



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

dynamite costumes that so enchanted the crowds in Las Vegas. It's an unparalleled glitter festival. See it! And believe!



And that's about all the dirt I've managed to dig up for this week, Ya'll take care. Ya heah!



"They've got movies. Don't you want to see them?" Burt pleaded.



"Not unless you can talk them into taxiing all the way."



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The Screen Shop


Miss Emmy just showed up for her yearly visit. She was all dressed up and looking far, far superior to recent haunting appearances. Everything that COULD be done, WAS done to make the old gal look good. But no one was really fooled. Miss Emmy has a fatal disease. And everyone knows it. A disease that can never be cured. And everybody knows that, too. Never.

It wasn't always that way. In the beginning, the presentation of the Emmy Awards, for achievement in television, was much like the Oscars of movie lore. Both the Oscars and the Emmys were big. Really big. You'd never miss 'em. They were rituals, like suntans, sock hops and new clothes for school. But, alas, that's all in the past. Miss Oscar has fallen on hard times. But nothing to compare with the dive suffered by Miss Emmy. Oscar now rises and falls. But Miss Emmy is down for the count. For good. Forever. And it's not even her fault.

The difficulty with giving awards for achievement in television is that television is not a single or precise display of creative effort. It's a medium. An instrument. Like the telephone. And trying to give awards for achievement in television, these days, is just as silly as trying to give awards for the juiciest conversation to be heard during the past year over the telephone. Television is no

longer like the movies. TV is bigger. A million times bigger. No longer just two networks showing a few hours of entertainment each night, television is now EVERYTHING. Entertainment, news, reality, companionship, Future Shock hum, our window on the world. Television is too big to give awards for. There's just too much. All the time. It's right up there with "sex" in the "to do" column. The quantity, complexity and sheer vastness of the medium preclude honors. It's all things to all men. Which is noble of spirit, but far too massive in ambition to permit "awardsmanship."

As late as 1964, TV existed in only one of two modes - either comedy series or drama series. With perhaps a little news, some sports and a handful of specials. Everything was stable. The 1964 Emmys gave out seven awards for comedy series (actor, actress, supporting actor, supporting actress, writer, director and "best"); seven awards for drama series (actor, actress, supporting actor, supporting actress, writer, director and "best") and a few awards for "specials" - and that was IT! All neat. All divided. All easy to follow. TV was simple then. And so were the Emmys. Simple enough to generate anticipation. Simple enough to be a good awards show. As it "meant" something to win an Oscar, so, too, it "meant" something to win an Emmy.

But that's not true anymore.

Since 1964, TV and the Emmys have both grown and changed. This year, the Emmys were handed out in three separate events, First, the Emmys for daytime TV were given out in a special daytime awards show. Then, about a week late, the "prime time" Emmys were handed out on the prime time Emmy show on the night of May 17. In between those two awards shows, the news and technical people received their Emmys during a non-televised luncheon. You can see how complex this Emmy business is getting. Instead of a total of twenty awards on one night as in 1964, Emmy now represents hundreds of annual awards carted out night and day from three separate locations. If you just look around, I'm sure there's an Emmy near you. Like U-Totems. The only common trait between the 1964 Emmys and the 1976 Emmy show was the presence of Mary Tyler Moore in the winner's circle. (Of course, in 1964 Mary was an actress who worked with Dick Van Dyke and not an institution as she is today.)

Television no longer features only neatly packaged thirty or sixty minute series. It's all been opened up and broken down. Now we have the miniseries, the now and then series, the syndicated series, the affiliate series, increasing news time allocations, daily "specials," the pilot film, the pilot series, the "return" series and the ever-popular "we can't describe it but stay tuned anyway." Like CB transmissions, TV is now a free-for-all. And much too complex to give awards for, unless you break the awards categories down into the dozens, with dozens more sub-categories and "almost a sub-category" categories. It's the only fair way to do it. Which is exactly the

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burden Miss Emmy lives with.

Should the Emmy awards be complex and fair, or simple and entertaining. If you cut down the number of awards, they would certainly "mean" more. Then the Emmy could resume its equal-importance status with Oscar, as in simple days of yore. And the Emmy show would be much more entertaining. But it wouldn't be fair. TV is now too big for the simple awards structure as presented in 1964.

So what do you do? If you reduce the increasing complexity of the categories, you ignore the fundamental transformation of the medium which has occurred in the past decade. If you let the complications multiply at their current rate, soon the Emmy will mean nothing. Everybody will have one. It'll be like the Guiness Book of World Records — but with statuettes!


Obviously you can't turn back the clock - so look for more complications in the Emmy structure. Which is okay philosophically, but makes dull viewing for the simple minds of the awards shows watchers. And the award itself will shrink in value. Consequently, I think they would be well advised to call a halt to the whole thing right now. Let's do away with the Emmy! They were grand once, but have now fallen prey to our integrated-circuit, maximum-input, high-wired society. Sounds Un-American, I know, but it's certain that they will be forced to do away with Emmys sooner or later. So let's just end it now, while the memory of Miss Emmy's past greatness still lingers. She's a sick lady. Let her go out with honor. Turn off the respirator, Please.

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

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
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
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
