DALLAS MAYORAL, COUNCIL CANDIDATES ADDRESS OAK LAWN DEMOCRATS

*Contenders Set Forth Positions
on AIDS, Oak Lawn Plan,
Discrimination, Crime & More.*

DALLAS — Candidates for the mayor's office recently met with the Oak Lawn Democrats in an open forum held at the public library on Cedar Springs. Those in attendance included Kathryn Cain, Frank P. Hernandez, Rufus Higgenbotham, Forrest Smith and Dallas Jackson. Steve Bartlett's staff said his schedule would not allow him to attend due to a previous commitment.

Each candidate was given two questions to answer directly in a brief period of time. Each candidate was then allowed to give a brief summation of his or her overall campaign stands.

Smith, when asked about hiring gays and lesbians on the Dallas police force, said, "We need to start looking at what people can do, instead of at labels. The division in our city is because we look at differences. We need to rebuild our city by looking at what people are capable of doing."

Smith also stressed the serious nature of the issue of homelessness in Dallas, citing a need for counseling and activities for the homeless. He said that probably one-third of those who are homeless have previously been institutionalized or been addicted to drugs or alcohol.

Higgenbotham said that education and jobs are needed first, and then the crime rate would decline.

Jackson said that adult video businesses should definitely be restricted, as well as what he called "naked bars," and that this could be accomplished by enforcing stricter zoning regulations.

Cain said that the standard for single family homes in the Oak Lawn area should be preserved, through the enforcement of codes and the leverage of city funds for home repairs.

Higgenbotham drew an irate response from the crowd when he said that while driving through the Oak Lawn area he



noticed businesses that were, in his words, "not the best kind."

When asked to elaborate, he explained, "I don't think I really want to get into it here and now." When pressed as to whether he was referring to the gay bars in the area, he responded by saying he was not opposed to gays and lesbians "per se."

Cain said she felt that each neighborhood should define itself, as some become purely residential and others include commercial interests. She said that it was not the Mayor's job to direct the plan for a particular neighborhood, but to "listen carefully to all sides, and then act with the neighborhood organizations to help promote the quality of life" in the area.

In summing up her position, Cain said that money was tight in the city budget and therefore tough decisions will have to be made. She said that she would give Dallas a "chance to have progressive politics at City Hall. My 20 years of business background and years of civic service help me understand the various components that are needed in city government."

Jackson said that he is not afraid to "get [his] hands dirty. I want to bring dignity to all people, and give everyone an opportunity to be heard." He also noted that when he was producing programs for access cable, he was not afraid to have PWAs on his program, even when some cameramen refused to work on those shows.

Higgenbotham claimed that he has found \$18 million that he can cut from the city budget. "The top 100 people in city government are making at least \$75,000 or more. How many of you are making that much now?"

Smith said that he believes in a seven-day waiting period for handgun purchases, he is pro-choice, for the elderly and veterans, and would move to eliminate the practice of discrimination in the hiring of gays and lesbians by the Dallas Police Department.

Hernandez was the only candidate to use his summation time to attack his opponents. "Are we getting the same thing with Kathryn Cain that we got with Annette

Strauss?" He also described himself as a "real civil rights lawyer," and chastised Cain for her years working with the Safeway supermarket chain, which, in Hernandez' words, "was run out of town."

Also appearing at the forum were City Council District 14 candidates Alton L. Kolpien, Rick Finlan, Michael David Needleman and Lori Palmer.

Palmer said she would seek to reinstate the funds for AIDS services which City Council had previously cut completely from next year's budget.

Palmer was queried about the Oak Lawn Plan, part of which, if approved, could impose such strict zoning regulations that gay clubs in the area would be forced to close. Palmer said she had not been involved in the planning of the zoning changes, but that parking issues had been raised by the Oak Lawn Forum back in the 80's.

Palmer also said that the Oak Lawn area has its own zoning regulations that are not applicable citywide due to these previous provisions.

Needleman countered that using zoning regulations in such an indiscriminate manner was a "blatant form of discrimination." Finlan said, "City codes need to be enforced uniformly, whether it's restaurants or dance halls." There is nothing wrong with applying these codes to the entire city."

Kolpien claimed that more revenues could be raised by charging Highland Park and University Park taxes for the sewage that the city of Dallas processes for them currently. He also said he believed that the antidotes are in place for the treatment of AIDS, citing Jonas Salk and the polio vaccine as an example.

Needleman asked voters to ask themselves if they were better off today than they were two years ago. "It is time for a change for the future of the city. There are tough questions that must be answered."

Finlan said that crime was his number one issue, and he also wants to stem the tide of urban flight. "We need to increase the quality of life to bring people back to the city."

Palmer said she is proud of her three terms on City Council and will gladly stand on her record, especially in her appointments on civil rights issues.

"I am well informed, and I argue for issues. I am not afraid to develop strong positions."

AUSTIN'S 'FROM ALL WALKS OF LIFE' RAISES OVER \$160,000

Over 3,500 Take Part in ASA Fund-Raiser October 20.

AUSTIN — On Sunday, October 20, over 3,500 people joined together for the "From All Walks of Life" walk and raised over \$163,500 for AIDS care, education and research. The fourth annual event was sponsored by AIDS Services of Austin [ASA] and coordinated by Dara Gray and over 300 volunteers.

By nine o'clock Sunday evening, the total had gone over the original goal of \$150,000 by some \$13,500. The final total is expected to be even higher, as some pledges and donations had not yet come in.

The festivities started with registration at 1:30 p.m. The crowd then proceeded to the grounds of the state Capitol for warm-up exercises and speeches by various Austin dignitaries.

ing speeches was given by Patricia Presley, president of the ASA board of directors. The five-kilometer walk then followed.

The large throng of participants worked their way back to the Capitol grounds, where they enjoyed food furnished by local businesses and entertainment by Austin musicians.

ASA will share 25% of the net proceeds from the walk with ALLGO [INFORME SIDA], Austin Immune Health Clinic, the C.A.R.E. Unit, the Central East Austin Community Organization, Christopher House and the HIV Study Group.

Also benefiting will be the Pediatric AIDS League, People's Community Clinic, Planned Parenthood, Project Transitions and the Waterloo Counseling Center. The proceeds will assist all these agencies to provide hospice care, conduct prevention education, offer counseling for HIV-infected people and conduct drug trial research, among other invaluable services.

Several participants won prizes for outstanding support of the walk. Jim Campbell, who turned in the largest money amount the day of the walk, received a trip for two to any American Airlines destination in the world, courtesy of TrameX Travel. Jim had asked more than 200 of his friends for pledges and showed up with \$5,165.

Jayne Larson won the drawing for a trip to Cancun, Mexico, and Geary Simmons won Honorable Mention for turning in \$4,605 in pledges.

Coordinator Gray told TWT NEWS, "The organizers are very pleased with the response and the events of the day. We are absolutely overwhelmed by the total raised, and will let everyone know the final total raised as soon as it becomes available."

PARKER FILES SUIT IN CITY COUNCIL REDISTRICTING CASE

*Seeks to Prevent Imposition of
Plan Moving Montrose Out of
District C, Claiming It Violates
State Election Code.*

HOUSTON — District C City Council candidate Annise Parker has filed suit to voice her opposition to a redistricting plan still under consideration by the Justice Department which would move Montrose

into another district.

In a press conference held on Monday, Parker explained that she was acting to protect her interests as a candidate running in District C.

"I'm filing suit to stop what amounts to a blatant attempt at political gerrymandering by City Council and the Mayor," she said, referring to the modified 9-5 plan as an "October surprise" and "part of the incumbent protection frenzy" now affecting City Hall.

On October 11, less than a month before the November 5 elections, City Council devised a modified 9-5 plan in which Montrose would have been transferred from District C into District D, leaving incumbent Vince Ryan without a challenger.

The proposal was approved by a majority of Council members and Mayor Kathy Whitmire, and also won the tentative okay of the Justice Department.

U.S. District Judge David Hittner rejected the plan, however, and ordered city elections to proceed under a scheme adopted by City Council back on June 5.

Although Hittner rejected the modified 9-5 plan, it is still under consideration by the Justice Department as a possible solution to the city's redistricting problems.

The suit filed by Parker is based on the contention that an election held on November 5 under the modified 9-5 plan would be illegal under the state election code.

Under a provision of that code, no change may be made in the boundaries of a territorial unit of a political subdivision—in this case, a City Council district—less than five months before election day.

The provision is generally regarded as intended to prevent the practice of gerrymandering by incumbents trying to hold onto office.

Parker said her campaign has to date raised and spent approximately \$20,000 and sent out approximately 50,000 pieces of mail in District C. Any redistricting plan that moved Montrose out of that district into another would mean that her campaign's efforts had been wasted.

Parker rejected the claim by city officials that they had acted in a timely fashion to try to resolve the redistricting crisis. "They deliberately chose to ignore the ramifications of this. That's not leadership, and it's not effective representation."

Handling the case for Parker is Pamela C. Oglesby, an attorney with the Texas Human Rights Foundation in Austin.

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INT'L CONFERENCE OF GAY & LESBIAN OFFICIALS IN HOUSTON NOVEMBER 22-24

*HGLPC Sponsoring Seventh
Annual Gathering of Elected
& Appointed Officeholders.*

HOUSTON — Because so few openly gay or lesbian people have run for office or been elected in Texas, most voters are not used to the idea, and many believe that gays are not fit to serve. A gathering of gay and lesbian officials around the country in Houston may help to change that.

The November 22-24 conference is being hosted by the Houston Gay & Lesbian Political Caucus. GLPC board chair and conference organizer Chris Bacon told TWT NEWS that holding the conference would provide "an opportunity to attract talent from around the country so that we can learn how to get people elected and appointed."

"We see the conference as a good way to educate people in Houston to the fact that there are other cities around the country with gay and lesbian officials, and they seem to be doing a good job," he added.

The conference begins on Friday, November 22 and runs through Sunday. A variety of workshops will explore themes ranging from getting elected, AIDS and the law and legal recognition of gay and lesbian families to the gender problem in gay politics.

One feature of the ICOGLEAO conference will be five caucuses made up of representatives of five different interest groups: elected officials; appointed officials; political action committees, political organizations and campaigners; members of activist groups like ACT UP and Queer Nation; and significant others. The caucuses will address conference objectives and file reports.

Bacon described the objectives of the conference as fourfold: to create an organization structure for ICOGLEAO; to build bridges between caucuses; to develop an agenda for the nineties; and to examine and address current issues and policies facing the gay and lesbian community.

The Stouffer Presidente Hotel is the official hotel of the conference. A special

rate of \$69 per night is available for participants, and reservations may be made by calling (713)629-1200.

Those planning to attend can also take advantage of discount fares being made available by American Airlines. For more information, call 1-800-433-1790. Refer to "Star File No. S08N18B" when making reservations.

TEXAS AIDS PROJECT FILES TO INCORPORATE AS NONPROFIT GROUP

*Efflandt Steps Down as Executive
Director, to Remain as Consultant.*

AMARILLO — The Texas AIDS Project [TAP], which was formed to meet the needs of HIV-positive people and PWAs in the Panhandle area, has filed for incorporation under the Nonprofit Corporation Act. TAP Chairman Barry Oldfield said he expected the Internal Revenue Service to grant his group 501(c)(3) status shortly.

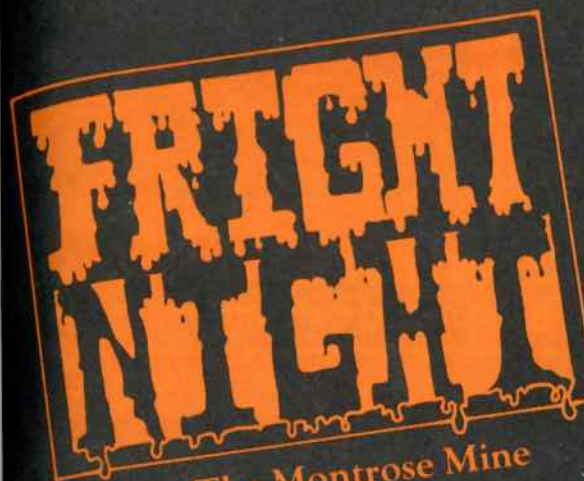
Oldfield also said he is encouraged by the reception his group has received since its formation, and stressed that TAP is working to build relationships with other organizations in the area.

Oldfield also announced that Rick Efflandt has resigned as Executive Director of TAP. Efflandt cited personal and health concerns as his reasons for leaving the post. He will continue as a consultant to the Executive Board, and will work on special projects for TAP and serve as a media spokesman for the group.

Kevin Danforth of Dallas has been selected as TAP's new Executive Director and will assume his new position effective November 1. Danforth has a Master's degree in clinical psychology as well experience with other support support programs.

Oldfield said he believed Danforth's experience and qualifications would help TAP in the development of its buddy program and the training of staff and peer counselors.

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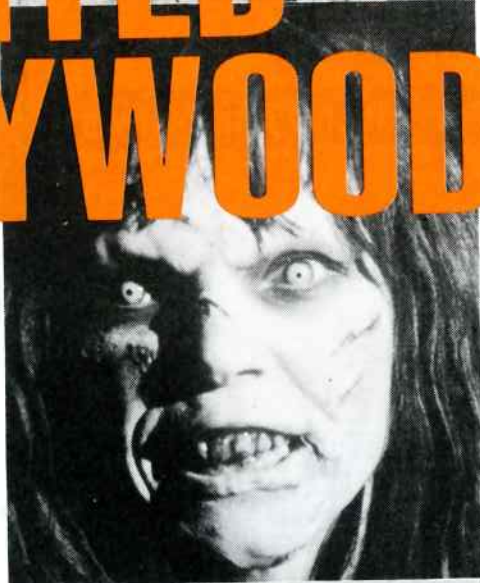

These Are the Facts

Dear TWT:

This September, yet another signal went out to the bigots, the hatemongers and the homophobes: The life of a person of color or a woman is not as dear as that of a straight white male. Further, if you are a person of color and are also homosexual, your life is almost insignificant. Therefore, murder, rape and crimes of hate may be committed against these souls with virtual impunity.

On January 1, 1990, then Marine private and New Jersey native Nicolo Giangrosso murdered Charles Resendez, a San Antonio substitute teacher. That the crime of murder was committed is a fact. The killer confessed to it.

The victim was bludgeoned and stomped to death. This too, is a fact. The victim's face was crushed and the soles of the killer's sneakers were imprinted on the victim's back.

The sequence of events leading to this heinous crime are not a matter of fact. The killer told inconsistent stories and, of course, dead men cannot speak. What is a matter of fact, however, is that on the day of this crime, both Resendez and Giangrosso entered a motel room, but only Giangrosso left the room alive and unscathed.

Despite no physical evidence to support the killer's final story (a story finally arrived at 20 months after the murder), our District Attorney Steve Hilbig and 186th District Court Judge Terrence McDonald gave undue credence to it.

The charges against the murderer were summarily reduced by Hilbig from capital murder to murder to voluntary manslaughter. This was done without ever consulting the family of the victim. This, too, is a fact.

The killer was ultimately sentenced by Judge McDonald to ten years probation with deferred adjudication. Simply speaking, if the killer is a good boy during his probationary period, the fact that he viciously and brutally took the life of

another living, breathing human being will be expunged from the record, as if nothing had happened! This, sadly, is also a fact; one that, sadder still, cannot be undone.

The murderer is now back in New Jersey, safe in hearth and home, reportedly working in the family business. His family has him back. This is a fact.

But what about the Resendez family of San Antonio? What do they have?

It is a fact that they do not have Charles anymore. Doubtless his sister, Patricia Perez, has and will always have in her memory the image of her brother with "his face bashed in" and Giangrosso's shoe imprints still "visible in Charlie's back."

The Resendez family will know forever the acrid taste of good-ol'-boy justice. Any redress they may obtain through the civil courts (thanks to Hilbig and McDonald, the only legal recourse available to them now) will pale in significance to the loss of a loved one.

This is all that they have; a dead family member and legal disenfranchisement by a system that failed them abysmally, and by extension, failed us all. This is all that they and we are left with. And that, San Antonio, is the saddest, most chilling fact of all.

The people of San Antonio elected Hilbig and McDonald to protect them and to prosecute, convict and punish the guilty.

Only the most jaded of cynics would claim they did so.

The judicial slap on the wrist given the killer was a sneering slap on the face to the Resendez family and all fairminded citizens.

The offices these two hold are elective offices. We must resolve to vote them out.

Steve Hilbig and Terrence McDonald, you stand accused of egregious malfeasance; you stand accused of abrogating the rights of the innocent; you stand accused of violating that which should be inviolate—the public trust; you stand accused of abject incompetence.

The jury is in and you are guilty as charged. Resign now. You will be held accountable.

To Governor: Bar Discrimination by State

The following letter was sent to Gov. Ann Richards urging her to issue an executive order outlawing discrimination by state agencies. The Governor has not responded.

—Editor

Dear Gov. Richards:

I respectfully urge that it is time for you to issue an executive order banning discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation by executive branch agencies in the state of Texas.

Other governors around the nation have issued such orders; it is hardly a groundbreaking measure. Most recently, on August 16, New Jersey Gov. James Florio issued an executive order of this type. Even the newly-elected Republican governor of Minnesota, Arne Carlson, issued such an order earlier this year. Among the more popular states in the country, Texas stands out in that it has not yet seen fit to take such action.

As an attorney in a state agency, and as a gay man, I can assure you this is not just a theoretical concern. In the same campaign last fall that put you into the governor's office, one prominent Republican candidate for statewide office promised to fire all the homosexuals employed at his agency if he were elected.

I know of a 15-year veteran of state employment who recently resigned his senior position with an agency led by elected Democrats, in large part because he was no longer willing to put up with his supervisors' anti-gay remarks. There is absolutely nothing in the law which would prohibit an agency head, even here in Travis County ("land of the free, home of the brave"), from discharging or demoting a state employee solely because of his or her sexual orientation.

You have always enjoyed the over-

whelming support of the lesbian/gay community in every political race you've ever run. You count many self-identified gay men and lesbians among your most trusted colleagues, and you have consistently encouraged sexual minorities to participate in the "New Texas."

So I had expected to hear you issue an executive order banning discrimination within your first eye-opening week in office. But you made no announcement. Perhaps, I thought, you were waiting to make the announcement in conjunction with the March on Austin earlier this year. But the largest civil rights rally in Austin's history came and went without any such announcement. I thought then that you might be waiting for the Legislature to leave town in order to avoid a reactionary backlash from those quarters.

But now the regular and special sessions are over, and the Legislature will not meet in regular session again until 1993. It is time for you to extend whatever legal protections you can offer to all those current and future state workers who happen to be homosexual or bisexual. At the very least, you are empowered to prohibit discrimination in employment at all of the "non-constitutional" state agencies.

I would urge you to follow the lead of so many other states and issue your own executive order, preferably one which would address employment practices in all executive branch agencies as well as the awarding of state contracts. It is the right thing to do.

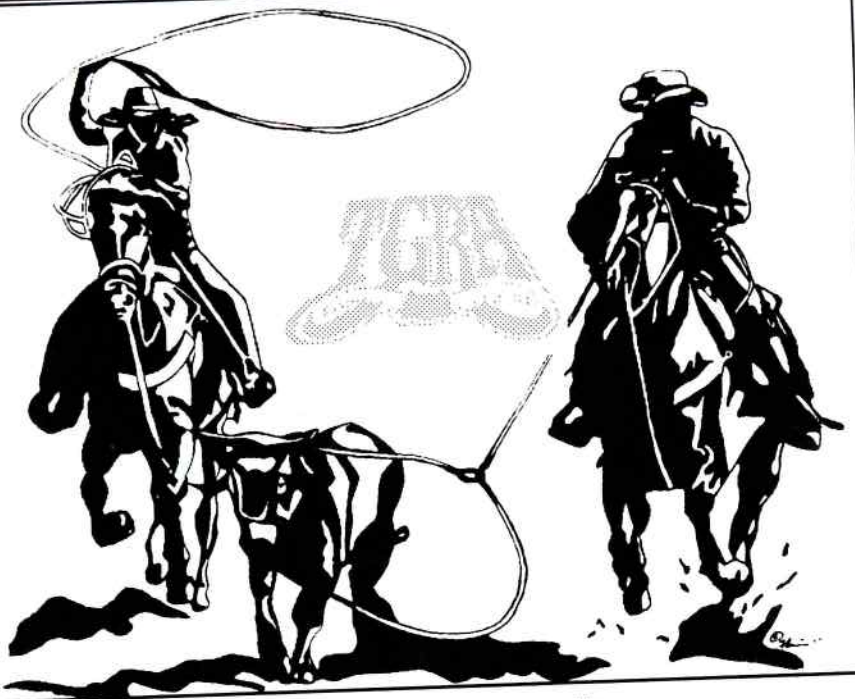
Come Out and Be Proud

Affecting Gays and Lesbians in Texas

Recently, State Rep. Billy Clemons [Dem.-Pollock] has stated that he is interested in running for Speaker of the Texas House. Currently this position is held by Gib Lewis [Dem.-Fort Worth]. Lewis has received a lot of negative press attention because of alleged ethics violations. However, considering Clemons' homophobia, Lewis is still the better of two evils in the race for Speaker.

Clemons has served as both the Vice Chairman of the Public Health Committee and as a member of the State Task Force on AIDS. Instead of offering his support to legislation that would have benefited people living with HIV, Clemons often used these committees as forums for gay-bashing.

Clemons' most recent round of gay-bashing was in a letter sent to Ben Rick Jordan, a resident of Lufkin and an AIDS activist in East Texas. Jordan was concerned because of remarks that he heard Rep. Clemons make during a TV interview in East Texas. In these remarks, Clemons stated that he was pleased that his work had helped slow the spread of AIDS in East Texas. Jordan took issue with this statement because he had not seen nor heard of Billy Clemons' activities in the East Texas AIDS community.

Jordan questioned Clemons' sincerity in a letter sent to the legislator in mid-September. Not only was the letter Jordan received back from Clemons unresponsive to his question, it also demonstrated Clemons' bigotry, ignorance and homophobia.

In his letter to Rick Jordan, dated October 2, Rep. Clemons states, "I am not

homophobic, if that means I am afraid of homosexuals. I don't fear them, but I do have some resentment, which is based on two things:

1) "Each person's lifestyle is their own business, but don't expect me to accept it and say it's okay. I don't expect anyone to tell me that what I do is okay, if what I'm doing is unhealthy or ungodly.

2) "HIV is a homosexual disease. It was brought to this country by homosexuals, spread all over by homosexuals (the original acronym was GRID, gay-related immunodeficiency disease). Babies would not be born with it, and blood recipients would not get it, if it had not been for homosexuals.

"If you think more heterosexual cases will cause society to blame policy makings, more than homosexuals, you're wrong. The general society blames the homosexual community. The fact that HIV was brought to and spread all over the U.S.A. by homosexuals is not a matter of opinion, but rather of expert testimony."

Clemons concludes his letter by stating, "Neither policy makers nor the public is concerned about preserving promiscuity. Our testimony made it obvious that what homosexuals really hated was that they would either have to abandon their promiscuity or die. Heterosexuals are beginning to realize that they had better do the same."

Clemons' letter demonstrates several things about his qualifications for Speaker of the House. First is his ignorance about AIDS. AIDS is a global epidemic that has been spread primarily among heterosex-

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uals. But whether the epidemic was spread among homosexuals or heterosexuals is a moot point. Placing blame at a time when millions of people are infected with HIV is a waste of time and energy that should be spent fighting the epidemic.

Secondly, Rep. Clemons seems to have very limited understanding of the United States Constitution. He states, "Each person's lifestyle is their own business, but don't expect me to accept it and say it's okay." This is fundamentally false. The United States Supreme Court has held that gay and lesbian people do not have a right to privacy. Our lifestyles are not our own business, but the business of federal and state government. Considering our lack of constitutional protection from governmental oppression, bigoted remarks by an elected official like Clemons are particularly threatening to our community.

We should not allow gay-bashers like Clemons to take any credit for the role our community has played in curbing the spread of the AIDS virus.

Finally, Clemons ignores the role that the gay and lesbian community has played in fighting AIDS. Lower infection rates among gay men in East Texas and elsewhere are not the result of biased legislators bashing gay and lesbian people. Instead, decreased infection rates are the result of community organizing and education within our own community. We should not allow gay-bashers like Clemons to take any credit for the role our community has played in curbing the spread of the AIDS virus.

There has been a lot of negative press about current Speaker Gib Lewis. However, if Clemons is the only person who decides to run against Lewis for the post, our community should not support Clemons. It is my hope, and the hope of many concerned individuals, that when the time comes to elect a new Speaker of the House, the people of Texas will have better choices than either Gib Lewis or Billy Clemons. The Fox network made TV history when two programs depicted African-American gay men within one hour of broadcast time.

Fox TV's *In Living Color* recently featured the resolution of last season's "cliffhanger" episode of "Men on...", the sketch series featuring two stereotypical black gay reviewers. It was followed immediately by an episode of the new show *Roc* with a storyline dealing with a visiting uncle who is gay.

Over the course of the last television season, many gays and lesbians wrote to *In Living Color* protesting the exploitation of a mean-spirited stereotype. Others just thought the skits were funny. But even many of these folks thought last season's cliffhanger went too far. That was the episode where Blaine gets hit on the head and goes straight: the link with gay-bashing was just too close for comfort.

The new television season has just started, and the much-touted cliffhanger resolution airs. Antoine desperately keeps whacking Blaine in hopes of making him return to his gay senses—which he eventually accomplishes—and everyone celebrates. And so the nasty conversion and violence elements are disposed of, and we're back to the same old stereotyping of last season.

It may be coincidence that these two shows aired during the same hour, or it could be that Fox has taken to heart the concerns expressed in readers' letters this year. In the climate of black lesbian and gay visibility on TV, the *In Living Color* characters dramatize the need for a broader spectrum of black gay portrayals. *Roc* shows Fox is beginning to realize that. As always, it's great to be included, but the media need a constant reminder that gay people don't come only in the male gender. Also, urge Fox to take the next step by airing more episodes with Roc's gay uncle, and allowing the gay characters to develop into more complex individuals.

Now for a little quiz. Here's the background:

It's difficult to encapsulate the effect Kimberly Bergalis has had on media coverage of AIDS. Her willingness to blame, and to place a moral value on the disease, have given the media a convenient way to sidestep responsibility for complete and fair coverage: this young woman says all these things, so they don't have to really cover the crisis.

The most recent news hype came when Bergalis testified before Congress in favor of mandatory testing. Prominent homophobe Congressman William Dannemeyer orchestrated the visit. (He's been one of the most shameless in using Bergalis to further stigmatize the disease.) Her statement "I didn't do anything wrong, but I'm being made to suffer like this" must have made Dannemeyer quite happy.

Now the quiz. Of the two most widely-read weekly national news magazines, *Time* and *Newsweek*, which one conspired in the push to stigmatize AIDS, and which provided some equitable coverage?

If you read *Time*'s unsigned piece on the Bergalis testimony, you undoubtedly picked up on its slant, and you know the answer. The photo caption used the notorious slur "innocent victim," and the text dismissed critics of mandatory testing with the line, "That's small comfort to Kimberly."

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Meanwhile, *Newsweek* printed a fuller exploration of the story in a "My Turn" piece. Tom Ehrenfeld pointed out the way the undeniable tragedy of Bergalis is being used as a political tool. He wrote about the media's insistence on creating AIDS "heroes" and "villains," stating that "the real villains are hatred and ignorance [and] the heroes...are love and education." *Newsweek* deserves credit for including this piece.

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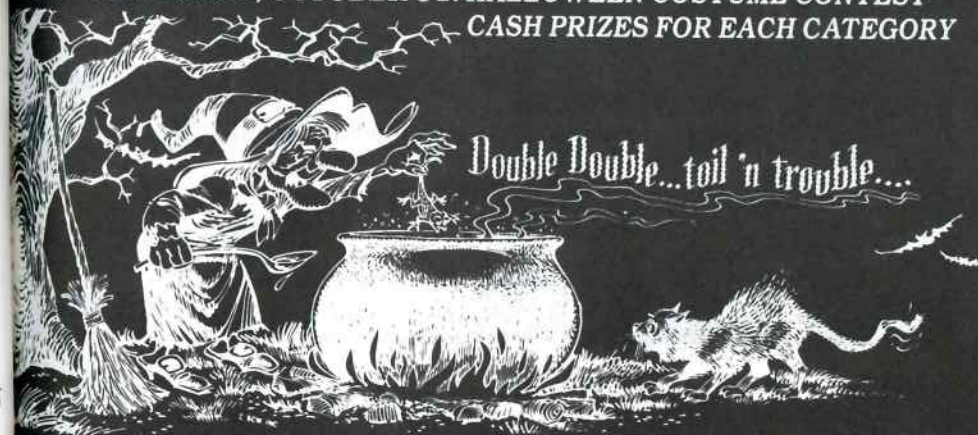

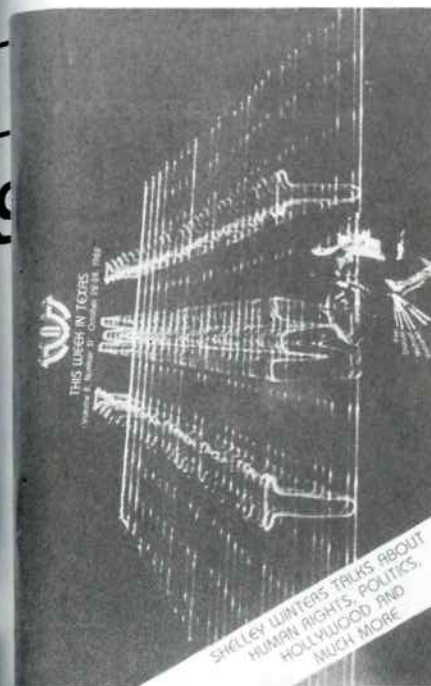

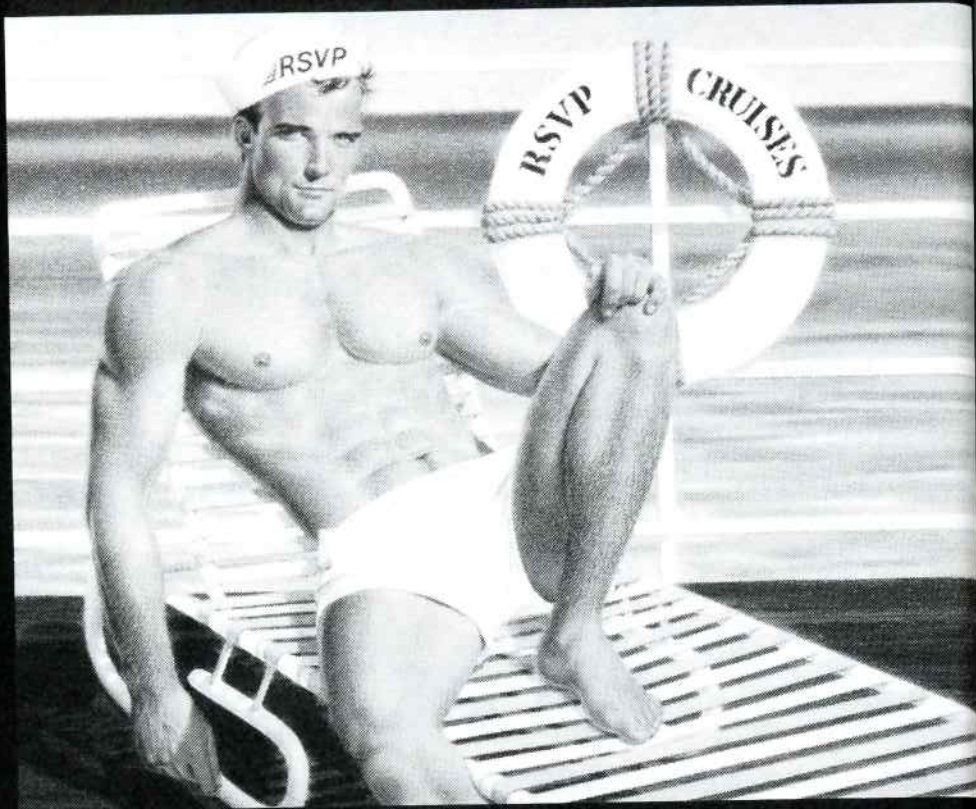
Each and every culturally defined group has one—one holiday which, traditionally, best expresses a sentiment, an important date or an ideal which symbolizes the achievements and desires of that group.

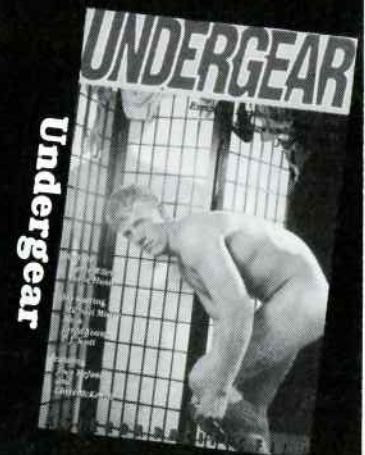

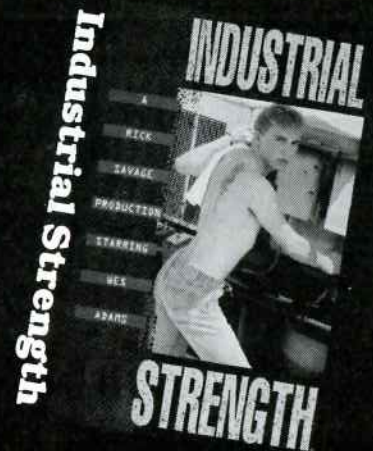

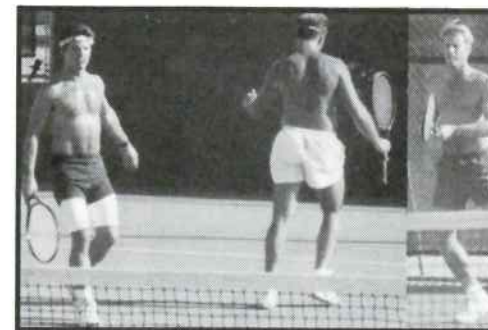
The switchboard operates as does any other voice mail system in that it permits individuals to record messages and receive responses delivered by phone. Informational mailboxes will also provide club news and information.

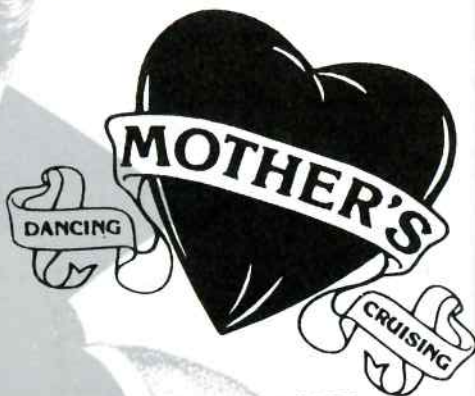

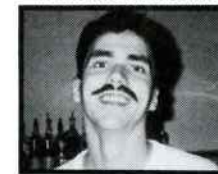

say goodbye.

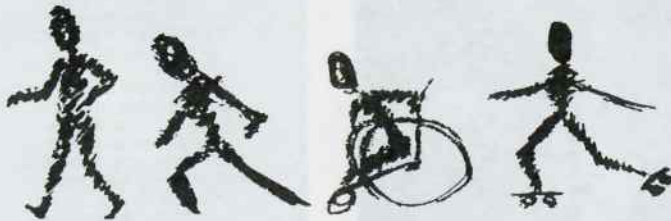
