





Message from Deborah Bell - Female Co-Chair

When one has an opportunity such as this to make a statement to the whole community there is an intense desire to be sagacious, inspiring and memorable. How I would dearly love to say exactly the right thing to touch each of you and to provide motivation for you to be involved in

Lesbian/Gay Pride Week 1988.

The implications of this year's theme, "Rightfully Proud," are many. The year that has passed since last June has been one filled with activities and events which we as lesbian and gay people can be We proud. demonstrated Washington, D.C. on October 11, 1987 in numbers over half a million strong. We carried a message to this nation that "for love, and for life... we're not going back." We were able to experience the power that exists for us by being visible in large numbers.

continues to Our community devastated by the AIDS epidemic. We are meeting the challenge with education, funding, providing care and by being politically active. Our loss, dramatically represented by the NAMES Project quilt that was displayed here May 7-8, is immense. We came together as a community to grieve for our lost family, friends, lovers and thousands we will never have a chance to know. We were touched by the love and compassion expressed. We also made important connections with the larger community of this city, as we both put aside our differences. This horrible tragedy has opened doors for understanding

and acceptance in many ways.

A few months ago, Joann Loulan, lesbian psychologist and author, appeared with a panel of other lesbians on the Oprah Winfery Show. The show was controversial in the lesbian community for a variety of reasons. There was a disappointment that the show really wasn't very good for us from a public relations standpoint. There has been a lot of criticism about the way the women were presented, what they said, how they said, how they were dressed, etc. Middle America may not have understood what these women were saying, but I'm sure there are thousands of lesbians who agree with them and thousands more audience members who could and did get their The thing that caught my attention the most about this program is the following: when they were being



The gay and community in Houston lesbian coalesce, become a unit that is RIGHTFULLY PROUD and willing to attack any issue head

As people more and more involved, Pride Week will continue to grow into something we can all be more proud of, not only because it will be better, but also because it will be WE not THEY that run the show. Infighting must cease

and unity must come forward.

"I have a dream..." begins one of the world's most eloquent speeches by Martin Luther King, Jr. King was and is a major factor in the fight for black civil rights. Many of those same words also Harvey Milk planted seeds apply to us. which may one day become important to a newcomer, someone just coming out who needs to hear about a kid in Altuna, Pennsylvania, excited to hear Harvey's election.

Remember what it was like for you to be THE ONLY ONE? Most, if not all, of us have been there at some point in our lives. Wasn't it wonderful to find out there were others that felt what you felt, and even better yet, people who weren't afraid to express that where Jenny Q. Public could take notice. And the feeling inside when you saw two men or two women kiss for the page 6

first time. That exhilirating feeling of pride that surged forth and the happiness I felt on that occasion is one I will

never forget.

Happiness and fulfillment are part of what come with being out. Those people who aren't out think they won't discovered and worry constantly about being found out. "Where will you be when they come?" is a poem written by Pat Parker a number of years ago to emphasize the need for coming out. When they come to take us away, it won't matter whether we are out or not, they are going to find us. Hiding is not a deterrent when Nazism or McCarthyism come into play. Is it really easier for these people to hide? Maybe, but I don't believe anyone who IS out would agree. If we ALL come out, EVERYONE would know someone gay lesbian. Think how the world would change overnite if it happened.

If you're not out, come out and join US in the parade. Wear a paper bag over your head if you must, but at least be counted. If you're not involved, don't ask what THEY are doing, ask yourself why you're not involved. Many talents are needed to make Pride Week the success it is. Become one of US, and let's put the THEY syndrome

to bed forever.

Boots are being polished; trumpeteers clean their horns. Chains and locks forged; the crusade has begun. They will not come a mob rolling through the streets, But quickly and quietly move into our homes

Everytime we heard "I don't mind gays, but why must they be blatant", And said nothing, it was an act of perversion.

Everytime we let a lesbian mother lose her child, And did not fill the courtrooms, it was an act of perversion.

Everytime we let straights make out in our bars, While we couldn't touch because of the laws, it was an act of perversion.

Everytime we put on the proper clothes to go to a family wedding, And left our lovers at home, it was an act of perversion.

Everytime we heard "Who I go to bed with is my personal choice - It's personal, not political," and said nothing, it was an act of perversion

Everytime we let straight relatives bury our dead and push our lovers away It was an act of perversion.

And they will come for the perverts. And it won't matter if you're homosexual, not a faggot, Lesbian not a dyke, gay not queer.

It won't matter if you own your own business, Have a good job or an SSI.

It won't matter if you're black, chicano, native american, asian or white.

It won't matter if you're from New York or Los Angeles, Galveston or Sioux Falls.

It won't matter if you're butch or femme, not into roles, Monogamous, non-monogamous.


It won't matter if you're Catholic, Baptist, Atheist, Jewish or MCC.

Lesbian/Gay Pride Week History

"One of the more volatile and emotional social movements in the nation's history emerged on a summer night 19 years ago at a ramshackle bar in New York City's Greenwich Village."

"At 3 a.m. on June 28, 1969, police raided the Stonewall Inn, investigating alleged liquor violations. Until then raids regarded as routine harassment of bars catering to homosexuals had met only

token opposition."

Within minutes, however, more than 400 people had gathered in nearby Sheridan Square and a riot erupted. More distur-

bances followed the next night."

"A minority shrouded in mystery, fear, self-depracation and widespread looting decided it had enough. It was the Lexington of the gay rights movement, a gathering of forces and the beginning of a tumarch." (Ledwell, Tony. "Stonewall opened gay activism age." AP 1979)

The true story of events surrounding the Stonewall riots has always been a bit elusive, and media accounts printed at the time appear as blatantly biased and notably lacking in factual detail. However, the above quotes tell the story most widely known, and the results of the night in New York City can been seen today as the national gay and lesbian community grows in both influence and stature in our society.

In 1970, Morris Kight of L.A. was responsible for the "Remember Stonewall" vigil that became a yearly event around

the country.

In 1975, the first gay and lesbian march in Texas was held in Dallas as a part of the Stonewall remembrance. community activists in Houston held a widely attended new conference that summer which announced, among other events, the formation of a political coalition that has become the Houston Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus.

In 1976, an estimated 200 people held a march in downtown Houston to commemorate the Stonewall riots, which was sponsored by the fledgling Gay Activist Alliance of

the University of Houston.

Singer and former beauty queen Anita Bryant's appearance as featured entertainer for the Texas Bar Association convention in 1977 brought an estimated 6000 angry gays and lesbians down Houston's streets in protest. The heavily publicized march, headed by such notables as gay publisher David Goodstein and Rev. Troy Perry of the Metropolitan Community Church, was in vivid reaction to Ms. Bryant's ordinance then in effect in Miami, Florida. A few weeks later, Houston's gay and lesbian community held its first Gay Pride Rally in Cherryhurst Park to celebrate what has become a national holiday for lesbian and gay people.

Over 4500 community activists met at Astroarena in 1978 for Town Meeting I, the first organizational gathering in Houston that included gay and lesbian people from every aspect of Houston society. Former state legislator and vice-presidential nominee Frances "Sissy" Ferenthold was the keynote speaker; and the meeting was chaired by Virginia Apuzzo, a leading gay activist who became executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force in New York. Many of Houston's gay and lesbian services, including the Montrose Clinic, were formulated and organized at this first historic meeting. The first full week of events commemorating our pride in being free gay and lesbian Americans was held in this year.

Since 1979, the community of Houston has celebrated Lesbian/Gay Pride Week with a full schedule of events spanning more than a week in late June. More than 70 gay and lesbian related organizations sponsor a variety of events for the entire community, ranging from judged art to athletic events and everything in between.

Changes, as always, are again in store for this year. Floats and trophies are back, and in addition to the two Grand Marshals, this year also arrives with two Honorary Grand Marshals - Harvey Milk and Sharon Kowalski. The parade will again be broadcast live on KPFT 90.1 FM. changes and updates to the Pride Week schedule of events, listen to KPFT's programming listed elsewhere in The Guide.



mis-represented, when they were challenged with asinine questions, when they faced hostility - this group of seven women took each other's hands, held tightly and were fearless, as they spoke the truth, over and over and over. I believe this is what we should do. This is where we will find our strength. We should hold each other's hands and love one another through these hard times. And we must continue to speak the truth in a fearless manner in our quest for full rights.

In closing I would like to share the following from "The Strength of Women" by Nancy Berano. It certainly speaks to me as a feminist and I think its philosophy is an excellent one for the gay and

lesbian movement as well.

"The movement is cyclical. Caring for ourselves, ourselves making strong, passing the knowledge of our strengths through our bodies, our minds, our spirits, our actions - to the generation. Practicing independence, asking the essential questions, listening to voices that speak truthfully, being able to say in a world often hostile to our very existence, this is who I am. This is my life. Facing challenges, pulling of others when we have to, holding back at times, acknowledging our fears and becoming less afraid of losing (as well as winning) in the process. Hanging with our friends, looking for support and approval, recognizing the differences - age, race, ethnicity, ability, class, preference/orientation - that separate us, learning to experience others fully while feeling grounded in ourselves. the limit, testing how far we can go each time, treating ourselves gently when we make mistakes, when we fail, believing that there are new possibilities and searching them out. Achieving against heavy odds, enjoying the thrill of the moment, while preparing for the longer haul, finding unexplored personal resources, suprising even ourselves. Raising up those who come after, teaching them what we have learned, equipping them keep their histories (herstories) alive, to seek what is life-affirming for themselves and their loved ones, being taught by them. Doing work we believe in, earning our respect in spite of being devauled as women, increasing our skills and figuring out ways to put them to

better use, working hard and taking pleasure in it. Recognizing our both. where we have been and where we are moving, looking at life directly liking who we are. Creating community, making space where we can be together, sharing resources and stories and love, having fun. Continuing the work of a lifetime, or growing into a new awareness, acting to shape the world, perfecting, honing, letting go. Giving out and getting back. The movement is cyclical.





On October, 11, 1988, hundreds of thousands of gay and lesbian persons will participate in a bold, new, national campaign: National Coming Out Day, '88: Take Your Next Step.

"This is a grass-roots project designed to include everyone in our community. NATIONAL COMING OUT DAY will build individual self-esteem and commitment, energize our local communities, and increase our national visibility and strength," announced Jean O'Leary, Executive Director of the National Gay Rights Advocates, which will co-sponsor the event with The Experience Weekend.

NATIONAL COMING OUT DAY '88 jointly supported by all major national gay and lesbian organizations, and will enlist the active support of more than 8000 local and state gay and lesbian groups across the country, as well community's local as the national media.


"A national coming out day is an idea whose time has come," declares Rob Eichberg, founder and key spokesperson for The Experience Weekend. "As last year's March on Washington showed, this is a community that is growing and thriving; we are determined to bring that spirit home - to show our strength, our rich cultural diversity, and our boundless creativity and vitality - even in the face of the AIDS epidemic."

The National Coming Out Campaign will encourage "take your individual to next step," on October 11, wherever it is on the coming out "Everyone continuum: can participate," O'Leary NGRA's explains. "One lesbian might find the courage to come out to son's PTA; a gay man might choose to engage in civil disobedience for the first time; a teenager might finally be able to admit to herself she's gay. There are countless ways to be involved. Our job campaign coordinators will be encourage widespread participation

from every corner of our community and our organized movement, and to act as a clearing-house for the hundreds of innovative ideas this campaign will engender."

Jean O'Leary concludes: advancement of our movement, elimination of our oppression, in the hands of every individual gay and lesbian. With the help of local and national all our organized groups, this campaign will take the gay movement's most basic form of both personal and political liberation - coming out and expand it into a broad, creative action that can country." across the Adds Eichberg, "We have an opportunity to take a bold collective step forward as a movement because the bravery of each of us individuals. This single our history can release enormous power."



Bruce William Cook - Male Grand Marshal



Bruce William Cook is our Male Grand Marshal for 1988. He describes himself as "a true tenacious and stubborn Taurus, born during the full moon, May 5, 1955, in Wilmington, Delaware." Growing up in Pittsburg, Philadelphia and Detroit, Bruce was named one of "Who's Who Among American High School Students" and was on the Dean's List for five terms at Montgomery County Community College (Michigan) after which he was offered a scholastic scholarship at Michigan State University.

In 1977, with one term left to go, Bruce became disillusioned with school, dropped out and began working for a wholesale wallcovering distributor where he soon established and ran the customer service department. Following the love of his life, he left for Fort Lauderdale in 1979 and to Houston in 1981 where he says "the relationship didn't last, but Houston has."

Bruce became active in the community in 1986 - "With friends dying, I needed a coping mechanism, and volunteering with AIDS Foundation Houston seemed to me the best way to make a difference." With his background in management and food, Bruce took over Stone Soup in January 1987 as coordinator and helped build the pantry from "a pile of assorted bags of food, to its mini-grocery store status. My work with Stone Soup gave me the opportunity to

meet and work with many wonderful community leaders while building the support that keeps the pantry stocked."

The Honorable Debra Danburg sponsored a Texas House Resolution recognizing the work done by Bruce and the pantry to feed PWAs and was just recently nominated to the Mayor's Outstanding Volunteer of the Year award. Bruce has become very active in the PWA Coalition Houston. As a newly diagnosed PWA, Bruce says the Coalition "is developing into a strong force in the Houston community for addressing the needs of PWAs and I feel my efforts and actions will accomplish a lot through them."

Most recently, Bruce was involved with NAMES Project Houston in bringing the quilt to the city. "What needs said about this wonderful project except that it MUST be seen by everyone. It is one of the most touching and moving things I've ever experienced, and I wanted to assure that Houston would have a display that would

boost us all up."

"As a final comment," Bruce said, "I've always watched the Houston Pride Parades and cheered US on. I have even been lucky enough to participate twice. The parades have been a time of great pride and community unity. So, as just a 'no body' who raised his hand and said 'I'll try that,' I'm truly honored to be recognized in such a special way by MY OWN community."

Eleanor Munger, our Female Grand Marshal, was born in Ithaca, New York, in 1911, and grew up in a small town near there. From there, she went to Rollins College in Winter Park, Florida, before moving to New York City and later Kansas City, Missouri, moving to Houston to be near her daughter after the death of her husband in 1970.

Volunteering has been a way of life for Eleanor, beginning in New York City, where she served at a mission for Armenian children. In addition, she was involved in both church and her college alumnae association, as well as a pre-school for totally deaf children at the University of Kansas Medical Center.

After moving to Houston, Eleanor says, "I went back to school to study the Montessori Method. For fifteen good years, I taught children three and a half to six years of age at the School of the Woods. It was a delightful time."

"AIDS had appeared on the scene and I felt a heart's urge to help. In 1985, January 19th, I took the AIDS Foundation Training weekend for volunteers and the following Sunday went on duty at McAdory House. I served from 1 p.m. until 6 p.m. every Sunday until January 1986 when I set out with Michael Shuff to make my dream of Omega House into a reality."

"It was an exciting and discouraging venture, but more exciting than otherwise. The idea called to the most wonderful people of compassion and energy who made it possible for Omega House to serve fifty-one residents since we opened on August 29, 1986."

Among her other accomplishments, Eleanor has been awarded the Diana Award in 1987, named the Houston National Association of Social Workers: Public Citizen 1988 and YWCA Outstanding Woman of 1988 - Civic Leadership.

Sharon Kowalski - Honorary Female Grand Marshal

Our Honorary Female Grand Marshal is Sharon Kowalski, who, in November, 1983, was hit head-on by a drunk driver. Sharon was paralyzed from the waist down and suffered a "closed-head" brain injury. Some of Sharon's brain cells had been permanently damaged, while others were only partially injured and could be re-trained.

After surviving a five month state of semi-coma, Sharon responded quickly and effectively to the presence and therapy of Karen Thompson, her lover of four years at the time of the accident, and the professional staff at an excellent rehabilitation hospital in St. Cloud, Minnesota.

In order to protect Sharon's right to recovery and the highest quality of life in addition to their rights as a couple, Karen entered into a highly contested legal struggle with Sharon's parents for guardianship. In July, 1985, Sharon's father was granted full guardianship with unlimited power by the court system in Minnesota. Claiming that Sharon was totally incompetent, the Kowalski family moved Sharon to a maintenance-only rest home and disallowed any visits from Karen, Sharon's court-appointed attorney, the Minnesota Civil Liberties Union, and Sharon's friends. All this was done without a competency hearing and with videotaped evidence of Sharon's progress, returning abilities, and communicated wishes.


In their attempts to obtain guardianship over Sharon, Donald Kowalski (her father) and his attorney, Jack Fena, have denied Sharon's identity, relationship and her right and capability

to self-determination. Fena has labeled Sharon "a six year old mentality" and accused Karen of being after Sharon's money and causing Sharon to be depressed. These diversion prevent people and institutions from fairly evaluating the evidence and reaching solutions that are most beneficial to Sharon Kowalski.

Karen says, "I've spent more than two years and over \$100,000 in our legal system, only to arrive at not seeing Sharon. This case has to be won. The last time I saw Sharon, she typed out to me, 'Help me, Karen. Get me out of here.' I had to look at her and say, 'Sharon, I'm doing everything I can, and I will never quit fighting this. I've got to go now. My time is up.' And she typed, 'Please take me home with you.'"

Karen, in an interview in May with THE GUIDE noted that a court order has been issued stating that Sharon is to be tested annually, that her guardian must look into getting her an electric wheelchair, as well as looking into communication devices such as computers to replace her stick and board. In addition, there will be an episode of "West 57th Street" sometime this summer concerning Sharon's dilemma and Karen has just recently taped a show for Geraldo Rivera. Karen said, "We're going to win this, no matter how long we have to fight. Hopefully, we'll win it in time to help Sharon recover, but we must fight and win."

May the day soon come when Sharon can walk down Westheimer with the rest of us in the Pride Parade. For now, those persons interested in assisting Karen Thompson in her fight for Sharon's rights, can write to her in care of Julie Andrzejewski, 32495 County Road #1, St. Cloud, Minnesota 56301. Sharon will be represented in the Pride Week Parade by an empty wheelchair.



Harvey Milk - Honorary Male Grand Marshal



San Francisco Supervisor Harvey Bernard Milk is the Honorary Male Grand Marshal for this years Pride Week celebration, as the tenth anniversary of this and Mayor George Moscone's assassination by Supervisor Dan White (November 27, 1978).

While sitting around with friends one day someone told Harvey how they felt: that the system was screwed up and how we, as gay and lesbian people, should go down and force changes to which Harvey replied, "That's great, but they have more bombs to throw than we do." Harvey continued looking around the room and pointing to each person as he spoke, "What if you were the Mayor, you were the Chief of Police, and you, you, you and I were on the Board of Supervisors" to which everyone replied "that would be great!" Harvey's next statement brought silence to the room as he told them, "I thought you said the system was screwed up? It's not the system that's screwed up, it's the people that are running the system that are screwed up. We must elect gay people to those offices and change the world from within."

After several unsuccessful attempts at running for public office, usually facing most of his opposition from WITHIN the gay and lesbian community, Harvey was elected to the San Francisco Board of Supervisors in November 1977, becoming the first openly gay person ever elected to public office. Only eleven months later he was killed, but Harvey had already come to represent something far greater than his office.

All throughout Harvey's life he spoke of our strength as a community by the mere numbers that make us one of the largest

minorities in the world. Harvey's dream of "every gay person must come out" has got to be realized if we are ever to gain the strength and power that is rightfully ours as a gay and lesbian people.

0n this tenth anniversary respectfully honor Harvey Milk as one of millions of gays and lesbians who have made and continue to make our movement strong and powerful. Many quotes could be printed to share Harvey's love and hope for us all but none carry his message of life more than the words he spoke only three weeks before his untimely death. It was on the evening that Proposition 6 was defeated, a law that would have excluded homosexual school teachers schools throughout the state California. Harvey stood before the victors and said, "We must destroy the myths once and for all, shatter them. must continue to speak out, and most importantly, most importantly, every gay person must come out. As difficult as it is, you must tell you immediate family, you must tell you relatives, you must tell your friends, if indeed they are your friends, you must tell you neighbors, you must tell the people you work with, you must tell the people in the stores you shop in, and once they realize that we are indeed their children, that we are indeed everywhere, every myth, every lie, every innuendo will be destroyed once and for all, and once you do you will feel so much better."

Harvey, we love and miss you so very much. Harvey will be represented in our parade by a banner with his silhouette.
