 infection and decrease HIV-related illnesses you must keep taking COMPLERA. Ask your healthcare provider if you have questions about how to reduce the risk of passing HIV-1 to others. Always practice safer sex and use condoms to lower the chance of sexual contact with body fluids. Never reuse or share needles or other items that have body fluids on them.

It is not known if COMPLERA is safe and effective in children under 18 years old.

# **IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION**

# What is the most important information I should know about COMPLERA?

**COMPLERA** can cause serious side effects:

- Build-up of an acid in your blood (lactic acidosis), which is a serious medical emergency. Symptoms of lactic acidosis include feeling very weak or tired, unusual (not normal) muscle pain, trouble breathing, stomach pain with nausea or vomiting, feeling cold especially in your arms and legs, feeling dizzy or lightheaded, and/or a fast or irregular heartbeat.
- Serious liver problems. The liver may become large (hepatomegaly) and fatty (steatosis). Symptoms of liver problems include your skin or the white part of your eyes turns yellow (jaundice), dark "tea-colored" urine, light-colored bowel movements (stools), loss of appetite for several days or longer, nausea, and/or stomach pain.
- You may be more likely to get lactic acidosis or serious liver problems if you are female, very overweight (obese), or have been taking COMPLERA for a long time. In some cases, these serious conditions have led to death. Call your healthcare provider right away if you have any symptoms of these conditions.
- Worsening of hepatitis B (HBV) infection. If you also have HBV and stop taking COMPLERA, your hepatitis may suddenly get worse. Do not stop taking COMPLERA without first talking to your healthcare provider, as they will need to monitor your health. COMPLERA is not approved for the treatment of HBV.

### Who should not take COMPLERA?

Do not take COMPLERA if you:

- •Take a medicine that contains: adefovir (Hepsera), lamivudine (Epivir-HBV), carbamazepine (Carbatrol, Equetro, Tegretol, Tegretol-XR, Teril, Epitol), oxcarbazepine (Trileptal), phenobarbital (Luminal), phenytoin (Dilantin, Dilantin-125, Phenytek), rifampin (Rifater, Rifamate, Rimactane, Rifadin), rifapentine (Priftin), dexlansoprazole (Dexilant), esomeprazole (Nexium, Vimovo), lansoprazole (Prevacid), omeprazole (Prilosec, Zegerid), pantoprazole sodium (Protonix), rabeprazole (Aciphex), more than 1 dose of the steroid medicine dexamethasone or dexamethasone sodium phosphate, or the herbal supplement St. John's wort.
- Take any other medicines to treat HIV-1 infection, unless recommended by your healthcare provider.

# What are the other possible side effects of COMPLERA?

Serious side effects of COMPLERA may also include:

- New or worse kidney problems, including kidney failure. Your healthcare
  provider should do blood tests to check your kidneys before starting
  treatment with COMPLERA. If you have had kidney problems, or take other
  medicines that may cause kidney problems, your healthcare provider may
  also check your kidneys during treatment with COMPLERA.
- Depression or mood changes. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you have any of the following symptoms: feeling sad or hopeless, feeling anxious or restless, have thoughts of hurting yourself (suicide) or have tried to hurt yourself.

- Changes in liver enzymes: People who have had hepatitis B or C, or who have had changes in their liver function tests in the past may have an increased risk for liver problems while taking COMPLERA.
   Some people without prior liver disease may also be at risk. Your healthcare provider may do tests to check your liver enzymes before and during treatment with COMPLERA.
- Bone problems, including bone pain or bones getting soft or thin, which may lead to fractures. Your healthcare provider may do tests to check your bones.
- Changes in body fat can happen in people taking HIV-1 medicines.
- Changes in your immune system. Your immune system may get stronger and begin to fight infections. Tell your healthcare provider if you have any new symptoms after you start taking COMPLERA.

The most common side effects of COMPLERA include trouble sleeping (insomnia), abnormal dreams, headache, dizziness, diarrhea, nausea, rash, tiredness, and depression. Other common side effects include vomiting, stomach pain or discomfort, skin discoloration (small spots or freckles), and pain. Tell your healthcare provider if you have any side effects that bother you or do not go away.

# What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking COMPLERA?

- All your health problems. Be sure to tell your healthcare provider if you have or had any kidney, mental health, bone, or liver problems, including hepatitis virus infection.
- All the medicines you take, including prescription and nonprescription medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. COMPLERA may affect the way other medicines work, and other medicines may affect how COMPLERA works. Keep a list of all your medicines and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist. Do not start any new medicines while taking COMPLERA without first talking with your healthcare provider.
- If you take rifabutin (Mycobutin). Talk to your healthcare provider about the right amount of rilpivirine (Edurant) you should take.
- If you take antacids. Take antacids at least 2 hours before or at least 4 hours after you take COMPLERA.
- If you take stomach acid blockers. Take acid blockers at least 12 hours before or at least 4 hours after you take COMPLERA. Ask your healthcare provider if your acid blocker is okay to take, as some acid blockers should never be taken with COMPLERA.
- If you are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if COMPLERA can harm your unborn baby. Tell your healthcare provider if you become pregnant while taking COMPLERA.
- If you are breastfeeding (nursing) or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed. HIV-1 can be passed to the baby in breast milk. Also, some medicines in COMPLERA can pass into breast milk, and it is not known if this can harm the baby.

# (emtricitabine 200 mg, rilpivirine 25 mg, tenofovir disoproxil fumarate 300 mg) tablets

Brief summary of full Prescribing Information. For more information, please see the full Prescribing Information, including Patient Information.

### What is COMPLERA?

- COMPLERA is a prescription medicine used as a complete HIV-1 treatment in one pill a day. COMPLERA is for adults who have never taken HIV-1 medicines before and who have no more than 100,000 copies/mL of virus in their blood (this is called 'viral load'). Complera can also replace current HIV-1 medicines for some adults who have an undetectable viral load (less than 50 copies/mL) and whose healthcare provider determines that they meet certain other requirements.
- COMPLERA is a complete regimen and should not be used with other HIV-1 medicines. HIV-1 is the virus that causes AIDS. When used properly, COMPLERA may reduce the amount of HIV-1 virus in your blood and increase the amount of CD4 T-cells, which may help improve your immune system. This may reduce your risk of death or getting infections that can happen when your immune system is weak.
- **COMPLERA does not cure HIV-1 or AIDS.** You must stay on continuous HIV-1 therapy to control HIV-1 infection and decrease HIV-related illnesses.
- Ask your healthcare provider about how to prevent passing HIV-1
  to others. Do not share or reuse needles, injection equipment, or
  personal items that can have blood or body fluids on them. Do not have
  sex without protection. Always practice safer sex by using a latex or
  polyurethane condom to lower the chance of sexual contact with semen,
  vaginal secretions, or blood.

# What is the most important information I should know about COMPLERA?

# **COMPLERA** can cause serious side effects, including:

- Build-up of an acid in your blood (lactic acidosis). Lactic acidosis
  can happen in some people who take COMPLERA or similar (nucleoside
  analogs) medicines. Lactic acidosis is a serious medical emergency
  that can lead to death. Lactic acidosis can be hard to identify early,
  because the symptoms could seem like symptoms of other health
  problems. Call your healthcare provider right away if you get any of
  the following symptoms which could be signs of lactic acidosis:
  - feel very weak or tired
  - have unusual (not normal) muscle pain
  - have trouble breathing
  - having stomach pain with nausea or vomiting
  - feel cold, especially in your arms and legs
  - feel dizzy or lightheaded
  - have a fast or irregular heartbeat
- Severe liver problems. Severe liver problems can happen in people
  who take COMPLERA. In some cases, these liver problems can lead to
  death. Your liver may become large (hepatomegaly) and you may develop
  fat in your liver (steatosis). Call your healthcare provider right away if
  you get any of the following symptoms of liver problems:
  - your skin or the white part of your eyes turns yellow (jaundice)
  - dark "tea-colored" urine
  - light-colored bowel movements (stools)
  - loss of appetite for several days or longer
  - nausea
  - stomach pain

- You may be more likely to get lactic acidosis or severe liver problems if you are female, very overweight (obese), or have been taking COMPLERA for a long time.
- Worsening of Hepatitis B infection. If you have hepatitis B virus (HBV) infection and take COMPLERA, your HBV may get worse (flare-up) if you stop taking COMPLERA. A "flare-up" is when your HBV infection suddenly returns in a worse way than before. COMPLERA is not approved for the treatment of HBV, so you must discuss your HBV with your healthcare provider.
  - Do not run out of COMPLERA. Refill your prescription or talk to your healthcare provider before your COMPLERA is all gone.
- Do not stop taking COMPLERA without first talking to your healthcare provider.
- If you stop taking COMPLERA, your healthcare provider will need to check your health often and do blood tests regularly to check your HBV infection. Tell your healthcare provider about any new or unusual symptoms you may have after you stop taking COMPLERA.

### Who should not take COMPLERA?

# Do not take COMPLERA if you also take any of the following medicines:

- Medicines used for seizures: carbamazepine (Carbatrol, Equetro, Tegretol, Tegretol-XR, Teril, Epitol); oxcarbazepine (Trileptal); phenobarbital (Luminal); phenytoin (Dilantin, Dilantin-125, Phenytek)
- Medicines used for tuberculosis: rifampin (Rifater, Rifamate, Rimactane, Rifadin); rifapentine (Priftin)
- Certain medicines used to block stomach acid called proton pump inhibitors (PPIs): dexlansoprazole (Dexilant); esomeprazole (Nexium, Vimovo); lansoprazole (Prevacid); omeprazole (Prilosec, Zegerid); pantoprazole sodium (Protonix); rabeprazole (Aciphex)
- Certain steroid medicines: More than 1 dose of dexamethasone or dexamethasone sodium phosphate
- Certain herbal supplements: St. John's wort
- Certain hepatitis medicines: adefovir (Hepsera), lamivudine (Epivir-HBV)

  Do not take COMPLERA if you also take any other HIV-1 medicines, including:
- Other medicines that contain tenofovir (ATRIPLA, STRIBILD, TRUVADA, VIREAD)
- Other medicines that contain emtricitabine or lamivudine (ATRIPLA, Combivir, EMTRIVA, Epivir, Epzicom, STRIBILD, Trizivir, TRUVADA)
- rilpivirine (Edurant), unless you are also taking rifabutin (Mycobutin) **COMPLERA** is not for use in people who are less than 18 years old.

### What are the possible side effects of COMPLERA?

## **COMPLERA** may cause the following serious side effects:

- See "What is the most important information I should know about COMPLERA?"
- New or worse kidney problems, including kidney failure. Your healthcare
  provider should do blood and urine tests to check your kidneys before
  you start and while you are taking COMPLERA. If you have had kidney
  problems in the past or need to take another medicine that can cause
  kidney problems, your healthcare provider may need to do blood tests
  to check your kidneys during your treatment with COMPLERA.
- Depression or mood changes. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you have any of the following symptoms:
  - feeling sad or hopeless
  - feeling anxious or restless
  - have thoughts of hurting yourself (suicide) or have tried to hurt yourself
- Change in liver enzymes. People with a history of hepatitis B or C virus infection or who have certain liver enzyme changes may have an

increased risk of developing new or worsening liver problems during treatment with COMPLERA. Liver problems can also happen during treatment with COMPLERA in people without a history of liver disease. Your healthcare provider may need to do tests to check your liver enzymes before and during treatment with COMPLERA.

- Bone problems can happen in some people who take COMPLERA. Bone
  problems include bone pain, softening or thinning (which may lead to
  fractures). Your healthcare provider may need to do tests to check your bones.
- Changes in body fat can happen in people taking HIV-1 medicine.

  These changes may include increased amount of fat in the upper back and neck ("buffalo hump"), breast, and around the main part of your body (trunk). Loss of fat from the legs, arms and face may also happen.

  The cause and long term health effect of these conditions are not known.
- Changes in your immune system (Immune Reconstitution Syndrome) can happen when you start taking HIV-1 medicines. Your immune system may get stronger and begin to fight infections that have been hidden in your body for a long time. Tell your healthcare provider if you start having any new symptoms after starting your HIV-1 medicine.

### The most common side effects of COMPLERA include:

 Trouble sleeping (insomnia), abnormal dreams, headache, dizziness, diarrhea, nausea, rash, tiredness, depression

### Additional common side effects include:

 Vomiting, stomach pain or discomfort, skin discoloration (small spots or freckles), pain

# Tell your healthcare provider if you have any side effect that bothers you or that does not go away.

- These are not all the possible side effects of COMPLERA. For more information, ask your healthcare provider.
- Call your healthcare provider for medical advice about side effects. You may report side effects to FDA at 1-800-FDA-1088.

# What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking COMPLERA?

## Tell your healthcare provider about all your medical conditions, including:

- If you have or had any kidney, mental health, bone, or liver problems, including hepatitis B or C infection.
- If you are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if COMPLERA can harm your unborn child.
  - There is a pregnancy registry for women who take antiviral medicines during pregnancy. The purpose of this registry is to collect information about the health of you and your baby. Talk to your healthcare provider about how you can take part in this registry.
- If you are breastfeeding (nursing) or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed
  if you take COMPLERA.
  - You should not breastfeed if you have HIV-1 because of the risk of passing HIV-1 to your baby.
  - Two of the medicines in COMPLERA can pass to your baby in your breast milk. It is not known if this could harm your baby.
  - Talk to your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby.

# Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and nonprescription medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements:

- COMPLERA may affect the way other medicines work, and other medicines may affect how COMPLERA works.
- If you take certain medicines with COMPLERA, the amount of COMPLERA in your body may be too low and it may not work to help control your HIV-1 infection. The HIV-1 virus in your body may become resistant to COMPLERA or other HIV-1 medicines that are like it.

- Be sure to tell your healthcare provider if you take any of the following medicines:
  - Rifabutin (Mycobutin), a medicine to treat some bacterial infections.
     Talk to your healthcare provider about the right amount of rilpivirine (Edurant) you should take.
- Antacid medicines that contain aluminum, magnesium hydroxide, or calcium carbonate. Take antacids at least 2 hours before or at least 4 hours after you take COMPLERA.
- Certain medicines to block the acid in your stomach, including cimetidine (Tagamet), famotidine (Pepcid), nizatidine (Axid), or ranitidine hydrochloride (Zantac). Take the acid blocker at least 12 hours before or at least 4 hours after you take COMPLERA. Some acid blocking medicines should never be taken with COMPLERA (see "Who should not take COMPLERA?" for a list of these medicines).
- Medicines that can affect how your kidneys work, including acyclovir (Zovirax), cidofovir (Vistide), ganciclovir (Cytovene IV, Vitrasert), valacyclovir (Valtrex), and valganciclovir (Valcyte).
- clarithromycin (Biaxin)
- erythromycin (E-Mycin, Eryc, Ery-Tab, PCE, Pediazole, Ilosone)
- fluconazole (Diflucan)
- itraconazole (Sporanox)
- ketoconazole (Nizoral)
- methadone (Dolophine)
- posaconazole (Noxafil)
- telithromycin (Ketek)
- voriconazole (Vfend)

**Know the medicines you take.** Keep a list of all your medicines and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist when you get a new medicine. Do not start any new medicines while you are taking COMPLERA without first talking with your healthcare provider.

### How should I take COMPLERA?

- Stay under the care of your healthcare provider during treatment with COMPLERA.
- Take COMPLERA exactly as your healthcare provider tells you to take it.
- Always take COMPLERA with food. Taking COMPLERA with food is important
  to help get the right amount of medicine in your body. A protein drink is not
  a substitute for food. If your healthcare provider decides to stop COMPLERA
  and you are switched to new medicines to treat HIV-1 that includes
  rilpivirine tablets, the rilpivirine tablets should be taken only with a meal.

# Keep COMPLERA and all medicines out of reach of children.

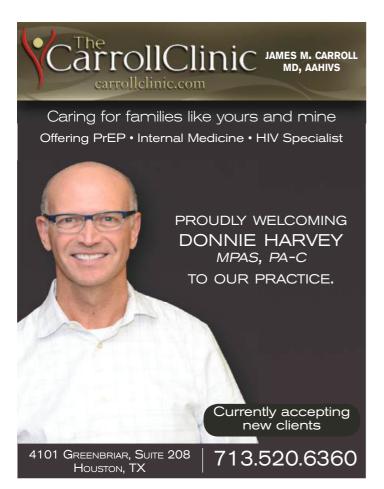

# **Abomination or Inspiration?**

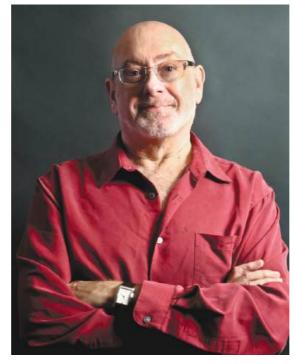
From "sissy boy" to AIDS activist to Sunday School teacher, therapist Ken McLeod prepares to teach adult classes about the truths and myths used to support religious attitudes toward LGBTQ folks

fter growing up as "the designated sissy boy" in a southern coalmining community, in adulthood Ken McLeod became a tenured professor, teaching theater at Louisiana State University—a life he left behind to get a master's degree in clinical social work when he felt called to "do something for my brothers." AIDS in 1985 and 1986 was, he says, "essentially gay men." He was 38 when he went back to school to earn his degree at LSU, and his first job as a social worker was at a Catholic hospice for people with AIDS. Appointed by both a Democratic and a Republican governor, he served on the Louisiana Commission on AIDS, advising the Louisiana legislature about the disease. Now a therapist in private practice, he moved to Houston in 1996 to work with various AIDS organizations, including the Bering Support Network at Bering United Methodist Church.

McLeod has been a Unitarian for nearly 40 years, and for the past nine years has attended Emerson Unitarian Universalist Church, a gay-friendly religious community near the Galleria. "It's a congregation that has completed The Welcoming Congregation Program, which is the LGBTQ affirmation program of the UU [Unitarian Universalist] Association," McLeod explains. He points out that Emerson invites people of all gender identities and sexual orientations to join them, and Emerson co-pastor Dr. Becky Edmiston-Lange has been a visible and outspoken supporter of the Houston Equal Rights Ordinance.

According to McLeod, "The Welcoming Congregation Program is a process that UU churches can go through, and members vote to become a Welcoming Congregation. The program came about because, although Unitarian Universalists have been very supportive of these issues for decades, there was a time in the '80s when they were doing a lot of visioning in the congregations and surveying to figure out what they thought about women ministers, black ministers in white congregations, and all

kinds of things like that. They came up with results that they didn't like relative to the LGBT community, so they gathered about a dozen people from around the country to sit down and talk about what to do." McLeod, who was then director of education at the Unitarian Church of Baton Rouge, was one of those chosen. In 1989 the UU denomination's general assembly voted, and The Welcoming Congregation Program is the idea that came out of that vote.

# "We are doctrine-free, dogma-free."

"One of the challenges for people [who are new to this church] is we don't have the answers," says McLeod. "You have to do the thinking, you have to develop your credo, etc. It's all on you." Thomas Jefferson, Ralph Waldo Emerson, and Henry David Thoreau were all known to be Unitarians, he says. "We as a denomination have no church-wide policy," he explains. "We are doctrine-free, dogmafree. Part of what we believe is that everyone has to create their own theology and figure out their own path. Most UUs today would not call themselves Christians. Even though we might look to Jesus as a great teacher, he

wouldn't be the only one and we wouldn't call him the son of God." McLeod says UUs use the term fellowship more often than congregation. It's common for UUs to say, "Don't tell me what you believe, tell me what you did today," he says.

McLeod states that "a lot of people find their way to UU as their first step back to organized religion, and very often they use us as a transition back to their faith of birth or childhood, because what

> they learn from us is that you need to be responsible for your own theology. I have a friend who is Catholic who says, 'I go

to Catholic church for the ritual, and I go to UU for the community." He agrees that there is a comfort to going through the rituals you learned as a child.

Although there are marked differences between Unitarian Universalists and →

other mainstream churches, McLeod says there are similarities. "Our services would look very much like a Methodist service. Our services used to be very different, but now when people come in who have been unchurched for a long time, they say, 'Well, this feels like a church. There are opening words, sermons, hymns.""

Emerson has about 450 members. Community is one of the things McLeod talks about a lot. Compared with Houston's Lakewood Church—arguably the largest church in America—Emerson is quite small and liberal. (Lakewood was the target of protests late in 2014 by Westboro Baptist members because Lakewood is tolerant of LGBT attendeesalthough Lakewood pastor Joel Osteen has made it clear through several recent interviews that he believes the homosexual lifestyle is a sin according to the Bible.)

In Emerson's upcoming five-week series on attitudes in the religious community toward LGBTQ people, McLeod will lead the Emerson UU adult education classes in examining those same scriptures plus other sacred teachings. (Of course, he does not believe the scriptures support judgmental views like Osteen's.) In the first week of the series, McLeod says, "I'm going to be talking about where we as a denomination have been and what 'Welcoming Congregation' means. It's a UU community that, through education and discernment, has chosen to assert their affirmative welcome to people who are

"The second Sunday is going to be about what the [Judeo-Christian] scripture really says, what Leviticus really means, and [the various ways that has been interpreted by different religions]," McLeod continues. "What have the churches done with this? In the Middle Ages there were same-sex marriages in the church, but then it was suppressed. There's some really good research done on that by John Boswell out of Yale. The last two Sundays I'm going to look at 'What about the World Religions?'

Over the last two years, as part of their "Living Text" series, Emerson has conducted a church-wide study of topics such as Buddhism, Hinduism, Taoism, the Hebrew Bible, the Christian Bible, earth-centered religions, women and religion, as well as both Unitarianism and Universalism. Last year McLeod taught about Taoism, which he says is an area of interest for him, and if he had to cite a book as his spiritual guide, he says, it would be the Tao Te Ching.

Now, beginning on the first Sunday in February, the entire Emerson congregation will be studying LGBTQ religious issues for a five-week period. During each of the five Sundays, the topic will be the focus of the youth and adult classes, as well as the topic of the day's sermon. McLeod says, "I think this is a very significant move for a church not identified as a so-called 'gay church' but a denomination that has been gay-affirming since the very early 1970s and has been doing services of union since not long after that."

Emerson Unitarian Universalist Church is located at 1900 Bering Drive in Houston. Each Sunday, adult education classes and activities for youth and children begin at 10 a.m., followed by a worship service at 11 a.m. To learn more about Emerson Unitarian Universalist Church or the upcoming study series, go to EmersonHouston.org.

# From Darkness to Light

A journey to healing

his is a story about hope, change, and transformation. Change, for me, is usually motivated by insight or pain. In my case, HIV was the catalyst.

My world came to a crashing halt when I was diagnosed with HIV in 2003. The day I was diagnosed, it was like someone turned off the lights and my world went black. I was consumed with shame, guilt, remorse, selfpity, and thoughts of suicide. I was a 44-yearold African-American woman living my dream life as an attorney in Washington DC. I had come a long way from where I started as a teenage mother, high school dropout, and drug addict. I stopped using drugs, went back to school, raised my daughter as a single parent, and completed law school by the age of 37. Everyone told me, "Fight, Venita! You have always been a fighter." But I was tired of fighting—HIV had been the final blow.

After my diagnosis, I withdrew from the world. I was preparing myself for death even though I knew HIV was not a death sentence. I did not want to live with the stigma and complications of HIV. In December 2004, I resigned from my job, sold my home, and moved to Houston to be near my family. I lived in darkness for four years before I made a decision to reclaim power over my life.

At first glance, this may not appear to be a story of hope and transformation—but it is. I do know that at some point during my journey, I chose to use HIV as a stepping-stone instead of a tombstone. I credit my triumph over darkness to the love of my family, friends, the Houston HIV community, my healthy lifestyle, and advocacy. This is my story about how fitness, nutrition, and advocacy became my stepping-stones to enlightenment, self-love, gratitude, and freedom.

The turning point came one day in 2007. I was having my usual thoughts of suicide

when I said to myself, "Either kill yourself or find a way to move on." My first thought was that I needed to exercise. I had always been physically active for most of my life. After my diagnosis, I went back and forth between wanting to exercise and feeling like "What's the use?" It was during this time that I went to my first yoga class. Even though I was not flexible and understood nothing, the first yoga class touched me in a place I had closed off for the past four years. I was hooked.

The more I practiced yoga, the better I felt. After class one day, I asked the teacher, Daksha, to teach me how to meditate. I ended up studying yoga with Daksha in her home for the next year.

Since that time, I have had a number of wonderful yoga teachers who have taught me how to apply yoga principles in life both on and off the mat. Awareness of the simple art of breathing is one of the many benefits I learned from practicing yoga. I was also able to reconnect to a God of my understanding on a yoga mat. Yoga is so much more than a physical practice; it is a lifestyle.

It was also during this time that I began to experience menopausal symptoms, facial swelling, and extreme fatigue. I was tak-

ing five different meds to manage these symptoms as well as my HIV, but hadn't had any relief. In desperation, I sought out the help of a personal trainer, Shana Ross, who taught me the importance of nutrition. In yoga, I was learning how to listen to my body, and Shana taught me how to feed my body. I began to use food in a way that allowed my body to function at its best. This was not an easy process for me, but it has been worth all the time and effort.

I don't remember when I stopped having thoughts of suicide. But one day I realized that I no longer wanted to die. Soon, my menopausal and other symptoms had also disappeared.

I used fitness and nutrition as a way to exercise power over the things in my life that I could control. I could not cure myself of HIV, but I could control what I ate, how much I rested and exercised, and my spiritual growth. I went from being →

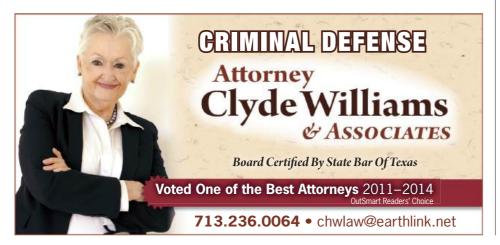

passive in my healthcare to taking charge.

In late 2007, I informed my doctor that I would no longer take all of the meds I was being prescribed. I went from taking five meds to one. Although I developed an undetectable viral load soon after starting meds in 2003, my CD4 count improved at a slow pace in those first four years. By 2008, my CD4 count had doubled. One day, my doctor told me, "I don't know what you're doing, but whatever it is, you need to keep doing it."

The final step in my journey back to health was getting involved in HIV advocacy. It all began when I finally got the courage to attend my first support group. A number of people in the group were talking about an HIV advocacy training program called Project LEAP that was funded by the Houston Ryan White Planning Council (RWPC). In 2008, I completed Project LEAP and went on to serve on the RWPC for several years. As a lawyer, I used to pride myself on being an advocate, but lost my desire for advocacy following my diagnosis. HIV gave me another platform for advocacy on an issue that is near and dear to my heart. Houston has an HIV advocacy community with a long and proud history, and it is my honor to be a

Another critical part of my activism and healing was my decision to go public about my HIV. In 2011, I agreed to participate in a project called "We Choose to Climb." I was one of seven women who had overcome major obstacles in their lives who were brought together to train and climb Mt. Kilimanjaro in Tanzania, Africa. The goal of the project was to inspire others to not give up on the "mountains" in their lives. In order to participate, I had to be willing to be open about my HIV-positive status. (There were still a number of family and friends who did not know I had HIV.) I still had some fear, but I knew I was ready. I was tired of living in shame and secrecy. It was during my trip to Africa as an openly HIV-positive woman that I finally got the courage to never be invisible again. I was finally free!

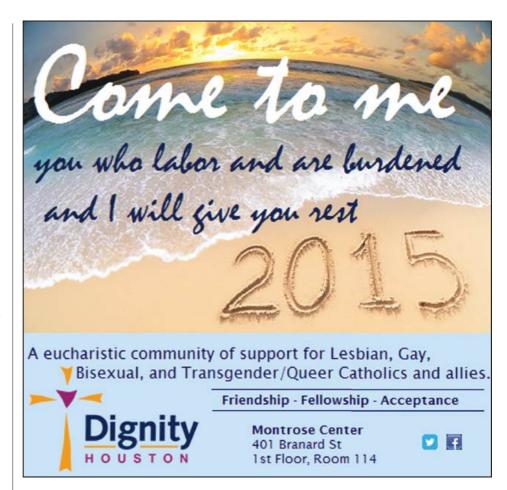
I went on to participate in a Centers for Disease Control (CDC) campaign called "Let's Stop HIV Together." I chose this campaign because of its anti-stigma message and inclusion of family members and supporters in the campaign. It gave me a chance to say thank you to my family, because I know I would not be here without their love and support.

Earlier this year, I joined Legacy Community Health Services as the Program Coordinator for the Positive Organizing Project (POP+). POP+ is an advocacy-training program designed by and for people living with HIV/AIDS (PLWHA). The goal of POP+

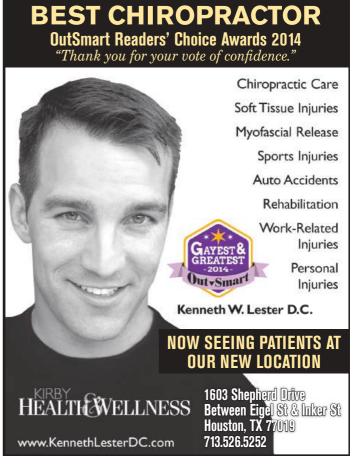
is to promote greater leadership and involvement by the PLWHA community in decisions that impact their lives. Fifteen PLWHA have just graduated from POP+ after receiving trainings in community organizing, effective leadership, and advocacy. I am so honored to use my legal skills and passion to raise awareness about HIV, impact public policy, end stigma, and help others come to terms with living with HIV.

The last 11 years have made for an amazing journey of highs and lows. It's still bittersweet to think that without HIV, I may not have discovered the life I have today. I have continued to evolve in my yoga practice, understanding of nutrition, and overall fitness. My friends would probably call me a healthand-fitness fanatic. I love feeling good! 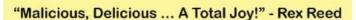

# Something for Everyone

We've got the scoop on this award season's LGBT characters

ou know you're gay when you watch award shows to see "who" celebrities are wearing. You know you're really gay when the use of excessive force by the fashion police makes you cheer.

Was it just a year ago that Jennifer Lawrence's Christian Dior felony at the Golden Globes inspired selfies of fanboys swathed in white bed sheets and black ribbons?

At the same event, little-known Lupita Nyong'o larcenously lit up the red carpet in a red off-the-shoulder Ralph Lauren with attached cape. She lost Best Supporting Actress that night to Lawrence, but her awards derby debut launched Nyong'o's march to an Oscar as Patsey in 12 Years a Slave.

Twelve years in the making was this year's Oscar favorite, Boyhood, written and directed by Bellaire High School graduate Richard Linklater. It's already been crowned Best Picture by the New York Film Critics Circle and the Los Angeles Film Critics Association, where the runner-up was The Grand Budapest Hotel. Its auteur, St. John's School product Wes Anderson, won for Best Screenplay.

While actresses attract most of the accolades on the red carpet, this year's most competitive race pits Best Actor hopefuls Steve Carell (Foxcatcher), Michael Ke-

aton (Birdman), Jake Gyllenhaal (Nightcrawler), Eddie Redmayne (as Stephen Hawking in The Theory of Everything), and Benedict Cumberbatch as gay hero Alan Turing in The Imitation Game.

Fighting to take one of them out is David Oyelowo, whose portrayal of Dr. Martin Luther King in Selma rounded out the field for Best Drama Actor at the Golden Globes.

Matthew McConaughev, who emerged from the pack of Oscar contenders when he won last year's Golden Globe Best Drama Actor for Dallas Buyers Club, is back in the hunt, this time in the Best Actor in a TV Movie/Limited Series category. He's joined

by True Detective partner Woody Harrelson, Fargo co-stars Martin Freeman and Billy Bob Thornton, and Mark Ruffalo as Ned Weeks in The Normal Heart. As Ned's lover, Felix Turner, out actor Matt Bomer is nominated for Best Supporting Actor at the Globes.

Julia Roberts is a Screen Actors Guild (SAG) finalist as Dr. Emma Brookner in The Normal Heart.

Sugar Land's Allison Tolman was nominated for Best Actress in a TV Movie/Lim-

ited Series for her debut in Fargo. Among her competition is Frances McDormand (Olive Kitteridge), who won an Oscar for the movie Fargo, and Jessica Lange in Ryan Murphy's American Horror Story: Freak Show.

Selma fans claim it didn't pick up any SAG nominations because not enough actors on the group's nominating committee saw it. In contrast, do too many members of the Hollywood Foreign Press Association watch TV's Modern Family? Is that why it was shut out at the Golden Globes for the first time in five years? You know the episode I mean: Pepper hires a director of photography to film the guys' wedding; Cam overhears Mitchell

say, "Apparently, he's a big deal. He won a Golden Globe." Then Cam pipes in, "You win an Oscar, you buy a Golden Globe." (They didn't like that, did they?)

Julianne Moore heard her name called twice as a Golden Globe nominee: in the drama category for her Oscar-bait role as a professor with early-onset Alzheimer's in Still Alice, and in the comedy or musical category for Map to the Stars, which won her the Best Actress prize at the

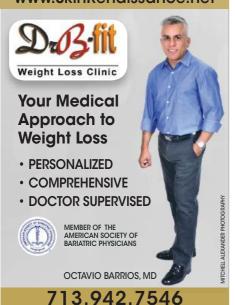

Last year, Taylor Schilling was nominated at the Globes for Best TV Drama Actress as bisexual Piper Chapman in the Netflix women's prison series Orange Is the New Black. This year, she's nominated in the TV comedy category—go figure. OITNB is up for Best TV Comedy, along with Amazon's original series Transparent. It also scored a Best TV Comedy Actor nod for Jeffrey Tambor, who stars as transgender parent Maura.

In more category confusion, Uzo Aduba (who won a 2014 Emmy Award as Outstanding Guest Actress in a Comedy Series as lesbian Suzanne "Crazy Eyes" Warren in OIT-NB) is both a SAG nominee for Outstanding Performance by a Female Actor in a Comedy Series and a TV supporting actress finalist at the Globes. She's also in the running for Outstanding Actress in a Comedy Series at the NAACP Image Awards, where OITNB's supporting-actress contenders include Emmy nominee Laverne Cox (who is transgender in real life and in the show) and costars Adrienne C. Moore as "Black Cindy" and Lorraine Toussaint as villainous "Vee."

The cast of OITNB also competes for SAG's TV comedy ensemble award, along with Modern Family, which managed acting nominations for its three Emmy winners,

Eric Overstreet (as Cam), Ty Burrell, and Julie Bowen. (It's a crime that out actor Jesse Tyler Ferguson, as Mitchell, never wins an individual honor.)

A welcome LGBT nominee for Best Motion Picture-Musical or Comedy at the Globes is Pride, which scored big at the 17th British Independent Film Awards, winning Best Film, Supporting Actor (Andrew Scott), and Supporting Actress (Imelda Staunton). Pride is based on the true story of gay and lesbian activists who raised money for striking mineworkers in a small Welsh village in 1984.

At the 30th Film Independent Spirit Awards, Love Is Strange is nominated for Best Feature, along with Best Screenplay for Ira Sachs and Mauricio Zacharias, and acting nods for both John Lithgow and Alfred Molina as a gay couple whose financial troubles force them to live apart.

Justin Simien, the out Houston native who won the U.S. Dramatic Special Jury Award for Breakthrough Talent at last year's Sundance Film Festival, won two Independent Spirit nominations for Dear White People, which he produced through crowdfunding. His categories are Best First Feature and Best First Screenplay.

In the upcoming televised awards season, some other nominees of particular interest in the LGBT community are the star-studded Stephen Sondheim musical Into the Woods; Jim Parsons in The Big Bang Theory; Guillermo Diaz in Scandal; bisexual Alan Cumming in The Good Wife; The View, co-hosted by Rosie O'Donnell; TV shows with gay characters, such as American Horror Story: Freak Show, Brooklyn Nine-Nine, Downton Abbey, Game of Thrones, Girls, House of Cards, and How to Get Away with Murder; Orphan Black (in which one clone played by Tatiana Maslany is bisexual biologist Cosima Niehaus); House of Lies, which features two gender-fluid teenagers; and Cicely Tyson, whose performance in The Trip to Bountiful was directed by former Houstonian Michael Wilson.

Red carpets will also be filled with gayfriendly celebrities wearing their favorite gay designers, including Debbie Reynolds, who will be celebrated with the Screen Actors Guild 51st Annual Lifetime Achievement Award. She was OutSmart's covergirl in September 1998, and you can read Blase DiStefano's interview with her at OutSmart Magazine.com.

# **Queer to the Ear**

'Queer Music Heritage' marks its 15th anniversary

t's all Jimmy Carper's fault. I really miss Jimmy. We lost him a year ago, and he was a good friend and in some ways a mentor to me. I also credit him for giving me my start in radio—something I wasn't even seeking. He had been hosting After Hours on KPFT for many years, and in late 1999 I began calling in during his shows, nudging him to play more gay and lesbian artists, as there was really no outlet for their music. After doing this several weeks in a row, he just said, "Well, why don't you come on the show and play some?"

So I did. With zero radio background, I put together two half-hour segments of old and new music, and I "put a little history" behind the songs. As I was very comfortable with Jimmy, we had a good time, and Jack Valinski, the producer of the station's Monday night show Queer Voices (then called Lesbian & Gay Voices) invited me to do a monthly segment. My first segment aired in January 2000, and it turned out to be a perfect outlet for my collection of LGBT music and my

passion for digging into LGBT history.

Within a vear I

took my segments online in order to archive the shows, since history needs to be accessible. My fanatic approach has led to a website of over 2,000 pages and 560 hours of streaming music. As I have always considered our music history visual as well as aural, from the beginning I set up pages for each show that captured photos of the artists and recordings. I wasn't playing Top 40 artists, but mainly indie ones whose work was difficult to discover. They were not heard on the radio and struggled to make their music available in the few coffee shops and LGBT bookstores

that agreed to carry them. And as the show's name would indicate, I loved going way back to feature the very early artists and songs that paved the way for the music of our culture. I am pleased to have been able to interview many of our pioneers, some of whom began in the '60s and '70s when recording explicitly gay songs was indeed brave.

In addition to the many interview shows,

there have been a large number of "theme" shows and some that are centered on genres: country, jazz, hip hop.

Christmas, gay musicals, and on my recent November show, "Obscure Queer Blues," covering mainly the '20s and '30s-some very deep material that I loved researching.

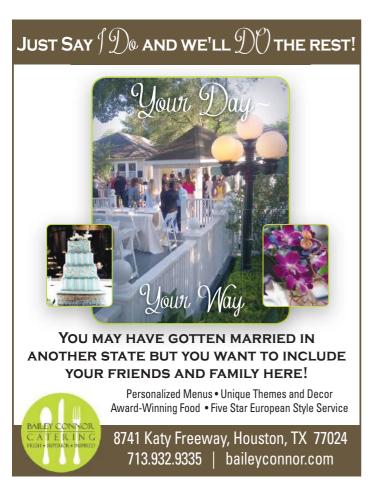
Other unusual themes have included: Music Inspired by Harvey Milk, Singing Drag Queens, Music Inspired by The Wizard of Oz, Songs about AIDS, Same-Sex Marriage, Stonewall, Matthew Shepard, Anita Bryant, Gays in the Military, Drag Kings, Music by Bear Artists . . . and lots and lots on women's music and transgender artists. There have been fanatically long shows of up to nine hours on gay choruses, Queercore, and gay Christian music. I am grateful that Queer Voices allowed me to air the first hour of these shows on KPFT every month. As

I lack the discipline to do just one hour, additional hours can always be heard on my website.

As the name Queer Music Heritage may imply, I was trying to cover the history while also including current music. Five years ago, that led me to start a second show (when I retired from my job and had more available time) called OutRadio, just for current music. So, it's the fifth anniversary of that show, and that one is online only.

For my QMH anniversary show, I am doing something I have never done-a show focusing not on our music history, but on my favorite songs that span over eight decades. So for those wondering about the music I personally adore, that's my January show that you can find at queermusicheritage.com/jan2015.html, or by coming through the front door of the website at queermusicheritage.com.

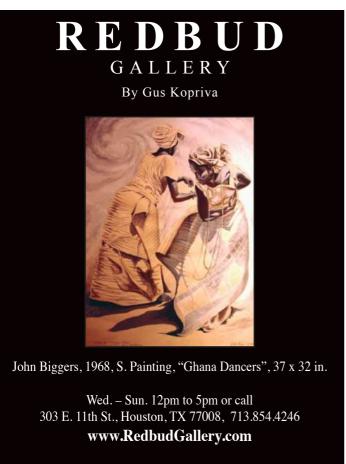












# Dan Stevens (former Downton Abbey star)

In 2007 Frin Davies' VW Beetle was vandalized with a graffiti slur while she was at a Pride event. Rather than

be ashamed of what happened, the art-teacher-turned-activist drove around with the word faa on her car for a year before getting it remodeled as the "Fagbug." She then hit the road with her loud, out, and proud message to raise awareness of LGBT rights. Fagbug Nation takes you behind the wheel of what it's like to drive the now-famous Fagbug. With six years of touring under her belt, the director and activist had her mind set on getting her car to all 50 states, Hawaii and Alaska being the final two. To pull this off, she went 54 days without a car as it traveled on five boats, and she flew on 14 planes. The Fagbug gets lei'd in Hawaii and drives into the midnight sun in Alaska. While on the road, Davies meets a diverse cast of characters and recounts what she's experienced over the past half-decade: praise (from those who have been helped to find their own voices), condemnation (from bigots and from those within the LGBT community who don't agree with her methods), confusion, and applause. 'npopular opinion: I didn't find director Craig Johnson's  $The\ Skeleton\ Twins$ to be "really funny," as so many critics have claimed. And going into a movie that stars Saturday Night Live veterans Kristen Wiig and Bill Hader, funny is what's to be expected. Instead, I'm going to agree with Rolling Stone when it called the film "heart-crushingly real." The Skeleton Twins gives you the unexpected—an honest, character-driven story. And that's exactly what makes this film absolutely superb.

The film opens with dental hygienist Maggie Dean (Wiig) staring at a fistful of sleeping pills—on the brink of committing suicide—when her phone rings. Her twin brother, Milo (Hader), is in the hospital after slitting his wrists in a suicide attempt of his own. Just like a sibling to mess up your plans for the day.

Milo, a failed Hollywood actor, is lonely and depressed following a recent breakup with his boyfriend. When Maggie arrives at the hospital, it's the first time the twins have seen each other in 10 years. In an attempt to break the silence,

Milo jokes, "Look at me, another tragic gay cliché."

Maggie, being a loyal sister despite their estrangement, insists that Milo should come to stay with her and her husband, Lance (Luke Wilson), in their upstate New York hometown. Lance reads like an inspirational-quote poster—an easygoing man's man whose positive outlook on life is annoyingly overthe-top. He and Maggie make for an oddball couple—instead of their personalities balancing each other out, they exaggerate each other's extremes. The more depressed she becomes, the more he seems to try and compensate.

The reason behind the twins' estrangement isn't initially addressed, but it's soon revealed that it's due—at least in part to an inappropriate affair that Milo had with one of his high school English teachers, Rich (Ty Burrell), as a teenager. Soon after Milo moves in with Maggie, he looks up Rich (who is still closeted, living with his girlfriend and son) in an attempt to rekindle their flame.

Although Milo is now an adult, the vibe that Rich gives off when the two are together

still feels predatory. Rich gives Milo false hope by sleeping with him, only to treat him coldly the following morning. His true motive, we find out, is to have Milo read his film script, as he's under the impression that Milo is a successful actor with an agent back in Los Angeles.

Maggie has some skeletons in her closet as well. Although she's finally found the "nice guy" every girl seems to desperately seek, she's not in love or even satisfied with her marriage. Instead, she's secretly having sex with her scuba instructor—something that doesn't fulfill her either. Caught up in what seems to be an endless funk, Maggie also hides her birth control around the house instead of telling her husband she's not ready to have kids. As Milo says, "He's good. Maybe good isn't your thing."

Despite the serious subject matter, there are some delightfully comedic moments-in Wiig and Hader's signature crowd-pleasing style—scattered throughout the film. The pair rocks a hilarious lip-sync scene to the '80s hit "Nothing's Gonna Stop Us Now," and the look on an intoxicated Milo's face when he goes to a local gay bar looking to pick up someone, only to find out it's "dyke night," is priceless.

Like most twins, Maggie and Milo share each other's pain and failures without even trying. But the most beautiful part of the story is when the pair realizes that the solution to fixing their situations may lie in fixing their relationship with one another.

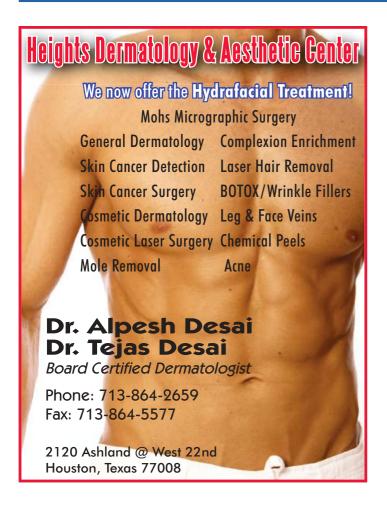

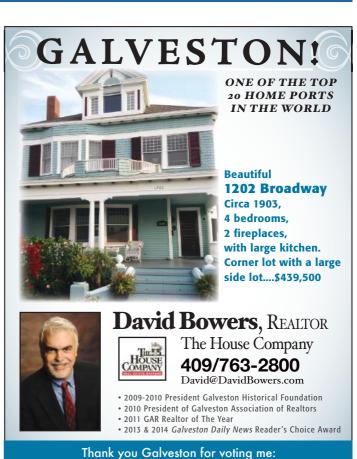

### 'Shameless'

Father does not know best

ver the past few years, TV has blossomed with more diverse portrayals of gender and sexual identity. with series like Orange Is the New Black and Transparent blowing the past away. But there are few spaces in our culture that celebrate the alternative, self-made families seen on Family Guy and Modern Family and reject the conservative stay-at-home-mom model. Many of us don't belong with our parents in the suburbs anymore. Shameless, which begins its fifth season on Showtime on January 11, has a different message for sons and daughters who want to embrace their difference: father does not know

Frank Gallagher (William H. Macy) personifies this ideal. As Chicago's most unkillable alcoholic, Macy roars around the screen like a genie out of the bottle: manic, fearless, and nonplussed by consequences. He lives by his own hobo code, replete with political philosophy

best. In fact, he might even be a

total moron.

that none of his bar-mates want to hear. He wakes up in all manner of places: dumpsters, under the snow, and once, in Mexico.

But at least Frank is consistent; his six children know not to expect any parental support. Led by Fiona (Emmy Rossum), the Gallagher brood relies on one another to maintain their decrepit home and make the gas bill. Together with their neighborhood friends, they build a family dynamic on survival and

dependability, not on moral hierarchies. "I trust you," Fiona says to her first love, Steve. "That's bigger to me than 'I love you."

With Frank doing Godknows-what God-knows-where, it's up to Fiona to hold the family together. But with a penchant for dangerous men and selfdestructive behavior, Fiona may be inching toward her father's legacy. The other siblings are not that far off, either. Lip (Jeremy Allen White), blessed with an abnormally high IQ, could be bound for greatness, but with every stumble, he convinces himself that he will never leave the neighborhood. When Ian (Cameron Monaghan) begins to

exhibit symptoms of his mother's bipolar disorder, his siblings share looks of concern, but not of surprise. For the Gallaghers, inheritance is nothing more than a time bomb.

But it's not all that grim, really. Shameless is driven by the same daredevil mania as American Horror Story or even Jackass, and at its best portrays sickening behavior as a part of survival. Frank has outdone himself every season: he's been used

> as a drug mule, tried his hand at male prostitution, and lost-and regaineda liver. I'd love a whirl in 3D, if only to better enjoy

the phantasmagoria of shattering beer bottles, dripping sweat, gushing fluids, exposed buttocks, and the occasional cadaver.

Sex on Shameless may take place behind bodega freezers and under bridges, but it has never felt detached, especially for Ian and his thug lover, Mickey (Noel Fisher). Their passionate and

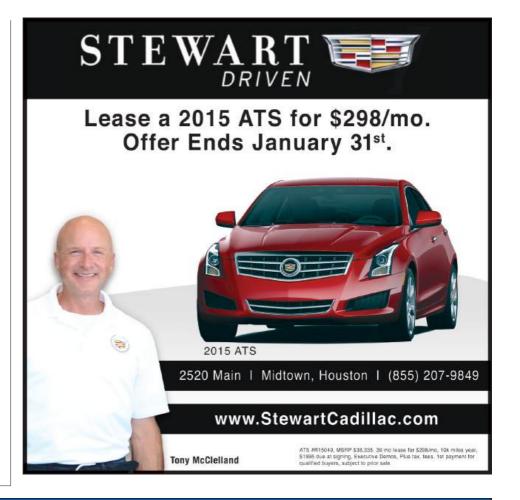
often bloody confrontations return a sense of curiosity and even danger to gay sexuality on TV. Not every couple needs to be nice, or suburban, or safe.

Like Game of Thrones, Shameless has a bad habit of punishing its female characters for no good reason. Particularly disappointing are Lip's girlfriends, who have all acted like jealous psychopaths when meeting one another. Mandy (Emma Greenwell), Lip's most consistent love, has suffered too many physical wounds of poor creative taste over the years. The writers of Shameless flirt masterfully with taboo, but their missteps in certain touchy areas have left too many characters-dare I say it?-shamed.

The show has careened into nonsense and lost its moral footing before, and likely will again. But Shameless' mission to portray outsiders at the extreme edge of the American dream will likely never get stale. The Gallagher children have a great many hereditary woes to contend with, and some will likely succumb to the shadow of their parents. No matter how strong our self-made families are, we can never escape our upbringing. But who wouldn't want to watch us try?

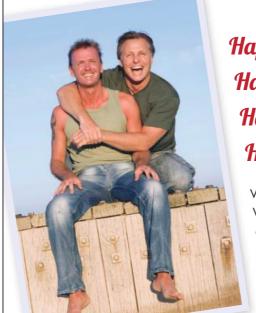

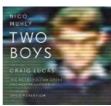

recordings released between 1997 and 2004, the five Teldec and Warner Classics albums do a solid job of spotlighting Isbin's outstanding fretwork and guitar skills. These albums—Journey to the Amazon (on which she is ioined by saxophonist Paul Winter), Dreams of a World (featuring folk-inspired guitar music by Theodorakis and others), Guitar Concertos (with music composed by Christopher Rouse and Tan Dun), Baroque Favorites for Guitar (with compositions by Bach and Vivaldi), and Concierto de Aranjuez (featuring the music of Rodrigo, Villa-Lobos, and Ponce) are all splendid achievements, each complementing the other.

Queer organist Cameron Carpenter's If You Could Read My Mind (Sony Classical) is his most daring album by far, and marks the debut recording of his International Touring Organ. While it's probably unlikely that Carpenter (an OutSmart coverboy in 2013) will ever achieve the kind of crossover success that he rightfully deserves (perhaps a dance remix would do the trick), it's not hard to admire his substantial talent. What's especially striking is the inclusion of both original compositions (such as "Music for an Imaginary Film"), as well as his renditions of 20th-century pop tunes, including the Gordon Lightfoot-penned title tune, Burt Bacharach's "Alfie," Leonard Cohen's "Sisters of Mercy," and Anthony Newley and Leslie Bricusse's "Pure Imagination." The limited deluxe edition of If You Could Read My Mind includes a DVD containing the doc Birth of the International Touring Organ.

Beginning with 1990's acclaimed Cole Porter tribute Red Hot + Blue, which featured a stellar assortment of queer and queerfriendly artists, including Sinead O'Connor, Jimmy Somerville, Erasure, k.d. lang, Annie Lennox, U2, Debbie Harry and Iggy Pop, and the late Kirsty MacColl and the Pogues, singing Porter tunes, the Red Hot Organization launched a series of AIDS fundraising albums that continue to be issued to this day. Covering a variety of genres (indie, country, dance, Latin, Brazilian, African, alternative, and jazz, to mention a few) and calling on an incredible array of talent (Antony, Sharon Jones, David Byrne, Grizzly Bear, Meshell Ndegocello with Herbie Hancock, Bebel Gilberto, Angelique Kidjo, George Michael, Natalie Merchant, Smashing Pumpkins, Patti Smith, Bob Mould, Pavement, Dolly Parton, Wilco with Syd Straw, and Future Bible Heroes), the Red Hot compilations are something to look forward to, and all in the name of a worthy cause.  $Red\ Hot + Bach$ (Masterworks), one of the Red Hot Organization's 2014 releases, is akin to the work that Cameron Carpenter is doing in that it features a variety of hip artists (such as Chris Thile, Mia Doi Todd, Shara Worden, and Julianna Barwick) performing the music of J.S. Bach for an audience (read: generation) that might not necessarily have Bach in its iTunes playlist.

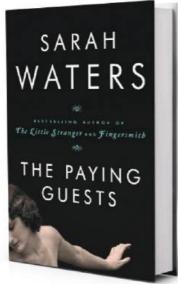

# **Paying More than Asked**

'The Paying Guests' by Sarah Walters



uch has been written about the British schizophrenia about homosexuality, which has been both ignored and criminalized by the state. It has a long history among young men in public universities, e.g. Oxford, producing iconic books about male lovers who met at school. Yet the 1895 sodomy trial of Oscar Wilde, one of England's most glittering literary idols, was the talk of turn-of-century Europe. Everyone was suitably

scandalized, while tickets for

his plays continued to sell out.

British writer Radclyffe Hall's first novel (The Well of Loneliness, 1928) was banned in both the U.S. and U.K. for many years, despite its grim warning about engaging in same-sex love or hoping for any kind of long-term relationships. The tortured public romances of author Vita Sackville-West and Violet Treyfusis (who escaped their husbands and eloped to Paris)—and also Sackville-West and more famous British writer Virginia Woolf (A Room The Paying Guests by Sarah Waters 2014 • Riverhead Books (penguin.com) 576 pages • \$28.95 Hardcover

> of One's Own, 1928)—were held up as cautionary tales for a younger generation. The Well of Loneliness was only allowed to be openly distributed in 1948, after

Hall's death. Wilde and Hall both paid mightily for their open lives.

But England has produced many out lesbian writers in recent years. Best known in America are Emma Donohue. Sarah Waters, and Jeanette Winterson, all of whom are critically admired and popular with the reading public. Less well-known but fine writers are Clare Ashton, H.P. Munro, crime novelist Val McDermid, and Jackie Kav.

Winterson's first novel (Oranges Are Not the Only Fruit, 1985) won her almost instant celebrity and a shelf of awards, including an OBE. Donohue writes great fiction for both a general audience and gay women, but her overview of lesbian writing over the centuries (Inseparable: Literature between Women, 2010) is a must-read.

Sarah Waters' first novel, Tipping the Velvet, was both a shocker and a great work in 1998. The title refers to a Victorian pornographic name for cunnilingus, so it was clear from the beginning that this book was going to be both romantic and erotic. Moreover. the BBC made a film from the

book, which followed closely the adventure of young Nan, who fell in love with a male impersonator, Kitty, and followed her to London. Later Nan becomes a male impersonator herself, in an act with Kitty, to bond the couple closer together.

From the oeuvres of Donohue, Waters, and Winterson, Americans have learned more about the fluidity of female sexual identity and gender, which has existed for centuries in Europe and the U.K. What had been largely ignored is the lesbian love affair, which has never received the kind of literary acceptance like male classics such as Evelyn Waugh's Brideshead Revisited or Somerset Maugham's The Razor's Edge.

Now Waters' newest novel, The Paving Guests, has again been praised by critics, and named an Amazon Best Book of 2014 and a top book by Barnes and Noble. It reflects a prominent historical time, 1922, between the two World Wars, when England was suffering the loss of many of its young men, and in anticipation of yet another war with Germany. Yet because of Waters' skill and detail, the novel is achingly contemporary.

Mrs. Wray and her daughter, Frances, 26, live together in reduced circumstances after the death of their husband and father, who left a nasty pile of debts. To make ends meet, they agree to rent part of their large family home to a married couple of lower class. (Class, lesbian sexuality, and the place of women in the U.K. through the years are all familiar Waters themes.) So Leonard and Lilian Barbour move in with the Wrays. The small rent the Barbours pay is enough to relax the Wrays about their debts and to keep their home.

Frances has been aware of her lesbianism for some time: she had a romance with Christina, but they remained friends after an embarrassing end to their affair (discovery, drama, separation). Her solution is to be celibate and work hard within the family home, doing all those tasks once done by servants when the Wrays were more financially secure.

While Leonard is at work, Lilian reads, smokes, pampers herself, and rearranges furniture. Obviously, she is bored. What interrupts her ennui is one of the most earthshaking events she could have imagined-a deep passion she had never anticipated, which cannot be denied. Frances is equally surprised, fascinated, and then lost in the tsunami. All of this leads to a tragedy (two, some readers would say) and twist after twist in this romance-as-mystery novel.

Here's an example of what's waiting on the page: Waters foreshadows the explosion of desire by comparing it with the shelling of a boiled egg on a picnic planned by Lilian and Frances on their first day together, as "... the eggs gave up their shells as if shrugging off cumbersome coats." Elegant bodice-ripping and skirt-lifting follow the shrugging.

# 'Hotel Volkswagen'

Politician/actor/writer Jón Gnarr is a serious supporter of LGBT rights

'ón Gnarr is sort of like the Icelandic Al Franken—a comedic writer and actor-turned-politician. Except he's funnier. And more brilliant.

He's also a serious supporter of human rights and the LBGT community, having led his city's 2010 Pride parade dressed in drag.

Having finished his four-year stint of mayor of Reykjavík, Iceland, he is returning to his roots, and this month Houstonians will have a chance to sample his wit as Mildred's Umbrella Theater Company hosts the first Texas reading of his play Hotel Volkswagen. The absurdist play follows a man, Palme, and his son, Little Ziggy, whose car breaks down near the Hotel Volkswagen. They check in while the front desk manager, who is also a mechanic, tries to repair the car. But will they check out? Turns out everyone at the hotel has an interesting past, including a gender-bending couple that longs for children and a nostalgic former Nazi. The play premiered in Iceland in 2012, and while many Houstonians may not be familiar with Gnarr, the staged reading will serve as an introduction to his work before he arrives here this spring to serve as the first CENHS



Writer-in-Residence at Rice University during the spring semester. While here, he'll work on the third volume of his fictionalized autobiography.

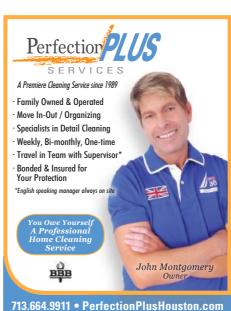

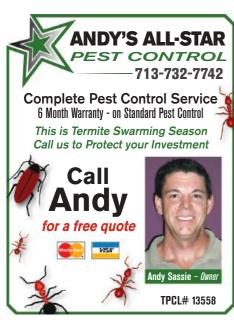

a small craft/handmade business was born. I want to remind folks that this was in the mid-'90s and there wasn't much consciousness about recycling. I was determined to change that mindset."

In 2000, Neumann purchased a warehouse to use as a woodworking studio. After a few years of ownership, her friends encouraged her to build a second-story addition to make more space for other artists to rent and create in—ultimately creating six studios. "I invested more of my own money and went

ahead with designing a working environment primarily out of secondhand found objects," she says. "I just went to town creating an environment for other artists to enjoy working in."

Neumann now works primarily with sign letters and scrap license platesdonating many of her creations back to

the city. The Reuse Center, the Green Building Resource Center, and the in-progress Smither Park adjacent to the University of Houston all display pieces of Neumann's metal letter work.

The artist was overjoyed upon hearing she had won first place in the city's reuse contest, noting it brought tears to her eyes.

"For years I was misunderstood about what I was trying to achieve," Neumann says. "Folks kept saying, 'Are you going to get a job?' Now, to be recognized by my peers for creating something from nothing is a long-awaited taste of validation."

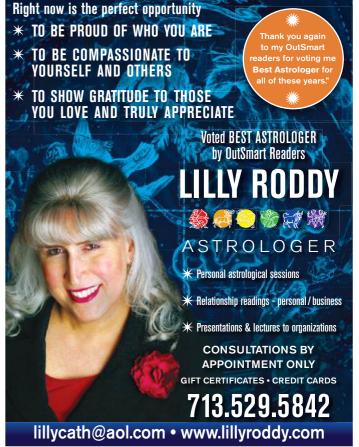
The contest was coordinated by The Reuse Warehouse, a component of the City of Houston Solid Waste Management Department. Judges included Mayor Annise Parker, Solid Waste director Harry Hayes, and Dan Phillips, founder of Phoenix Commotion, a local recycled- and salvagedmaterial building initiative.

Neumann sells her work in local markets and statewide stores, and encourages others to buy

handmade products from local artisans. She continues to participate in art festivals, galleries, and shows across Texas. "I just hitch up and go," she says. "I feel like I have a new 'license' on life!"
