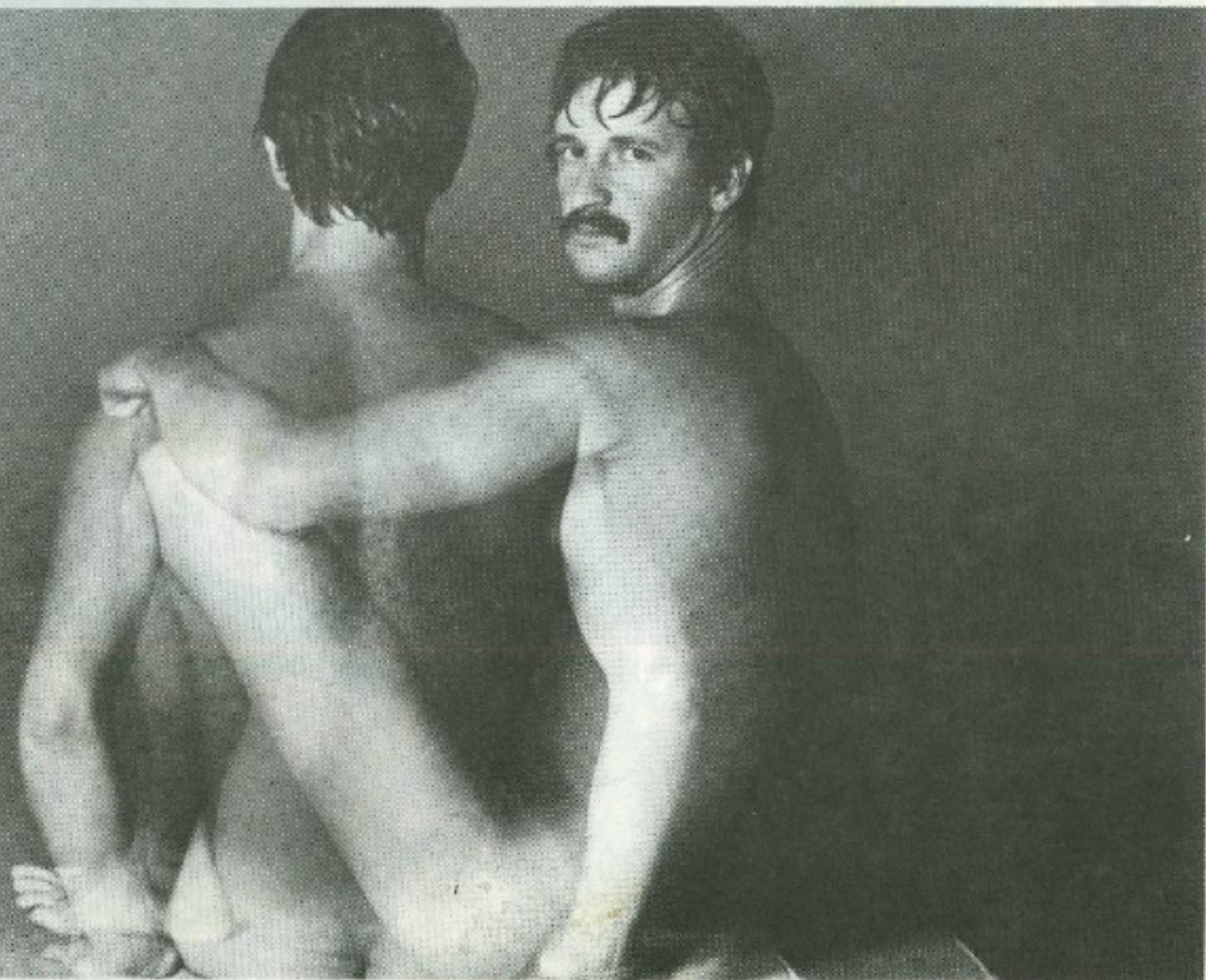

Benefits for Texas Human Rights Foundation Successful

This week across Texas we can be proud of the monies we are raising through benefits. Two weeks ago San Antonio Country held an F-Dance benefit during Fiesta for the Texas Human Rights Foundation, and raised \$750. Two Sundays ago, the annual Miss Gay Houston Pageant at the OP raised approximately \$2,200. And, last Sunday night the annual Mr. Houston Pageant netted another \$2,700 for the THRF. In addition to the money donated by the OP door in the TWT/Union Jack co-sponsored event, the following clubs pledged: The Copa \$200, Mary's \$100, and The Spirit Cafe \$100. The next benefit will be R.M. Production's Miss Gay USA-Texas Pageant at The Copa on May 20th and 21st.

In another benefit, over \$1,200 was raised at the Bartenders' Drag Show which was held at Houston's Club L'Amour on May 3rd. \$684 was donated in cash and another \$600 in pledges. \$400 of that money will go to the Family and Friends of Gays founded by Mary Thelma "Disco Grandma" and Mrs. Anella Harrison. The balance, around \$800, will go to the local committee on organizing the March on Washington, on Sunday, October 14th.

We of the gay community can be proud of our brotherly efforts of being so generous as "to give" in the name of human rights!

**Gay politics;
straight-forward
campaign.**

In the recent Austin elections, I ran for City Council, and in a four-man race, came in second with approximately 5,000 votes. From the time I announced, I made no effort to conceal the fact that I am gay, and in fact, because I announced my affiliation with gay organizations, it was widely known. Much to my surprise, it never became a campaign issue — no thundering sermons from Rev. O'Chester's pulpit (he had brought Saint Anita to Austin) and no smears (that I know of). Just a straight-forward campaign on the issues. Perhaps it was just this campaign in which *all* the incumbents won by landslide margins; perhaps it was because my opponent thought it unnecessary; but I like to think it was because Austin is the kind of city in which we can all take pride.

Most of the political alliances that gays have formed have been with the liberal-left and with other minority groups. In my opinion, it is a serious tactical error to anchor the future of the gay movement solely on this end of the political spectrum. I fear it alienates middle-class, middle-aged gays, and others. But Libertarian



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philosophy is gaining increasing acceptance among the American middle class, and could be the wave of America's political future. In California, we scored 375,000 votes for governor (the largest third party in its history). We were the only party to endorse Proposition 13 before it passed. We elected our first state legislator in Alaska and displaced the Republicans as the second party in several districts. In Austin, we expect to run one or more Libertarians in the next Austin City Council race. There are currently two Libertarians running for the City Council in your city, Houston. Naturally, like all of us, they vehemently defend equal treatment for gays.

Since Libertarians have always supported equal treatment for gays, as a matter of principle, I believe it would be in your interest and the interest of the community you serve, to give coverage to our candidates. Thank you for your consideration.

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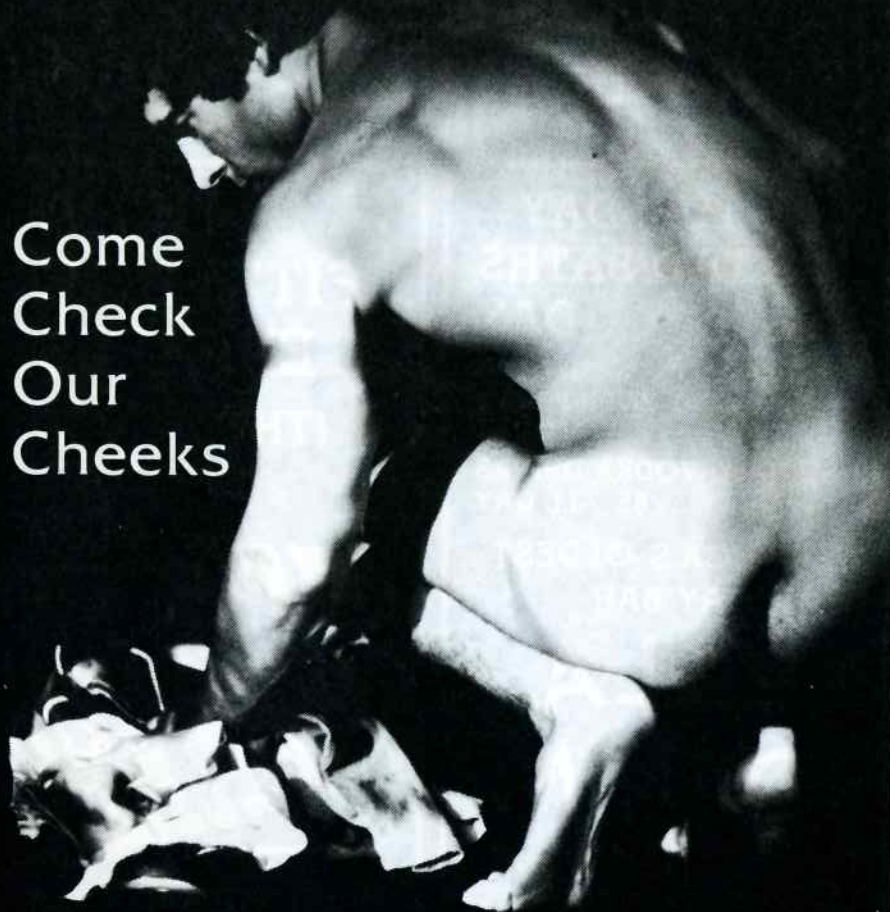
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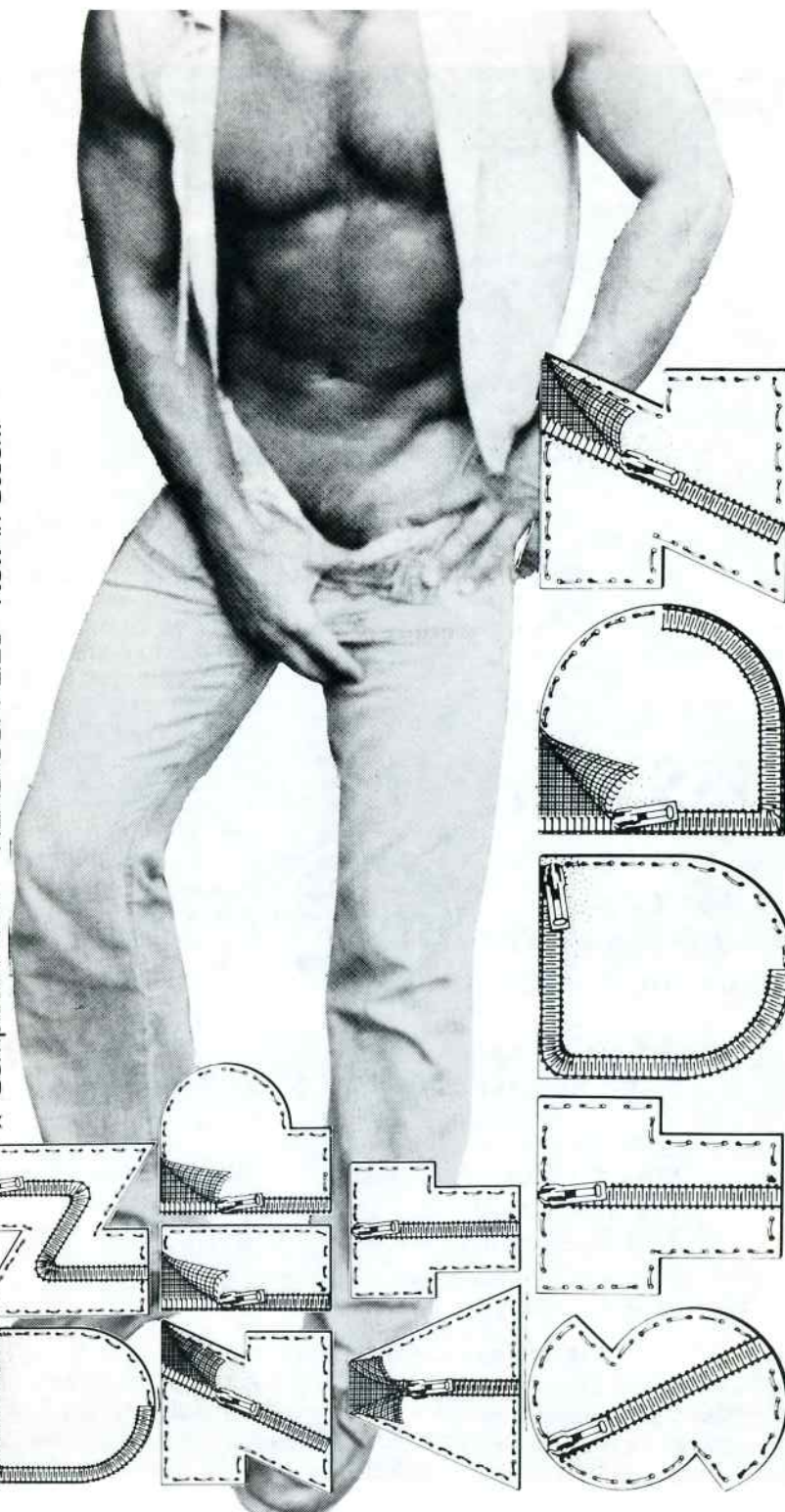
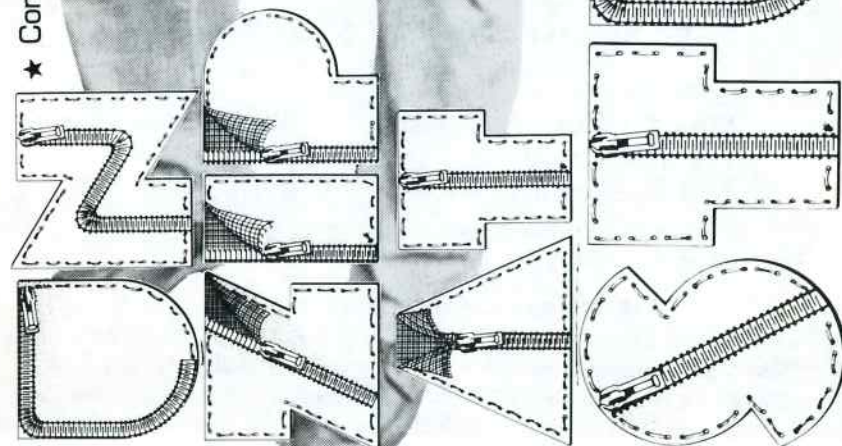
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LIFE WITH VERA by John Gardner

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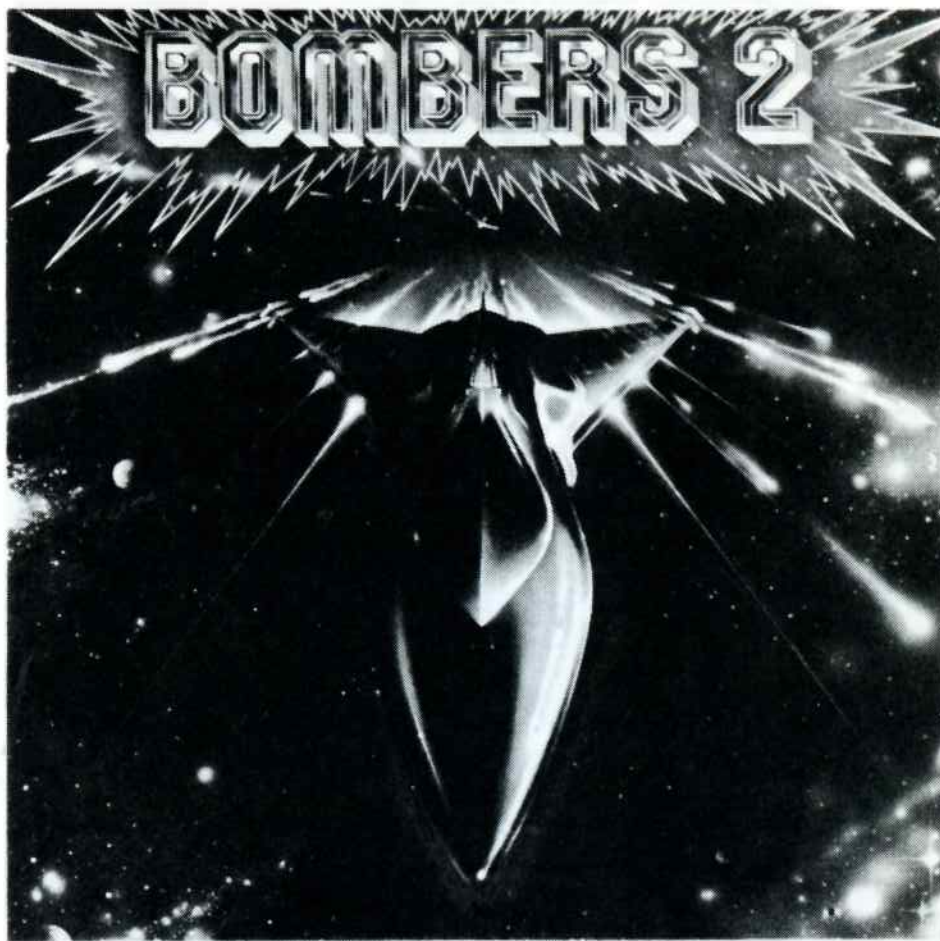
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MAYBE TIME ISN'T SUCH A GREAT HEALER AFTER ALL

ALLAN'S LANDING: Allan Carr, the producer of *Grease* and Hollywood's most beloved caftaned chubbette, will be heading to Fire Island soon to begin production on the movie *The Music Never Ends*. With a budget of \$10 million, the film will be the most elaborate and expensive epic, with a gay plot and theme, done so far. Making his acting debut and starring in the gay film will be former decathalon champ Bruce Jenner. Pour it on! Pour it on!

GAY BUCKS: Liza Manelli, Diana Ross and The Village People are swinging into summer with money pouring in faster than it can be counted. Hitting the concert tour trail, these performers are having both their egos and pocketbooks bolstered by throngs of gay men lining up at the box office. Ironically, the biggest winner in the trio, Village People, is the one most reluctant to concede a large gay following. Manelli and Ross both publicly acknowledge their gay fans. Village People, however, prefer to remain ungratefully silent on the issue. The Manelli show and the Ross show have not been complete sellouts, but biz is still booming by anyone's definition. Insiders say the Manelli show is suffering a bit because of the high ticket prices, and the Ross show doesn't always fill to capacity, because it's playing large, large theatres. In Rochester, New York, Ross's ticket sales totaled about \$66,000 out of a potential of \$84,000. The show picked up steam in Buffalo, however, when \$133,000 was made out of a potential \$150,000. The Village People tour, in which they are teamed with Gloria Gainer, is definitely standing room only at every stop along the way. And that's only part of the good news for The Village People. The group is on the verge of breaking a lot of recording industry records too. On the list of nation wide top selling single records the last week, Village People again had not one, not two, but three entries. "In the Navy" ranked number seven after being on the charts for six weeks, "YMCA" was in the twelfth position, after being on the charts 27 weeks. "Macho Man", after being on the charts an unbelievable 46 weeks is still hanging on to 40th position. This success is also reflected on the Nation-wide list of top selling LP's and tapes. On that chart, The Village People's "Go West" album is number 12, the "Cruisin'" album is number 20, and the "Macho Man" album is still selling good enough to retain the 38th spot. The sale of that "Macho Man" album is especially incredible when you consider

that it's been out for 52 weeks. Yes, this is the one year anniversary of the release of the "Macho Man" album and it's still on the charts. Admittedly, it's dropped down to 38th place, but, my God, it is so old, old, old!

OH, ANGELA! Fans of Angela Lansbury will be delighted to know that she has just signed to star as Miss Marple in the upcoming film version of Agatha Christi's *Mirror Crack'd*. Talk about perfect casting! If anyone can crack a mirror, Angela can, God love her.
