Now in the third decade of the modern gay liberation movement and the second decade of the great epidemic the face and fact of gay-lesbian America is radically changed.

An age when police raids on bars were commonplace, the word "gay" did not appear in the mass media and the vast majority of gay men and lesbians were ensconced in the recesses of individual closets all that is gone.

We have emerged into America's mainstream—in the press, in the movies, on television, amongst the politically active and in all other walks of life. Such exposure brought with it new enemies and greater attacks. Recently when President Bush met with a select group of leaders of the evangelical right he reassured them of his opposition to the "homosexual agenda" while they acknowledged that this issue was even more important to them than abortion.

And after more than ten years of fighting and dying with AIDS and with the disease now reaching all segments of society (heterosexual America is today where gay America was in 1983) our enemies still hold sway over a national government which refuses to acknowledge our humanity.

Granted gay America is as diverse as the nation, truly a rainbow of colors, races, backgrounds, likes and dislikes as the greater nation which still cannot understand or accept us. We need this diversity, this foot in every camp. But there is a greater issue hereour very lives.

Blacks in America spent decades accommodating to the tyranny of the majority, alternately patronized and brutalized, until the liberating necessities of World War II destroyed the facade of "separate but equal". Women in America shared in every aspect of this great and developing nation for centuries while accepting "their place" which was, in fact, every place but the voting booth. Only in the early years of this century was this changed, reluctantly and begrudgingly.

Today the same forces which still put limits on black justice, still restrict the rights of women to make crucial decisions about themselves, also would relegate gay America to those stifling closets.

If history teaches us anything it is that there is nothing new in politics, yet we repeatedly refuse to learn from the past. In the latter half of the nineteenth century, the so-called Populist movement addressed the injustices of the newly industrialized America and attempted to unite all its victims. The powers that be then, much the same as the powers that be today, adapted the military strategy of divide and conquer. Blacks and poor whites in the South, sharing the same

problems of exploitation and oppression by the system, sacrificed their common cause on the altar of racism. Our cities were brought into line by the imagined fear of foreigners for their "differences".

The same forces then that savaged principle for power reside in the White House. A natural and needed coalition of black America, women and gay America is being splintered, in the name of political control, by a national government as committed to power and the fruits of power as their counterparts among the industrial robber barons—they are in every sense the heirs to the same wealth and power.

Granted there have been hard-won gains by blacks, by women and by gay America, just as their were crumbs scattered before the Populists. But those gains will not translate into a proportional share of power until all of us recognize our true stake in this struggle, until we rise above our petty differences, until we cast aside racism, sexism and all other "isms" raised up before us.

Pride in gay America can prepare us for this greater battle, but it is only a beginning. Timing is everything in comedy and in life. Now is the time for all good women and men to come to the aid of this cause. This is a battle to finally win the civil right struggle, the equal rights movement and lesbian and gay rights. These issues are inseparable.

We celebrate that first skirmish at Stonewall Inn twenty-three years ago. And we justly take pride in our achievements since. But we must also dedicate ourselves to the great task at hand, resolve to share the greater good and unite in a struggle which, simply put, pits the rights of all Americans against the oppressive control by the few.

We cannot and must not underestimate the ability of our oppressors to adapt to every challenge to their power. The national administration repeatedly turns back the clock on civil rights yet promotes those blacks who have seen the "light" of conservatism. The national administration reversed years of Republican support for the Equal Rights Amendment yet parades those women leaders who extol the woman's place in the home.

And finally, the Bush-Quayle team revives the great issue of Nixon-Agnew family values, ignoring the fact that its two previous exponents were acknowledged crooks. "Family values" is the rallying cry against pushy women, welfare blacks and sinful queers just as race once rallied the oppressed white to join with their very oppressors. This latest cry of the powerful will only work if we allow it.

Yes, let us celebrate our pride in our gains but let us not ignore the great task before us.



Our theme this year is **PRIDE=POWER**. With this theme we stress the idea that we must be proud of ourselves as people. We must be proud within ourselves to handle the hostile world around us, yet have the compassion to love each other. With **PRIDE** within ourselves comes the **POWER** we have in numbers.

The **PRIDE GUIDE** serves as a networking and resource forum. Within its pages you can find many different viewpoints in articles written by people of our community. The listing of Pride Week events and the Resource Guide show the strength of a well established and powerful community.

During the past few years, our community has experienced many changes. Many have suffered spiritually from the loss of loved ones and have needed strength to overcome those losses; many have lost their jobs due to the suffering economy or because of discrimination; many have experienced declining health—both physically and mentally.

We have experienced change, and change can be tough but it also brings new opportunities. Our participating and sharing during the ten days of Lesbian/Gay Pride Week can open new avenues for creating a new commitment to our goals as a community in celebration of our pride.

When the week of activities and celebration comes to a close, the renewed spark of camaraderie need not end. A vast resource of opportunities will have been presented: new friendships, renewed excitement of spirit, pride in who we are, and the knowledge of opportunities which lie in store for us.

The **PRIDE GUIDE**, created and produced by the Lesbian/Gay Pride Week Committee, can serve as an important resource throughout the year. As Co-Chairs we would like to give a special thanks to all the volunteers and especially the Executive Team who spent long hours performing the many special tasks to make this celebration possible. We can never say enough to those very special people.

And take notice of the advertisers who made this publication possible. They believe in this community. Please patronize them so they can continue to be strong within our community.

Finally, do your part. Participate in the many events during the week, get in the Pride Parade and come to the Pride Rally...Naturally! After that, volunteer in an organization and make our community stronger.





A YEAR LATER AND A LITTLE WISER

ime passes and it is time for the gay and lesbian community to celebrate another Lesbian/ Gay Pride Week in Houston.

This is the anniversary of a riot that took place in New York City at the Stonewall Inn. It was a hot summer night just after the funeral of Judy Garland. A routine bar raid, where patrons would commonly be arrested and get their names published in the paper. People were usually fired, lives were ruined simply because of being, or perceived as being, gay.

This time it was a little different. The patrons of the Stonewall got tired of this routine and began to fight back. It turned into a riot and for the first time some gay and lesbian people decided not to take it anymore.

The communities began as a small number of groups, mostly in a few major urban areas. Only a few brave individuals proclaimed that "We are everywhere," and "Come out of the closet." As time passed we grew into a community. Certain mostly run down neighborhoods became identified as gay friendly areas, like the Village in New York or the Montrose here in Houston.

While we developed as a people and a community we have had setbacks. AIDS hit the male

While we have been blamed, this community has done much to help identify its causes, reduce the risks and educate on "safer sex," with little help from the government. This learning experience is already helping other communities.

It is my belief that in the past twelve months we have made more progress as a people than ever before. Unfortunately it began with a tragic murder. Just as the dust was settling from last year's Pride Week, because it encompasses many categories of race, class and gender.

Queer Nation got the community used to the American institution of civil disobedience. Shortly after the murder, over 2,000 queers, many who had not been involved previously, marched in the heart of the Montrose to declare that they would not tolerate attacks on them just because of who they were.

A very brave columnist in the Houston Post wrote a very touching

a young professional, Paul Broussard, was brutally murdered.

Paul's murder was not the first nor was it the worst. It was, however, unique. Violence was up in the city. There were witnesses to the murder. Annise Parker, an open lesbian, was running for City Council. The major press was willing to print the brutal accounts of this murder. Crime was a big issue in the city elections. And last but not least, a new group formed in the community called Queer Nation.

Queer Nation is a group of mostly young individuals who basically are tired of being treated as second class citizens and are willing to put themselves on the line to create change. Yet some within the community believe that they are too radical and take on a name that is condescending. To that they say: "We're here. We're Queer. Get used to it." By taking on the term queer, we empower ourselves by keeping others from using it as a epithet. The single word also connects us

article about this incident. He tried to come out in the piece but was censored. Later, Juan Palomo was fired and then rehired. Juan is now one of a few openly gay people on the editorial board of a major newspaper.

Over the years the Houston Police Department was not very highly regarded nor even trusted within our community. Their macho attitude and raids of our bars added to this image. There have also been reports that HPD kept fag files on community activists. The past year much of the image has changed with the Visa Versa operation. When the men in blue pose as us they began to know what it is like to be perceived as different, misunderstood and even hated. They were not only attacked on the streets by verbal slurs but were actually physically attacked by hate mongers looking to bash a few Queers. It was also reported that

when these officers returned to their stations, fellow officers made fun of them.

The Visa Versa operation put this city on the map with the *New York Times* more than once, saying in their Op-Ed section that other cities could take lessons from HPD. to be understood by others. This year we have seen more and more stories and TV reports on our community.

All three major candidates for mayor sought the endorsement of the Houston Gay and Lesbian Caucus. Many other office seekers also sought the power of the block vote young and felt we were the only ones. Community groups like Houston Area Teenagers Concerned about Homosexuality (HATCH) and Sexual Minority (SMLY) need our help and support to help insure the next generation will be stronger than we are.

We also help the younger generation by having a strong community that has plenty of strong organizations. Our beginnings in this community were about visibility. Then we moved on to building a community.

And as it took a tragic murder to get us motivated and to galvanize us together in common goals, we realize our struggle is a lifetime effort. We do set aside some time to reflect and celebrate our accomplishments during Pride Week.

Houston Lesbian/Gay Pride Week is a celebration of our community that is open to everyone. We want to be a part of, not apart from. Yet if we don't demonstrate that we need and have power, we will be ignored. That is why we chose the theme POWER = PRIDE.

June 19th to the 28th is the Houston Lesbian/Gay Pride Week. The Pride Parade starts at 5:00 pm, Sunday, June 28th at the corner of Westheimer and Woodhead and moves east to Westheimer and Whitney through Montrose. Please join us in our celebration. λ

CBS Television also did a very positive story on *Street Scenes* about this operation.

The upsurge of violence is probably a reaction of our strength and visibility. Being visible and coming out has its risks, but it is also the act that makes everything else possible. We first develop as individuals and then help to build the security of a community.

Visibility is very important to any community. Hate and mistrust come from not being known. KUHT-TV decided not air Marlon Riggs's Tongues Untied, a documentary on gay black men. This robbed the Houston market of a very valuable and enlightening experience of the aspect of a lesser known part of our community. It was aired by a majority of other public TV stations, yet KUHT decided that one of the few pieces on gay black men did not need to be aired in Houston. Black gay life needs to emerge in its own right.

Our community is served well with such publications as *TWT* and *The New Voice* and radio programs on KPFT-FM; however, it is only with the major media where we can hope to get beyond our borders and


that the gay and lesbian community delivers. This is proof that we have come a long way from the hate campaign that was brought upon this community during the 1985 job rights referendum.

It is important to know that much progress has been accomplished by a few people in our community who have put their lives on the line to make life better for us all and for the next generation of gays and lesbians. It should also be noted that it is not easy for many young people—they are subjected to the invisibility of our community.

Of all suicides among young people, gays and lesbians make up one third, yet we are only ten percent of the population. And gays and lesbians make up about half of all the kids on the street. This happens because of the isolation young people face. It is hard enough to be a young person in this society, yet it is even harder for someone who has different feelings than the majority. Unlike other minorities, they cannot turn to their family, church or school for support.

We must remember to look back to the time when we were





AIDS VS. BREAST CANCER

his June, as we observe the twenty-third anniversary of the Stonewall riots; we also celebrate the birth of the modern day Gay and Lesbian rights movement.

We remember these monumental events in our history with parades, parties, and for some, not a small degree of nostalgia.

The degree of nostalgia that many feel is not necessarily due to the passage of years. Memories are stirred by the call of an era of progress and innocence that has passed.

This June we also mark the eleventh anniversary of the first reported cases of what was to be called AIDS.

Approximately one-half of the past twenty-three years have been spent primarily on survival and less on advancement. This by no means is an indictment of the seemingly tireless efforts of the few good women and men who have continued to carry the banner for equality and justice.

Often, the same women and men have struggled, side-by-side, to ensure the voices of those with AIDS are heard. This endeavor has been delivered in a spirit of love and solidarity unlike any this country has ever seen. We must never forget this reason to be proud.

Much still remains to be done before we rest. We as a community face the myriad challenges that HIV/AIDS presents more so than any other group of people. This is not fair, nor equitable. It is just the way that it is. Our government should be shouldering the monetary cost of HIV/AIDS, not because it insists that we bear a disproportionate proportion of the death toll, but because it is morally right. Our governmental leaders should be demanding the delivery of a cure and a vaccine, along with compassionate and adequate health care for those stricken with AIDS (and government inaction), not because we have been doing the job. But because it is morally right.

After eleven years of disease, death, and community destruction; after eleven years of marching, protesting, and going to jail; after eleven years of demanding, cajoling, and intimidation, we have moved but an inch down the mileslong road to the place that knows no AIDS.

While we journeyed in the forest of the unknown we have learned a lot about ourselves. We have learned that we have to be self-reliant and self-sufficient. We have learned that we are a beautiful but embattled people. We have learned that we are deserving of all that others take easily and for granted. We have learned that while we may never have (nor desire) numerical superiority, we have moral superiority over those who paint us otherwise. We have this because we have earned it.

We are not the only ones that have learned a great deal about us. People the world over have a view of us that our detractors had rather they did not. Many people have learned from us Lesbians, Gay men, and our supporters. Many have

learned that they do not have to suffer in silence. The present day movement has lead others, such as breast cancer advocates, to the road of empowerment. It is here that we have a problem that conceivably we would not be able to rebound from with any honor. We must not let this happen.

When we were unwittingly teaching other groups of disenfranchised people how to empower themselves, we took our eyes off our national leadership long enough for them to regroup for their present attack.

America has awakened to the fact that we are plagued with many physical and mental illnesses that equal attention and response should be given to. Our government is alarmed and running scared. Instead of acting according to our wishes that our diseases be researched, treated, and cured, the Bush administration continues to focus on the rhetoric that the defense budget is more important than the delivery of health care. The federal government currently spends \$882,000,000.00 per day on defense. They spend in five hours on defense what they spend in five years on health care. There is no war being waged. Least of all on any disease.

The present strategy is to pit disease sufferer against disease sufferer against disease sufferer. It is not the least bit surprising that the two diseases chosen to do battle are AIDS and breast cancer. Bush and the Republican administration see AIDS as a Gay disease and breast cancer as just a woman's cosmetic concern. They





want us to decide whose disease is to be addressed.

We (being AIDS activists) must not allow this to happen. The only way that we can assure, at minimum, that the voices of women with breast and other forms of gender related cancer are heard and heeded, is to not answer these obscene accusations.

To make any claim that AIDS, breast cancer, or any other disease is more or less deserving is not only ludicrous but reprehensible. To compare numbers of persons affected only clouds the focus and

lends a false credence that "some are more/less deserving than others." To compare contagiousness/communicability to malignancy does nothing to ensure health care delivery or disease mitigation or eradication.

The officials responsible for funding, researching, treating, and curing both AIDS and breast cancer must not be successful in this their latest effort to ignore the concerns of millions of Americans. We must see that they fail. Gay men, Lesbians, those living with HIV/AIDS, all women, and the men who care

about them, must demand our right to health care. This right should not be predicated on the ability to pay, one's gender, sexual orientation, or any other factor.

The time is long overdue that the American tax-base be used to provide the best possible life for all its citizens, not just for the affluent, white, heterosexual male. We as Gays and Lesbians should be on the forefront of this agenda. Then there will be another reason for the history books to say we are a proud and powerful people.





ROWDY, EXUBERANT, AND PROUD

rom being the stepchild of the Gay Political Caucus, and being operational only a few months every year, Lesbian/Gay Pride Week '92 has matured into its own year 'round organization that sponsors other celebrations and is run by a volunteer board of directors that has its own tax exempt 501(c)(3) status.

Ten years ago Larry Bagneris inspired the community with his vision and enthusiasm and created Gay Pride. Under his direction there were rallies in parks, parades, lots of glitter, sparkle and drag. With the cooperation of leaders like Marion Coleman and John Hill, Gay Pride was sheltered by the Montrose Activity Center and will remain so through this summer.

Extended to a ten day "week", the Lesbian and Gay Pride organization in Houston is making progress towards their goals of full time board members, an office, hosting celebratory events like National Coming Out Day, securing grants, and offering outreach.

Noting that gay and lesbian youth commit suicide at a rate three times higher than that of other kids, co-chair Jack Valinski hopes to offer

education and support through the media and through Pride workshops. He is encouraged by the new 501(c)(3) status that Pride Week was awarded this year. "It makes our outreach much easier," he said, "For example, it makes it possible to mail the newsletter and other correspondence at a reduced rate. And now we can apply for grants."

Although Pride Week has never been a financially profitable endeavor, it has always been successful due to the commitment of dedicated volunteers who recognize the need to express our pride, and to enjoy the exhilaration of being a part of the triumph that is Pride Week.

As Pride Week evolves into a twelve month project, more volunteers are sought to meet the increased demand by the community and beyond. "Pride Week is not just a party," Jack reminds us, "it's an outreach, a tradition born of Stonewall and it's our reply to those who would reject us, our biological families, the churches we were raised in, who say we are perverse, burning sinners. We are okay, we are survivors, we are proud!"

Other than our shared goals, Pride Week volunteers are a very diverse group. Women, people of color, employed and medically disabled people and students, all offer distinct skills and schedules to the cause. Many volunteers are active with other groups. Brian Keever is the Marketing chairperson for Pride Week, and on the board of the Houston Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus, and a member of Metropolitan Church of the Resurrection, the National Leather Association, and Miss Camp America. "I'm involved in a lot of activities, but Pride Week is important to me because it is our own history. Our riots. I don't want anyone to have to wonder why we parade around in the streets on the last Sunday in June every year in 90 degree heat!"


Co-Chair Carol Clark is active with the Houston Women's Softball League and is a founding member of the Houston Rape Crises Coalition. Her personal goal is to play golf in the Women's Senior Tour. She joined Pride Week last year as the Logistics chairperson and was unanimously drafted by the board as Co-Chair for 1992. "I was looking around for something to do to give back to the community," she says, "And Pride Week seemed to be the organization that pulls the whole community together."


teers are the heroes of this community."





FROM "TAKE PRIDE" TO "PRIDE = POWER"

Since Houston Gay/ Lesbian Pride Week, 1991, Houston's gay community has been much less than quiet.

Changes are coming fast and furious and sometimes faster and more furious than all of us can cope with.

July started off on a sad note and, to say the least, a call to arms. The bashing and murder of Paul Broussard triggered the warning, "We will not stand by and take this shit anymore!" Productively, a rally and demonstration of 2000+ occurred at Montrose and Westheimer within five days of the gay bashing. The publicity got the attention of the media, the politicians and the general public. The warning went out, "We are taking back our streets."

Soon after the rally, Q-Patrol had its inception and has had a great degree of success in preventive medicine. Ten young suburbanites from the Woodlands area were arrested and charged with the bashing and murder. HPD instituted the Vice Versa program (a first in the country) and experienced first hand gay baiting and bashing, and an unofficial program began at the HPD Police Academy called sensitivity training. As I write the hope is that the Gay Sensitivity Training will take its place

As this year has progressed Houston has the first openly gay editor on board a major newspaper (I hope the day will come when those editors who are closeted will have the opportunity and guts to step out of the closet without fear of losing their jobs). Also, this year saw several stories in the media on gay issues.

We have come a long way, but not without tears, pain, suffering and anger. We have a long way to go: nine more defendants need to go to trial, and we cannot let them slip through the cracks because we have one victory. Gay Sensitivity Training must take its place as part of the curriculum at the academy and be introduced to the officer on the street.

Did you read about the Rodney King incident in L.A.? I hope you did, and I hope you read and felt some type of reaction to the verdict when it occurred. At first I was indifferent. It occurred in L.A., not Houston. It was a black issue, not a gay issue. But then it occurred to me that L.A. and California have been leaders in such areas as civil rights for blacks as well as Hispanics and Gays and Asians. I'm sure black Sensitivity Training started twenty years ago as the smoke cleared from Watts. Twenty years of sensitivity training and yet four officers lose it and beat a traffic offender.

Everyone thought that with the video tape, the verdict was obvious. Well, the jury surprised everyone, but what scares me is that supposedly educated officers of the nineties, not the stereotypical redneck cop of the sixties, did this. Prejudice and racism are not gone. Nor is homophobia. We, you and I, must continue to push and to be aware of the need for Gay Sensitivity Training with the Houston Police Department. We cannot let this training slip by the wayside because of our apathy.

Less than five months ago National Leather Association: Houston, a social service, educational organization promoting the education and rights of the leather, S/M and fetish community, celebrated its first anniversary with a whole weekend of events. An incident occurred during that week that was detailed in *The New Voice* dated January 24.

During that weekend one of our out of town guests was arrested for PI (public intoxication). The arrest was not the problem—the treatment of Lee Baber of San Antonio was. As a leatherman, his treatment voiced the ignorance that is still carried with officers patrolling the streets of Montrose and working the City Jail. Lee has both nipples pierced and upon his arrest was wearing a chain harness with a cock strap (a chain that goes from the harness to a ring that is around the genitals). The arresting officers demanded Lee remove it. As he undid his pants to remove the ring, the officer had to question what he was doing. The officer let Lee get his shirt on (temperatures were in the 30's), but when Lee requested his coat and reached for it, he was

yanked and tossed into the mud and handcuffed.

His rights or the reason for his arrest were not given to him until he was being processed downtown. Several requests to the arresting officer to loosen the cuffs a little fell on deaf ears and resulted in nerve damage to one hand. At processing, his nipple rings were discovered by the processing officer; because he would not remove them (the senior officer on duty finally okayed it) his card was marked with SADO-MAS-OCHIST.

Lee was taken to the isolation floor but not until the processing officer showed each officer he came in contact with Lee's nipples. Twice the elevator was stopped at unrelated floors and Lee's shirt-t was pulled up to show off his nipples and rings to officers on those floors. Talk about insensitive! Consequently, an Internal Affairs investigation was instituted and results are being awaited.


We can no longer sit in our homes, apartments, businesses or

jobs and wait for our rights to come to us. We must unite as a community—gays and lesbians, cowboys and yuppies, leather and drag. Our apathy is our worst enemy; our prejudice within our own community for those minorities among us will keep us divided, disorganized and, consequently, weak.

When you harass a gay brother or sister because she is a lesbian, or a drag queen or wearing leather or not wearing leather, then you are no better than the guy or guys roaming our streets and yelling "queer" or "faggot". If the Rodney King case is left standing as ruled, we have all stepped back at least twenty years. Where were gay rights twenty years ago—Stonewall had just happened three years before. Gay was not said on TV and any character was the stereotypical limp-wristed fairy. There was not an openly gay politician anywhere except maybe San Francisco (and you know how perverted San Francisco is anyway!!).

Those of us who can be visible must be visible; we must join together and work the system for our nights, demand our rights. We must TAKE PRIDE for PRIDE = POWER. Demand sensitivity training from your city council person and your mayor and your police chief. Write, march, scream, yell, work. Nothing will be given to us, and while you sit waiting for what is not coming, what little we (you) have will be lost.

Remember, any step back in the civil rights for blacks or Hispanics affects us as well. If they can beat a black traffic offender senseless on video tape, have it viewed by the entire nation and still get away with it, what will happen to you with a TWT sticker or pink triangle in your back window or wearing full leather when stopped by HPD (or any PD for that matter)? Supposedly, blacks have their civil rights, yet this happens? We do not have any rights (in fact, 21.06 is still on the state law books). UNITED WE STAND—PRIDE = POWER—TAKE (YOUR) PRIDE! λ





WHY DO WE GROW UP TO HATE OURSELVES?

by Stan W. Ziegler

t's said the more things change, the more they stay the same.

I think this applies to our society's understanding of homosexuality and maybe, more important, to our own views about our gayness. I suggest that while there have certainly been changes in our society's relationship to homosexuality in the past 25 years it's still true that the world is heterosexist and homophobic. While many lesbians and gay men are considerably more open and at least superficially accepting of their gayness now, I

course it is. Look at what society teaches us about ourselves. Is it any wonder that as gay people we grow up hating ourselves for becoming what our society says is the worst thing we might become? Children call each other "faggot" when they want to be most cruel, and this is before they really know what the word means. Messages like this are everywhere.

I've had many adult gay patients ask me how they could so clearly have learned being gay is wrong when they're sure gayness was never discussed in their homes or schools 25 years ago. Before there was any talk of gayness, there were clear messages about how

don't hurt anyone, then we have a lot of work to do.

If it weren't for denial, emotionally well-integrated gay people would be enraged at what society tells us about ourselves. Psychologist Vivian Cass asserts that a stage of anger at society is necessary to form a healthy gay identity. Of

boys should behave and how girls should behave. These messages may be changing somewhat (probably more so for girls than for boys) but not enough to keep me from overhearing a mother at the San Diego Zoo say to her cranky young son that he had to stop crying since "boys don't cry"

In my experience there is a much higher rate of gender atypicality or gender nonconformity among gay people. I think there's nothing wrong with this For some reason, gay boys don't act as much like little boys are "supposed" to act and gay little girls aren't as feminine as our culture insists they be. I'm assuming that gender atypicality is a natural part

of being gay for many people and a part that precedes sexual attraction to others by years So we can speak of a gay 4-year-old.

Research doesn't help us understand why there is a high degree of gender atypicality in the gay population, and maybe it's true that this matters only if we assume that boys really should behave like boys and girls really should behave like girls I think that this is an important clarification in terms of our creating healthy identities for ourselves as gay people, because long before we start experiencing sexual attraction to other people, we present ourselves to the world with some version of a gay male gender or a gay female gender that our society tells us is wrong and that we should keep hidden in order to fit in. In the gay community, I think this is more apparent among gay men who routinely request that "no fems" respond to their personal ads. This understanding of gender appropriateness is less true in the gay women's community, possibly because femaleness has been so much less valued in our culture.

What will it take for our society to start reconsidering the way it understands maleness and femaleness? I hope that for the emotional health of the gay community, we are moving toward a place where a man is someone who possesses a man's body and a woman is someone who possesses a woman's body (the transsexual phenomenon notwithstanding) and that the rest is a purely personal manifestation of what is natural for the person. Am I really saying that there isn't a way

that boys are supposed to behave because they're males and girls are supposed to behave because they're females? That's right. That's what I'm saying.

Despite Erikson's observations in his brilliant Childhood and Society, young boys are more likely to build towers and young girls to build rooms not because of penises and vaginas (biological determinism) but because a lot of learning has already taken place by the time they're in nursery school. Such a reconsideration of gender appropriateness would go a long way to altering our views of ourselves as gay people. If there was no particular way that a boy was supposed to

behave in terms of his maleness then the young gay boy would not feel different or be treated differently because of his gender presentation.


In such a world, a 5-year-old boy wouldn't be taken to a psychologist because he preferred to read or play with dolls rather than play ball. Or if he were taken to a psychologist for this reason, the psychologist would help the parents understand that this is probably natural for him and help them deal with their feelings about it. Such a reconstruction of our idea of gender appropriateness—or more to the point, that there is no such thing as gender appropriateness

only gender naturalness—would be enormously liberating for lesbians and gay men.

This is also clearly an area in which the gay movement and the women's movement should combine forces. If the test of a decent society is in being a place in which people can be whoever they are as long as they don't hurt anyone, as I believe it should be, then we have a lot of work to do in changing some of society's most basic beliefs The gay community must somehow find the strength, time, and resources in this beleaguered time to wage this battle. Something as basic as the mental health of a significant portion of the gay population depends on it. λ





MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of Body Positive/Houston is to encourage individuals at risk of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection and those already infected with HIV to actively manage their lives and health for maximum quality of life.

The objectives of Body Positive/Houston include providing emotional support, education, and socialization opportunities to affected individuals, as well as outreach.

Body Positive/Houston is one of the few organizations to specifically address the needs of the asymptomatic HIV-positive individual. As a result of our outreach programs, Body Positive/Houston is often the first organization a newly diagnosed individual contacts for immediate support and information. The services of Body Positive/Houston are available to all individuals impacted by HIV infection throughout the spectrum of the disease. Target populations include, but are not limited to, the gay community, minorities, women, children, caregivers, health care providers, hemophiliacs, and intravenous drug users.

Body Positive/Houston welcomes all people affected by HIV. There are no membership fees or dues. The organization operates entirely through private donations, grants and fundraising activities.

PEER COUNSELING

Our Peer Counseling program consists of structured tenweek sessions that cover ten (10) specific topics and other issues relevant to seropositive individuals Some of these topics are: working with your doctor healing alternatives; relationships; lifestyle issues- and stress reduction/relaxation.

Each group includes ten (10) HIV+ individuals led by two (2) trained facilitators, who are also seropositive. The group sessions are closed confidential and free of charge.

BUDDY PROGRAM

Our Buddy Program is a one-on-one support program for

a person who has recently tested HIV positive. Three sessions are recommended. All sessions take place in a neutral location, such as a restaurant. Each session lasts from one to 1-1/2 hours. All client information is strictly confidential.

All Buddy volunteers are HIV+ so that the volunteer will be able to relate to the person (client) who has recently tested HIV positive. We have men and women volunteers in our Buddy Program.

NEWSLETTER

Each month Body Positive/Houston publishes a newsletter, *Positively* which is sent to everyone on our confidential mailing list and also distributed throughout Houston.

Our newsletter contains certain features each month: a monthly calendar of Body Positive/Houston events; a Community Reporter section that has information about upcoming HIV/AIDS events in the Houston area; a doctor, a lawyer and other experts each contribute a question and answer section on issues that affect HIV+ persons and their significant others; and the Options insert contains articles of interest covering a variety of timely subjects. Each month there is coverage of past events, upcoming events and other items of interest to our readers.

GARDEN PROJECT

This is a very successful on-going project dedicated to the memory of Gary Schalles, a founder of Body Positive/Houston. Novices and seasoned gardeners have established plots at the southwest corner of the Metropolitan Multi-Service Center. Vegetables, fruit and flowers are produced year-round.

The harvests provide food to indigent persons with AIDS in the Houston area. The flowers are delivered to AIDS patients in local hospitals.

ANDREW ARTHUR BOYD HIV RESOURCE LIBRARY

Our library was founded at the beginning of Body Positive/ Houston in 1988. Its purpose is to provide information to and for the HIV seropositive community in Houston and the surrounding areas.


