NEWS UP FRONT

TWIT VISITS POLICE HEADQUARTERS

After being shuffled around by Pappy Bond, the two complainants (Ray Hill and Rita Wanstrum) accompanied by a representative of TWIT, were finally brought before Deputy Chief R.G. McKeehan (Bond's liaison in gay affairs) to voice their dissent over recent police harrassment in the Bayou City. After ninety minutes or so of little more than evasiveness by McKeehan, Ray Hill (and TWIT) left the meeting with no more accomplished than further confirmation of police apathy for gay problems. "But," as Ray Hill puts it, "at least the lines of communication are open, whether official action is stirred or not." (The chances are, it won't be.) Topics discussed: the Exile raid, general harrassment, Hill's gripe with Sqt. Bilstein, complaints over vice officers, Rita's suggestion for the organization of Minorities Against Negativeness (a committee to formulate positive responses to neighborhood problems), and even the Henley/Corrl issue. McKeehan seemed attentive through most of the discussion, from time to time coming up with such astute comments as how he was "astonished to learn that Greeks had founded a complete culture based on homosexuality" and a smiley agreement that the "homosexual impulse is present in everyone." Ray closed the unproductive meeting by saying, "If we are quiet for too long, bad things begin to happen. Maybe if we're noisy for long enough, good things will begin to happen." TWIT would like to urge all readers to take any complaints against police to Katy Feller of the Gay Activists Alliance (749-3489) or the Gay Political Caucus of Houston (526-2668) and they, in turn, will let you know the most effective way in which to voice them.



IN-DEPTH REPORT

THE TRIAL IN GALVESTON

It was over. A "not guilty" verdict had been reached. As we celebrated over coffee at Angelo's Seawall Cafe, an uncertain hush suddenly consumed the group. (The group consisted of two officers from the Galveston Gay Society, several members from the Gay Activist Alliance of Houston, a reporter from Galveston's The Other Paper, your own TWIT reporter, a local waiter, an attendant from the baths, and two "masseurs" from the Kon Tiki.)

J.B. Fare was lying on the floor of the restaurant in an epileptic state. His buddy Michael was kneeling over him, giving him aid. ("It's okay. He'll be okay in a minute.")

The mood of the group suddenly changed. We were suddenly taken back to the morning of the 4th of July when I.B. had had his last seizure. "I suppose after awhile it's more embarrassing than anything else," Katy Feller, president of Houston's GAA remarked. I agreed with her. But then the entire episode had been an embarrassment. An extreme embarrassment. First of all, and probably worst, to the victims of the raid: the 39 people who were physically degraded by a horde of policemen on the morning of our nation's Bicentennial. But secondly, and probably a longerlasting embarrassment, to the police themselves who are only now beginning to feel the pinch of dissent.

The trial was not so much a kangaroo court as we expected. The bigoted Judge Youngblood had decided not to preside, and in his place sat the fairer, if impatient, Judge Alman. Edward Ashworth was being prosecuted for indecent exposure, a random charge drummed up by local police on the night of the raid.

As the two defense attorneys (James Brady and Dick Martin) began firing questions at the immobile Officer Platt, Alman at once demanded that only one questioner be appointed, and the smooth-talking Martin was immediately chosen. TWIT was impressed with the calm, sometimes humorous manner with which he handled the interrogation of the two arresting officers. We were proud to be on his side. The prosecuting attorney was a sheepish man named Charles Head who did little more than mumble and look apologetic throughout the trial. (At one point, when he made an objection to Martin's insinuations, the judge sighed and said, "Well! I'm glad you finally found something to object to!")

The two testifying officers, one from the Galveston Police Force, the other from the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, were separated from each other during the question and answer period. Martin had little trouble tripping up their stories. He even got complete contradictions from them. And though James Walker of the TABC was not as cooperative a witness as Platt had been, he nonetheless melted evenly under the defense attorney's steady probing. It seems that Martin kept digressing on the point of the absence of a search warrant, and Judge Alman kept insisting that if the officers entered the baths peacably and undercover (as they had alleged) then the matter of a search warrant was, in this particular case, immaterial. (Once he asked Martin, "Who's on trial here, anyway?")

Obviously Judge Alman knew that the two officers didn't have a leg to stand on and, after 55 minutes of a rather amusing trial, found the defendant not guilty on charges of indecent exposure.

Bob Ellison, owner of the Kon Tiki and president of the Galveston Gay Society, had seemed confident that the outcome of the trial would be positive. He even speculated to TWIT that there was a possibility that the other cases just might be thrown out of court. But Martin was more apprehensive. Some of the other charges, he mused, could stick. And although Ashworth's charge was false and libelous, some of the other cases might not be so cut and dry.

The Galveston Gay Society deserves more support from fellow Texans than they've been getting. Despite a petty argument between two of its more prominent members, they're sticking together admirably through most of the ordeal. Money has been raised, sympathy stirred.

Charles Jernigan, manager of the baths, is an amiable man trying to be optimistic about a situation he has little control over. Business at the tubs has slackened drastically. And although the chances of a raid in the near future are almost non-existent, a lot of Houstonians who frequent the island city are still suspicious of the

establishment. And a shame, too.

TWIT would like to take this opportunity to ask all Texans to write the GGS, P.O. Box 1272, 77553, and give moral support to the cause. Let them know that you care about them and are behind them 100%. TWIT is, for sure!

REVIEWS

Richard Heffron's Futureworld is your typical overproduced/underdeveloped menage of robots, video screens, panoramic special effects, and two dimensional characters that all add up to spell science fiction. Filmed on location in Houston (you'll notice scenes from Jones Hall, Pennzoil Place, even Houston's Intercontinental Airport) the movie takes on three definite and distinct phases guaranteed to thwart even the most viable attention span. First, we are introduced to the spectacular Delos, an amusement park to end all amusement parks: a collection of five different worlds (Medieval World. Roman World, Futureworld, etc.) where only the filthy rich can afford to retire. We are taken, along with two roving reporters (Peter Fonda and Blythe Danner), on a lengthy tour of the unusual resort that proves to be admittedly entertaining, but for the most part uninvolving and redundant. The movie then phases into a 1950type spy epic as we learn that Delos is no less sinister, alas, even reminiscent of Ian Fleming's formidable Spectre. There are chase sequences, mysterious tunnels and warehouses, and hordes of robot men who work menacingly towards God-only-knows what evil ends. ("There can be no mistakes at Futureworld.") And by the time we finally discover to what sinister goals Delos is striving (they intend to replace world officials with their own cybernetic counterparts), the movie lapses into its third and final phase, alarmingly similar to a disjointed Twilight Zone episode.

Performances by Fonda, Danner, and Arthur Hill were basically simplistic, but then they weren't really given anything to work with. Their moods seemed as stale as the dialogue, and the dialogue stale as the plot itself.

RAY HILL SPEAKS OUT

The gay community is supposed to be like any other community: a collection of individuals with common interests served by the institutions they share. If people congregate into communities through common interests, then those communities dissolve when the individuals' differences are given greater importance than their similarities. So, while you hear a lot about the gay community. we've never really developed into a community. We've made a beginning, but it includes less than five per cent of all gay people (and a few non-gay people) who share a sense of belonging with one another.

Despite tremendous advances in sexual behavior research, religion, and politics, most gay people just don't like other gay people. This dislike is a natural product of our social learning process which teaches the whole society that there is something wrong with being gay. Battles have been fought to prove that notion false. But the victories have mostly been won in college libraries. and because these are very quiet places, the word of our successes has not escaped the bookshelves. We all hear that "gay is good," but no more than a handful of us can quote chapter and verse that proves it.

Some of us have been loudly voicing complaints about recent police harrassment of gay bars, bookstores, and baths in Houston, Galveston, and Dallas. The vast majority of us have been silent, and some gays have


even voiced support of these clear abuses of police power.

From my point of view, the gay lawyer who characterized the raid of a bar netting 36 arrests for public intoxication as "justified" is actually saying, "Gay people should learn to keep their place and are not entitled to the same rights enjoyed by other citizens." I do not agree with him, nor do I believe the assistant chief of police who said the raid was not planned and executed to harrass gay people. Twenty vice officers did not just happen to be in the area to chase a person into the bar, especially when that person was never found or identified by the pursuants. If there was no campaign to harrass gay people, why did my phone ring every few hours with other similar incidents? If our relations and communications with the city officials and police department are so good, why do I have to go to council chambers so often with new complaints?

But my concern is not with police homophobia. I always knew it was there. What bothers me is gay apathy. I strongly object to gay people surrendering their voice to a handful of overworked spokespersons who are seldom directly involved in the incidents.

The public relations people of City Hall and the police department keep saying, "You gay people select one or two people to come to us with your complaints and we'll listen to them." It is my belief that no small group of people can represent all gay people in



defending our individual rights and protecting our institutions. Each of us has as much right as the other to speak out.

The gay community is not now, and I hope will never be a separatist society. The present Gay Activists are the most outspoken interrogationists I have yet to observe. We, as gays, should strive to join mainstream society, not separate from it. We want to have the same rights and opportunities that everyone else enjoys. The gay person who must live in fear of discovery to have rights does not really want them at all. The enormous amount of rhetoric I have listened to that justifies "closet freedom" is merely an excuse for more oppression.

Perhaps the most significant research of homosexual behavior in this decade showed conclusively that gay people who associate with other gay people have more self confidence and fewer psychological problems than those of us who try to go it alone. And those who live in society openly as gay persons actually function better than their heterosexual peers.

I'm throwing the challenge to you. You can wait until the other activists win your freedom (and while you wait, you can get arrested in a general harrassment raid, get picked up off the streets, get attacked by some homophobic outside your favorite bar, lose your job because you're gay, or lose your self-respect in society), OR you can get involved and help better yourself and the entire gay community.
