

TEN MONTROSE MURDERS UNSOLVED

The past months in Houston's Montrose have been the most violent ever! There are currently ten murders of gays that still remain unsolved. Detective John M. Donovan who has spent the past ten years with the Houston Police Department in the Homocide Division, has been appointed the official liaison between the police and the gay community.

Speaking at a recent Tuesday night meeting of "Family," he assured all that his department is only interested in solving these murders. Gays should not feel that his department is interested in harrassing gays who come forward with information. He stated that too often gays fail to divulge information because they feel intimidated by the HPD. He also recalled having grown up in Montrose and noted the violent changes in the community.

If you know information about a past murder or witness a murder tonight, call the HPD Homicide Division at (713) 222-3651 and ask for Detective Donovan personally. Detective Donovan will meet with Integrity/Houston at 3405 Mulberry at Hawthorne on October 11 at 7:30pm. Topic of discussion will be "Murders in the Montrose Community."

"BANG BANG, QUEER" 7 ARRESTED IN 28 MINUTES

On the night of Saturday, September 15, a gay male was snatched up near a Houston disco and driven to a side street where five juveniles (4 males and one female, ages 16 and 17) robbed the man at knife point. The man reported it to the Montrose Patrol dispatcher, Steve Coates, remembering the license plate (SHB-820) and color of car (Blue Continental). The MP publishes a weekly list of suspicious cars and plates.

One week later, Friday, September 21, a Montrose Patrolman recognized the same blue car back in Montrose in the Baby Giant parking lot at Helena and Westheimer. The Houston police were notified and quickly arrested the occupants. After a search, HPD found three sets of stolen billfolds with picture ID's, a sack of stolen money, and a box of 38 cal. pistol shells.

At the same time of the above arrest, a yellow Mazda with plate JK-6947 was headed east on Westheimer. A gay male reported to the Montrose Patrol that the occupants had pointed a pistol at him. saying, "Bang Bang, Queer!" Again the MP notified HPD. In a scene reminiscent of TV's "Rookies," a human blockade was erected across Westheimer in front of Baby Giant. When the Mazda traveled east into this human roadblock, the HPD made an arrest and found a 32 cal. revolver, MP leader, Jim Erwin, remembered that earlier there had been two more people in the car. They were quickly found on foot nearby by MP men Vennie and Rick in MP unit 213. The two suspects had ditched another pistol which the MP found in a neighborhood trash can.

In both simultaneous arrests, seven people (2 adults and 5 juveniles) were apprehended in just 28 minutes. They were the ones who one week previously had robbed at knife-point several gay males. The HPD said they couldn't have made the arrests without the assistance of the Montrose Patrol. And, the Montrose Patrol wishes to openly thank patrol officers B. Russell, J. Zdiedzic, J. Myers, and C. Grant, plus district supervisor Sgt. Windham for their quick cooperation. The MP and the HPD are working together to make Montrose safer.

DALLAS SCHOOL TEACHER TO FIGHT FOR JOB

Bill Nelson teaches at a Dallas High School. Last Labor Day he was working for the March on Washington Committee at the Democratic Fun Fest in Lee Park. TWT covered the event with a two-page photo essay (see volume 5, issue 25, September 14-20, 1979). One of the photos (on page 59) was of Mr. Nelson wearing a



"march" t-shirt. That issue of TWT found its way into the High School. The school administration, having seen his photo in TWT, are now sending him a letter of reprimand. Teacher Nelson told TWT he is going to fight it since the reprimand is based solely on moral reasons.

The Dallas School Board Administration should have also read our frontpiece on page 6 which says, "Publication of the photograph of any person in TWT is not to be construed as any indication of the sexual orientation of said person..."

It should be noted in volume 4, issue 39, December 23-29, 1978, a photo appeared on page 46 in "Hot Tea" showing State Representative and Mrs. Sam Hudson and Dallas City Councilwoman, Juanita Craft, cutting the ribbon at the grand opening of the Metro Baths. Neither reported having received a letter of moral reprimand from their political parties.

NEW HOUSTON GAY COFFE HOUSE OPENS

Last Friday, September 28, a Community Coffee House began operation at 3405 Mulberry at Hawthorne. The coffee house is open from 7pm 'til 11pm every Friday night for all lesbian and gay brothers and sisters who prefer non-alcoholic social activities. Billed as a "social alternative," the Coffee House is being sponsored alternately by Integrity/Houston and the Weslayan Fellowship for Gay United Methodists and is offering free films, pool, bridge, and a casual, comfortable atmosphere. BUCK FOR RIGHTS HOUSTON LOBBY NIGHT

Concern over abusive police conduct has dominated the headlines in Houston for some time now. If a special legislative session occurs in early 1980 in Austin, the issue of "wiretapping" will undoubtedly be part of the Governor's call. Imagine the Houston Police Department or the Department of Public Safety having these powers as well. This is just one of the major concerns of the Human Rights Advocates (the lobbying arm of the Texas Gay Task

Force, Inc.) if Governor Clements follows through as promised and pushes the law-making body to pass his demand for electronic surveillance.



The 66th session lobbyist, Bettie Naylor (photo above) warns, "We must again be on our toes and be present in Austin if a special legislative session is called. The Governor must give only two weeks' notice of his intentions, certainly not much time for the statewide gay/lesbian community to raise \$6-8,000 to protect our few remaining freedoms."

Naylor told TWT, "The regular session should have frightened all Texans, especially the gay/lesbian community. During the regular session, lawmakers attempted to pass a law which could have closed the state's gay bars, attempted to ban poppers, tried to raise the state's drinking age and passed an unbelievable obscenity statute which no lawmaker opposed." She warns, "The enemies of civil liberties and human rights are at work in Texas; the time has come that we must be present and "BUCK FOR OUR RIGHTS." After all, Naylor points out, "We all live under state law. No matter how we feel about Austin and the Legislature, they do affect our lives!"

Houstonians will have an opportunity this Saturday night, October 6, to become active in halting some of the absurdities of the state's 181-member lawmaking body. The Human Rights Advocates is sponsoring "Lobby Night," in which Houston's gay/lesbian bars will be participating. "Lobby Dollars" will be sold in

these bars. Lobby supporters will be exchanging a "Lobby Dollar" for an actual one dollar bill.



Naylor predicts the event will raise some \$6,500. "Every gay and lesbian in Houston who goes to a bar this Saturday night will have an opportunity to buy a "Lobby Dollar" (A BUCK FOR YOUR RIGHTS) and become active in protecting his/her rights." Some of the bars have agreed to split the door proceeds with the HRA and others will offer a drink special in exchange for a "Lobby Dollar."

Lobby Nights will also be scheduled in other Texas cities during the month of November. Proceeds collected will go toward eliminating the 66th session debt and to the special session lobbying fund of the Human Rights Advocates, P.O. Box 39406, San Antonio, Texas 78239.

1980 TEXAS DEMO CONVENTION

The Lesbian/Gay Democrats of Texas recently elected co-chairs and is now in the process of electing a steering committee to serve until the 1980 State Democratic Convention. Janna Zumbrun of Austin and Allan Calkin of Dallas were elected temporary co-chairs. One woman and one man will be elected from each of five Texas regions to serve as the steering committee. They will draft a detailed statement of purpose and arrange for means of operation until convention time.

L/GDT was informally organized prior to the 1978 Democratic Convention and operated as a caucus coordinating the activities of the approximately 100 lesbian and gay delegates and alternates who attended. At the recent Sixth Annual Texas Gay Task Force Conference in Austin, it was decided that a more structured organization was immediately needed.

MATLOVICH IS DALLAS KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Leonard Matlovich will be the principal keynote speaker at the North Texas Committee for the March on Washington press conference next Friday, October 12, at 3pm at D/FW airport.

Texas International Airlines is providing the VIP Suite for the committee to speak out regarding discrimination of gays and lesbians in the Dallas/Ft. Worth Metroplex. Matlovich will be addressing the five demands of the National March on Washington. Debbie Shaffer and Mark Earhart told TWT, "Numbers make us visible. We need media coverage if we are to be recognized in D/FW and let the ruling class know that we exist and that we are not going away."

MARCH ON WASHINGTON FINAL LOGISTICS

The organizers of the National March have announced the final logistics and plans for the October 14 Washington, D.C. event. Over half a million gays from all fifty states will be listed on the March roster in the following order:

Third World lesbians will lead the March followed by the physically challenged; children and senior citizens; internationals led by Puerto Rico; parents and friends of gays; then, the regions: Prairie (includes Texas), Rocky Mountain, Far West, Midwest, Southeast, Northeast, Middle Atlantic, plus any remaining contingents of national organizations.

The March will gather in the block bordered by Constitution and Independence Avenues, 3rd and 4th streets beginning early Sunday morning. The March will step off at noon and proceed down Pennsylvania Avenue ending at the Washington Monument end of the Mall where the rally will begin at 2pm.

Any regional banners are to be 15 feet across. For further information, call the National Logistics Office in Washington, D.C. at (204)789-1070.






Dear Councilman Westmoreland,

I'd like to thank, in my turn, the gay community for having come and enjoyed themselves, for having expressed their appreciation, and for having generally behaved so well. I look forward to doing it again.


"JUNIOR TERRORISTS" AT IT AGAIN



SHOULD GAY GET CUSTODY?

A reader of the Dallas Morning News has forwarded to TWT an article which appeared, copyrighted, in the Des Moines Register and Tribune, entitled, "Should homosexual parent get custody of the kids?"

Q. I am getting divorced and want custody of my three children. I am well educated, productive and a good mother. I am also a lesbian. My husband believes I am a bad influence on the children and is trying to take them away from me. What do you think my chances are in court?

A. According to Rosalie Davies, founder of Custody Action for Lesbian Mothers, your chances are poor—90 percent against. Ten years of legal history demonstrates that fathers, grandparents, other relatives and even the state have a 90-percent probability of gaining custody.

Following the rise of the homosexual rights movement, lesbians have pushed for courtroom confrontation of their lifestyle. Initially judges displayed open and strong prejudice. In 1973 and 1974 two major decisions were reversed in favor of lesbian

mothers. While these decisions did not lead judges to rule in favor of lesbian mothers, they did cause the judges to decide cases on other grounds.

In 1976 a New York court addressed the constitutional issues involved but subordinated them to the "best interests of the child." This gave judges license to base their adverse decisions squarely on the grounds of lesbianism. A breakthrough of sorts occurred in 1978-79 when two cases heard in state supreme courts ruled in favor of lesbian mothers.

Judge Ross Campbell of the Michigan Circuit Court recently set forth guidelines for lesbian custody cases. Judge Campbell advised that homosexuality per se should not be used as grounds for disqualification as a custodial parent. He suggested judges should attempt to determine which parent offered the greatest degree of stability and which had been the primary parent.

Most custody decisions are based on what a lesbian mother is believed to be rather than on an evaluation of that particular person's skills as a mother. While serving on a National Institute for Mental Health team studying homosexual families, Dr. Richard Green concluded:

"Many of the children were aware of what happens in a lesbian relationship. However, all of them were typical in their own sexual orientation. Little girls wanted to play with dolls and little boys with trucks and games. When they played house, girls were mommies and boys were daddies."

Dr. Green described the youngsters as liberal children who were tolerant of alternate lifestyles, yet did not wish to adopt them.

Ms. Davies advises against litigation if at all possible. She believes most caring fathers will agree to some form of shared custody. She points out that in the court-room one adult wins and the other loses. However, the child always comes out a loser.

Since the courts have not addressed themselves to the question of who is a lesbian mother, the criterion emerging is a tendency to commit homosexual acts. A few states have adopted the language of the Uniform Marriage and Divorce Act, which states, "The court shall not consider conduct of a proposed custodian that does not affect his relationship to the child." This wording shifts the responsibility onto the opposing party to demonstrate that a mother's sexual preference does affect her relationship to the child.

A further problem is that most attorneys have little expertise in cases such as yours. The bottom line: You're going to have a tough time.



VILLAGE MIXUP: That new "Village People" album, "Low & Sleazy," has a new twist. A cast change. Half of the album tracks were recorded in concert, live at the Universal Amphitheatre here in L.A., and featured lead singer Victor Willis, who has since departed the group. The studio half of the double-album has Willis' replacement, Ray Simpson, doing the honors as the group's lead vocalist. And just when you thought the V.P. were incapable of new sounds, huh?

POOR MARY: As this month draws to a close, the hot concert news for September was, of course, Liza Minnelli's opening at Carnegie Hall. On the other side of town, however, there was an opening that drew much less attention. It was an equally touching event. But unfortunately, the emotions it touched were those of sympathy and sadness. It was the opening of Mary Wilson as a solo performer on the disco circuit.

Appearing at the disco "New York, New York," Mary Wilson attempted to recreate the excitement she enjoyed when she, along with the late Florence Ballard and Diana Ross, set the world on fire as the original "Supremes." It didn't work.

But the blame is not to be laid on Ms. Wilson's vocal talents. The pipes were conditioned, strong, and in solid form. The difficulty was created by attempting to put the Motown sound in a disco. The Motown sound is as highly rhythmic as basic disco, but the thundering and overpowering dominance of the skeleton-vibrating thumps proved too much for the less-hysterical material at the base of Wilson's act.

And worse, the crowd facing Ms.

Wilson had come to be seen, rather than to see. The presence of Diana Ross in the audience only added to the confusion. The evening was not pleasant. And the looks of sorrow exchanged between Mary and Diana could make a grown man cry. I





me to report today.




