NEW MANAGEMENT

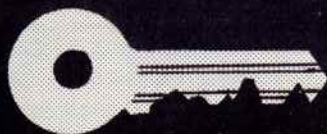

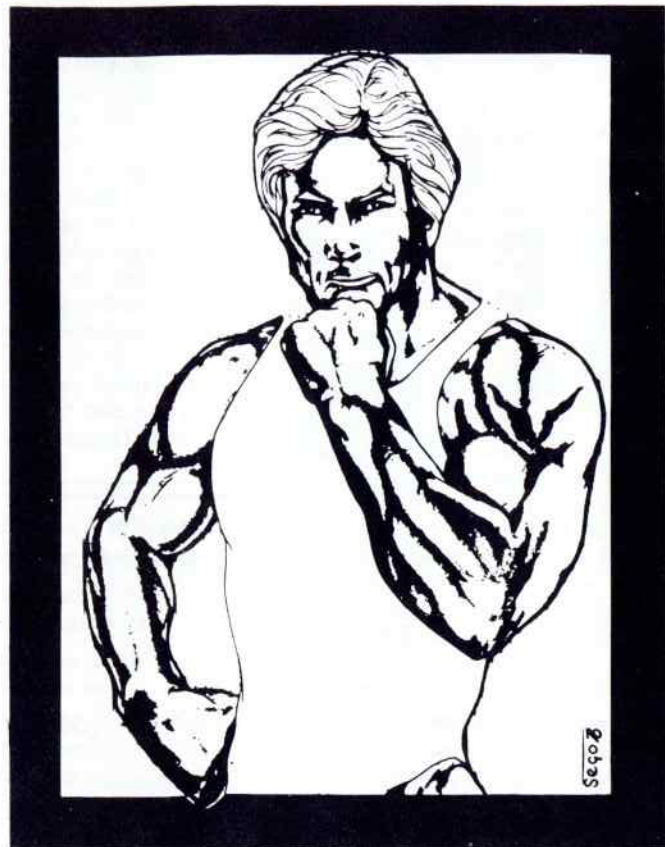



REVIEWS

Theatre

Four Houston playwrights contributed wit and fancy to Theatre Suburbia's latest summer offering, **FOUR BY FOUR**. Unfortunately, though, these contributions were not as consistent as the varied directions they undertook. Usually polished and professional, they plays were reinforced under sometimes laborious scripts by mostly pleasing performances.

The first, Eddie Cope's **Inside Story**, had a plot straight from a 1950 situation comedy minus the sight gags. It concerns a frantic young couple who work for rival newspapers and try to out-scoop each other before the next day's impending deadline. The piece was stylishly directed by Bonnie McFerren, but kept us yawning throughout.

Henry Klussman's **Survivor from Leningrad** suffered from B.A. Mather's poor direction as well as a poor script. The story centers around a fallen general in East Germany (circa 1962) and his inward struggles concerning the impervious Berlin Wall.

One begins to suspect Klussman's attachment to this peculiar eyesore in history as something of a fetish.

Showing considerably more promise was M.L. Pearson's **The Sandflea**, in which a young girl falls desperately in love with a vampire and they take a beachhouse in Galveston to spend the summer together. Jean Montgomery directed the well-intended script with all the sensitivity of parent to child. There were lots of laughs, and lots of precocity.

The evening of plays closed with Albert Green's **An Elucidation on the Psychology of Happiness**. Brilliantly directed by Ray McFerren, **Elucidation** was more of a lecture than a play, but the laughs came fast and quick as the five polished actors whipped through Green's comic dialogue and left us drained, and satisfied.

FOUR BY FOUR is, to say the least, an interesting distraction. It is, to say the most, a promising respite in Houston theatricality.

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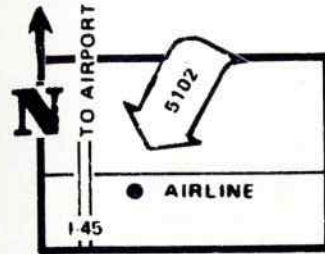
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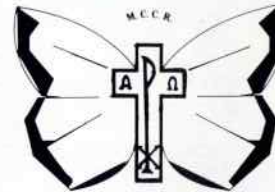

We've Come a Long Way, Baby . . .

. . . but we've got a long way to go. From my point of view, I can see the progress gay people have made in the last fifteen years. I have a pretty clear picture of the gains we've achieved, and I can make a reasonable estimation of the weaknesses and strengths that will make a difference in the immediate future. What follows is an overall description of the state of gay liberties. More than anything else, it is an appeal for your involvement.

In the early sixties, gay people were a large group of potential citizens who were beaten into the dark corners of society by scientific bullshit from psychologists and psychiatrists who said that we were sick (And we believed it). *This* was compounded with religious bullshit that labeled us as the ultimate sinners (we went for that, too). Our legal standing was the same as other criminals and while we complained to one another about this, the laws stayed on the books with our passive acceptance. As far as the rest of society was concerned, we did not exist at all except as child molesters, characters in jokes, or manic-depressive individuals who were not sure what kind of plumbing they had been born with.

But there were a handful of women and men (perhaps one in every 10,000) who rejected all or part of the bullshit and mythology. They fought against the odds to struggle out of our closets to do something about our sorry state. It paid off.

The small group that took on the sexual research establishment was

able to rip the foundation from under the psychologists and psychiatrists. Homosexual behavior is now known to be a natural response to a natural attraction experienced universally. Humans who are not aware of both homosexual and heterosexual attraction within themselves are likely to have poor self-awareness. Those who hate or fear homosexuals (homophobes) are now recognized as sociopaths in need of treatment.

Another group defied the religious establishment and exposed the soft belly of prejudice that lay under organized religion. The Biblical condemnation of homosexuals has now been shown to have been interpretive and traditional rather than literal. Embarrassed theologians are burning midnight oil trying to redefine the religious notions that have oppressed us since about 600 AD.

The laws that make us criminals have been removed from the books in some states. In each case, the credit must go to a very few. Civil rights legislation has passed in some local and state governments but this progress has so far been quite small.

Very little has been done to combat the prejudice, ignorance, and mythology held by the general public. The job requires mass education, and a handful of people just cannot handle the workload alone. Fewer than 20% of gay Houstonians have ever heard of Katy Feller, Pokey Anderson, Gary Von Ootegham, Hugh Krell, Jerry Miller, or me. Either we are not doing our jobs well or no one is listening.

financial success, though I doubt its critical draw.

Critics. I hate them. They destroyed me in FULVERSON-50. They said terrible things about me in BONDAGE.

Good morning. Hello.

My lover made the mistake of directing this fiasco. I call it a fiasco because it will surely mar his otherwise flawless reputation in the film industry. No one is going to appreciate, in this day and age, a musical extravaganza based on the antiquated tales of Flash Gordon. NO ONE.

The publicity releases state: THE FIRST MOVIE EVER FILMED IN OUTER SPACE! We have all been run through the mill with ad campaigns that take up, it seems, more of our time than the actual filming. I am sick of it.

The editor of the film is a maniac named George Swineson who does not like me and will probably do his best to make me look as ridiculous as possible in the final prints.

The star of this film is the sensational Sandra Cohen. (Ha.)

I don't know. I'm rambling on about nothing. I'm sick of it all. I'm sick of breathing heated air and drinking water that tastes like pee and eating food that smells like shit.

If you have been waiting safely in your closet for a modern Moses to lead you safely out . . . forget it! He ain't comin'. We, collectively, are the Moses of gay liberation. When the gay lawyer, gay doctor, or gay middle class businessman or woman realize that they too are the target of homophobia, prejudice, and ignorance and begin to actively respond to each incident of harassment, then we will begin to show progress.

If a bar or bookstore is raided and needless arrests are made, hundreds of outraged citizens should literally tie up city hall phone lines complaining. Those arrested should demand the jury trials they are entitled to, and then sue for redress of any excessive police action. Hardy souls should refuse to post bond and insist on speedy trials. All witnesses should meet and write out their observations to be used in court. And dozens of people should fill the Wednesday morning city council agenda in loud complaint.

We have a literal alphabet of gay support organizations: GAA, GPC, MCCR, CCC, UHO, Integrity/Hous-
