

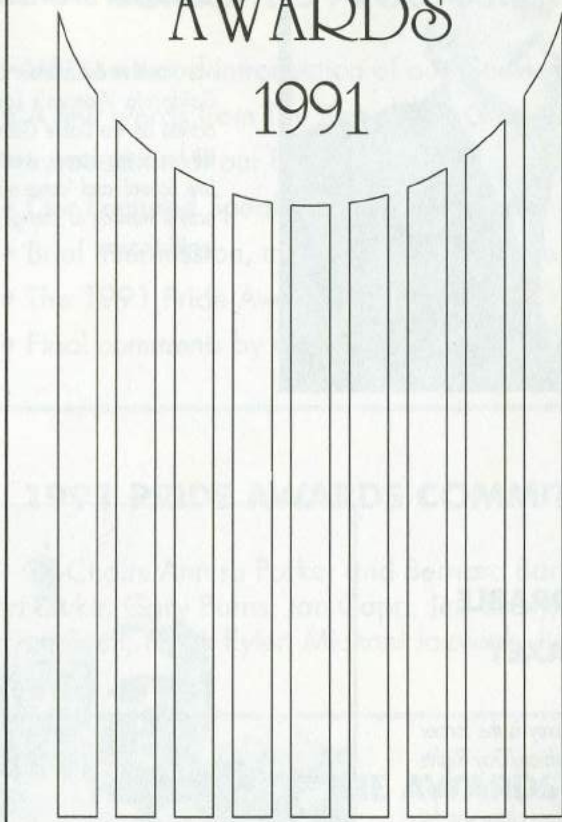

SHEILA JAMES KUEHL

Ms. Kuehl is the founder of the Southern California Women's Law Center. An actress on the Dobie Gillis Show, Sheila left her acting career, went on to Harvard Law School, and "came out" as a lesbian activist working to change laws to further feminist causes.

THE HONORABLE GLEN MAXEY

The Honorable Glen Maxey is the former Executive Director of Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby of Texas. For four years, Rep. Maxey worked as a tireless champion for the rights of gay and lesbian Texans and for a saner state AIDS policy. He was elected to the state House of Representatives on March 6, 1991 and is the first openly gay, elected Texas state official.

Promoting Pride WITHIN THE COMMUNITY

▼ BERING COMMUNITY SERVICE FOUNDATION

The BERING CARE CENTER is a place for people to gather, Monday through Friday, who are HIV+, have ARC or AIDS. The Care Center provides an emotionally safe environment that enhances quality of life by providing an accepting and caring family atmosphere in which people's basic life necessities can be met and their personhood respected.



▼ TEXAS GAY RODEO ASSOCIATION

The Houston Chapter of TGRA embodies the objectives of elevating the image of gay men and women in the sports field of rodeo and raises monies for charity through the staging of an annual rodeo. Since TGRA was formed in 1983, they have returned approximately one million dollars to local and state wide charities.

▼ PRIDE WEEK PARADE 1990

The Pride Parade 1990 had a record number of entries and was the longest gay pride parade to date. The first Gay Pride Parade was held on Sunday, July 1, 1979 and crowds were estimated at 10-12,000. In its twelve year history, the parade has traditionally been held on the last Sunday of pride week. Each year the parade has grown in size and diversity of its participants. The parade is a subcommittee of Houston Gay/Lesbian (Lesbian/Gay) Pride Week festivities.

▼ MONTROSE CLINIC

MONTROSE
C·L·I·N·I·C

The Montrose Clinic was founded in 1981 to meet the sexually transmitted disease diagnostic and treatment needs of gay men. It developed PACE (Program for AIDS Counseling and Evaluation) in 1983, which was the first HIV testing/counseling program in Houston. The Clinic is still at the forefront of the fight against AIDS. It is a United Way agency, offers HIV case management for the hearing impaired, is a pharmacy for the dispensation of state-funded AZT, pentamidine and bactrim.

▼ STATE REPRESENTATIVE GLEN MAXEY

The Honorable Glen Maxey is the former Executive Director of Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby of Texas. His experience as a legislative aide and community activist allowed him to take the reins of the lobby at a critical time and lead it into its first full-time presence at the capital. He worked for the repeal of section 21.06 of the Texas Penal Code. He was elected to the Texas House of Representatives in March 1991.

▼ NAMES PROJECT HOUSTON



The NAMES Project Houston was founded in 1988 and is part of the national NAMES Project organization. A past Pride Awards recipient, its goals are to illustrate the urgency and enormity of the AIDS epidemic, build a symbol of remembrance, raise funds and encourage support for people living with AIDS and their families. Programs include workshops to help create memorial panels and community outreach and education.

◀ FELIX GARCIA ▶

Mr. Garcia is a member of the Mexican American Democrats of Houston and Gay/Lesbian Hispanics Unidos. He is a long-time member of Miss Camp America, a past Diana Show dancer, past board trustee of the Montrose Activity Center, GLHU's Mr. Baile 1988. Mr. Garcia has co-chaired Houston March on Austin '89 committee, Baile '89 committee, Team Houston '90, and Houston Lesbian/Gay Pride Week '91.



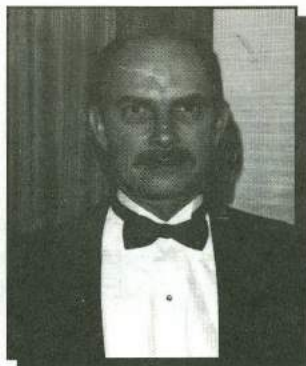
◀ JACK JACKSON

For over 10 years, Mr. Jackson has been a fundraising fixture for almost every community organization. In early 1983, he got a few friends together and met with the then "Karposi-Sarcoma Committee (later the AIDS Foundation) and helped establish the first team of "buddies" to PWA's and worked to establish McAdory House and later Stone Soup. He has assisted with Pride Week and has been active with Houston Gay Lesbian Political Caucus and Citizens for Human Equality. He has been honored by The Diana Foundation, 1990 Mayor's Volunteer of the Year, and is a 1991 Houston Gay Pride Parade Grand Marshall.



◀ CHUCK PATRICK ▶

A graduate of the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, Mr. Patrick majored in journalism, radio, and TV; and was a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity. Patrick moved to Texas in 1969 and was both Program Director and News Director for KRBE-104 FM before joining This Week in Texas (TWT) in the mid '70s serving as Publisher and News Director for 16 years.

◀ MARION COLEMAN

Ms. Coleman has been an activist in such diverse areas as the Houston Gay Political Caucus and the Republican Party, served as a board member or officer of dozens of community or professional organizations. She is the owner of House of Coleman and former owner of Kindred Spirits. She has received numerous awards including the 1991 MCCR Community Service Award and the 1988 Diana Foundation Humanitarian Award.



LINDA MORALES ▶

Ms. Morales' efforts have spanned Hispanic activism, to the feminist movement, to lesbian/gay liberation. She is the lead plaintiff in seeking to overturn section 21.06 of the Texas Penal Code. She currently serves as President of Mexican-American Democrats of Houston, founded AMIGA (a lesbian latina organization in Houston), serves on the board of The AIDS Equity League and LLEGO, former President of GLHU and is a 1991 Houston Gay Pride Parade Grand Marshall.



◀ ANNISE PARKER

A native Houstonian, Ms. Parker attended Rice University and graduated with three B.A. degrees, she is the co-owner of Inklings Bookshop and is employed in a major oil company. She is a former board member of Community Alliance, Montrose Activity Center, NAMES Project Houston, Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby, former president of Gay Lesbian Political Caucus and is the current co-chair of the Pride Awards.

▼ AIDS EQUITY LEAGUE

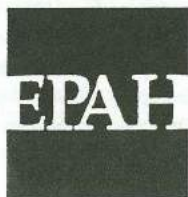
The AIDS Equity League is dedicated to insuring the equitable treatment of the gay atrisk community in local AIDS decision making. Formed in the Spring of 1990, their accomplishments include the defeat of the "HIV Health Care Plan" proposed by the Greater Houston AIDS Alliance and obtained over 5000 signatures for the "Take a Pledge Campaign" supporting non-discrimination of persons with HIV.

▼ COLT 45'S

The purpose of the Colt 45's, now in its fifteenth year as a non-profit western oriented charity and social organization, is to promote and raise funds for worthwhile local causes and to promote the western interest among all club members. Activities include helping restock The Stone Soup Pantry and provide financial assistance through their AIDS TroubleFund.



▼ EPAH



The Executive and Professional Association of Houston (EPAH) now in its fourteenth year, has a membership of over 230 men and women. EPAH provides a non-political forum for discussion of business and community affairs and offers opportunities for socializing and networking. Since 1988, EPAH has contributed in excess of \$52,000 to charitable organizations. The Leather and Lace party has been held annually in February for the past four years and is EPAH's major fundraiser.

▼ INKLINGS

Inklings—an alternative bookshop first opened its doors in 1988. Co-owners Pokey Anderson and Annise Parker, both former Houston Pride Week Parade Grand Marshalls, seek to combine their activism with their business. The store has become a committee meeting space and received the 1990 Houston Gay Lesbian Political Caucus Community Service award and is a past Pride Awards nominee.



▼ LOBO



LOBO opened in Dallas in December 1973. Its founder, Larry Lingle, was joined in 1978 by Bill White, his lover and partner. LOBO Houston was opened in 1986 and Bill and Larry moved to Houston in 1988. LOBO, the oldest gay and lesbian bookstore in Texas, continue to offer a wide range of merchandise for the community. LOBO has been honored by the HGLPC, 1990 Pride Awards and the "Spirit of Montrose" float trophy in the 1990 Gay Pride Parade.

▼ THIS WEEK IN TEXAS (TWT)

This Week in Texas (TWT) publishes and distributes a news magazine statewide, to hallmark the current activities of the Texas gay and lesbian community. Founded in 1975, TWT articles have covered social, political, spiritual, and entertainment aspects of gay and lesbian life as well as informed its readers nationwide of Texas fundraisers and national special events of interest.

▼ DIANA FOUNDATION AWARDS 1990

Founded in 1952, the Diana Foundation is a tax-exempt organization established to provide for health and social services, educational endeavors and cultural advancements of the gay/lesbian community. Their focus remains concentrated on the AIDS crisis. Benefactors include AIDS Foundation, PWA Coalition, McAdory House, Houston Assistance Fund, Colt 45's, and The Montrose Clinic.
