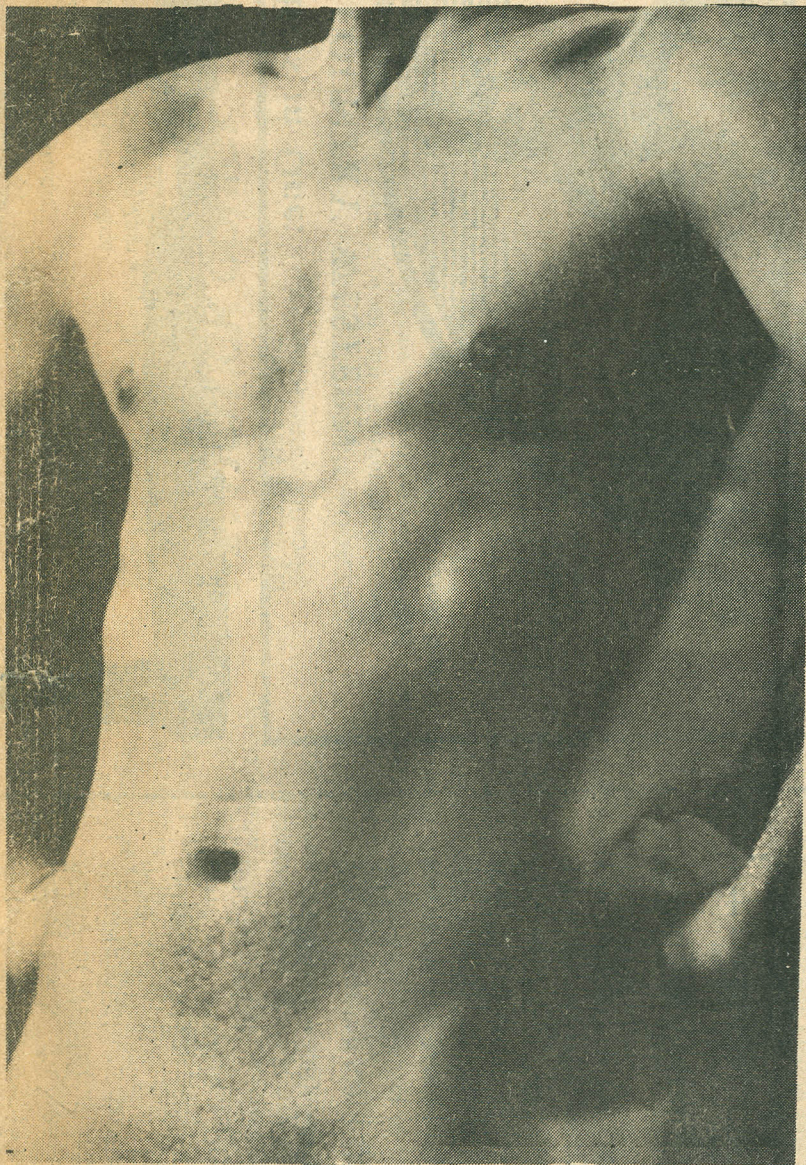

Connecticut House, governor deny rights

HARTFORD, Conn. — The Connecticut Senate approved a sweeping gay-rights bill April 16 by a vote of 23 to 11, a margin that was heavier than Lesbian lobbyist Christine Pattee predicted.

On April 23 the House voted the measure down, 87 to 60, after scattered objections surfaced at the last minute.

State Sen. Betty Houdson, D-Madison, attributed the House defeat in part to opposition from Gov. Ella Grasso, a Democrat who is conservative on abortion and other sex-related issues.

"It's just a matter of education," said Houdson, the co-chairperson of the Joint Human Rights and Opportunities Committee which unanimously approved the gay-rights bill April 7.

The senator refused to be dismayed by the setback, saying, "We couldn't have prepared for it any better than we did. We didn't have the votes for it when we went in (brought the bill to the House floor), but now we've got a whole year to work on it."

From her New Haven home, lobbyist Pattee reacted by calling a post-mortem meeting a week

later to lay plans for the 1976 session. The coalition she heads delivered a gay lobbying effort that has won national attention, producing in the Senate victory the first legislative approval of a strong gay-rights bill. It would outlaw discrimination due to sexual orientation in jobs, housing, credit, public accommodations and state services. (The Minnesota Senate in 1973 approved, by a single vote, a House-defeated bill that did not cover gay child-workers' jobs.)

"It's very likely that Ella Grasso scuttled the bill," Pattee said, although she pointed to political maneuvering by House majority leader William O'Neill, D-East Hampton, who had just been appointed interim chairman of the Connecticut Democratic Party and

seeks the post permanently.

A party chairman's first job, Pattee observed, is to work closely with his party's highest elected officials, "and I assume he'd be willing to do Grasso a favor" on the bill.

"Still, I'm not absolutely certain we could have won in the House anyway," the 33-year-old Yale graduate student said. "At one point we had 86 members of the 151-seat House indicating they were for us, leaning toward us or questionable."

The April 23 tally of 60 yeases showed 10 defections from the 63 firm supporters Pattee had counted three weeks earlier, plus several "doubtful" members voting yes and at least one former opponent switching to support.

Gov. Grasso was questioned twice by reporters before the House vote. She said, "I have several reservations. I have not read this particular legislation, and until I do, I suppose it's better to forgo any serious discussion. . . . There have been situations where circumstances of employment have been such where concerns have been raised on the part of parents. I feel this is one other area we should examine."

Iowa Senate votes sex reform

DES MOINES — The Iowa Senate has approved a comprehensive revision of the state's entire criminal code that removes all penalties for consensual sodomy. The vote was 37 to 10.

The age consent under the new code is 14. In addition, the new package contains no prohibitions of solicitation or sex in public places, although cities are not forbidden from having their own ordinances on those subjects.

The Senate approved the 400-page bill on Feb. 27. The victory did not come to the attention of gay people outside Iowa in part because there is not active support for the revision from Iowa gays. "We're not doing any lobbying," an Iowa City male activist told CONTACT.

Indeed, there is virtually no activity for or against the sodomy provisions of the comprehensive package, even from the Iowa Bar Association. Nor was there much more than a passing mention of them during debate.

"It was made clear to the Senate exactly what it was doing. A couple of senators, law and order fundamentalists, complained during the debate that the new code would make immoral acts like these legal," a legislative observer recalled. "But there was no attempt to delete them from the bill."

The bill is now before the House Judiciary Committee, whose chairman is an active supporter and sponsor of the bill — Norman Jesse, D-Des Moines, the House speaker pro-tem. Prospects for House action before the contemplated Memorial Day adjournment were in doubt, and it appeared likely that the package will not come to a House vote before January 1976.

Eight other states have already repealed their laws against same-gender sexual activity between adults, and the California Assembly approved a bill to do so March 6.

Current Iowa law provides a 10-year maximum sentence for "carnal copulation with any opening of the body... except the genital organs." It applies equally to same-sex and opposite-sex behavior.

The new code punishes as "sexual abuse" any sexual activity with someone under 14, with maximums of 5 to 10 years, depending on which provision the prosecutor chooses. If under age 12, the maximum is 25 years. Forcible sex is punished equally severely.

Of the eight "consenting-adults" states, only Hawaii has placed the age of consent as low as 14. (The other states are Connecticut, Delaware, Ohio, Colorado, Oregon, North Dakota and Illinois.)

In contrast, the Iowa code revision retains the 1973

Iowa obscenity law that lets adults read without restriction but provides penalties for making graphic photographs available to anyone under 18.

The new code would also repeal Iowa's laws against adultery. Prostitution, male or female, remains illegal, according to Senate Legal Counsel Steve Cross.

Also prominent in support this year is State Sen. Kevin Kelly, R-Sioux City, the Judiciary chairman last session and one of the original legislators who became interested in updating the code with fairer penalties, the step that led to the comprehensive revision.

Debate on the new sex-related provisions has centered around the abortion and rape changes, Cross said. The main opposition to the entire revision, he added, has come from various police associations and their allies, which have called it "soft on crime" — providing lighter, often indeterminate sentences, and changing rules of evidence and other criminal-court procedures.

Shrinks ordered for hetero pair

DENVER — It may not be rare, in a Lesbian mother's child-custody case, for the judge to consider ordering psychiatric care for the parent.

That's what Judge Orrelle Weeks ordered in Denver — but for the heterosexual parents, as the Juvenile Court jurist approved the petition of two gay mothers April 22.

Both the father and his second wife admitted beating the 9-year-old daughter of Lesbian Evelyn Odum, who had divorced him two years ago. The beatings came to light when the girl showed her mother large black-and-blue marks during one of her twice-monthly visits.

The 9-year-old was hospitalized, and a psychiatric team from the University of Colorado Medical School told Judge Weeks that the girl has a serious emotional disturbance. They recommended she be removed from her father's home and placed in a 24-hour residential treatment center.

The father admitted the beatings — as did his

second wife, who said she too struck the child so as not to show favoritism. But they wanted the girl to remain in their home.

Ms. Odum and her lover of the past two years, who are raising the lover's 5- and 6-year-old boys, supported 24-hour treatment for the girl. Otherwise, they'd be willing to take her into their own home, gay attorney Gerald Gerash told the court. Both Lesbians sat at the counsel table, openly held hands and testified as to the love and closeness in their family unit.

Judge Weeks ordered the 9-year-old placed in the 24-hour treatment center for one year, with both sets of parents to be counseled as to the girl's special emotional needs.

Citing the heterosexuals' history of violent behavior, she ordered Mr. Odum and his second wife both to seek psychiatric therapy.

"And she added, although it wasn't an issue in this case," Gerash said, "that homosexuality by itself is no basis to determine anybody's ability to raise a child."

In state after state, gay-rights bills are emerging from committees and heading toward public-record votes in full legislative bodies.

The front-page news they are making in daily newspapers across the country in 1975 is a marked contrast to two years ago, where sex-reform was enacted only in North Dakota, and where gay-rights protections were freed by legislative committees only in Minnesota and Oregon, to face defeat.

So far this year, in the 13 states to receive gay-related legislation dealing with sex or job protections, Connecticut has become the first state where one body has approved broad job and housing protections. The Senate passed such a bill April 16; the governor and House leader are credited with roles in the bill's defeat April 23 by the House (see story on page 1).

The Colorado House and the Oregon House have created mild gay-rights bills — one covering consumer credit, the other protecting gay state employees (see stories below and on page 5).

The Iowa Senate enacted sex reforms that respect the privacy of consenting adults (story on page 1), but in Olympia the Washington Senate rejected a similar bill.

Legislatures in California, Minnesota and Massachusetts were moving rapidly toward votes on sweeping civil-rights bills, and Texas legislators held a public hearing on sex reforms. In Albany, N.Y., lobbyists were preparing strategies that promised hope this summer.

Colorado House votes credit rights

DENVER — Gay-rights protections in jobs and housing have been scuttled by a legislative committee, but the Colorado House voted April 23 to outlaw discrimination against gay people in granting credit.

The House vote was 42 to 18, and gay lobbyists promptly began to recruit supporters in the Senate.

The credit bill, which would cover banks, finance companies and department stores, was

In Washington, D.C., gay spokespeople continued their campaign to line up supporters for the Abzug-Fraser anti-discrimination bill in the U.S. Senate.

Here is a state-by-state report of progress from capitols not covered in separate news reports:

WASHINGTON

A piecemeal approach to enacting a comprehensive reform of the state's criminal code has failed to produce a repeal of "victimless crime" laws in Olympia. On April 10 the Senate voted 23 to 19 to reject a bill that would wipe consensual sex-related crimes off the books and reduce prostitution to a misdemeanor.

On April 18 Majority Leader August Mardesich met no opposition when he moved to return the sex package to the Judiciary Committee. "I think it's obvious that the votes just are not here in the floor for the bill," he said.

The measure would have repealed laws on sodomy, adultery, vagrancy and seduction, and reduced penalties for all prostitution-related offenses. Other criminal-code revisions passed by narrow margins, one by one.

TEXAS

The House Committee on Criminal Jurisprudence spent all day April 15 considering a variety of marijuana, prostitution and other "victimless crime" bills, including a proposal by its chairman, State Rep. Craig Washington,

He was absent from Austin, however, as the committee heard 45 minutes of testimony on the gay bill — from the Rev. Sanford Coon of University Methodist Church, Austin; Darrell Blakeway, lobbyist for the Defense Lawyers Association in Austin, and Jane Eleoseff, Austin psychologist.

Representing the Texas Gay Task Force were Randy Beitel, Dallas law student, who read a written statement from Dr. Robert Dain, psychologist at the University of Texas Health Services Center in Dallas, and Neal Parker, who added a brief statement of his own.

The bill was referred to a subcommittee which was not appointed immediately. Parker said the bill's prospects rest on winning support from 6 of 11 committee members. There is no Senate Companion bill.

NEW YORK

Senate Minority Leader Manfred Ohrenstein, D-Manhattan, has named an open gay, Ernest Reaugh of Albany, to his staff as a symbol of his commitment, as chief sponsor of the gay civil-rights bill. Ohrenstein is also a cosponsor of the sodomy repeal bill.

No public hearings have been scheduled on either bill, and eyes are on the Assembly to act first. Chief sponsor there, for the fifth year, is State Rep. William Passannante, a Democrat who represents the Greenwich Village gay concentration in Manhattan.

CALIFORNIA

The Assembly Labor Committee voted out John Foran's bill for gay job rights and housing protections April 7 by a vote of 6 to 2. That sent the San Francisco Democrat's bill to the Ways and Means Committee, which scarcely batted an eyelash in sending the sexual orientation proposal to the Assembly floor. An Assembly vote was expected early in May.

Meanwhile, the Senate was preparing to take up Assemblyman's Willie Brown's bill to legalize consensual sodomy, a measure which the Assembly approved March 6 by a vote of 45 to 25 and which Gov. Edmund Brown Jr. is ready to sign, gay lobbyist George Raya reported. Floor managers for the bill in Sacramento are State Sens. George Moscone, D, and Milton Marks, R, both candidates for mayor of San Francisco and eager to deliver a plum to that city's well-organized gay minority.

Episcopalian bishops

The House vote was 42 to 18, and gay lobbyists promptly began to recruit supporters in the Senate.

The credit bill, which would cover banks, finance companies and department stores, was introduced in February by State Rep. Charles DeMoulin, D-Denver.

Marge Johnson of Littleton, a Lesbian who is taking an active role in the lobbying, said it was approved unanimously by the House Judiciary Committee in March.

The bill then went before the House Business and Labor Committee for a public hearing April 8, along with three other bills covering employment, housing and public-accommodations bias against gay people.

Women's groups asked that the gay credit bill cover discrimination due to marital status, as well. The amendment was quickly adopted and the bill was recommended by the committee, 8 to 5.

At the same meeting, however, the committee killed the gay job, housing and public-accommodations bills offered by State Reps. Jack McCroskey and Wellington Webb, both D-Denver.

"The committee debated them and voted right after two hours of public testimony, and there had been no opposition — outside of a question on the job bill from someone in the League of Housewives, an anti-Equal Rights Amendment organization," Johnson said.

"We had no opportunity for input at all, once the testimony was ended," she said. "Our supporters on the committee could speak in general terms about civil rights for everyone, but they weren't in any position to deal in detail with the homophobic responses they got."

Johnson contrasted this with the generous freedom granted to feminist lobbyists in March during Judiciary Committee consideration of a rape-reform bill.

The credit bill drew little debate on the House floor April 23, save for a query from right-wing State Rep. Sam Zachem, R-Denver, about whether it would promote same-sex marriages — a question Zachem raised after a hurried whisper from an ERA opponent.

There is no Senate companion bill to any of the House gay-rights measures, nor was it clear whether any of the broader measures can be revived in the

Episcopalian bishops, Mr. Herrick confer

CHICAGO — The Rev. Robert Herrick, a gay Episcopalian minister, met for four hours April 2 with 15 Midwestern bishops, and later reported that their "tone is suddenly responsive."

"They do not seem to be ducking the issues."

The bishops were called together by the Task Force on Homophiles of the church's Committee on Pastoral Development, which was established by the Episcopalian House of Bishops at the church's 1973 convention in

Louisville, Ky.

Although the task force has held a number of regional meetings with bishops around the country, this is the first time it has asked a gay person to sit in with them. Also present was Canon Clinton P. Jones, the author of two positive books on counseling gay people in a church context.

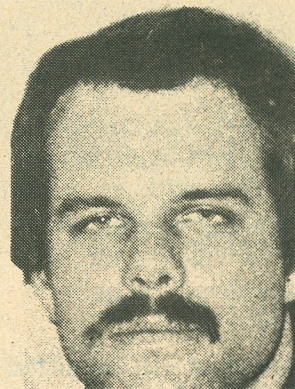
Mr. Herrick is coordinator of the

Episcopalian Gay Caucus. He is on the staff of the National Gay Task force in New York.

The bishops' task force was created in the wake of proposals to ordain gay men as ministers, and out of a growing concern to define the role of existing gay clerics, Mr. Herrick reported.

He said the House of Bishops is expected to get a progress report in September and added, "The Episcopalian Church will have to deal with this at their next convention, in Minneapolis in 1976."

The hottest issue coming before that convention, however, is already clear — the ordination of women.

MINNESOTA

Bitter clashes between gay Minneapolis men have kept the gay-rights debate lively at the Capitol in St. Paul, and State Sen. Allan Spear reported support for job and housing protections slipping.

The House Judiciary Committee approved the Human Rights Act amendments April 10 by a vote of 12 to 10, making no effort to insert protections for transvestites and transsexuals nor to replace public accommodations or public services protections that were deleted in subcommittee. The move prompted one gay man to dash forward amid hoots and catcalls, and seize the chairman's lectern, producing a prominent photograph in the Minneapolis Tribune, the state's largest morning paper.

A long-time observer of the Twin Cities gay scene attributed the divisions to personality clashes and political disputes dating to last fall, rather than the content of the bill.

Spear, the openly gay senator from Minneapolis, said the Senate will not hold hearings until after the House votes, probably in early May. Sodomy repeal is likely to get a public hearing before the House in May, as well; there is no Senate companion bill so far.

MASSACHUSETTS

The Joint Commerce and Labor Committee unanimously approved a gay job- and housing-rights bill April 23, the same day the Public Service Committee gave the nod to a gay Civil-Service employment bill. The House will take up both bills before May is ended, lobbyists predict.

A committee effort to weaken a job-rights bill, by allowing discrimination if gayness can be related to a job, was handed a setback by the personal intervention of State Rep. Elaine Noble, the Lesbian legislator from Boston. She had the "nexus" clause limited to bona-fide occupational qualifications, which observers called a significant victory.

The gay-rights bills are aided by public announcements of support from Atty. Gen. Francis X. Bellotti, a Democrat who campaigned on personal privacy issues, and House minority leader Francis Hatch, a Republican.

The bill to legalize sexual relations between consenting adults is dead, at least for 1975, Noble aide Linda Lachman reported.

Marriage licenses granted in Boulder

BOULDER, Colo. — The decision of County Clerk Clela Rorex to issue marriage licenses to same-sex couples has made Boulder a popular spot for half a dozen pairs of gay lovers, male and female.

Two gay men flew in from Los Angeles to wed April 21, in hopes that it would keep one, an Australian citizen, from being deported.

Another man promptly reported the first financial benefit: "His spouse is now covered under the group health insurance where he works," gay lawyer Gerald Gerash said in Denver. "They didn't even raise an eye when they saw it was another man, either."

Word also arrived that a Lesbian couple seek a legal marriage license in Baton Rouge, La., after being united by a Metropolitan Community Church minister in New Orleans.

Gerash threw cold water at an attempt by Colorado Atty. Gen. J. D. McFarlane to call the marriages void. McFarlane issued an opinion April 25, saying such

weddings are invalid because Colorado law refers to marriage between men and women.

"The marriage definition in the law says it's a contract between two persons, and McFarlane has no authority to stop them, anyway," Gerash said. He predicted the issue will eventually be resolved by the courts, probably if an injunction is sought by State Rep. Sam Zakhem, who requested McFarlane's opinion.

But not before more weddings take place. "I saw a couple of men only today who want to marry in Boulder next week," Gerash said, shortly after McFarlane's ruling was announced.

The first marriage license was issued March 26, and only after Rorex, who was elected clerk last November, checked with District Atty. Alex Hunter in Boulder. In a two-page opinion, the lawyer said there is nothing in Colorado law to prevent two people of the same sex from marrying one another.

The men, Dave Zamora and Dave McCord, both 27, had first tried in Colorado Springs, where they live. "As I understand it," Rorex told reporters later, "a clerk there told them, 'We don't do that sort of thing in El

Paso County — maybe you should go to Boulder County.'

Rorex added, "Believe me, I spent a lot of sleepless nights thinking about this."

The daily Rocky Mountain News said they were married promptly — as were Boulder lovers Susan Mele, 22, and Sheila Sernoitz, 23, soon after.

And a deputy clerk in Rorex's office — whose handsome lover, Colorado neighbors said, won the Mr. Jockey Shorts contest at a Colorado Springs bar last summer.

Attention from newspapers and television was heavy. A Denver Post editorial columnist wrote a long "why not?" article.

Driving down from Laramie, Wyo., were Terry Guillard, 21, and Davey Hough, 19, who asked judges and ministers all over town before they found the Rev. Charles Arehart, a United Methodist minister who serves MCC/Denver, willing to perform the ceremony April 11. They've been lovers since January.

"Usually I insist that men be together six months before I perform the service — women three months — but in this case they were from out of town and had to get back to Laramie, so I went ahead," Mr. Arehart said.

Guillard missed two days of work, as it was. "That was the excuse they used when they fired me April 14," he said of his \$2.23-an-hour ambulance driving job at Memorial Hospital. Hough is a college student.

The Los Angeles pair are Richard Adams, 28, a clerical worker, and Tony A. Sullivan, 33, an Australian writer who has been his lover for three years — and who had been warned by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service that he could be ordered out of the country at any time.

The men flew to Denver with the Rev. Robert Sirico assistant pastor at MCC/Santa Monica, who married them in the courthouse corridor as soon as the Boulder license was issued April 21. Then they drove to Denver for a full-scale ceremony at MCC, assisted by Mr. Arehart and the Rev. Freda Smith of MCC.

They called a press conference immediately in Denver and, later that day, in Los Angeles, as soon as they returned. They announced their application for a change in Sullivan's immigration status, now that he's wed to American citizen.

"I believe that our relationship is blessed by God and legalized by the laws of this country," said Sullivan, who arrived on a 1972 tourist visa and at one point married an American woman, in order to stay with Adams. "We decided we could not perpetuate a lie, so in March I had

Pittenger, Noble to address MCC

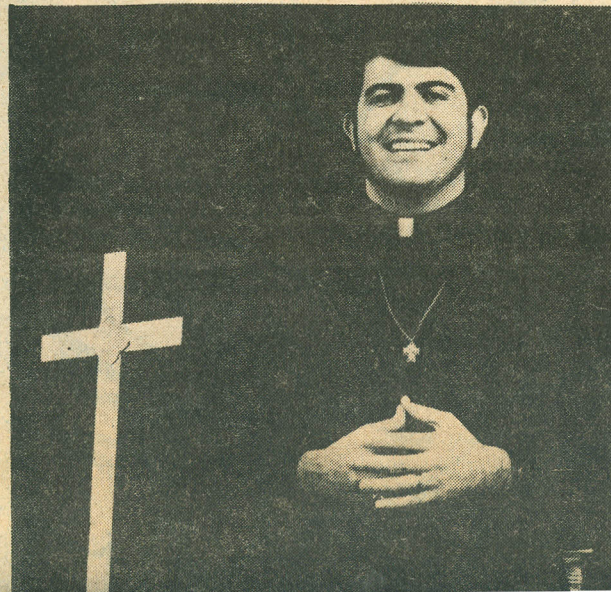
DALLAS — The Rev. Dr. W. Norman Pittenger, a prominent Anglican theologian at Cambridge University in England, will deliver the closing sermon at the 6th annual General Conference of the Metropolitan Community Church Aug. 3.

State Rep. Elaine Noble of Boston will speak a day earlier at the 5-day international convention, which may draw as many as 3,000 people to the Adolphus Hotel. The Rev. James C. Harris of MCC/Dallas is host pastor.

Dr. Pittenger, 69, has articulated the church's responsibility to change its attitudes towards gay people almost since he became an Episcopalian priest in 1937.

He is the author of 54 books, including "A Christian View of Sexual Behavior" (1954), "Making Sexuality Human" (1971), "The Christian Understanding of Human Nature" (1964), "A Time for Consent" and "Christian Words to a Homosexual." He writes frequently for prominent church magazines.

Dr. Pittenger began teaching theology at General Theological Seminary and Columbia University in 1936, and is currently on the divinity faculty at King's College

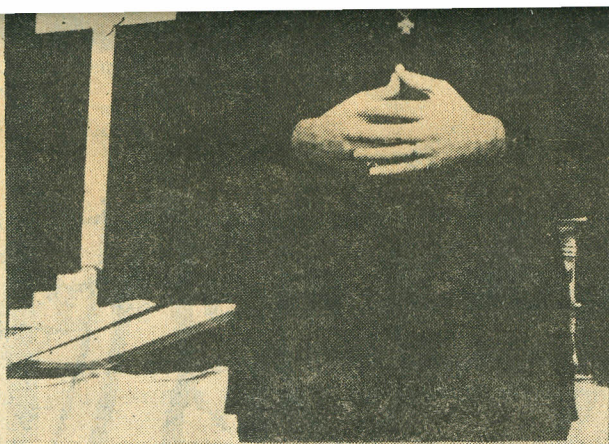
"This shows how far MCC and gay liberation have come in just six years," said the Rev. Troy D. Perry, founder of MCC.

Noble, 30, the first open gay elected to state office, will speak at a Saturday afternoon plenary on behalf of the MCC Social Action Committee.

MCC, a predominantly gay denomination founded in the late 1960s in Los Angeles after Mr. Perry was expelled from a pentecostal sect which learned he was gay, claims close to 20,000 members, mostly in the United States.

In announcing the convention plans, Mr. Perry said, "You're going to see even more prominent people involving themselves.

"In 1976 we are holding the General Conference in Washington, D.C. We are going to have a great 'Affirmation' there for all the world to see, in the

spotlight of the U.S. Bicentennial. We will be inviting gay leaders from all over the world to join with us.

"Our goal is to move from the state to the national level and see an openly gay member of Congress in time for the Bicentennial," Mr. Perry said.

The MCC founder will visit Dallas June 3-6 for a Board of Elders meeting to plan the convention. He is to speak in Fort Worth during the South Central MCC District Conference May 23-26.

Shapp bans bias by Pennsylvania

HARRISBURG, Pa. — Gov. Milton J. Shapp issued an executive order April 25 forbidding discrimination against gay women and men in hiring for state jobs, The Associated Press reported.

The order followed several meetings with Philadelphia gay activists over the past few months, aimed at opening up state government channels to the gay community. Last winter Shapp sent a personal representative to testify in support of a broad gay-rights ordinance before a Philadelphia City Council committee.

The Democrat's state hiring order is the first such by any of the 50 governors. It commits Shapp's entire administration "towards ending discrimination against persons solely because of their affectional or sexual preference" — the phrase used in the Abzug-Fraser federal gay-rights bill in Congress.

Richard Doran, Shapp's No. 1 aide, told

reporters that the "spirit and intent" of the governor's order is that "we're not going to discriminate against people in state hiring policies because of sexual preferences." The order covers tens of thousands of state jobs.

Doran and Terry Dellmuth were among the Shapp aides who, along with the governor himself, met with Harry Langhorne and Mark Segal of the Philadelphia Gay Activists Alliance last October. Shortly afterward, the Pittsburgh Gay News carried a list of staff members in six state departments who had been designated for liaison with the gay community. The list included their telephone numbers.

Later, Dellmuth set up a Gay Concerns Task Force which has met with gay-movement people to study possible legislation, as well as state departments' policies. No consenting-adults or gay civil-rights bills have been introduced in the Legislature, however.

They called a press conference immediately in Denver and, later that day, in Los Angeles, as soon as they returned. They announced their application for a change in Sullivan's immigration status, now that he's wed to American citizen.

"I believe that our relationship is blessed by God and legalized by the laws of this country," said Sullivan, who arrived on a 1972 tourist visa and at one point married an American woman, in order to stay with Adams. "We decided we could not perpetuate a lie, so in March I had the marriage annulled," Sullivan said.

Married in New Orleans in February were Gloria Villani, 49, and Earline Robin Hulsey, 34, who were wed by the Rev. Ron Anderson of MCC/Fort Worth. The following week the Lesbians applied for a legal license in Baton Rouge, where they live. Courthouse officials there are still waiting for a ruling from the Louisiana attorney general's office, and the women said they are ready to file a lawsuit if they are denied the license.

Meanwhile, two men who were united Jan. 8 in Phoenix, Ariz., saw their marriage thrown out when Judge Irwin Cantor entered default judgment against them.

Sam Burnett, 39, and Tony Secuya, 21, won headlines when they got a license Jan. 7 from Clerk of Court Wilson D. Palmer, who told reporters he could find no law forbidding them.

Angry community reactions forced an embarrassed Palmer to go into court. Unemployed but willing to fight, Burnett and Secuya spent \$1,000 in lawyer fees to fight criminal charges against them successfully, but they had nothing left to answer Palmer's civil suit against their union.

"Marriage is and always has been a contract between a man and a woman," Judge Cantor said in declaring their marriage void. "The institution of marriage, as a union of man and woman, involving the procreation and rearing of children within the family, is as old as the book of Genesis."

Later, the two men were arrested and jailed on charge charges of armed robbery. They are accused of holding up a hitchhiker for \$35 with a shotgun. Police told reporters that Secuya, wielding the shotgun, was wearing a dress when officers picked the men up.

State Rep. Donna Carlson, R-Mesa, reacted to the marriage by introducing a bill in the Legislature to outlaw same-sex marriages specifically. It passed the Arizona House handily, but Caroline Laughlin of the Gay People's Alliance in Phoenix said gay activists have been assured the bill will be pigeonholed in the Senate. The bill lies now in the Senate Natural Resources Committee, not the Judiciary Committee Carlson expected.

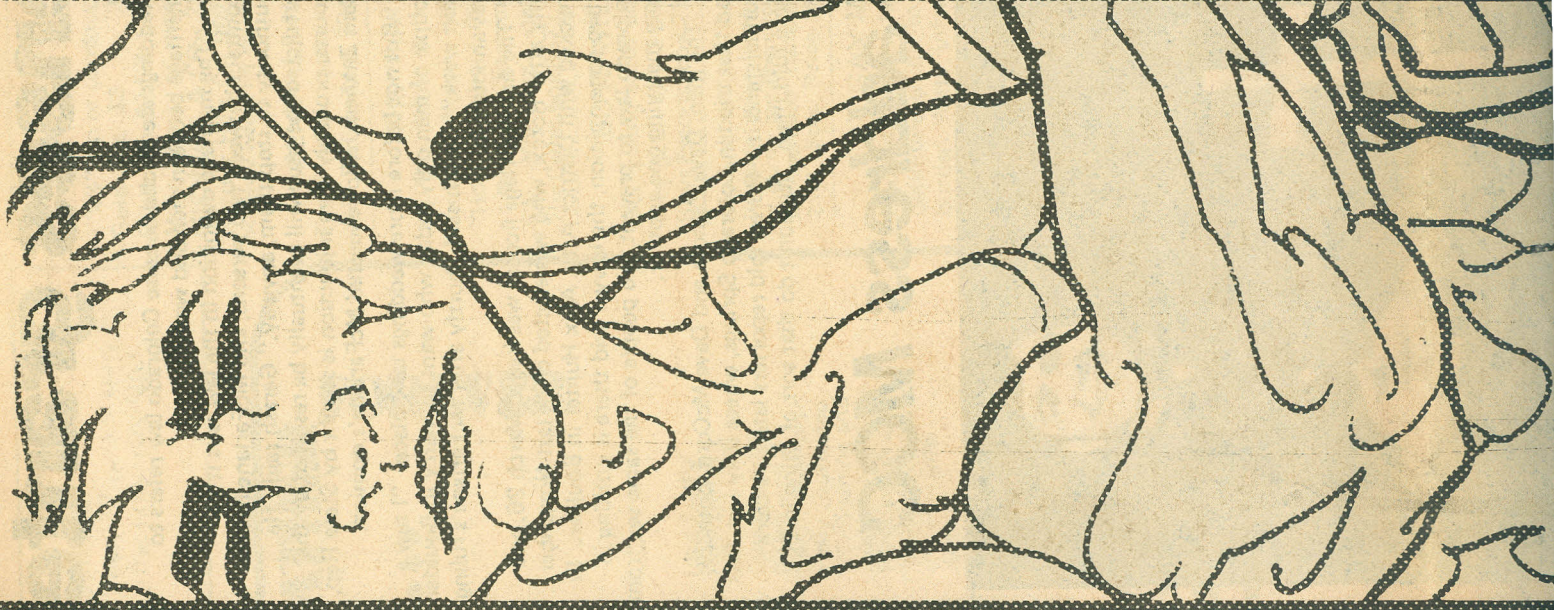

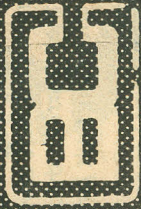

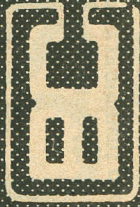

State-employees bill falls short in Oregon

SALEM, Ore. — A bill to protect Oregon's 24,000 state employees from gay discrimination on the job fell a single vote short of passing the Oregon House — not once, but on two separate attempts.

The tallies appear to close any prospect of gay-rights legislation for Oregon until 1977, because a measure to enact broad protections against discrimination due to sexual orientation is bottled up in an unfriendly committee

The first vote on the state-employees bill came April 21, when it received a favorable margin in a 30 to 29 rollcall vote. To pass, a bill in Oregon needs a full majority of the 60-member House, or 31 votes.

On the second vote April 30, lobbyist Ken Allison of Portland was ready for a close call, but he knew several legislators had switched in favor of the bill. And there were several crossovers, including House Speaker Bill Lang, who surprised observers by voting for his first gay-rights bill.

But the total was again 30 to 29, a single vote short of passage. It is the same count by which a gay-rights bill came close to approval in 1973.

Allison, 26, a \$500-a-month lobbyist for the gay movement, had already been assured by Gov. Robert Straub, in a brief private interview, that he would sign any gay-rights measure that reaches his desk.

Broad gay-rights protections, outlawing discrimination in housing, schools and public accommodations on the basis of "sexual orientation," and in employment due to sexual orientation and marital status, appear to be dead for this year.

Allison said the House State and Federal Affairs Committee, which held a noisy, two-hour public hearing on the bill April 4, has emerged distinctly unfriendly to State Reps. Vera Katz and Steve Kafoury's proposal. Allison sees little prospect that the Portland Democrats' bill can be wrested from the panel before summer adjournment.

The Civil Service bill was almost an accident. What happened, Allison said, is that the Executive Department asked for a "housekeeping" bill forbidding sex discrimination in state employment.

When it came before the House Ways and Means Committee, which supervises state departments, Katz moved to add sexual orientation and marital status to the protected categories. The committee concurred on April 16.

When the bill came to the House floor April 21, however, opponents raised objections about child-workers, and the bill received only 30-to-29 approval. It takes a majority of the whole 60-member House, 31 votes, to pass.

Two legislators immediately announced plans to seek reconsideration, and the next day the House agreed to reconsider, with 33 yes notes. The bill went April 23 to the House Human Resources Committee, where Kafoury sits, and the committee added a clause that switched enough votes for lobbyist Allison to be confident of House approval.

The new clause says gay discrimination is illegal "where such (sexual) preference or conduct does not bear a demonstrable relationship to the effective performance of the employment assignment in question."

Allison said this clause put the burden of proof on the discriminator, not the prospective gay employee. The gay protections would cover only state workers in classified Civil Service jobs, not seasonal or temporary employees of the state.

Allison has been working full-time in Salem since Jan. 15. A veteran of the anti-war and alternative press movements, he has been active in the gay movement since early 1970 in one capacity or another, he told CONTACT.

He debuted as a lobbyist in efforts before the Portland City Council last December, and his Salem salary is paid out of a \$4,000 war chest raised for lobbying with the aid of a variety of gay Oregon groups.

Church gives \$500

PHILADELPHIA — The United Church of Christ has given \$500 in cash to the United Church Gay Caucus.

The funds came from the 2-million-member church's Board for Homeland Ministries, which had been supporting the Council for Religion and the Homosexual in San Francisco since 1964. The 1975 grant was diverted to the Gay Caucus on learning that the Rev. William R. Johnson, a gay United Church minister, resigned as secretary of the council in December.

The \$500 is the second direct denomination grant to a Protestant gay caucus, following \$2,000 approved by an American Lutheran Church board in December for Lutherans Concerned for Gay People.

Will ERA legalize gay marriages?

A CONTACT News Roundup

An obscure student article in the Yale Law Review is being cited with increasing frequency by opponents of the Equal Rights Amendment, who says the research proves that the ERA would legalize same-sex marriages.

The unsigned article, published by Yale University law students in January 1973, argues that to permit a man to marry a woman, but not to marry another man (and vice-versa for Lesbians), amounts to discrimination based on sex.

The anti-ERA forces are raising other arguments, too, of course — that women would be drafted into the Marines, and that separate restrooms would have to be abolished.

One feminist in Austin, Texas, met that latter issue head-on during an ERA repeal attempt in April.

Billie Carr of Houston stepped just inside the men's-room foyer at the Texas Capitol. Her confederate waited outside and, at just the right moment, tapped on the door.

Carr stepped into the hallway in full view of three conservative women, who were carrying pastries to reinforce their image as happy homemakers.

"They almost dropped them," Carr recalled with a chuckle later.

It is not clear that the ERA attackers are being believed in their gay-marriage, restroom or other arguments — nor that the Yale article's logic is sound. But the full-scale attack is apparently succeeding in raising doubts in legislators' minds as to the long-range effects of the feminist amendment, which proponents agree will be wide-ranging.

So far, 34 states have ratified the amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Opponents' strength has emerged this year greater than expected, however, and ratification has failed in North Carolina and Florida recently. For this year ERA ratification remains alive only in Illinois and Missouri.

The Yale article takes note of the widely-publicized lawsuit brought in 1970 by Jack Baker and J. Michael McConnell of Minneapolis, in their quest for a legal marriage license. The U.S. Supreme Court in 1972 declined to hear the case, saying there was no "federal question" involved.

The Yale article says, "Their claim, however, would almost certainly be vindicated under the proposed Equal Rights Amendment, which would establish a stricter prohibition against discriminatory treatment along sexual lines."

For one thing, the Yale students wrote, the Supreme Court has often been willing to throw out long-standing laws which discriminate against certain classes, especially classes based on attributes "inherent... wholly or largely beyond (individuals') control."

Child-bearing has never been an accepted legal criterion for marriage, the article says. Marriage provides, besides tax, property, inheritance and other legal benefits, a "stability, respectability, and emotional depth (to) any relationship... homosexual or heterosexual."

It adds, "Legislative classifications disfavoring homosexuals may in fact be based upon prejudice and misinformation about the nature of that condition."

The article notes that Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., denied during Senate debate on the ERA that the amendment would legalize gay marriages, "so long as licenses were denied equally to both male and female pairs."

Conceding that legislative debates are often crucial in

court interpretations of what the law intends, the article then cites *Loving V. Virginia*, a case in which the Supreme Court struck down an interracial marriage law that applied equally to blacks and whites. This case "would appear to raise a strong presumption that homosexual couples could not be uniformly denied marriage licenses" if the ERA is adopted.

The 16-page article carries 76 footnotes, ranging from Baker-McConnell law briefs to works by homophobic psychiatrist Irving Bieber. He is cited to refute assumptions that gay people are all child molesters or can be "changed" by "therapy."

The article concludes, "The stringent requirements of the proposed ERA argue strongly for removal of this (legislative) stigma (of deviance) by granting marriage licenses to homosexual couples who satisfy reasonable and non-discriminatory qualifications."

Bible school ejects 2


DALLAS — After repeated, Bible-quoting pleas to change their sinful ways, President Gordon R. Mumford has expelled two gay students from Southern Bible Training School.

The 27-year-old ex-students, Bob Miller and Dan Austin, described Dr. Mumford's attitude as genuine if uninformed concern, not hateful homophobia. The college has 300 students.

It was Miller, an exhorter at MCC/Dallas who enrolled in the non-denominational, fundamentalist school last September to prepare for MCC ordination, who raised the gay question. After delivering a sermon on Christian love in homiletics class in March, he asked his audience if they could love him, as a gay Christian.

Dr. Mumford called him in a week later — and the following week also expelled Miller's close friend Austin, an MCC deacon, despite a 2-hour visit from the Rev. James C. Harris, pastor at MCC/Dallas.

A lawyer told the expelled men that, in the absence of an anti-discrimination law, they have no legal recourse against a private college

Saxe arrested; 4 Lesbians still jailed in FBI probe

PHILADELPHIA — An FBI agents' sweep of the Lesbian-feminist community in half a dozen cities resulted in the arrest March 27 of Susan Saxe, 26, who is charged with two armed robberies, conspiracy and theft.

The FBI's national search continues for the Lesbian wanted as Saxe's partner, Katherine Ann Power.

Meanwhile, four gay women remain jailed for contempt of court for refusing to answer grand-jury questions about the women, and the National Gay Task Force has asked 38 Washington liberal officials to help them expose the extent of FBI and other intelligence agencies files on gay women and men.

Since the 1970 bank robberies in Boston and Philadelphia, the FBI had traced Saxe to New Haven and Hartford, Conn.; Lexington, Ky., and Philadelphia, where her picture was circulated by FBI agents in gay bars the latter half of March.

Saxe, who was using the name Val Woolf, was arrested walking down a Philadelphia street hand in hand with her lover, Byrna Aronson, 27, a staff member of the Philadelphia ACLU branch. The policeman who spotted them had been briefed on Saxe only shortly before.

Saxe, affirming radical rhetoric, pleaded not guilty to all charges. She is jailed in lieu of posting \$350,000 bond in Philadelphia, where she will be tried on the first of the charges against her.

Meanwhile, eight gay men and women who were jailed for refusing to answer grand-jury questions in

Lexington, Hartford and New Haven, four women remain behind bars. Of the others, two were released when the grand-jury term expired, and two others relented and were released after questioning.

Lawyers for several of the eight have accused the FBI of abusing the grand-jury system by arranging for those who refuse to talk to agents — which isn't illegal — to be called before the juries, where they must answer or face jail for contempt.

Lesbians in Cincinnati and other cities also accuse the FBI of gratuitously exposing, or threatening to expose, closeted gays to parents and employers, as agents seek information in their search. Saxe was, and Power still is, on the FBI's Ten Most Wanted list.

The New York Times said prominent Lesbians agreed on a uniform, no-answers policy at a national meeting early in March.

Copies of an ACLU pamphlet, "The Right to Remain Silent," were widely circulated among Philadelphia Lesbians. "What I sense, at least among Lesbians, is a phenomenal sense of unity," Aronson told the Philadelphia Inquirer after her lover's arrest.

"The issue here isn't Susan Saxe," said Aronson, who had believed her to really be Val Woolf all along. "The issue is the FBI coming down heavy on Lesbian communities. There's a sense that the FBI would really like to infiltrate and find out what's going on."

Bruce Voeller, executive director of the gay task force, wrote 12 U.S. senators and 25 House members March 30, asking their help in learning which federal agencies, besides the FBI, compile files on gay people or anyone else because of sexual activity — and to whom the information is made available.

Voeller also asked "how many American citizens are listed as homosexuals in various government files," how often this is used to bring charges against or blackmail them, and where the funding for it comes from.

Hoover aide dies

WASHINGTON — Clyde A. Tolson, retired deputy director of the FBI and for over 30 years the closest friend of J. Edgar Hoover, died in a Washington hospital April 14. He was 74.

Like Hoover, Mr. Tolson was a bachelor. Hoover picked him up in his limousine each morning on the way to work, and the two men lunched and dined together daily, visited the racetrack together, vacationed together.

Mr. Tolson resigned from the FBI the day after Hoover died in 1972 and spent his last years living in the \$100,000 Georgetown home which the director bequeathed to him, the New York Times reported.

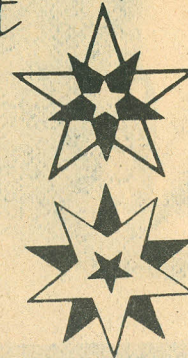
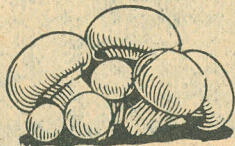

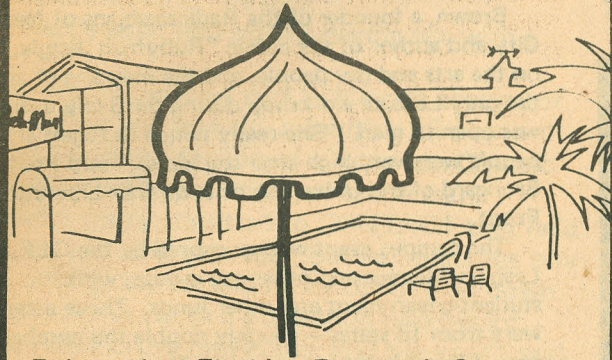

Police rap with Eureka Valley

SAN FRANCISCO — Few heterosexuals showed up for a weekend symposium on "Improved Attitudes: Gays and Straights" in the Eureka Valley neighborhood April 12-13.

About 1½ dozen police officers — in plain clothes, but still easy to spot — were among the 100 or so denim-clad Eureka residents who spent the two days in a variety of workshops, after a welcome from Ernest Asten, chairperson of the neighborhood's Police-Community Relations Council.

None of the local straights who have been antagonistic toward their gay neighbors — because of traffic congestion around gay bars, litter on the streets and concern for children — showed up to get better acquainted.

In contrast, 200 people attended a council meeting several months back, after a police sweep. The same number attended the neighborhood's first meeting of Bay Area Gay Liberation recently.

For the gay residents of the Eureka Valley are active as a community, not just as a subculture. It's said to be the best-organized gay ghetto west of Greenwich Village.

Planning for this affair started last year, after former council leader Thomas M. Edwards sought a city-wide seminar; 200 signed a petition for the Eureka Valley event.

Most didn't show up, although coordinator Henry Ferrari said he sent an invitation to every petitioner for the event, held at Everett Junior High School on Church St.

Not all gay people on hand said they are satisfied with their neighborhood. One said Castro St. has "the atmosphere of a huge open-air bar." Others said they prefer to shop in Noe Valley, some distance away.

At the workshop on the Psychological/Technological Power of the Police, some gays complained that police really serve the interest of people who don't live in Eureka Valley — and accused officers of "defining our society," while gay people become the victims.

Several officers retorted that the police force is not monolithic, and one said privately that many policemen disagreed with the policies of the former captain at the Mission Station.

Another officer complained that the public doesn't treat policemen as human beings. He cited his own experience at a private party — as soon as he entered, everyone went to the bathroom. The toilet flushed constantly for at least 20 minutes, he said.

distrust, dislike and are suspicious of each other."

Another group contemplated a Civilian Review Board, and looked in detail at police-neighborhood relationships, facilitator Frank Fitch said.

Women related horror stories about the police at their own workshop, but the meeting reportedly "ended in general good feelings."

Ray Carlson, the police-community relations officer who works with the gay community, reported most of the police said they benefitted from the symposium. Others attending were Capt. Kevin Mullin of the Mission Station; newly retired Sgt. Elliott Blackstone, once the liaison man with gays, and Mary Jane Scharff, city-wide coordinator of the neighborhood police-community relations councils.

MCC charters 43rd congregation

HOUSTON — Metropolitan Community Church of the Resurrection was chartered April 20 as a congregation of the fast-growing gay denomination.

The Houston parish becomes MCC's 43rd parish, according to Frank Zerilli, secretary of the Universal Fellowship of MCC at the Los Angeles headquarters. It is the 41st in the United States, besides congregations in London, England, and Toronto.

In addition, Zerilli said, there are 46 study groups, missions and investigatory groups of MCC in the U.S., Nigeria, Australia, New Zealand and Europe.

Close to 60 people, about one-fourth of them women, turned out for the charter banquet April 19 in the church's storefront at 2020 Waugh Dr., for a ham dinner and short talks by the Rev. Robert M. Falls of Oklahoma City and the Rev. Ron Anderson of Fort Worth.

The group honored its interim board of directors and silver-haired Arnold Lawson, who has been a prime figure in the growth of the Houston church. Some 44 persons had signed the charter as members by banquet time, and more were expected to soon after.

Mr. Falls said Houston is the fifth congregation in the South Central District which he coordinates, including New Orleans, Dallas, Fort Worth and his Oklahoma parish.

No pastor has been called by the Houston board yet. William Baer continues as exhorter and worship coordinator.

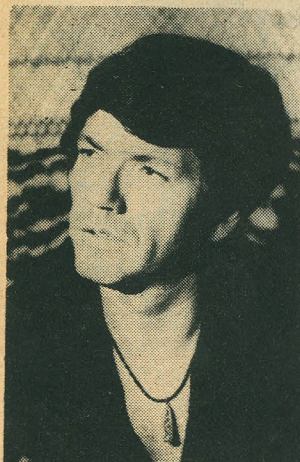

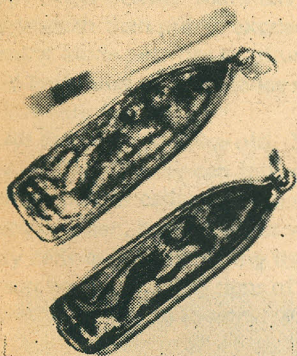

400 hear Brown, Crompton in Iowa

IOWA CITY, Iowa — A Gay Pride Conference of almost 400 people — at times strained by pressures of counter-culture and Lesbian separatism — was united April 12 by writer Rita Mae Brown.

Brown, a founder of the Radicalesbians of New York City and author of the comic "Rubyfruit Jungle," spoke on the arts and gay people, and the meaning of art, at the only Lesbian workshop during the 3-day event that was open to men. "She really pulled us together, and people were very high after she spoke," said Fred Brungard of the University of Iowa Gay Liberation Front.

The campus event was sponsored by the GLF, the Lesbian Alliance and other gay groups, with student-government and other funds. Those attending were from 18 states — roughly double the number a year ago. Almost half were women. The keynoter was Tomi Avicelli, a Philadelphia transvestite activist.

A strong impression was left by Prof. Louis Crompton of the University of Nebraska, who read his Gay Academic Union paper on gay genocide, which traces the systematic persecution and killing of gay people from Leviticus up to the 220,000 gays who died in Nazi concentration camps, according to figures Crompton attributed to the Austrian Lutheran Church.

A religion workshop was led by Catholic journalist Brian McNaught of Detroit and the Rev. Jerry Sloan of MCC/Des Moines. There was a strong presence from the rural counter-culture centered in Iowa City and Grinnell.

The event closed with enthusiastic discussion of a prospective gay film festival possibly next fall.

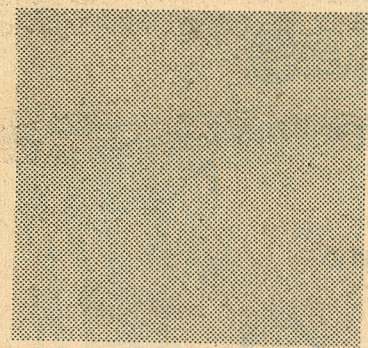

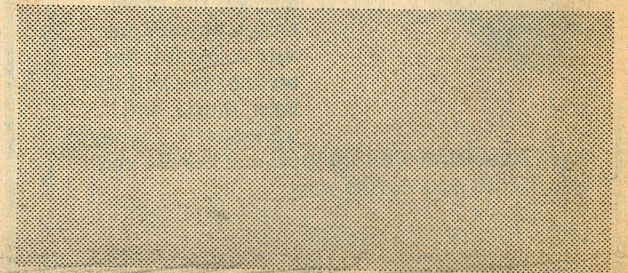

NOW finds lawyers in S&M murder case

HOUSTON — A feminist organization has provided the names of three lawyers to a Houston man who is charged with first-degree murder in an S&M slaying that made headlines in January.

The legal referral was made by the Sexuality and Lesbianism Task Force of the Houston chapter of the National Organization for Women, which recently surveyed Houston professionals for gay and feminist sensitivity.

Facing the murder trial is Paul C. Green, 27, who is charged with the pistol slaying of Joseph Chamberlain, 34, great-nephew of Neville Chamberlain, the British prime minister of the 1930s.

In a letter to CONTACT seeking help, California native Green gave his side of the Jan. 24 meeting with Chamberlain.

"I was transferred to Houston in January. I've always hung with the 'butch' crowd and never had any problems avoiding the SM types. I went to a bar, Mary's, where I met a leather-type from England," Green wrote.

"I went home with him, after (saying I was) new in town and had no friends or relatives. He tried to interest me in the sadomasochistic games which were his bag.

"I turned off — at which time he pulled a pistol and

forced me at gunpoint for 2½ days to play the role of slave. After suffering incredible and inhumane tortures for that period, I got the gun from him and the rest was headlines. . .

"For this service to humanity I am charged with first-degree murder. The uniqueness is that I am a LIVING victim of this Houston Sex Syndrome. That's the only thing I have going for me right now."

Green, whom police had described as an unemployed welder, complained that his court-appointed lawyer "is not understanding of the case at all. . . He wants to hire a private investigator to show a picture of the sadist in Houston's gay bars (you know how that would go over), hoping to find others who have gone with him.

"I don't figure there are any alive — he intended to kill me," Green wrote.

Green, who is jailed under \$20,000 bond, was identified by Chamberlain's co-workers who visited his apartment three days after the two men tricked, to see why Chamberlain had missed work. They said they saw Green cleaning up bloodstains. The body was found two days after that visit, shot three times in the head. Police told reporters it was tied up and crammed into a crate.

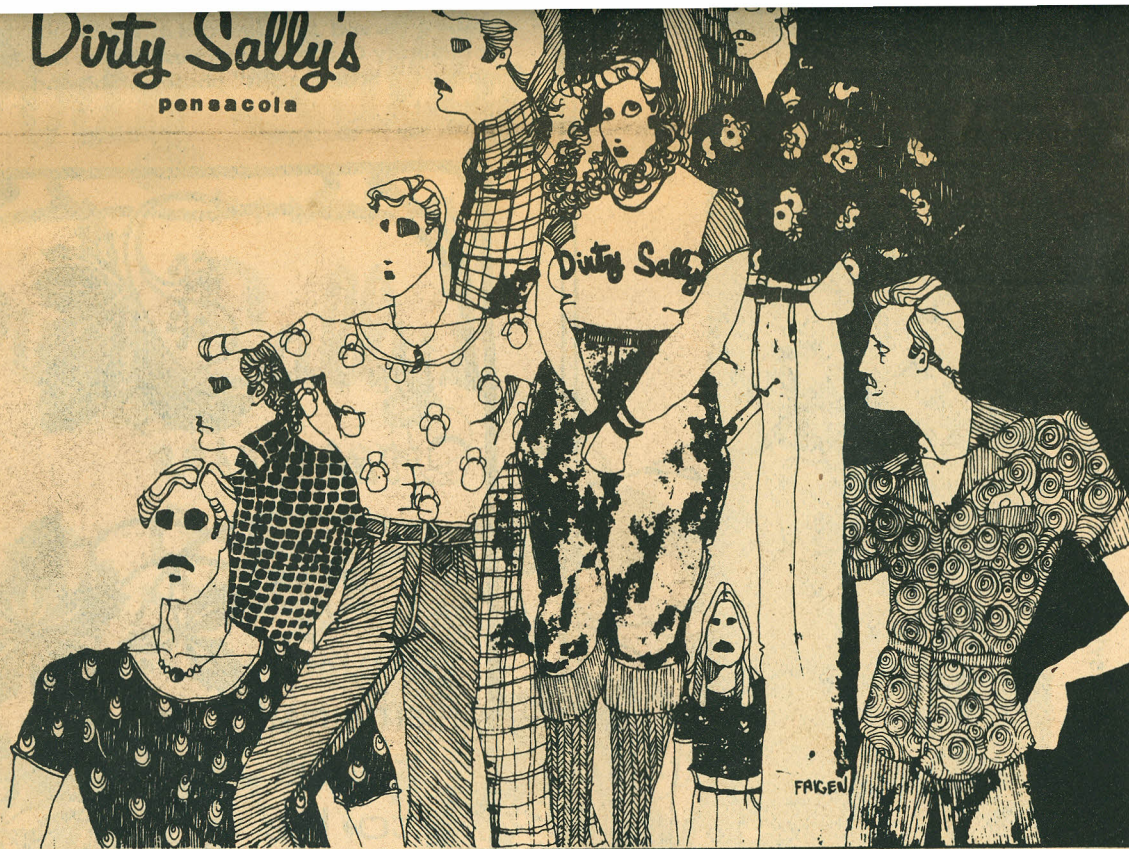

The House leader, originally a supporter, voted to defeat the bill himself. Gov. Grasso met with Senate leaders after the Senate vote, voicing her displeasure about the gay bill ("At least she could have discussed it with me," sponsor Houdson said), and Pattee said the governor probably contacted House allies, as well.

The formidable lobbying effort she led included an extensive letter-writing campaign, an impressive array of witnesses at an orderly public hearing April 3, united male and Lesbian efforts, and support from gay bar owners as well as gay and established non-gay political groups.

Pattee had heavy praise for local lobbyists who helped coordinate the effort — including Roberta Ann, Carl Williams and Jack Winkler in New Haven; Clyde Proch, Lenny Semons, Laurie Green and Gail Robinson in Hartford; Stan Sussman, Milford; Joan Grusson, Stamford; Don Zajac and Bill Coplon in Middletown; and Chuck Jesky, Bridgeport.

Texas profs unite

AUSTIN, Texas — A Steering Committee was chosen April 12 as the start of a permanent organization for the South Central Region of the Gay Academic Union, at the conclusion of the GAU's first regional conference at the University of Texas.

About 75 Texas professors, non-campus professionals and graduate students — some 40 per cent of them Lesbians — attended the event and heard discussion of founding a regional or national academic journal for gays, and plans for a fall event.

Featured speakers were Robert Helmreich, Austin psychology professor who discussed his research into stress conditions, personality testing and masculinity-femininity traits for NASA; and Jaye Miller, historian at the University of Houston, who discussed androgyny in turn-of-the-century literature.

Duluth to take up rights bill

DULUTH, Minn. — Extensive amendments to Duluth's civil-rights ordinance, aimed at discrimination due to marital status, "affectional or sexual preference," sex and welfare status, have been proposed by the city's Fair Employment and Housing Practices Commission.

Although the bill is not scheduled for formal introduction in the City Council until late May, the gay-rights provisions have already been criticized by Council members Robert LaPine and Elnora Johnson, who cited moral and religious grounds.

Prospects for the bill in this heavily blue-collar, Catholic-influenced city of 100,000 were not clear. The city's black minority is tiny (about 2 per cent), and the Chippewa and gay communities are not organized. The area's single gay bar is in adjacent Superior, Wis.

The bill was drafted over the past seven months by the rights commission, with the assistance of ACLU

lawyer Newton Friedman and Iver Bogen, who teaches sexuality courses at the University of Minnesota Medical School campus in Duluth.

"And they don't want gay people to get involved in working for the ordinance," gay Duluth native Gary E. Johnson of Minneapolis said after a visit to his home town last November.

The bill would forbid discrimination in jobs, housing, credit, public accommodations and labor unions by adding gays, welfare recipients, the mentally and physically handicapped to the existing law that covers racial and religious minorities.

The principal backer of the extensive amendments is Council member Maureen Bye, who is also on the rights commission. On April 8 she brought it before the Council's Personnel Committee, which she chairs, for a series of four public hearings.

It was then that Council members Johnson and LaPine voiced their reservations. Others on the 9-seat Council have not yet chosen sides nor has Mayor Robert C. Beaudin, except to observe that much of the bill would duplicate existing state and federal laws.

Gay exhibit set

ANAHEIM, Calif. — The National Gay Task Force will have an exhibit of photos and literature giving "a strong, positive portrayal of healthy, happy, loving women" at the American Psychiatric Association convention in Anaheim May 5-7.

The display, to be staffed by Lesbians, is the first which the psychiatrists have permitted from a gay organization.

"We believe it is evidence of their interest in putting muscle behind their pledge a year ago to fight for gay civil-rights," task force Director Bruce Voeller said in New York, in appealing for donations to cover \$500 in travel and production costs (80 Fifth Ave., New York 10011).

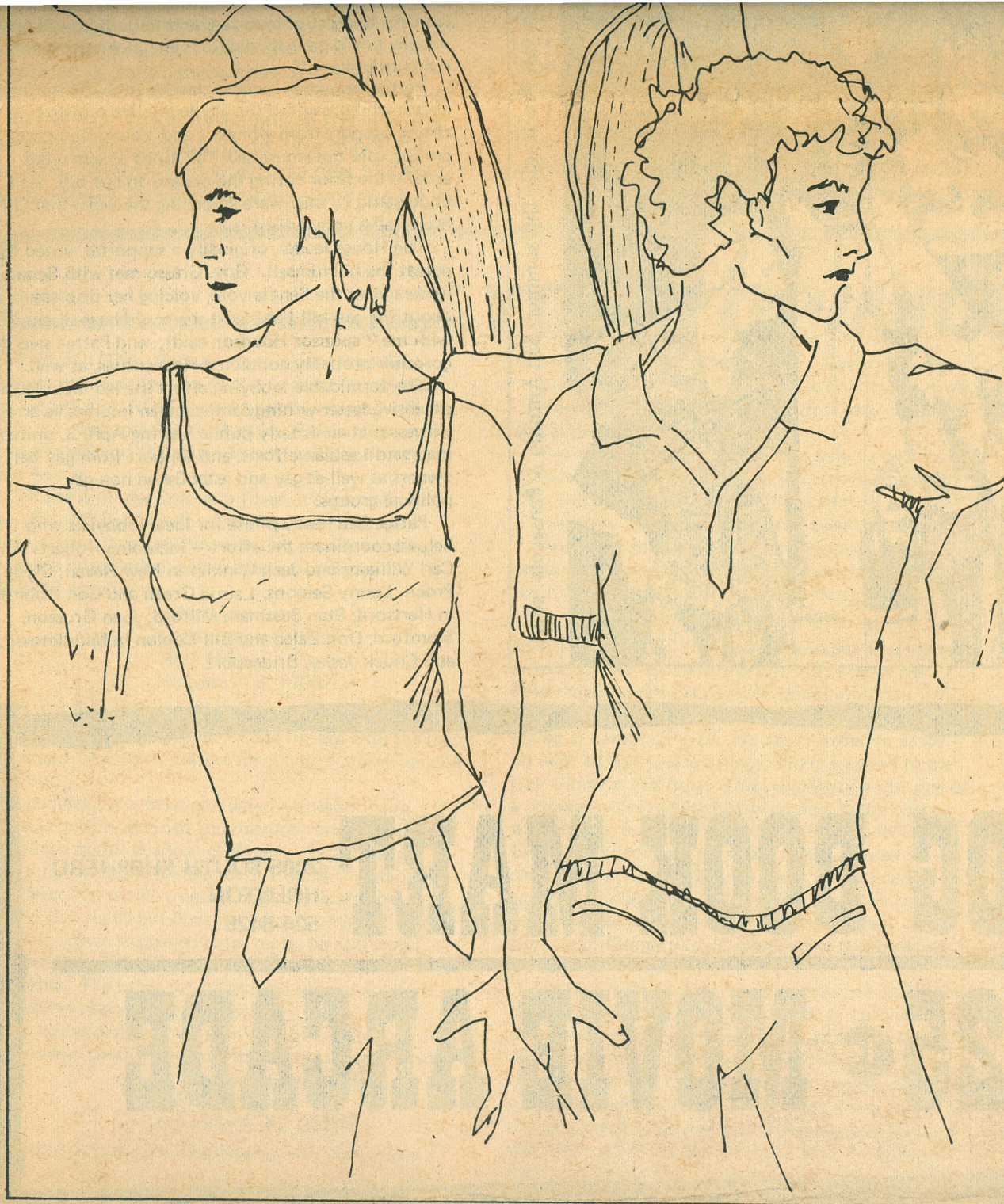

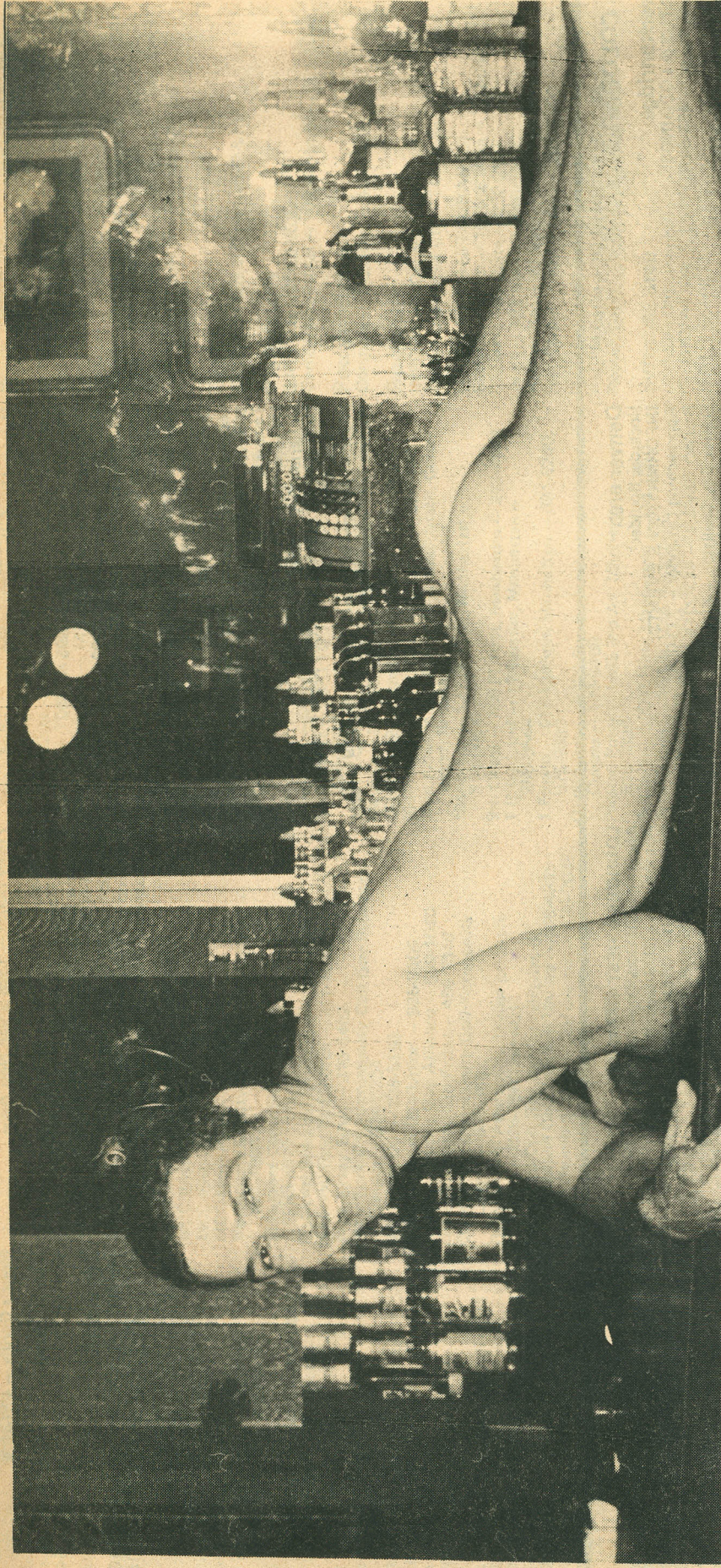
